Peasants Stage Demonstration Against Jews in Suceava

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, July 11—At least two Jews are known to have been injured following an attack by massed crowds of anti-Semitic peasants on Jewish houses in Suceava, Roumania, according to a report in the Vienna "Freie Presse." Following the inflammatory speech of an anti-Semitic agitator, 4,000 peasants who had come to Suceava for marketing demonstrated against the Jews and the attack followed.

In the meantime a communique from the Roumanian government states that the agitation is directed only against usurers. The disturbances began in front of a number of banking houses. Despite the orders of the local authorities to the peasants to return to their villages they insisted on remaining in Suceava and their threatening attitude is creating danger of serious trouble.

Bucharest, July 11—Under the leadership of Colonel Niculcea, an officer in the reserves, a crowd of peasants attempted to organize demonstrations in Suceava against bankers and Jews. While Colonel Niculcea was on his way to Radautz he was arrested and the planned meeting of anti-Semites prohibited. Nevertheless the crowd of peasants numbering about 2,000, demonstrated against the Jews and bankers.

An official communique from the Ministry of the Interior states that no meeting took place in Suceava where the assembled peasants waited all day in vain. According to the government's statement the demonstration passed without serious clashes and the crowd was finally dispersed and order reestablished. The police took all necessary measures while the general secretary of the district directorate and police from Czernowitz also watched the situation.

Leipzig Turns Down Proposed Anti-Schecchita Legislation

Leipzig, July 11—The municipal council of Leipzig today rejected a motion of the National Socialists to pass a law prohibiting schecchita, the Jewish method of slaughtering.

Anti-schecchita legislation has been one of the chief planks in the program of the National Socialists. A law banning schecchita will go into effect October 1 in Bavaria while in Thuringia where the National Socialists led by Dr. Wilhelm Frick control, the government is now considering a similar bill. The municipal council of Berlin recently rejected an anti-schecchita bill.

Roumanian Press Demands New Inquiry Into Borscha Fire; Notes Conflict in Evidence

Bucharest, July 11—The Roumanian press here and in Czernowitz is almost united in demanding a new and thoroughgoing investigation into the disastrous fire in Borscha last week which left several thousand Jews homeless and caused damage estimated at 50,000,000 lei. In view of what it terms the contradictions and inconsistencies in the evidence on which the government's communique on the fire was based the "Adverul" leads the way in demanding a new probe.

The "Lufta" also joins the call for a sweeping inquiry and punishment of the guilty. If this is not forthcoming, the "Lufta" says, it is the government's duty to prove that the allegation that the fire was incendiary in origin is false because the country's prestige is at stake. It is also pointed out that unless real action is taken Borscha will be but the beginning of such fires.

Discussing the government's statement on the fire, the "Adverul" points out that the official version of the disaster stated that the fire had started through negligence and that this was confirmed by a Dr. Solomon whose house was among those destroyed. The "Adverul" remarks, however, that not only does Dr. Solomon deny having given such evidence but he says that the fire started in his house in a chimney that had been unused for four

Canada May Close Doors to European Immigration

Montreal, July 11—The possibility of a ban on European immigration to Canada is seen in a statement made here by Premier Mackenzie King during a campaign address. Asked whether he favored the prohibition of immigration to Canada until such time as those people in Canada who are willing and able to work find employment, the Liberal leader replied in the affirmative. He added that in the future the Dominion government proposed to let the provincial governments say more and more what immigration they wanted.

Stoppage of immigration was also advocated by E. W. Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railways. In an interview here he said that immigration from the United States and Canada must be stopped for the time being at least. In the meantime Canadian labor, which has always supported the attitude of the American Federation of Labor regarding immigration, is also demanding that Canada closes its doors to immigrants owing to the unemployment situation.

Wailing Wall Commission's Sessions May End July 17

Jerusalem, July 11—The international Wailing Wall Commission which has been taking evidence on the Moslem and Jewish claims to the Wall is likely to conclude its sessions July 17 when the final speeches of the Arab and Jewish advocates will be delivered, it is learned here today. The commission began its public sessions June 25.

At today's session John Yasmin, a Christian Arab and a professional guide, posing as an authority on Jewish ritual, caused some amusement when he replied in the affirmative to a question from Dr. Mordecai Eliash, Jewish counsel, as to whether the Jews who pray at the Wailing Wall on the Sabbath wear phylacteries. Jews never wear phylacteries on the Sabbath or holy days.

The same witness was brought forward by the Arab counsel in an effort to prove that the Jewish service at the Wailing Wall and the service in the synagogue are not alike. Yasmin testified that he had never seen Moslems praying at the Wall but it is known that he often told tourists that the pavement in front of the Wall was a holy place to the Moslems at which the Jews were entitled to worship.

Another witness, Slim Salameh, stated that in 1895 he laid tiles on the pavement in front of the Wall similar to those in the Mosque of Aksa area. Hassan Ghaneim, a former police officer, testified that during the Turkish rule he often kept order at the Wall during Jewish festivals but said he did not see the Jews sitting down or using a screen for separating the sexes. He declared that his strict orders were to prevent any interference with the Jewish worshippers. This testimony bore out the Jewish contention that the interference in the past was due not to the Moslem authorities but to irresponsible people, mostly to the residents of the Mogh-rabi community.

Proposes Conference of Moslem Leaders for Arab-Islamic Accord

Jaffa, July 11—A proposal that the numerous Moslem dignitaries from Egypt, Iraq, India, Persia, Java and other Moslem countries now in Palestine in connection with the hearings on the Wailing Wall be invited to a conference that would lead to a general Arab-Islamic accord is made today by the local Arab paper, "Falastin." In support of its suggestion the "Falastin" argues that the Wailing Wall question arises from the general situation of the Arabs and of Palestine.

**National Jewish Hospital
Honored for Research Work;
Chief Is Awarded Gold Medal**

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Denver, July 11—Recognition has been accorded the National Jewish Hospital of Denver by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, through the award of a gold medal to Dr. H. J. Corper, Director of Research of the Hospital, according to an announcement yesterday by Judge Samuel D. Levy, of the Children's Court, chairman of the New York Committee of the hospital. Ben Altheimer, of New York, is national treasurer and Paul Felix Warburg is New York treasurer of the institution.

The medal, known as the Ward Burdick Research Award, was presented to Dr. Corper for outstanding research work in clinical pathology. The presentation was made recently at the annual banquet of the Society in Detroit, at the conclusion of its 1930 meeting. The research work, for which the award was bestowed, was done in the laboratories of the National Jewish Hospital.

Further honor was paid Dr. Corper through his selection as president-elect of the society for the coming year. Dr. Corper will serve as president during the year 1931-32.

An exhibit of the research work of the National Jewish Hospital was given honorable mention at the meeting of the American Medical Association, which convened in Detroit concurrently with the meeting of the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

The Research Department of the National Jewish Hospital was established in September, 1919, with Dr. Corper as its director. During the decade of its existence, the department has made many distinctive contributions to the knowledge of tuberculosis, and has earned international commendation for its research work. During this time also, Dr. Corper and his associates have been the recipients of a number of awards and honors from scientific bodies for their activities in tuberculosis research.

**Lubawitscher Rebbe Received
at White House by President**

Washington, July 11—Rabbi Joseph Schneersohn, better known as the Lubawitscher Rebbe, his son-in-law, Rabbi Gourary, together with H. Kramer, president of the Agudath Habad, H. Fogelman, vice-president of Agudath Habad and Arthur Rabinovitz of Boston were yesterday received at the White House by President Hoover. The President appeared to be impressed with the modernism and intelligence of the Lubawitscher Rebbe and his son-in-law.

The Lubawitscher Rebbe told the president that before leaving the United States on July 16 he was anxious to pay his respects to Mr. Hoover to tell him how much he appreciates the fact that the Jews have found a real asylum in this country with full religious liberty.

After thanking the President for all the liberties and equalities that Jews enjoy in the United States, Rabbi Gourary said to Mr. Hoover, "We are especially thankful for and appreciate the stand this country of yours took in the recent unfortunate uprising against the Jewish people that took place in Palestine. The attitude on the part of this government in a most lamentable and trying situation again strengthened our admiration for the justice and principles that underly this country."

**Abraham Cahan, Editor of
"Forward," Reaches Seventy**

Abraham Cahan, for 33 years editor of the "Forward," the largest Yiddish daily newspaper in the world, and a veteran of Yiddish journalism and the Jewish Socialist movement in the United States, is seventy years old today but no celebration of the event will take place in accordance with the wishes of Mr. Cahan.

The editor of the "Forward," who is now the dean of Yiddish newspapermen in this country, was born July 13 in the township of Podbereze, province of Vilna, Russia. He came to the United States in 1882. In an amazingly short time he mastered the English language and shortly after began teaching English to foreigners in the public night schools of New York.

After a number of years in this country he became a contributor to the New York English dailies, his sketches of East Side life becoming extremely popular. His great journalistic achievements, however, began when in 1897 he was named editor of the recently established Jewish daily "Forward." As the editor of this great paper, the organ of the Jewish labor movement, he became the most influential personality in the Jewish trade union movement in America.

Mr. Cahan has also won fame in the English literary world, being the author of several collections of ghetto sketches and two full length novels, "The Rise of David Levinsky" and "Yekl the Yankee." The entire Yiddish journalistic world looks upon Abraham Cahan as the ablest and most energetic Jewish editor.

**Baltimore Charity Campaign
to Start November 9**

Baltimore, July 11—Through its president, Walter Sondheim, the Associated Jewish Charities of Baltimore has announced that it will conduct a campaign for funds in the Fall of this year. The decision was made at a special meeting of the executive committee called for the purpose of discussing the advisability of taking this step. At this meeting also the week of November 9 was determined upon as the date for the campaign.

According to Mr. Sondheim, increased demands and pressure being put upon the agencies of the Associated Jewish Charities are such that increased funds must be raised in order to carry on adequately the work of the organizations.

The last campaign of the Associated Jewish Charities was held in November, 1928, at which time \$590,000 was subscribed.

**Hebrew Teachers' License
Board Will Hold Examinations**

An announcement by the Board of License for Hebrew Teachers states that the Board has completed the task of approving licenses for teachers of Talmud Torahs who have been found entitled to such licenses without examination. Teachers who are to be examined, and men and women who desire to become Hebrew teachers, may obtain from the Board applications for such examinations.

All applicants will obtain a list of subjects in which examinations will be given, as well as an ample bibliography as an aid in preparation. The bibliography will cover the following subjects: Bible, Talmud, Jewish History, Mediaeval and Modern Hebrew Literature, Principles of Pedagogy, Methodology of the Hebrew Studies, and History of the United States and American Institutions.

**Urges Council to Give
Prayerbooks to Jewish Blind**

A plea to provide the Jewish blind with prayerbooks, has been addressed to the members of the National Council of Jewish Women by Mrs. Oscar Silberschmidt of Cincinnati, national chairman of its Committee on Work for the Blind and Sight Conservation. The prayerbook for the Jewish blind, the first one of its character to be published, has been printed by the National Council of Jewish Women according to the most modern methods of Braille printing.

The women who are associated with Mrs. Silberschmidt on this committee of the National Council of Jewish Women are: Mrs. Jonas Weil, vice-chairman, of Minneapolis; Mrs. John P. Frank of Nashville; Mrs. Daniel H. Kassell of Yonkers; Miss Rebecca Mack of Cincinnati; Mrs. Benj. Tishler of Boston; Mrs. Wm. Weil of Altoona; Mrs. Henry S. Wieder of Philadelphia; and Miss Virginia Schwalb of Cleveland, representative of the National Council of Jewish Juniors.

Credit Kassas Only Hope of the Jews of Poland, Warsaw Conference Declares

That the credit cooperatives established in Poland by the Joint Distribution Committee are the strongest factor in the rebuilding of the economic life of the Jews of that country, was the consensus of opinion expressed at the united annual conference of the Federation of Jewish Cooperatives which met in Warsaw during the latter part of June.

At the same time delegates of fifty Gemiluth Chesed (Free Loan) Kassas of the Warsaw district found it necessary to send a cablegram to the Joint Distribution Committee appealing for further aid in saying Polish Jewry "which is suffering immensely through the great economic crisis."

Several hundred delegates attended the convention of the Federation of Credit Cooperatives, which consists of Kassas organized by the Joint Distribution Committee, the American Joint Reconstruction Foundation (in which the Jewish Colonization Association is a partner) and other interested organizations.

Dr. Leib Silberstein, chairman of the board of directors of the Federation, declared, in his report, that the success of the credit cooperatives had far exceeded the most sanguine expectations of their organizers. They have developed, he said, according to advices received at national headquarters of the Allied Jewish Campaign, into the strongest factor in the economic reconstruction not only of the Jews of Poland, but of the Jews in many other East European countries.

It was demonstrated at the convention that the Jewish Credit Cooperative movement embraces the greatest part of the Polish-Jewish population. There are credit-Kassas in practically every city and town. Although the development of the movement, it was made clear, is continuous, it is suffering because of the serious economic crisis, which, affecting the whole country, is inflicting especial hardships on the Jews. Nevertheless, the convention felt, with the continued assistance of American Jewry, it will be possible eventually, to carry the development of the cooperatives to a point where no outside assistance will be necessary.

Gratitude was expressed at the convention to the Jews of America for their many manifestations of solidarity with the suffering Jews of Eastern Europe and for the continuance, through the Allied Jewish Campaign, of their efforts to ameliorate the condition of the vast numbers who are still struggling to rebuild their lives on the ashes of the great disaster that began in 1914.

Hederah to Have Electricity from Rutenberg Plant

Jerusalem, July 11—Hederah, one of the oldest Jewish colonies in Palestine, is having electricity installed this week. The electricity is being supplied to the colony by the Rutenberg plant.

Two Notorious Anti-Semites Arrested by Roumanian Police

Bucharest, July 11—The notorious anti-Semitic agitator, Danila, and his associate, Nicolai Totu, who in 1927 was acquitted in Campolung of having murdered the Jewish student, David Falik, in the Czernowitz court house, November 11, 1926, have been arrested by the police in Campolung following a raid, according to a report in the Bucharest daily, "Dimineata."

Falik was shot and killed in the Czernowitz court by Totu while Falik was testifying in a trial against anti-Semitic students. The murder aroused great indignation and protests throughout the Jewish world. On the plea that Totu could not get a fair trial in Czernowitz the case was transferred to Campolung. While the trial was pending Totu ran for Parliament on the Christian ticket.

The trial was finally held February 21, 1927 and Totu was acquitted.

Bacharach Becomes Mayor of Atlantic City for Third Time

Atlantic City, N. J., July 11—Harry Bacharach became Mayor of Atlantic City for the third time yesterday when he took the oath of office. Mr. Bacharach, who is a brother of Congressman Isaac Bacharach, is a banker and is State Public Utility Commissioner.

The new mayor took the oath before a large crowd and afterwards received many floral tributes. Walter Edge, American Ambassador to France, was among those who sent cables of congratulations to Mayor Bacharach.

In his inaugural address the Mayor said:

"I am sure that I express your wishes as well as my own when I state that it is the desire of the City Commissioners to give the people of Atlantic City a clean, honest, efficient and businesslike administration; that we will not have three people doing the work of one; that our employees must be efficient or lose their positions; that undesirables will not be tolerated in our city; that it shall be my aim to make our city one to which visitors may feel safe in coming to enjoy health and pleasure."

Hadassah Convention

Set for October 19

Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, announced yesterday that it will hold its sixteenth annual convention on October 19. Mrs. A. H. Vixman is chairman of the arrangements committee of the convention, and Mrs. Frieda Silbert Ullian chairman of the program committee.

During the months prior to the convention the organization will concentrate its efforts on increasing its membership, according to Miss Juliet Benjamin, national membership chairman. The 304 chapters throughout the country are conducting campaigns to secure new members in a competition that will yield membership awards at the annual convention.

Petition Maryland Governor to Enable 15,000 Baltimore Jews to Vote This Fall

Baltimore, July 11—To make it possible for Baltimore's 15,000 Jewish voters to cast their ballots in the Fall election and still observe their religious holidays, a petition requesting Governor Ritchie to take steps to change the dates of registration is being circulated throughout synagogues and Jewish organizations of the city. The petition is being distributed by Melvin L. Fine, member of the House of Delegates from the Fourth Legislative District, who hopes to obtain more than 5,000 names.

"Saying the situation will result in a 'practical disfranchisement' to thousands of Jewish voters, the petition urges the Governor to 'take such steps as may be necessary to change the registration dates in Baltimore so that the Jewish people of the city may be afforded ample opportunity to have their names placed on the registration books.'"

The four registration days falling on important holidays, Rosh Hashonah and Succoth, Jews of both the Reform and Orthodox sects will be unable to register if they conform strictly to their religion.

The contingency was pointed out to Willis R. Jones, Assistant Attorney-General, who returned an opinion that the situation could be remedied only by an act of the legislature. Rosh Hashonah will fall on September 23 and 24 and Succoth on October 7 and 8.

Boy Scout Camp Installs Special Kosher Table

Yonkers, N. Y., July 11—As a result of several appeals made by rabbis here to officials of Yonkers Council, Boy Scouts of America, a special kosher table has been installed at Camp Collins, Summer headquarters of the local council, for use by the Jewish boys at the camp. Camp Collins is located at Indian Lake, near Peekskill.

For First Time Jew Heads Polish Export Institute

Warsaw, July 11—A Jew was, for the first time in the history of Poland, chosen president of the Government Export Institute, when the Institute at its general meeting elected Pan Minkowski as its presiding officer. Minkowski was Assistant Secretary of War for one week in the cabinet of Premier Grabski.

"American Israelite, Oldest Anglo-Jewish Weekly, Celebrates

Cincinnati, July 11—The "American Israelite," published here, the oldest Anglo-Jewish weekly on this continent, celebrated its 76th anniversary with the issue of Friday, July 11. Dr. Isaac M. Wise, founder of Reform Judaism in America and of the Hebrew Union College, established the "Israelite" July 15, 1854.

months. He adds, according to the "Adverul," that the fire started simultaneously in several houses while the house of an anti-Semite within the fire area was unscathed and the surrounding buildings were reduced to ashes.

While the "Adverul" recalls that the prosecutor for the Borscha district was warned in a memorandum several weeks ago that the anti-Semites were planning to burn Borscha, M. Angelescu, under-secretary of the Interior, informed the press that the investigation made by Dr. Valer Moldevanu, district director, established that the fire started in Dr. Solomon's house through negligence and that the suggestion of arson has been dismissed. In the meantime the Jewish community of Bucharest has undertaken to raise a fund for the relief of the Borscha Jews who are reported to be badly off.

Vienna, July 11.—The entire Jewish population of Borscha, now practically homeless as a result of the fire, will be compelled to emigrate as further residence there is considered hopeless, according to letters from Borscha reaching the Jewish community of Dornwarth. The letters complain that the poverty among the Jews is such that it is impossible to raise one hundred lei among them.

Charges that the fire was started by anti-Semites who ignited gasoline in various parts of the town are also contained in the letters. This is confirmed by an inquiry into the fire made by a delegation from the Jewish community of Visuel. The delegation wired the results of its investigation to Premier Maniu and Vayda Voyvoed, minister of the Interior.

United Yeshivah Chest to Seek \$500,000

The United Yeshivah Chest, a federation of nine Jewish schools functioning within the metropolitan area, will seek to raise an amount of \$500,000 to cover the joint annual deficit of the schools participating in the Chest, it was announced yesterday by Judge Max S. Levine of the Court of General Sessions, president of the organization. The campaign will start on August 3rd, and will last until October 1, during which time a city-wide effort will be made.

Orthodox Jewish Congregations' Union to Meet in Baltimore in November

Baltimore, July 11.—The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America will hold its bi-annual convention in Baltimore November 15, 16 and 17. This will be the first time the assembly has been held anywhere except in New York city, according to Israel S. Gomborov, president of the Council of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of Baltimore.

16 Jews Among National Business Leaders Who Will Aid Trade Research

Cambridge, Mass., July 11.—Sixteen of the two hundred and fifty nationally known leaders of American industry and commerce who have united to organize a foundation to aid the scientific study of business under the guidance of the Harvard Business School are Jews. The new foundation will be called the Two Hundred and Fifty Associates of the Harvard Business School and the members pledge themselves to pay annual dues of \$1,000.

The sixteen Jews invited to join the Two Hundred and Fifty are Louis E. Kirstein of Boston, Herbert N. Straus of New York, Jesse I. Straus of New York, Gerard Swope of New York, A. Lincoln Filene of Boston, Herbert Fleishacker of San Francisco, Col. Michael Friedsam of New York, Henry Ittelson of New York, Otto H. Kahn of New York, Arthur Lehman of New York, Adolph S. Ochs of New York, Carl Pforzheimer of New York, Julius Rosenwald of Chicago, Lessing I. Rosenwald of Philadelphia, Walter N. Rothschild of Brooklyn, David Sarnoff and Percy S. Straus of New York.

Mr. Kirstein, and Messrs Herbert and Jesse Straus and Gerard Swope are members of the first board of trustees.

Appeal for British Jewry for \$5,000 to Care for Neglected Jewish Cemeteries

London, June 19.—An appeal to British Jewry to provide a sum of \$5,000 to take care of neglected Jewish cemeteries in localities in Great Britain which formerly had flourishing Jewish congregations but which now have no Jewish populations, has just been issued by the Very Rev. Dr. Joseph Hertz, Chief Rabbi of the British Empire, and O. E. d'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board of Deputies of British Jews.

In their appeal they state:

"There are some twenty localities in the British Isles where there were once flourishing Jewish congregations, but which have now no Jewish population. The only memorials of the existence of those congregations are the old burial grounds, which the traditional Jewish reverence for the memory of our ancestors, quite apart from other reasons, makes it essential to maintain in proper order. For many years past the Deputies have undertaken the duty of caring for these neglected cemeteries, and have done their best with the very limited funds at their disposal. The income from this source is only \$40 a year, and is obviously insufficient adequately to keep all these disused cemeteries in satisfactory order. Small payments have to be made to caretakers, while repairs to tombs, walls and fences, etc., have to be carried out from time to time. The Deputies are now faced with the necessity of assuming further responsibility for cemeteries in two additional towns, and it is imperative that the fund should be augmented."
