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## **Proclamations Urging Arabs to Strike Are Confiscated as Arab Leaders Protest**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—A protest against the government's confiscation of proclamations calling for an Arab strike Saturday, was adopted by the Arab Executive today. The Executive decided to carry out the strike plans, publishing a statement of its decision in place of the confiscated proclamations.

The Arab Executive decided on the strike to protest against the recent revivification of Joseph Mizrahi Urphali, Jew, whose death sentence was recently commuted to ten years' imprisonment, and to commemorate the commencement of the riots of 1929.

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—The government received its earlier report that all copies of "Aljamea Al Arabia", which contained the Arab Executive call to strike Saturday, had been confiscated. Instead, the later report states, that all copies of the proclamation calling upon all Arabs to strike which were published by the "Aljamea Al Arabia" press have been seized.

A telegram protesting against the proposed Arab strike on behalf of the Semitic Union Party has been received by the "Palestine Daily Bulletin" from Hamad Al Titi of Nablus.

In connection with the anniversary of the commencement of the riots in August, 1929, "Aljamea Al Arabia" today places the number of Arabs slain during the riots in Jerusalem at 46. A check-up of official lists fails to reveal the source of the paper's information.

## **Jews Returning to Hebron; Sixty Plan to Settle There**

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—Three Jewish artisans have returned to Hebron to reside in the Jewish district. Sixty Yemenite Jews are also planning to settle here.

Since the riots in 1929 only one Jew has returned to Hebron which was the scene of a massacre. Dr. Daniel Elkana, who was saved by his Arab landlord from the attacks of Arabs, returned to Hebron on August 10 at the request of his former neighbors and landlord who guaranteed his safety.

## **Jew Executed in Russia for Money Speculation**

Moscow, Aug. 22—A Jew, Chazkel Rainbovitch, was among the eight Russians executed by order of the Ogn, Soviet secret police, for concealing large sums of silver coin, speculating with foreign money and spreading counter-revolutionary rumors.

## **Jew Shot by Anti-Semites in New Roumanian Riots**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Aug. 22—A Jewish merchant, M. Rotstein, was dangerously wounded when armed anti-Semites attacked the Jewish business quarter of Baltzi and fired their revolvers freely while plundering stores.

The anti-Semitic disturbances which had subsided for a time are now flaring up again and assuming a dangerous form.

A group of Borscha peasants, in a letter to Minister Voevod, indicated the names of sixteen persons who participated in starting the Borscha fire. In view of this disclosure the attorney general has ordered a supplementary investigation into the causes of the fire which the government had previously stated was not of anti-Semitic origin but accidental.

A difference of opinion exists in government circles as to whether measures adopted to curb anti-Semitic agitation were sufficient or whether more drastic measures for its suppression is necessary, declared Under-Secretary Gafencu.

## **Mobilize Palestine Police to Keep Order on Anniversary of Start of Arab Rioting**

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—The police of the entire country have been mobilized to prevent any untoward occurrences tomorrow, the first anniversary of the commencement of the riots.

Mouzza Far, Arab agitator, has been warned by the government to make no mention of the contemplated strike of the Arabs which is scheduled for tomorrow. The press of the country as well as the printing plants were warned not to publish proclamations of the Arab Executive calling on all Arabs to join the strike.

## **"Falastin" Urges Suppression of Zionist-Revisionists**

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—The government is urged by the Arab paper "Falastin" to observe closely the activities of the Zionist-Revisionists, opposition to the Weizmann regime within the Zionist organization. The Revisionists, who recently concluded their world conference, are a "seditious party which ought to be suppressed in its beginning," states "Falastin."

## **League Council Meets Sept. 8**

Geneva, Aug. 22—In view of the small agenda the Council of the League of Nations has postponed its meeting from September 5 to September 8, it was officially stated.

## **Jewish Agency Executive Prepares Agenda for Meeting of Administrative Committee**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 22—Preparation of the agenda for the Jewish Agency administrative committee meeting has been occupying the attention of the executive committee of the Agency which has been in session yesterday and today.

Many members of the administrative committee have already arrived here for the meeting which will be held here August 29. Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency, will arrive here Monday. Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the administrative committee of the Agency, is expected here about next Saturday as are also several other non-Zionist members of the committee.

It is reported here that in private consultations among the Zionist members Lord Passfield was severely criticized because the suspension of Jewish immigration certificates had not been rescinded. An early withdrawal of the suspension would have considerably strengthened the position of the Zionist executive at the meeting of the Actions Committee of the Zionist Organization which starts here tomorrow. Lord Passfield, however, has insisted that he could make no such decision before receiving the report of Sir John Hope Simpson who recently left Palestine after completing an investigation into the problems of immigration and land. Sir John is expected in London on September 1.

## **To Try Voldemaras for Causing Slobodka Pogroms**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Aug. 22—Former Premier Augustine Voldemaras will have to stand trial on the charge that he organized the pogroms which occurred in Slobodka in August of last year. While it was previously known that Voldemaras was instrumental in furthering the attacks on the Jews, the prosecutor had taken no action against him up to now. It is believed that the prosecutor has now decided to prosecute in order to render the former Premier completely harmless as a political opponent of the government by disgracing him abroad and eventually making a future political career impossible for him by preferring a criminal charge against him.

## **Report Morganatic Marriage Being Considered by Carol**

London, Aug. 22—King Carol of Roumania is seriously considering a morganatic marriage with Madame Lupescu, Jewess, according to the German correspondent of the "London Daily Mail."

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### Acting High Commissioner Receives American Delegation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—Appreciation of the remarkable work accomplished by American Jews in behalf of Palestine and of the important role played by the Jewish workers in building up Palestine was expressed by Acting High Commissioner Mark Aitchison Young, who received the American Jewish labor delegation today.

Abraham Shipiloff, chairman of the delegation, expressed the anxiety of American friends of Palestine at the recent events, particularly the suspension of immigration. Isaac Hamlin stressed the need of the Jewish masses for a large and free immigration to Palestine. Morris Finestone, the third member of the delegation, declared that American Jewish workers are united in urging Britain to fulfill its obligation toward the Jewish people.

Acting High Commissioner Young told the delegation that colonization must be based on the principal of profitable investment and expressed the hope that the American Jews would support this view. He promised the delegation that he would do all in his power to aid its members in making a thorough study of the country.

### City of Kovno to Subsidize School for Jewish Children

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Aug. 22—A school for Jewish children subsidized by municipality funds has been authorized by the municipality following prolonged conferences between the Jews and officials of the municipality. Building operations have already begun. Simultaneously the Jews are erecting a large community building to house a real gymnasium (high school), here, funds for which are being supplied by Lithuanian Jews in America.

### \$1,669,020 Already Expended in Palestine Emergency Relief Dr. Hexter's Report Reveals; Total of \$2,780,000 Now Allocated

The rebuilding of communities, the establishment of new colonies, the building of roads, the advancement of loans for rehabilitation purposes, the purchase of land and the care of widows and orphans were achieved as a result of funds sent to Palestine from America and other countries following the uprisings in that land last year, according to a report just received by David A. Brown, chairman of the Palestine Emergency Fund, and made public yesterday, from Dr. Maurice B. Hexter, American member of the special committee in charge of the distribution of the funds in the Holy Land. These philanthropic undertakings were made possible, Dr. Hexter reported, through the \$2,945,000, which was secured in America and England for the aid of the stricken population of Palestine. Of the whole sum raised, \$2,038,493 was obtained in this country.

The committee in charge of the expenditure of the funds raised for the emergency, is composed of Pincus Rubenberg, Colonel Frederick K. Kish and Dr. Hexter. This committee was organized through the aid of Mr. and Mrs. Jonah J. Goldstein, of this city, who went to Palestine immediately after the riots, to arrange for this work.

In many of the projects, the cooperation of the government was had, Dr. Hexter announced, as well as that of other organizations, such as the Palestine Economic Corporation and the Labor Federation of that country.

Allocations of the funds for relief and rehabilitative work in Palestine, amounting to \$2,780,000, have already been made, Dr. Hexter reported, and of this sum, he announced, \$1,669,020 was expended up to June 30 on a large program of relief and reconstruction. For general relief, during and immediately following the riots, Dr. Hexter stated \$207,790 was used and in addition the sum of \$140,000 was set aside to care for widows, orphans and invalids for the next twelve or fifteen years. Loans to the extent of \$225,000 have already been made to families financially affected financially by the riots, he reported.

#### Safed a New Summer Resort

The town of Safed, one of the cities damaged during the riots, is now being developed with part of the funds into a commercial center and a new summer and health resort, Dr. Hexter said. An allotment of \$125,000 has been made for this purpose, of which only \$10,000 has thus far been spent. Dr. Hexter also reported that the British Commissioner has given his cooperation in this project by arranging for a 99-year lease on a large tract of land on the highest hill of Safed.

An appropriation of \$325,000 was also made, Dr. Hexter said, for the reconstruction of the destroyed colonies and the rehabilitation of the settlers. Of the five ruined colonies, two—Kfar Uzin and Hulda—no longer exist. The reason

given for this action, Dr. Hexter declared, was the principle "concurring in by the American and British trustees not to re-create uneconomic centers." However, the three remaining colonies—Motza, near Jerusalem; Har Tov, midway along the Jerusalem Lydda railroad, and Beertuvia, the southernmost colony of Judea near Gaza—are now being rebuilt.

For housing purposes, Dr. Hexter reported an appropriation of \$250,000. In Haifa, he said, a large urban plot has been obtained with a view to making the Jewish residents in that section "more secure for all time by linking up the Jewish areas and preventing the dispersion of the Jewish community in all directions in the immediate future."

To relieve the financial strain of manufacturers and merchants who suffered from the rigorous boycott of Jewish enterprises, \$75,000 was released for loans, Dr. Hexter announced, and for the aid of small shop-keepers, \$25,000 was advanced to the Palestine Economic Corporation for its loan fund activity.

#### Aiding Home Construction

In Jerusalem and environs, the committee, through mortgage facilities, Dr. Hexter reported, is aiding in the building of multiple family houses. One co-operatively-owned 20 apartment building is now going up—the first in Palestine, he added. There is also an outstanding appropriation of \$250,000, Dr. Hexter stated for colonizing at strategic points, farmers on small holdings. The plans for these are now being made and work should begin in October, he stated. As a result of this appropriation, Dr. Hexter pointed out, "we called into being a credit corporation for colonizing which will raise an additional million dollars in England and Germany for this purpose. If successful, we hope, physically, to make secure, for all time, a large part of the citrus area by concentrating our people strategically."

A sum of \$80,000 had to be expended, Dr. Hexter further reported, on providing greater security for the residents of Palestine. In addition, he said, \$182,500 was expended for roads, telephones and central buildings, the roads being undertaken in cooperation with the government, the latter making a grant of \$25,000 towards this work. These roads, it was explained, were not main highways, and accordingly would not have been reconstructed for a good many years by the government. They link up most of the Emek colonies, Dr. Hexter pointed out, provide means of concentration and, consequently, better and more rapid self-defense in case of future disturbances. For the same reason, he said, telephones were installed in each colony. In addition to the roads and the telephones, Dr. Hexter stated, the committee has insured that every Emek colony has at least one solid structure in which, in time of danger, the women and children might be concentrated and which might comprise centers of defense until the arrival of troops.

## Rabbinical Committee Meets Dwyer, Asks Kashruth Boards Manned by Prominent Jews

A committee of seven rabbis, representing all rabbinical organizations in this city has conferred with Commissioner of Public Markets, Thomas F. Dwyer, concerning the best means for preventing the evils that led to the scandal between the kosher butchers and the market supervisors, the former charging the supervisors with extorting bribes from them.

The committee suggested to the Commissioner that Kashruth Boards be organized in all the boroughs consisting of rabbis and prominent Jews who should supervise the observation of kashruth in their boroughs. Over these boards there shall be organized a central executive committee empowered to settle all disputes arising within the local kashruth boards.

Commissioner Dwyer showed great interest in this plan and declared himself in full sympathy with it, saying that he is willing to help them get the official recognition of the city government as the Jewish authority over kashruth. The conference also discussed the commissioner's proposed ordinance to license kosher butchers. The commissioner assured the committee that under his plan no licenses would be issued nor revoked without the consent of the rabbinical board.

## Seven Bucharest Students Imprisoned for Praising Beza

Bucharest, Aug. 22—Seven students have been sentenced to prison for two weeks each, for voicing their approval of the attempt of Georg Beza to assassinate Dr. Alexander Angelescu, assistant minister of the interior.

## Invites Strickland Here to Lecture on Palestine

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—C. F. Strickland, Colonial Office expert on cooperatives, has been invited by the American Foreign Policy Association to lecture on Palestine in the United States.

## Warburg and Passfield Confer

London, Aug. 22—Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the administrative committee of the Jewish Agency, conferred with Lord Passfield today and is returning to Germany tonight.

## Russian Jews to Lose Work Permits in Lithuania

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Aug. 22—Over 1,000 Jews, formerly Russian citizens, who reside in Lithuania but are not citizens will lose the right to work when the new law withdrawing the rights of non-citizens to work without special permits is put in operation. The Jews affected fear that permits will not be given to them and are greatly alarmed for the future.

## Palestine Hebrew Teachers Oppose Proposed Transfer of School Administration

Jerusalem, Aug. 22—A strong protest against the proposed transfer of the administration of Hebrew schools to a joint body composed of representatives of the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Council (Vaad Letumi) was voiced today in a resolution adopted by the Palestine Hebrew Teachers' Conference now in session here.

The conference also protested against the policy of the Brith Shalom, organization headed by Dr. Judah L. Magnes, which aims at the achievement of friendly relations between the Arabs and Jews.

## Habonim Meets in Montreal

Montreal, Aug. 22—The sixth annual convention of the Zionist Order Habonim, fraternal organization of Canada, is being held at the Hotel Vermont here.

Dr. Elias Solomon of Emanuel Synagogue, Mt. Vernon, Meyer Weisgal, editor of the Toronto "Jewish Standard," and M. H. Lausner of New York will be the speakers today.

Nine Habonim lodges from Eastern and Western Canada will send delegates. Mr. and Mrs. Archibald J. Freiman of Ottawa, will greet the convention in the name of the Zionist Organization of Canada and the Canadian Hadassah respectively, of which they are the presidents.

## Pinansky Heads Maine Judges

Portland, Me., Aug. 22—Judge Max Pinansky, Justice of the Municipal Court here, was elected to the 1931 presidency of the Municipal Court Judges' Association of Maine at the sixth annual meeting and conference held on Wednesday at Scarborough.

Judge Pinansky succeeds Judge Frank B. Miller of Rockland, who had been president for the past two years. The Justice is prominent in Maine legal, communal and charitable circles.

## S. Lipp, Cincinnati Attorney, Killed in Fall from Train

Cincinnati, Aug. 22—Samuel I. Lipp, attorney, president of the Ohio Bus Company, was instantly killed Thursday when he fell from a moving train on the New York Central line near Little Falls, New York.

Mr. Lipp who was a past president of the Rockdale Temple Men's Club and active in B'nai B'rith was 57 years old.

## Raid and Close Offices of Warsaw Jewish Unions

Warsaw, Aug. 22—Following a raid on the Left-wing union of Jewish trade employees, the offices were closed and 53 of the union members were arrested. The Jewish Textile Union was also raided and 28 members arrested.

## Preparations for American Jewish Congress Conference Made at Washington Meeting

Washington, Aug. 22—Preparations for the sessions of the American Jewish Congress, which will be held here October 19 and 20, were completed at a conference held here Thursday. The conference, which took place at the National Press Club, was attended by local Jewish leaders who were addressed by Samuel Blitz, organization director of the Congress.

A banquet in honor of Harry Snell, M. P., Labor member of the Shaw Commission which investigated the causes of the August, 1929, riots in Palestine, was arranged. Mr. Snell will be a guest of the Congress during its convention here.

The officers elected for the convention include Leopold V. Freudberg, chairman of the banquet committee; Joseph Tepper, chairman of the election committee; Mrs. John Safer, chairman of the women's committee; Morris Garfinkle, Louis E. Spiegel, Joseph A. Wilner, Mrs. David Alper, vice chairmen of the election committee; Maurice Bisgoy, executive secretary, and Oscar Leonard, secretary of the election committee. The honorary convention officers will be named by a committee headed by Isidore Hershfield. The sessions of the Congress will be held at the Willard Hotel.

## Worcester Y.M.H.A. to Affiliate With Jewish Welfare Board

Worcester, Aug. 22—Virtual completion of negotiations by which the Worcester Young Men's Hebrew Association will become affiliated with the Jewish Welfare Board of America was announced by president Abbee W. Talamo today.

Added impetus was given the proposed plan to erect a \$150,000 Community Centre by the announcement and it is expected that field workers from national headquarters will shortly visit Worcester to survey possible sites for such a project.

Plans for the coming year of the local Y. M. H. A. chapter call for organization of the Jewish youth in the outlying towns of Worcester county which at the present time have no Jewish youth organizations.

## Hoover Names Dr. Wolman to Unemployment Commission

Washington, Aug. 22—Dr. Leo Wolman, member of the experts' commission which was sent to Palestine prior to formation of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, and economist for the Amalgamated Workers of America, has been appointed by President Hoover to his Unemployment Statistical Commission. The commission is scheduled to meet here Oct. 6.

## Shanghai Jews Seek Funds for East-European Jews

An extensive campaign is now being conducted among the Jews of China and the Far East to get them to participate in the relief work for the Jews in the Eastern European countries and in Palestine.

The relief campaign is conducted in the same manner as it is in America by the Allied Jewish Campaign, reports the Shanghai English weekly, "Israel's Messenger," editorially advocating the great relief cause.

"Pogroms, hunger, epidemics, an army of helpless orphans and over two million souls without means for livelihood are waiting for your help," the paper writes. "If no relief comes immediately, every Jewish institution in Eastern Europe that was established with great energy is doomed to destruction. It is impossible in a few years to heal the wounds that pogroms, revolutions and wars have brought upon the Jewish body. More time is necessary for that purpose, and our happier brothers in other countries must come to the rescue," is the appeal of "Israel's Messenger."

## Rabbi Plotkin to Lead New Jersey City Congregation

Jersey City, N. J., Aug. 22—Rabbi Benjamin Plotkin, spiritual leader of Temple Emanu-El, of Bayonne for the past six years, has resigned to become rabbi of the newly organized orthodox Congregation Emanu-El of this city. Rabbi Plotkin is a graduate of Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary. Prior to his service in Bayonne, he occupied a pulpit in Providence, R. I.

Congregation Emanu-El is comprised mainly of business and professional men, and is temporarily holding services in the Jewish Community Center. Dr. I. Schuman is president of the congregation.

## Six Jewish Candidates in Los Angeles Primaries

Los Angeles, Aug. 22—Charles A. Son, member of one of the oldest Jewish families in California, is among the six Jewish candidates listed for the city primaries, which will be held Aug. 26. Mr. Son is a candidate for nomination for the post of attorney general. William Bronstein and Milton M. Golden, attorneys active in Jewish circles, are on the ballot for seats in the assembly, while Harry Lyons, who for the past several terms has been the only Jewish assemblyman from the southern part of the state, is seeking reelection. L. H. Phillips is seeking the nomination for judge of the Superior Court. Chaim Shapiro, former president of the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Association, will seek the office of lieutenant governor on the Socialist ticket.

## Detroit Rabbis Hit "Mushroom" Synagogues as Irreligious

Detroit, Aug. 22—The rise of a "mushroom synagogues" during the High Holy Day period is menacing the existence of the all-year-round functioning congregations, many of which are already in a critical financial condition, states an appeal of the Vaad Horabonim, rabbinical council, and Vaad Hair, Jewish community council of Detroit, to the Detroit Jewish community.

The statement of the rabbis declares that the "mushroom synagogues" divert funds that would otherwise go to the functioning congregations. Warning is issued against the rise of temporary congregations in halls where dances are conducted throughout the year, in theatres, garages and other places unfit for religious services. According to the statement the use of such places for religious services, and the placing of Sefer Torahs in them, is prohibited by Jewish law.

The statement charges that such "mushroom synagogues" are organized by private people for personal profit, thereby depriving synagogues of income and placing many of them in danger of closing up because they are not receiving the Holy Days' income upon which they depend for their existence.

## Hold State Conference for Jewish Legionaires Campaign

Boston, Aug. 22—At an all-day conference to take place on Sunday, September 7, at the Copley-Plaza, there will be organized a Massachusetts committee of sponsors for the American-Jewish Legionaires Colonization Fund. At this time will also be decided the state quota towards the \$300,000 national campaign, and the date set for the launching of the drive here.

The Colonization Fund was founded for the purpose of colonizing American-Jewish ex-legionaires in Palestine, and the proceeds of this campaign are intended for the settlement of the first 200 legionaires and their families within the next twelve months. Although the Jewish National Fund is giving each legionario land and part of the irrigation funds, amounting to \$1,000, and although each legionario is himself contributing \$500 towards his own settling, expert opinion has decided that the sum of \$3,500 is necessary for the settlement of a family. Therefore, this campaign is being launched in order to raise the balance of \$1,500 per family or \$300,000 for 200 families.

The national headquarters are in New York, with the Hon. Carl Sherman, Attorney-General, chairman; Jacob de Haas, secretary, and Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence, treasurer. Abraham A. Aronoff, field secretary, is at present in this city, making arrangements for the conference.

## Many Jewish Candidates in Maryland Primaries

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 22—An unusually large number of Jews are included in the list of candidates seeking political office in Baltimore. In fact, according to some of the political leaders in the city, more Jews have filed certificates of candidacy for the primaries on September 8 than ever before in the history of the city. There are no Jews, however, listed for Congress or the State-wide posts—Governor, Attorney-General, Comptroller and Clerk of the Court of Appeals.

A hard fight amongst Jews looms in the race for the Democratic nomination to the State Senate in the Fourth District. All three of the candidates—E. Milton Altfield, Abram C. Joseph and Sydney R. Traub—are Jews. Another Jew, Louis Binder, who also sought the post, now held by State Senator Harry O. Levin, withdrew from the contest and then filed for re-election to the House of Delegates. A Jewess, Mrs. Rose I. Loeffler, is seeking one of the six Republican nominations for the House of Delegates in the Fifth Legislative district.

Of the fourteen Democrats who have filed for the House of Delegates in the Fourth District, twelve are Jews. Only six of the fourteen candidates can be nominated.

## Pennsylvania Y.M.'s and Y.W.'s to Meet at Bushkill, Pa.

Easton, Pa., Aug. 22—The twenty-first convention of the Y.M.H.A.'s, Y.W.H.A.'s and the Jewish Community Centers of Pennsylvania will be held at Bushkill, Pike county, near here, on August 30, 31 and September 1, terminating on the evening of Labor Day with a "Stunt Night."

Delegates will be present from forty organizations in the state, representing 40,000 members. The buildings owned by the various organizations in the State are valued at \$5,000,000.

## Proposed Providence Jewish Chorus to Include All Classes of Jews

Providence, Aug. 22—The proposed Jewish Chorus, plans for which are now under way under the leadership of Arthur Einstein, director of Temple Emanuel, will attempt to include all classes of Jews in the city regardless of congregational or other affiliations. The chorus is in part an outgrowth of the Jewish Festival Chorus which was also under the leadership of Professor Einstein.

The new chorus will, it is hoped, introduce to the Providence Jewish public all varieties of modern Jewish music. Many Jews of the city have already offered their financial support.

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
