Roads Leading to Bessarabia Recall War Days as Troops March to Halt Anti-Semites

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, July 21—A situation reminiscent of the War days prevails on the principal roads and highways of the Maramuresh and South Bukovinian districts leading to Bessarabia as strong military detachments are arriving in connection with the anti-Semitic peasants' movement, which is spreading from Bukovina to Bessarabia, and the march of the anti-Semitic youth organization, Iron Guard, the Hungarian Telegraphic Agency reports.

All railway bridges leading to Bessarabia, particularly those in and around Jassy and Radanti, are in control of troops in view of the attempts being made by the Iron Guard to in-

Government Says Order Prevails in Roumania But Preventive Measures Still Enforced

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 21—Order prevails throughout Roumania although preventive measures against the anti-Semitic disturbances are still enforced, according to an official communique issued today by the ministry of the interior. Sixty members of the anti-Semitic organization, Iron Guard, were prevented from entering the town of Focsani by the order of the local authorities.

The Iron Guard delegation was headed by the anti-Semitic chieftain, M. Codreanu. Danila and Nicolai Totu, two notorious agitators, who have been arrested three times in the past few weeks and each time released, were also refused permission to alight at Focsani on their way to Jassy.

In the meantime the order for the arrest of Colonel Negulescu, organizer of the anti-Semitic disturbances in Bukovina, has been confirmed by the Court of Appeal. The eighty peasants of Beoceana who were arrested following anti-Semitic riots in that town will remain under arrest until the October session of the Court of Assizes. They are charged with rebellion and robbery.

Polish Papers See Need of American Jews' Friendship

Warsaw, July 21—The importance for Poland of obtaining the support and sympathy of American-Jewish public opinion is emphasized in two of the country's leading conservative dailies, the "Czas" of Cracow and the "Slowo" of Vilna. The latter points out that the best way to secure this friendship of American Jews is to fulfill the justified demands of the Polish Jews.

Treasury Department Approves \$475,000 Tel Aviv Budget

Tel Aviv, July 21—The municipality budget of \$475,000 for Tel Aviv, the largest of any in Palestine, was today approved by Steuart Spencer Davis, treasurer of Palestine. The government's grant towards the budget will be \$32,000, the smallest to any municipality in the country.

The approval of the budget will enable Tel Aviv to contribute \$12,500 to the Hadassah Hospital, making it possible for the latter to reopen its surgical department which had been closed when this contribution had been held up. The government's approval of the budget also enables Tel Aviv to continue with the construction of its own abattoir for which it had obtained a loan of \$50,000 from the Ottoman Bank, guaranteed by the government.

The proposed wage scale for municipal employees was also ratified by Mr. Davis.

Sister-in-Law of Disraeli Dies in London at 93

London, July 21—A sister-in-law of Lord Beaconsfield, Mrs. Ralph Disraeli, died here yesterday in her ninety-third year. Mrs. Disraeli, whose maiden name was Katherine Trevor, was married in 1861 to Ralph, the younger brother of the famous Jewish Prime Minister of Great Britain, who died in 1898. One son, Coningsby Disraeli, and four daughters survive her.

Says Israel Has Been Preserved Because It Kept Its Rituals; Montefiore Traces Problems of Reform; American Rabbis Speak

London, July 21—Israel has been preserved only because it kept its rituals and if the rites had not been strictly observed it probably would not exist today, declared Edmond Fleg, celebrated French author, speaking on "The Mission of Israel" at the second world conference on Progressive Judaism here yesterday.

M. Fleg pointed out that orthodox, progressive and Zionist Jews are still seeking a central idea which will reunite them. This idea, he suggested, will be found in the ancient concept of the mission of Israel "which must be lit with fresh youth and the life of the past and the present."

Discussing "The Task of Liberal Judaism," Rabbi Felix Levy of Chicago, said that three forces were at work in the modern world, science, nationalism and industrialism. The latter two he characterized as "the twin enemies of religion. Religion today is engaged in a deadly combat with this twin-headed monster. If they win, religion will disappear because it will not be worth ob-

Wailing Wall Commission Ends Hearings with Final Plea for Moslem-Jewish Understanding

Jerusalem, July 21—Thanking both Moslems and Jews for their cooperation during the sessions of the Wailing Wall Commission, Eliel Loefer, chairman of the Commission, in his statement at the end of the session Saturday afternoon, said that he believed the Commission had been provided with sufficient material to make a decision and report on the rights of both Moslems and Jews to the Wailing Wall.

Stating that he appreciated that the decision of the Commission should have in view the improvement of conditions leading to peace and goodwill between Jew and Moslem, the chairman added that the "fruits of justice can not ripen except in an atmosphere caused by a proper appreciation of one another's interests which often appear opposed although in reality these interests can serve in common for both sides."

Final Attempt to Persuade Moslems

The Commission, which left for home Saturday evening after a final vain attempt on the part of Loefer to persuade the Moslems to promise that they would accept the ruling of the Commission, was bidden farewell by representatives of both Moslems and Jews, and a general atmosphere of friendliness prevailed. The Grand Mufti and representatives of the government were among those who were

serving. But if religion is able to defeat the monster, religion will enter its proper phase of duty." Rabbi Levy declared that the failure of religion in the past may be laid to the fact that it had been content to run only in the old grooves.

Sees Danger in Ceremonies

In the course of a discussion on "Personal Piety" during which Heinrich Stern of Berlin presided, Rabbi Israel Mattuck of London pointed out the danger of ceremony destroying the balance in religion. Ceremonies have value and have danger, he said, "the greatest danger being in the belief that the observation of ceremonies pleases God and religion being corrupted and rotted at its very heart by those who believe that the worship of God means to observe certain things."

In the same discussion, Rabbi German Levy of Paris compared music with prayer, pointing out that like music one can only understand prayer

Opposition to Mufti Asks New Elections to Supreme Council

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Haifa, July 21—A petition being circulated by the opposition to the Grand Mufti, president of the Moslem Supreme Council, demands new elections to the Council, a complete accounting of all monies disbursed and a modification of the present method of electing members to the Council. The petition also criticizes the concentrating of the Moslem side of the Wailing Wall case in the hands of the Council.

The signatures to the petition include Sheikh Hassad Shoukri, the Grand Mufti's rival; Omar Bittar, head of the Moslem-Christian Union of Jaffa and other leading Moslems.

Heal Breach in Ranks of National Socialist Party

Berlin, July 21—The breach in the National Socialist party which began before the parliamentary crisis and was completed with the dissolution of parliament by Chancellor Bruening has been healed pending the new parliamentary elections in the Fall. In the meantime the party is forming a united front throughout the country. At National Socialist mass meetings in Mannheim and Heidelberg it was suggested that a new German racial party be formed.

The National Socialist party was split into factions, one headed by Adolf Hitler, anti-Semitic leader, and Dr. Alfred Hugenberg and the other by Count Westarp. The party itself has a number of anti-Semitic planks. For a while before the breach was healed the Westarp and Hitler groups were extremely bitter at each other.

See Absence of Definite Statement of British Policy Regarding Palestine as Endangering Economic Conditions of Country

London, July 21—Grave concern at the action of the British government regarding the Jewish National Home since the August disturbances and the belief that the postponement of a clear and definite statement of policy regarding Palestine in accordance with the principles of the Mandate discourages Jewish enterprise and endangers the economic conditions of the country were voiced in a resolution adopted at a conference of representatives of Jewish institutions and synagogues of the British Isles.

A firm and determined tone characterized the remarks of the speakers at the meeting which was held in the Kingsway Theatre under the auspices of the Jewish Agency before a capacity crowd. President of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, d'Avigdor Goldsmid, who presided, said that he realized that the government was responsible for much because it had deliberately and on uneconomic grounds suspended immigration to Palestine and was submitting the whole question of land purchase and immigration to the report of one man.

Acts Conflict With Assurances

While he accepted the government's assurances that it was ready to carry out the terms of the Mandate, Mr. Goldsmid said that the difficulty lies in the fact that the government's action conflicts with the assurances. Recalling the recent speech of Hamilton Fish in the Congress of the United States where it was emphasized that the world-wide protests of the Jews are not improving British prestige, Mr. Goldsmid declared that "as Jews and British citizens we desire to make the government realize that we are not satisfied with declarations alone but we call upon the government to translate these expressions of good will into actions which will assist and not impede the upbuilding of Palestine."

The resolution that the Conference adopted was moved by Mr. Goldsmid. It deplored the fact that the White Paper presented to the Mandate Commission raised serious doubts regarding the government's intention to fully implement the terms of the Mandate. Associating itself with the world-wide Jewish protests against the suspension of immigration, the Conference declared that the official explanations so far given of the suspension were unconvincing and appealed to the government to reopen the gates of Palestine and reaffirm the right of the Jews to return to their National Home. The desire for good-will and cooperation with the Arabs was also asserted.

"Palestine and Jews Inseparable"

In supporting the resolution, Chief Rabbi Joseph Hertz said that the best reply that could be given to Lord Passfield's argument that "we must protect the poor Arabs" was to remind him of a speech made by Premier MacDonald seven years ago in which he said "Palestine and the Jews can never

be separated." Dr. Hertz quoted Mr. MacDonald as describing the enthusiasm and devotion of the pioneers on the land and saying that "the ten years of work which I (MacDonald) saw will increase the wealth of Palestine a hundred-fold."

Prof. Selig Brodetsky, who also spoke for the resolution, pointed out that it was a mistake to have ever used the word immigration in relation to Palestine. He said that the Jews are not alien immigrants but are merely returning to their National Home as exiles returning to their native land. Criticizing the recent attempts of British officials to whittle down the meaning of the Jewish National Home, Professor Brodetsky said "we demand free immigration in accordance with the absorptive capacity of the country developed through our efforts."

Other speakers were Michael Marcus, M. P., and Col. Frederick Kisch, members of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, and Nettie Adler, non-Zionist member of the Jewish Agency.

British-Jewish Aid Society to Help Needy Ukrainian Jews

Moscow, July 21—Permission for the Federation of Jewish Relief Organizations of Great Britain to enter Soviet Russia and assist the needy Jews there has been granted following several weeks of negotiations between representatives of the Federation and Sh. Yochelman of the Comzet, the government department for settling the Jews on the land. An agreement between the Comzet and the Federation was signed following Yochelman's return from Ukraine with definite plans. The agreement will be approved by the higher Soviet authorities within a week.

Some months ago when the Federation sought permission to contribute money for the needy Jews of Ukraine it was denied because the president of the Federation is Chief Rabbi Joseph Hertz who had taken an active part in the campaign against Russia's war on religion.

Hear Simpson to Leave for Home July 27

Jerusalem, July 21—A report that Commissioner Simpson, who has been investigating problems of colonization, immigration and settlement in Palestine for Great Britain, would leave for home July 27 has aroused much conjecture as to his possible conclusions. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent learns that all forecasts as to the contents of his report are premature but it is known that Simpson considers that Palestine is able to absorb a greater population if a better system of development were followed.

Maryland Governor Calls Extra Session of Legislature to Enable Jews of State to Vote

Baltimore, July 21—A proclamation calling the General Assembly of Maryland into extraordinary session on July 29 to amend the dates for registration was issued today by Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland. The Governor acted after more than a week's investigation of a situation created by the conflict of the registration dates with two of the most important religious holidays of the Jewish calendar, Rosh Hashonah and Succoth.

The Governor said he has taken the proper steps to assure himself that the legislature will limit itself to the one subject and that it can and will meet, pass the necessary law and adjourn in one day.

After consideration of the terms of the law in the case, the Governor explained he has found two or three alternatives, but believes the best course to follow would be an amendment of the existing law, providing for the substitution this year of new registration days for September 23 and 24 and October 7 and 8, which are set by statute. The former two coincide with the observance of Rosh Hashonah, and the latter dates are the same as Succoth, the Feast of Tabernacles.

Pointing out that the state should not permit any large group of its people to be disfranchised by circumstances wholly exceptional and unforeseen and beyond their control, as is the case in the coincidence of the registration dates with the days sacred to the Jewish people, the Governor declared he has not acted because of any great demand or pressure from any source.

"It is simply that I recognize an existing situation, have taken the time necessary to examine and appraise it calmly and carefully, and am convinced that fairness and justice to the people affected require a remedy which only the Legislature can give," he said.

According to estimates, the Governor said, there are from 26,000 to 30,000 voting Jews in Baltimore, and of these it is estimated that 20,000 or more are Orthodox. The others are Reform. The cost of a one-day session of the Legislature as provided by law would be something over \$8,000, the Governor stated.

Mark Half Century of First Jew's Arrival in Manitoba

Winnipeg, July 21—Coincident with the celebration this month of the sixtieth anniversary of the founding of the Province of Manitoba and its entry into the Dominion of Canada, there is also being celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the entrance of the first Jew into Manitoba.

On July 31, 1880, Reuben Goldstein came to this province, and in his wake followed many other Jews who established themselves in Manitoba as farmers, homesteaders, workers, business men, manufacturers and traders. Today there are twenty thousand Jews living in the province, of Manitoba.

by trying it. Claude Montefiore emphasized the necessity for discipline, saying that a certain amount of dullness, regularity and ceremony is necessary even for the most liberal Jews for an inculcation of piety.

Mr. Montefiore, who presided at the opening session, declared that progressive Judaism endeavors to satisfy thinking men and women today but said that this did not imply that "Judaism must veer about with every new fashion in philosophy or that it could be false to the fundamental doctrines. But within those wide limits it seeks to enrich our conceptions of God and makes them more consistent with the advance of knowledge and science."

Traces Problems of Reform

After pointing out that the problems of the "world of the Bible" and of today are different and that Reform Judaism had begun largely with outward things, Mr. Montefiore traced the difficult problems that confronted Reform Judaism 50 years ago and which have not yet been definitely settled.

Some of these are, what are the legitimate influences of Biblical criticism on progressive Judaism, what should be the value of tradition, what the place of rabbinic ordinances as compared with Pentateuchal Law, how far should all purely national elements be removed from modern Judaism, how many of Maimonides' Thirteen Articles of faith are still valid for Reformers, what should be the attitude of Reform to Sabbath observances and the dietary laws.

On the other hand he said that the success of Liberal Judaism had revealed certain defects. Indifference had not been abolished by Reform. Admitting that the problems of today are

graver than those of 50 years ago, Mr. Montefiore enumerated the following as the pressing questions of today: is the God of the modern world the God of Judaism, can there be a reconciliation between the two and has prayer a meaning?

Rabbi Schulman Reads Paper

Rabbi Samuel Schulman of New York read a paper on "The Conception and Value of Prayer." The central fact in religion is prayer, Rabbi Schulman said. Prayer expresses the conviction that God is a reality and not merely a wish, he continued. Rabbi Schulman emphasized that there was an aspect of modern thought which frankly acknowledges religion as a fundamental human experience which performs a peculiar function in life and which has biological value and therefore justifies itself.

In the absence of David Koigen, his paper on "The Conception of God in the Light of Modern Thought" was read by Rabbi Nathan Stern of New York. Sir Philip Hartog and Rabbi Bernard Heller of Scranton, Pa., also spoke.

Paterson Jewish Teachers to Get Holidays Off With Half Salary

Paterson, N. J., July 21—All Jewish teachers in the public schools of this city will in the future be given three days off with half-pay on Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur, according to a resolution passed by the Paterson Board of Education last week. This ends a six-year fight which has been carried on by the Jewish teachers of Paterson against the deduction of substitutes' pay on Jewish High Holidays.

Feeling that the matter could not be treated as a Jewish problem since it might smack of discrimination, the special committee of the Board of Education presented a resolution which establishes three "merit days" by which every teacher will be permitted that number of days of absence by application to the superintendent with the loss of half-pay. Charles H. Roemer, city attorney, has been the main figure behind the teachers' agitation against the deduction of substitutes' pay on Jewish holidays.

14 Directors of Consumptive Relief Ass'n Elected for 2 Years

Los Angeles, July 21—The fourteen directors of the Jewish Consumptive and Ex-Patients' Relief Association elected at the Association's recent convention will serve for two years. They were named to the places of the fourteen whose terms had expired. The Association also went on record as favoring the construction of needed buildings through special gifts and bequests and that all monies raised by auxiliaries should be utilized for maintenance purposes only.

Perskie to Succeed Bacharach on Jersey Utility Commission

Atlantic City, July 21—City Solicitor Joseph B. Perskie, of Atlantic City, is slated to succeed Mayor Harry Bacharach, of the resort municipality, on the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners, according to information reaching this city.

From sources close to the administration of Governor Morgan F. Larson, it was learned that he favors the appointment of Mr. Perskie although he will not nominate him immediately because he wishes Mayor Bacharach to continue as a member of the commission until the increased fare rate case of the Public Service Corporation, now pending, has been decided.

Mr. Perskie, like Mayor Bacharach, is active in the Jewish communal life of Atlantic City. He is also one of the state officers of the recently organized New Jersey branch of the American Jewish Congress. He is a son-in-law of the Rev. Hirsch Masliansky, noted Yiddish orator and scholar. He has held the post of City Solicitor of Atlantic City for a number of years.

present when the special train carrying three men who are to make a momentous decision left the station.

Verdict to Be Based on Justice

"We will, as Commissioners for the League of Nations," said Loefgren, "base our verdict on what, in our best belief, is right. We are determined to do our duty without being influenced by conflicting motives of a purely political nature. We are representatives who wish to help in the creation of peace."

The League of Nations, said M. Loefgren, would await and receive the report without bias. However intricate the case, he said, despite its conflicting religious sentiments and traditions, the hearings had been useful in helping the commission to ascertain facts "which rightly understood and frankly told have a reassuring effect on agitated minds."

Saying that both the Moslems and the Jews were responsible not only to their own generation but to posterity, Mr. Loefgren made a final plea to both sides to attempt to reach an accord. "Irrespective of sentiments and political agitation and excitement," he declared, "it should be possible for both sides to arrive at a friendly settlement in a spirit of mutual understanding and respect."

The Commission, declared its chairman, would much prefer a voluntary solution to an enforced verdict and "with great satisfaction will receive proposals and arrangements either party cares to offer before September 1. We stand ready to offer all possible assistance."

The Commission, Chairman Loefgren said, would prepare its report with the least possible delay. Meanwhile, he emphasized, it was to be understood that the regulations issued by the government in regard to the practice at the Wailing Wall were to remain in force until eventually altered, cancelled or replaced. "Until then innovations should not be made, or actions taken by either side which are of a nature which would alter the present Wailing Wall status quo," he concluded.

Cincinnati, July 21—Professor Moses Buttenweiser, professor of Biblical Exegesis at Hebrew Union College, has been elected president of the Western Branch of the American Oriental Society.

Expedition to Ancient Jewish City Planned by Art Museum

Cleveland, July 21—The Cleveland Museum of Art will participate in a joint expedition which will be conducted during the coming year on the site of the ancient Greek city of Seleucia on the Tigris River, according to an announcement just made. Excavations on the site of Seleucia, which was once conquered by the Macceans and became a Jewish city for a time, were begun a few years ago. The present expedition will aim to unearth art and archaeological treasures of the ancient city, which will have a bearing not only upon the Babylonian and Greek phases of its history, but also upon the period when it was within the ancient Jewish domain.

Seleucia, which in more ancient times was the Opis of Babylonia and which was later conquered by Alexander the Great, was conquered by Alexander Jannai, who succeeded his brother Aristobulus as King of Judea in 103 B. C. He forced its inhabitants to abandon idolatry and adopt the rites of Judaism. Seleucia was one of many conquered cities whose inhabitants were forced by the Hasmonean power to adopt Judaism.

As ruler of the Greek people in Seleucia, Alexander Jannai ordered coins to be struck off bearing the inscription "King Alexander" in Greek characters upon one side, and the inscription "Jehonathan ha-Melech" (Jonathan the King) in Hebrew characters on the other. His Hebrew title as set forth on earlier Hephra coins had been "The High Priest Jonathan, the Commonwealth of the Judeans".

Arabs to Commemorate 40th Day of Murderers' Hanging

Jerusalem, July 21—The fortieth day since the execution of three Arabs for their part in the riots of last Summer, will be commemorated by the Arab political leaders who are utilizing July 27 for purposes of political manifestations. A government communicate states that only the customary pious acts will be permitted. No assemblies or political speeches will be allowed.

The Grand Mufti and the members of the Arab Executive, plan, it is understood, to visit Acre on that day.

Rabbi Hurwitz Called to Beth Israel Center, Phoenix

vade Bessarabia. The nationalistic youth organization led by M. Codreanu, is chiefly composed of school boys and college students.

Similar stringent measures are being taken by the authorities, local and national, to control the tour of the country now being made by Danila and Nicolai Totu, anti-Semitic agitators. The refusal of local officials to grant permission to these two to stop off at various towns has partly quieted the alarmed Jewish population.

On the other hand the Jewish members of parliament are reported to be dissatisfied with the promises made to them last week by Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, Roumanian minister of the interior, and have consequently decided to request an immediate audience with King Carol. Deputy Michael Landau declared that the pogrom atmosphere in Bessarabia is similar to the situation in 1905 and 1913 when that part of Roumania was Russian territory.

\$10,500 More Contributed To New York Campaign

Contributions totalling \$10,500 were announced today by the New York campaign committee of the Allied Jewish Campaign. These contributions include gifts of \$1,000 each from Monroe C. Gutman, Mrs. Henry Ittelson, Isidor J. Kresel, Mrs. Morris Leob and Paul M. Mazur.
