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## Soviet Abandons Bira Bidjan as Jewish Republic; Region to Be Independent Unit

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 19.—After many weeks of discussions and suggestions and reports the presidium of the Union Central Executive Committee of the Soviet Union today decided to separate Bira Bidjan, Far Eastern Republic, into a self-contained administrative unit including the previous districts of Michailosemionovski and Yekaterinikolski and parts of other districts which had been principally allotted for Jewish settlement in accordance with plans for a Jewish Republic at Bira Bidjan.

The Jews here are greatly disappointed at the failure to declare the new district Jewish, but the Moscow "Emes," Yiddish Communist paper, is already retreating from its program of a Jewish district, saying that for Jewish Communists national territorial unification is not an aim in itself, their chief desire being productivization of the Jewish masses.

Nevertheless there is still some hope in Jewish circles here that if the plan of the land commissariat to settle 50,000 Jews at Bira Bidjan in the next five years succeeds, which means the creation of a Jewish majority, the district will be declared Jewish.

The decision to make of Bira Bidjan a self-contained administrative unit resulted from the many reports emanating from Bidjan that the management, which had been entrusted to the Comzet and the Ozet, was not satisfactory, and from the recommendation of the land commissariat last week that Bira Bidjan be made an independent administrative and economic center with its own district executive committee supervising.

On a number of other occasions there have been indications that the Soviet government had abandoned its plan to establish a Jewish republic at Bira Bidjan.

## Gives \$50,000 for Suffering Jewish Settlers in Emek

Jerusalem, Aug. 19.—The Jewish Agency today assigned \$50,000 for the relief of the Jewish settlements in the Emek where the recent plague of field mice did considerable damage to the crops. The action of the Jewish Agency is prompted by the government's failure to do anything about it thus far. In the meantime the government has refused to exempt from freight charges the seed sent by the Jewish Agency to the Emek settlers. In this connection the Hebrew press recalls that during the drought in the southern part of the country two years ago the government gratuitously transported cattle of the bedouins to the north for pasturing.

## Danila's Arrest Completes Round Up of All Anti-Semitic Leaders

Bucharest, Aug. 19.—Carol Danila, notorious anti-Semitic agitator, for whom the police have been hunting for more than a fortnight, was arrested today in Klausenberg (Cluj) and turned over to the state's attorney. A police dragnet had been out for Danila since he escaped from Dorna after a bomb had been thrown into a Jewish house there.

The arrest of Danila completes the government's round-up of the leading anti-Semitic chieftains who are all in custody. Zelea Codreanu, although acquitted of a charge of inciting to riot and murder, is still in prison, the priests, Fathers Dumitrescu and Bereinde, are under arrest, and Nicolai Totu and M. Eremia were arrested yesterday.

As a result of all the anti-Semitic leaders now being under arrest the members of the Roumanian cabinet will now leave Bucharest for their vacations abroad, without fear of any anti-Semitic disturbances taking place in their absence.

## New German Party Names Bruno Weil as Reichstag Candidate

Berlin, Aug. 19.—The failure of the new German Constitutional Party to nominate any Jews on its slate for the Reichstag elections was remedied today with the nomination of Bruno Weil, vice-president of the Central Association of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, and a leader of the recently liquidated Democratic party, as a candidate for a Berlin district.

The candidacy of Georg Bernhard, editor of the "Vossische Zeitung," in Potsdam, has been definitely rejected. This has brought forth bitter comments in the Jewish press which is now questioning the assurances given by the new party's leaders that it will be friendly to the Jews.

## Jewish Population of Palestine Is Now 172,000, Agency Reports

Jerusalem, Aug. 19.—From September 1, 1929 to July 31, 1930, 5,671 Jews entered Palestine, including 4,663 who came in on immigration certificates, according to figures made public today by the Jewish Agency. The Jewish immigrants included 700 from Yemen and 458 Russians. The Jewish Agency's figures show that the Jewish population of Palestine is now 172,000, or twenty percent of the total.

## Austrian Premier Says Austrian Anti-Semitism Is Not Serious Enough to Warrant State Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Aug. 19.—Anti-Semitism in Austria has not assumed such forms that the government needs to take action against it, Johann Schoeber, Austrian chancellor, said today in an interview with Jacob Landau, managing director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

He said that "anti-Semitism at times finds noisy expression but the equal citizenship rights of the Jews nevertheless always remain unrestricted. Occasional Hakenkreutz disturbances and students' demonstrations do not deserve to have importance attached to them abroad."

Chancellor Schoeber recalled that anti-Semitic excesses in the universities were worse when he was a student thirty-six years ago. At that time, he said, the anti-Semitic movement was at its height. The Austrian premier spoke of the time when Karl Lueger, Christian Socialist leader, was elected mayor of Vienna for the first time in 1897. But even under Lueger, he said, the position of the Jews as equal citizens and their right to enjoy equal rights was not affected.

"Lueger adroitly exploited anti-Semitism to spread his own policies," Chancellor Schoeber declared. "It is symptomatic of the spirit that existed in

## Russian Newspaper Criticizes Vayda Voevod's Interview with J.T.A. on Anti-Semitism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Aug. 19.—Shameless and unparalleled insolence is the label given by the local newspaper, "Vechnernaya Moskva," in an article headed "Bloody Blackmail," in bringing to its readers the contents of the recent interview granted to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent by Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, Roumanian minister of the interior, in which he suggested that foreign Jews should aid Roumania's credit as a means of ending the anti-Semitic disturbances.

"To demand Jewish loans as payment for Jewish safety," says the paper, "is not nonsense as it was termed by the Roumanian Liberal press, but sheer bloody blackmail, surpassing in cynicism even the Czar's ministers. Notwithstanding the ironical and 'sharp criticism' in the Liberal press Vayda Voevod retains his post. Isn't it the best proof that the government agrees with his pogrom politics?" asks the "Vechnernaya Moskva." "The Liberals attack the minister," the paper concludes, "not because they disagree, but for his babbling about what ought to be kept quiet."

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## Sees Growing Undercurrent of Anti-Semitism in South Africa

London (By Mail).—Although there is seemingly no anti-Semitism there is a great deal of it under the surface and it is growing in South Africa, declared Morris Kentridge, Jewish Labor member of the South African parliament, in an interview here with the "Jewish Chronicle." The covert anti-Semitism was demonstrated, Mr. Kentridge said, by the recently enacted immigration law which intended to exclude Jews from South Africa, and the near passage of the Humane Slaughter Bill, which is aimed at shechita.

Generally speaking the situation of the South African Jews is good, Mr. Kentridge pointed out. He said that they have played an important role in the development of the mining industry and commerce and have been responsible for the establishment of some of the most important factories and the provision of a great deal of work for thousands of people. He also referred to a marked drift to the land by South African Jews.

Recalling that 99 per cent of South African Jews are Zionists, Mr. Kentridge, who came here preparatory to a visit to Palestine, pointed out that South African Jewry is extremely disappointed at the recent attitude of Great Britain towards Palestine.

## Dr. Steindler to Aid Formation of World Orthopedic Society

Iowa City, Ia., Aug. 19.—Dr. Arthur Steindler, head of the department of orthopedic surgery at the University of Iowa medical college, has been invited to attend a meeting in Paris, October 6, to organize the International Orthopedic Society. Dr. Steindler, who is internationally known, is now in Vienna. He will read a paper before the German Orthopedic congress at Heidelberg, September 16.

## Hungarian Jewry Marks 100th Birthday of Emperor Francis Joseph, Friend of Jews

Budapest, Aug. 19.—All of the Hungarian synagogues were filled to capacity today when Hungarian Jewry celebrated the centennial of the birth of the late Emperor Francis Joseph, who was a great friend of the Jews in the Austro-Hungarian Empire. Government representatives and a delegation of Jewish army officers led by the Jewish General Zoell, attended the services in Budapest.

In the various memorial services it was recalled that Hungarian Jewry owed much to the great monarch for equality of rights and religious recognition as well as for the creation of a public Jewish fund for cultural institutions, particularly the rabbinical seminary.

It was on February 18, 1860, in the reign of Francis Joseph that legislation was promulgated giving the Jews of the Empire the full right to hold property. In December, 1867, the new constitution adopted with the approval of Emperor Francis Joseph, removed all disabilities under which the Jews labored.

He also did much to raise the intellectual and moral status of the Jews, establishing Jewish schools in the large cities and aiding in the opening of the rabbinical seminary in Vienna in 1894.

## Hungarian Trade Minister

### Condemns Anti-Semitism

Budapest, Aug. 19.—M. Goembs, Hungarian minister of trade, today condemned anti-Semitism and appealed to the political leaders of all parties to collaborate for the country's economic revival. Speaking at a political mass meeting, the former leader of the Party of Racial Defense urged that religious differences be disregarded and that no differences be made between Jews and Christians.

Both must live together like brothers, he declared, because they are both fighting for the ideals of Hungary.

## Demands Arab High

### Commissioner for Palestine

Jerusalem, Aug. 19.—The appointment of an Arab as High Commissioner of Palestine is demanded by the Arab paper, "Jamal El Arabia," the organ of the Grand Mufti. Criticizing what it terms the "superfluous moderation of the Arab Executive," the paper also demands that in the future all laws be issued in the name of the Arab people and not in the name of the English King.

## Ex-President of Hungarian

### Jewish Council Is Dead

Budapest, Aug. 19.—Solomon Eulenberg, former president of the Hungarian Jewish Council, died here today at the age of 80. He had rendered important services to Hungarian Jewry.

## Warsaw to Name Street for Zamenhof, Esperanto Founder

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Aug. 19.—The Warsaw municipality today decided to rename a certain section of Dzika Street, Ludwig Zamenhof Street, after the founder of Esperanto, the universal language. Zamenhof was born in Bialystok but later moved to Warsaw where he studied medicine and later practiced as an oculist. In 1887 he published his famous brochure under the pen name of "Doktoro Esperanto," doctor hopeful.

The idea of an international tongue came to Dr. Zamenhof from the polyglot character of his native town. In compiling his universal language he appeared to have regard for the needs of his Yiddish-speaking co-religionists. At one time he was an ardent Zionist.

## Denies Attempt to Create United Right Wing Front

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 19.—President Hindenburg today officially denied the report of his alleged negotiations with various political leaders for the creation of a united right wing front at the forthcoming Reichstag elections. Terminating the report a pure invention, he also denied the rumor that he was to meet Adolf Hitler, leader of the anti-Semitic National Socialists (Fascists). He pointed out that from motives of principle he does not interfere in elections.

In the meantime the National Socialists announce that they have arranged for 34,000 meetings at which 1,500 speakers will demand the establishment of a peoples' court to deal with all those favoring the Young Plan and the "Jewish bankers who plunder the peasantry."

## Keith Roach Declines to Confirm Dismissal of Wailing Wall Beadle

Jerusalem, Aug. 19.—Keith Roach, district commissioner of Jerusalem, today refused to confirm the dismissal of the self-appointed Ashkenazi beadle of the Wailing Wall, Noah Gladstone, whom the Jewish Wailing Wall commission had decided to remove, unless the chief rabbinat adheres to the dismissal. Chief Rabbi Abraham Kook is thus far hesitating to give his approval.

## World Conference of Mizrachi Opens in Vienna

Vienna, Aug. 19.—The world conference of the Mizrachi, orthodox Zionist organization, opened here yesterday. All Mizrachi members of the world Zionist Executive are in attendance as are also Gedaliah Bublik, president of the American Mizrachi, and Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum, American Mizrachi leader. The conference's chief aim will be to define the attitude of the Mizrachi to the meetings of the Zionist Actions Committee and the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency which open in Berlin next week.

## Commissioner Dwyer Answers Critics, Backs His Stand on Kosher Permits

Commissioner of Markets, Thomas F. Dwyer, reiterated yesterday the benefits Jewish butchers would have, if his proposed ordinance to license them were to be adopted, and at the same replied to the attacks voiced against him Sunday at the butchers' meeting, where the accusation was made that his proposed ordinance would give market supervisors a greater opportunity for graft than ever.

Mr. Dwyer pointed out that under the present system, when kosher butchers do not need licenses, he is unable to check up on any of them. But if the proposed ordinance were to go into effect, he said, "I would have every applicant for a kosher butcher's license investigated thoroughly. His record would then be submitted to a character committee, consisting of reliable Jewish organizations, or individuals, or both, and I could make the final decision with all of the facts at hand. It seems that such a procedure could not be regarded as other than a protection to the Jewish traders in the markets," Mr. Dwyer declared.

The Commissioner further explained that under the present system it was possible to investigate kosher butchers only on complaint, but under his proposed plan to license them investigations would involve little more than a reference to a special card index of the Department of Markets.

The delegation appointed by the butchers' meeting has not yet called on Mayor Walker in connection with the butchers' disputes with the Commissioner of Markets.

## Hebrew Youth Groups to Meet in Chicago

Chicago, Aug. 19.—Delegates from a number of Hebrew speaking youth organizations throughout the country will meet at the Jewish Peoples' Institute here, September 6 and 7, to organize all Hebrew speaking clubs in the United States and Canada into a national organization with unified aims. The invitation to meet in Chicago was extended by the local Hanoar Hovivri.

## St. Paul Jewish Center to Be Dedicated Sept. 28

St. Paul, Aug. 19.—The new \$100,000 Jewish educational center at Holly Avenue and Grotto Street, this city, will be completed in time for formal dedication, September 28, Mrs. A. A. Peilen, chairman of the dedication committee, announced today. Final work on the building is being rushed this month to complete the center for dedication.

The building will be equipped with furnishings and fixtures for class rooms, kitchen, auditorium and gymnasium, all of which will be in harmony with the architecture and interior decoration.

## 18 Russian Chalutzim, Lacking Visas to Palestine, May Never Realize Ambition to Get There

Jerusalem, Aug. 19.—Eighteen Russian chalutzim, (Zionist pioneers) with permission to leave Russia have cabled that they will lose the right to proceed to Palestine if they do not obtain their visas within the next few days. A month ago the Soviet authorities granted permission to 36 chalutzim to leave Russia. Eighteen of these had visas and will be able to enter Palestine without any difficulty.

The other eighteen, who have not yet received their visas, must remain in Russia until the visas are obtained, thus facing the danger that their passports will expire, making it impossible for them ever to realize their ambition of going to Palestine.

## Survey Shows Important Role by N. Y. Jewish Women in Local Philanthropic Work

The extent to which the Jewish women of New York are taking part in the philanthropic work of the community was disclosed today with the publication by Mrs. Sidney C. Borg, chairman of the Women's Division of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, of the results of a study of their work on the directorates of the ninety-one humanitarian agencies of the federation. The study was based on recent board elections at the institutions.

There are more women than men among the 1,715 directors of the Federation institutions, Mrs. Borg's report states, 924 serving on at least one board. Thirty-eight women are directors of at least 3 social agencies, the statement shows.

"These figures are more important when considered in connection with the fact that the Women's Division of the Federation since its start has been actively engaged in raising funds for the institutions," Mrs. Borg said. "Not only have New York women proved themselves invaluable in the direction of charitable affairs, but they have secured such sums for the work as would place them in the forefront of the country's community chests were they an independent body."

## Polish Court to Hear Post-Mortem Appeal to Clear Rabbi Shot as a Spy

Warsaw (By Mail).—The Supreme Military Court of Poland has decided to consider the appeal in the case of Rabbi Chaim Shapiro, the rabbi of Plotsk, who ten years ago was sentenced to death by a Polish court martial and executed. He was charged with being a Bolshevik spy and with betraying the Polish army. For a decade Polish Jewry has sought a post-mortem retrial for Rabbi Shapiro in an endeavor to wipe out the stain on his name and on all Polish Jewry. The case was retried in 1922 but the Military Court confirmed the sentence of the court martial.

On September 18, 1920, Rabbi Shapiro stood on the balcony of his house in his talith and tefillin praying. With no other evidence than the accusation that his praying on the balcony was meant to be a signal to the Bolsheviks, Rabbi Shapiro was hastily convicted and the death sentence carried out. The execution came shortly after the Polish army had thrown back the Russian army at the Vistula and Poland was taking form as a unified state.

As the tenth anniversary of Poland's emancipation draws near plans are being made to rehabilitate the name of Rabbi Shapiro. The Jews of Poland are taking all measures for the defense of the late Rabbi's reputation while a special judicial committee has been organized to handle the case which has taken on the nature of a cause celebre.

## Saranac Lake Synagogue Installs Its First Rabbi

Saranac Lake, N. Y., Aug. 19.—The installation of Rabbi Samuel Perlman as the first spiritual leader of Congregation Smanu-El here was made the occasion for a general gathering of all Jewish residents from Lake Placid, Plattsburgh and Tupper Lake in addition to those of Saranac Lake. Representatives of the various Christian denominations were also present. Rabbi Stephen S. Wise conducted the installation ceremonies for Rabbi Perlman who is a graduate of the Jewish Institute of Religion of which Dr. Wise is president.

For a number of years the few permanently resident Jewish families here have tried to serve the many Jews who come here for their health. Adequate service was impossible until the installation of Rabbi Perlman.

## Levi Sisters Reside in Worcester

In yesterday's Bulletin the story reporting that Mrs. Helen C. Allman and Miss Jeannette Levi, sisters, had inherited the \$10,000,000 estate of the late Albert Levi, millionaire jewelry and furniture store merchant, the date line was erroneously given as Waterbury. It should have been Worcester, of which city the heiresses are residents.

## Need of Unification of Various Types of Yiddish Schools Urgent, Says "Day"

Under the heading "A Time for Unity," the New York Yiddish daily, "The Day," editorially advocates the need for unifying the various types of Yiddish schools in this country with a view of eliminating the evils caused by the existing unnecessary quarrels between them and of strengthening their position. The paper cites a number of reasons for the critical situation of the schools, saying that the economic crisis in this country is chiefly responsible for it.

The editorial, however, places a great deal of the responsibility on the quarrels between the left and right political movements and the pro and con Palestine feelings that are now current among the Jews, emphasizing that education has no place in the sphere of these.

The schools do not make any progress, the "Day" says, because they are split over unimportant matters, and appeals to all "who have the matter of the modern schools at heart to find a way for unity of forces and to work in unison for that important aim."

The various types of schools referred to by the "Day" are the Jewish National Workers' Alliance Schools, the Sholem Aleichem Schools, the Workmen's Circle Schools, the Independent Workmen's Circle Schools and the Communist Workers' School.

## Nathan Wise, Painter and Inventor, Dies at Age of 51

Mt. Vernon, N. Y., Aug. 19.—Nathan Wise, 51, portrait painter and inventor, is dead here following a sudden heart attack. A native of Lithuania, he came to the United States forty years ago, residing here for the last twelve years.

He was the inventor of the dualite electric light and more recently of an automatic telephone dial system. He was also a trustee of Sinai Temple and the board of the Temple's school.

## Judge Holzer Presides at Judicial Councils' Conference

Chicago, Aug. 19.—Honored a year ago, when he was chosen as the first chairman of the National Conference of Judicial Councils, Judge Harry A. Austria that Lueger's election was not recognized, the municipality itself dissolved and a government official temporarily placed in charge of the Vienna administration. I know of no similar case in any other country."

Speaking of Zionism, Chancellor Schoeber said he had always been keenly interested in the movement and declared he understands the idea and "the Zionist Jews, who, conscious of their historic connection with the Jewish people, are making it their task to rebuild Palestine." The Chancellor also spoke of his long friendship with Dr. Robert Stricker, Austrian Radical Zionist leader, and of his friendly relations with the late Rabbi Chajes, whom he termed an "extraordinary personality and a man of strong character."

Chancellor Schoeber laughingly recalled that his friendship with and for Jews gave rise a few years ago to rumors that he himself was a Jew. A Jewish newspaper replying to an inquiry from a reader informed him that Schoeber was not a Jew nor of Jewish origin.

## Bostonian Appointed Editor of Jewish Veteran Paper

Boston, Aug. 19.—Benjamin G. Leve, Boston attorney and president of the Zionist Organization of this city, was appointed editor-in-chief of the "Jewish Veteran," a monthly publication which goes to Jewish veterans of the World War throughout the country. The publication, which since the war, has been issued from New York, will now be published in this city. Hyman Margoles is the retiring editor.

## Ephraim Granstein, Prominent New Englander, Dead at 72

Springfield, Mass., Aug. 19.—Ephraim Granstein, 72, of Chicopee, is dead here as the result of a sudden heart attack. He came to Springfield to attend to some business. At the time of his death he was rated as the largest taxpayer in Chicopee. He was active in the Zionist movement and owned considerable land in Palestine. For some time he had been chess champion of Springfield.

## Chicago Jewish Charities Left \$10,000 by M. D. Wormser

Chicago, Aug. 19.—The Associated Jewish Charities of Chicago was left \$10,000 by the will of the late Milton D. Wormser, president of Falk, Wormser and Company, manufacturers of brewers' supplies. Mr. Wormser died July 5.

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
