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Auni Abdul Hadi Dismissed as Counsel for Grand Mufti's Moslem Supreme Council

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 18—A crisis in the Palestine Arab Executive was precipitated today by the sudden dismissal of Auni Abdul Hadi, as counsel of the Moslem Supreme Council of which the Grand Mufti is the president. Auni's friends are remarking that this is his reward for his labors for the Arab cause before the Palestine Inquiry Commission, as a member of the Arab delegation to London and as counsel for the Moslems at the hearings of the Wailing Wall Commission.

While no cause has been given for the unexpected dismissal it is alleged that the Grand Mufti is jealous of the growing power and influence of Auni Abdul Hadi. Arab political leaders here now expect that Auni will join the opposition group that has been fighting the Grand Mufti.

The dismissal of Auni as counsel to the Moslem Supreme Council will not affect his position as secretary of the Arab Executive but it is expected that the conflict between the Arab Executive and the Moslem Supreme Council, long smoldering, will now break out.

Jerusalem, Aug. 18—While many of the Arab newspapers in Palestine are expressing opposition to the general strike that has been called by the Arab Executive for August 23 to commemorate the outbreak of last year's riots, "Jamal El Arabia," the organ of the Grand Mufti, is urging all Arabs to demonstrate by the strike their unity and desire for liberty and independence.

I. Klinov Quits Executive of Revisionists as Protest on Independent Unions Decision

Berlin, Aug. 18—Indications of dissatisfaction within the ranks of the Zionist Revisionists at the results of the recent world conference of Revisionists at Prague are seen in the resignation today of I. Klinov, German Revisionist leader, from membership in the executive of the Union of Zionist Revisionists. He resigned because of the Revisionists' conference's decision to establish independent labor unions in Palestine to compete with the General Federation of Jewish Labor.

The decision to establish independent unions was made despite the bitter opposition of Mr. Klinov, Mordecai Danzig, the only American delegate, and a number of others who bitterly opposed the plan which was suggested by B. Weinstein of Palestine and recommended in a memorandum of Revisionist workers.

Ashkenazic Beadle of Wailing Wall to Be Dismissed by Rabbis

Jerusalem, Aug. 18—The chief rabbinic and the special Jewish Wailing Wall committee have decided to dismiss the self-appointed Ashkenazic Wailing Wall beadle, Noah Gladstone. While no reason is given for the dismissal, Gladstone is claiming that all the apertures in use at the Wall that bear the seal of the district commissioner are his property and threatens not to permit the worshippers to use them if he is discharged.

With negotiations continuing between the rabbinate and Gladstone, Keith Roach, district commissioner, has ruled that the Jews will be unable to substitute a table and other apertures for those which the government has measured and stamped with its seal and which Gladstone claims as his property.

The Ashkenazic beadle who is faced with dismissal has been one of the central figures in the recent Palestine incidents over the Wailing Wall. It was he who set up the screen to separate men and women worshippers at the Wall during the Yom Kippur services of 1928, and it was the incident that resulted in Keith Roach's ordering the screen removed in the midst of the prayers that eventually led to the more serious incidents over the Wailing Wall.

Sees Canadian Immigration Ban as Not Affecting the Jews

Montreal, Aug. 18—Doubt that Jewish immigration to Canada will be affected by the decision last week of the Canadian government to bar all immigration from Europe except the kin of aliens resident in Canada and experienced farmers, is expressed in reliably informed Jewish circles. Jewish immigration is not likely to be affected because Jewish immigrants have not been dependent on transportation companies' permits for three years.

Permits for Jewish immigrants are obtained through official procedure and the Relations Act and are endorsed by a member of parliament. The government is aware that Jewish immigrants are well-maintained.

Says Blood and Gold Only Way to Arab Independence

Haifa, Aug. 18—Blood and gold alone will secure independence for the Arabs, writes the Haifa correspondent of the Arab daily paper, "Falastin," in expressing his opposition to the general strike called by the Arab Executive for August 23 to mark the first anniversary of the outbreak of last year's riots. He points out that in the past strikes have availed the Arabs nothing.

Jews Again Alarmed as Anti-Semitic Attacks Are Renewed, Agitation Continues

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Aug. 18—Renewed alarm over possible anti-Semitic disturbances is being felt by the Jewish population of Bukovina and especially Bessarabia as a result of new attacks on Jews and a revival of the anti-Semitic agitation inspired by the acquittal of Zela Codreanu, anti-Semitic student leader. In Kishinev, Galatz and other Roumanian cities Jews were attacked yesterday and today in the streets.

The anti-Semitic students are again going through the villages inciting the peasants against the Jews with little hindrance from the local authorities. In Bessarabia, Carol Danila and Nicolai Totu, anti-Semitic student leaders for whom the police have been searching for a fortnight, are freely making the rounds of the villages and spreading their anti-Semitic propaganda.

On the other hand there are a number of Jewish leaders here who feel that the situation is not dangerous and warrants no fear in view of the fact that a number of members of the Maniu cabinet who have been particularly active in working to check the anti-Semitic movement have now decided to take their long postponed vacations and have left Bucharest.

Hear Hindenburg Seeks United Right Wing Front with Fascists

Berlin, Aug. 18—The latest indication of the uncertainty in political circles as to how the various parties and leaders will line up in the forthcoming Reichstag election is seen in the reports in the newspapers opposed to the National Socialists and other Right Wing parties that President Hindenburg is seeking to unite all those groups able to establish a united Right front, including the National Socialists.

While the papers announce that he intends to confer with Adolph Hitler, National Socialist leader, who is now in Bavaria, the Democratic press expects that President Hindenburg will deny the reports.

Czernowitz Authorities Arrest Two Anti-Semitic Agitators

Bucharest, Aug. 18—Nicolai Totu and M. Eremia, two notorious anti-Semitic agitators, have been arrested by the Czernowitz authorities on a train going from Dornavatra to Bistritza, according to a report in the daily "Dimineata." Eremia was on his way to address an anti-Semitic meeting in Bistritza. Both have been called to appear before the states attorney at Kimpolung. It is also reported that Carol Danila is on his way to Bucharest.

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Says Meeting of Davila and

Jewish Congress Harmonious

The impression conveyed in the report of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency's interview with Carol Davila, Roumanian minister to the United States, that M. Davila's conference with a delegation of the American Jewish Congress last Wednesday did not pass off smoothly and that Dr. Stephen S. Wise and a number of other members of the delegation left the conference before the official statement was issued, is not correct, according to a telegram received from Bernard G. Richards, executive director of the Congress.

Mr. Richard's telegram points out that "the discussion was frank and friendly throughout and marked by mutual respect for each others' opinions. When our delegation left we felt highly gratified by the earnest assurances and offer of service to improve conditions extended by the Minister."

The official reply by M. Davila was given orally to the delegation with all members present. Before the press statement was issued Dr. Wise and the delegation left. It was this that gave rise to the impression that some members of the delegation had left before the official reply was given.

In connection with the same matter the editor of the Jewish Daily Bulletin received from the acting consul-general of Roumania on behalf of M. Davila a letter pointing out that there was nothing at the conference that could be interpreted as "not running smoothly."

Leading Italian-Jewish Actress

Plans American Tour

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Rome (By Mail)—Mme. Emma Grammatica, Italian Jewish actress who is considered one of the outstanding exponents of her art in Italy, is planning to sail for New York, there to make arrangements for an American tour.

New Agreement Between Ort and Soviet Government to Industrialize Jewish Youth

The central executive of the Ort and the Soviet government have come to an agreement which aims at preparing skilled workers among the Jewish youth for the state and artisan industry. According to this agreement the Ort will assign 200,000 roubles until October 1, 1930. Of this sum 150,000 roubles will be spent for placing young Jews in factories and 50,000 roubles for organizing professional technical courses in the cooperatives, which the Ort is establishing with the aid of the People's Tool Campaign in America and with variolous other incomes.

The new agreement will widen the activities of the Ort. The Ort representatives will participate in the government commissions of the Comzet, that is preparing the plans for the placing of Jewish youth in the factories.

Until September, 1930, over 3,000 young Jews will be placed in various undertakings and professional technical courses in Central Russia. According to the suggestion of the Comzet the Ort sent a special instructor to Leningrad whose particular mission is to place about 600 young Jews in the factory-schools of Leningrad.

Jewish Consumptive Relief

Open Southern Office

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 18.—The Jewish Consumptive Relief Association, which operates the Los Angeles Sanatorium at Duarte, Calif., and the Ex-Patients' Tubercular Home at Los Angeles, will open a regional office at Memphis within the next few days. The office will have jurisdiction over eleven Southern States, passing on applications for entry throughout the district, as well as fund raising.

I. E. Bloch, who is in Memphis arranging for the opening, has had a colorful career in many phases of Jewish service. He was a Warrant, 1st Class, in the 38th Battalion, Jewish Legion, which saw active service in the Palestine campaign under Col. Patterson. After the war he served in the Treasury Department in the Palestine Government. In this country Mr. Bloch was the executive director of the United Palestine Appeal in Texas.

Criticizes Government for

Awarding Contract to Jews

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—The Palestine government is sharply criticized today by the Arab daily paper, "Falastin," for awarding the contract for the construction of the railway shops at Haifa to the Jewish construction company from Jerusalem, Guth & Gurewirth. The Arab paper says that the bid of \$290,000 made by Guth & Gurewirth was higher than that of an Arab contractor, but that the government favored the Jews "who lost out on another contract." The paper also claims that the government wants to have Jews employed on the construction of the railway shops.

Discuss Needs of Modern Jewish Education at Alliance's School Parley

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Syracuse, Aug. 18.—The needs of modern Jewish education and the unity of the Jewish school movement were stressed by speakers at the convention of the Yiddish schools of the Jewish National Workers' Alliance and the Poale Zion which is meeting here. Delegates are in attendance from all parts of the United States and Canada. The keynote address was delivered by J. Entin who told of the last convention held in Syracuse twelve years ago. Other speakers were S. Shapiro of New York, Solomon Weisman of Montreal, Abraham Rhinewine of Toronto, Berl Locker of New York. They discussed the various problems of educational work.

H. Ehrenreich in his annual report on the school situation told the convention that the Alliance now has fifty schools, the best of which are in Canada and Philadelphia. Four thousand children obtain their education in these schools. The report expressed the readiness of the Alliance to cooperate with other Jewish school movements in certain types of work. Mr. Ehrenreich praised the magazine "Kinderwelt" published by the children of the Alliance's schools and announced that new publications, among them a text book by Solomon Weisman, are being considered.

2 Jewish Women Heirs

to \$10,000,000 Estate

Waterbury, Aug. 18.—Two Jewish women from Waterbury, Mrs. Helen C. Allman and Miss Jeanette Levi, sisters, have fallen heir to an estate of more than \$10,000,000, it became known today. They are bequeathed virtually the entire property of the late Albert Levi, millionaire jewelry and furniture store magnate, according to his will filed in Thompsonville, Conn. The parents of Mr. Levi are also remembered but no specific amount is named in the will.

Albert J. Levi was the chief owner of the 126 Jay jewelry stores and 26 Hadley furniture stores in various cities throughout the United States. He is said to have been the first man to introduce miniature golf on his estate at Enfield, Conn. The sisters of Mr. Levi are named as the principal beneficiaries under the terms of the trust which appointed Edwin M. Rosenthal of Detroit and Edmund I. Kaufman of Washington, D. C., as executors.

Providence Plans Jewish

Community Choral Group

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Providence, Aug. 18.—Plans are under way in Providence Jewish circles for a project that is tentatively, at least, called the Providence Jewish Chorus. The undertaking is being managed by Arthur Feinstein who some years ago conducted a Jewish Festival Chorus. The plan is to organize a group of about one hundred mixed voices.

Kosher Butchers Oppose Plan to Have Them Licensed

A sharp resolution against the plan of Thomas F. Dwyer, commissioner of markets, to license kosher butchers was unanimously adopted Sunday at a mass meeting in Clinton Hall. The meeting also appointed a committee of butchers to see Mayor Walker and Commissioner Dwyer to express opposition to the plan. The resolution points out that the plan of the market commissioner, if carried out, would give corrupt inspectors far more opportunities for graft than they now have, Mr. Dwyer having proposed his plan after charges by H. J. Reiter, a Queens kosher butcher, that John R. Shea, departmental supervisor, attempted to extort \$100 from him, which led to the suspension of the supervisor.

While those at the meeting were united in opposing the proposed licensing ordinance of Commissioner Dwyer, there was difference of opinion among the speakers concerning the best means of enforcing the existing State law concerning the sale of kosher meat. Meyer Machlis, counsel for Reiter, recommended a complete change in the method of regulating the sale of kosher meat. He opposed the licensing law as giving "the crooked supervisor a bigger whip over the butcher than the one he now has." William B. Jaffe, counsel for the Bronx Butchers' Association, also opposed the license ordinance for similar reasons. The interests of the 2,000,000 Jews of New York are most important in any settlement of the problem, he said.

William Greenwald, president of the Bronx Kosher Butchers' Association, who presided at the meeting, appointed the following committee to call on the Mayor: Hyman Horn, Joseph Rosen, Joseph Stier, Morris Kraut, Harry Greenberg, Louis Goldstein, R. Rabinowicz, Solomon Cohen, Alexander Shiller, Isidore Botkin, Usher Spitalnick, Daniel Shupach, Rubin Poizcakof, Joseph Weinzeiger, Max Schwartz, Nathan Grossman, Charles Levinson, Isidore Malmud, Samuel Jaffe and Isaac Hecht.

Excavators Find Objects Proving Bible Narratives

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—The discovery of objects authenticating the version of certain events as told by the Bible has been announced by the joint expedition of the Ixenia Seminary and the American School of Oriental Research which has been excavating at Tel Beit Mirsin, the site of the ancient Kiryat Sepher, thirteen miles from Hebron.

The excavations revealed objects showing the cultural development of Palestine during the two years preceding 586 B. C., the year in which Nebuchadnezzar razed Jerusalem. The era of the patriarch Abraham, the story of the exodus from Egypt and the conquest of Canaan are among the authenticated Bible narratives, according to M. Albright, leader of the expedition.

Britain's Reply to Mandates Body to Be Issued Thursday

London, Aug. 18.—It is learned here that the observations of the British government on the report of the Mandate Commission on Palestine are expected to be published Thursday. The observations are said to reproach the Mandates Commission for placing more confidence in certain points in the memorandum presented by the Jews than in the British government. The Mandates Commission is also said to be reproached for having given insufficient consideration to the report of the Palestine Inquiry Commission, with a large part of which the British government associated itself.

Col. Solomon, Anglo-Jewish Communal Worker, Dies at 44

London (By Mail).—Lieut.-Colonel Harold Josiah Solomon, O.B.E., M.C., died at the age of 44 at Valmont, Switzerland.

Col. Solomon was a prominent personage in Anglo-Jewry and took a keen interest in Palestine affairs, particularly in the industrial development of the country. Soon after the War he became the director for commerce and industry of the Palestine administration under Sir Herbert Samuel, a post which he held for a number of years. He was also a member of the Anglo-Jewish Association and only last year raised his voice there in vigorous protest against the disturbances which occurred in Palestine and against the policy pursued by the British administration in the execution of the Mandate.

The late Colonel Solomon was also the chairman of the Anglo-Palestine Club, of which the late Lord Balfour was the patron and of which James de Rothschild is the president. The club owes much of its success and its growth in the last years to Col. Solomon.

When the Palestine Potash, Ltd. was established to work the Dead Sea Salts Concession granted to Messrs. Tulloch and Novomejsky, Colonel Solomon became a director of the company, representing the Jewish Colonial Trust on the board. He was also a member of the Council of the Economic Board for Palestine and Governor of the Haifa Technical Institute.

Colonial Office Expert

Praises Jewish Cooperatives

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—Praising the excellent work of the Jewish cooperatives in Palestine which he said is filling his with admiration and astonishment, C. F. Strickland, Colonial Office expert on cooperatives, who is here to investigate the creation of Arab cooperatives, said in a lecture at the Y. M. C. A. that an agricultural bank for Palestine is not necessary as it would benefit the landlords and not the small cultivators whose hope lies in cooperation along the lines of the work being done by the Jews here and by others in India.

Rabbi Cohen, Dean of Montreal Rabbis, to Be Honored at 70

Montreal, Aug. 18.—On September 7 Montreal Jewry will honor its acknowledged religious leader and dean of local rabbis, the venerable Rabbi Hirsch Cohen, who is celebrating his seventieth birthday.

The aged Rabbi, who is also esteemed and respected outside of religious circles, has completed forty years' service as religious head of the local Jewish community. He is chairman of the Rabbinical council, chairman of the Board of Education of the United Talmud Torahs, chairman of the Canadian Mizrahi and active member of the Separate Jewish School Committee. His patriarchal face and flowing white beard also grace many Zionist functions. He has recently visited the Jewish homeland.

Rabbi Cohen was born in the village of Budowitz, Suwalk province (formerly Russian territory) being a descendant of a dynasty of pious and learned men. He received his education in the famous Yeshivoh of Voyozhin and Vilna, and came to Montreal in the year 1890.

The movement for separate Jewish schools found its strongest champion in the person of Rabbi H. Cohen who notwithstanding his advancing years has carried on a fiery and active campaign for a Jewish school system. He was a member of the delegation to the Provincial government in Quebec which voiced the demand that the Jews be given the right to control the education of their children.

For forty years Rabbi Cohen has helped to form and mould the Jewish community of Montreal.

Heads Synagogue Council's Wider-Scope Committee

Dr. Elias L. Solomon, chairman of the Synagogue Council of America, has designated Albert Wald to head a Committee for Widening the Scope of the Council's activities. The other members are Dr. Nathan Stern, Ben Altheimer, S. Herbert Golden and Louis Guttman.

The Council represents national religious Jewish organizations of all shades of doctrines and opinion and speaks for Reform, Conservatism and Orthodoxy. The Council acts unitedly but without interfering with the religious and administrative autonomy of its constituents.

Dr. Alexander Aisman, Urologist of Jewish Hospital, Dies

Dr. Alexander Aisman, one of the best known urologists in the United States, and associate urologist in the Jewish Hospital, Brooklyn, was buried yesterday at Mount Hebron Cemetery. Dr. Aisman died Saturday at his home at the age of 39. He had been ill for some time. A native of Russia, he came here as a child and received his professional training at Bellevue Medical College. For 18 years he had been a member of the medical staff of the Jewish Hospital.

Gustave Frohman, Eminent Theatrical Figure, Dead

Prominent figures in New York's theatrical world are expected to be present this morning at the funeral of Gustave Frohman, noted theatrical manager and brother of the late Charles Frohman and of Daniel Frohman, both of whom he started in the business. He died Saturday at the age of 76. Since 1916 he has been retired.

From advance man for a minstrel show at the age of 17 Frohman climbed to manager of the old Madison Square Theatre in the 1880's. A pioneer in the development of road shows he managed William Gillette and was one of the founders of the Sargent Dramatic School, now the American Academy of Dramatic Arts. He is said to have been the one who brought David Belasco to New York and was also instrumental in starting the theatrical career of Marc Klaw.

Before he joined with his brothers as a theatrical manager he presented shows of his own. In his youth he was an office boy to Horace Greeley and one of the first theatrical press agents.

Reproaches Arab Leaders for Hiding Jewish Land Buying

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—Enumerating the acreage of thirteen Jewish land purchases in the last year totalling one hundred thousands dunams in the Tulkatem district, including the 31,000 of the Wadi Hawareth tract, the Arab newspaper "El Carmel" reproaches the Arab leaders for concealing these figures while they "are busy entertaining so-called leaders".

3 Jews Among Winners of \$25,000 Symphonic Prize

There are three Jews among the four winners of the \$25,000 prize for the best symphonic work by an American which was offered by the Victor Phonograph Company, according to the announcement made public by Mr. Shoemaker, president of the company.

The prize was originally promised for one symphonic work, but the judges had difficulties in deciding which one was the best of the submitted manuscripts and deserved the prize. They therefore decided to divide it among the five best compositions, giving \$5,000 for each one.

The winners are Ernest Bloch, Louis Gruenberg, Aaron Copeland and Robert Russell Bennett, the latter having received \$10,000 for two of his submitted manuscripts.

Arab Students to Ban School If Expulsion of 8 Not Lifted

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—A conference of Arab students here today decided to call upon all Arab students in the government schools not to return to their classes for the new term until the expulsion of the eight Arab students from the government's Arab college for participating in the strike on the day the three Arab murderers were executed is rescinded.

Jewish Institutions Get \$875,000 from Hubert Estate as Surrogate Approves' Executors' Accounting

Four Jewish organizations are now in a position to collect \$875,000, their share of the \$6,000,000 estate of the late Conrad Hubert (nee Chaim Hurewitz), millionaire flashlight manufacturer, as a result of a court decree signed by Surrogate James A. Foley approving the accounting of the executors. The philanthropies to benefit by the Hubert estate were selected in accordance with his will by Julius Rosenwald, former president Calvin Coolidge and ex-governor Alfred E. Smith.

The Jewish charities selected by this famous trio and the amounts they will receive are the Jewish Mental Health Society, \$250,000 to be used toward the construction of a new hospital, the Jewish Theological Seminary, \$250,000, the Young Men's Hebrew Association, \$175,000 and Beth Israel Hospital, \$200,000, to be used for the completion of its new building.

Conrad Hubert was a native of Minsk, Russia. He died in Cannes, France, February 14, 1928. Under the terms of his will, one-quarter of his estate, about \$6,000,000, was left to religious, educational, charitable and benevolent institutions to be selected by "a committee of three prominent citizens, who shall investigate and determine the institutions to receive such gifts."

Waterbury Jews Commemorate Palestine Riots of 1920

Waterbury, Aug. 18.—The Jews of Waterbury yesterday held a mass meeting under the auspices of the Zionist district and associated Jewish organizations to mark the first anniversary of last year's Palestine riots. S. Lipetz, chairman of the Waterbury Zionists' district, presided. The speakers were Rabbi Moses D. Sheinkopf and Rabbi Judah H. Levenburg of New Haven.

Rabbi Sheinkopf declared, "Our martyrs have not died in vain but will re-inspire world Jewry with the zeal and determination to proceed with the task of rebuilding Palestine as the Jewish National Homeland."

Drummond Shiels Leaving for Palestine About September 20

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Aug. 18.—Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary for the colonies, will start his trip to Palestine about September 20, the Labor organ, the "Daily Herald," reports. It is expected that he will be away for more than a month. He is not going on any specific mission nor will he follow any carefully planned official route.

While he is not going on any definite mission he will go to Palestine after the sessions of the Council of the League of Nations are ended. It is understood that Dr. Shiels will attend the sessions accompanied by Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner for Palestine, the paper states.

Mordecai D. Frankel, Noted Chassidic Rabbi, Dead

Funeral services were held yesterday by the Mordecai David Frankel Association for the well known Chassidic rabbi, Mordecai David Frankel, known as the Premishlianer Rebbe, who died Sunday at Saratoga Springs after a long illness, at the age of 58. He is survived by a widow and a daughter here and a son and two daughters in Galicia. One of his sons was arrested some time ago for his refusal to shave his beard when called to the army.

Rabbi Frankel, who came to the United States three years ago, was the grandson of the rabbinical scholar, Rabbi Meer Premishlianer and a son of Joshua Heschel, a Chassidic rabbi.

Hear St. John Philby Embraces Islam Faith

Jerusalem, Aug. 18.—Reports from Jeddah in Transjordan reaching here say that St. John Philby, pro-Arab Englishman and former adviser to the Transjordanian government has been converted to Islam and has made a pilgrimage to Mecca where his Moslem friends gave him a reception.

Lay Cornerstone for First New Jewish Colony of This Year
