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Increase in Jewish Population Chief Cause of Wailing Wall Dispute, Keith Roach Says

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, July 16—The increase in the Jewish population of Palestine since the British occupation is the chief cause of the dispute between the Moslems and the Jews over the Wailing Wall, it was implied by Keith Roach, district commissioner for the Southern district, and the chief actor in the drama at the Wailing Wall dispute, Yom Kippur, 1928, who as the first government witness testified today before the Wailing Wall Commission.

Police Removed Screen

In the midst of the Yom Kippur prayers at the Wall in 1928 the British police under the command of Inspector Duff attempted to remove the screen put up for the services to separate men and women worshippers. The congregation resisted the police attempt to remove the screen but it was forcibly re-

Wall Commission's Chairman. Warning on Politics, Says That Threats Will Not Influence It (Iewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 16-"Threats will not influence us in our inquiry into the respective rights of the Jews and Moslems at the Wailing Wall and we must rule out all political questions," declared Eliol Loefgren, chairman of the Wailing Wall Commission, yesterday afternoon in the course of his remarks interrupting a recital by Jamal Husseini, secretary of the Moslem Supreme Council, of the Arab Executive's efforts to get the neighboring Moslem countries protest regarding the Wailing Wall. Mr. Loefgren said it was regrettable that the Arab Executive had opposed the government's lawful order laying down temporary regulations for Jewish worship, but he pointed out that the Wailing Wall Commission would (Continued on Page 3)

A number of the former colonists have already returned and the others are expected to return shortly.

The Palestine Emergency Fund has not acceded to the requests of the settlers to enlarge the colony but a new police post will be established on the estate of J. L. Goldberg which is still unreconstructed.

Peasants Warn Borscha Jews to Leave Town Before Night (Iewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, July 16-An ultimatum to the Jewish community of Borscha demanding that all Iews leave the town before six o'clock tonight was handed to the community leaders today by a delegation of anti-Semitic peasants under the leadership of a priest, according to reports in the Austrtian papers. If the ultimatum is not complied with the delegation said it would not guarantee the fate of the Jews.

In view of the ultimatum the Jewish community of Borscha has telegraphed to the government in Bucharest and also to various lewish organizations asking for aid and describing the panicky state of the Jewish population. Borscha was the scene of a fire of anti-Semitic origin a fortnight ago which did damage estimated at 50,000,000 lei and left several

Roumanian Press Unites in Demand for Stern Measures to Suppress Attacks on Jews

Leides-dorf, chairman of the Business Men's Council of the Federation, in his annual report to the eecutive committee of the Council.

Last year's budget totalled \$10,132,-056. The Federation's problem this year is the raising of its deficit of \$2,221,000, he said, pointing out that the remainder is already assured through annual recurring subscriptions and donations.

Task Rests with Workers

"The task of raising this sum so essential to philanthropic work here in New York rests with the workers of the Business Men's Council," Mr. Leidesdorf's report stated. "More than 75 cents of every dollar spent for Jewish philanthropy in New York is spent by the Federation institutions and more than three-fourths of all charitable work is done by these

The police official later said that his action had been on orders from Keith Roach. His instructions were said to have been based on complaints

from the Moslem Supreme Council. In his testimony today, Mr. Roach asserted that the Turks had followed a laisse faire policy because Jewish attendance at the services at the Wall was small. He admitted having seen campstools used at the Wall which the government tolerated until the new regulations were issued by High Commissioner Chancellor.

Says Form of Service Has Changed

Mr. Roach considered that there had been a distinct change in the form of the service at the Wall during his term in office. He said that the screen was first used during the 1928 Rosh Ha-shonah services. He said that his at-tention was first called to the use of the screen at Yom Kippur, 1928, when he ordered its removal. The government had not permitted the use of chairs, he stated, because it interfered with the right of way and might give the Jews the idea that they had property rights there.

Replying to Dr. Mordecai Eliash, chief counsel for the Jews, Mr. Roach said that the new door which the Moslems had built might be an innovation although he pointed out that he knew two officers had used the passage previously. At the request of Abdul Auni Bey, Arab counsel, he read a letter from Chief Rabbi Kook to Sir Ronald Storrs, former governor of Jerusalem, asking for permission to use benches at the Wall during the high holidays, and a letter from Harry C. Luke, former chief secretary, to Nashashibi, forwarding the complaint of the Jews that the Moslems had befouled the Wall.

Polish Jew Honored for Rescue of Pilsudski Legionnaires (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

This wire caused great excitement in Transjordania and necessitated hurried conferences with Palestine officials who urged Husseini to alter the telegram, The Arab Executive then called a strike in Palestine and Transjordania to protest against the regulations.

Dr. Leopold Auer, Famous Violinist and Teacher of Elman, Heifetz, Dies at 85 (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Dresden, Germany, July 16-Dr. Leopold Auer, famous violin teacher, who numbered among his pupils Mischa Who numbered among his pupils Mischa Elman, Jascha Heifetz and Efrem Zimbalist, died here yesterday at the age of 85. He had developed pnuemonia a few days ago and had been

Leonold Auer was born of Jewish parents at Veszprim, Hungary. He studied the violin with the celebrated virtuoso in several European capitals which he toured Through the influence of Anton Rubinstein, the famous composer who befriended Auer and who was director of the Imperial Conservatory of St. Petersburgh, Russia, Auer became professor of violin in this institution in 1869, succeeding Henri Wieniawski, another famous violinist and

Auer remained for many years in Russia, where he was honored by being given the title of soloist to the Czar's Czars, Alexander II, Alexander III, and Nicholas II. In St. Petersburg, where some of the most famous musicians in the world were gathered during his time, Auer became an intimate friend of Tchaikowsky, Rimsky-Korsakoff and Glazounoff. He founded the first string quartet and held the post of concert director of the Imperial Russian Society

After the outbreak of the war. Dr. Auer left Russia and spent some time in the Scandinavian countries. In 1918 he arrived in New York, where young violinists besieged him with requests to be taken as students. In 1925 a concert was given in Carnegie Hall, when several of his pupils who had become famous musicians united to do him honor. In 1926, at the age of 81, he became an American citizen. He recently published a book of reminiscences, called "My Long Life in Music."

"From Russia and America will come the great music of the future," Dr. Auer declared a few years ago in an interview. "These countries are the youngest in art, and my sympathies and beliefs are always with youth."

A Geneva dispatch to the New York "Times" says that in informed circles there great doubt is expressed that the so-called "second Balfour Declaration" of February 8, 1918 in which Lord Balfour is supposed to have promised the Arabs independence, a photostatic copy of which has been submitted to the League of Nations as part of a petition from the Syrian-Palestine Congress, will have any favorable effect on the Arabs' plea for a re-

Mandate. According to the "Times'" story even Arab supporters are of the opinion that the document will not have much of a real effect and some even believe that the document does not establish the hard and fast juridical case that the Arabs think they have. Balfour's letter was written to King Hussein, former ruler of the Hedjaz, in confirmation of promises of in-dependence made to the Arabs by Sir

Henry MacMahon.

It is pointed out that in Lord Balfour's letter he gives no indication of just what the promises were or whether Palestine was included in the territory promised to the Arabs. It is also pointed out by neutral observers that the British government officially stated in 1922 that Palestine was excluded

from the promise.

Jewish circles in Geneva are not inclined to attach much weight to the Balfour letter and it is pointed out that the Jews too have some new documents which are said to prove that in 1915 the British were planning a special regime in Palestine when they made promises to the Arabs. The "Times'" correspondent also says that the lews have documentary evidence showing that on March 13, 1916 Vis-count Grey submitted to Russia a British plan for an international re-gime in Palestine, giving the Jews the right to colonize there and eventually to take over the internal administration of the country and that this plan was agreed to before the end of the
