## Warn Officials Will Be Removed If Anti-Semitic Agitation Is Not Halted

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, August 6—A warning that unless all anti-Semitic agitation in Bukovina is rooted out the responsible officials will be removed was issued today by the ministry of the interior, according to the Roumanian News Agency, which reports that despite the stern measures taken by the government to suppress the anti-Semitic propaganda it is still flourishing in many cities in Bukovina.

Meanwhile more arrests have been made by the police in connection with the bomb that was thrown Saturday into the house of Menachem Rubinger, a Jew from Dorna. The two notorious anti-Semitic leaders, Carol Danila and Nicolai Totu, who escaped from Dorna following the bomb-outrage are still at large. A second telegram has been sent to all branches by the secret police instructing them to find Danila and Totu and turn them over to the authorities at Kimpolung who are investigating the bomb-throwing.

The probe into the bomb-throwing has established that it was a fortunate thing that the infernal machine failed to go off because it contained dynamite. A further search of the luggage that Danila abandoned in his flight from Dorna revealed a copy of the by-laws of his illegal terroristic organization and plans for attacks not only on the Jews but on a number of government officials.

Commenting on the attempt to kill Rubinger by the bomb the local paper says, "it is too bad that the student leaders are now beginning to use bombs. If certain high officials doubted until now that Danila, Totu and their followers are dangerous to the country their doubts will now be shaken".

## Jewish Agency Will Elect Special Commissions to Deal With Proposals in Reports

London, Aug. 6—Special commissions will be elected at the forthcoming session of the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine in order to consider the proposals contained in the reports to be submitted to the meeting by Felix M. Warburg, Dr. Chaim Weizmann and Dr. Arthur Ruppin.

The agenda for the meeting, which opens in Berlin August 29, which is made public today, states that Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the administrative committee, will open the meeting with the chairman's address. He will be followed by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish

## Leader of League of German Youth Denies Anti-Semitism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 6—M. Mahraun, leader of the League of German Youth, which is one of the constituent elements in the newly organized Constitutional Party, today declared that while his organization has no Jewish members it recognizes the equality before the law of German citizens of the Jewish faith and condemns anti-Semitism. He made a similar declaration on his own behalf.

"Defending the citizenship that has been levied against the League of German Youth because it does not accept Jews as members, M. Mahraun said that the German youth of Christian extraction are just as much entitled to have a society composed exclusively of their own race as are the Jewish youth. At the same time, he pointed out, the League of German Youth does not approve of "the anti-Germanism that exists in certain Jewish circles."

When the Constitutional Party was first organized and the League of German Youth joined it was feared that the more nationally inclined members of the League might give the party an anti-Semitic tone. At a recent meeting of the liquidated Democratic Party leading members of the Democrats discussed the possibility of affiliating with the new group. At this meeting Erich Koch-Weser, a prominent Democrat, gave assurances that the new party would not be anti-Semitic and also said that the League of German Youth was not anti-Semitic.

## Publish Indictment Act Against Zelea Codreanu

Bucharest, Aug. 6—The act of indictment against Zelea Codreanu, anti-Semitic leader awaiting trial for anti-Semitic agitation and propaganda, was made public today. It charges that he, as the head of the anti-Semitic youth organization, the Iron Guard, is responsible for all of the disturbances and for inciting the peasantry against the Jews and the government. He is also charged with violating article eleven of the criminal code which provides a prison sentence of from six months to five years for those found guilty of agitation that endangers public order.

## 8 Arab Students Suspended for Taking Part in Strike

Jerusalem, Aug. 6—Eight students in the government Arab College have been suspended from their classes for participating in the strike called by the Arab Executive on June 17, the day the three Arabs were executed for their part in the riots of last Summer.

## Brith Shalom Society Creates Study Seminar to Foster Arab-Jewish Good-Will

Jerusalem, Aug. 6—Following out the suggestions made in a recent letter by Harry Snell, Labor member of Parliament and of the Palestine Inquiry Commission, the Brith Shalom Society today decided to establish restricted seminars in a number of subjects with a view of establishing closer relationships between Jews and Arabs.

The seminars will offer study courses in Palestine politics, Jewish colonization and Arab cultivation, health and educational development among Jews and Arabs, self-governing institutions, bi-national government, a practical scheme for the improvement of Arab-Jewish relations and the history of the Arab national movement.

In a recently published letter Mr. Snell suggested the establishment of bi-national committees of Jews and Arabs in all towns and villages in Palestine where the two peoples live as a step toward mutual self respect and good will.

## German-Jewish Leader Denies Siegfried Wagner Was Hitlerite

Berlin, August 6—The reports in foreign newspapers characterizing the late Siegfried Wagner, son of the famous composer Richard Wagner, and manager of the Wagnerian festival plays at Bayreuth, as an anti-Semite and a member of the National Socialist party, are untrue, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed here today by Bruno Weil, vice-president of the Central Association of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, and a friend of the Wagner family.

While the Bayreuth festival plays came under the influence of the National Socialists in 1924, Siegfried Wagner, after lengthy negotiations, promised his friend, Mr. Weil, that he would eliminate all political attachments from the plays. Not only did he keep his promise, Mr. Weil recalled, but he often protested that the American press called him a Hitlerite while only the Bayreuth municipality was under the control of the anti-Semitic Hitlerites, the Wagner House welcoming all races and creeds.

In a last letter to Bruno Weil, Wagner complained that the "Jewish Chronicle" of London was attacking him as an anti-Semite. Mr. Weil today, however, expressed the hope that Siegfried Wagner's heirs will refrain from manifesting any religious prejudices.

## Trial of Police Charged With Anti-Semitic Attack Opens in September

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Yonges, N. Y., Aug. 6.—Development in charges of race prejudice being made by two New York Jews against members of the Westchester County Park Commission police, today found formal charges filed by the two men against two officers, alleging omission of duty. Dr. Philip A. Cohen, and James Cunningham, both of New York City, are plaintiffs in the charges filed in Special Sessions Court against Sergeant Orville Perry and Patrolman Charles Smith.

This and all the other charges and countercharges in the case, in which anti-Semitic remarks by police during an alleged assault have been outstanding, will be presented to a jury Sept. 4, it has just been decided. City Judge Charles W. Boote will preside.

The new charges against these police are the outgrowth of the arrest of Dr. Cohen and Cunningham by Patrolman Emmet Howell at Tibbetts Brook Park here July 13, for disorderly conduct, because the New Yorkers were smoking in the pool, against regulations. They claim Howell took them to a nearby shack and administered a beating to them while Sergeant Perry and Patrolman Smith stood idly by and failed to protect them. They add that the three officers used remarks derogatory to the Jewish race.

Accordingly the new charges have been filed, indicating the two officers were guilty of a misdemeanor in neglecting to interfere and stop the beating, as provided in Section 1857 of the Penal Law. Besides the charges against the two Jews, and the two policemen, there is also an assault charge against patrolman Howell.

## Mayor Acts in Graft Charges Made by Kosher Butchers Against Market Officials

Markets Supervisor John R. Shea was suspended on Tuesday by Commissioner of Markets Thomas F. Dwyer after charges of extorting money from kosher butchers in Brooklyn and Queens had been brought against him. Mr. Shea was arrested on July 13 and fifty dollars in bills, which police had marked when Julius Reiter, a Far Rockaway kosher butcher, complained that Shea was blackmailing him, were found in Shea's pocket. After being held in \$3,500 bail for trial, Shea was discharged on July 25 when Reiter withdrew his charge.

Similar charges of graft have been made during the week by other kosher butchers and grocers against officials of both the Department of Markets and the Bureau of Weights and Measures. These charges will be investigated by Commissioner of Accounts Higgins, who on Tuesday was directed to do so by Mayor Walker.

Department of Markets officials are accused of extorting thousands of dollars daily from kosher butchers, while officers in the Bureau of Weights and Measures are accused of organizing a racket for extortion from grocers and others who use weights. It is said that for a price the latter would permit retailers to use false weights to victimize consumers.

Oscar Glassberg, a Brooklyn kosher butcher who found no one at the City Hall when he called there on Monday to complain against four officials of the Department of Markets, charged that when he stopped paying tribute to the latter he was threatened, and that thereafter he was arrested on four occasions and discharged thrice in the magistrate's court, and on the fourth occasion, after conviction and sentence, was freed by the Appellate Court.

Commenting on the treatment accorded Mr. Glassberg at the City Hall, the New York "Evening Telegram" of Wednesday declared editorially:

"Mr. Glassberg deserved better treatment than was accorded him by city officials. He deserved it as a citizen. He deserved a hearing of his charges either before the Mayor or some one whom the Mayor might designate."

## Rachmann, Jewish Moving Picture Distributor, Dead

Berlin, Aug. 6.—Fritz S. Rachmann, German-Jewish film distributor who spent several years in America, is dead of heart disease at the age of 52. Mr. Rachmann, who was born and raised in Germany, went to New York in 1914, where for several years he staged wrestling tournaments and managed a German stock company. After the war he returned to Germany, where he became associated with the Ufa Film Company. In 1925 he became manager of the Ufa Palace, one of Berlin's leading moving picture theatres.

## New York Cloak and Suit Manufacturers Favor Return of Piece Work System

Employers in the cloak and suit industry in New York City are in favor of restoring the piece work system which was abolished eleven years ago. A formal demand to this effect was made this week by Samuel Klein, manager of the Industrial Council of Cloak and Skirt Manufacturers, in a hearing before Raymond V. Ungersoll, impartial chairman of the industry.

The International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, which represents the 40,000 employees in the trade, has declared itself as opposed to the restoration of the piece work system, on the ground that it would reopen sweatshops. Benjamin Schlesinger, president of the Union, denied that a majority of the workers are in favor of the piece work system, as the spokesman for the employers claimed.

The employers' organization has also charged that the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union has "ignored or evaded" fundamental conditions of the contract made in the settlement of the 1929 strike. Mr. Klein alleges that the Union has not carried on its organizing campaign, that it has violated its agreement by permitting dress manufacturers to work under the piece work system, that it has extended preferential treatment to independent manufacturers and that it has not enforced its laws against employing cutters. All of these charges are denied by Mr. Schlesinger, who declares that his union has made every effort to stabilize the cloak industry.

## Roumanian Envoy Plans to Meet Jewish Congress Delegation

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Bernard S. Deutsch and other leaders of the American Jewish Congress, including representatives of the United Roumanian Jews of America will meet with the Roumanian Minister to the United States, M. Carol A. Davila in New York on Wednesday, August 13.

The American Jewish Congress, which had arranged to send its delegation to Washington, was informed by the Roumanian Ministry that M. Davila, who is now away on a vacation, will come to New York for the purpose of meeting the delegation in connection with the present Jewish situation in Roumania.

## Simon Ascher Leaves \$8,500 to Two Jewish Charities

Simon Ascher, head of the knit goods house of Simon Ascher & Co., who died on July 28, left \$5,000 for the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Institutions and \$3,500 for the Shaarey Tefila Congregation on West Eighty-second Street, it was announced on Tuesday when his will was offered for probate. Altogether Mr. Ascher left an estate estimated at more than \$250,000, practically all of which goes to his immediate family.

## Waldman Says Anti-Jewish Outbreaks in Roumania Wouldn't Have Occurred If Government Had Suppressed Students' Organizations

Geneva, Aug. 6.—The press reports on the anti-Jewish disturbances in Roumania have not been exaggerated or distorted, declared Morris Waldman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee, in an interview here with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, on his arrival from Roumania where he made a first hand investigation into the Jewish situation.

Mr. Waldman said he was convinced that the anti-Jewish outbreaks "which seriously impair Roumania's prestige and credit, would not have occurred had it not been for the government's support of the students' organizations and the so-called patriotic congresses and the government's reluctance to suppress illegal anti-Semitic propaganda out of a mistaken emphasis upon liberty of the press and assembly."

Pointing out that the attacks on the Jews are unquestionably instigated by anti-Semitic agitators who found the peasantry, though normally friendly to their Jewish neighbors, fertile soil for their propaganda because of the agrarian depression, Mr. Waldman charged that the ministry of the interior, which controls the police, and the ministry of cults and education which controls the students, teachers and priests, were especially responsible.

Mr. Waldman stated that King Carol is greatly distressed by the recent events and that the government's latest measures which have restored order indicate that the government has finally realized that the numerous anti-Jewish manifestations during the past year, which it professed to regard as sporadic and trifling and harmless, were rapidly generating wide-spread anarchy.

He cited Borscha as a "tragic testimony of the danger of propaganda of hate among the normally kindly disposed peasantry who terrorized the entire Jewish population of Bukovina, Transylvania and Bessarabia for months". Despite the local government officials' first report that the Borscha fire was an accident, Mr. Waldman found overwhelming evidence proving that it was carefully planned incineration.

Though four weeks have elapsed since the fire, no relief has been afforded the Borscha Jews except \$2,500 originally granted by the government and a few hundred dollars raised by the Transylvanian Jewish emergency committee, Mr. Waldman

said, and this in the face of the fact that damage totalling \$300,000 resulted and trade and industry were suspended.

No steps have been taken to provide shelter for the homeless Jews or to rebuild the burnt area, Mr. Waldman charged. "Hundreds are virtually starving and many are living in cellars of the ruined houses under conditions begging description", he continued. "Unless steps are taken immediately I fear that pestilence will not only affect the Jewish as well as the Christian population of Borscha but it will spread elsewhere". The situation warrants the imperative action of the Roumanian government and the Red Cross, Mr. Waldman concluded.

## Tel Aviv and Labor Federation in Dispute Over Contracts for Construction of Abattoir

Tel Aviv, Aug. 6.—A rather acrimonious dispute has developed here between the municipality of Tel Aviv, the all-Jewish city, and the labor exchange of the General Federation of Jewish Labor. The disagreement resulted from the labor exchange's rejection of the municipality's distribution of contracts for the construction of the city's new abattoir.

The labor exchange claims that the bulk of the work has been awarded to private contractors. Both sides to the dispute have published statements, the municipality warning unauthorized laborers to leave the premises and the General Federation of Jewish Labor ordering a stoppage of work until the dispute is settled.

## Say Palestine Contemplating Imposition of Income Tax

Jerusalem, Aug. 6.—The Palestine government is contemplating an income tax, according to information conveyed to the Jewish National Council by its Revisionists members. They point out that such a tax would be a particular hardship on industrialists and professional people who are already bearing a heavy burden in indirect taxation.

The neighboring countries of Iraq and Egypt have been considering the imposition of an income tax but have thus far hesitated to carry it into effect.

## Jewish Member of Hungarian High Court Dies at 65

Budapest, Aug. 6.—Emil Kecskenmenti, a member of the Hungarian high court, died here yesterday at the age of 65. The Jewish community of Budapest is planning an imposing funeral for Kecskenmenti who was one of the most prominent Jews in Hungary.

## Each Hadassah Member Asked to Enroll One New Member in Zionist Organization

Declaring that only a tremendously increased number of Zionists can bring about an increase in the political strength of the Zionist program in Palestine, Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, issues an appeal for new members for the Zionist Organization of America in the leading editorial of the current issue of the Hadassah periodical, out today.

The article asks the Hadassah women to bring men to the Zionist cause. In its senior and junior divisions Hadassah has 50,000 members, who are also members of the Zionist Organization of America, comprising the majority of American Zionists. Hadassah requests each of its members to make herself responsible for one new member in the Zionist Organization.

"To strengthen the coalition regime of the Zionist Organization, to make Zionism here a telling force and an influence in Zionist affairs the world over, the Zionist Organization of America must have a vastly increased membership," the statement says. "No amount of ability, prestige and strategy in leadership can go far without a huge army of enrolled backers. There are 4,500,000 Jews in America, among whom for years have been carried on extensive and continuous propaganda for Zionism. It is inconceivable that there exist today Jews ignorant of the aims and ideals of Zionism and of the general aspect of life and Zionist accomplishments in Palestine. Without loss of time, the most thorough attempt must be made to plumb the sources of Jewish life in America in the interests of Zionism, to crystallize the latent enthusiasm of men who bear a measure of sympathy for Zionism and to arouse interest among those still indifferent."

## Hexter Tells of Industrial Progress in Palestine

Something of the industrial progress being made in Palestine was told by Dr. Maurice Hexter, American member of the Jewish Agency's Palestine executive, just before he sailed Tuesday night to attend a meeting of the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency in Berlin, August 29. The statement was issued through the Allied Jewish Campaign.

During the next four years the orange industry, Dr. Hexter pointed out, will be exporting 10,000,000 crates of oranges to foreign markets. This year, he stated, oranges were exported to England and Germany and in both of these countries high prices were obtained for the fruit.

He also stated that stockings made in factories located in Tel Aviv will soon be exported to South American countries. Before the end of this year, he said, the Rutenberg power plant near Tiberius will begin operations. Intensive work, he added, is now going on in connection with the Dead Sea development.

## Rabbi's Sermon Published in "Christian Century Pulpit"

Cincinnati, Ohio, Aug. 6.—Rabbi Victor Emanuel Reichert, associate rabbi of Rockdale Avenue Temple, is the author of "The God Who Hides His Face" in "The Christian Century Pulpit" for July. He is said to be the first rabbi to have a sermon published in this magazine.

## Socialist International Urges Britain to Facilitate Jewish Immigration, Colonization

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Brussels, Aug. 6.—The British government should create opportunities for Jewish immigration and colonization in Palestine for the purpose of establishing a Jewish National Home there, reads a resolution adopted last week by the Executive Committee of the Socialist International, which met here. The British government is asked to utilize the free land on both sides of the Jordan River for an intensive and widespread Jewish colonization.

The session which adopted the pro-Zionist resolution was presided over by Emile Vandervelde, Belgian Socialist leader and friend of Zionism. Among those who gave their approval to the resolution were Leon Blum, French-Jewish Socialist; Jean Longuet, grandson of Karl Marx; Pierre Renaudel; and M. Turati, Italian Socialist leader.

A detailed report of the present Palestine situation was rendered at the meeting by M. Yarbloom, Poale-Zion leader. The Executive of the Socialist International also discussed a statement presented to it by the Histadruth Ha'Ovdim, the Jewish Labor Federation of Palestine, as well as the majority report of the Shaw Commission and the minority report of Mr. Harry Snell, British Labor M. P.

The two parts of the Palestine Mandate, the one which speaks of the establishment of a Jewish National Home and the other which assures the non-Jewish groups in Palestine their civil and religious rights, do not contradict each other, declares the resolution adopted by the Socialist World Executive.

## Charles Schwed, Somerville Merchant, Dead at Eighty

Somerville, N. J., Aug. 6.—Charles Schwed, pioneer Jewish merchant of this city, died yesterday at the age of eighty. Mr. Schwed, who was born in Germany, came to America in 1866 and in 1871 established the firm of C. Schwed & Co. here, a dry goods establishment with branches in Plainfield and Elizabeth. At the time of his death he was vice-president of the Second National Bank of Somerville and a director of the Citizens Building and Loan Association. He also took an active part in politics as a Democrat, and was a member of the old Board of Commissioners and of the Board of Education of Somerville.

## Foretells Serious Trouble on Border of Palestine

London, August 6.—Serious trouble is now expected at any time on the border of Palestine, the "London Daily Mail" prophesies, saying that the trouble will be provoked by Ibn Saud, King of the Hedjaz, and Emir Abdullah of Transjordan.

## Outdoor Campaign of United Yeshivah Chest Successful

The outdoor campaign of the United Yeshivah Chest, a federation of 10 Jewish day schools, combined with elementary and high schools, with an enrollment of 5,000 children, proved successful, when the effort was launched last Sunday, Tisha B'Av.

A considerable amount was raised towards the \$500,000 needed to cover the combined deficit of the 10 yeshivahs. The total of the contributions, mainly in small denominations, included also more formidable subscriptions. According to William Weintraub, Chairman of the Executive Council of the United Yeshivah Chest, the results were extremely gratifying, and constituted an earnest of the great possibilities that lie ahead for the United Yeshivah Chest, when its campaign will unfold with full strength during the month of Elul, when over 500,000 men and women will visit the cemeteries.

One thousand big, iron chests were placed last Sunday on the grounds and in the vicinity of 20 Jewish cemeteries within the metropolitan area. One thousand volunteers supervised the collections and formed a Guard of Honor around the chests. Ignoring the fast, and the unbearable heat which prevailed, the volunteers, including many girls, remained at their posts from 9 A. M. until 7 P. M. Young Israel, the orthodox Jewish youth organization, furnished the bulk of the volunteers. Elderly men and women, as well as prominent business and professional men, who had enrolled in the United Yeshivah Chest Guard of Honor, took a leading part in the collections.

## Rutenberg's Return Delayed by His Ill-Health

Jerusalem, Aug. 6.—The Hebrew paper "Ha'Aretz" reports today that the return of Pinchas Rutenberg, head of the Rutenberg Power Company and Jewish Agency official, from Europe, where he has been conferring with Jewish leaders regarding the Palestine situation, has been delayed because of his ill-health. He will remain in a European health resort for some time.

## Distinguished Gathering at Funeral of Ludwig Haas

Berlin, Aug. 6.—A distinguished gathering of German political figures and persons high in Baden society were part of the great number that attended the funeral yesterday of Ludwig Haas at the Jewish cemetery in Carlsruhe. The sermon at the last rites for the late leader of the Democratic party and member of the Reichstag since 1912 was delivered by Rabbi Deitrich. Dr. Joseph Wirth, minister of the interior of Germany, and Dr. M. Schmidt, state president of Baden, declared that the death of Haas was a great loss to Germany.

## 11,526 Jewish Immigrants Came Here in Year Ending June, 1930

Washington, Aug. 6.—A total of 15,225 Jews were admitted to the United States during the fiscal year ending June, 1930, according to figures made public today by Harry E. Hull, commissioner general of immigration. Of this number 11,526 were immigrants and the others were non-immigrant aliens. In the fiscal year ending June 1929, 12,479 Jews were admitted.

During the fiscal year ending June 1930 a total of 2,210 Jewish aliens left this country, 299 being emigrants. This made an increase in the Jewish alien population of the United States of 13,015. The Jews admitted for the fiscal year closing June 1930 were four and a half percent of the total number of 241,700 admitted. In June 1930 726 Jews were admitted.

The figures of the bureau of immigration for the fiscal year ending June 1930 show a sharp drop in the number of Jews debarred from entering the country and a slight increase in the number of Jews deported. The number of Jews debarred for the year ending June 1930 was 275 as compared with 610 in the previous year. A total of 164 Jews were deported for the year ending June 1930 as compared with 153 in the year before.

## Mother of Rabbi Isaiah Levy Dies in London

Mrs. Jenny Levy, mother of Rabbi Isaiah Levy of the First Hungarian Congregation Ohav Zedek of New York, died on Monday in London, England, in her eightieth year, according to word received in New York this week. Mrs. Levy, who was the widow of Michael Levy, lived in London with another son.
