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Deny Poland Is Sending Jewish Delegation Here to Bolster Trade and Credit

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Aug. 8.—An unofficial denial was issued today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by the Polish foreign ministry concerning the report in the mid-day edition of the Warsaw Yiddish daily, "Haint," that the Polish government was sending a delegation of prominent Polish Jews to the United States in order to influence American Jews to support Poland's credit and trade.

The "Haint's" report said that the delegation was comprised of Deputy Herschel Farbstein, Dr. Joshua Thon, Adolph Trusker and M. Hausner. According to the story in the "Haint" the Polish government believes that American Jewish financiers are in a position to help Poland and it calculates that such a delegation will be able to interest American Jewish merchants in importing goods from Poland. The delegation is alleged to have been organized at the special request of the Polish embassy in Washington.

Inquiries by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency at the office of Deputy Farbstein and other Jewish leaders here brought the information that they were unaware of any such delegation.

Waldman Gives Memo to Envoy of Roumania in Berlin

Berlin, Aug. 8.—Morris Waldman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee, today conferred with Georg Tasca, Roumanian ambassador to Germany, and gave him a detailed description of the Jewish situation in Roumania with particular emphasis on the towns in which disturbances have taken place. The Roumanian envoy promised to forward to his government the memorandum that Mr. Waldman gave him.

Mr. Waldman has just arrived here from Geneva where he consulted with Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee, regarding the Jewish situation in Roumania where Mr. Waldman made a first hand examination of the towns and cities affected by the anti-Jewish outbreaks.

Sonnenfeld Explains Status of Agudath to Acting Commissioner

Jerusalem, Aug. 8.—Rabbi J. C. Sonnenfeld, heading a delegation of Agudists, called on the acting High Commissioner and told him that the Agudath Israel was united with the entire Jewish community on major questions such as the Walling Wall, although on religious grounds it had not entered the Jewish community organization.

Fourth World Conference of Revisionists Opens Today

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Aug. 8.—The fourth world conference of the Union of Zionist Revisionists, the opposition to the Weizmann regime in the World Zionist Organization, will open here Sunday with an address by Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Revisionists, on the crisis in Zionism and the aims of the Zionist movement. The conference will be in session until Thursday.

After the election of the praesidium and the committees, Meir Grossman, Revisionist leader from England, will address the conference on the reconstruction of Zionist policy.

The speakers for the second day of the conference are Dr. S. E. Soskin, Dr. Robert Lichtheim and O. Rabinowicz, who will speak on the land question in Palestine, the relations of the Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency. They will also submit the report of the Central Bureau of the Revisionist Party. A general debate will follow these addresses.

Further subjects to be discussed at the conference will be the social attitude and the labor policy of the Revisionist Union, the youth movement, the training of chalutzim (Zionist pioneers), immigration, and problems of organization and internal and external propaganda.

Mandates Body Observations to Be Published Next Week

Geneva, Aug. 8.—The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the observations of the British government to the remarks of the Mandates Commission were received this week by the secretariat of the League of Nations. The observations consist of a detailed reply. The report of the Mandates Commission as well as the observations of the British government will not be published before the end of next week.

Says Peoples' Party Leader Seeks Alliance with National Socialists

Berlin, Aug. 8.—The "Berliner Tageblatt" today vigorously attacks Dr. Ernst Scholz, leader of the Peoples' Party, of which the late Gustave Stresemann was the head, for his failure to reply to a question whether it is true that he plans to form a government jointly with the anti-Semitic National Socialists. The "Tageblatt" charges that Dr. Scholz's abrogation of negotiations with the former Democrats and for a fusion with the new Constitutional Party, is due to his desire to leave the country open to a government by the National Socialists.

Soviet to Confiscate All Unregistered Tombstones in Moscow Jewish Cemetery

Riga, Aug. 8.—A large part of the tombstones in the Moscow Jewish cemetery called Dragomilov, face destruction as a result of failure to have them registered between June 25 and July 25 as had been ordered by the Soviet government. Tombstones which were not registered during that month will be confiscated and the graves levelled.

Since only a brief announcement on the subject appeared in the Soviet press it is probable that a large part of the tombstones remain unregistered, particularly since many people who are interested in the tombstones have left Russia and are unaware of the order that endangers the tombstones of their dead.

The complete destruction of the tombstones is believed to be the aim of the Soviet government because it feels it can realize large sums of money from their sale. The Jewish community of Moscow has requested the authorities for a longer period in which to register the tombstones but the results of this plea are not yet known. It is feared that similar orders for confiscation will be extended to all parts of Russia.

Jerusalem Vaad Hair Opposes Plan for Jewish Autonomy

Jerusalem, Aug. 8.—The Jewish town council of Jerusalem today announced that it is opposed to the Hatshav association which has been organized here to take legal steps to separate the Jewish community in Jerusalem from the rest of the population and obtain autonomy for it as is now the case in Tel Aviv.

The Jewish town council calls the Hatshav movement irresponsible and says it undermines discipline. It demands that the leaders of the movement desist from further activity. In the meantime the founders of the Hatshav society, mostly lawyers, announce that they have enrolled one thousand members.

First Jew Returns to His Home in Hebron

Jerusalem, Aug. 8.—The first Jew to return to Hebron to live since the massacre there last August will go back on Sunday. This Jew is Dr. Daniel Elkana who is returning at the request of his former neighbors who guarantee his safety. Dr. Elkana's landlord, who saved Elkana and his family during the massacre and with whom he lived during the riots, is among the petitioners asking the return of the physician.

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Executive Council May Yet**Grant Full Pardon to Urphali**

Jerusalem, Aug. 8.—The decision of the Executive Council of Palestine to commute the death sentence of Joseph Mizrahi Urphali, the only Jew hitherto still under the death sentence as the result of the events growing out of last Summer's riots, to ten years in prison instead of granting a full pardon for which Urphali's counsel petitioned, is understood to be due to the absence of the chief justice and the other British judges.

Despite their absence, however, the reprieve was issued because of the government's anxiety to assure the Jewish public that the death sentence would not be carried out, something for which Arab public opinion clamored. Apparently satisfied that the dismissal of Urphali's appeal by the Privy Council was due only to technical reasons the government took into consideration the recommendation for mercy that was attached to the judges' decision in sentencing Urphali. This recommendation for mercy not only weighed in the decision granting the reprieve but may yet lead to a further reconsideration.

Just a few hours before the announcement of Urphali's reprieve was issued, the English edition of the Hebrew daily, "Davar," devoted its entire issue to a full documented history of the case and proposed the appointment of "a capable person in whom complete confidence can be reposed with a view to instituting a thorough investigation concerning the preparation of the case."

This suggestion followed a plea that Urphali was innocent and a suggestion that the case against him was framed. To substantiate this charge the paper pointed out that at both trials the judges had found Urphali guilty despite flagrant inconsistencies and contradictions in the testimony of the Arab witnesses for the prosecution.

St. Louis Jewess Leaves \$107,000 for Orthodox Jewish Hospital

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 7.—Mrs. Paul Epstein, who died a few days ago at the Jewish Hospital, willed the sum of \$107,000 for the establishment of a memorial wing to be added to an "Orthodox Jewish Hospital or Orphans' Home," according to the will probated today.

Mrs. Epstein left an estate of approximately \$108,000. She designated that the addition be named the "Burenstein Memorial Wing," in memory of her first husband who died in 1919. Prior to her second marriage, Mrs. Epstein entered into a pre-nuptial agreement with her second husband with an understanding that the money left to her by her first husband should be used exclusively for the purpose of building a wing of the Jewish Hospital or Orphan Home.

The trustees of the estate include Rabbi Abraham E. Halperin, Hyman Cohen and Dr. M. Golland. No preference was expressed as to what institution should benefit by the bequest. Dr. M. Golland, one of the trustees, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent that it was the intention of Mrs. Epstein, as well as of her first husband, that the Jewish Hospital should receive the fund. The difficulty arises over the fact that the Jewish Hospital here has a kosher kitchen, which means that there is no room for a special orthodox Jewish hospital, as there are ample facilities in the local Jewish hospital to provide for those that need medical aid. Dr. Golland said that when the trustees return from their vacation they will make disposition of the funds in accordance with the intention of Mrs. Epstein. In the opinion of Dr. Golland, the money left should go to endow the kosher kitchen of the Jewish Hospital, and thus carry out in part the intention of the bequest. He will make such a proposal to the other trustees at their first meeting.

Jewish Teachers in Holland**Greet Queen on 50th Year**

Rotterdam, Aug. 8.—Greetings to Queen Wilhelmina on the occasion of her fiftieth birthday were sent today by the conference of Jewish Religious Teachers of Holland which was held here. The question of finding means to increase the number of religious teachers and to enable them to study at the Jewish seminary in Amsterdam was the principal subject on the agenda.

Cincinnati Jewesses to Hear**Details of \$200,000 Drive**

Cincinnati, Aug. 8.—All Jewish women of Cincinnati will be invited to a rally at the Wise Center, September 25, to hear former Mayor Murray Seasonood explain the \$200,000 campaign for the Jewish Welfare Bureau which will start October 8. Mr. Seasonood is chairman of the campaign. Rabbi David Philipson has accepted the chairmanship of the advisory committee for the campaign.

Lipsky Characterizes Jewish Agency as Unrepresentative

The Jewish Agency, the body representing Zionists and non-Zionists for the upbuilding of Palestine, is an unequal partnership with the non-Zionist side unorganized and unrepresentative, as far as America is concerned, was the assertion made yesterday by Louis Lipsky, American Zionist leader, and president of the Judea Life Insurance Company, on his departure from America on the Majestic to attend the sessions of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency which will take place at Berlin on August 29.

In a statement made to the press, Mr. Lipsky, former president of the Zionist Organization of America, said:

"One of the most serious problems facing the Zionist movement today and one which will undoubtedly be given major consideration at the sessions in Berlin is the matter of the future of the Jewish Agency. Without in the slightest degree questioning the value of that movement, which arose in the Zionist Organization, for uniting Zionists and non-Zionists for the task of upbuilding Palestine as the Jewish National Home, it is of the utmost importance, especially here in the United States, that the Jewish Agency become not merely a partnership on the one side representing the organized forces of the Zionist movement and on the other side an unorganized and unrepresentative force of non-Zionists.

"For the good of the Agency, and for the future of Palestine, it is of the utmost importance that the Jewish Agency become an effective instrument for the organization of the Jews in this country. It cannot remain what it is at the present time—an inchoate form that does not move out to capture and conquer the Jewish masses, but merely represents a small group of Jews in this country who are not Zionists but who are personally devoted to the upbuilding of Palestine.

"When the Jewish Agency was organized at Zurich, Switzerland, in August, 1929, it was the understanding that the non-Zionists would seek to enlarge their forces, to become active exponents of the cause of Palestine, constantly securing new recruits for the work. Our hopes in this direction have met with disappointment. It is our expectation that at Berlin some measures will be taken to remedy this situation. The result of a strengthened, and more representative non-Zionist group will mean much for the concrete upbuilding of Palestine as the Jewish National Home."

B'nai B'rith of Prague**Plans Kraus Memorial**

Prague, Aug. 8.—The B'nai B'rith lodge of Prague has decided to establish a memorial to the late Adolph Kraus, international president of the B'nai B'rith. The memorial will take the form of a fund for the poor in his native town of Rokysmay and the placing of a memorial tablet on the house in which he was born.

Over \$1,000,000 Expended by Jewish Agency in Palestine in Six Months Ending May 1

Over a million, two hundred and fourteen thousand dollars was spent by the various departments of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency during the half year ending May 1 in the development of its economic and cultural program in that country, according to an announcement by the Allied Jewish Campaign yesterday.

The largest expenditure, L. P. 105,455 (\$527,275), was by the Colonization Department of the Agency and of this sum L. P. 36,514 went for individual settlements, L. P. 29,542 for large farmsteads and L. P. 27,258 for cooperative farms, according to a report from the Palestine Executive of the Agency.

The expenditures of the Education Department, from November last to the end of May, were L. P. 80,620 (\$403,100), of which L. P. 41,458 was for elementary Hebrew Schools: L. P. 5,934 for secondary schools and L. P. 4,820 for kindergartens. Toward this the Palestine Government paid L. P. 9,600 and the department received in fees from municipalities and colonies slightly over L. P. 13,130. The next largest item was L. P. 24,753 by the immigration department of the Jewish Agency.

Few Unemployed

The report of the Palestine Executive in addition to giving the following figures states that no more than from 300 to 350 Jews were without employment in Palestinian towns at the end of May, and the expectations were that they would be absorbed either in the extensive building operations going on in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, Jaffa and Haifa or in the orange orchards and vineyards. In Jerusalem over 1,300 men are presently employed in the building allied trades, due to the steady expansion of a new commercial center which has developed since last August when large numbers of Jewish traders forsook the Old Town where most of the property is owned by Arabs. In Tel Aviv 700 Jews are engaged in building operations and 500 in Haifa. Over 8,000 Jews are employed in the plantation colonies where there was not a single Jewish farm hand without employment up to the middle of May. The grape and almond harvest which began in June absorbed about 100 who were then out of work.

500 Jews Arrived Since Riots

The report of the Palestine Executive states that since the disturbances in August last year until the end of April, 500 Jewish immigrants arrived in the country. A total of 1,514 arrived during March, April and May of this year of whom 1,017 found employment in the plantations and 324 in the towns.

All of the Jewish colonies, with one exception, escaped the ravages of the recent locust invasion of Palestine, and only two suffered loss of animals due to foot and mouth disease which was rife in many Arab colonies. The mouse pest which came close on the heels of the locust plague was brought under control with the assistance of the Agricultural Experimental Station of the Jewish Agency.

Joseph Cuba Heads Southern Interstate Young Judeans (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Atlanta, Aug. 8.—Joseph Cuba, of this city, was elected president of the Southern Interstate Young Judean Association at the concluding session of the five-day annual convention.

Seven states and 16 principal cities with 175 delegates were represented at the gathering, including, in addition to Atlanta, visitors from Birmingham, New Orleans, Chattanooga, Jacksonville, Columbus, Savannah, Miami, Augusta, Rome, Montgomery, Waynesboro, Charleston, Mobile, Selma and Memphis.

Mr. Cuba succeeds Louis Geffen as head of the southern Young Judeans. Other officers named were Fannie Brener, New Orleans, first vice-president; Milton Blank, Atlanta, second vice-president; Rebecca Minkow, Birmingham, third vice-president; Mitzi Simich, Montgomery, corresponding secretary; Sarah Rothkoff, Savannah, recording secretary; Fruma Belle Winer, Chattanooga, convention secretary; Sidney Parks, Atlanta, treasurer; Edith Kohn, Savannah, chairman executive committee, and Abraham Eisenman, Savannah, editor.

Chattanooga was named as the next convention city. The principal discussion topics of the five-day gathering involved club projects and the technique of Jewish leadership with two educational sessions led by Edward M. Kahn, executive director of the Atlanta Jewish Educational Alliance.

Eduard Baneth, World-Famous Talmudist, Dies in Berlin (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 8.—Eduard Baneth, world-famous Talmudic scholar and professor of Talmudic studies in the Rabbinical Seminary of Berlin, is dead here at the age of 75. Professor Baneth was the author of a number of works on Talmudic lore.

Born in Hungary, he learned Bible and Talmud from his father. After attending various rabbinical seminaries he received his doctorate "summa cum laude" from the University of Berlin in 1881. He studied for the rabbinate under Dr. Israel Hildesheimer and for many years was spiritual leader of the old Jewish community of Krotoschin. In 1895 he became professor of Talmud in the Berlin "Lehranstalt für die Wissenschaft des Judentums," a position he occupied until his death.

Cincinnati Memorial Services Today for Palestine Riot Victims (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cincinnati, O., Aug. 8.—Memorial services in honor of those Jews who were killed in Palestine during the riots last August will be held Sunday, Aug. 10, at the Bureau of Jewish Education. Rabbi Yehudah Levenberg of New Haven, Conn., will speak in Yiddish. Ezra Shapiro, president of the Cleveland Zionist District, who recently returned from Palestine will give his impressions of the Jewish Homeland.

Graft Charges Seen as Plot Against Officials for War on Butchers Avoiding Kosher Law

The New York City Department of Public Markets was praised for its cooperation with Orthodox Jews in their efforts to regulate the sale of kosher and non-kosher meat, in a letter written this week by Benjamin Greenspan, a lawyer, to Mayor Walker. In his letter Mr. Greenspan expressed the opinion that the present graft charges against employees of the Markets Department might merely be an effort to intimidate the Department against carrying on a campaign against butchers who violate the kosher laws.

Commissioner of Accounts Higgins began on Thursday the investigation of an anonymous letter in which four supervisors of the Department of Public Markets were charged with taking graft from butchers for allowing them to violate the kosher meat regulations. Commissioner Higgins declared that he would question John R. Shea, a market supervisor, who is accused by H. J. Reiter, a kosher butcher, of attempting to extort \$100 from him. Shea was arrested a few weeks ago after \$50 in marked money was found in his possession. Mr. Reiter, who said he gave Shea the money, withdrew his complaint because he said that politicians had warned him against going through with the case.

A charge that a large east side meat market was paying off market supervisors by check each Wednesday, in order to be able to sell non-kosher meat for kosher, was investigated this week by Commissioner Higgins, who declared that after a thorough investigation of this complaint he found it had no basis in fact.

Jewish Newspaperman Heads Minnesota American Legion (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 8.—A. B. Kappelin, Jewish newspaperman of Duluth, was elected commander of the American Legion of Minnesota at the closing session of the legionnaires' convention here yesterday. He succeeds Earl Cliff of Ortonville.

Kappelin was elected after Oscar Youngdahl of Minneapolis withdrew from the race for office in his favor. The Duluth newspaperman in 1917 had quite a job getting into the army. He enlisted as a private no less than eight times because the first seven times he was rejected due to an eye defect.

But on the eighth attempt he was put into the ranks and finally rose to transport officer on the U. S. S. Northern and made eight round trips, moving soldiers to and from France. He was discharged with the rank of first lieutenant.

Nineteen years ago he began work with the "Duluth Herald" and still is a member of its editorial staff. He is credited with having originated the idea of the pilgrimage of gold star mothers to France, later approved by congress.

Racial Classification in Naturalization Forms Ended

Washington, Aug. 8.—Secretary of Labor Davis today directed the discontinuance of forms used by his department under the Naturalization laws since July 1, 1929, calling for classification of applicants in terms of race, and not simply as to nationality. This embraces applications for forms for first papers and for final papers as well as for registry of aliens, as to whom no contemporary record of admission exists.

The decision is based upon an opinion of the solicitor of the department of labor, sustaining the claims advanced in an elaborate memorandum filed by Max J. Kohler, Judge Horace Stern and Lewis L. Strauss on behalf of the American Jewish Committee last February, contending that these new forms make an authorized, illegal and confusing requirement likely to prove prejudicial to applicants against whose race officials passing on the case might have some prejudice.

The decision does not bear on racial classification under the Immigration law which is required by express statute and has practical benefit for the aliens in promoting prompt production of appropriate interpreters, segregating possible refugees from religious persecution and enabling immigrant aid societies to promptly identify their protégés.

The National Council of Jewish Women joined in the application of the American Jewish Committee that such naturalization forms be changed, as did also Senator Salus of Philadelphia.

Alabama Rabbi to Campaign for Reform in Australia

Selma, Ala., Aug. 8.—Rabbi Jerome Mark, of Selma, Alabama, has been selected by the Governing Body of the World Union for Progressive Judaism to engage in extension work in Melbourne, Australia.

Rabbi Mark is a graduate of the 1918 class of the Hebrew Union College, and has been in charge of the Mishkan Israel pulpit in Selma for four and a half years. He is a member of the Board of Managers of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension, of the Executive Board of the Alabama Tuberculosis Association, and many other city and state welfare bodies. At present is he president of the Dallas County Jewish Welfare Workers' Alliance.

The appointment is for a period of six months, during which time the rabbi is expected to survey the field in Melbourne, and to engage in the organization of a liberal Jewish movement there. Temple Mishkan Israel of Selma has granted Rabbi Mark a six months' leave of absence to facilitate his engaging in this experiment. The rabbi plans to sail from San Francisco on August 21, and arrangements are being made in Melbourne to conduct Reform Jewish New Year and Atonement services for the first time in the history of Australia.

20th Convention of New England Y. M.'s Opens in Boston Aug. 30

Boston, Aug. 8.—The twentieth annual convention of the Associated Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Associations of New England will be held in Cambridge, Aug. 30, 31 and Sept. 1. A special program in connection with the general tercentenary celebration of the founding of Massachusetts is being planned. This program, which is in charge of Abraham Ranen, will include the laying of a wreath at the soldiers' monument, patriotic orations by eminent speakers and concerts by military and naval bands.

The convention will open Saturday night, Aug. 30, with an informal dance, which will be followed Sunday morning by the opening session. On Sunday night the grand banquet, which the Governor and other notables are expected to attend, will be held in the Commander Hotel. On Monday, Labor Day, a business session will take place, followed by the tercentenary program. In the evening the New England "Y" convention will close with a ball.

Rabbi Abraham Bengis Named to Pulpit in Birmingham

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 8.—Rabbi Abraham Bengis, who during the past year has been spiritual leader of a Conservative congregation in Omaha, has been chosen rabbi of Temple Beth-El of this city. He will assume his duties here next month.

Dr. Bengis, who was born in Vilna, Poland, is the son of an orthodox rabbi. He came to America at the age of 12 and was educated at the City College of New York and the Jewish Theological Seminary. For six years he was rabbi in Fort Worth, Texas, and for two years he was the spiritual leader of a San Antonio congregation. He is a past president of the Texas Zionist Association and was editor of the Fort Worth "Jewish Monitor."

Harry Lurie to Head Bureau of Jewish Social Research

Chicago, Aug. 8.—Harry Lurie, superintendent of the Jewish Social Service Bureau of Chicago, resigned today to become director of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research in New York. He will succeed Samuel Goldsmith who is going to Chicago as director of the Chicago Jewish Charities.

Mr. Lurie, who will leave for New York in October or November, is a member of the faculty of the University of Chicago and a former member of the Illinois Public Welfare Board. He came here six years ago from Ann Arbor where he was on the faculty of the department of sociology at the University of Michigan.

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
