## Says Roumanian Jewish Plight Will Be Serious Until Economic Conditions Alter

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 28—The Jewish situation in Roumania will remain serious so long as the general economic situation of the country is depressed, said Victor Caderu, head of the Seguranza, the Roumanian secret police, in an interview today with the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. M. Caderu, who has just returned from an intensive investigation of the Bukovina area where the recent anti-Semitic disturbances occurred, is considered the right hand man of King Carol.

He frankly admitted that the Jewish situation in Bukovina was "very alarming". He added, however, that while on his tour of investigation, which was made at the request of the King, that he had issued orders designed to prevent any repetition of the anti-Jewish disturbances. These orders, included, he said, instructions to arrest any person conducting anti-Semitic propaganda and to refuse to permit strangers to reside in places in Bukovina where anti-Jewish feeling is tense, thus avoiding any invasion of agitators. M. Caderu also said that he had ordered that no meetings should be held unless special permission sanctioning such gatherings was obtained from the local authorities.

The peasantry throughout the country is now in frightful misery, the chief of the secret police stated, because Roumania's exports of corn, timber and other products have been greatly reduced owing to Roumania's inability to compete with Soviet Russia's prices for the same products. The peasants are in a state of great dissatisfaction and this unrest is being utilized, M. Caderu explained, by anti-

## Report of Arab Delegation to London Threatens Direct Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 28—A threat of direct action on the part of the Palestine Arabs to offset "Zionist propaganda in Europe and the enormous dangers to the Arabs of the British policy" is contained in the official report of the Arab delegation to London read yesterday by Auni Bey before the Arab Executive.

After calling for the establishment of an Arab political bureau in London the report says that the Arabs "recognizing their plight appreciate the enormous dangers because of the continued British policy, but the nation will not continue to face death with locked hands but will use every legal means in its power to defend itself against the danger."

## Hear Hungarian Jews Seeking Foreign Aid for First Time

Vienna, July 28—Indications that the Jews of Hungary for the first time require economic relief from abroad are seen in reports in the Austrian papers that Baron Kohler, president of the Budapest Jewish Community, state councillor M. Stern and Joseph Veszi, Jewish leaders of Budapest, have made visits to the Alliance Universelle Israelite in Paris and the Joint Distribution Committee in Berlin to negotiate for assistance to the Jews of Hungary. The reports, however, do not mention whether the relief sought is direct financial help or merely support for the contemplated Hungarian national loan.

## Recommend Gold Medal for Jewish Health Society

Warsaw, July 28—The Polish department of health and the ministry of the interior have recommended to President Moscicki that he bestow a gold medal on the Toz, for useful health work. The Toz is the society for protecting the health of the Jews of Poland.

## Jews of Uriev Panic-Stricken as New Attacks Impend; Police Raid Home of Anti-Semitic Official; Jews Plan Self-Defense

Bucharest, July 28—A raid was made by the police yesterday morning on the home of M. Tazladanu, chief secretary in the office of the Minister of the Interior, Alexander Vayda Voevod. The search, which lasted for several hours, was made on the order of Premier Maniu. Documents were sought to establish Tazladanu's connection with the anti-Semitic agitator, M. Zelea Codreanu, whom M. Tazladanu has been accused of having aided in organizing the recent outbreaks.

Following the search, police took M. Tazladanu to the jail where M. Codreanu is imprisoned because of his leadership of anti-Semitic propaganda, and they were both cross-examined regarding the source of the funds which they had obtained for their activities. M. Tazladanu was later released, but was ordered to appear before the public prosecutor to morrow morning.

M. Vayda Voevod, speaking to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent, explained that he knew that M. Tazladanu was an outspoken anti-Semite who was closely connected with anti-Semitic organizations, but he had nevertheless invited him to act as chief of his Ministry Office, as he believed that in that way the government would be able to pacify the anti-Semi-

## Seek Pardon for Urphali as Privy Council Declines to Hear Death Sentence Appeal

London, July 28—In view of the refusal of the Privy Council, the highest legal tribunal in the British Empire, to hear the appeal from the death sentence of Joseph Mizrahi Urphali, the only Jew under the death sentence in Palestine as a result of the events growing out of last Summer's riots, counsel for Urphali is preparing a petition to the High Commissioner for a pardon or at least a commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment.

After being sentenced to death by the lower court the Court of Appeal ordered a new trial for Urphali when it ruled out evidence presented by the prosecution. At his second trial he was again found guilty and resented. When the Arab prisoners found guilty of murder had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment no action was taken regarding Urphali because his appeal was pending before the Privy Council.

Now it is learned that when he was resented the court inserted a plea for clemency in its decision. On the basis of this plea Urphali's council will ask for a pardon or commutation of the sentence.

### Home Being Watched

M. Tazladanu's home is now under police observation and he will continue under surveillance until the public prosecutor decides what action to take.

M. Codreanu who was arrested last week, today demanded his release until the date of his trial, while being questioned by the State's attorney. His demand was refused and the prosecuting attorney announced that he would not be released before the trial.

### Jews Panic-Stricken

The Jews of Uriev, Bessarabia, are in a state of panic in connection with the murder of Sholom Landau, which occurred on Friday. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent, speaking over the telephone with the Jewish leaders of Uriev, was informed that the Jews are fearful of further developments in what appears to be a definitely planned anti-Semitic campaign. All stores owned by Jews are remaining closed and Jews are keeping off the streets in the bazaar section.

## 40th Day Since Execution of 3 Arabs Passes Quietly

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, July 28—Despite the government's refusal to permit any political demonstrations to color the religious observation of the fortieth day since the execution of the three Arabs for their part in the riots of last Summer, the Arab Executive, in an impassioned appeal issued yesterday, described the "martyrs who went to their death with smiling lips and hearts full of faith" as "the forerunners of liberty and independence." The statement denied that the executed Arabs were guilty of any crime. "They were the victims of imperialism, alien aggression and political intrigue," it concludes.

The Arab Executive, after a prolonged session on Friday, decided that religious services at the Mosque of Acre yesterday would be semi-political in character. The services held at Safed were uneventful due to adequate police precautions.

## Urges Arab Laborers to Emulate Jewish Workers

Jaffa, July 28—While Ben Zvi, Jewish labor leader, is continuing his efforts for cooperation between Arab and Jewish labor as well as unity and mutual understanding between the two people, the Arab Society of Jaffa, recently organized here, has issued an appeal to the Arab workmen to emulate the Jewish workers.

The Arab laborers are urged to follow the example of the Jewish workers in fighting for an eight hour day and higher wages. Saying that "the Jewish employer is not better than the Arab employer but the Jewish workers appreciate the necessity of protecting their interests," the appeal asks "are we worse than the Jews and not deserving of securing our rights?"

## Funeral Services Today for Dr. Silverman from Emanu-El Where He Served 34 Years

Funeral services for the Rev. Dr. Joseph Silverman, for 34 years rabbi of Temple Emanu-El and rabbi-emeritus since 1922, who died Saturday afternoon, will be held at ten o'clock this morning at Temple Emanu-El. He would have been 70 in August. The eulogy will be delivered by the Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, rabbi of the Free Synagogue. Burial will be in the family plot at Salem Fields Cemetery, Long Island. All the trustees of Temple Emanu-El have been invited to serve as honorary pall-bearers.

Rabbi Silverman, the second prominent New York rabbi to pass away in recent weeks, Rabbi Maurice Harris having been the first, was the youngest man to be selected as rabbi of one of the country's most important congregations. He was 29 years old when he came to New York from Texas as assistant rabbi at Temple Emanu-El, then at Fifth Avenue and 43rd street. Rabbi Silverman was named rabbi of the congregation in 1903 at the age of 43 when Dr. Gustav Gottheil died.

Rabbi Silverman was born in Cincinnati where he obtained his rabbinical and secular education. In 1884, the year of his ordination, he became rabbi of Temple Emanu-El in Dallas. After one year of work in Texas he had established a circuit to bring the Jews of the state into closer touch with each other. Later he was called to Temple Israel in Galveston where he remained until he came to New York in 1888.

The Jewry of New York found in Rabbi Silverman a tireless worker. He became one of the outstanding leaders in the organization of charitable groups, community centers, and social welfare bodies which were so much needed then to take care of the wave of Jewish immigration that completely changed the complexion of the New York Jewish community in less than a generation. When he became rabbi of

## Prof. Albert Einstein Working on New "Interesting" Theory

Geneva, July 28—Although not saying what it is, Dr. Albert Einstein, world-famous physicist and scientist, who is here to attend the meetings of the League of Nations Committee on Intellectual Cooperation, admitted that he is working on a new theory, one more vast than his Theory of Relativity. Asked about the subject matter of his latest experiments he said it was more interesting than his previous contributions to science but he feels that "maybe people will think I am a fool when they read it."

Best known for his work as a scientist, Professor Einstein is giving much time here to the problems of child education. He is of the opinion that the League of Nations can do no greater work than to aid in improving the elementary schools of the world. The other members of the committee here are amazed at Dr. Einstein's frankness and the sincerity with which he approaches all problems.

## Dead Sea Concessionaires Get Right to Build Railroad from Dead Sea to Gulf of Akaba

Jerusalem, July 28—The right to build a railroad from the Dead Sea to the Gulf of Akaba, which is an arm of the Red Sea, has been granted to the Anglo-Jewish firm which, headed by Moses Novomejsky and Major Tulloch, a few years ago obtained the concession to exploit the minerals of the Dead Sea. The railroad when built will give the company direct access to the Asiatic and Australian markets, avoiding the high tariffs which must be paid for the use of the Suez Canal.

According to an agreement signed by King Hussein with the British government before the former was forced to abdicate, the town of Akaba on the Gulf and a strip of land which leads from it to the Dead Sea was made a part of Palestine. This agreement was later ratified in a treaty signed by Sir Gilbert Clayton, on behalf of Great Britain, and the Wahabite King, Ibn Saud, who expelled Hussein from Arabia.

The company, which is exploiting the Dead Sea minerals, does not plan to build the railroad in the near future. In the meantime it is transporting in trucks the first shipment of chemicals which have been obtained from the Dead Sea to Haifa or Jaffa. For the near future the company is planning to build a spur line to Jerusalem or Beisan for the purpose of facilitating the transportation of the chemicals from the Dead Sea to the main railroad line.

## Revisionist Conference to Open in Prague August 10

Prague, July 28—The world conference of the Zionists-Revisionists which opens here on August 10 will continue for five days. Vladimir Jabotinsky, noted leader of Revisionism, will make the opening address, in which he will discuss the present crisis in Zionism.

The conference will discuss the political work of the Zionist Organization, the land question in Palestine and the attitude of the Revisionists toward the Jewish Agency. Addresses on various Zionist questions will be given by Meer Grossman, M. Soskin, Richard Lichtheim and I. Klinow.

## Henrietta Szold May Rejoin Jewish Agency's Executive

Jerusalem, July 28—With Col Frederick Kisch, chairman of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, expected back here at the end of the week from his flying visit to London, Dr. Arthur Ruppin, Rabbi Meyer Berlin and Joseph Sprinzak are preparing to go abroad for the sessions of the Zionist Actions Committee which will be held in Berlin, August 24. In the meantime it is expected that Henrietta Szold will temporarily rejoin the Jewish Agency Executive together with Col. Kisch and Pinchas Rutenberg.

## Roumania to Pay Damages to Pogrom Sufferers in Vama, Suceava and Borscha

Bucharest, July 28—The Roumanian government will pay damages to the victims of the anti-Semitic disturbances in Borscha, Vama and Suceava immediately after the investigations into these disturbances have been completed, the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was assured today by Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, minister of the interior, following a three hour interview.

After pointing out that the Jewish sufferers from anti-Semitism will get government assistance as they did at Klausenberg in the past, Dr. Vayda Voevod pointed out that anti-Semitism in Roumania usually increases and grows whenever the country suffers from an economic depression as it is now. Under these circumstances the minister of the interior feels that the Jews abroad should aid in obtaining credits for Roumania because this indirectly aids in the safety of the Jews in Roumania.

Giving definite assurances that stricter measures will be used in the future to guarantee the safety of the Jewish population, Dr. Vayda Voevod, who has been granted what amounts to almost dictatorial powers by the Cabinet in dealing with anti-Semitic disturbances, said that the government is determined to suppress and punish with the greatest severity every movement that disturbs the internal peace of the country and of course the anti-Semitic movement which creates danger for the safety of the Jews.

Emphasizing that the present anti-Semitic outbreaks are stimulated by the Liberal Party which he charges is seeking to discredit the present government in order to regain its lost political power, Dr. Vayda Voevod declared that "the Roumanian people are not anti-Semitic. They are very friendly towards their Jewish neighbors. Excesses, however, occurred after the election of Professor Cuza to parliament."

Cuza's election, Dr. Vayda Voevod believes, was efficiently supported by the Liberal Party. He said that he has now undertaken energetic means to prevent a repetition of the outbreaks. He pointed out that he has issued orders to arrest every one guilty of anti-Semitic propaganda, adding that the military would be used wherever necessary.

## Women Offer Prize for Best Arab Costume

Jerusalem, July 28—As part of a plan that is apparently designed to encourage the use and manufacture of home spun articles by the Arabs in Palestine as the Indian Nationalists are doing in India, the executive committee of the Arab Womens' Society has offered a prize of \$50 for the Arab woman designing the most characteristic Arab costume.

## Fires in Roumanian Towns Cause Damage to Jewish Property; Many Jewish Families Homeless

Bucharest, July 28—The entire commercial quarter of Saskut in Moldavia, consisting of many Jewish houses and stores was destroyed by fire last night. The Roumanian Academy of Science, valued at \$1,000,000, which was donated by the Jewish banker, Jacques Elias, was badly damaged. Families, homeless because of the fire, have found temporary shelter in the Saskut sugar plant. The fire has not yet been completely extinguished. The damage is estimated at more than \$50,000.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was today assured that the origin of the fire was in no way connected with the anti-Semitic sentiments of the population and was merely an unfortunate occurrence.

Telephone reports received by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here indicate that in dozens of towns in Old Roumania fires have also broken out. Many Jewish houses have been destroyed by fires attributed to the abnormally hot weather in Bakeu, Niamz, Bortchai, Gurawei, Valiaska and Bivolvar.

## Anti-Semitic Leader, Unpunished, Is Transferred to New Post

Bucharest, July 28—Notwithstanding government assurances that those guilty of anti-Semitic acts would be punished, the state attorney of Beltz, M. Pakuraru, whom the investigating authorities had branded as being guilty of encouraging the disturbances in Beltz, was today transferred from his position at Beltz to a similar one at Deva where there is also a large Jewish population.

The investigating officials had established that Pakuraru had openly protected the leaders of the anti-Semitic outbreaks at Beltz and had even inspired their activities against the Jews. Simultaneously, the investigation showed, he oppressed innocent Jewish sufferers following the disturbances and tortured them.

The Bucharest press is asking why he was allowed to go unpunished and why he was transferred to Deva, since there are also large numbers of Jews in that community.

Semitic agitators as a means of stimulating anti-Semitic outbreaks.

These outbreaks, he feels, are dangerous not only for the safety of the Jews, but also for the entire country because they may "drive the peasantry to Communism". M. Caderu concluded the interview by saying that only foreign agricultural credits can save the Roumanian peasants from starvation and prevent outbreaks of dissatisfaction.

murdered Sholom Landau in the presence of hundred who were attending the Uriev bazaar and who has been arrested, told the investigating authorities today that he shot Landau because he hates the Jews.

"I shot at the Jews who were attending the bazaar while I was perfectly sober and conscious of what I was doing," the anti-Semitic leader said. "When I am released I shall join Professor Cuza in order to widen my anti-Semitic activities."

From Galatz, over long distance telephone, came details of the fire which occurred on Saturday. Many Jewish homes in the Cherish section of the city were destroyed by the fire, which started in the warehouses of the Jewish bankers, Marmorosh, Blank & Co., and was still unextinguished at the time of this report. Already the flames are said to have caused tremendous damage. Water to fight the fire is being procured directly from the Danube river.

## Hold 2 in Galatz Fire

Police today arrested and detained two suspects whom they are questioning regarding the origin of the fire.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency headquarters here are reminiscent of war headquarters, with telephonic reports from every part of the country coming in voicing the fears of the local Jewish population. From Fikan it is reported that the Jewish youth of the town have organized themselves into a Jewish self-defense league to combat expected anti-Semitic outbreaks. The Fikan Jewish community is also sending a delegation to the local commandant to urge him to afford the Jewish population military protection in the event that outbreaks occur.

In view of Jewish fears in that town the authorities have prohibited the scheduled march of the Czuzists which was planned for and proclaimed by anti-Semitic leaders. The chief of police, however, has asked the Jews to dissolve the newly formed Self-Defense League, arguing that this might be considered serious provocation.

## Uphold Dismissal of Jewish Teacher for Wedding Christian

Budapest, July 28—The dismissal of a Jewish woman teacher from the schools supported by the Jewish community of Miskolcz because she married a Christian has been upheld by the Hungarian government. A serious conflict had arisen between the Jewish authorities and the Miskolcz authorities over the dismissal of the teacher, the local authorities demanding her reinstatement.

When the matter came up in court the government recognized that the steps taken by the Jewish community officials were proper and upheld their decision in dismissing the teacher.

## Commend Plan for Bill to Bar State Exams on Religious Days

Assemblyman Albert D. Schanzer, who intends to introduce at the next session of the State Legislature a bill prohibiting any state, municipal or departmental examinations on any holy day of any religion having a following of devotees numbering one million or more, has been commended for this move by the Hebrew Religious Protective Association of Greater New York. Assemblyman Schanzer emphasized the fact that the bill is intended to benefit all representative religious groups in the State.

The resolution commending Mr. Schanzer was adopted by the Board of Directors of the Hebrew Religious Protective Association at its recent meeting. The Hebrew Religious Protective Association is said to represent 500 Jewish organizations, congregations, societies and lodges in Greater New York, with a combined membership of 150,000.

## Rabbi Levy Denies He Favors Inter-marriage

Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin,

My attention has been called to a brief paragraph in a late issue of the Bulletin with a head-line indicating that I favor intermarriage. As a matter of fact, there was nothing to that effect in your quotation of my position on this question. Far from being in favor of it, I am distinctly opposed to it, upon many grounds.

But—I do face the situation which confronts us, directly and without quibbling. I have not noticed that the orthodox practice of mourning the delinquent has stopped this tendency. All that it has done has been to cut off all possibility of retaining the family in the ranks of Israel.

The other method of enforced conversion is widely condemned on the ground of tending towards hypocrisy, which is opposed to Jewish ideals.

Our chief concern, in cases of mature determination upon intermarriage is to secure, as far as possible, the allegiance of the new family to the teachings and ethical principles of Judaism. This is done, in a direct, sensible way by insistence upon the children being reared in the Jewish faith. That is quite a different thing from being in favor of intermarriage.

Temple Emanu-El 27 years ago he was the fourth spiritual leader of this famous congregation. He continued as the active head until 1922 when he resigned to devote himself to communal and literary endeavors. The congregation then elected him rabbi-emeritus for life.

When the old Temple Emanu-El gave way to a skyscraper Rabbi Silverman felt a personal loss for in this famous house of worship he had confirmed, married and buried a generation of New York's leading Jews. Every member of the congregation was known to him by name.

### Espoused Zionist Cause

One of the most prominent rabbis in America, Rabbi Silverman was also known as a writer, speaker, social worker and scholar. Although a reform rabbi he did not hesitate to be an outspoken advocate of Zionism. At a time when most of the reform rabbis in America were holding aloof from Zionism he had the vision to espouse it.

Two years ago he was the guest of honor at a distinguished gathering of reform and orthodox rabbis, members of his congregation, Christian ministers and many prominent Jews of New York who came to Temple Emanu-El to do him honor on the occasion of his 40th anniversary in the rabbinate. Rabbi Silverman had been president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, and honorary president of the Association of Reform Rabbis and of the New York Board of Jewish Ministers.

An impressive figure in the pulpit his eloquence made his addresses real gems. Known for his courage he scathingly attacked political corruption, opposed woman suffrage and fought against anarchism and Bolshevism. He was the author of several works on reform Judaism, textbooks and newspaper articles as well as a consulting editor of the Jewish Encyclopedia.

### Says Descendants of Tribe of Benjamin Found in Palestine

Vienna, July 14—A settlement of the tribe of Benjamin exists in Palestine in the village of Ain-Arik and six other villages in the vicinity of Ramallah, says a report from its Palestine correspondent in the "Vienna Neue Freie Presse." All the inhabitants belong to the Greek Orthodox Church and claim to have lived in the district since the time of Nebuchadnezzar. They have retained many ancient traditions and trace the name Ain-Arik to its connection with Hushai the Archite, the friend of David, who helped him when he fled before his son, Absalom.

King Saul belonged to the tribe of Benjamin. On the secession of the northern tribes, Benjamin remained loyal to the House of David and therefore assumed the destinies of Judea at the time of the Restoration.

## Convention of Shomre Shabbos Opens in Berlin August 24

Berlin, July 28—A world convention of Jewish Sabbath observers, Shomre Shabbos, will take place here on August 24, 25 and 26. Delegations from the United States, Union of South Africa, England, Ireland, France, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Switzerland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Lithuania, Latvia, Poland, Roumania, Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Palestine, and numerous German delegates will attend. A large number of business men and members of economic and industrial circles, as well as rabbis and great scholars, will be among those who will attend the congress.

The Gerrer Rebbe, one of the most famous and best known leaders of the present-day Chassidic movement, in an interview which he granted recently while passing through Berlin, when informed of the aims and actions of the Shomre Shabbos World League expressed his heartiest sympathy with the purpose of the Shomre Shabbos movement. He proposed to found local groups in all the larger and smaller cities of Poland which should cooperate with the World Sabbath Observance League.

Thanks to the initiative of Rabbi A. S. Katz, a branch group of the World Sabbath Observance League has recently been founded in Raseiniai, Lithuania, under the name of "Mashire Shabbos." This branch, which has a large membership, will fight legal restrictions in Lithuania which seek to prevent Jews from observing Saturday as their day of rest.

Friends of the Shomre Shabbos movement have also been active in preparing the foundation of a group in Leipzig.

## Two American Jews Honored by French Government

Two American Jews, Colonel Michael Friedsam, president of the Fifth Avenue Association and of B. Altman and Company of New York, and Walter C. Korn, a director of Montefiore Hospital, the Bronx, were honored this week by the French government. Colonel Friedsam received the silver Medal of Honor of the French Ministry of Commerce in recognition of the assistance given by him in New York to the "exposition de la Rue St. Honore." The presentation was made at a luncheon in Paris presided over by the head of the Federation of Committees of Streets of Paris, at which Col. Friedsam was the guest of honor.

Dr. Korn was decorated for the fourth time by the French Academy for his work for physical education in France. Maxime Mongendre, Consul General of France in New York, presented him with the purple ribbon and citation of an officer in the Academy.
