Says Roumanian Jewish Plight Will Be Serious Until Economic Conditions Alter

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 28-The Jewish situation in Roumania will remain serious so long as the general economic situation of the country is depressed, said Victor Caderu, head of the Seguranza, the Roumanian secret police, in an interview today with the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. M. Caderu, who has just returned from an intensive investigation of the Bukowina area where the recent anti-Semitic disturbances occurred, is considered the right hand man of King Carol.

He frankly admitted that the Jewish situation in Bukowina was "very alarming". He added, however, that while on his tour of investigation, which was made at the request of the Recommend Gold Medal King, that he had issued orders designed to prevent any repetition of the anti-Jewish disturbances. These orders, included, he said, instructions to arrest any person conducting anti-Semitic propaganda and to refuse to permit strangers to reside in places in Bukowina where anti-Jewish feeling is tense, thus avoiding any invasion of agitators. M. Caderu also said that he had ordered that no meetings should be held unless special permission sanctioning such gatherings was obtained from the local authorities,

The peasantry throughout country is now in frightful misery, the chief of the secret police stated, be-cause Roumania's exports of corn, timber and other products have been greatly reduced owing to Roumania's inability to compete with Soviet Russia's prices for the same products. The peasants are in a state of great dissatisfaction and this unrest is being utilized, M. Caderu explained, by anti-(Continued on Page 3)

Seek Pardon for Urphali as Privy Council Declines to Hear Death Sentence Appeal (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, July 28-In view of the refusal of the Privy Council, the highest legal tribunal in the British Empire, to hear the appeal from the death sentence of Joseph Mizrachi Urphali, the only Jew under the death sentence in Palestine as a result of the events growing out of last Summer's riots, counsel for Urphali is preparing a petition to the High Commissioner for a pardon or at least a commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment. After being sentenced to death by

the lower court the Court of Appeal ordered a new trial for Urphali when it ruled out evidence presented by the prosecution. At his second trial he was again found guilty and resentenced. When the Arab prisoners found guilty of murder had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment no action was taken regarding Urphali because his appeal was pending before the Privy Council.

Dr. Silverman from Emanu-El Where He Served 34 Years

Funeral services for the Rev. Dr. Joseph Silverman, for 34 years rabbi of Temple Emanu-El and rabbi-emeritus since 1922, who died Saturday afternoon, will be held at ten o'clock this morning at Temple Emanu-El. He would have been 70 in August. The eulogy will be delivered by the Rev. Dr. Stephen S. Wise, rabbi of the Free Synagogue. Burial will be in the family plot at Salem Fields Cemetery, Long Island. All the trustees of Temple Emanu-El have been invited to serve as honorary pall-bearers.

Rabbi Silverman, the second prominent New York rabbi to pass away in recent weeks, Rabbi Maurice Harris having been the first, was the youngest man to be selected as rabbi of one of the country's most important congregations. He was 29 years old when he came to New York from Texas as assistant rabbi at Temple Emanu-El, then at Fifth Avenue and 43rd street. Rabbi Silverman was named rabbi of the congregation in 1903 at the age of

Rabbi Silverman was born in Cincinnati where he obtained his rabbinical and secular education. In 1884, the year of his ordination, he became rabbi of Temple Emanu-El in Dallas. After one year of work in Texas he had established a circuit to bring the Jews of the state into closer touch with each other. Later he was called to Temple for their part in the riots of last Israel in Galveston where he remained

until he came to New York in 1888. The Jewry of New York found in Rabbi Silverman a tireless worker. He became one of the outstanding leaders in the organization of charitable needed then to take care of the wave of Jewish immigration that completely changed the complexion of the New York Jewish community in less than a generation. Dead Sea Concessionaires Get Right to Build Railroad from Dead Sea to Gulf of Akaba

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, July 28-The right to build a railroad from the Dead Sea to the Gulf of Akaba, which is an arm of a few years ago obtained the concession to exploit the minerals of the Dead Sea. The railroad when built will give the company direct access to the Asiatic and Australian markets, avoiding the high tariffs which must be paid for the use of the Suez Canal.

According to an agreement signed by ment before the former was forced to abdicate, the town of Akaba on the Gulf and a strip of land which leads later ratified in a treaty signed by Sir Gilbert Clayton, on behalf of Great Britain, and the Wahabite King, Ibn Saud, who expelled Hussein from Arabia.

The company, which is exploiting the Dead Sea minerals, does not plan to build the railroad in the near future. In the meantime it is transporting in trucks the first shipment of chemicals which have been obtained from the Dead Sea to Haifa or Jaffa. For the near future the company is planning to build a spur line to Jerusalem or Beisan for the purpose of facilitating the transportation of the chemicals from the Dead Sea to the main railroad line.

Roumania to Pay Damages to Pogrom Sufferers in Vama, Suceava and Borscha (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 28-The Roumanian government will pay damages to the victims of the anti-Semitic disturb ances in Borscha, Vama and Suceava into these disturbances have been completed, the correspondent of the lewish Telegraphic Agency was assured today by Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, minister of the interior, following a three hour interview.

After pointing out that the Jewish sufferers from anti-Semitism will get government assistance as they did at Klausenberg in the past, Dr. Vavda Voevod pointed out that anti-Semitism in Roumania usually increases and grows whenever the country suffers from an economic depression as it is now. Under these circumstances the minister of the interior feels that the Jews abroad should aid in obtaining credits for Roumania because this indirectly aids in the safety of the Jews in Roumania.

Giving definite assurances that stricter measures will be used in the future to guarantee the safety of the Jewish population, Dr. Vayda Voevod, who has been granted what amounts to almost dictatorial powers by the Cabinet in dealing with anti-Semitic disturbances, said that the government is determined to suppress and punish with the greatest severity every movement that disturbs the internal peace of the country and of course the anti-Semitic movement which creates danger for the safety of the Jews.

Emphasizing that the present anti-Semitic outbreaks are stimulated by the Liberal Party which he charges is seeking to discredit the present government in order to regain its lost political power, Dr. Vayda Voevod de-clared that "the Roumanian people are not anti-Semitic. They are very friendly towards their Jewish neighbors. Excesses, however, occurred after the election of Professor Cuza to

Cuza's election, Dr. Vayda Voevod believes, was efficiently supported by the Liberal Party. He said that he has now undertaken energetic means to prevent a repetition of the outbreaks. He pointed out that he has issued orders to arrest every one guilty of anti-Semitic propaganda, adding that the military would be used wherever

Damage to Jewish Property: Many Jewish Families Homeless (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, July 28-The entire commercial quarter of Saskut in Moldavia. consisting of many Jewish houses and stores was destroyed by fire last night. The Roumanian Academy of Science, valued at \$1,000,000, which was donated by the lewish banker, Jacques Elias, was badly damaged. Families, homeless because of the fire, have found temporary shelter in the Saskut sugar plant. The fire has not yet been completely extinguished. The damage is estimated at more than \$50,000.

The correspondent of the lewish Telegraphic Agency was today assured that the origin of the fire was in no way connected with the anti-Semitic sentiments of the population and was merely an unfortunate occurrence.

Telephone reports received by the Iewish Telegraphic Agency here indicate that in dozens of towns in Old Roumania fires have also broken out. Many Jewish houses have been de-stroved by fires attributed to the abnormally hot weather in Bakeu, Niamz, Bortchai, Gurawei, Valiaska and Bi-

Rabbi Levy Denies He Favors Intermarriage

Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin,

My attention has been called to a it brief paragraph in a late issue of the Bulletin with a head-line indicating that I favor intermarriage. As a matter of fact, there was nothing to that effect in your quotation of my position on this question. Far from being in favor of it, I am distinctly opposed to upon many grounds. But-I do face the situation which

confronts us, directly and without quibbling. I have not noticed that the orthodox practice of mourning the de-linquent has stopped this tendency. All that it has done has been to cut off all possibility of retaining the family in the ranks of Israel.

The other method of enforced conversion is widely condemned on the ground of tending towards hypocrisy,

which is opposed to Jewish ideals.

Our chief concern, in cases of mature determination upon intermarriage is to secure, as far as possible, the al-legiance of the new family to the teachings and ethical principles of Ju-daism. This is done, in a direct, sensible way by insistence upon the children being reared in the Jewish faith.

That is quite a different thing from being in favor of intermarriage. Sincerely yours,

An impressive figure in the pulpit his eloquence made his addresses real gems.
