

## Death Sentence on 3 Polish Jews Annulled by Court

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Aug. 28.—The Polish Court of Appeals today annulled the decision of the Lemberg Court of Assizes in sentencing to death three Jews from Lemberg for belonging to the Communist Party and for Communist activities. The Court of Appeals has submitted the sentence to the Lemberg Court of Assizes for revision.

The three Jews who had been sentenced to death were Samuel Jugend, 22, a minor government official; Naf-tali Propper, 22, and Israel Hirsch, 23.

## Jews Quit Austrian Health Resort Because of Anti-Semitism

Vienna, Aug. 28.—Many Jewish visitors to the Styrian health resort, Poellau, have left because of anti-Semitic disturbances. Anti-Semitic songs echoed through the town, Jewish visitors were molested, and some Jewish houses threatened by the rowdies. Even near the police station the shouts against the Jews were heard. Fearing serious trouble the Jewish visitors have cut short their holidays and left.

## Suspect Murder in Death of Palestine Jew in Lebanon

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the name of the Palestinian Jew found dead near the railroad tracks in Zahle, Lebanon today was not, as had first been reported, Michael Benjamin, but Benjamin Lifshitz of Tel Aviv. He is 43 years old and left a widow and three children. His brother is secretary of the Haifa Jewish Chamber of Commerce.

While the Lebanon press termed Lifshitz's death suicide a group of Beirut Jews have written a letter to the Palestinian press expressing their suspicion that he was murdered and urging an investigation.

## Hebron Arabs Demand End of "Pro-Zionist Policy"

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—A memorandum demanding the abolition of the Palestine government's "pro-Zionist policy," the stoppage of Jewish immigration, the abolition of the collective fines imposed on the Arab villages after the riots of last year, greater compensation to the Arabs affected by the riots and the release of all Arabs sentenced to prison as a result of the riots was presented to the Acting High Commissioner, Mark Aitchison Young, today by a delegation of Arabs from Hebron.

## Palestine Must Become Bi-National State, Weizmann Tells Actions Committee

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Aug. 28.—In a speech that appears to pave the way for a rapprochement with the Arabs and with the British government, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization and of the Jewish Agency, speaking at the session of the World Zionist Actions Committee, created a sensation when, in using the word "bi-national" for the first time in referring to Palestine, he declared that "we must agree to Palestine becoming a bi-national state. It is impossible to continue the talk about a Jewish State as we did during the period when the world was engaged in war. Our present slogan must be 'peaceful cooperation.'"

Pointing out that it is necessary "to change our mental outlook and to consider reality," Dr. Weizmann said, "We cannot drive the Arabs out of Palestine. Two nations must exist in Palestine." He told the Actions Committee that the Zionists had now sub-

## Voevod on Vacation; Maniu Assumes Interior Portfolio

Bucharest, Aug. 28.—In view of what appears to be the subsidizing of the anti-Semitic agitation, Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod, Roumanian minister of the interior, is leaving for a month's vacation at Carlsbad. Premier Maniu will, temporarily, take over the portfolio of the minister of the interior, which the Roumanian press is welcoming. The "Adevarul" remarks that at least for one month there will be peace.

## Arab and Jewish Settlers Seek Release of Tithes

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—A joint delegation of Jewish settlers from the Emek and the neighboring Arab villagers today called upon the district officer at Nazareth to urge again the release of the tithes this year as a loan to the cultivators who are suffering from the ravages of the plague of field mice which has done great damage to this year's crops in the Emek.

## Jewish Cemetery in Silesian Town Totally Destroyed

Berlin, Aug. 28.—A revival of the desecrations of Jewish cemeteries in Germany is seen in the total destruction of the old Jewish cemetery at Kieferstaedt, Silesia. The vandals escaped. There is no longer a Jewish community in Kieferstaedt.

## French Police Nip Plan to Counterfeit Palestine Money

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—The watchfulness of the French frontier police on the Syrian-Lebanon border today frustrated what appeared to be an attempt to counterfeit Palestinian money on a large scale. Suspicious of a car crossing the border, the police stopped it and found that it contained a complete plant for making counterfeit Palestine notes and currency, in addition to electrotpe plates. Considerable money was also found in the possession of the chauffeur who was arrested and taken to Beirut for questioning.

## Lubarsky, Agro-Joint's Chief Agronomist, Arrested in Russia

Berlin, Aug. 28.—Confirmation of reports reaching here yesterday from Russia that George Lubarsky, chief agronomist of the Agro-Joint, American Jewish Joint Agricultural Corporation, which carries on agricultural activities in Russia, had been arrested in Russia, was obtained here today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency from Dr. Joseph Rosen, director of the Agro-Joint, who is here to consult with Dr. Bernard Kahn, European director of the Joint Distribution Committee.

While the reason for Mr. Lubarsky's arrest is not known, Dr. Rosen told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that it had no connection with his Agro-Joint activities and he expected that Lubarsky would be released shortly.

## Protest Court Trials on Second Day of Rosh Hashonah

Budapest, Aug. 28.—A serious conflict has arisen between Jewish lawyers here and the Royal Central District Court because a number of cases have been put on the calendar for the second day of Rosh Hashonah, September 24. The Jewish lawyers contend that the second day of Rosh Hashonah is also a legally recognized Jewish festival but the court insists that it only recognizes the first day. The Jewish lawyers have decided to take their protest to the highest authorities.

## Say Transjordania Preparing For Attack by Ibn Saud

Cairo, August 28.—The Cairo daily, "El Mokkatom," reports today that the Transjordanian government is fortifying the country at various strategic points in anticipation of an attack by Ibn Saud. Other Egyptian papers state that Palestine is taking measures to forestall an expected Arab attack on British authority.

## Zionists Throughout Country Prepare for Larger Program

A concerted attempt by Zionists throughout the country to increase the membership of the Zionist Organization of America and to secure the co-operation of additional forces, both in the officers of the districts and in the enrollment, is now in full swing, according to a preliminary outline of activities issued by Jacob de Haas, Chairman for Organization.

Two of the most important events are to be held in the first two weeks of September in Chicago and Boston, where programs will be drawn up to stimulate membership activities throughout the region. The Zionists of Chicago have called a regional conference for September 7. Miss Pearl Franklin is chairman of the Conference committee, which includes such well-known figures as Judge Harry M. Fisher, Rabbi Solomon Goldman, Max Shulman, H. Steinberg, Dr. A. E. Abramowitz and H. L. Meites.

This conference will also be attended by representatives of the Peninsula district which includes the Zionists of Green Bay and communities north of that. It is understood that these conferences will work out a method of co-operation with the local districts whereby officers who are not functioning will be replaced with those who will devote themselves actively to building up the Zionist movement.

A conference of New England Zionists will be held at the Elysium Club, Boston, on September 14. James D. Glunts, temporary chairman of the New England Region, has appointed Julius Meyer as Chairman of the Conference Committee, which has the assistance of numerous other Zionists from every part of the region, who are anxious that they shall be the first to record an enlarged enrollment in the Zionist Organization.

## Rabbi Newman, Speaking at Z.O.A.'s Memorial Exercises For Palestine Martyrs, Sees New Dawn Rising for Zionist Movement

At the first religious service ever sponsored by the Zionist Organization of America, in commemoration of the first anniversary of the death of 134 Jews who were killed in the Palestine riots last August, Rabbi Louis I. Newman, in his first sermon at the Rodeph Sholom Temple, last night, declared that "a new dawn is rising in Zionism", and characterized the report of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations on Palestine as a sign that Zionism has "recovered the understanding and favorable opinion of the world without".

The exercises at the Rodeph Sholom, which marked the first large public gathering at the new temple which recently elected Rabbi Newman of San Francisco to its pulpit, were part of a nation-wide series of similar memorial meetings in tribute to the Palestine Jewish martyrs. Mr. Jacob De Haas, Chairman for Organization of the Zionist Organization of America, who presided at the exercises, pointed out:

"This is, as far as I am aware, the first occasion on which the Zionist Organization of America has sponsored a purely religious service. I trust we may regard it as significant of the new approach between the various elements of Jewry that we have been permitted for this purpose to meet in this new beautiful temple."

### Up to England to Speak

Saying that now that the League of Nations has spoken its mind, it is for England to "speak with similar confidence in the Zionist ideal", Rabbi Newman declared that "Britain has everything to gain and nothing to lose from a recognition that the mistakes of the past must be rectified, and an affirmative program of statesmanlike counsel and aid must be pursued".

The memorial exercises last night marked Rabbi Newman's entry into the New York rabbinate, to which he has come after a distinguished career in California. He is one of the eighteen composing the Administration of the Zionist Organization of America.

During the course of his memorial address, Rabbi Newman said:

"A new dawn is rising in Zionism. Coincident with the anniversary of the riots the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations has issued its judgment as to the causes and responsibility for the bloodshed in Palestine. One year of agony, despair and uncertainty has passed; now at last the Zionist movement has regained its power within, and has recovered the understanding and favorable opinion of the world without. It is wrong to make overconfidence or unrealistic optimism the mood of the hour, but it may be safely affirmed that Zionism is once more on the road to success from which it has been diverted in the past few years by a number of factors culminating in the Arab assaults of 1929."

### Britain and Israel

"With the blood of Zion's martyrs

whom we now commemorate, let Britain and Israel seal anew the compact of friendship and co-operation on behalf of the building of the Jewish homeland. We appeal to the British people to re-affirm with clarity and vigor its ardent Zionist sentiment of a decade ago. Now that the Mandates Commission has spoken, let England speak with similar confidence in the Zionist ideal. Britain has everything to gain and nothing to lose from recognition of the fact that the mistakes of the past must be rectified, and an affirmative program of statesmanlike counsel and aid must be pursued.

"Britain's prestige will be enormously heightened and history will be further indebted to her, if she bend every effort to the achievement of the Zionist (Continued on Page 4)

## Snell to Address Hadassah Convention in Buffalo

Harry Snell, Labor member of the British Parliament, will address the sixteenth annual convention of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, to be held in Buffalo, October 26, 27 and 28, it was announced at the Hadassah headquarters yesterday. Mr. Snell, who was a member of the Shaw Commission that investigated the causes of last Summer's riots in Palestine and who presented a minority report differing sharply from the conclusions drawn by the other members, will make his address on the first day of the convention.

Mr. Snell is coming to the United States at the invitation of the American Jewish Congress and in order to make it possible for him to be present Hadassah has postponed its convention from October 19.

Delegates from nearly every state in the country will attend the convention, which will consider a number of problems affecting health work in Palestine. Reports will be presented by the national chairmen of the work of Hadassah in America and Palestine. One of the most important of these will be the report of Mrs. Edward Jacobs, chairman of the Palestine Committee, who will return shortly from Europe and Palestine.

Considerable interest will center around a memorandum prepared by Miss Henrietta Szold, founder and honorary president of Hadassah, on the enlargement of women's work for Palestine, in which she suggests that the women of the world undertake the non-economic development of Palestine as their special task.

## Jewish "Talkie" to Be Shown on Broadway

Broadway is to have its first Jewish talking picture in September. It will be produced by the Judea Film Company under the direction of Sidney M. Goldin and will feature Bella Gudinsky, Jewish actress.

## Yiddish Press Sees in Report of Mandates Body Veering of World Opinion Towards Jews

Hailing the report of the Mandates Commission on the Palestine riots of 1929 and the Commission's criticism of the British government's failure to carry out the obligations of the Palestine Mandate, the Yiddish press of New York, editorially commenting on the report, sees in its tone and text an indication that world public opinion is now veering towards the support of the Jewish claims in Palestine and away from the British and Arab contentions.

"The Day" finds that the Mandates Commission's report is the first hand that the world has extended to the Jews to support them in "their battle with the dark powers of the British Colonial Office. It is the first ray of light that has fallen from the outside world into our midst." Seeing in the report a pleasant surprise for the Jews and an unpleasant one for the British government, "The Day" notes that the report marks the first occasion in Jewish history in which "an international body expressing the opinions of almost all the powers of the world has upheld the Jews in their case against such a great power as England."

S. Judson, in the "Jewish Morning Journal," is of the opinion that if the League of Nations had hitherto only been "the conscience of the world," in theory, the report of the Mandates Commission makes it so in fact as well. No group of people, he says, coming from any one individual country and from one definite camp could have had such a wide view on such a matter as the Jewish-English-Arab complication in Palestine. "Only a world-representative body . . . could have reached the conclusions that the Mandates Commission arrived at."

"The Forward," the Socialist Party's organ, characterizes the report as a happy event for the Jews because since the investigations in Palestine began "they have received one blow after another." Comparing the report of the Mandates Commission to the minority report of Harry Snell in the Shaw Commission's report, the "Forward" is of the opinion that the criticism leveled against the British government was not meant for the Labor government but was intended for the previous Conservative governments under whose regime, the "Forward" recalls, most of the "sins of omission and commission" were made.

## Strickland Leaves for Home

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—C. F. Strickland, British Colonial Office expert on co-operatives, who has been investigating the possibility of the extension of Arab co-operatives here for the past few weeks, left for home today. In the course of his probe he had extended his study to include the co-operatives of the Jewish settlers which he declared were among the finest in the world.

## Messages of Tribute to Late Lucien Wolf Pouring In

London, Aug. 28.—A special meeting of the Board of Jewish Deputies was held here to pay tribute to the late Lucien Wolf who was secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board and of the Anglo-Jewish Association. O. E. d'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board and vice-president of the Anglo-Jewish Association; Leonard G. Montefiore, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, and Morris Myer spoke.

A resolution expressing sorrow at Mr. Wolf's death and praising the services he rendered not only to world Jewry but to oppressed minorities, homeless refugees and persons deprived of citizenship by the War, was passed by the members of the Board standing in silent tribute.

Messages of condolence at the passing of Mr. Wolf, who had come to be known as the foreign minister of the Jews, are pouring in from all parts of the world. Messages were received today from the American Jewish Committee, the Royal Institute of International Affairs, the Roumanian charge d'affaires, the International Migration Service at Geneva, various Jewish communities in all parts of the world, the foreign ministers of various countries, Dr. Bernard Kahn, European director of the Joint Distribution Committee, the Hias, the Jewish Colonization Association, and the director of the Minorities Section of the League of Nations.

## Depositors in Bankrupt

### Artisans' Bank Lose \$82,816

Warsaw, Aug. 28.—A total of \$82,816 or 73 percent of the capital of 922,000 zlotys (\$103,448) will be lost by many Jewish artisans as a result of the liquidation of the Jewish Artisans' Bank. After a stormy meeting an acting committee was elected to attempt to rehabilitate the institution. While the balance sheet shows this large loss to the depositors other cooperative banks will not be affected by the liquidation of the Jewish Artisans Bank.

## Cohane Elected to Committee of American Bar Association

Detroit, Aug. 28.—Louis B. Cohane, local Jewish attorney, was honored at the annual convention of the American Bar Association in Chicago by being elected to the executive committee of the section on criminal law and criminology.

Mr. Cohane is also a member of the Psychiatric Jurisprudence Committee of the American Bar Association. This committee's report was accepted by the convention with the recommendation that a survey be made of psychiatric service to courts by the American Social Service Research Council.

## See Mandates Body's Report Influenced by Successful Jewish "Propaganda"

London, Aug. 28.—Claiming that the Mandates Commission's disapproval of Great Britain's Palestine policy is "undoubtedly due to the effectiveness of Jewish propaganda at Geneva, both verbal and written which was successful this year," "Near East and India," a magazine reputedly close to the Colonial Office, in commenting on the Mandates Commission's report, says that the "criticism of Geneva is not a bad thing but it is not helpful. The art of government is better inculcated through the medium of experienced counsellors than through doctrinaire schoolmasters which the Mandates Commission on this occasion has shown itself to be. It is hoped that the Council of the League of Nations will realize this."

"Near East and India" is annoyed because it feels that "much of the Mandates Commission's criticism rests apparently on statements emanating from the Jewish Agency. These statements were known to the British government. They had been carefully weighed and some discounted. It is with a certain dismay that the Mandatory Power sees the Mandates Commission accepting ex parte statements as the final truth."

Taking issue with this view, Leonard Stein, a member of the Council of the Jewish Agency, points out, in a letter to the "London Times," that the Memorandum of the Jewish Agency was not a mere piece of partisan rhetoric but a serious attempt to draw attention to certain gaps in the report of the Shaw Commission.

Mr. Stein declares that the Jewish Agency's memorandum showed, by quoting chapter and verse of the Shaw report, on some highly material points, that "its findings were inconsistent with the evidence presented at the inquiry, with the official statements of the British and Palestine governments and in some cases with relevant passages in the report itself."

## New England Y's to Meet in Cambridge Aug. 29-Sept. 1

Cambridge, Mass., Aug. 28.—The twentieth annual convention of the Associated Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Associations of New England will be held here during the Labor Day week-end.

The first session of the convention will be held Friday, August 29, with religious services at the Temple Ashkenaz. George E. Gordon, president of the Associated Y's, will speak. As part of the program planned for Saturday's session army planes will circle over Harvard Square where the convention will be held. A reception and dance will be held in the evening at the Hotel Commander. The officials of the association will be tendered a luncheon at noon by officials of the city government. Mayor Richard M. Russell will be the chief speaker.

ist objective. The Mandate over Palestine stands in a unique category; it is of interest, not to Britain or Jewry alone, but to all the nations.

"If England seems to be indignant at the criticisms of the Mandates Commission, let it be remembered that the Commission looks forward, not backward. It aims to repair the harm done to Palestine by the endeavor to pass over lightly the chief responsibility for the outbreaks. Now that the opinion of the world is set right, let England set its own policy in the right direction. England offers to look favorably upon any constructive recommendations the League Commission can offer. We have faith in England's sincerity and are certain that her leaders will confer with Jewish leaders and with all others concerned with Zion's future, so that the work set in motion so zealously a decade ago may be impaired no further. A policy by Britain ensuring political stability will open the doors to the investment of capital from which all classes of the Palestine population will increasingly prosper."

### De Haas Speaks

In the course of his brief remarks, Mr. De Haas said:

"At Masada in the year 72, a thousand lives peacefully closed so that a nation might be reborn. In Palestine, in that same small land which is the web and woof of all our dreams, just one year ago one hundred and thirty-four Jews gave their lives so that this same nation might continue to live. Time knows no similar story. By their blood we are sanctified. By their faith are we enriched. By their hopes are we strengthened.

"The challenge of old Masada was answered in Safed and Hebron, after the lapse of eighteen centuries. Humbly we trust, loyally we pledge ourselves ever to meet the challenge so that our people may continue, so the end we seek may be achieved."

In addition to the reading of the list of 125 Palestine martyrs, the names of the eight American students who had been killed during the Arab attack on the Yeshiva at Hebron were also memorialized. These included: William

Berman, Philadelphia; Aaron David Epstein, Chicago; Harry Fromen, New York; Wolf Greenberg, New York; Benjamin Horwitz, Brooklyn; Hyman Krasner, Chicago; David Sheinberg, Memphis; and Jacob Wexler, Chicago.

The memorial prayers for the dead, which included a sixteenth century version of the martyrs' prayer, "Oleinu Leshabeach", were recited by Cantor Nathan G. Meltzoff.

## Los Angeles Honors Memory of Palestine Victims

Los Angeles, Aug. 28.—The Jewish community of Los Angeles observed the anniversary of the death of the one hundred and twenty-five Jewish victims of Arabian riots, at a memorial meeting held at Temple Sinai, Wednesday evening, August 27, under the auspices of the Zionist District, the Mizrahi Organization, and the Poale Zionists of Los Angeles. Aaron Riche, president of the Zionist District, presided.

The program was prepared by Mr. Riche, M. Tannenbaum, president of the Mizrahi, and Dr. Nathan S. Saltzman, president of the Poale Zionists. Rabbi Raphael Gold, of Dallas, Texas, and Dr. Louis G. Reynolds, well known orator and Hebrew scholar, were among the principal speakers.

## Site for Pittsburgh Zionist Colony in Palestine Purchased

Notwithstanding the turbulent period through which life in Palestine passed during the last nine months as a result of the anti-Jewish Arab riots of a year ago, the Jewish National Fund has added considerable stretches of land to its possessions during the same period, according to a report received through the Jewish National Fund of America, and made public by Emanuel Newman, president.

The purchase of a site for an American Zionist colony in Palestine, to be known as Nachlath Pittsburgh, was completed during the period, the report states. The land on which the colony will be erected is located in the Western part of the Valley of Jezreel and comprises an area of 2,287 dunams. The project was initiated by the Zionists of Pittsburgh, Pa., who contributed up to date the initial sum of \$30,000 for the purpose.

## Benny Leonard Joins Faculty of City College

Benny Leonard, noted boxer who retired as the undefeated lightweight champion of the world, has joined the faculty of the School of Business at the College of the City of New York as an instructor in boxing. He will take up his new duties at the beginning of the Fall semester. He will also aid in coaching the varsity boxing team. Leonard will give instruction in boxing to the students in the commerce division.

mitted a detail memorandum to the British government regarding their demands but that, while "we have won friends and have spoken sharply to the government, England also has to deal with the Moslem world in India and Egypt."

The aim of the Zionists, Dr. Weizmann explained, is not a Jewish State but "the creation of the material foundation for an autonomous and productive Jewish unit. Why should we debate about a Jewish State or a National Home? Let us better draw up a program for the colonization of 40,000 families in Palestine within the next ten years. We have submitted our program to the English government, but the carrying out of the program is up to the government. There is also a possibility of a gradual understanding with the Arabs. We must carry on our work step by step."

Referring to the present difficult political situation of Zionism, Dr. Weizmann said, "We have conducted a strong fight during the last year. If we have not achieved everything it is due to objective reasons. If ten members of the Actions Committee think that they can conduct the politics better than I, I am ready to resign. It is easy for Gruenbaum to fight from the tribune, but when he will be asked to carry over the responsibility we shall then see his results." Gruenbaum is the Polish Zionist leader who has often demanded Dr. Weizmann's resignation.

## Found Hebrew Research Library in Los Angeles

Los Angeles, Aug. 28.—Rabbi S. M. Neches, a well-known Hebrew scholar and rabbi of the Breed Street Synagogue, is the instigator of a movement for the establishment of a Hebrew Research library in Los Angeles. A group of prominent students of Hebrew and Jewish literature and culture met at the Modern Social Center last night, and elected Dr. George J. Saylin as chairman of the organization to be known as "The Hebrew Library Association."

Rabbi Neches, who has one of the finest libraries in the Southwest of Judea and Hebraica, stated that the purpose of this organization was to foster Jewish and Hebrew Culture and Literature, and the gathering of material for a center of Hebrew studies.

## Campaigns for Legionnaires, Tel Hai Funds in Detroit

Detroit, Aug. 28.—Plans are being formulated for two campaigns to be conducted among Detroit Jews for the legionnaires' colonization fund and the Tel Hai Fund for sports and physical training of the Jewish youth.

The Zionist District of Detroit has pledged its cooperation to a legionnaires' committee to aid it in soliciting \$25,000 among Detroit Jews toward the national quota of \$300,000 for the settling of 200 legionnaire families in Palestine.

A conference of organizations has been called for Sept. 7 to arrange for the legionnaires' campaign.
