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## 81% of Replaced Arab Tenants Still Carry on Cultivation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Aug. 5.—Eighty-one percent of 688 Arab tenants in the villages of the Emek, who had been replaced by Jewish colonists when the land changed hands, still carry on agricultural work in the Northern districts of Palestine, according to the results of an investigation made by the Palestine Land Development Company, and contained in the company's annual report which is published here today.

Thirteen percent of the former Arab cultivators in the Emek now earn their livelihoods as vendors of vegetables or milk, builders or camel drivers in the towns. Of forty-one of the quondam Arab cultivators no details are available and thirty-seven have died since being replaced on the land.

These figures indicate that when the Palestine Land Development Company purchases land it is not neglecting to look after the tenants and is conducting this work with an unusual sense of responsibility. At the annual meeting of the company today all of the former directors were reelected and Dr. Werner Senator, treasurer of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, was named the company's governor.

## Moslem Papers Charge Italy Seeks Mandate Over Syria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 5.—Italy is trying to influence Christian public opinion in Syria and Lebanon with a view to having the mandate over Syria transferred from France to Italy, the Moslem papers in Syria allege in reporting that M. Barlasina, the Papal Legate in Jerusalem, accompanied by six Italian priests, has toured Syria incognito.

The Patriarch of the Maronites, a Christian people in communion with the Catholic Church living in Lebanon, is manoeuvring for Italy, according to one pro-French Maronite leader who asserts that "a hidden hand is exploiting the Maronite clergy". The same leader charges that "an agent of the Vatican in Syria is assiduously working toward the same end".

In connection with the reported campaign to have the mandate over Syria transferred to Italy the Moslem papers in Syria recall that when the Vatican signed the Lateran treaty with the Italian State, the Papal agent ordered all the convents and monasteries in Syria to fly the Italian flag instead of the French emblem, causing a Franco-Italian incident which is still unsettled. The papers also point out that the Pope has frequently decorated many Lebanese and Syrians though the honor was not particularly merited.

## Time and Place of Zionist Congress to Be Settled at Council Meeting in Berlin

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Aug. 5.—The time and place of the forthcoming seventeenth world Zionist Congress will be settled at the Zionist General Council meeting which opens in Berlin August 24, it was announced today by the Zionist Executive in releasing the provisional agenda for the Congress.

The Congress will open with an address on the political situation by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization and of the Jewish Agency for Palestine. This will be followed by reports on Palestine by Dr. Arthur Ruppin, on the Jewish National Fund by M. M. Ussishkin and by Dr. Arthur Hantke on the Keren Hayesod. A member of the Palestine Zionist Executive will report on the budget and economic questions and other questions of the organization will also be discussed.

## 20 Arrested as Attack Mars Warsaw Reception to Jewish Motorcyclists from Tel Aviv

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Aug. 5.—Twenty Jews and Christians were arrested and a number were injured here yesterday after somebody threw a stone at the Jewish motorcyclists from Tel Aviv, Palestine, while the latter were parading through the Warsaw streets and receiving great ovations from the assembled mass.

Hundreds of autos and motorcycles had waited on the outskirts of the city of Warsaw for the arrival of the Tel Aviv cyclists, who were returning from the Antwerp Maccabiad. When the latter arrived they were formally greeted in the city tower by representatives of the Zionist central committee and various Jewish sport organizations accompanied by an orchestra. A parade then started through the streets of Warsaw.

The stone was thrown at the cyclists when the procession reached Kymarska Street. The cyclist who was hit by the stone then struck his attacker, who is believed to be a member of the Polish Anti-Semitic National Democratic party, and a free-for-all fight ensued. The police then arrived upon the scene and forbade the parade to continue to the Nalewki, the main street of the Warsaw Jewish quarter.

The Jewish motorcyclists of Tel Aviv before their arrival in Warsaw yesterday had toured many Polish cities and towns, receiving everywhere enthusiastic receptions. In the town of Blonzy they were officially greeted by the mayor.

## Government to Avoid Incidents During Trial of Anti-Semites

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Aug. 5.—The government authorities and the police are now taking measures to prevent a demonstration of anti-Semitic students in front of the court house when the trial of Zelea Codreanu, anti-Semitic leader, opens this week. While the date of the trial is being kept secret the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that it will take place Thursday.

Admission to the court room will be by special permits only in order to forestall any incidents by Codreanu's followers. Simultaneously with Codreanu's trial there will also start the proceedings against the seven anti-Semitic students accused of conspiring against the life of Dr. Constantin Angelescu, assistant minister of the interior, who was recently shot.

The official accusation charges them, including the would-be assassin of Dr. Angelescu, George Beza, with plotting not only against Dr. Angelescu but also against other ministers. It is expected that they will be sentenced to from six months to two and a half years in prison.

While the Bucharest papers today are demanding severe punishment for those participating in any disturbance likely to occur during the trials of Beza and Codreanu, the "Universul,"

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## Anti-Semitic Students to Seek Seats in Rumanian Parliament

Bucharest, Aug. 5.—On the basis of a resolution declaring that the sentiment in the country favors the Christian Students' League, which is now in convention, the League today decided to actively participate in the coming parliamentary election by placing its own tickets in the field in all districts and thus conduct a well-organized campaign to obtain power in parliament.

The convention also decided to publish a daily newspaper in Bucharest and to hold three regional conferences, one each in Bukovina, Bessarabia and Transylvania. Professor Alexander Cuza, chairman of the convention, today wired to King Carol complaining against the so-called suppression of the anti-Semitic movement. On behalf of the Christian Students' League, Professor Cuza demanded freedom to hold meetings.

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## Dr. Hexter Sails to Attend Agency Meeting in Berlin

Dr. Maurice Hexter, American member of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency and the American member of the triumvirate in charge of the Palestine Emergency Fund, for which \$2,000,000 was raised in this country, sailed yesterday for Europe on the S. S. Berengaria to attend the meeting of the council of the Jewish Agency which opens in Berlin August 29. Following this meeting he will return to Palestine.

While in this country Dr. Hexter rendered a report of the work of the Palestine Emergency Fund, the current situation in Palestine and the recent discussion of the political committee of the Jewish Agency recently held in London. His report was given at an informal joint meeting of the American members of the administrative committee and council of the Jewish Agency and of the administrative committee of the Zionist Organization of America.

## Sees Future of Palestine Orange Industry Assured

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 5.—The future of the orange-growing industry in Palestine is assured provided it is conducted along modern lines and the growers organize for mutual aid, is the opinion of Colonel Sawyer expressed in a letter to the "Hadar," the journal of the orange-growers.

While supporting the plan of Harry Viteles, manager of the Palestine Economic Corporation's cooperative bank, for growers' associations along local cooperative lines, Colonel Sawyer doubts whether profits in the future will be equal to those of the present but orange cultivation is more than worthwhile even with a smaller profit, he feels.

## Jewish Butchers Make More Graft Charges Against Officials

Further charges that supervisors of the New York City Department of Markets were extorting graft from Jewish butchers of Brooklyn and Queens were made yesterday, after Oscar Glassberg, a Jewish butcher of Brooklyn, had originally charged that market supervisors, whose names he is prepared to furnish before the mayor or his assistant, collected petty graft from him and other Jewish butchers.

Yesterday H. J. Reiter, a kosher butcher of Rockaway Avenue, Queens, declared that he was frightened by Queens politicians and others into withdrawing extortion charges against the Department of Markets supervisor after the latter had taken from Reiter \$50 in marked bills. Two days after he withdrew his extortion charges, said Reiter, his butcher shop was served with a summons.

Other Jewish butchers who have been named by Glassberg as victims of extortion by market supervisors have confirmed his statements. They have stated that many Jewish butchers in Brooklyn and Queens are contributing regularly to supervisors of the Department of Markets in order to avoid annoyance and unfavorable publicity which would destroy their trade.

## Masada, New Zionist Youth Group, to Be Launched in Fall

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cleveland, Aug. 5.—A new national Zionist youth organization called Masada will be launched here early this Fall. The aim of the movement is to enroll young men between the ages of 20 and 30 in the Zionist Organization of America. These young men as a group will participate in all of the activities of the Zionist districts and pay their dues to the Z.O.A. but will retain a corporate existence of their own and enact their own program of activities which is to be chiefly cultural.

A local chapter of Masada is already functioning in Cleveland. At the last convention of the Z.O.A. held in Cleveland a resolution recognizing the Masada as an integral part of the Z. O. A. and pledging support to it was adopted. The name Masada comes from a town of that name which was the last fortress in Palestine to yield to the battering rams of Rome.

The organizers of the new Zionist group point out that there is a need for such a movement because the existent Zionist groups do not meet the needs of those interested in the Masada. The Young Judeans are too young, the Avukah is confined to the academic youth, the Junior Hadassah is limited to young women and within the Zionist districts themselves there is too diversified a group to offer a congenial social atmosphere to young people, and to admit of a unified cultural program to fit the need, taste and background of the young people interested in the new movement.

## Say Passfield Offered Arabs Jewish Agency Equivalent or Restricted Legislative Body

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 5.—While rejecting the demand of the Arab delegation for a parliament, Lord Passfield, British colonial secretary, did offer the Arabs the equivalent of the Jewish Agency or a restricted legislative body, Auni Abdul Bey, reported to the last meeting of the Palestine Arab Executive, according to a full report of the proceedings of the meeting contained in the Syrian paper, "Alif Ba," supplementing the fragmentary items in the local Arabic press. The editor of the "Alif Ba" is a brother of the editor of the Arabic Nationalist paper, the "Falastin."

The British government refused the request for a democratic government in Palestine, Auni Bey told the Executive, according to the report in the "Alif Ba," because it feared it would cause conflicts. "We did not petition but vigorously demanded until Lord Passfield assured us of a fresh offer not to disappoint our hopes," Auni Bey declared.

Alfred Roch, the Christian member of the delegation that went to London, gave a different version of Lord Passfield's statement, namely that the institution that the British government was prepared to grant did not fall short of the Arab demands, the government believing that the Arabs did not really ask for much.

In the course of his report at the meeting, according to the "Alif Ba," Auni Bey, quoting Georges Clemenceau as saying, "Woe unto the nation electing silence," declared that the "hesi-

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## At Least One Jew to Be Named by Republicans in Brooklyn

The final slate of Republican nominees for county judge, district attorney and borough president in Brooklyn at the coming elections will include one Jew, one Catholic and one Protestant, it was decided at a meeting of the executive committee of the Brooklyn Republican organization. A special committee was named to select the candidates for the three offices.

Nine names, three of each faith, are being considered for the three offices. The three Jews under consideration, one of whom will certainly be nominated, are Nathan D. Shapiro, president of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities; Harry Fromberg, New York lawyer, and Harry G. Anderson, former assistant district attorney.

Mr. Shapiro, a member of the state legislature from 1915 to 1917, introduced the first kosher law. In 1919 he was a candidate for municipal court judge. Mr. Fromberg, the founder of the Young Israel movement and president of the Yeshiva of Flatbush, is a former special deputy attorney general and candidate for the state senate. Mr. Anderson, who was assistant district attorney of Kings County from 1912 to 1922, is president of the Brooklyn Y. M. H. A.

The official investigation into the anti-Semitic disturbances in Bereshit, which was concluded today, establishes that the local authorities were lenient and recommends their dismissal.

## March of Jewish Musician to Be Played at King's Coronation

Bucharest, Aug. 5.—A military march composed by Chaim Kopelman, a Jewish musician from Kishinev, in honor of the coronation ceremonies for King Carol this September has been accepted by the King. The King today notified Kopelman that he was touched by this attention of one of his subjects and would permit the march to be named the "March of King Carol II."

The King has submitted the new march to the ceremonial committee with the expressed desire that it be played during the coronation ceremonies.

## Roumanian Town to Name Streets for Herzl, Weizmann

Bucharest, Aug. 5.—The city of Vashkovitz, in the Bukovina district, today decided to name two of its streets after Theodor Herzl, founder of political Zionism, and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

## Professor Einstein to Make No More Long Journeys

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 5.—Professor Albert Einstein, world-famous Jewish physicist, will undertake no more journeys to America or to any other far-away country. This was the statement made here by Mrs. Einstein to Elias M. Grossman, American-Jewish artist, who has just completed a painting of Prof. Einstein. New York and America in general, said Mrs. Einstein, had so annoyed the Professor by their curiosity and their constant dogging of his footsteps, that he has decided to undertake no more journeys across the seas. Professor Einstein himself is said to have stated that he cannot understand why people should want to travel so much, giving as an example Rabindranath Tagore, the famous Hindu poet who visited Einstein recently and who does much traveling.

## Bucharest Papers Critical of Report That No Damages Will Be Paid to Jews of Borscha

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Aug. 5.—While the question of whether the Jews of Borscha will receive compensation from the government for the fire of anti-Semitic origin on July 4 which destroyed more than a thousand houses and did damage estimated at more than \$250,000 is arousing the greatest interest among Jews and anti-Semites this question was answered in the negative today in quarters close to the ministry of the interior.

The Bucharest papers report this negative reply with reservations saying that if it is true it means that the government is indirectly telling the anti-Semites to "make fires, gentlemen, because the treasury will not suffer anyhow". The papers demand that the government issue a clear cut and unequivocal communique regarding this question and recall the statement of the minister of the interior, Dr. Vayda Voevod, to the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that damages would be paid as soon as the investigation into the causes of the fire is completed.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency tried to verify the report that no damages would be paid to the Jews of Borscha who, as a result of the fire are in dire need and suffering from lack of food and clothing. The attempt to obtain confirmation of the report from Premier Maniu was unsuccessful as his secretary explained that the Premier was out of the city for several days.

As a result of Dr. Vayda Voevod's statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency's correspondent that the government was prepared to pay damages to the Jews of Borscha, Valer Moldavanu, ministerial director of Transylvania, submitted his resignation, saying that Dr. Vayda Voevod's promise compromises Moldavanu's findings as the chief investigator into the Borscha fire. M. Moldavanu says he is resigning because he considers Dr. Vayda Voevod's statement as a repudiation of the findings in Moldavanu's investigation.

In well-informed political circles here it is felt that if the Borscha Jews are not compensated by the government for their losses in the fire Premier Maniu should be held no less responsible than the minister of the interior for the Premier has enough influence to nullify Dr. Vayda Voevod's alleged tendency not to pay damages.

Complete peace and order now prevails and the government, working in full cooperation with the King has given assurances that no further anti-Semitic outbreaks will occur, Premier Maniu told the Klausenberg papers today. The Premier is visiting Klausenberg.

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congress, which will last several days, has delegates from every city in Roumania, and is being presided over by Professor Alexander Cuza, anti-Semitic leader and member of parliament.

The agenda of the congress includes a discussion of further anti-Jewish tactics and plans to influence the trial of Zelea Codreanu, anti-Semitic student leader whose trial for inciting to pogroms will begin this week. Similar regional conferences of the anti-Semitic students will be held throughout the country, the congress decided today.

While the anti-Semitic students were meeting here the police made a number of arrests in connection with the bomb that was thrown Sunday into the house of Menachem Rubinger, a Jew from Dorna. Among those who have been arrested is a driver who took Danila and Nicolai Totu, notorious anti-Semitic agitators, who were found in Dorna after the bomb-throwing but who later escaped, from Dorna to a neighboring town.

The information furnished by the driver gave little help to the police in their search for the escaped bomb-throwers. Instructions were telegraphed today to every police station in the country to be on the watch for Danila and Totu. The state's attorney from Kimpolung has arrived in Dorna to undertake an investigation.

## Takes Issue with London Attack on Reform Judaism

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Aug. 5.—An attack upon Reform Judaism which appeared in a recent issue of the "London Jewish Chronicle" is answered by Rabbi Victor Emanuel Reichert of Rockdale Avenue Temple in an editorial in the current issue of the "American Israelite." The "Jewish Chronicle" had attacked Reform Judaism on the occasion of the recent conference of the World Union for Progressive Judaism.

"It is curious to see how the 'Jewish Chronicle' dusts off the antiquated and rusty flintlocks for attack against Liberal Judaism," says Rabbi Reichert. "It accuses it of 'rejecting tradition as something to be avoided per se.' It argues that the principle of K'lal Yisrael, the historic conception of the unity of the House of Israel, is denied by Liberal Judaism. While grudgingly admitting that Liberal Jews have been singularly alert in endeavoring to cope with religious indifference within the ranks of Israel, the 'Jewish Chronicle' maintains that the reason for this may be found in their conception of Judaism which makes it a 'more congenial thing for them to diagnose the disease, even though the remedies they apply are at best merely calming palliatives, and at worst sheer empiricism, if not religious charlatanism.'"

Rabbi Reichert denies that Reform Judaism wishes to break completely with Jewish tradition, but declares that "it seeks to re-invest our tradition of ethical and spiritual living with pulsating ideals."

The "Alif Ba" also reports that Azat Darvazah urged the immediate convening of the eighth Palestine Arab Congress, since the seventh Congress elected the present executive which failed to secure a parliament. Darvazah is also reported to have proposed a policy of non-cooperation and civil disobedience similar to that in India.

The full report of the Arab Executive's meeting indicated that the officers of the Executive endeavored to pacify some of the extremists with the statement that when High Commissioner Chancellors returns he will bring with him a satisfactory solution to the Palestine problem. Bouslou Shehada opposed the suggested Arab political bureau in London and insisted on a political bureau for the Eastern countries instead, because he said Great Britain is more sensitive to dissatisfaction in the East than to complaints from European powers.

## League Gets Observations of Britain on Shaw Report Today

Geneva, Aug. 5.—The observations of the British government on the conclusions of the Mandates Commission regarding the Palestine Inquiry Commission's report will be submitted to the League of Nations August 6, the British government has informed the secretariat of the League, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

The observations of the British government together with the report of the Mandates Commission on Palestine, both of which will be considered by the Council of the League of Nations at its next session in September, will be published as soon as they are received.

## Dickstein to Seek Change in Examination of Emigrants

Warsaw, Aug. 5.—Samuel Dickstein of New York, a member of Congress, announced here today that he would use all efforts to obtain a change in the present system of examining emigrants at the American consulate. His announcement was the result of his being present at the examination of emigrants conducted at the American consulate here. Congress Dickstein said that the present form of examination antagonizes the emigrants.

## Professor Freud Wins High German Scientific Prize

Vienna, Aug. 5.—Professor Sigmund Freud, world-famous psychiatrist and scientist, was informed today that he had been awarded the Goethe Prize, the greatest scientific and literary distinction in Germany. The prize will be given Dr. Freud at ceremonies in Frankfurt at the end of this month.

## Samuel Grossman, Playwright, Social Worker, Commits Suicide

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Boston, Aug. 5.—Samuel (Schlomo) Grossman, Jewish playwright, theatrical manager and social worker of New York and Philadelphia, who had been staying here for the past two months with his father-in-law in the Dorchester section, committed suicide yesterday by jumping from the sixteenth floor of the Statler Hotel. Mr. Grossman had recently been suffering from insomnia, and it is believed that this, together with the fact that he had lately been unemployed, drove him to his deed.

Mr. Grossman was one of the most talented and most beloved young Jewish communal leaders in this country and his tragic fate is widely mourned in Jewish circles. Though born in this country, he had a perfect command of the Hebrew language and wrote many plays in that language for children of Hebrew schools. Altogether he wrote about seventy one-act plays, which were published by the New York Bureau of Jewish Education, and also arranged "Fifty Songs from the Bible". He was one of the organizers and first general manager of Maurice Schwartz's Yiddish Art Theatre from 1918 to 1922.

Subsequently he was entertainment director of the Brooklyn Jewish Center and director of the first Anglo-Jewish Playhouse in this country. He was co-author of the play "Samson and Delilah" which was produced by Arthur Hopkins, and adaptor of Gogol's "Inspector General", which was produced by Maurice Schwartz.

Mr. Grossman was born in 1893 in Allentown, Pa., the son of a rabbi. He was educated at the University of Pennsylvania, Columbia University and Jewish Theological Seminary.

## Aged Polish Jew Gets Medal from Polish Government

Warsaw, Aug. 5.—Meyer Zettel, a seventy-year old Jewish poultry dealer from Kielce, was today decorated with a silver service medal and granted a government concession and monopoly in the sale of certain commercial articles. The award was made for Zettel's rescue of three Polish legionnaires in 1914 during the retreat of the army and the Cossack march.

The three legionnaires whom he saved sixteen years ago now occupy prominent positions in the Polish army.

## Jewish Merchant Renamed to Milwaukee Police, Fire Board

Milwaukee, Aug. 5.—Joseph Stein, prominent Jewish merchant of this city and a member of Temple Emanuel B'nai B'rith, has been re-appointed by Mayor Daniel Hoan as a member of the Milwaukee Board of Police and Fire Commissioners. Mr. Stein, who has held this office since 1924, has been re-appointed for another term of five years.

## Zionist Delegation to Europe Discusses Political Issues on Eve of Departure

A discussion of the Zionist attitude to Great Britain and the possibility of convening an extraordinary World Zionist Congress this year will be the principal topics at the meeting tonight in the Pennsylvania Hotel at which the Zionists of New York and vicinity will bid Godspeed to the American Zionist delegates who are leaving for Berlin to attend the sessions of the Actions Committee which opens on August 24, and of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency on August 29.

The speakers at the meeting, Judge Julian W. Mack, Dr. Stephen S. Wise and Louis Lipsky, are also expected to give their views of the present political situation. In view of the large delegation from America which will be present at the Berlin sessions, it is believed that the views of American Zionists will exert an unusual influence.

A topic that has been the subject of discussion for many months in Zionist circles is the desirability of convening a Congress some time this year, in order to adopt extraordinary measures to cope with the situation that exists in Palestine and that has been made possible by the political attitude adopted by the Mandatory Power. Both the Actions Committee and the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency will discuss the problem.

The Godspeed meeting for the delegates will also be the first public occasion at which representatives of the new administration of the Zionist Organization of America will indicate their political program, both as regards the British Government and the World Zionist Organization.

The meeting, which will be presided over by Robert Szold, chairman of the Zionist Administration, will also bid Godspeed to Abraham Goldberg, Jacob Fishman, Dr. A. Coralnik, Morris Rothenberg, Judge William M. Lewis, and Elihu D. Stone, of Boston, all delegates to the Berlin meetings.

Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia, one of the co-chairmen of the Allied Jewish Campaign, and one of the two Zionist members of the American section of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, will also participate in the sessions of the meeting of the Jewish Agency Administrative Committee, which will take place in Berlin beginning August 29, it is learned. Judge Lewis, a member of the Administration of the Zionist Organization of America, will also give expression to American Zionist opinion.

## Deny Jews Being Enlisted in Transjordanian Frontier Force

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 5.—The recent report from Jerusalem that seventy Jews were being enlisted in the Palestine-Transjordanian frontier force is fictitious, a high government official today informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. At present there are no Jews included in this frontier force which operates chiefly in Transjordan.
