

Agency's Closing Session Approves \$3,325,000 Budget, Elects New Executive and Adopts Resolutions Clarifying Attitude Toward British Government, Arabs and Mandates Commission

Berlin, Sept. 3—With the election of a new Jewish Agency Executive, the adoption of a budget of \$3,325,000, and the passage of four resolutions making clear the attitude of the Jewish Agency towards the British government, the Palestine Arabs and the Mandates Commission, the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, in session since last Friday, closed its sessions here. All of the resolutions were adopted without much discussion.

The closing address was made by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the Jewish Agency. He thanked Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Administrative Committee, in the name of the gathering, and pointed out that throughout the sessions no split front had existed between Zionists and non-Zionists, but rather mixed voting regarding a number of questions on which some Zionists voted with non-Zionists against a similarly combined opposition. He closed his address with an appeal for a larger organization, the purchase of more land and the doing of more work for Palestine.

The first of the four resolutions points out that in view of the British government's announcement that it would formulate its policy regarding the future development of Palestine after receiving Sir John Simpson's report, "the Jewish Agency expects Great Britain to consider the memorandum submitted to it by the Executive of the Jewish Agency, and also to recommend such a constructive program as will be calculated in accordance with the Mandate to secure the establishment of the Jewish National Home. The Administrative Committee announces that the Jewish Agency is prepared to cooperate fully with the British government in working out such a program".

Welcomes Mandates Body's Findings

In its second resolution the Administrative Committee welcomes the conclusions of the Mandates Commission which "confirm the necessity for an

active and dynamic policy by Great Britain to develop in Palestine such economic, political and administrative conditions as will secure the establishment of the Jewish National Home."

The Administrative Committee also confirms the statement of the political situation as adopted by the Jewish Agency's political commission on June 27. In this statement the political commission pointed out that while it did not cast any doubt on the competence or impartiality of Sir John Simpson, who has completed a survey into problems of land settlement, immigration and development in Palestine, it could not accept an expert's report as the verdict on the future of the Jewish National Home.

The political commission also announced at that time that the Jewish National Home is the central purpose of the Palestine Mandate and the only policy which can be pursued by the Mandatory power is already fixed, namely, at all times to encourage the maximum Jewish immigration compatible with the absorptive capacity of Palestine. The Administrative Committee also endorsed the political commission's statement that it "will not spare any honorable effort to secure

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Late Lucien Wolf Eulogized at League Refugee Conference

Geneva, Sept. 3—The late Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Jewish Deputies and the Anglo-Jewish Association was eulogized today by M. de Navailles Labatut, the representative of France, who is acting as chairman of the League of Nations Inter-Governmental Refugee Commission whose conference opened here today. Mr. Wolf was a technical advisor of the Commission which was organized at his suggestion.

National Minorities Bureau's Congress Opens in Geneva

Geneva, Sept. 3—The annual congress of the Bureau of National Minorities opened here today under the chairmanship of the Bureau's president, Dr. Josef Wilfan of Italy. In his opening address Dr. Wilfan expressed regret at the absence of Leo Motzkin, Jewish representative from France, who is ill. Among the Jewish delegates present are Deputy M. Nurk of Latvia and Dr. J. Robinson of Lithuania.

See Austrian Heimwehr's New Head Aiding Anti-Semitism

Vienna, Sept. 3—The Austrian Heimwehr, Austria's private nationalist militia, is openly adopting an anti-Semitic character and may become a separate political party, the Socialist press here forecasts in commenting on the sudden resignation of the Heimwehr leaders, M. Steidle and M. M. Pfriemer, who have been replaced by Prince Stahremberg who now becomes the sole leader of the Heimwehr.

It is said that Prince Stahremberg has close connections with the Hitlerites in Germany. In other quarters, however, it is reported that Prince Stahremberg is seeking to restore peace between the Heimwehr and Chancellor Schober together with the big industrialists who are supporting the anti-Marxist parties without regard to religion. It is known, however, that the Heimwehr meetings under Prince Stahremberg's leadership have been more anti-Semitic than those under the former leaders.

When Major Waldemar Pabst, ex-generalissimo of the Heimwehr, was expelled from Austria last June by Chancellor Schober as an undesirable alien it was expected to result in a weakening of anti-Semitism in the ranks of the Heimwehr, because Major Pabst favored close contact with Adolph Hitler and his anti-Semitic National Socialists in Germany. Shortly after Major Pabst's expulsion, Dr. Steidle, now out as the Heimwehr leader, charged in the Austrian parliament that Chancellor Schober had been influenced by the larger "Jewish liberal dailies" in expelling Major Pabst.

Sees New World War If Hitler Wins in Germany's Election

Berlin, Sept. 3—A new world war will be the result of a victory by the anti-Semitic National Socialists (Fascists) led by Adolph Hitler in the forthcoming German elections, the Frankfurter Zeitung, one of the most important papers in Germany, warns today. Disclosing that Hitler's proposed foreign policy consists first of the immediate breaking up of the Young Plan and then a sudden union of Germany, England and Italy against France and Russia, the Frankfurter Zeitung sharply attacks him for this dangerous scheme.

The paper points out that "Hitler knows that England would not enter such an alliance with Germany but it would be explained as due to 'Britain's being chained by international Jewry.' Hitler, however, hopes that Great Britain may succeed in breaking 'the Jewish chains' and thus making possible a German-British-Italian alliance."

Cuzists Seeking Fascist

Dictatorship for Roumania

Bucharest, Sept. 3—Manifestos bearing the picture of Professor Alexander Cuza, Roumanian anti-Semitic chieftain, and declaring that only a Fascist dictatorship can save Roumania, have appeared placarded over the streets of Bucharest. The manifestos recommend Professor Cuza as the best candidate for dictator.

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Original Idea Earns Millions for Jewish Business Man

An original idea which he hit upon two years ago of setting up for firms offices with a staff of stenographers, a communal telephone exchange, etc., has earned for Herman Levy, New York Jewish business man, a million dollars a year. Mr. Levy, who is now forty-five, started his career by selling newspapers on the lower East Side at night.

After the war Mr. Levy became a salesman. While making frequent visits to offices and office buildings he noticed that stenographers and other clerks were wasting too much time and were being paid too much for the amount of work they did. It occurred to him then that a communal staff of office assistants, paid to do only what the tenant wanted done, would mean a saving of expense to each office employer.

Mr. Levy's corporation now serves more than 1,000 individual offices in New York in this way. He has signed contracts that bring under his control more than 250,000 feet of office space at a yearly rental cost of more than \$1,000,000.

Herzfeld, One of Oldest Members of Stock Exchange, Dead at 78

Deal, N. J., Sept. 3.—The New York Stock Exchange lost one of its oldest members in the death here yesterday of Felix Herzfeld, a special partner in the firm of Herzfeld & Stern. Mr. Herzfeld, who was 78, had been a member of the Stock Exchange for 46 years. Retiring from active business in 1920 he sold his seat on the Exchange in 1925. Active in a number of Jewish philanthropies he had particularly been interested in the work of the Hebrew Technical School for Girls of which he was a trustee.

Rabbis Philipson, Wolsey Back Schulman's Attack on Zionism; Rabbi Heller Criticizes It

Cincinnati, Sept. 3.—Three American Reform rabbis, two non-Zionists and one Zionist, have responded to the American Israelite's invitation to comment on Dr. Samuel Schulman's recent characterization, in Temple Emanu-El of New York City, of Zionism as a "spiritual escape."

The non-Zionists are Dr. David Philipson, honorary president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and rabbi of Cincinnati's Rockdale Avenue Temple; and Rabbi Louis Wolsey, rabbi of Temple Rodeph Shalom of Philadelphia and past president of the C. C. A. R. The Zionist is Rabbi James G. Heller, rabbi of Plum Street Temple of Cincinnati and chairman of the Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, 1929-30. No reply has been received from the other outstanding Zionists invited by the Israelite to comment.

"May it not be possible that Dr. Schulman has too narrow a definition of spirituality?" says Rabbi Heller. "The prophets would not have sneered at the Chaltzitim."

"I would personally go even further than this. There is some hope for an agnostic or an atheist who is a staunch and courageous man and who will give his life and endure untold hardships for an ideal. It may be heterodox, and I suppose I lay myself open to excommunication, if there were such a thing nowadays, but I have no hesitation in admitting that I greatly prefer such an atheist or agnostic to many of our weakening worshippers."

"Nationalism is either good or bad. I have always been unable to understand the combination, which is again that of Dr. Schulman, of opposition to Jewish nationalism on the score that it is backward and retrogressive, with the defensive assurance of our patriotism in the various lands in which we dwell."

"My own interest in Zionism is surely not because I am a rabid nationalist. Strange, is it not, that some of us have ventured to speak out against American nationalist aberrations and hypertrophies, while our exponents of the 'Jewish mission' and our ardent Jewish anti-nationalists are of the variety who consistently make the eagle scream?"

"Zionism is a policy of despair, a surrender of the universalistic mission of Judaism," says Dr. David Philipson. "When I once declared that Reform Judaism and political Zionism are incompatible, that statement called forth clamorous disclaimers from rabbis who wanted to march under both flags—Zionism and Reform Judaism. Now as then, I hold that Jewish nationalism, the chief article in the Zionist creed, and universalism, the teaching of Reform Judaism, are incompatible."

"I am an American nationalist and a Jewish religiousist. The Zionist is a Jewish nationalist and religiously he may run the gamut from extreme orthodoxy to sheer unbelief. In Zionism

Critical Condition of Yeshivah College and Parochial Schools Discussed by Vaad Harabonim

The critical financial condition of the Yeshivah College and the Jewish parochial schools of New York City is the leading topic of discussion of the convention of the Vaad Harabonim, a federation of Orthodox rabbis of New York City, which opened on Tuesday at the Broadway Central Hotel and which was continued yesterday. About 140 Orthodox rabbis from New York City and vicinity are attending the convention.

A plan for systematizing both the Talmud Torah and parochial Jewish education in New York City was presented to the convention and in an address by Rabbi Telushkin. To relieve the Yeshivah somewhat of their present financial burdens Rabbi Predmesky pointed out that since several Yeshivah in one district have separate high schools which they are unable to support, they should combine into one high school. Two committees which are to report on a system of financing the Yeshivah were chosen by the convention. A committee was also appointed to study the proposal that the Vaad Harabonim take over the Yeshivah Rabbi Solomon Kluger.

The convention was opened by Rabbi M. Gussik. Rabbi Feivelson, director of the Vaad Harabonim, read a long report about the activities of the organization, which consisted mainly of giving aid to the Yeshivah that were either closed or were in need. Rabbi Feivelson also reported about the activities of the "Vaad" in combating the action of self-styled rabbis who issue permits to women to marry without a religious divorce. The observance of kashruth and Sabbath were among the other activities with which the "Vaad" concerned itself during the past year.

Orthodox Rabbis Appeal for \$150,000 for Yeshiva College

In view of the grave situation that has arisen in respect to the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary and Yeshiva College, which threatens the future of this seat of Jewish learning, the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada has issued an appeal calling upon American Jewry to contribute immediately the sum of \$150,000.

The appeal is signed by Rabbi L. Silver, president; Rabbi M. S. Margolies, Rabbi B. L. Leventhal, Rabbi Israel Rosenberk and Rabbi Bernard Revel, honorary presidents; and Rabbi I. L. Seltzer, secretary.

Trotsky to Give Up All Politics for Literature

Vienna, Sept. 3.—Leon Trotsky, exiled Soviet leader, has definitely abandoned all of his political activities and will henceforth devote himself entirely to his literary work, according to an interview obtained with M. Trotsky by the Bucharest paper, "Epoca."

Keystone "Ys" Urged to Economize But Not to Curtail Their Work During Depression

Easton, Pa., Sept. 3.—That the work of the Y.M.H.A.'s and Y.W.H.A.'s of the state of Pennsylvania should not be retarded by the present financial depression was decided at the annual state convention held at Bushkill Falls, near here, for the past several days. About 500 members of the Y.M.H.A.'s and Y.W.H.A.'s from all parts of the state were present at the convention.

All organizations in the State were urged to economize as much as possible, but not to curtail their usual activities to aid Jewish young men and women and to further promote Judaism.

Milton J. Kolansky, of Carbondale, former chairman of the state executive committee, was elected president. Jack Sher, of Easton, one of the most active Y.M.H.A. workers in the state and secretary of the Easton organization, was named chairman of the Third district. His duty will be to look after the cultural activities of the district.

Zangwill Letters Presented to Hebrew University Library

Cleveland, Sept. 3.—A batch of letters written by Israel Zangwill during October and November 1905, when the Jewish Territorial Organization was formed, were presented to the Hebrew University library in Jerusalem by Isaac Carmel of Cleveland, who, during this period, was in England, was active in the Zionist movement, and was one of the supporters of the movement led by Mr. Zangwill.

Mr. Carmel also dispatched a letter addressed to him, written by hand, by the late Jacob Moser of Bradford, England, who was once Lord Mayor of Bradford, and who made possible the erection of the Herzlia Gymnasium in Tel Aviv, Palestine. Mr. Moser had also built the Herzl-Moser Institute, and also a Jewish hospital in Leeds, England. Mr. Moser's letter was addressed to Mr. Carmel, dated January 1920, in response to greetings extended to him by Mr. Carmel, on the occasion of his eightieth birthday. In this letter, the noted philanthropist claims as the greatest achievement of his life his having made possible the establishment of the first Hebrew high school in the world, in memory of the founder of Zionism, Dr. Theodor Herzl.

Pioneer Montana Jew Dies in Helena at 72

Helena, Mont., Sept. 3.—David Marks, 72, veteran political leader of Montana, is dead. Mr. Marks came up the Missouri River by steamboat shortly after the Civil War, and was one of Montana's best known pioneer citizens. At the time of his death he was secretary of the Democratic state Central Committee. He had been active in politics during his entire residence here.

Jew Named to Roster of Men Who Have Contributed Most to Progress of Chemistry Here

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 3.—Dr. Moses Gomberg, professor of chemistry at the University of Michigan here, is on a roster of men who have contributed to the progress of chemistry in America during the past century. This roster has been submitted to the National Research Council's science advisory committee for use in planning an historical chemistry exhibit at the 1933 Chicago World's Fair.

Dr. Gomberg was born in Russia in 1866. In 1890 the University of Michigan conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Science. Since 1904 he has been professor of chemistry at the University of Michigan, having previously taught at the university, first as instructor in chemistry and then as assistant professor in organic chemistry.

Dr. Gomberg received the Nichols Medal in 1914 and the Willard Gibbs Medal in 1925. He is noted for his researches in connection with trivalent carbon and free radical quino-carbonium salts, tautomerism in the triphenylmethane series, and ethylene chlorhydrin.

Jewish Leader Sees Hitlerites Gaining 80 Reichstag Seats

Berlin, Sept. 3.—That the anti-Semitic-National Socialists (Fascists) will gain 80 members in the forthcoming election for the Reichstag was the warning given by Dr. M. Weiner at a press conference called by the Central Association of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, in the face of the anti-Semitic campaign being conducted by the Hitlerites. Dr. Bruno Weil, vice-president of the Association, and the candidate of the new Constitutional Party, said that the Hitlerites in the Reichstag would attack the rights the Jews have had since the emancipation, and that it would, accordingly, be the duty of the Jewish deputies to counteract these attacks.

New Haven Names Jew to Noise Abatement Board

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 3.—Fred S. Wetzler and Nathaniel Sherman were appointed today by Mayor Thomas A. Tully as members of the Noise Abatement Commission for this city. Included in the personnel of the Commission are the chief of police, the city attorney, the city health officer, and other officials. Dr. Max Mailhouse, professor emeritus of neurology at Yale, and one of the country's leading nerve specialists, is chairman of the commission.

Mr. Wetzler, who is prominent here in the legal profession, is the son-in-law of the late Col. Isaac M. Ullman, who was for many years the leader of Connecticut Jewry. Mr. Sherman is a former city editor of the New Haven "Journal-Courier" and executive secretary to the late Mayor John B. Tower.

Committee of 1,000 Will Stimulate Religious Work in Small, Unorganized Towns

Philadelphia, Sept. 3.—A. B. Cohen, president of the Eastern Pennsylvania branch of the United Synagogue of America, will head a "National Committee of One Thousand" citizens—men and women—recruited from Jewish communities throughout the land for the purpose of enlisting the active participation of the leaders of the larger communities in the religious welfare of the smaller unorganized towns, according to an announcement made yesterday by Nathan T. Levy, national president of the United Synagogue of America.

The immediate task of this "National Committee of One Thousand" will be to study the needs of these smaller communities, most of whom have no organized activity, with the view to bringing them in closer contact and under the influence of the neighboring larger communities. These latter will be called upon to serve in the capacity of big brothers and to take a paternal interest in the religious welfare of the coreligionists in these small towns. In accepting the chairmanship of this "National Committee of One Thousand," Mr. Cohen characterized its objective as a most constructive undertaking which is bound to be productive of beneficial results.

Result of Experimentation

"The present effort," Mr. Levy explained in his statement, "is the result of a number of years of successful experimentation, by the United Synagogue. The plan is the natural expansion to a national scale of work with small communities that has been conducted in more restricted areas."

Mr. Levy's statement continues with an account of the work conducted by his organization among the small communities in Long Island, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Eastern Pennsylvania.

Known in Communal Affairs

Mr. Cohen, who received his Jewish education in a Yeshiva in Lithuania, is well known in Jewish communal and general civic activities in Scranton and Philadelphia.

In addition to active participation in all the philanthropies of his home town, he was chairman of the board of City Assessors under two administrations. During the World War he served as chairman of the Jewish Welfare Board in charge of Camp Toboyhanna. The Scranton Y.M.H.A. owes much to his energy and cooperation. The drive to erect the \$300,000 Temple Israel in Scranton was headed by him.

356 Jews Entered Palestine in July

Jerusalem, Sept. 3.—Of the 441 immigrants reaching Palestine during the month of July, 356 were Jews. Of the 282 emigrants, 143 were Jews, leaving a net increase of 213 Jews.

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cooperation with the Arabs in developing the country and we call upon them to make such cooperation possible. Of the British government we ask that it look once more upon its task in Palestine in the spirit of those by whom the Balfour Declaration was conceived."

Seeks Understanding with Arabs

In connection with relations with the Arabs the Administrative Committee announced its intention to intensify efforts to reach an understanding with them and recommend the establishment of a special department for this work in the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency.

The Committee also recommended that supervision of the Jewish educational system in Palestine be transferred to a committee composed of representatives of the Jewish Agency and of the Palestine Jewish community the committee to take control with the beginning of the Jewish year 5692. Another resolution urged the coordination and cooperation of the various Jewish economic enterprises in Palestine and the establishment of coordination between them and the Jewish Agency. The Executive of the Jewish Agency is instructed by this resolution to prepare the necessary plans for coordinating these undertakings.

A concluding resolution advocates that Zionists and non-Zionists should work together for the Keren Hayesod, the chief financial instrument of the Jewish Agency, in central and local organizations. The Administrative Committee also called attention to the need for strengthening the Jewish Agency by means of increasing the interests in the work of the Jewish Agency among wider non-Zionist circles. At the same time the need for the Zionists to strengthen their basis was noted.

Chooses New Executive

The closing session lasted longer than was expected because no unity could be reached on the appointment of the Jewish Agency's Executive. This question was finally solved by the appointment of Nahum Sokolow, veteran Zionist leader, as honorary vice-president of the Jewish Agency and the election of Professor Selig Brodetsky, Rabbi Meyer Berlin, Dr. Arthur Rupin and Col. Frederick Kisch as Zionist members of the Executive, and Dr. Maurice Hexter, Dr. Bernard Kahn, Julius Simon and Dr. Werner Senator as non-Zionist members.

Of the budget of \$3,325,000 adopted \$725,000 was allocated for the payment of debts, \$600,000 additional for land and colonization, \$380,000 for education, \$430,000 for medical work, \$105,000 for the expenses of the Palestine Executive, and \$90,000 for the expenses of the London Executive. After the labor members of the Committee had put up a fight the budget was amended to include an appropriation of \$50,000 for

immigration and other matters in which they were particularly interested. Nevertheless the labor group refrained from voting for the budget because their financial demands were rejected by a vote of 10 to 9.

The question of whether a new drive for funds should be conducted in the United States was settled by a decision that Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Warburg should give the matter their immediate attention by coming into close contact with interested groups in America.

Dr. Weizmann Misquoted

Berlin, Sept. 3.—An unfortunate mutilation of the cable resulted in Dr. Chaim Weizmann being misquoted in his speech at the opening session of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency here Friday. The first report quoted Dr. Weizmann as saying, after Felix M. Warburg had spoken about Lord Passfield's declaration to him, "the declaration compels us to assume a fighting attitude toward Great Britain which is contrary to our desire. Our sincere wish remains, however, to cooperate with Great Britain on the basis of the Mandate."

What Dr. Weizmann did say was "we were compelled to adopt a fighting attitude toward Great Britain. Now, however, our wish is more than ever before to be friendly and to cooperate with Great Britain on the basis of the Mandate."
