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Zionist Executive Sharply Rapped, Vehemently Defended at Zionist Actions Committee

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 27—Sharp criticism of the activities of the World Zionist Executive was voiced by some speakers at the session of the Zionist Actions Committee while others vehemently defended the Executive's policy. Dr. Robert Stricker, leader of the Austrian Radical Zionists, criticized the Jewish Agency and indicated that it was a failure. Saying that only an intense propaganda for the idea of a Jewish State could save the Zionist movement, Dr. Stricker demanded that a Zionist Congress be convened immediately.

The adoption of what he termed "an elastic policy" towards the Mandatory Power was recommended by Leo Lewitte, Zionist leader from Poland. He pointed out that only when "we have before us the promised new program of the British government will the Zionist Executive be able to decide whether it should resign."

Kurt Blumenfeld, president of the German Zionist Federation, declared that the problem of a bi-national State
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Unfair Treatment of Jewish Cooperatives in East Europe Not Raised at Cooperative Parley

Vienna, Aug. 27—Considerable surprise has been manifested by the many Jewish delegates here for the International Co-operative Congress that none of the delegates have yet raised the question of the unfriendly treatment accorded to the Jewish cooperatives by the governments in Eastern and Southeastern Europe, particularly in Poland and Roumania.

While there are no delegates here from the Jewish cooperatives of Eastern Europe there are many Jewish delegates from other countries, among them M. Boradnewsky from the Argentine, and M. Sabarsky from Palestine.

New Polish Cabinet May Have Jewish Problems Division

Warsaw, Aug. 27—A special department for Jewish problems headed by B. Hausner, Polish vice-consul at Tel Aviv, Palestine, will be created by the new Polish cabinet headed by Marshal Pilsudski, according to a report in the "Hajntike Najes" which is not confirmed as yet from other sources. Mr. Hausner, who was recently recalled to Poland by the foreign ministry on a matter relating to the promotion of trade between Poland and Palestine, was decorated by the former trade minister with the Officers' Order Polonia Restituta.

Hungarian Jews to Resume Relations with Jews Abroad

Budapest, Aug. 27—Hungarian Jewry is about to resume official relations with the various Jewries abroad after an interval of sixteen years. This action was decided upon by the central committee of the newly organized Union of Hungarian Jews which represents all organizations of Hungarian Jewry. Baron Kohner, president of the Jewish community of Budapest, speaking at the first meeting of the Union, said that the aim of the organization was to resume relations with foreign Jewish organizations both from the view of the union of Israel and also to benefit the cultural and social institutions of Hungarian Jewry.

The meeting approved the decision to approach foreign Jewish organizations in the United States, France and England through Baron Kohner, Deputy Paul Sandor, M. Dezi and Joseph Veszi, editor of the "Pester Lloyd."

Baptized Relative Fights Will of Kin of Rothschilds

Berlin, Aug. 27—The will of the late Baroness Salome Rothschild, kin of the famous Jewish family of bankers, who died in Berlin in 1922, is now the subject of negotiations between the city of Frankfurt, the Baroness' native city, and the French government. A German subject resident in Paris for many years, she left the French capital during the World War and came to Berlin where she died. Her property was sequestered by the French government under the Alien Property Act.

In her will she left 500,000 gold francs for the care of the poor children of Frankfurt. As a result of her estate having been confiscated while Poincare was president of France the bequest was never received by the municipality of Frankfurt. Now that the estate of the late Baroness has been released a baptized relative of the Baroness from Belgium has put in a claim for the money and is fighting the probate of the will.

Consequently the municipality of Frankfurt, the native city of the original Rothschild, is seeking the intervention of the French government to have the 500,000 gold francs paid out.

New Crime Code for Palestine

Jerusalem, Aug. 27—A new criminal code for Palestine as well as a new law governing the procedure in civil courts will be published shortly, it was learned here today. The new code will replace the existing Ottoman criminal code under which Palestine has been operating.

Sabbath Observance League to Create Bank to Aid Jews Who Strictly Observe Sabbath

Berlin, Aug. 27—The creation of a world Sabbath bank to furnish financial assistance to Jews who find themselves in economic difficulties because of their strict observance of the Sabbath, was decided upon at the closing session today of the world congress of Shomrei Shabbos, the League for Upholding the Sanctity of the Sabbath. The congress also adopted a resolution appealing to the entire cultural world and to all organizations connected with the proposed calendar reform plan to assure the fixity of the Sabbath.

The congress also authorized its World Executive to make certain that the Sabbath would be included as one of the two rest days when the plan for the five-day week is realized in the United States. The American delegates had expressed optimism that the growth of the five-day week plan would solve the problem of Sabbath observance. A decision to appeal to all the world powers to mitigate the effects upon the Jews of the compulsory Sunday rest day was also adopted.

M. Gruenberg was reelected president. Rabbis Bernard Drachman, M. Treistmann, Aaron Teitelbaum, Wolf Gold, M. Ferner and Gedaliah Bublik, M. Staviskey, Jonas Travers and Jehudah Rosenberg and Dr. Henry Keller were the Americans elected to the central executive committee.

Carl Melchior Gets Highest Honor of Prussian State

Berlin, Aug. 27—The highest order of the Prussian state was today bestowed upon Dr. Carl Melchior, noted Hamburg banker, partner of Max Warburg, and world famous economist, for the services he rendered to the German Republic as the German representative on the directorate of the Bank for International Settlement. The Mayor of Hamburg, M. Ross, lauded Mr. Melchior's work for the upbuilding of post-war Germany, saying that: "Melchior convinced the victorious powers of Germany's inability to carry the burden of debt imposed upon her by the Versailles Treaty."

Dr. Melchior, who has represented his country at every one of the post-war international conferences, recently declined the position as head of the Reichsbank after the resignation of M. Schacht. In order to accept his position on the directorate of the Bank for International Settlement, he resigned from the finance commission of the League of Nations.

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Zionists Call Mandates Report "Sweeping Vindication"

"The report of the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations on the Palestine situation is a sweeping vindication of the Jewish position with regard to the disturbances in Palestine last August," declared Robert Szold, Chairman of the Administration of the Zionist Organization of America, in commenting on the report that was issued Monday at Geneva.

Declaring that the Mandates Commission has laid it down as a definite policy that the Palestine Mandate carries with it positive obligations for the establishment of the Jewish National Home, Mr. Szold, speaking on behalf of the Zionist Organization of America, finds it "regrettable that the British government should take offense at the frank and courageous statement of the Mandates Commission." Reviewing the maladministration of Great Britain in Palestine during the past year, the Zionist statement asserts, however, "We have not lost faith in the British people."

Mr. Szold, on behalf of the Z. O. A., also sent a cable to Sir Eric Drummond, secretary general of the League of Nations, in which the Mandates Commission's report is termed "a great state paper" which constitutes a message of hope and encouragement to the Jews of America.

The cablegram expresses satisfaction with the contents of the report and gives praise to the League for a reassertion of its authority over the administration of mandated territories. Declaring that the action of the Mandates Commission in dealing with the conduct of Great Britain in Palestine will "hasten all the smaller peoples whose rights depend upon the enforcement of a reign of law and justice," the cablegram expresses the belief that the report will "simplify the Palestine problem."

Melchett, Here on Business Trip, Upholds Report of Mandates Commission and Criticizes Reply of the British Government

Fully upholding the report of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, which criticized the British government for its failure to carry out all the provisions of the Palestine Mandate, Lord Melchett, prominent British industrialist, and president of the English Zionist Federation and vice-chairman of the Council of the Jewish Agency, who arrived here Tuesday on the S.S. Majestic, criticizes the reply of the British government to the Mandates Commission's report which attempted to shift the blame for the results of its Palestine policy.

"There could have been no other report of the Mandates Commission," Lord Melchett told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on his arrival here for a business trip of two weeks. "The report," Lord Melchett said, "fully repudiates the report of the Shaw Commission whose conclusions sharply contradicted the testimony of impartial observers on the Palestine disturbances."

Government Responsible

"There is no getting away from the fact that the Palestine government is responsible for the Palestine outbreaks of last Summer," Lord Melchett unequivocally stated. "The fact that when military reinforcements reached Palestine, the disturbances were suppressed, proves that the riots could have been prevented if sufficient military forces and police had been available," he said.

The reply of Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, to the Mandates Commission's report, that the outbreaks in Palestine came suddenly and were a surprise to the Palestine government, Lord Melchett characterized as "illogical." It was the business of the government to know what was going on in Palestine and it is not logical for Mr. Henderson to claim that the Mandates Commission had not previously found any danger in the situation," Lord Melchett said, adding that: "It is not the business of the Mandates Commission to watch the situation in Palestine. Moreover, the report of the Shaw Commission admitted that there had been a lack of adequate protection in Palestine."

Discusses Mandate

Turning from a discussion of the Mandates Commission's report to a comment on the Mandate itself, Lord Melchett pointed out that of the two main objects of the Mandate, the establishment of the Jewish National Home, and the creation of self-governing institutions and the protection of the civil and religious rights of all inhabitants, the first was a positive object and the chief aim of the Mandate while the protection of the rights of all inhabitants he termed a negative object. As for the creation of self-governing institutions, Lord Melchett said that the Mandate says nothing about it being done simultaneously with the creation of the Jewish National Home, but only when the conditions of the country permit it.

Replying to Henderson's explanation that Britain was obliged only to create the conditions that would lead to the establishment of a Jewish National Home and not the Home itself, Lord Melchett declared that the British government had not even created these conditions.

Speaking of the relations between Jews and Arabs in Palestine, Lord Melchett, who himself has large investments in Palestine, said: "The Palestine government could create such condition there as would help to promote mutual good-will between Jews and Arabs. If the government had interested itself more in the economic development of the country, both the Jews and the Arabs would have profited by it and it would have served as a means of cementing good-will. There is plenty of land and there are enough opportunities for both races to make controversies unnecessary."

No Animosity

Lord Melchett denied that there was any animosity between the Arabs and the Jews, adding that the anti-Jewish riots were only the result of the agitation of a group of self-seeking Arab politicians who did not have the interests of the Arab masses at heart.

The Jews ought to be satisfied that they have the Mandates Commission with them, Lord Melchett stated, but: "They should not rely on this alone. They must utilize the present favorable atmosphere to make greater efforts for the upbuilding of Palestine. On the other hand, they must also put a stop to the extremist demands on both sides."

Referring to the stoppage of immigration, the noted British Zionist and industrialist said that if American Jewry had kept its promise with regard to subscription of funds for Palestine, a greater immigration would be possible for "it is only a matter of finances, and the more money that is available, the larger the immigration can be. The American Jews ought to be encouraged to make more private investments in Palestine which are profitable. After the report of Sir John Simpson is made public, I am sure the immigration stoppage will be rescinded."

Oratorio Hints at Return of Schoenberg to Judaism

Vienna, Aug. 27.—The possibility that the world famous composer, Arnold Schoenberg may return to Judaism is foreshadowed by his completion of a new oratorio entitled "Moses and Aaron," in which he presents the ideas and the divinity of various religions culminating in a pacan to an unpersified Jewish god. Schoenberg, a native of Vienna, has been the conductor of the Bunt Theatre in Berlin and professor of music theory at the Sternschen Conservatory in Berlin. For many years he has had no affiliation with Jews nor any connection with Jewish groups.

French Press Inclines Toward Britain, Fellow Mandatory, on Mandates Commission's Report

Paris, Aug. 27.—With France one of the important Mandatory Powers, the general tone of the comment in the leading French papers on the Mandates Commission's report on the Palestine riots of 1929 is one of "speaking as Mandatory to Mandatory it is better to stick together."

"Le Temps," whose editorials on foreign affairs reflect the attitude of the French foreign office, says that the report cannot fail "to provoke a lively reaction in England," since the British cabinet "intends to defend itself against any reproach for not having fulfilled in Palestine all its obligations towards the Jewish National Home. The Mandates Commission is doing its duty in studying the facts and searching for the cause of the conflicts, which means to criticize, but it would be erroneous to believe that the Mandates Commission ought to act defiantly towards the Mandatories."

"The prime duty of the Mandatory Power is to preserve order. Great Britain possibly committed errors in Palestine but she incontestably had the intention to conscientiously fulfill the Mandate. Indeed, the task of conciliating the creation of the Jewish National Home and the legitimate rights of the Arab population is by no means an easy task, and if the British authorities were surprised by the events it would be unreasonable to conclude that England had failed in any respect to fulfill the conditions of the Mandate."

"L'Action Francaise," the Royalist organ, utilized the report of the Mandates Commission for attacking the entire Mandates system, saying that: "A mandate represents a form of sovereignty hardly desirable. It is hardly probable that British citizens will bless the memory of Lord Balfour for his declaration which resulted in the Mandates Commission's report."

League's Refugee Commission Pays Tribute to Lucien Wolf

Geneva, Aug. 27.—Tribute was paid today to the late Lucien Wolf, the secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies, who died Saturday, at the opening session of the League of Nations Inter-Governmental Refugee Advisory Commission of which Mr. Wolf was the founder. C. Goulkevitch, chairman of the Commission, expressed regret at the death of Mr. Wolf whom he termed a devoted collaborator and loyal friend.

The members of the Commission stood in silence for a moment in memory of Mr. Wolf and then voted to send a telegram of condolence to Mrs. Wolf. The address of M. Goulkevitch was also devoted to praise of the late Dr. Fridtjof Nansen, former High Commissioner for Refugees.

Find Canaanite Art Work on Site of Abraham's Home

Jerusalem, Aug. 27.—On the site of the ancient home of the Patriarch Abraham at Kirjath Sepher the joint expedition of the Xenia Theological Seminary of Pittsburgh and the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem has found a small limestone lion perfectly preserved and believed to be one of a pair that flanked the sides of an ancient ruler's throne. It may also have been part of the support of a Canaanite idol because a small altar was found nearby.

Dr. Melvin G. Kyle, one of the directors of the joint expedition, estimates that both objects date from about 1400 B.C. The chiefs of the expedition regard the archeological finds as the most important ever found in Palestine, being far in advance of any pre-Greek object unearthed in Palestine and offering wonderful specimens of genuine Canaanite art.

The lion was found standing on its nose in a heap of rubble and was apparently thrown out by the Israelites after conquering a Canaanite fortress. The lion will be housed in the Palestine Museum of Antiquities.

Soviet Economist, Other Jewish Officials Arrested

Berlin, Aug. 27.—Aaron Sokolowski, prominent Soviet Jewish economist and one of the authors of the famous Five Year Plan, has been arrested in Moscow, according to reports reaching here. Confirmed reports from Moscow all state that a number of Jewish government officials have been arrested this week, among them M. Loevetsky, leader of the Ozet, and Abram Ginzburg.

Congress of Anti-Semites At Baltzi Banned After Protest

Bucharest, Aug. 27.—The planned congress of followers of the anti-Semitic chieftain, Professor Alexander Cuza, at Baltzi tomorrow, has been forbidden by Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, minister of the interior following the intervention of the Jewish deputy, Michael Landau. Baltzi has recently been the scene of renewed anti-Semitic agitation and the Jews there feared that if the congress were held serious excesses might occur.

Polish Rabbinate Wars on Mushroom Synagogues

Warsaw, Aug. 27.—The war on mushroom synagogues, which spring into existence every year around the High Holidays, has spread to Warsaw. The rabbinate today warned that it would no longer permit the conversion of moving picture houses, dance halls and theatres into synagogues for the High Holidays.

Palestine Hebrew Press Unit in Approving Mandates Body Report; Raps British Reply

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Aug. 27.—Unanimous approval of the report of the Mandates Commission on the Palestine riots of 1929 is voiced in editorials in the three Hebrew daily papers published in Palestine. On the other hand they are a unit in condemning the reply of the British government to the Mandates Commission's criticisms of the British policy in Palestine.

The "Ha'Arctz" terms the report the most important event in the history of Palestine policy since the approval of the Mandate. The paper points out that the Mandates Commission has for the first time voiced "a clear opinion of the Mandatory Power's policy and the Mandatory Power is clearly charged with not fulfilling its undertaking to encourage the establishment of the Jewish National Home and with not assisting in a rapprochement between the Jews and Arabs." The British government's reply, according to the "Ha'Arctz," puts the Mandatory Power in the position of the Shaw Commission "appearing as a party against the Jews."

The "Doar Hayom," organ of the Revisionists, sees in the Mandates Commission's report what may be the turning point in the fight for "our rights if we conduct the right policy. The Mandatory Power's reply to the Commission's criticism is animated by enmity toward the Jewish aims. Her only reason—

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German Centre Party Begins Anti-Semitic Agitation

Berlin, Aug. 27.—German Jewry is amazed by the fact that the great German Centre Party, to which the present Chancellor, Heinrich Brüning, belongs, has begun an anti-Semitic agitation in connection with the forthcoming Reichstag elections. The "Deutsche Tageszeitung," the organ of Dr. M. Stegerwald, parliamentary leader of the German Centre Party, has published an article attacking the Social Democratic Party because of its Jewish leaders.

The article says that: "The leaders of the Social Democrats are Jews and that is why they are aiming at the destruction of German industry and, at the same time favoring financiers and bankers who are chiefly Jews."

Jewish Agency Aids Fight On Rat Plague in Palestine

Jerusalem, Aug. 27.—As a result of the Palestine government's failures to take any action on the offer of the Jewish Agency to share in the cost of fighting the plague of field rats in the Emek, where much damage was done to crops by the pests, the Jewish Agency today sent two agricultural experts to aid in fighting the field rats. The Jewish Agency recently appropriated \$50,000 for the relief of the Jewish settlements affected by the plague.

American Jewry Gave Half of \$20,000,000 Raised Throughout World for Keren Hayesod

Of \$20,121,980 received by the Palestine Foundation Fund (Keren Hayesod) from April 1st, 1920 to the end of last year, Jews in this country contributed more than half, \$10,976,970, is a statement contained in an announcement issued yesterday, that the tenth anniversary of this fund, the purpose of which is to finance the economic and agricultural rebuilding of Palestine, will be celebrated in Jewish communities throughout the world during all of next November. Other countries that have made large contributions to the Palestine Foundation Fund are: South Africa, \$1,505,320; Germany, \$982,505; Roumania, \$877,65; Great Britain, \$875,275; Poland, \$820,500 and Canada, \$737,070.

The Palestine Foundation Fund was organized in London in 1920, and is now the chief financial instrumentality of the Jewish Agency for carrying out its program for the development of Jewish life in the Holy Land. Oscar Wasserman, president of the Deutsche Bank in Berlin is chairman of its Board of Directors and among the American members of the Board are David M. Bressler, and Dr. Solomon Lowenstein. Contributions to the Palestine Foundation Fund are being obtained in this country by the Allied Jewish Campaign, which is seeking to raise \$6,000,000 from American Jewry for the aid of stricken Jewry in Eastern Europe and Palestine.

During the first nine years of its existence, the Palestine Foundation Fund has invested about one-third of its income, \$6,055,000, in fostering the agricultural settlement of Jews in the Holy Land, and since its inception has, in part, founded and maintained 70 farming colonies there with a total population of 11,000 souls. To the end of September last the Fund expended \$1,775,000 for facilitating and regulating Jewish immigration to Palestine.

Urban development of Palestine is another branch of the Foundation Fund's activities in which it had invested at the end of last year \$3,947,940. Through its budget for public works, it has enabled many of the towns that have sprung up there during the past decade and more to build new roads and install other civic improvements. Credits are granted by it through its Labor Department to urban cooperative groups to finance industrial enterprises. Through its General Mortgage Bank it encourages house building. It is a large investor in the Palestine Electric Corporation which owns power stations in Tel Aviv, Haifa and Tiberias, and is presently constructing a central power station on the Jordan River, which, it is believed, will become an important factor in the development of Jewish industry there, and in the irrigation of the citrus plantations and vineyards. It is a large investor, also, in the Palestine Mining Syndicate, which is exploiting the mineral and chemical resources of the Dead Sea.

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in Palestine has already been decided by the fact that the Arabs are there. "All that remains to do," he said, "is to make the greatest possible effort for the upbuilding of Palestine."

Defending the Zionist Executive from the charges made against it by the oppositionist delegates, Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist Executive, emphasized the need for obtaining more funds to intensify the political work. He also remarked that the Jewish press "often uses language towards England which is not appropriate."

While praising the report of the Mandates Commission on the Palestine riots of 1929 as giving moral support to the Zionist cause, David Ben Gurion, president of the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine, pointed out that despite this support from Geneva, the political center for Zionism still remained in London and not in Geneva. Hence he felt that the policy of upbuilding should be aimed at cooperation with England and the Arabs on the principle that Palestine "will give us a place for millions of Jewish immigrants."

Does Not Trust Britain

In the course of the long debate on the Zionist political situation, Herschel Farbstain, a member of the Actions Committee from Poland, declared that he did not trust Britain's promise of a constructive program for Palestine. He said that the basic Zionist ideal was still the Jewish State. Isaac Greenbaum, Polish Zionist leader and a member of the Polish parliament, demanded the withdrawal of Dr. Chaim Weizmann as president of the World Zionist Organization as "a symbol of a new chapter in Zionist history." He also suggested that the Zionists must oppose England and "look for other support."

Abe Goldberg, American member of the Actions Committee and a Yiddish journalist, advocated the creation of a political commission which should prepare for the coming Zionist Congress an effective slogan for the future Zionist work. Meer Grossman, Revisionist leader from England, suggested an intermission in the work in Palestine and also outlined the program of the political offensive of the Executive of the Zionist Revisionists, the opposition to the Weizmann regime within the Zionist Organization.

George Hyman Named Executive Secretary of Avukah

The appointment of George M. Hyman as Executive Secretary of Avukah, the American Student Zionist Federation, was announced by Rabbi Samuel M. Blumenfield, National President. Mr. Hyman will succeed James Waterman Wise who was elected Honorary Secretary of the Organization. Mr. Hyman has recently returned from Palestine. He holds a M. A. degree from Columbia University, was former director of club activities at the Central Jewish Institute and for the last two years served as assistant registrar at the Hebrew University.

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onable argument is that the Commission never expressed its dissatisfaction before but why should the Commission have done so if it heard from the English and the Jews alike that everything was all right?"

Why then, does the Mandatory Power justify its lack of assistance to the Jewish National Home by these rights?"

Former Judge Greenbaum Is Dead at Seventy-six

Funeral services for former Justice Samuel Greenbaum, of the Supreme Court, who retired from the Appellate Division in 1923 after being on the bench for 21 years, and who died Monday at the age of 76, were held yesterday in the West End Funeral Parlors.

Justice Greenbaum was one of the founders of the Educational Alliance and served for many years either as its president or first vice-president. Among other organizations of which he was a member are the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, the Baron de Hirsch Fund, the Jewish Welfare Board, the Society of Medical Jurisprudence, the Jewish Historical Society and the New York Public Library, of which he was a trustee.

Henry Siegel, Former Wealthy Department Store Magnate, Dead

Funeral services for Henry Siegel, former president of the Siegel Stores Corporation and at one time one of the wealthiest and most prominent businessmen in the city, who died last Monday, were held yesterday from his home in Hackensack, N.
