## Says Enlargement of Pavement in Front of Wall Suggested by Turkish Chief During War

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 8.—The suitable enlargement of the pavement in front of the Wailing Wall where the Jews pray, even if such enlargement involved the exchange of Waik property for similar property elsewhere, was suggested during the World War by Jamal Pasha, Turkish commander in Jerusalem, the Wailing Wall Commission was told this morning by David Yellin, former vice-mayor of Jerusalem.

Mr. Yellin gave the Commission the details of his interview at the Turkish headquarters on the Mount of Olives when he, Chief Rabbi Franko, Albert Antebi and Dritzahk Levi waited on the Turkish commander-in-chief to thank him for not deporting these and other Jewish leaders as he had intended. The Jews later submitted maps and plans for the proposed enlargement, Mr. Yellin said, but the plan was not revived.

Himself a member of the Jewish committee presenting the Jewish case before the Commission, Mr. Yellin testified that he had read extensively in Arabic and Islamic literature. He said that he was well acquainted with the

## Anti-Semite Posters in Buenos Aires Urges Jews Be Expelled from Argentina

Buenos Aires, July 7.—Anti-Semitic posters, which call for the expulsion of the Jews from Argentina have been found posted on bill-boards in the Jewish section of Buenos Aires.

"The Jews have insulted the honor of the Argentine woman; they do not respect the Argentine laws; Jews should not be tolerated in our schools and universities and should be expelled from the country," the posters declare. They are signed by "The Sons of the People," a mysterious organization which some people here link with the anti-Semitic student group which some weeks ago posted a placard with "Kill the Jews" as its slogan.

The Independent Socialist Deputy Bezinski, who is himself a Jew, has called upon the police department to investigate the origin of the anti-Semitic posters and to punish the guilty. The Socialist newspaper, "La Vanguardia," in an editorial voices a strong protest against the anti-Semites. Other newspapers of Buenos Aires have ignored the entire incident.

The Jews of Buenos Aires are not over-excited at the appearance of these posters, having as they do full confidence in the democratic spirit of the Argentine people and in the effectiveness of Argentine laws.

## Borscha Paper Says Fire Was Started by Anti-Semites

Bucharest, July 8.—The fire in the village of Borscha that destroyed 250 houses, four synagogues, three churches and left 3,500 Jews homeless was set by an Orthodox priest and a teacher who upon the return of the notorious anti-Semitic agitator, Danila, revived the terrorization of the Jewish population, according to the "Borschoy Lapok," a Borscha daily newspaper.

This report conflicts with the official government statement issued yesterday by the ministry of the interior which said that the fire was due to negligence and was not caused by anti-Semites. The Borscha paper adds that the government authorities are disquieted by the growth of the anti-Semitic movement led by Danila. Nevertheless the government has informed the press that it is impossible to supply additional information on the fire because telephonic communication with Borscha has been interrupted.

Many refugees from Vama and Campolung, Bukowinan towns where anti-Semitic disturbances took place last week, have reached Czernowitz with stories of the terrible situation of the Jews in Bukovina. They have appealed to Senator Meyer Ebner for aid. He has protested to the Bukowinan authorities against the disturbances and also against the release of the arrested anti-Semites.

## Arabs Tell Luke's Wife They Appreciate His Pro-Arab Feeling

Jerusalem, July 8.—The Arabs appreciate the pro-Arab feeling of Harry Charles Luke, former chief secretary of the Palestine government and acting High Commissioner during the riots, the Mayor of Nablus said at a reception there to Mrs. Luke. Mr. Luke has recently been appointed lieutenant-governor of Malta. Another speaker at the reception said that Mr. Luke was of the type of Englishmen who follow the dictates of their conscience, sacrificing their positions if necessary.

## Sir Boyd Merriman Coming to U. S. This Summer

Montreal, July 8.—Sir Frank Boyd Merriman, who was counsel for the Jewish Agency before the Palestine Inquiry Commission, will be in the party of eminent English lawyers who will visit Montreal before attending the annual meeting of the Canadian Bar Association at Toronto on August 15 and 16. Later he will visit Chicago as the guest of the American Bar Association.

## Some Mandates Body Members Reported to Hold Britain Unconsciously Favors Arabs

London, July 8.—A certain section of the members of the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations regards the British government as unconsciously biased in favor of the Arabs in Palestine by virtue of its anxiety to conciliate the Mohammedans in India, according to the "Daily Telegraph" which reports that the Mandates Commission's report on its extraordinary Palestine session holds the British government responsible to some extent for the disturbances and their consequences.

The implication of Britain's unconscious bias by Professor William Rappard, the Swiss member of the Commission, is reported to have been energetically repudiated by Lord Lugard, the British member. According to the "Daily Telegraph," the report points out that the British government is responsible for the events preceding the outbreak of last August and for the manner in which the disorders were dealt with.

## Arab Paper Complains British Only Profited from Riots

Jerusalem, July 8.—Last year's Palestine riots benefited the British exclusively because since then the Palestine administration has become increasingly Anglicized, complains the Arab paper, "Meraat El Shark." The paper recalls that while Sir Herbert Samuel, the Jewish first high commissioner, increased the number of Arab officials in the government, his successor, Lord Plumer, and the incumbent, Sir John Chancellor, have reversed this policy.

## Late Conan Doyle Recalled as Great Friend of Jews

London, July 8.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, the famous British author who died here on Sunday, is recalled in British Jewish circles as a friend of the Jews. His defence of Oscar Slater, a Jew who served eighteen years' imprisonment in Scotland for a murder of which it was later found he had been innocent, and who was subsequently freed, is particularly remembered by the Jews here. It was due mainly to the efforts of the late author of the great "Sherlock Holmes" detective stories that Slater was proven innocent.

It is also recalled here that Sir Arthur was a warm friend and supporter of Israel Zangwill, whom he aided in his efforts to find a suitable territory for Jewish settlement.

## Rabbi Opposes Late Friday Evening Services and Men and Women Sitting Together

Strenuous opposition to late Friday evening services and men and women sitting together in the synagogue was voiced yesterday by Rabbi Nachman H. Ebin of Brooklyn in his presidential message at the opening of the second annual convention of the Rabbinical Association of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. One hundred rabbis, graduates of the Yeshiva College, are attending the sessions, which are being held at the Hotel Pennsylvania.

"We strenuously oppose late Friday evening services," declared Rabbi Ebin. "Services should take place at sunset when the Sabbath is ushered in. We are, however, in favor of Friday night lectures in the synagogues, provided that the same are arranged in accord with the spirit of the Jewish religion."

"As orthodox rabbis, we uphold the time-honored tradition and custom that women be segregated from the men during hours of worship. We are therefore against family pews in the synagogue. The Jewish traditional synagogue always had a gallery for women. We urge the various communities to construct their synagogues up to the model and design of the old traditional synagogue. Those synagogues that have no gallery should make proper partitioning, to enable men and women to come to the synagogue without violating the principle of the law."

At the opening session addresses were delivered by Rabbi Dr. Bernard Revel, president of the Yeshiva College; Rabbi Eliezer Silver, president; and Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, honorary president of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of America. The secretary's report was rendered by Rabbi Solomon Reichman of New York.

The morning session was opened with an invocation by Rabbi Guterman of Scranton. The convention dinner took place last night at Trotzky's Restaurant. The convention will close this evening.

## Montreal Yiddish Daily Holds Readers' Referendum on Plan for Separate Jewish Schools

Montreal, July 8—Negotiations between the newly-created Jewish School Board of Montreal and the Protestants of this city on the school question have been adjourned until August owing to the absence from the city of the chairman of the Protestant Board of School Commissioners.

The local Yiddish daily, "Keneder Adler," has, in the meantime, been conducting a sort of referendum among its readers on the subject, by having its readers participate in a letter contest for or against separate Jewish schools, and so far a majority of the readers have declared themselves in favor of a separate Jewish school system.

The arguments of the opponents, who are mostly women, are that separation will tend to strengthen anti-Semitism in Montreal; that Jewish children will have no respect for Jewish teachers and that Jews, as a rule, are incapable of managing their own schools. Talmud Torahs are pointed out as examples of the mismanagement of Jewish educational institutions. The "separatists" on the contrary, deny the truth of these arguments and stress the value of a healthy Jewish education in Jewish schools authorized by government legislation and financed by taxes instead of voluntary contributions.

Prizes will be given by the "Keneder Adler" for the best letters on the subject. The members of the Provincial Parliament, Joseph Cohen, K. C., and Peter Bercovitch, K. C., and Rabbi J. L. Zlotnik, executive director of the Zionist Organization of Canada, will act as judges in this contest.

## Revisionists' Leader Sees Z.O. Executive Lacking Fixed Plan

London, July 8—The absence of a fixed plan or policy on the part of the Zionist Executive becomes evident, declared Meer Grossman, Zionists-Revisionists leader, at a Revisionists' press conference here today. Mr. Grossman complained that the Zionist Executive had failed to realize the danger in Sir John Simpson's mission, which he pointed out the Revisionists had predicted. Three months after the prediction, Mr. Grossman pointed out, the political commission of the Jewish Agency declared it would be unable to accept Sir John's report.

A letter from Vladimir Jabotinsky, world leader of the Zionists-Revisionists, was read in which he enumerated the various activities of the Zionist Executive which allegedly prejudiced the government against him leading to his exclusion from Palestine. In his letter Mr. Jabotinsky said that the Zionist Executive was free to protest against unjust and immoral action by the government regarding any Palestinian Jew but he does not desire the Revisionists' leadership to associate itself with such steps.

## Jewish Education Not Charity, Dr. Lowenstein Tells Annual Rabbinical Assembly Parley

Tannersville, N. Y., July 8—Jewish education is not charity and tuition fees should pay the budget of Jewish schools although the charity federations should support a central educational guidance bureau, Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for Support of Jewish Philanthropies of New York, declared in speaking in a symposium on "Community Federation and Jewish Religious Work" at the 13th annual Rabbinical Assembly convention which opened here yesterday. Dr. Lowenstein expressed disapproval of Rabbi M. A. Drob's proposal for the organization of a federation for the support of Jewish religious organizations.

## 100 Conservative Rabbis Attend

One hundred conservative rabbis from New York, New England, New Jersey, Chicago, Florida and other sections are in attendance. The convention was opened by Rabbi Israel Goldman. Rabbi Samuel Rosenblatt of Baltimore gave the opening prayer and greetings on behalf of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America were extended by Prof. Israel Davidson. Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the Seminary, sent a message urging the rabbis to use their influence on the Jewish Agency in favor of religious education in the schools of Palestine.

Satisfaction that the reform rabbis at their recent convention in Providence were approaching Jewish nationalism and Conservative Judaism was expressed by Rabbi Louis Finkelstein in his presidential address. He advocated greater cooperation between Jewish religious bodies and denied that there was an over supply of rabbis. Saying that spiritual leadership in the congregations was essential he pleaded for greater support for the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Rabbi Finkelstein advocated publication by the Rabbinical Assembly of a theological tract representing the conservative interpretation. The publication of scholarly works is also contemplated, he announced.

## Rosen Urges Community Action

In the symposium on "Community Federation and Jewish Religious Work" Ben Rosen, director of the United Talmud Torahs of Philadelphia, urged community action and responsibility but made allowances for the particularistic problems of congregational schools and individual agencies. Rabbi Simon Greenberg of Philadelphia felt that the community federation is primarily philanthropic and cannot control religious institutions or further religious activity owing to its policy of neutrality.

Rabbis Israel Goldstein, Samuel Cohen and Elias Margolies of New York, Louis Schweffel of Washington and Philip Laugh of Chelsea took part in the round table discussion on "How to Strengthen Conservatism."

## Jewish Consumptives' Association to Cease Building Operations

Los Angeles, July 8—No further building activity will be undertaken nor will patients able to pay for treatment be admitted, it was decided by the Jewish Consumptive Relief Association and Ex-Patients' Home Society at the conclusion of its seventh annual convention here. The convention voted to continue the development of the rehabilitation program.

## "Jewish Forum" Organizes

### Bureau to Supervise Kashruth

The "Jewish Forum," a monthly organ of American orthodox Jewry, announces the formation of the Jewish Forum Food Bureau in charge of Rabbi Eliezer Silver and Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, president and honorary president respectively of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada. These, together with the members of the Vaad Hakashruth (Kashruth committee) are planning to co-opt others as members of the Bureau. Dr. David I. Macht, pharmacologist at Johns-Hopkins University and Dr. Nathan Isaacs of Harvard, have already accepted places on the Bureau.

Commenting on the Bureau, the "Jewish Forum" in its current issue says "the eagerness to earn money has led to many corruptions in the Jewish food market. The prevalent use by the baker of shortening in the form of lard and of eggs from impure fowls has put a question mark on the kashruth of the bread and cake sold."

"We urge our readers everywhere to ask for the stamp of approval of the Jewish Forum Food Bureau, and we urge the proprietors of hotels, restaurants, and camps, and the manufacturers of food products to apply to the Jewish Forum Food Bureau for an investigation of their respective establishments as the first step towards acquiring that recognition which will mean much to their economic success as well as to the satisfaction of all earnest-minded religious Jews of America."

## Palestine Policeman Killed by Marauding Bandits

Haifa, July 8—Two mounted members of the Palestine police force were ambushed today on the highway between Safed and Acre by unknown assailants. One of the policemen, Abdul Koubash, was killed. The police, who are investigating this latest of a series of attacks by marauding bandits, believe this to be part of a regular campaign of depredations.

## Arabic Scholar Gives Hebrew University Library Valuable Mediaeval Arab Document

Jerusalem, July 8—Nizar Abu Su'ud, an Arabic scholar, has donated to the Jewish National and University Library an Arabic manuscript entitled "Rasa'il Ikhwān as-Safa." This manuscript is the great Arabic scientific encyclopedia which was compiled in the tenth century through the well known Islamic sect, Ikhwān As-Safa. The manuscript donated to the Library was written in the year 1191 of the Hegira (1777 C. E.) and contains about two-thirds of this encyclopedia which fills four volumes of print.

A collection of scientific works produced by the most prominent Czech scholars of today has been donated to the Jewish National and University Library by the Czechoslovakian Government through the Czechoslovakian Consulate in Jerusalem. Among them are the works of Prof. Hrozný on the Hittites, and the works of Prof. Lexa on the History of Old Egypt.

The well known German biographer, Emil Ludwig, has sent to the Jewish National and University Library as a memento of his stay in Jerusalem last winter, the large edition of Goethe published by the Propyläen in 45 volumes. The collection contains besides the works of Goethe three volumes giving a description of the personality of Goethe by relatives and letters of his contemporaries.

## Seasongood Heads Cincinnati Jewish Welfare Fund Drive

Cincinnati, July 8—Former Mayor Murray Seasongood will be the chairman of Cincinnati's first joint Jewish Welfare Fund campaign, which is to conduct a \$200,000 drive early in October. Plans for the drive were formulated at a luncheon to members of the Cincinnati Jewish Community Council.

Out of the \$200,000 which is to be asked of the Jewish community here, \$100,000 will go as Cincinnati's share of the Allied Jewish Campaign, while the other \$100,000 will go to Jewish organizations receiving funds in Cincinnati, but which are not eligible to the Cincinnati Community Chest.

Until Mr. Seasongood returns from Europe late in August, William J. Shroder will act as chairman of the campaign. Samuel Ach and Sidney Freiberg are the honorary vice-chairmen. Bernard Pepinsky is executive secretary, Kurt Peiser is secretary and Warren J. Heldman is treasurer.

## Jewish Counsellor to Rumanian Legation Starts

## Ernest Bloch to Compose Music for Sabbath Service

legend regarding the Prophet Mohammed's celestial journey but stated that he had never heard nor found any reference that the Wailing Wall and the spot where Mohammed's mythical horse, Burak, was tethered were identical or sacred to the Moslems. As an orthodox Jew he testified that he had never visited the Haram area.

Cross-examining Mr. Yellin, Abdul Auni Bey, Arab counsel, deprecated the Jewish witness's alleged attempt to reduce the sanctity of Burak. Mr. Yellin denied this, saying that he had only cited well-known authorities "whom Auni Bey tried to belittle."

Mr. Yellin said that archaeologists disagree whether certain visible layers on the Wall date from Solomon's time, but almost all agree, he stated, that the lowest courses are Solomonic and there was never any doubt among the Jews that the Wall is a remnant from Solomon's Temple.

### Pachachi Testifies

Mezrah Pachachi Bey, former diplomatic agent of Iraq in London, the first important Arab witness to take the stand to testify before the Wailing Wall Commission, testified at yesterday afternoon's session.

He said he had come to Palestine especially to testify before the Commission as the representative of the committee established in Iraq for the protection of Moslem rights in Palestine, including El Burak (Moslem name for the Wailing Wall).

Pachachi Bey testified that he never knew that El Burak was called the Wailing Wall. He stated that he had written many letters to the High Commissioner, the members of the Shaw Commission and to the League of Nations regarding El Burak which he termed sacred to the Moslems because it is mentioned in the Koran and is part of the Mosque of Aksa.

### Moslems Turn to Burak

The praying Moslem before turning towards Mecca turns toward the Mosque of Aksa, Pachachi Bey declared, and therefore the Moslems object to the Jews adopting the Wall as a synagogue. The Moslems in Iraq and India who were excited "over the approaching establishment of a synagogue at the Wall would be equally excited if a church were contemplated at the Wall," the witness said.

Cross-examined by Dr. Mordecai Eliash, chief of the counsel for the Jews, Pachachi Bey said that El Burak was not the only reason for the establishment of the committee in Iraq to protect Moslem rights in Palestine. He couldn't say whether El Burak and the Wailing Wall were identical and he did not know whether the Moslem Supreme Council's guidebook to the Mosque area refers to the Wailing Wall.

### Has Not Heard of Befouling

He himself, Pachachi testified, visited the Wall in 1927 and in 1929. Regarding Jewish complaints that the Moslems had built a latrine near the Wall, Pachachi said he would have

hanged a Moslem guilty of such action but he said he had not heard of anybody befouling the place.

Other Moslem notables present at today's sessions included Abdul Kaha Mouzakki, former member of the Egyptian government; Osman Beyhoum, vice-president of the Moslem Supreme Council of Beirut; Abu Bakr El Ashharj, representing the Moslem Association of Java and Gazer Mauski Bey, Persian commercial attache in Egypt.

An exhaustive description of numerous visits to the Wailing Wall was contained in an affidavit presented to the Commission at yesterday's morning session on behalf of Rev. Christie, the oldest English resident of Tiberias, who because of advanced age was unable to testify in person. His affidavit described his trips to the Wall where he saw individual and congregational services by the Jews with all the apertunances.

### Tells of Visits to Wall

Commenting on Rev. Christie's affidavit, Chairman Loefgren said it might be necessary for the Commission to go to Haifa or Tiberias to arrange for a cross-examination of the aged English minister. Another affidavit from Rev. Judah Slotki, principal of a Hebrew school in Manchester, England, sworn before Samuel Finburgh, mayor of Salford, England, June 19, stated that in 1890 he had visited the Wailing Wall with his father and had wanted to sit on the stools that were there. His father informed him that the chairs and other apertunances were reserved for the aged.

### Young People's League of United Synagogue to Hold Fall Parley

A national convention of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue will take place this Fall, probably on Thanksgiving Day, in accordance with a decision reached at a meeting of representatives of the movement at the Jewish Club, Manhattan. The convention will bring together representatives from the more than one hundred young people's societies affiliated with the national body and located all over the country.

A convention committee under the chairmanship of Harry H. Goebel was elected to make all the necessary arrangements for the event. The convention committee for New York is headed by Edward I. Aronoff.

### Recalling Poverty, Jewish Realtor

#### Wills \$14,000 to Jewish Charity

Having always remembered the days when he was a penniless immigrant and was obliged to work in sweat shops, Pincus Burger, who was a wealthy realtor at the time of his death, specified that \$14,000 of his \$100,000 estate was to be devoted to charitable organizations, especially on the lower East Side of New York, where he lived the greater part of his life.

He also specified in his will that the Yeshiva Ohel Torah and the Yeshiva College, as well as the Congregation Ohab Zedeck, should receive contributions, as do several synagogues in Hungary.

submitted that the disturbances might have been averted by the proper exercise of authority during the events which led to them and claims that resolute action at that time would probably have nipped them in the bud. The Commission is reported to have reserved an opinion on the question of Jewish settlement until the conclusion of Sir John Simpson's investigation.
