Unable to Accept Simpson's Report, Political Commission of Jewish Agency Declares

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 27—While not casting any doubt on the competence or impartiality of Sir John Simpson, who is in Palestine to investigate problems of land settlement, immigration and development, the political commission of the Jewish Agency, which has just concluded its session here, declared its inability to accept an expert's report as the verdict on the future of the Jewish National Home.

The statement released by the political commission says that "technical and economic calculations cannot deal with the imponderables of will and work of a nation. The determination and energy of the Jewish people can extend Palestine's potentialities beyond the limits of an immediate definition. The Jewish National Home is the central purpose of the Palestine Mandate and

France Threatened with Stoppage of Immigration

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, June 27—France, now practically the only country in Europe to which the Jews of Eastern Europe could immigrate and find employment, is threatening to close its gates to immigrants. The possibility of this action, foreshadowed by an announcement from Premier Tardieu that France is threatened with unemployment, is causing great anxiety among the Jews of France.

In making this announcement M. Tardieu cited the campaign in the French newspapers for the stoppage of immigration.

Decreased Budget Indicates Comzet Frowns on Bira Bidjan

Moscow, June 27—Indications that the Comzet, government department for settling the Jews on the land, is retreating from its plans to establish a Jewish republic in Bira Bidjan, Far Eastern Republic, are seen in a decision taken today by the Comzet to transfer 325,000 roubles assigned to Bira Bidjan to Crimea. Further reductions in the Bira Bidjan budget were considered and a commission to take action on it was appointed.

It was also decided that starting this Fall the Comzet will discontinue financing Jewish colonization in the Cherson, Krivorog and Melitopol districts of White Russia. While the Jews in these regions are somewhat concerned at this action it will not affect the colonization activities of the Agro-Joint, the Ort or the Jewish Colonization Association.

30 Industrial Guilds Employing 4,000 Jews to Be Established in Ukraina by the Ort

Moscow, June 27—Thirty Jewish industrial guilds employing 4,000 Jews are planned in Ukraina by the foreign Ort in Moscow. It contemplates the establishment in practically every small town of Ukraina of a factory or other industrial enterprise suitable to the raw material obtainable in the region. Brick kilns, metallurgical plants and timber works for which the Ort will supply the machinery and tools from America and Germany will be built.

These plants will be established in Kiev, Odessa, Uman, Smiela, Choenik, Shpole, Lipovetz, Talne, Cherkas, Korosten, Kamenez Podolsk and Nikolaev. A spectacles factory will also be built in Moscow where 150 Jews will be employed and a furniture plant will be opened in Vitebsk where 300 Jews will find work. In addition to these contemplated undertakings the Ort has already established industrial enterprises for 3,300 declassed Jews, nearly half of them in Ukraina and the rest in White Russia and Central Russia.

Oscar Gruenbaum Named Head of Austrian Zionists

Vienna, June 27—Dr. Oscar Gruenbaum was elected president of the Austrian Zionists at the conclusion of the party conference here. It was decided to hold another conference in the Fall to decide whether the Austrian Zionists should engage in local politics or restrict themselves exclusively to Zionism and Palestine.

Resolutions adopted expressed indignation at the stoppage of immigration to Palestine, the British government's "anti-Mandate policy," demanded the close settlement of the Jews on the land and protested against the withdrawal of the visa from Vladimir Jabotinsky, Zionist Revisionist leader. The activities of the Brith Shalom were condemned as breaking the national front. A resolution criticizing Dr. Judah L. Magnes and censuring the Zionist Executive was defeated.

Form French Society of Hebrew University Friends

Paris, June 27—A French Society of the Friends of the Hebrew University was organized here today under the presidency of Justin Godart. Among those who have joined are Louis Barthou, minister of justice; Leon Blum, Socialist leader; Paul Painleve, former premier; M. de Monzeo and others prominent in French public life.

House Committee Rejects Bill That Would Have Cut Quota Immigration by 50 Percent

Washington, June 27—By a vote of six to five the House immigration committee today rejected the Johnson bill to cut the immigration quota in half thus removing the danger of the bill passing during the closing days of the present session of Congress. Had not Congressman Dickstein cancelled his plans to leave Washington yesterday and arranged, to remain for another day to be present at the voting of the bill, it would have been voted out favorably for consideration by the House. It was his vote which saved the situation.

Congressman Dickstein led the fight against the bill in a bitter debate which took place this morning. Another unexpected development took place, when Congressman Cable of Ohio proposed another bill to the committee, giving the President authority to suspend all immigration at any time within his discretion. This bill was also rejected, by a vote of seven to four.

During the debate on the Johnson bill, Congressman Dickstein called attention to the drastic cuts which have been made in the annual immigration, from 1,300,000 before the War, to the present figure of 150,000 besides non-

Berlin Police Chief Promises to Allay Pogrom Atmosphere

Berlin, June 27—M. Zoergriebel, police president of Berlin, today assured the executive committee of the German Union of Jewish Frontier Soldiers that the police would do everything in their power to safeguard the life and property of citizens. The executive of the Union had waited upon the police president to express its serious concern at the growth of a pogrom atmosphere.

M. Zoergriebel has already sent out a radio appeal to the public to help the police in maintaining order. Tuesday the Union will hold a mass meeting in the City Hall to protest against the pogrom atmosphere. The mass meeting will be addressed by George Bernhard and M. Kareski, president of the Berlin Jewish community.

30 Cases of Typhoid Reported in Emek; 2 Fatalities

Jerusalem, June 27—Over thirty cases of typhoid have been reported among the colonists in the Emek. Two fatalities have been recorded. Most of the cases are in Beth Alpha, Afuleh and Kfar Ezekiel. General inoculation of typhoid antitoxin has started.

Communists Decline to Accept Renouncing Poale Zion Leaders

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 27—The Central Communist Party has refused to accept into the party the 24 former leaders of the left-wing Poale Zion, who some weeks ago publicly denounced their belief in Zionism, gave up their fight against Bira Bidjan and applied for membership in the Communist Party. It is understood that they were informed that their acceptance into the party en bloc was impossible but that they could apply individually to local Communist groups who would consider whether they were suitable candidates for the party.

"Doar Hayom" Permitted to Appear Once More

Jerusalem, June 27—The Jerusalem Hebrew daily, "Doar Hayom," which had been suspended some days ago together with two Arab dailies will be allowed to appear again Friday, Wolfgang von Weisl, German newspaperman, who was wounded during the riots last August, is expected to join the staff. During its suspension the paper appeared several times under different names.

Councillor to Iraq's High Commissioner May Be Palestine Chief Secretary

Jerusalem, June 27—With Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, leaving for London Sunday, it is reported that Hubert Young, now councillor to the High Commissioner of Iraq, will be named chief secretary of the Palestine government to succeed Harry C. Luke, recently appointed lieutenant governor of Malta. If Mr. Young is not named Sir Stewart Davis, treasurer of Palestine, is the most likely nominee for the post.

When the High Commissioner is out of the country the chief secretary is acting High Commissioner, consequently there is great interest here in who will be selected as the new chief secretary.

Central Conference of American Rabbis Hears Rabbi Foster Cite Indications of Demoralization Among American Jews

Providence, June 27—The interpretation of charity and service in a Jewish or non-Jewish philanthropic institution as the all-sufficient manifestation of Jewish loyalty, congregations languishing for lack of support, moral and financial, while Jewish clubs and charities are supplied with more generous support and the domination of some Jewish communities in whole or in part by leaders whose only association with the Jewish group is affiliation with a Jewish club or recognition as the Jewish representative by non-Jewish bodies were pointed out as some of the signs of wide-spread demoralization among American Jews by Rabbi Solomon Foster of Temple B'nai Jeshurun, Newark, in the Conference lecture tonight at the 44th annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

Other indications of this break-down cited by Rabbi Foster were the fact that "some of our Talmud Torahs, several of our seminaries, many of our Jewish educational institutions are frequently hard pressed, if not forced into bankruptcy, while our people individually enjoy great luxury and support in general in all kinds of cultural movements. The Jewish lecture platforms, both before our brotherhoods, sisterhoods, temple centers, Y.M.H.A.'s, lodges and societies are not infrequently the sounding boards of such anti-Jewish doctrine, such anti-social theories, such anti-moral influences as to make loyal and discriminating Jews sick at heart."

Jewish Millionaires Neglect Synagogue

Rabbi Foster charged that some Jewish millionaires in America whose benefactions to art, science and medicine run into the millions "actually refuse to aid a Jewish religious or educational movement and repudiate the synagogue as a spiritual home." He also said that the messages from Jewish pulpits "are adulterated in their Jewish spirit and denuded of Jewish thought and hope so as to be indistinguishable from an address by a liberal Christian theologian."

The Conference lecturer concluded by saying that "they who prefer Jesus to Moses, who use Jewish institutions and agencies, locally and nationally, as a means of self-glory and exploitation, who practice an absentee rabbinate in search of fame and fortune, who make social service, political reform, industrial progress and educational advance, important though they be, subservient to an intimate, intensive and enlightened spiritual ministrations both to sick, bewildered, and unhappy, and to confident, hopeful and enlightened Jews, are planting the seeds of disloyalty and disintegration in the souls of unwary modern Jewry and preparing for wholesale losses in our ranks. Our survival is eternally conditioned by a vision of holiness and a program of righteousness."

Speaks on Synagogue Music

The delegates yesterday heard Rabbi

Louis Wolsey speak on synagogue music. He favored the major keys as more representative of a happy American life. Abraham Binder, professor of music at the Jewish Institute of Religion, who worked two years on the new hymnal, said that the new book sets a new style in hymnology. He deplored the slow progress of synagogue music and urged framing the musical tradition of the Jews in a tasteful and refined setting.

The important symposium in the Union Prayer Book also took place last night. Rabbi Solomon Freehof criticized the inflexibility of the present book and advised the creative spirit in modern prayer and recommended that a Union Prayer anthology be issued entirely new every five years, in addition to the present book. Rabbi Beetan declared that the present book should contain instruction of a general character and that the revision should strengthen the Jewish qualities of prayer, not dilute them.

Sees Ideas Needed in Prayer

Rabbi Cohen pointed to the necessity of ideas in prayer and advised the reformation of ideas to stress the concept of God as real and a spiritual force. Rabbi Jonah Wise urged uniformity in prayer as a cementing factor. He said that the object of the revision was devotional, not theological and advised linguistic changes by using psalms and poems.

The alumni of the Jewish Institute of Religion tendered a dinner here last night to Rabbi Stephen S. Wise. In his address, Rabbi Wise said that the most pressing modern Jewish problem was the relation of the Palestine builders with Great Britain. Saying that the Mandatory power has failed in fulfilling the Balfour Declaration, Rabbi Wise saw an excuse in the incapacity and ill-will of underlings. He expressed the hope that the Jewish Agency and the League of Nations will force fulfillment of the Declaration in letter and spirit.

Rabbi Kaplan announced a gift of \$35,000 in insurance to the Institute.

Rabbi Simon Reappointed to Washington School Board

Washington, June 27—Rabbi Abram Simon, together with two other members, has been reappointed to the District Board of Education for a three year term by the District Supreme Court.

Rabbi Abram Simon who was the founder of the Synagogue Council of America and former president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, was first appointed to the Board of Education in 1919. He was elected president of the board in 1920 and was re-elected to this office for three successive years. At the expiration of his three year term in 1923 he declined a reappointment, but last January he was appointed to serve the unexpired term of Isaac Gans, who resigned.

Levine Succeeds Judge Panken as President of American Ort

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Ort held last night, Murray Levine was elected President, succeeding Judge Jacob Panken. In addition a new Steering Committee was selected consisting of Dr. Henry Moskowitz, Murray Levine, Louis Boudin and B. C. Vladek to cooperate with Howard S. Cullman and Paul Felix Warburg representing the Ort Reconstruction Fund.

Mr. Levine is a practicing lawyer of this city who has been identified with Jewish communal affairs for many years. He served as the first secretary of the Metropolitan League of the Young Men's Hebrew Association. He was National President of the Zeta Beta Tau Fraternity for a number of years and has recently been President of the Ort Tool Supply Corporation, affiliated with the American Ort.

Jewish Physician and Bride Leave for Tropical Trip

Dr. Morton C. Kahn, who is a member of the faculty of Cornell University Medical College, and his bride, who was the former Ruth D. Ring, sailed Friday for Paramaribo, Dutch Guiana, where Dr. Kahn will lead the Myron I. Granger expedition for the American Museum of Natural History. This trip is being arranged with the cooperation of Dr. Clark Wissler, curator of anthropology of the American Museum of Natural History.

This is Mrs. Kahn's first exploration trip to the tropics, but Dr. Kahn who has made eight trips, four of them to the Dutch Guiana, believes that the perils of the jungle have been greatly exaggerated, and sees no reason why a healthy normal girl cannot get the full benefits of such adventure.

Vaad Leumi Asks Raising of Ban Against Jabotinsky

Jerusalem, June 27—Revocation of the ban on the admission to Palestine of Vladimir Jabotinsky, Zionist Revisionist leader who has been refused a visa, is demanded in a letter sent to the High Commissioner by the Jewish National Council. A proposed meeting that was to have been held in Jaffa to protest the exclusion of Jabotinsky has not been permitted by the district commissioner.

District No. 4 B'nai B'rith Convention Opens

San Diego, Cal., June 27—The 67th annual convention of the district No. 4 B'nai B'rith opened here today with delegates from British Columbia, Oregon, Arizona, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, California and Oregon in attendance. The convention started with religious services at Temple Beth Israel and Congregation Tifereth Israel. Mayor Harry Clark welcomed the delegates.

Lord Melchett Seventh in English "Best Brains" Contest

London, June 27—Lord Melchett, president of the English Zionist Federation and chairman of the political committee of the Jewish Agency was voted seventh in the "best brains" contest in England in which the readers of the London "Spectator" were participating. George Bernard Shaw was voted as having the best brains but neither Premier MacDonald nor any woman received a vote. Lord Reading was voted eleventh place.

Describes Growth of B'nai B'rith's Shanghai Lodge

Cincinnati, June 27—The organization and growth of B'nai B'rith's most recently established outpost is described in the first annual report of Shanghai Lodge No. 1102, Shanghai, China, just received here. The charter for this lodge was granted on May 6, 1928, and its first meeting took place Dec. 10, 1928, with 20 of its 23 charter members present.

The report, which is written by George E. Sokolsky, president of Shanghai Lodge, declares that although small in number, the Jewish community in Shanghai is exceedingly complex in its social and political characteristics, the Jews there being divided into the old-established and very wealthy Sephardic element; the West-European and American Ashkenazim; and the recent immigrants from Russia and Poland.

"It was for the purpose of creating a medium in which these three elements can find a common meeting ground that the Shanghai Lodge of B'nai B'rith was organized," declares the report. "The membership doubled during the first year of the Lodge's existence and is constantly on the increase.

"The charitable work of the lodge has been astonishingly significant, considering the fact of its recent organization. When the Jews in Palestine issued their appeals for relief, the members in about fifteen minutes contributed \$595 which was later distributed through the agency of the Palestine B'nai B'rith lodge. The employment committee has found work for several Jewish young men who drifted into Shanghai, expecting to find easy fortunes here, but found themselves faced rather by depressed economic conditions."

Ibn Saud Asked to Allow Delegation to Study Locust Situation in Nedia

Jerusalem, June 27—The government entomologist, reporting the conclusion of the anti-locust campaign, announces that the International Locust Bureau in Damascus has requested King Ibn Saud to permit a delegation to go to Nedia to study the locust situation in the deserts where the swarms are believed to hatch.

Named to Judicial Post Left Vacant by Judge Cohen's Death

Pittsburgh, June 27—Attorney Joseph Statfield, former president of the Allegheny County Bar Association, was today named by Governor John S. Fisher to the place vacated on the bench of the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas by the death of Judge Josiah Cohen on June 11th.

A member of the B'nai B'rith, Temple Kodesh Shalom, and other organizations, Statfield has gained an enviable reputation as a corporation lawyer here. He will hold office until elected or his successor chosen in the elections in the fall of 1931.

In 1914 Statfield was appointed city solicitor by Joseph G. Armstrong, former mayor, but refused the office because of his law practice.

Palestinian Jews Living in U. S. to Form Federation

A federation of Palestine Jews of America will be organized by delegates representing Palestinian Jews living here at a conference in the Hotel Pennsylvania, July 6. The proposed federation will have as its aims substantial work for the Jews in Palestine and assisting Palestinian Jews here who desire to return to Palestine. Several hundred delegates from many parts of the country are expected.

Balti Incidents to Be Raised in Rumanian Parliament

Bucharest, June 27—Notice has been given by Deputy Hoffman that he will raise the question of the Balti anti-Semitic disturbances in Parliament. His question will be supplementary to the forthcoming interpellation by Professor Alexander Cuza, leader of the anti-Semites, who is demanding that Parliament submit the results of the judicial and administrative investigation in Balti.

Shreveport \$20,000 Drive for Allied Jewish Campaign Starts; Herold Honored

Shreveport, La., June 27—A drive to raise \$20,000, Shreveport's quota of the Allied Jewish Campaign, was begun here this week. Leaders of the drive expect not only to raise the full quota, but also that Shreveport will go over the top.

At a meeting of the North Louisiana Zionist District a resolution was passed congratulating Sidney L. Herold, Zionist leader and philanthropist and a life member of the Zionist Organization of America, on the attainment of his fiftieth birthday and testifying to the high admiration in which he is held by the District for his support of Jewish causes. The meeting also decided to inscribe Mr. Herold's name in the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund.

Hebrew Union College 1929 Annual Contains Important Jewish Scholarship Contributions

Cincinnati, June 27—The Hebrew Union College Annual for 1929, the sixth volume in this series, has just appeared from the press. The editors of the Annual are Dr. David Philipson, chairman; President Julian Morgenstern; Prof. Jacob Z. Lauterbach, and Dr. Sheldon H. Blank, secretary. The volume contains a number of important contributions to Jewish and general scholarship, five of the articles being written by members of the faculty of the Hebrew Union College and three by scholars in England and Germany.

The first title of the volume, entitled "The Gates of Righteousness," is contributed by Dr. Morgenstern and sketches the history of the many interesting Jewish, Christian and Moslem traditions concerning the so-called Golden Gate of the Temple area in Jerusalem. The gate is in the Eastern wall of the present enclosure of the Mosque of Omar and has been sealed for many years. The article was read by Dr. Morgenstern before the International Congress of Orientalists, Oxford, England, in 1928.

Other articles in the Annual are by Rabbi Bernard Bamberger of Albany, N. Y., who writes on "Fear and Love of God in the Old Testament," by Rev. Frank Gavin of the General Theological Seminary in New York, who discusses "Rabbinic Parallels in Early Church Orders"; by Dr. J. Z. Lauterbach, professor of Talmud at the Hebrew Union College, who writes on "The Pharisees and Their Teachings"; by Prof. A. Marmorstein, professor of Talmud at Jews College, London, who writes on "The Background of the Hagaddah"; by Prof. V. Aptowitzer of Vienna, who writes in German on "Arabach-Juedische Schoepfungstheorien," or Arabic and Jewish legends of the creation; and other articles by Dr. Moses Gaster of London; Prof. Solomon Gandz of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary and Yeshiva College, New York, and Dr. Israel Bettan and Dr. Henry Englander of the faculty of the Hebrew Union College.

the only policy which can be pursued by the Mandatory power is already fixed, namely, at all times to encourage the maximum Jewish immigration compatible with the absorptive capacity of Palestine.

"Our trust is in the moral forces of the Jewish people. We shall stand by our rights and continue our work and follow the tasks which destiny has set us. Still, in this hour, when ways are being mapped out which may have been tread perhaps for many years we address ourselves once more to the Arabs and to the Mandatory power.

"We will not spare any honorable effort to secure cooperation with the Arabs in developing the country and we call upon them to make such cooperation possible. Of the British government we ask that it look once more upon its task in Palestine in the spirit of those by whom the Balfour Declaration was conceived."

The statement further says that the political commission met when the hitherto implicit confidence of the Jews in the British government was gravely shaken. "The line the British government has adopted in consequence of the Shaw report, a virtual suspension of immigration in conjunction with an inquiry which seems to question the very basis of our work in the Jewish National Home and the policy indicated in the recent White Paper has created an atmosphere of uncertainty which has aroused the fears of the Jewish people that the policy of the Mandate is in danger."

The political commission's statement recalls Premier MacDonald's statement in the House of Commons, December 23, 1929, that the government could be expected to disregard the Shaw Commission's findings on questions of major policy, and goes on to say "yet the White Paper largely follows the findings of the Commission. The Jewish protests against the stoppage of immigration are not directed against Great Britain but against the action of the British government which is contrary to the letter and spirit of the Mandate. Theoretical confirmations of the Mandate policy are of no avail if coupled with administrative measures calculated to defeat our work."

Jewish Professor Honored by American Medical Association

Detroit, June 27—Dr. Raphael Isaacs of the University of Michigan was, together with Dr. Cyprus Sturgess, awarded a silver medal at yesterday's session of the American Medical Association's convention for their joint work in developing a powder from a hog stomach, which is considered superior to liver in the treatment of pernicious anaemia. A paper on this discovery will be read during the sessions of the present convention.
