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Mexican Government Prepared to Nationalize Synagogue Property

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mexico City, Sept. 9.—Synagogue as well as church property in Mexico will be nationalized and declared the property of the Mexican nation in accordance with the Mexican constitution, the Minister of the Interior said yesterday in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent here. The government last week took steps to nationalize the properties of the Methodist and other Protestant churches, just as it had done formerly with the property of the Catholic Church.

The Jews of Mexico, comparatively few in number, and most of them recent immigrants, as yet own no synagogue property, conducting their services in rented halls. The government, however, does not intend to permit this in the future. It will give the Jews a few years time in which to build their own synagogues, until which time they will be permitted to conduct services in rented halls. The Sephardic Jews, however, have two synagogues which are worth about 50,000 pesos; after these are nationalized the Jews will be able to pray in them as formerly.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent also asked the Minister about the recent statement made by the Mexican Consul in New York with regard to the curtailment of Jewish and Chinese immigration into Mexico. The impression which the correspondent got from the Minister was that this statement has a foundation in fact, because he said that "this limitation also applies to Syrians and Lebanese."

At the present moment all immigration into Mexico has been stopped. Two weeks hence there will appear a new immigration law which will make it more difficult for illiterates to enter the country. Only Mexican citizens will be able to bring in close relatives. Permits to bring in relatives and friends, which were issued up to May, 1930, have been annulled, and immigrants possessing such permits will not be allowed to land in Mexican ports.

Oldest Daughter of Herzl Dies in Bordeaux at 40

London, Sept. 9.—Pauline Herzl, eldest daughter of the late Theodor Herzl, founder of political Zionism, died today in Bordeaux, France, at the age of 40, according to an announcement by the Zionist Executive. She had been ill for a long time. In accordance with her last wish she will be buried near her father. The Zionist Executive is making arrangements with a view to transferring her remains to Vienna.

Laborites to Back Agency in Spite of Disapproval of Budget, Non-Representation on Executive

Berlin, Sept. 9.—Despite the fact that the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency adopted a budget for which it did not vote, and elected a Jewish Agency Executive in which it is not represented, the Labor fraction in the Zionist Actions Committee and in the Administrative Committee will continue in the future to assist in the amplification and extension of the Jewish Agency, according to a statement issued here today by members of the Labor parties within both committees.

The statement of the Labor leaders points out that while "the failure of the Jewish Agency in this year of catastrophes does not yet justify condemnation of this serious attempt on the part of the Zionist movement to extend the circles responsible for the upbuilding work, the negative efforts which have already found expression in the leadership of the Jewish Agency during this year cannot be overlooked."

Blaming the last meeting of the Administrative Committee at Berlin for "imparting a philanthropic and bureaucratic character to the upbuilding work in Palestine without paying sufficient attention to the needs of upbuilding,"

Rothschild's Refusal Rescued Austria from Heimwehr Putsch

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Sept. 9.—A probable explanation of the stronger anti-Semitic policy on the part of the Heimwehr, Austria's private nationalistic militia, is seen in the revelation by M. Zangl, president of the Austrian Landowners' Association, that the Heimwehr leaders had once sought the financial support of Baron Louis de Rothschild in financing an anti-Socialist putsch in Austria.

The revelation, which is made in connection with the change in the leadership of the Heimwehr, indicates that Baron Rothschild declined to have anything to do with the proposed coup d'état, pointing out that he would do nothing contrary to the government's wishes. M. Zangl says that Major Waldemar Pabst, the exiled Heimwehr chieftain, had himself unsuccessfully approached Baron Rothschild. Heimwehr leaders had also sought to enlist the aid of the Vienna Jewish community which refused to have anything to do with the scheme, since the community holds itself completely aloof from party politics.

M. Zangl's sensational story shows that Baron Rothschild's refusal to support the Heimwehr saved Austria from a putsch under Heimwehr leadership.

Dispute Between Great Britain and Mandates Commission Over Latter's Palestine Report Ends in Complete Victory for Mandates Body as England Accepts Verdict of Rapporteur

Geneva, Sept. 9.—The silent fight between Great Britain and the Mandates Commission is considered here to have been settled with a full and complete victory for the Mandates Commission, after the open admission by Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, that the Mandates Commission was justified in its criticism of the British government. Even the last British effort, which consisted of Mr. Henderson's two-day negotiations with M. Procope, the rapporteur of the League's Council on Mandates, to get the latter to tone down his observations before reading them to the Council, and which assumed a serious character, is considered to have been unsuccessful.

The text of M. Procope's observations as read before the Council yesterday shows practically no differences from the original draft of his report. The modified text presented to the Council emphasizes, as did the original, that the Mandates Commission's report was a thorough and judicial presentation of the Palestine events. Procope's report also partly blames the Palestine government for the Palestine disturbances, although admitting the

difficulties in administering the Mandate.

Van Rees Sounds Victorious Note

The victorious note was evident throughout M. Procope's closing remarks, held after the general discussion, in which he again found it necessary to praise the Mandates Commission's report. The same note of victory, and even of reproach, was openly sounded in the speech of Daniel van Rees, vice-chairman of the Mandates Commission, who went so far as to indicate that the Mandates Commission may yet take up Great Britain's antagonistic comments on the Commission's report.

M. van Rees, speaking in the name of the Mandates Commission, was brief and sharp, and he could afford to be so, after Mr. Henderson's declaration, which amounted to an open apology on the part of Great Britain for its disagreeable comments. To those present at the Council's session it was clear that Mr. Henderson's diplomatic backing out from the dispute with the Mandates Commission was due in large part to the attitude of the

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International Jurists Demand League Establish Permanent Commission on Minorities

The establishment of a permanent minorities commission in the League of Nations to guard the various minority racial groups and to probe discriminations against them was demanded of the League of Nations by the jurists of the International Law Association, representing 20 countries, who have been meeting here. Cautioning that the situation of the minorities in Central Europe was inimical to world peace, the jurists voiced criticism of the procedure now in vogue before the League concerning the protests of minorities.

The warning of the danger in the situation of the minorities was given by Dr. Paul de Auer, head of the Hungarian delegation, chairman of the Hungarian Peace Society and counsel to the Bank of France. The demands on the League for a minorities commission were contained in the report of a committee, the chairman of which was R. E. L. Vaughan of England. The report was unanimously adopted. The report points out that a permanent minorities commission could insist on the preservation to the various minorities of such fundamental rights as are set forth in the Minorities Protection treaties. It was also suggested that the commission should be empowered to investigate whether there have been any violations of this protection.

Austrian Hakenkreuzler Renew Anti-Semitic Campaign

Vienna, Sept. 9.—The growth of the Hitlerite movement in Germany is casting a shadow on Austria and reanimating the anti-Semitic Hakenkreuzler organization which is intensifying its anti-Semitic activity, especially in connection with the anti-Jewish economic boycott campaign, the Austrian papers note.

Sees Dr. Weizmann's Jewish State Speech Intended for England and Non-Zionists

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 9.—Dr. Chaim Weizmann's statement at the recent meeting of the Zionist Actions Committee that Palestine must be a bi-national state and that the aim of the Zionists was not a Jewish State but an autonomous unit was apparently intended for the British government but chiefly for the Non-Zionists, declared Meer Grossman, vice-president of the Zionist Revisionists, the opposition to the Weizmann regime, in reviewing the results of the recent Revisionist conference at Prague.

Speaking at a press conference of Revisionists, Mr. Grossman pointed out that the Revisionist conference had consolidated the program of the party as regards political, social and economic questions relating to Palestine. He explained that the conference had devoted less time than on previous occasions to criticism of the Zionist Executive because "it is unnecessary to convince the Zionist public of the complete failure of the policy and tactics of the present Zionist leadership." Instead of criticizing the Zionist Executive, the Revisionists devoted themselves to clearly defining the political position and internal situation of the Zionist movement and indicated ways and means of "extricating the movement from the morass into which it has fallen."

Reviewing the meeting of the Zionist Actions Committee, Mr. Grossman declared that Dr. Weizmann's statement "amounted to a complete negation of Zionism, and the Actions Committee, which after Dr. Weizmann's speech asked him to retain the position of president of the Organization, could not dissociate itself from the responsibility and the results which must follow."

In referring to the political work of the Zionist Executive, the Revisionist leader said he understood that a member of the Jewish Agency would remain in London for a considerable time to assist Dr. Weizmann and Prof. Selig Brodetsky in their political negotiations with the British government. This meant, Mr. Grossman declared, that the Non-Zionists would actively participate in the political work which had previously rested solely with the Zionists. As for Sir John Simpson's report, Mr. Grossman stated that the Revisionists consider the manner of supplying information to an official British investigator harmful to the Zionist cause.

Weisbord, One of Founders of Tel Aviv, Dead at 60

Tel Aviv, Sept. 9.—David Weisbord, 60, active Zionist worker and the author of a book on Vilna, died here today of apoplexy. He was one of the founders of Tel Aviv, the world's only all-Jewish city.

Polish Zionist Party Council Voices Regret at Jewish State Address of Weizmann

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Sept. 9.—Profound regret at the statement made by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, at the recent Zionist Actions Committee meeting in Berlin, denying that the ultimate aim of the Zionists is a Jewish State, is voiced in a resolution adopted today at the extraordinary session of the Polish Zionist party's council.

Claiming that in the present serious moment Zionist leadership should not be in the hands of "such leaders," the Polish Zionist party's council demands the convocation of the seventeenth Zionist Congress this year. The council also insists that the Non-Zionists do more in the Jewish Agency because "their present achievements are not commensurate with their influence." The executive committee of the Zionist party council was instructed to form a united election bloc with all Zionist organizations in the Republic for the forthcoming elections to parliament.

Feldman, Oldest Jew in Latvia, Dies at Age of 117

Riga, Sept. 9.—Raphael Feldman, aged 117, said to be the oldest Jew in Latvia, died here today of natural causes. He is also reported to be the oldest person in Latvia.

Lazar Margulies Finds Jewish Agency Successful in Roumania

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Sept. 9.—The Jewish Agency has proved to be a success in Roumania, Lazar Margulies, prominent Roumanian Zionist leader and a member of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, said today in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The conciliatory and unifying idea as the underlying basis of the Jewish Agency has rallied new forces to the cause of Palestine in Roumania, M. Margulies declared, pointing out that Dr. William Fieldman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews and other non-Zionist personages, were vigorously participating in the work of upbuilding Palestine.

"I do not doubt that the Jewish Agency in other countries will also lead to similar results," he said. "The upbuilding of Palestine is such a vast undertaking that the efforts of all Jewry are essential in order to rise to the historic task." M. Margulies continued, "I feel a sincere admiration for Felix M. Warburg and for the earnestness, sincerity and tireless energy with which he is working for the cause of Palestine. If the Jewish Agency will be given time to develop its full potentialities, I am confident that we may expect a very essential acceleration in our work and the strengthening of our position," he concluded.

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other powers. Although they did not participate in the discussions after M. Procope had delivered his observations, they nevertheless had sufficient interest in the prestige of the Mandates Commission, and thus silently supported Procope.

On the other hand it was also clear that Mr. Henderson was not keen on offering an opportunity for a long discussion centering around the Mandates Commission issue, because such a discussion would have given Italy an opportunity to publicly attack Great Britain from the League's tribune on the Palestine Mandate in which Italy is now interested from the pro-Vatican point of view.

Persian Member Supports Procope

All this created for Mr. Henderson a situation by means of which Procope's resolution was unanimously adopted at the last minute, even though it had not been previously much changed to Mr. Henderson's liking. The only one finding fault with the report of the Mandates Commission was Khan Ala, the Persian member of the Council, who is known to be much influenced by the Arabs. League circles were aware of his animosity towards the Commission's report, and were even afraid that he might not vote for M. Procope's resolution, in which case the resolution

would fail, since, according to rule, it must be adopted unanimously.

However, even the Persian, although asking more protection for the non-Jewish communities in Palestine, declared himself for the report and for the resolution. The result of M. Procope's observations was another repetition on the part of Great Britain that the suspension of immigration to Palestine was absolutely temporary and that the question may be solved after Sir John Simpson's report has been studied.

Laborites to Back Agency in Spite of Disapproval of Budget, Non-Representation on Executive

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the statement says that the Berlin meeting "did not show a desire to improve matters nor did it provide a guarantee for the consolidation of the agricultural settlements."

Warning that they will fight against philanthropic and bureaucratic tendencies "which have found expression in influential quarters of the Jewish Agency," the Laborites conclude by declaring that they will "guard and retain the political and colonization values and achievements of the Zionist movement and the Labor work in Palestine."

U. S. Consul Reports No Jews Killed in Santo Domingo Storm

Santo Domingo, Sept. 9.—None of the 350 Jewish residents of Santo Domingo were killed or injured during the terrific hurricane which struck this island last week, killing more than a thousand, injuring other thousands and doing damage of several million dollars. This information was obtained from Mr. Clark, the American consul at San Domingo. The Jewish population of Santo Domingo is 70 families, most of them Sephardic. There are about a score of Ashkenazic Jews.

A New York Yiddish daily yesterday reported that 40 Jews had been killed and several score rendered homeless as a result of the hurricane.

Police Sent to Oust Arab Squatters on Hawareth Lands

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 9.—A squadron consisting of 19 British policemen and 12 Palestine policemen was sent today to remove the Arab squatters from the Wadi Hawareth lands of the Jewish National Fund, whose title and ownership was approved last June by the land court at Tulkarem. Despite the court's decision and notwithstanding the fact that the court had dismissed the appeal of the Arab squatters and that the Jewish National Fund had compensated them, the Arabs have refused to vacate the land which consists of about 45,000 dunams bought with a \$1,000,000 fund raised by Canadian Zionists.

When the purchase was made, most of the Arab tenants had already evacuated but a number of squatters remained. The Jewish National Fund obtained a court order for their removal but the government interposed objections. Rather than antagonize the Arabs the Fund let the matter rest until the land court at Tulkarem ruled that the government was entitled to sell the Wadi Hawareth lands to the Fund. It was expected that this ruling would end the difficulty and enable the Fund to take immediate possession.

Bernard Heller to Head Michigan Hillel Foundation

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 9.—Rabbi Bernard Heller, for ten years leader of the Madison Avenue Temple, Scranton, Pa., has accepted the position of director of the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation at the University of Michigan. He succeeds Rabbi Adolph H. Fink who goes to Temple Emanu-El, Spokane, Wash., after four years at the Ann Arbor foundation.

Rabbi Heller brings to his new post a background of several years of association with the Menorah society and Avukah, national student Zionist organization. New York University honored him last fall by selecting him as the Jewish member of a Jew-Protestant-Catholic seminar on tolerance sponsored by the institution.

Rabbi Heller achieved prominence in local as well as sectarian communal affairs, holding the presidency of the Scranton Community Fund association. He is the author of a book of observations on post-war Europe.

Lashkowitz Democratic Nominee for N. D. Attorney-General

Fargo, N. D., Sept. 9.—Harry Lashkowitz of Fargo has been nominated for attorney-general of North Dakota on the Democratic ticket. He is the only Jew running for public office in North Dakota.

Lashkowitz, admitted to the bar in December, 1912, has been attorney in many important litigations. He was formerly associated with A. T. Cole, now judge in the district court, and is a recognized leader in public activities of the state.

Zaleski's Statement on Future of Palestine Surprises Jews

Geneva, Sept. 9.—The declaration by Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, to the Council of the League of Nations yesterday, leaves no doubt that Great Britain will make no limitations for Jewish immigration in Palestine, August Zaleski, Polish foreign minister and his country's representative at the League, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

The intentions which Mr. Henderson demonstrated before the Council regarding the future British policy in Palestine "permit me to express the firm belief that the coming evolution of the Jewish National Home as foreseen by the Balfour Declaration will develop in most favorable conditions, assuring at the same time the general well-being of the country which will enable the creation of self-governing institutions for the benefit of the entire Palestine population," M. Zaleski declared.

The Polish foreign minister's statement created a surprising impression in Jewish circles here. It is being pointed out that not only does this statement lack the usual warmth with which M. Zaleski always spoke regarding Jewish interests in Palestine, but for the first time he injects the question of creation of self-governing institutions.

International Agricultural Institute's 25th Jubilee Recalls Jewish Founder

Rome, Sept. 9.—When the International Institute of Agriculture celebrates its 25th anniversary here with the ministers of agriculture of 74 member countries attending, David Lubin, an American Jew who conceived the idea of the Institute, will not be present. He died six years ago. Formerly a merchant in California, Lubin evolved the idea of the Institute and interested the King of Italy in the plan. The King saw the possibilities of the idea and he financed it. From these small beginnings in 1905 the Institute has grown to one of the most valuable international organizations in the world.

When the general assembly of the Institute met in Rome in 1913, Mr. Lubin, then 72 years old, received a silver cup in appreciation of his services in organizing the Institute. Some measure of recognition is expected to be given to the late Mr. Lubin when the silver jubilee of the Institute is celebrated with King Victor Emanuel, as the patron of the Institute, attending.

Judge Harry M. Fisher Heads Chicago Zionists

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Chicago, Sept. 9.—Superior Court Judge Harry M. Fisher was unanimously elected president of the Zionist Organization of Chicago at an all-day reorganization session at the Sherman Hotel. Judge Fisher, who played an important role in the effecting of peace at the recent Cleveland Zionist convention, succeeds Max Shulman, who has been president of the Chicago Zionists since 1921, and an active worker in the Zionist cause since 1902.

"Wisdom as well as need dictated not only that the Jews everywhere should put the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home in the foreground of their individual lives, but that they press this priority for Palestine upon the organized communal conscience," declared Jacob de Haas, chairman of the Organization Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, who was the principal speaker at the meeting. Turning to the local problems of Zionism, Mr. de Haas urged individual effort in enlisting members, the reduction of the districts and sub-districts to natural units answering local needs, and the active participation of the members in the life of the organization, by earnest discussion of the problems at home and abroad.

Other speakers were Rabbi Solomon Goldman, H. Steinberg and Miss Sara Moskowitz, barrister of Lincoln's Inn, London, England. An executive committee of 85 and an administrative committee of 18 members were elected by the conference. The conference presented Mr. Shulman, retiring president, with a platinum watch in appreciation of his services to the Zionist cause and decided to inscribe the name of Mrs. Shulman in the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund.

Anti-Semites Attack 2 Jews on Roumanian Railroads

Vienna, Sept. 9.—The followers of the anti-Semitic Professor Alexander Cuza are continuing their attacks upon Jewish passengers on Roumanian trains. Their latest victims are a 60-year old Jew and a rabbi. Markus Nadler, 60, was thrown from a train going from Bucharest to Constanza. He was also badly beaten up and deprived of some letters. The rabbi of Campina was attacked in the North Station in Bucharest while waiting for a train.

Postmaster Urges Early Mailing of Rosh Hashonah Greeting Cards

An appeal to the public to mail Rosh Hashonah greeting cards on or before September 19 so as to avoid congestion and delay was made yesterday by Postmaster John J. Kiely. Early mailing, he emphasized, will permit Jewish post office employees to observe the holidays. Careful addressing, prepayment of proper postage and the use of envelopes no smaller than 2½ by 4 inches are other suggestions made. Rosh Hashonah starts at sundown, September 22, and ends at sundown, September 24. Yom Kippur begins at sunset, October 1, and ends at sunset, October 2.

Canadian Hadassah Convention Hears of \$238,598 Income

Ottawa, Ont., Canada, Sept. 9.—In an address extending the greetings of the Zionist Organization of Canada to the Sixth Hadassah Convention which ended here yesterday, A. J. Freiman, president of the Zionist Organization of Canada, referred to the sermon delivered recently by the Rev. Dr. Samuel Schulman of Temple Emanu-El of New York. While claiming that it was undeniable that Jews have existed for 1900 years by virtue of their religion, Mr. Freiman stated that religion as it is today is insufficient to hold Jews together many more years.

"The Jewish religion is gradually losing every flavor of Judaism, and this is particularly true of Reform Judaism," said Mr. Freiman. "Zionism is not a spiritual escape, as Rabbi Schulman puts it, but rather strengthens the faith of the Jews. To me Zionism is Judaism, it is my religion."

More than 225 delegates and guests representing every Jewish community in Canada participated in the convention, which took place Sunday and yesterday in the Chateau Laurier Hotel here. Despite the prevailing financial depression, the statement of the Honorary Treasurer, Mrs. R. Kates of Montreal, shows an income of \$238,598.90, of which the sum of \$110,625.87 was remitted to the various Hadassah Trust Funds. The remaining amount has been contributed to the Hadassah Activity Funds, namely the Keren Hayesod and United Palestine Appeal, the Jewish National Fund, Sheloel and Registration etc.

English Press Relieved at Settlement of Mandates Body-Great Britain Palestine Dispute

London, Sept. 9.—"Britain's Escape from Reproach," "Geneva's Friendly Attitude Towards Britain" and "The Relief of Much Anxiety" are a few of the characterizations of the English press in commenting on yesterday's proceedings of the Council of the League of Nations and in describing the adoption of M. Procope's report and resolution.

The Daily Telegraph concludes a long editorial by saying that "the termination of the disagreeable incident ought not to pass without a final comment on the abuse of the League of Nations' position in the matter of mandates. When the government's own inquiry has publicly shown what was at fault and the right remedial measures already set on foot, it was unpardonable that the same points be made again in a magisterial tone by the Mandates Commission whose function it is to call attention to unadmitted faults. It is not for the League's instruments to take action tending to undermine the authority of its mandatories."

The Morning Post complains that the acceptance of the Palestine Mandate by England has brought "worry and difficulty enough without the irritation and antipathetic criticism of the Mandates Commission, a body with neither responsibility nor practical experience to guide it, whose assumption of superior wisdom would be impertinence, even if it were impartial in its inspiration."

Guardian Uses Different Tone

Using an entirely different tone, the Manchester Guardian finds that much anxiety will be relieved by Mr. Henderson's conciliatory spirit and the reply of the British government recognizing the duty of the Mandates Commission to criticize. The Guardian points out that the British foreign secretary did not content himself with "correcting the blunder in tone. He promised the League in the near future a full statement of policy as regards Palestine."

"Such a declaration was urgently needed to end the period of suspended animation which has paralyzed the Palestine experiment for over a year. Mr. Henderson says that Sir John Simpson has presented his report on immigration and land settlement and that the suspension of immigration is only temporary. When will he tell us that immigration has been resumed?" the Guardian concludes.

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
