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Anti-Semites Attack Jews in Streets of Berlin While Jews Protest Growing Anti-Semitism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, July 3—While in one part of Berlin a huge mass meeting of Jews under the auspices of the Union of Jewish Frontier Soldiers was being held to protest against the anti-Semitic agitation that has of late been stirring Germany, thousands of members of the anti-Semitic National Socialist party attacked Jews in the streets and one Jew was seriously injured here yesterday.

The great crowd of National Socialists carried out its demonstration in the Western section of Berlin on Wittenbergplatz. "Germany awake and rid yourself of the Jews," the anti-Semitic crowd shouted as its members attacked Jewish passersby. Immense confusion ensued and when the police reached the scene many of the National Socialists who had taken part in the disturbances were arrested.

While the police were engaged in dispersing the crowd in the Wittenbergplatz, the Jewish mass meeting was being held in the Berlin municipality hall. Nearly 4,000 Jews jammed the hall to vent their indignation and alarm at the disturbances that have endangered the Jewish communities in Thuringia, Saxony, and Schleswig-Holstein as a result of the agitation of the National Socialists.

The speakers were M. Kareski, president of the Berlin Jewish community, and Georg Bernhard, editor of the "Vossische Zeitung." The latter called on the Jews to create organizations to prevent anti-Semitism. Ministerial director Brecht, on behalf of the government, promised the fullest protection to citizens. A unanimously adopted resolution called on the German government, the state governments and the municipality governments to take drastic measures against the anti-Semitic incitement.

Hungarian Senate Adopts Law Aiding Jewish Aliens' Status

Budapest, July 3—The Hungarian Senate today adopted a law regulating the stay of aliens and those who are not citizens of any country by virtue of the post-war map changes. The law improves their treatment and provides for their protection against injustice. The law is apparently designed to counteract last week's complaints in the House of Deputies by two Social-Democratic members that Jewish aliens had been urged to accept Catholicism as a means of obtaining Hungarian citizenship.

Says Prior to 1928 Moslems Never Seen Going to Wall

Jerusalem, July 3—Prior to 1928 the Moslems were never seen going to the Wailing Wall, the Wailing Wall Commission heard Miss G. Hussey, British archaeologist in charge of the tomb in the Garden of Gethsemane, which some Anglicans believe is the true sepulchre of Christ, testify at the morning's session. Miss Hussey declared that she came to Jerusalem in 1900 and a fortnight later she visited the Wall where she saw old men sitting on chairs or benches.

In 1902 or 1903, she stated, she saw a wood and canvas screen at the Wall. Miss Hussey testified that she had lived among the Arab fellahen but had never heard them mention the Wall. Replying to Abdul Auni Bey, Arab counsel, she said she knew that "Burak is a new word".

Today's sessions found three Moslem delegates from India sitting on the Arab side of the room. They were dressed in green and gold turbans and

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Organize Opposition Group to Grand Mufti's Faction

Jerusalem, July 3—Indications of growing dissension within the ranks of the Arab leaders are seen in the organization of an opposition group to the Arab Executive in the Arab villages of the Jaffa district. The leader in this opposition is Azam El Sayed, mayor of Jaffa.

The chief ground of the dissatisfactions is the alleged mismanagement by the Grand Mufti's party of the distribution of the riot relief funds collected throughout the Moslem world. The opposition was held in check while the Arab delegation was presenting the Arabs' demands in London as a sign that the Arabs were maintaining a united front.

The opposition to the Grand Mufti and his followers is becoming pronounced, especially in the northern part of the country where the Mufti's opponents are concentrated.

Lithuanian Jewish Families to Be Ousted by Church Building

Kovno, July 3—Thirty-five Jewish families in Slobodka, the seat of Jewish learning in Lithuania, who make a living from gardening, are facing ruin in view of a decision to expel them from their land and houses which have been in their families for more than a century. The expulsion is threatened because it is intended to erect a church on the land. The Jews have appealed to President Smetena who has promised to consider the matter.

Roumanian Government Orders Strict Probe of Anti-Semitic Disturbances in South Bukovina

Bucharest, July 3—A most rigorous investigation of the anti-Semitic demonstrations in the Bukovinian towns of Campulung and Vama has been ordered by Vayda Voevod, minister of the interior, following a conference with Secretary of State Angelescu and police commandant Nicolescu. The government also issued a communique regarding the incidents at Vama and Campulung.

The government's statement says that "the manifestations in Vama and Campulung have been led by two priests, Berindj and Dumitrescu and two students, Metea and Constantin Danila. The local authorities tried to prevent the outbreak of serious disorders, and dispersed the demonstrations."

Charge Former Premier of Lithuania Instigated Pogroms

Kovno, July 3—The revelation that former Premier Waldemaras ordered the pogroms on the Jews of Slobodka last August was made today at a conference of the Nationalist government party. The former premier attempted to deny the allegation which was made by members of his own party who were his former supporters. His denial was considered to be unconvincing and the conference was left with the impression that he was guilty of the Jewish bloodshed in Slobodka.

Urges Hungary to Continue Aid to Cultural and Religious Work of Jewish Communities

Budapest, July 3—An appeal to the Hungarian government to continue the state support for religious and cultural work of the Jewish communities was made today by Baron Kohner, at a general meeting of the Budapest Jewish community. Baron Kohner thanked Count Apponyi, former minister of education, for his protest to the League of Nations regarding the Palestine disturbances.

In his appeal Baron Kohner asked that the state's support be in proportion to the number of Jews because the religious communities in various places were on the verge of collapse although the community taxes had already reached one hundred percent of the state taxes. His appeal concerns the intention of the minister of education to discontinue the subventions and to limit the right of religious taxation owing to the economic depression. Baron Kohner was elected president of the Jewish community.

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Dr. Rubinow Deplores Bias

Against Jew in America

Madison, Wisconsin, July 3—Discrimination in rooming houses and in business against Jewish young men and women was deplored by Dr. I. M. Rubinow of Cincinnati, International Secretary of the B'nai B'rith, in an address during the sessions of the convention of District Number 6 here. The convention was attended by approximately 800 registered delegates, from ten Midwestern states and Canadian provinces.

"Economic discrimination against the Jew in America is the biggest problem before him today," declared Dr. Rubinow. "Every sign 'Gentiles Only, Wanted' or a boarding house which draws the line is not only an insult, but an injury."

Tributes to Solomon Levitan, Wisconsin's State Treasurer; Louis Behr of Rockford, Ill., former University of Wisconsin athlete who was awarded the Kenneth Sterling Day cup for "the most Christian character shown by a student"; and the late Israel Shrimski, Chicago lawyer, all of whom were declared to have done much "to level antagonism between Jew and Gentile because of their splendid characters," were paid at the convention by Ben Samuels of Chicago. An engrossed testimonial plate was presented to Solomon Levitan, past president of the District Grand Lodge.

William Sultan of Chicago was elected president of District Grand Lodge Number 6 at the Monday afternoon session. Other officers elected were: Harry Lashkowitz of Fargo, N. D., first vice-president; Sam Beber of Omaha, second vice-president; O. G. Felton of Chicago, secretary; and William Bensinger of St. Louis, treasurer. It was decided to hold next year's convention in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Proposes B'nai B'rith Supervision of Three Factions in Judaism to Eliminate Existing Prejudices

San Diego, Cal., July 3—A proposal that the B'nai B'rith take up the supervision of the three factions of Judaism in America, Reform, Orthodox and Conservative, with a view in mind of breaking down the prejudices that exist between them, aroused considerable discussion at the second day's session of the 67th Annual Convention of District Number 4, B'nai B'rith, which was held here this week. The proposal was made by Harry L. Cohen of Long Beach, who said:

"The reason for the hatred existing between these factions, especially in the smaller communities of the country is purely an economic one. Each of the congregations is striving for mastery in the community, and is therefore in utter opposition to and contemptuous of the others.

"American Jewry is now the fountainhead of Judaism throughout the world. We can no longer look to Russia and Poland for the advancement of Judaism. We must do this within our own ranks, and in order to accomplish this we must cease our fighting amongst ourselves. I propose a commission be inaugurated by the Order which would study this matter, so that there could be established three distinct congregational and national bodies which would supervise each one of the factions of Judaism."

Mr. Cohen's proposal was submitted for further study and recommendation by a committee of five, which would confer with the other B'nai B'rith districts in the country, to devise some practical method which may be adopted by the Constitutional Grand Lodge of the Order.

Stating that within the past ten years there has been a growing economic boycott against Jews seeking employment in large banking and commercial houses of the country, Judge I. M. Golden of San Francisco, chairman of District Number 4, B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League, made his annual report to the convention. Judge Golden thought that the new Anti-Defamation Commission of the B'nai B'rith would have to conduct a scientific investigation into all the phases of this matter, and called upon other Jewish bodies to cooperate with the B'nai B'rith in this investigation.

The convention of the Women's Auxiliary Grand Lodge of District Number 4, which was held here simultaneously with the men's convention, elected the following officers:

Crime Commission Member's Slur on Jews and Italians Is Attacked in Congress

Washington, July 3—Frank J. Loesch, a member of President Hoover's Crime Commission, came in for a severe tongue-lashing on the floor of the House by Congressmen Dickstein and O'Connor, both of New York, for the statement he is reported to have made recently at the University of Iowa in which he said that "gangsters are chiefly of the recent immigrants and first generations of Jews and Italians, with the Jews furnishing the brains and the Italians the brawn." This statement drew a sharp rebuke yesterday in a letter from Congressman Celler.

Congressman Dickstein challenged Mr. Loesch "to prove the accusation that the foreign elements in the United States are violators of the law more particularly than any one else." Congressman O'Connor said that Mr. Loesch's statement is "a diabolical libel on the good name of two races who are as law-abiding and as God-fearing as any we have in this country."

Ica-Joint Foundation Aided in 335,000 Loans in Poland

Berlin, July 3—A report of the activities of the Ica-Joint Foundation during the past year, telling of the sums expended by this organization for loans for Jewish cooperatives in thirteen European countries, was presented at yesterday's opening session of the Ica-Joint Foundation conference, which was presided over by d'Avigdor Goldsmid of England.

The report stated that the Jewish cooperatives in Poland with the help of the Foundation last year issued 335,000 loans, which together totalled \$47,000,000. The Foundation itself has a capital of \$3,000,000 and resources totalling \$10,000,000. An additional \$40,000 for credit purposes in Eastern Europe, outside of Poland, was assigned by the conference. Delegates from Poland, Lithuania and Roumania are participating in the conference.

Dr. Berlove on Way to Assume Post at N.Y.U. Dental School

Zionist Convention, Replete with Drama, Ends with Principal Aim, Unity, Achieved

(By Our Cleveland Correspondent)

Cleveland, July 3—Now no one will be able to say the Zionist leadership does not submit to discipline.

It was a bitter pill but it had to be swallowed.

Palestine was placed above personalities.

Thus in effect did some of the men who have stood at the helm of the Zionist movement in this country during the past nine years characterize for this correspondent, their part in the drama called the Thirty-Third Annual Convention of the Zionist Organization of America, brought to a close after three hectic days of patient waiting on the part of the delegates and bargaining, bickering, pleading and submitting on the part of the helmsmen.

By common consent it was an extraordinary convention replete in dramatic moments though most instances that would lend themselves to dramatic effect were dissipated.

If welding together the element in American Zionism which has been more or less on the outside since 1921 with those who have conducted the affairs of the Zionist Organization since then, was the main object of this convention, then it achieved its end. For peace has been concluded. Who that was close enough did not have a strange feeling run up his spine as he watched the gaunt figure of Louis Lipsky—tall, erect, shoulders back, face taut and hands firm, watching the slow rhythmic approach of Jacob de Haas, his head a bit to one side, his eyes to the ground, his face ghastly pale, heading the procession to the dais. The silence was oppressing—was choking. Every tread of the foot was heard throughout the room.

They met—these two men who for years and years carried the movement

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Pacific Coast Zionists Plan Regional District Organization

Los Angeles, July 3—The first conference of Pacific Coast Zionist districts which was held here last week took up the problem of organizing a Pacific Coast Zionist bureau, with a regional executive director to coordinate all Zionist activities on the Coast. A committee, with Judge I. M. Golden of San Francisco as chairman, was appointed to undertake the organization of such a bureau.

The conference, which was held at the Alexandria Hotel, was called to order by Aaron Riche, president of the Los Angeles Zionist District. Judge I. M. Golden, president of the San Francisco District, was elected chairman, Aaron Riche, first vice-chairman, Herman A. Bachrach of Los Angeles, second vice-chairman and Rabbi Herman Parzen of Portland, Oregon, third vice-chairman.

Zionist Leaders and Yiddish Press Voice Optimism Over Peace That Has Just Been Effectuated in Ranks of American Zionism

Optimism over the peace that was effectuated in American Zionist ranks at the Cleveland convention is voiced in statements issued by various Zionist leaders of this country, and in editorial comments in the Yiddish press, which are given in part below.

Jacob de Haas, one of the leaders of the Brandeis-Mack group, which has now joined a coalition administration, stated:

"The ascendancy of political Zionism established at the Z.O.A. convention will, I hope, not only bring back to the ranks thousands of Zionists who withdrew in recent years, but I feel sure it will hearten our fellow-Zionists throughout the world. Two things will surely happen immediately. Greater activities in every department of Zionist endeavor and the opening of the doors of every local organization to free discussion."

Hopes for Genuine Coalition

The Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise stated: "It is to be hoped that there may be a genuine coalition, with the spirit of the foremost Jew of his age, Justice Brandeis, prominent in the policies and actions of the organization. A united front is desperately needed at a time which finds the Zionist cause imperilled from many directions. The return of the spirit of Brandeis to the movement means not only a strengthening of the inner forces of the movement in our country, but will give to American Zionism the place which it has long failed to have in the councils of the movement."

Morris Rothenberg, one of the leaders of the Lipsky group, said:

"The moving example which Justice Brandeis set by offering his unreserved aid was followed by all parties concerned in subordinating all consideration to the need of the hour, and the action that was taken is a splendid tribute to the idealism which prevails in the Zionist movement. In the same spirit of mutual helpfulness, I revised my own intention of withdrawing from participation in the governing body of the Z.O.A. for the coming year, and have entered the united administration which I shall whole-heartedly serve."

Marks Zionist Renaissance

Mrs. Robert Szold, national president of Hadassah, declared:

"This convention marks a renaissance of the Zionist movement in America. A new vitality, new energies, greater support and influence, and an awakened interest in Zionism among all Jews—qualities that can issue only from the most complete inner harmony—are sure to follow upon this historic peace. Speaking for the women Zionists of this country, the 50,000 members of Hadassah, we are happy to have taken part in this epochal event and to have on the new Zionist administrative committee of eighteen members Mrs. Edward Jacobs, one of the most able leaders of Hadassah and

of the Zionist movement in America."

The New York "Day" of Thursday says editorially:

"Let us hope that this devotion to the Zionist ideal which animated both groups and which led to the long-sought-for coalition in Cleveland, will continue in the future too, and will serve as the inspiration for other great deeds. It would be a pity if both parties in Zionism, having met in Cleveland, should again part company in New York. What is necessary more than anything else today is a permanent peace, and not a temporary armistice."

"We know the difficulties and the obstacles in the way of such a permanent peace. Differences of temperament, of ideology, of training, of social intercourse. These were the chief factors which led to the split of nine years ago. But nine years of experience, nine years of quarreling, should teach us something. And what it should teach us is that both groups together mean much, while each group separately is not sufficient."

Way for United Leadership Easier

Jacob Fishman says in Thursday's "Jewish Morning Journal":

"The way for a united leadership in World Zionism has been made much easier through the coalition of both parties in Cleveland. As a matter of fact Justice Brandeis has recently been conferring with Weizmann, Lord Melchett and Pinchas Rutenberg. This cooperation should be much strengthened now that the former Brandeis-Mack group stands officially at the helm of the Zionist Organization of America."

Junior Hadassah Plans \$50,000 Pardess Anna Palestine Colony

Cleveland, July 3—Plans for building a Pardess Anna colony (the orchard of Anna) in Palestine at a cost of \$50,000 to solve the problem of the graduates of the Children's Village in Meier Shifeyah were adopted at the eighth annual convention of the Junior Hadassah. Children interested in the farm and orange plantations will be trained at this colony.

Louis Lipsky spoke at the morning session. He praised the Junior Hadassah as representing the vigor and freshness of American Jewish youth with its specific task to accomplish in Palestine. Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver expressed the hope that the Junior Hadassah members would continue their Palestine work and spread its activities among the American Jewish youth.

More than 200 delegates from all parts of the country are attending the convention. Greetings were received from Henrietta Szold, founder of the Hadassah. Brief addresses were made by Samuel Blumenfeld, president of the Avukah and Max Seligman, a Palestinian now visiting in this country.

For the last forty years individual and congregational prayers together with aperturances have been a daily occurrence at the Wailing Wall, declared Raphael Meyuhas, 48, a native of Palestine, and the sexton of the Sephardic community at the Wall since 1904 when he succeeded his father, who testified at yesterday afternoon's session of the Wailing Wall Commission.

He told the Commission that benches, an awning and the screen for the separation of the men and women worshippers have been in regular use at the Wall for two decades and that the Jews always raised their voices in prayer. The witness stated that about eighteen years ago the Turkish authorities objected to the use of the screen but that this objection was soon withdrawn.

The Sephardic sexton said, too, that chairs and footstools had been introduced since the British occupation. During the War the Turks released him from military service because of his position at the Wall, he testified. Prior to last year he said he had never heard the Moslem zikh service or the calling of the muezzin but he conceded that the Arabs usually call the Wall Burak.

The witness resisted the leading question of Fakhril Hussein, Arab counsel, as to whether he personally wished the pavement in front of the Wall converted into a synagogue. The chairman, Eliot Loeftgren, ruled the question out of order but Meyuhas said that the Wall was holier than any synagogue.

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tors, some of whom have been arrested. No serious occurrences have taken place."

Despite the fact that King Carol has promised to solve the Jewish question himself and has given guarantees that anti-Semitism would be checked, new anti-Semitic disturbances have broken out in Vama and Campulung where the notorious agitator Danila has been urging the peasants to drive out the Jews. Secret meetings have been held in Vama at which it was decided to expel the Jews and deprive them of their property.

The agitators gathered 3,000 peasants and held street demonstrations. Church bells were rung, electric power cut off, processions held, windows in Jewish houses broken and anti-Semitic pamphlets distributed. One Jew was mishandled and when the police intervened they, too, were roughly treated, the chief of police and his wife being hurt by a thrown stone.

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together and for nine years now were separated. When de Haas was close enough Lipsky extended his hand—what a wealth of feeling there was in that gesture. De Haas accepted it. Their eyes met for only a moment. But it was enough. Peace had been concluded. De Haas was followed by the other two. It took almost a full minute before the delegates and the visitors came to. Then pandemonium broke loose. Those who had sufficient control of their emotions cheered and sang the Hatikvah. It was a great moment, not to be forgotten.

And it was for this peace that the delegates traveled from every part of the country. It was for this peace that lovers of Zion throughout the country prayed. It was for this peace—it became known last night—that the leaders of the World Zionist Organization pleaded.

Of course Mr. Justice Brandeis was not there, but Brandeis—his spirit was ever present. In 1921 the conflict centered about two men: Brandeis vs. Weizmann with the well known results. In 1930 it was just Brandeis. Even before his reassuring letter was read the delegates felt he was coming nearer to them; already they were charmed by his influence. He could have had anything he wanted. It should be remembered his letter was presented to the convention at least twenty-four hours before the final peace pact was agreed upon.

Under these circumstances, it is difficult to point to a record of achievement. Knowing that an extraordinary event is about to take place, the delegates were not in a mood to be bothered with details. The very life, the whole future of the Zionist movement in America was at stake—who had time to think of committee reports! Therefore all routine matters were referred to the new incoming Executive Committee.

One Minor Mistake Committed

There was, to be sure, one mistake committed. Attention was called to it by Mr. Lipsky—a little too late. When the list of the twelve and the six was submitted, the twelve who for reorganization purposes had been on the "outs" and the six who had been on the "ins," it should have been combined and the names read in alphabetical order. Zangwill once said "every label is a libel." This should have been avoided. It wasn't done, thus causing slight confusion and provoking some humorous remarks. Whether it should or should not have been done this writer ventures no opinion. The list in one form or another showed very clearly, however, that the Zionist movement is in the hands of friends. These will now have to get together and lay the foundation for a renewed Zionist activity in this country. To this all alike are committed.
