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Arthur Henderson Gives British Definition of Jewish Homeland

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Sept. 10.—The British government understands the Balfour Declaration in the sense that the interests of the Arabs should not be ignored while the Jews interpret the Balfour Declaration as meaning that Great Britain should be prepared to create the Jewish National Home, forgetting the British responsibility for the second part of the Mandate, that regarding Arab rights, declared Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, in reply to a question from the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

The representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency had asked Mr. Henderson in the course of a press conference what was the present British government's definition of the term Jewish National Home which was mentioned in the report of the Mandates Commission yesterday, approved by the British representative at the session of the Council of the League of Nations.

Whether the national minorities problem will be discussed at this session of the Council and also whether the proposed permanent minorities commission would be created at this session was asked of Mr. Henderson by the correspondent of the Manchester Guardian. Mr. Henderson said he doesn't expect that both matters will be taken up.

Figures Show Paucity of Palestine Jewish Officials

Jerusalem, Sept. 10.—Considerable alarm is voiced in the Hebrew press here at the paucity of Jewish officials in the various offices of the government's customs department. The figures show that in the head office there are 35 officials and only one Jew among them. Of the 32 officials in the Haifa office two are Jews and in the Jerusalem office there are 60 officials of which number 51 are Jews. In the other offices there are a total of 60 customs guards, only one of whom is a Jew. Of the fifteen tobacco supervisors employed by the customs office not one is a Jew.

2 Battalions of British Troops Under Orders to Go to Palestine

London, Sept. 10.—The first battalion of the King's own Royal Lancaster Regiment at Aldershot and the first battalion of the Royal Warwick at Blackdown are under orders to proceed to Palestine, the London Daily Express reports. No reason is given for the order nor is it known when the troops will leave.

10,000 Immigrants Helpless If Hias Gives Up Work in Europe, Speakers Warn

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Sept. 10.—Ten thousand Jewish immigrants will remain helpless if the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS), an American organization whose work is to facilitate the lawful entry of Jewish immigrants at the various ports of the United States, Mexico and South America, and to prevent them from becoming public charges, abandons its relief activities in Europe, it was announced by speakers at a conference of Jewish communal workers and press representatives, called in connection with the report that the HIAS was about to abandon its relief work in Europe.

Notwithstanding the fact that several new countries have recently adopted immigration restrictions, among them Canada and Mexico and South Africa, Jewish emigration from Eastern Europe has nevertheless increased in the last few months, the speakers at the meeting declared. They pointed out that this was due to the fact that the Hicem, world Jewish organization for immigration, had prepared the emigrants and had intervened in their behalf with the governments of the respective countries of immigration.

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Louis Marshall, Leader of World Jewry, Died One Year Ago Today in Zurich; Melchett Pays Tribute to Departed Leader

A year ago today Louis Marshall died in Zurich. On September 11, 1929, world Jewry, already grief-stricken over the victims of the Palestine riots, was plunged into deep mourning as the news was flashed to the farthest corners of the earth that Louis Marshall, the leader of world Jewry, honored and respected by multitudes of all races and creeds and nations, was no more.

Well past the Biblical three score, Mr. Marshall was fatally stricken shortly after he had brought to a successful consummation the unity of Israel with the signing of what he called the "pact of glory" that gave birth to the extended Jewish Agency for Palestine. Mr. Marshall was mourned not only by Jews the world over, whose acknowledged leader he was, but by everyone familiar with the ideals, achievements and character of this American Jew.

In an article released by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for publication on the first anniversary of Mr. Marshall's death, Henry Schneiderman, assistant secretary of the American Jewish Committee, of which Mr. Marshall was president for many years, pays notable

Jewish Socialist Leader Jailed in Poland as Pilsudski's Foe

Warsaw, Sept. 10.—Dr. Herman Lieberman, prominent Jewish leader of the Polish Socialist Party (P. P. S.), was among the fifteen members of the opposition parties in the Polish parliament who were called out of their beds early this morning and arrested on an order from Marshall Joseph Pilsudski, Polish premier. The arrests were on the grounds of crimes committed against the President and the existence of the Polish Republic.

The arrests are said to have been due to a recent meeting in Cracow where the Socialists and Farmers Party representatives convened to discuss the formation of a united bloc against Premier Pilsudski.

Polish Agudath Israel Seeks United Front for Elections

Warsaw, Sept. 10.—Probably for the first time in the history of Polish Jewry, the Agudath Israel, Orthodox organization, today published a statement favoring the establishment of a united Jewish front for the forthcoming parliamentary elections. In the past the various Jewish parties have nominated their own candidates and consequently the Jewish representation in parliament and in the city councils has been decreased as a result of the split vote.

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Quotas for Countries of Jewish Immigration Exhausted; Jews Not Affected by New Plan

Washington, Sept. 10.—The immigration quotas for Russia, Poland, Lithuania, Czechoslovakia, Roumania, Hungary, Germany and Palestine were all exhausted during the past fiscal year ending June, 1930, according to an announcement issued today by the state department. These countries are the chief source of Jewish immigration to the United States. From these countries a total of 44,676 immigrants were admitted during the last fiscal year in which 11,526 Jewish immigrants were admitted from all countries.

At the same time the state department ordered a stricter application of that part of the immigration law holding up passports from immigrants likely to become "public charges" after admission to the United States. This step was taken at the personal request of President Hoover who is seeking to restrict immigration as much as possible in order to relieve the unemployment situation.

This step, however, is not likely to affect Jewish immigration to any large extent, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed today by Isaac L. Assofsky, general manager of the Hebrew Emigrant Aid Society. Mr. Assofsky pointed out that the bulk of Jewish immigration to this country consists of family reunions, with parents sending for minor children and children sending for aged parents. All of these immigrants are provided for by their kin here before their arrival and hence there is no likelihood of their becoming public charges.

Atlantic City, Sept. 10.—Until the unemployment situation improves the American Federation of Labor favors a complete stoppage of all immigration, even quota immigration, to the United States, according to an announcement made here by William Green, president of the Federation, after a meeting of the Federation's executive council.

Von Bulow's Memoirs Reveal Ex-Kaiser's Attitude to Zionism

Berlin, Sept. 10.—The vacillating attitude of the former Kaiser Wilhelm toward Zionism a generation ago is now revealed for the first time in the memoirs of the late German chancellor, Prince von Bulow, which are now being published in the Vossische Zeitung. Through the intervention of Prince von Eulenberg, German ambassador to Austria, Theodor Herzl obtained an interview with von Bulow. Herzl asked the Chancellor to arrange for an audience with Kaiser Wilhelm.

Kaiser Wilhelm's visit to Jerusalem in 1898 followed an interview Herzl had with him in Constantinople. This visit is described in the chapter of Bulow's memoirs published today. On November 2, 1892, Herzl and his colleagues were received by the Kaiser outside the Jaffa Gate and Herzl made a brief speech of greeting.

In pointing out the Kaiser's weakness of character, von Bulow says that at first Wilhelm was very enthusiastic over Zionism, since he hoped by supporting the movement to get rid of the German Jews whom he did not like. Later, on learning that the German ambassador to Turkey had said that the Sultan was opposed to a Jewish State, Wilhelm abandoned his entire interest in Zionism, according to von Bulow.

Rabbi Zevi Cohen Honored at New York Reception

Rabbi Zevi Cohen, veteran scholar and Chief Rabbi of Montreal, was tendered a reception by a large group of Jewish communal leaders of New York on the occasion of his 70th birthday at the Mt. Vernon Home of Harry P. Pierst, associate treasurer of the Zionist Organization of America, who is a son-in-law of Rabbi Cohen and host to the distinguished guest during his visit at Mt. Vernon. The toastmaster was Yehuda Siegel, and the speakers included Rabbi Joseph M. Margulies, Dr. S. Bernstein, Bernard Stone, M. Ribalov, Nehemia Mark, M. Ch. Tausner. Rabbi Cohen returned yesterday to Montreal where a reception of national magnitude is being prepared for him by the Jewish community there.

Second Jewish Physician Denied Permit to Remain in Palestine

Jerusalem, Sept. 10.—The second case within a week of the Palestine government's refusal to permit a Jewish physician who came here as a tourist to remain as a permanent resident occurred today. A Yugo-Slavian physician who has a paid position and a capital of \$2,500 has been refused a permit to remain. Earlier in the week a similar refusal was made to the request of a Hungarian Jewish physician who had been married during his stay here.

Prof. Marc Rosenberg, Famous Goldsmith, Dies in Germany

Berlin, Sept. 10.—Professor Marc Rosenberg, prominent historian and expert in the art of goldsmithing, is dead at Baden-Baden. He was 80 years old. Professor Rosenberg, who taught the history of art at the Technical Academy in Karlsruhe, was a Russian Jew, having been born in Kamenetz, Ukraine. He was the author of a four-volume work entitled "The Sign of the Goldsmith" and also of a history of the art of goldsmithing. Professor Rosenberg owned a collection of rare specimens of his art. In recent years he had been living at Baden-Baden.

Edwin Montagu's Diary Reveals His Reaction to Palestine

London, Sept. 10.—A rather interesting sidelight on the alleged effect of Balfour Declaration upon British India is contained in one paragraph of the diary of the late Edwin S. Montagu, former secretary of state for India and the sponsor of the legislation under which India is now ruled. The diary is about to be published by Mr. Montagu's widow. Mr. Montagu was a Jew.

The passage reads as follows:

"It seems strange to be a member of a government which goes out of its way, as I think, for no conceivable purpose that I can see, to deal this blow at a colleague that is doing his best to be loyal to them despite his opposition."

"The government has dealt an irreparable blow at Jewish Britons, and they have endeavored to set up a people which does not exist. They have alarmed unnecessarily the Mohammedan world, and in so far as they are successful they will have Germanized Palestine on the flank of Egypt. It seems useless to conquer it."

"Why we should intern Mahomet Ali in India for pan-Mohammedanism when we encourage pan-Judaism, I can not for the life of me understand. It certainly puts the final date of my political activities."

Throng of Reverent Jews G greets Lubawitscher Rebbe in Riga

Riga, Sept. 10.—The world famous Lubawitscher Rebbe, Rabbi Joseph Schneursohn, received a rousing welcome from a great throng of Jews on his arrival here. The Rebbe, who just returned from a several month's visit to the United States, will make Riga his permanent home. A great many of his Chassidic followers from all parts of Latvia together with M. Dubin, the Jewish member of parliament, were at the station to greet the Lubawitscher Rebbe. Because of the great throng that sought a glimpse of the distinguished Rebbe and who endeavored to touch his hand or kiss the hem of his coat, the police had great difficulty in maintaining order and getting the Rebbe into his automobile and away from the railroad station.

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latter's Dearborn Independent had for years carried on a campaign of vilification against the Jews. The Jewish people owe to Mr. Marshall a debt of gratitude for the tactful, dignified and statesmanlike manner in which he conducted the negotiations leading up to Henry Ford's apology. The thousands of letters which Mr. Marshall wrote as answers to anti-Jewish attacks are masterpieces in their field.

"Among the Jews of Europe, Mr. Marshall's memory will be kept green because of his leadership in the raising and distribution of funds for the relief of the Jewish sufferers during and after the World War, and also because of his efforts to obtain at the Peace Conference the so-called minority treaties which removed cases of injustice against racial, linguistic, and religious minorities in European countries from the category of internal events to that of matters of international concern. In world Jewish history, Mr. Marshall will also be remembered because of his years of work in the direction of bringing about the union of all those forces in Jewry which are working for the rehabilitation of Palestine, whether these forces are motivated by Zionist ideals or merely by sentimental or philanthropic concern for the new settlement in Palestine."

Melchett Recalls Associations

Lord Melchett, British industrialist and president of the English Zionist Federation, on the eve of his departure for Europe recalled the great services of Mr. Marshall to world Jewry. In a statement released through the Allied Jewish Campaign, Lord Melchett declared that the "great work of Louis Marshall in connection with all matters affecting the Jewish community, and more especially the services he rendered in the cause of the Jewish minorities in Central and Eastern Europe, stand forever as evidence of what can be achieved by a man of courage, character, ability and endless persistence and patience, and of the respect he engendered in all those who came in contact with him for his fearless appeal to justice and moral rectitude, which enabled him to achieve so much."

Recalling that he had known him best in connection with their joint work in Palestine, both with the Commission of which Lord Melchett was chairman, and in the economic development of Palestine as well as in the construction of the Jewish Agency, Lord Melchett said, "Marshall may be said to have died on the field of endeavor. No one will forget the last great speech he made at Zurich at the Agency meeting when, already sore stricken by the disease which so shortly carried him to his grave, he thrilled us all by the lucid, clear, and forceful manner of his presentation and the fervor of his utterance."

"Looking back over our troubled path of events of the last year, political and economical, I have often regretted that we no longer have his clear counsel, his

courageous and steadfast help to assist us. He set a great example which will never be forgotten, and handed down a great tradition which inspired us all for the future."

"We want more men like Louis Marshall and I sincerely trust that his example and memory will be kept forever before us."

Recalls Marshall's J.D.C. Role

David M. Bressler, one of the chairmen of the Allied Jewish Campaign, said of Mr. Marshall yesterday: "The place that Louis Marshall held in Jewish life not only in this country but throughout the world is one, I sincerely believe, which will never be filled by any other man. At least not in our time."

"For the relief of the millions of Jews in Eastern and Central Europe, rendered destitute with the outbreak of the World War in 1914, he gave himself without stint. Together with the late Jacob H. Schiff he was the prime mover in 1914 of the organization of the American Jewish Relief Committee, which initiated those famous war-relief campaigns that have been conducted in this country. In each of these campaigns he rendered inspiring, unsurpassable service, and made generous contributions."

"Just prior to the meeting of the Jewish Agency in Zurich last August, he attended a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee, which is the distributing body of the Jewish overseas relief funds. At that meeting, Joseph C. Hyman, as member of a commission designated for the purpose, reported on the economic status of European Jewry after a tour of some thirteen countries which he had made in advance of this meeting:

"I cherish in my memory still, as it is cherished by all who heard them, the words he uttered when he had completed the unfolding of the tragic tale of Jewish agony:

"I feel that it would be a betrayal of a whole people for us to discontinue this life-saving work—a betrayal doubly culpable in view of the fact that the activities which the Joint Distribution Committee has launched are beginning to take root in the lives of the many thousands who have only us to look to for help. I feel sure that once the facts are made known, the Jews of America will want us to go on, and that they will give us the means, as they have so splendidly done in the past, for us to continue our task of saving East European Jewry from the terrible fate that would otherwise be theirs."

"Had Louis Marshall lived, he would have been the directing genius of the effort to raise \$6,000,000 which is now being sought in this country for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, for the reason that the present campaign, in which the two major Jewish causes are

combined, would have been regarded by him as the symbol of his great life-ideal, the unity of the Jewish people. It is well known to his friends and co-workers that he had planned to start this campaign upon his return to this country. We who are endeavoring to carry on in his stead miss him sorely—as he is missed by his people the world over."

Tells of Marshall's Palestine Work

Morris Rothenberg, another of the national chairmen of the Allied Jewish Campaign and one of the leading Zionists of this country said:

"Those of us who are devoted to the ideal of Palestine rebuilt cherish the memory of Louis Marshall as one of our great friends. Although he was not a Zionist, he was, as an ardent Jew, sincerely devoted to Palestine. From the very beginning of the Zionist movement he, though critical of some of its aspects, was ever ready to cooperate with its endeavors to colonize the land with Jews and to revive Hebrew culture."

"When in 1917, the Balfour Declaration recognizing the historic Jewish claims to Palestine was issued by Great Britain, Louis Marshall caused the adoption a few months later by the American Jewish Committee of a resolution which, among others, contained this clause:

"The opportunity will be welcomed by this Committee to aid in the realization of the British declaration, under such protectorate or suzerainty as the Peace Congress may determine, and, to that end, to cooperate with those who, attracted by religious or historic associations, shall seek to establish in Palestine a center for Judaism, for the stimulation of our faith, for the pursuit and development of literature, science, and art in a Jewish environment, and for the rehabilitation of the land."

Commission Levies Charges Against Teachers in Arab School

Jerusalem, Sept. 10—A government commission of inquiry sent to investigate the actions of the teachers in the government Arab school at Gaza has framed a number of serious charges against the teachers. They are accused of attending classes armed with revolvers, of talking politics with their students, of inciting them to strike in accordance with the decisions of the Arab Executive, of conducting chauvinistic and militaristic propaganda and of having rebuked the pupils for welcoming the district commissioner who came to visit Gaza.

Palestine's New Chief Secretary Is Expected Next Week

Jerusalem, Sept. 10—The new chief secretary of Palestine, Mark Aitchison Young, successor to Harry Charles Luke, is expected here over the weekend to assume his duties. Mr. Young comes to the chief secretaryship of Palestine from his post as colonial secretary of Sierra Leone.

Melchett Sees League's Action on Mandates Body's Report Placing Mandate on Unshakable Basis

The resolution adopted by the Council of the League of Nations upholding the report of the Mandates Commission on the Palestine events has definitely established the status of the Mandate on an unshakable basis, declared Lord Melchett, president of the English Zionist Federation and prominent English industrialist to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency just before he sailed for Europe yesterday on S. S. Aquatania.

Lord Melchett said that the Jews should be highly satisfied with the attitude expressed in the resolutions of the Council of the League of Nations. "I hope that the Mandates Commission will continue its wise supervision of the fulfillment of the Mandate, aiming at the establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine. The latest developments in Geneva were a great encouragement for us," Lord Melchett pointed out.

Asked about his attitude towards Dr. Chaim Weizmann's recent statement regarding the creation of a bi-national state in Palestine, Lord Melchett said: "As long as I have known Dr. Weizmann he has never made any references in regard to Zionism which would not be favorable for the Zionist cause."

"But this is only a question for theoretical discussion. Even if there were no Palestine Mandate, or the Balfour Declaration, which provides for the safe-guarding of the civil and religious rights of the Arabs in Palestine, the history of the Jews shows that they have always been fair to those with whom they have lived," Lord Melchett concluded, adding again that American Jewry ought to fulfill its promises of subscriptions made for funds in order to facilitate and hasten the upbuilding work of Palestine.

Lord Melchett had spent about two weeks in America which he devoted purely to business. He did not spend any time with American Jewish leaders as most of them were away on their vacations.

Judge Caplan Nominated for Connecticut State Senate

New Haven, Sept. 10.—Judge Jacob Caplan, for six years judge of the City Court, has been nominated for State Senator on the Republican ticket here. The Ninth District is heavily Republican, and Judge Caplan's nomination is equivalent to election. Judge Caplan won the nomination after a spirited contest with Howard Blakeslee.

Jewish Artist Wins Prize at Michigan State Fair

Mrs. A. J. Freiman Again Named Canadian Hadassah President

Ottawa, Ont., Can., Sept. 10.—Stressing the importance of Hadassah women in Canada making every effort to increase the income of the Jewish National Fund by placing boxes in every home in Canada, Mrs. A. J. Freiman, president of the Dominion Hadassah, stated at the sixth Hadassah convention here that had more men and women settled in Palestine last year, the riots would never have taken place. "Our weakness lay in our numbers, and unless we endeavor to acquire a greater area of land this must always be so," stated Mrs. Freiman.

Among non-Jews who addressed the convention were Mayor F. H. Plant of Ottawa, who welcomed the delegates to the city and praised the activities of Mrs. Freiman on behalf of Gentiles as well as Jews; Mrs. J. A. Neumann Says Weizmann

Must Choose Between Zionism and Defeatism

Criticism of Dr. Chaim Weizmann for his recent declaration at the meeting of the Zionist Actions Committee in Berlin in favor of a bi-national state in Palestine is contained in an article in the current issue of the New Palestine, official organ of the Zionist Organization of America. The article, which is entitled "Whither Bound?", is written by Emanuel Neumann, president of the Jewish National Fund of America.

"American Zionists have for years supported Dr. Weizmann's policies wholeheartedly," declares Mr. Neumann. "We have followed him with an almost childlike acquiescence. The time seems to have come to ask ourselves openly and frankly, 'Where are we bound and whither are we being led?' The moment is approaching when Dr. Weizmann will have to choose—if indeed he has not already made his choice. On the one hand lies the long and difficult road to Zionism, pure and unadulterated, the embodiment of the modern expression of the age-long dreams and aspirations of our people. On the other hand is the alluring but slippery path of hasty improvisation and diurnal compromise. It leads to something which is not Zionism, not even Achad-Haamism. It is a neo-Zionism. Its true name is defeatism."

"It is not only the leadership but we, the mass of American Zionists and the movement as a whole, who are standing at the crossroads. If we weaken in our faith or our resolve, we shall sink into the morass of opportunism from which we shall be unable to extricate ourselves. In dealing with the fundamentals of Zionism we must be guided by principles, and by them alone."

Successor to Lurie as Chicago Social Service Chief Not Named

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Contrary to an earlier report to the effect that Abraham Goldberg of the domestic relations division of the recorders' court probation division in Detroit was going to Chicago to succeed Harry Lurie as head of the Jewish Social Service Bureau of Chicago, the Jewish Daily Bulletin learns that Mr. Goldberg is only joining the Bureau as a member of the staff of the legal aid department in the position of a case worker. A successor to Mr. Lurie, who has resigned to become director of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research in New York, has not yet been appointed.

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
