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## Anti-Semitic and Anti-German Mob Renews Demonstrations in Streets of Prague

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Sept. 26—Three policemen were injured here today in a renewal of anti-Semitic demonstrations which grew out of nationalist protests against the showing of German talking pictures. The total of those arrested as a result of the demonstrations is now sixty. The new incidents lasted several hours as the mob of several thousand slugged policemen and doorknockers at moving picture houses showing German films. Patrons of the theatres were also attacked.

Shouting anti-German and anti-Jewish epithets, the mob went through the streets smashing windows of shops owned by Jews or Germans. The demonstration took on a serious character when the mob reached the German legation. On the way the rioters passed the theatre where Max Reinhardt's company is playing. They raised such a rumpus there by smashing windows and doing other damage that the day's performance was abandoned. Windows in the office of the Prager Presse, owned by Foreign Minister Benes, were also broken.

## Executive's Permit to Jewish Stores to Remain Open Sunday Irks Aldermen of Montreal

Montreal, Sept. 26—The action of the city executive in allowing Jewish stores to remain open last Sunday, the eve of Rosh Hashanah, has aroused the ire of many aldermen and of the League for the Observance of the Lord's Day. In voicing their protest the aldermen claim that the action was illegal, while the League is planning to take the matter up with the provincial government. A delegation of the League will see Premier Taschereau this week.

Sunday rest is compulsory in the province of Quebec under the Lord's Day Act. When asked about the action of the city authorities, Premier Taschereau said that the Lord's Day Act is federal legislation whose operation is left to the provinces and no one has authority to grant permission which would mean transgression of the law. "Anyone can lodge a complaint against transgressors before the courts. The act being federal only the Dominion parliament can amend or suspend its operation," the Premier declared.

## Polish-Jewish Deaf and Dumb Artist Has Exhibit in Buenos Aires

Buenos Aires, Sept. 26—Dr. M. Mazurkiewicz, Polish minister to the Argentine, today opened the exhibit of paintings by the Polish-Jewish deaf and dumb artist, Maurice Minkovsky.

## Czecho-Slovakian Government to Take Measures to End Anti-Semitic Incidents in Prague

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Sept. 26—Renewed anti-Semitic and anti-German disturbance in the streets of Prague have caused considerable property damage, windows of Jewish shops whose owners have German-sounding names being smashed. Police intervention finally restored order at a late hour. The troubles began when Czech nationalists organized demonstrations against the showing of German talking pictures in Prague theatres.

"Palestine to the Jews" and Prague to the Czechs" has been the cry of the Fascists, the chief organizers of the anti-German protest which took on an anti-Semitic character. A Jewish-owned moving picture houses was damaged and Jewish patrons of other houses as well as of a number of cafes were expelled.

Dr. Ludwig Singer, president of the Jewish National Council of Czecho-Slovakia, and a member of parliament, today protested to minister of the interior Slavik, and demanded sufficient protection for Jewish life and property. M. Slavik definitely promised to accede to Dr. Singer's wishes and has ordered drastic measures taken against the rioters.

The incidents came in for considerable discussion in parliament where a number of deputies expressed the opinion that the Fascist Nationalist disturbances were the result of the promise made to the League of Nations by the Foreign Minister, Dr. Eduard Benes, that Czecho-Slovakia would improve the treatment of its minorities, and also President Masaryk's statement of conciliatory policy to the minorities leaders.

Prior to the latest trouble, order had been established with the arrest of 14 persons and negotiations between the government and the owners of the cinema houses to change their programs until the anti-German excitement subsides.

## Arab Delegation to U. S. Made Financial Failure, Bendak Says

Jerusalem, Sept. 26—Issa Bendak, editor of the Christian-Arab paper Sout Aschaab published in Bethlehem, and one of the Arab delegation to the United States with Emir Ardel Arslan, officially reported today that the delegation's mission had been a financial failure. Emir Arslan, the chairman of the delegation, is now in Germany. The delegation came to the United States last Spring on behalf of the Grand Mufti's party to raise funds and propagandize the Arab cause.

## Question of What Happened to Collective Punishments for Safed Becomes Issue

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 26—A report in the Arab paper Al Hayat that District Commissioner Colville had acquitted the Arab populace of Safed of charges involving attacks on the Jews during the riots of August 1929, thus exempting them from the provisions of the Collective Punishments Ordinance, has aroused considerable interest here as to what has happened to the hearing on the collective punishments for Safed where 17 Jews were killed.

On page seven of its 1929 report to the League of Nations the Palestine government said that the Collective Punishment Ordinance had been applied to "towns and villages whose inhabitants were guilty of participation in concerted attacks on Jews at Hebron Safed, etc." In view of this statement and of the report in the Al Hayat, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency made inquiries from the government's secretariat which stated that the statement in the 1929 report was only anticipatory.

Following the report in the Al Hayat the secretariat told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the hearing on levying collective punishment on Safed had not yet been reached. The Al Hayat's report, however, is very circumstantial, even mentioning that Abcarius, a Jewish proselyte, is counsel for the Safed Arabs.

When interviewed by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Abcarius said that the collective punishment hearing for Safed was held in January and since then no action has been taken. He said that District Commissioner Colville had probably recommended no punishment. Abcarius denied that he was responsible for the Al Hayat's report that Safed's Arab populace had been acquitted.

The statement in the 1929 report indicates that it is not merely anticipatory as the government's secretary informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency but an evident misstatement requiring correction so far as Safed is concerned, collective punishments having been levied on other towns, including Hebron.

## Judge Mack to Visit Palestine Next Week

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 26—Judge Julian W. Mack of the United States Circuit Court in New York, and honorary chairman of the administration committee of the Zionist Organization of America, is expected here for a visit next week. Judge Mack has been in Europe most of the summer. He attended the recent sessions of the Jewish Agency's administrative committee in Berlin.

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## Protest Calling of Meeting to Reorganize Queens County Democracy on Yom Kippur Eve

Protests against the designation of the evening of October 1, the eve of Yom Kippur, as the day for the revamping of the Queens Democratic County Committee, are swamping Democratic headquarters in Queens County. The bulk of the protests are emanating from Jewish members of the committee who are indignant that the meeting was called for the eve of Yom Kippur when Jews will be unable to participate.

Replying to the flood of protests, which include some from non-Jewish members, John Thoeft, county Democratic leader, issued a statement saying that it was impossible to change the day of the meeting because of the election laws, and blaming county chairman Butler for the delay in calling the reorganization meeting.

Mr. Thoeft in his statement declared that "The election law compels the reorganization meeting of the county committee to be held within fifteen days of the primary. To hold the meeting after that date would be illegal. The election law also compels the organization to notify the county committee of such a meeting five days before it is held." Democratic headquarters had expected to call the meeting for yesterday or today but the necessary permission had not been forthcoming from chairman Butler until Wednesday, Mr. Thoeft said.

The need for giving five days notice would have brought the meeting on Sunday which, under the election law, is illegal, Mr. Thoeft pointed out. Since the delegates to the Democratic state convention leave Sunday and will not return until Wednesday morning, Wednesday evening is the only time possible for the meeting within the law, Mr. Thoeft declared.

As a way out it is expected that few matters of importance will be taken up October 1, these being left for another meeting at a later date.

## Assembly's Sixth Commission Satisfied With Restoration of Peace, Order, in Palestine

Geneva, Sept. 26.—The Assembly of the League of Nations expresses its gratification at the restoration of peace and order in Palestine and voices the hope that the measures taken by the British government may prevent a recurrence of such events as took place in 1929, says the draft of a resolution adopted today by the sixth or political commission of the Assembly for submission to the Assembly.

Hugo Valvanne, substituting for Hjalmar Procopé, Finland's representative on the Assembly, in submitting the resolution, also reported on mandate questions. He said that the sixth commission could not dream of going into details as to the position of the various mandated territories. The commission, he said, noted only a few particular points of special importance.

"It learned with great satisfaction of the improvement in the position of Palestine. In this connection it viewed with gratification the Mandatory Power's efforts to restore an atmosphere of tranquility and the steps taken to prevent a recurrence of such tragic events as the Assembly had deplored last year," he said. The report of the sixth commission also pays tribute to the work of the League's Council, of the Mandates Commission and to the ability and impartiality with which they conducted their proceedings.

## Hall of Fame Electors to Vote on Election of Isaac M. Wise

On October 1, the eve of Yom Kippur, American Jewry will learn whether a Jew, the first Jew, is to be elected to the Hall of Fame on the campus of New York University, for on that day will be made public the results of the balloting by the college of electors who will have to fill fifteen vacancies.

Among the candidates on whom the 106 electors are voting is Rabbi Isaac M. Wise, the late leader of American Reform Judaism, founder of the Hebrew Union College and founder and first editor of the American Israelite. Rabbi Wise is not only the solitary Jewish candidate on whom the electors are voting but he is also the first Jew for whom the electors have ever had an opportunity of balloting.

## Rabbis Kook and Sonnenfeld Ask Palestine Support for Yeshivas

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 26.—Rabbi Abraham Kook, chief rabbi of Palestine, and Rabbi J. C. Sonnenfeld, chief Ashkenazic rabbi of Jerusalem, today issued for the first time a joint appeal to the Jews of Palestine to support the rabbinical seminaries in the country in view of the diminution of support from America as a result of the economic depression there.

The appeal says, "Four thousand of Jerusalem's most precious sons, pillars of the faith and of the Torah, are suffering acute privations."

## Three Russian Zionists Freed From Prison Through Efforts of U. S. Zionist Organization

Three Russian Jews, condemned to prison terms for spreading Zionist educational material, have been freed and certificates given them for emigrating to Palestine, as a result of the efforts of the Zionist Organization of America, according to a report made by Robert Szold, chairman of the Administration.

Two of the Russian Zionists lived in Moscow and one in Paltava. All three were given prison sentences of three years on the ground of having conducted "counter-revolutionary activities." It was revealed, however, that the Jew in Paltava had sold stamps of the Jewish National Fund, the agency which purchases land in Palestine as the national property of the Jewish people. The two Moscow Jews had been engaged in giving information about the aims and purposes of the Zionist movement.

American relatives of the condemned Russian Jews communicated the facts to the Palestine Department of the Zionist Organization of America, which thereupon applied to the Palestine Government for immigration certificates for the condemned. As a result of a special arrangement which exists between the Zionist Organization and the Palestine Government, Russian Zionists who are imprisoned for their Zionist activities may obtain Palestine immigration certificates. Upon intercession with the Russian authorities, the three Jews were freed on condition that they would leave for Palestine. The certificates have already been forwarded from Palestine and are to be handed out in Moscow by the British consul there. The condemned will be able to leave the country with their families.

Mr. Szold also announced that eight more applications for certificates for imprisoned Russian Zionists have been made to the Palestine Government.

## Warsaw Kehillah Rejects Taxes of Converted Jew

Warsaw, Sept. 26.—Because he became a convert to Christianity, taxes of one thousand zlotys sent by Felix Wisliczki to the Jewish community of Warsaw have been returned to him by the community. In a letter that he received from the community's executive he was informed that converted Jews could not be members of the community. Wisliczki is the manager of a large silk factory in Tomaszow.

An annual grant of 5,000 zlotys to the Yiddish Literary Society, an organization that includes in its membership all the Jewish newspapermen and writers of Warsaw, has been approved by the Warsaw Jewish community. This is the first time that the Jewish community has granted such a subsidy. The community budget for the coming year will amount to over 5,000,000 zlotys. Herschel Farbstein, a member of the Polish parliament, is the president of the community.

# **Sees Rumanian Peasants' Difficulties Utilized for Anti-Semitic Agitation**

Bucharest, Sept. 26.—The situation in Northern Bessarabia, especially in Balti and Soroca, is very disquieting because the sufferings of the population are being exploited for anti-Semitic agitation, declared Serge Dimitru, Liberal leader and former prefect of Balti in the course of an interview that he gave to the Nasha Reci, the organ of the Russian minority in Bessarabia but published in Bucharest. There is more behind the present unrest than appears on the surface, Mr. Dimitru said, adding that the government measures are not sufficient.

On the other hand the Dimineatzu, leading Bucharest daily, calls the government's attention to the danger of social difficulties in the Southern part of Rumania. The paper urges the government to take measures to assist the peasants out of their troubles by such means as postponement of taxes and interest payments on loans. The Dimineatzu also suggests that government officials and members of parliament as well as the press begin a counter-propaganda to offset that among the peasants. Unless drastic steps are taken at once, the paper warns, it may soon be too late.

# **Named Assistant Attorney General of Missouri**

St. Louis, Sept. 26.—Henry H. Stern was today named assistant attorney-general of Missouri, according to an announcement from Jefferson City by attorney-general Stratton Shartel. He was appointed to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of M. Cunningham. Mr. Stern is the youngest Jew ever named to such a post in this state. He is 27 years old.

# **Democrats Name Miller for State Supreme Court**

Julius Miller, Borough President of Manhattan, was nominated for Justice of the Supreme Court by Tammany Hall at the First Judicial District convention of the Democratic organization held on Thursday night. Mr. Miller has been nominated to succeed Justice Joseph F. Crater, who disappeared several weeks ago. Justice Bernard L. Shientag was among the four Supreme Court justices now sitting on the bench who were nominated for another term.

Mr. Miller, who is 50 years old, was admitted to the bar at the age of 21 and started his political career with a term in the State Senate. He has served as Borough President of Manhattan for the past nine years. As Borough President he has carried out many public improvements, such as the widening of Park Avenue and Allen Street and the building of the viaducts around Grand Central and Riverside Drive. He is a member of the Congregation Kehillath Jesurun of Manhattan.

# **Revisionists, Brith Trumpeldor Making Plans to Mark 50th Birthday of Jabotinsky**

Jerusalem, Sept. 26.—The Zionist Revisionists, opposition to the Weizmann regime within the World Zionist Organization, and the Brith Trumpeldor, Jewish youth organization, are making plans for a wide-spread celebration of the fiftieth birthday of Vladimir Jabotinsky in October. Jabotinsky is the world leader of the Zionist Revisionists.

Born in Odessa, Jabotinsky studied law at the Universities of Rome and Berne. In 1889 he began his notable literary career as a contributor of stories, articles and poems to the Russian press. The persecutions to which Russian Jewry was subjected at the beginning of this century led him to interest himself in Jewish problems. His Zionist activity dates from about 1903 when he began to publish articles advocating a Jewish State in Palestine and denouncing the theory of assimilation.

In addition to helping organize Zionist societies in Russia, he also undertook a tour of the largest European cities in order to make political connections which would strengthen the Zionist movement and enable it to attain its ends. From 1905 to 1907 Jabotinsky was a member of the Russian Duma to which he was elected as a Zionist. The outbreak of the World War found him in Egypt where in March 1915 he organized the Zion Mule Corps which distinguished itself in the battle of Gallipoli.

In 1916 he formed the Jewish Legion out of which two Jewish battalions sprang. As a part of the British army Jabotinsky and his Jewish battalions fought the Turks in Palestine. After the British conquest of the country he remained in Palestine for many years.

When the first Arab attacks on the Jews broke out in 1920, Jabotinsky organized a Jewish self-defence corps. For this he was arrested and sentenced by a court martial to fifteen years in prison. As a result of widespread protests this sentence was commuted to one year. When Sir Herbert Samuel became High Commissioner it was annulled entirely.

In recent years he has been a sharp and repeated critic of the Weizmann regime in the World Zionist Organization. This year he was refused a visa to return to Palestine by the government.

# **Ab Goldberg, Z.O. Leader, Returns from Europe**

Ab Goldberg, vice-president of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization and one of the members of the Zionist Organization of America's coalition committee of 18, has returned from Europe where he attended the sessions of the Actions Committee and of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency. Mr. Goldberg is a contributor to the Jewish Morning Journal.

# **Would Conscript Best Members of Jewish Collectives to Aid in Coal Mines of Don Basin**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 26.—Every Jewish collective in the Jewish colonies of Russia would have to assign a number of its best and most able members to be sent to the Don Basin coal mines to aid in the liquidation of the Five Year Plan's failure on the so-called coal front, according to a demand today by the Comzet, the government department for settling the Jews on the land.

The Comzet publishes an appeal in the press saying that "thirty thousand workers and peasants are being utilized to assist in the Don Basin coal mines. It is therefore the duty of the Jewish peasants who are in collectives to be first in the ranks of those mobilized for the Don Basin." The Comzet concludes its appeal with a demand that each Jewish collective should conscript several of its best members for services in the Don Basin coal mines.

At the same time the Central Executive Committee of Miners has issued a circular saying that "it is not unlikely that the arrival of a great number of Jews in the Don Basin will cause anti-Semitic attacks by elements inclined to counter-revolution. It is therefore the duty of our professional organizations to prevent such attacks." The circular also reports that a number of anti-Jewish acts have already taken place among the Russian miners in the Don Basin.

"These acts are repeated quite often, consequently we must conduct a severe and systematic campaign against them by unmasking all anti-Semitic attempts in any shape or form," the circular concludes.

The Emes, organ of the Moscow Jewish Communists, although campaigning to have more Jewish youth sent into the mines, reports that of late the percentage of Jewish youth leaving the mines is extremely large. They became disappointed after working in the mines for several days, the Emes says. The paper blames for this the local Jewish leaders who, it claims, do not inform the Jewish youth of the difficult labor conditions in the mines when they are sent there from the small towns.

# **Jewish Educational Groups Appeal Against Showing of Yiddish Talks in Palestine**

Jerusalem, Sept. 26.—Appeals to the Jewish populace of Palestine not to attend the Yiddish talking pictures which are expected to be shown here shortly have been issued by the education department of the Jewish Agency, by the executive of the Jewish National Council and by the executive of the Jewish Teachers Organization. The education department of the Jewish Agency argues that while the talking pictures in other languages are also harmful, those in Yiddish are more so because of the propaganda element and the competition with Hebrew.

## Plans Completed for Home for Aged Jewish Scholars

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 26.—With the completion of plans for the Home for Aged Jewish Sages and Scholars, work is expected to be started shortly. The construction of the building is made possible by the recent gift of \$20,000 from Mordecai, Samuel and Shlomo Halperin and Mrs. Sarah Rabinerson and Mrs. Feige Greenberg, the sons and daughter of the late Moshe Halperin, millionaire sugar magnate of Kiev, Russia. The donors now live in Paris.

The Home for Aged Jewish Sages and Scholars will be built in the center of the United Aged Compound and will be known as Halperin's Home in memory of the parents of the donors. It is to contain 20 rooms with accommodations for 40 people. Special provisions will be made to enable the scholars and writers to carry on their literary work.

The United Aged Home (Moshev Sekenim), of which the new building will be a part, is now 50 years old, having been founded by the Jews of Jerusalem. It serves as a kitchen for the distribution of tea for old folks and is now the largest charitable institution in Palestine, accommodating several hundred pious old Jews and Jewesses from Palestine and abroad.

## Robert Szold to Speak at Boston Young Judaea

Boston, Sept. 26.—Robert Szold of New York, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, will be the guest of honor and speaker at the annual banquet of Young Judaea, to take place at the Beacon House, Brookline, on Sunday evening, October 12. At this time will be launched the \$5,000 campaign for funds for the continuation and development of the Young Judaea work here. In view of the great importance attached by the Zionist Organization to Zionist youth movements, the presence in this city of Mr. Szold is especially appropriate.

On the same evening, Mr. Szold will speak at the opening of the Allied Jewish Campaign in Lynn.

## Yeshiva College Opens For Its Third Year

The Yeshiva College opened last week for the Winter term. The Yeshiva College, the first and only College of Liberal Arts and Science under Jewish auspices, and authorized by the University of the State of New York, to offer courses leading to the degrees of B. A. and B. S. is starting the work of the third year.

In accordance with its policy of maintaining a small institution with a high standard, the Yeshiva College has accepted only 30 of the applicants for admission to the new Freshman Class, which includes several State Scholarship holders.

## Name Officers and Council of United Synagogue's Body of 1,000 to Stimulate Judaism

Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—The personnel of the officers and advisory council of the United Synagogue of America "Committee of One Thousand" was announced today by A. B. Cohen of Scranton and Philadelphia, national chairman of the committee. The purpose of this Committee of One Thousand is to stimulate interest in Jewish religious activity throughout the country, with special emphasis upon the requirements of the smaller unorganized Jewish communities.

Mrs. Samuel Spiegle, president of the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America has accepted the position of national associate chairman, and together with A. B. Cohen will head the movement. At a meeting of the Executive Council of the Women's League, whole-hearted endorsement was given to the program of "The Committee of One Thousand." A call will go out to the women of America to join the men in furthering this work.

Hon. H. P. Koppelman of Hartford, Conn., was named national secretary, with Jacob C. Gutman of Philadelphia, national treasurer. Mrs. David Friedlander of Philadelphia is national director.

## New Non-Denominational Temple Opens in Philadelphia October 12

Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—The "Liberal Temple," a non-denominational institution dedicated to youth, will open its doors on Oct. 12 in the Academy of Music under the leadership of Rabbi J. Gerson Brenner. Rabbi Brenner expects to have prominent clergymen, diplomatists, authors and statesmen deliver addresses during the Winter season as part of the religious services.

"The desperate cry of young men and women for religion is thunderous to him who does not close his ears," Rabbi Brenner stated. "Youth, hungry for a religious message applicable to this age, marched to the churches. Then, unable to find what they wanted, they marched past the doors and are now waiting at the crossroads. Young people today are more concerned with justice and righteousness on this earth than in the world to come. Poverty, disease, prostitution, crime and war are religious questions. For this reason the Liberal Temple will preach but one day a week and will practice during the other six."

Since the membership fee will be nominal, the success of his congregation will not depend upon a few large financial contributors, Rabbi Brenner said. He plans to establish a social service department which will function in the poorer sections of Philadelphia and in public institutions. The Liberal Temple will hold services every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock and men and women of all or no creeds will be welcome.

## \$25,000 U. J. C. Check Is Tribute to Mrs. Friedlander

Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—A unique tribute to a faithful worker is the check for \$25,000 on account of collection of subscriptions to the United Jewish Campaign sent last week by Albert H. Lieberman, chairman of the Eastern Pennsylvania Zone, to Paul Baerwald, national treasurer.

The payments of subscriptions covered by this check were an expression by subscribers to the United Jewish Campaign of their appreciation of the loyal and indefatigable service rendered in the Eastern Pennsylvania Zone by Mrs. David Friedlander, who has been the field secretary for that district ever since the Jews of that state organized themselves to raise their share of the \$15,000,000 sought in that campaign.

Mrs. Friedlander recently relinquished that post to accept the position of executive secretary of the Committee of 1,000 of the United Synagogues of America. Including this latest remittance, the Eastern Pennsylvania Zone has paid into the treasury of the United Jewish Campaign the sum of \$1,225,000.

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
