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Keren Hayesod's Budget More Socialistic Than Those of Labor Governments, Palestine-Labor Congress Told; Left Poale Zion Conflict Settled; American Delegate Urges United Labor Fund

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The budget of the Keren Hayesod, the chief financial instrument of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, is more Socialistic than the budgets of the various Labor governments, Berl Katzenelson, editor of the Hebrew paper, Davar, organ of Palestine labor, told today's session of the first World Congress for Palestine Workers. Mr. Katzenelson gave a detailed description of the activities of the Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund and indicated their importance for Palestine Socialism.

Salman Rubashov, Palestine labor leader, outlined the growth and development of the Jewish labor movement since the Bialystok congress of 1900 when Zionists were excommunicated from the party ranks and Zionist workers ousted from the Jewish unions. Now, he said, the unions contain a majority of workers who are in favor of the Palestine work and an insignificant number of Communists.

As a result of the intervention of Dr. Oscar Cohn and Ernst Toller of Germany, the disagreement between the Left Poale Zion delegation and the rest of the Congress was amicably settled. Having left the meeting hall on the opening day of the Congress when Nahum Sokolow began his address and having created a brief disturbance when David Ben Gurion, president of the General Federation of Jewish Labor in Palestine opened his speech in Hebrew, the Left Poale Zionists were not present at Sunday's session because Ben Gurion ordered their delegate cards taken away.

Explains Exclusion of Left Poale Zion

When asked by a delegate why the Left Poale Zionists were excluded, Ben Gurion said that they had broken their pledge not to obstruct the Congress. At a press conference of the Left Poale Zionists, M. Zernbovel declared that they had not undertaken to

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Compromise Settles Fight Over Showing of Initial Yiddish Talkie in Tel Aviv

Tel Aviv, Sept. 29.—After cutting out the talking and singing parts of the Yiddish film "The Jewish Mother," the presentation of which caused a minor riot Saturday night, the continued showing of the film was uninterrupted by. Special posters signed by the municipal officials and the representative of the producers today announced that a compromise had been reached.

Saturday night, during the showing of this first Yiddish talkie to be presented in Tel Aviv, a number of hot-headed defenders of Hebrew spat ink and hurled foul-smelling objects at the screen as the audible part of the picture began. Others left the theatre in a demonstrative fashion, being greeted with cheers by a crowd outside. The shouts and boos became so widespread that the British police were called in to aid the local force.

On the request of Vice-Mayor Rokeach the police prohibited the second showing of the film, after the initial performance had been completed with difficulty. A number of the rowdies were arrested but were later released when Vice-Mayor Rokeach gave assurances that their actions would not be repeated.

The Hebrew press is divided in its reaction to the incipient riot. The Doar Hayom applauds the action of the "defenders of the Hebrew language" against "the deliberate impertinence of a jargon performance." The Davar, organ of Jewish labor, on the other hand, satirizes what it terms the "futile fanaticism" of those who marred the showing of the first Yiddish talkie in this all-Jewish city.

German Jewry Need Not Fear Victory of National Socialists, Minister of Interior Says

Berlin, Sept. 29.—Assurances regarding the safety of the Jews of Germany were given today by Dr. Joseph Wirth, minister of the interior in the Bruening cabinet, in an interview with Jacob Landau, managing director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. In an authorized statement, Dr. Wirth emphasized that there was no ground for the anxiety of the Jews the world over in view of the unexpected increase in the National Social representation in the Reichstag and that there was no danger of an anti-Semitic wave sweeping over Germany.

Dr. Wirth said that the Reich government has not departed from the attitude it has maintained up to the present and it will not permit itself to "be driven along with the anti-Semitic flow." Replying to a question of how he explained the astonishing increase in the National Socialist vote at the recent election, Dr. Wirth said it was due to the difficult economic situation of Germany, the great vote of the National Socialists signifying a tremendous protest against the present situation, he added.

The German minister of the interior was emphatic in expressing his disbelief that all those who voted for the National Socialists had thus certified themselves as enemies of the Jews. "Aggressive anti-Semitism which would lead to injustice or even outrages does not exist," he pointed out. "The government can guarantee the peace of the country. It was always its resolute aim to protect German citizens irrespective of religion. This the German Republic considers a matter of its honor. We not only desire the protection of all our citizens but we are able to ensure it," Dr. Wirth concluded.

Would Sell Mount from Which Moses Saw Promised Land

Jerusalem, Sept. 29.—A number of Bedouin sheiks who claim ownership to Mount Nebo have offered to sell the top of the mountain to the Franciscan Fathers, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency is authoritatively informed. The Franciscan Fathers have declined the offer. According to Deuteronomy XXXIV, 1-3 it was from this mountain that Moses, just before his death, surveyed the promised land. The name Nebo is the Hebrew form of the name of the Babylonian god Nabu, and, according to the Jewish Encyclopedia, was no doubt attached to the spot during the time prior to the reign of Thothmes II, when Babylonian civilization was dominant in Syria and Palestine.

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Unusable Sefer Torah Buried in Chicago with Unique Rites

Chicago, Sept. 29.—A Sefer Torah, or scroll of the law written on parchment and kept in the arks of synagogues, was buried on Sunday afternoon at solemn ceremonies in which three rabbis and a cantor participated. This unique service was observed because one of the scrolls used by the First Roumanian Congregation has become unusable.

Rabbi Harry Goldstein, spiritual leader of the Roumanian Congregation, officiated at the rites. He was assisted by Rabbis B. A. Daskal and Abraham Elman. Hymns were sung by Cantor Rothberg. Several hundred members of the congregation attended the services. The interment took place at the Roumanian cemetery at Waldheim.

When the parchment on which the Sefer Torah is written tears, or the wood becomes defective for some reason, or it becomes illegible, this holy writing is "posil," that is, invalid, and may no longer be used. Some defects can be remedied. However, where a letter in the Divine name becomes illegible, that may not be corrected because that requires erasure, and under the Orthodox Jewish law the name of the Lord may not be erased. A special box is constructed for the defective Torah and it is placed therein and buried in the cemetery. A tablet is usually erected over it with an inscription telling that a sacred scroll lies buried there.

Funeral Services Today for Daniel Guggenheim, Capitalist, Philanthropist, Mining Magnate

This afternoon at Temple Emanu-El leaders in business, industry and civic life will join in the last rites for Daniel Guggenheim, distinguished philanthropist, mining magnate and financier, who died suddenly Sunday morning at his home on Long Island at the age of 74. He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Mrs. Roger Straus, and two sons, Harry F. Guggenheim, American ambassador to Cuba, and Col. M. Robert Guggenheim. He also leaves four brothers, Murray, Solomon, R. William and Simon, the latter former United States Senator from Colorado.

His career was inseparably linked with the development of the mining industry in this country, particularly copper. From his father's small investment in a Colorado mine in the early 1880's the Guggenheim holdings were gradually extended until the entire family was engaged in operating the manifold enterprises. Daniel Guggenheim, noted for the progressive and far-sighted methods he introduced into the mining industry, was a pioneer in the introduction of new processes. He never hesitated at spending huge sums of money merely to examine the possibilities of a mining property.

Enterprises Vast

Alaska, Mexico, Chile, Belgian Congo, Colorado, Montana and Bolivia are some of the places to which the Guggenheims were led by their initiative and enterprise. Ever in the van of new developments in mining, Daniel Guggenheim was also a master organizer, having been the prime mover in the merging of the Guggenheim interests into the American Smelting and Refining Company. For almost two decades he was either chairman of the board or president of this huge undertaking.

Great capitalist that he was, Daniel

Memories of 1910 Cloakmakers' Strike Recalled in Fete to Jewish Labor Victory Heroes

Memories of the bitter cloakmakers' strike of 1910, a strike that definitely established the Jewish labor movement in New York, were recalled Sunday night when 40 veteran members of the strike committee were honored with a dinner at the Broadway Central Hotel to mark the twentieth anniversary of the great labor victory which resulted in the establishment of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union.

Justice Louis D. Brandeis, who was instrumental in the settlement of the strike, sent greetings through Meyer Bloomfield, Abraham Rosenberg, leader of the strike, and president of the International in 1919, was presented with a watch. Sol Polakoff, secretary of the 1910 organization, was given a writing set. Further memories were evoked with the presence of Mrs. Meyer London and Dr. Isabel London, widow and daughter of the late Meyer London, who, as attorney for the strikers, was one of the real heroes of the victory.

Jew Is Guardian of Sons of Man Who Left Millions for White Protestants

Yonkers, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Whether Cornell University will accept a foundation provided in the will of Leslie B. Palmer, widely known Yonkers banker, who died August 31, because it provides for a dormitory for "Gentile, Protestant, white students and instructors," has not yet been determined, as no formal notice has yet gone forth to the university.

Appointment of a Jewish lawyer as guardian of the millionaire's sons today had increased interest in the matter. Such notice to Cornell may soon be given, however, as the will has just been formally probated by Surrogate George A. Slater in Surrogate's Court at White Plains. Asked as to the attitude of the University on such a sectarian gift, Dr. Livingston Farrand, president of the institution at Ithaca, N. Y., declared, "I have no information concerning the matter, and am, therefore, not in a position to make any statement."

The specific provision in the will, penned in the late banker's own handwriting, and covering several thousand words which dispose of millions of dollars states in explaining the disposition of terminated trusts:

"Tenth: the balance of the estate shall be paid to the trustees of Cornell University to be used in the erection of a dormitory in which Gentile Protestant white students and instructors of the Anglo-Saxon race may lodge at a nominal cost."

Because of the unusual provision, special attention here today focused upon the appointment of Harry C. Adams, a leading Jewish lawyer here and in New York, who is also vice-president of the Yonkers Board of Education, as special guardian for Mr. Palmer's two children, Richard and Wayne Palmer. Adams named by Surrogate Slater to represent the two boys, reported no objection to the will, thus permitting its rapid probate. Mr. Adams said each of the sons inherits a \$350,000 trust fund and shares also in the residuary estate.

Anti-Semites Allege Judge Trying Fascists Is Jew

Leipzig, Sept. 29.—A letter alleging that Dr. Arthur Edwin Baumgarten, presiding judge in the sensational trial of three Reichswehr lieutenants charged with high treason in connection with Fascist activities, is a Jew was handed him in the Supreme Court room at the opening of today's session of the sensational case. The letter was profusely decorated with swastika signs, which in Germany are used as anti-Semitic labels.

The letter also demanded that Adolf Hitler, leader of the Fascists, and who was himself called as a witness in the trial last week, be named the judge. Dr. Baumgarten read the letter himself from the tribunal and announced that he was not a Jew.

Following a greeting to the Congress by M. Huysman, Belgian Socialist leader, M. Pierard, on behalf of the Palestine Committee of the Second International, declared that the League of Nations must impose upon England the duty of assisting the establishment of the Jewish National Home.

Schlossberg Urges United Labor Fund

Joseph Schlossberg, American labor leader, appealed to the Congress to create a united labor fund. "Seven years ago the word Palestine was a synonym for reactionary in America, but today it means labor and work for social progress," he said, appealing for a postponement of the fight over whether Yiddish or Hebrew should be used in Palestine. He urged that those who are working for the upbuilding of Palestine should themselves choose the language. Morris Finestone then greeted the Congress in the name of 250,000 Jewish union members of America and also in the name of the American Federation of Labor.

M. Goudall, speaking for Albert Thomas, head of the International Labor Bureau, declared that the Labor Bureau had learned a lesson from Palestine. Speaking of the question of Arab-Jewish relations, M. Goudall pointed out that a unification of both groups is desirable or else each group should devote itself to the activities in which its specific abilities could be utilized. Noting that the Labor Bureau is represented on the Mandates Commission, M. Goudall said that the Bureau would see to it that Palestine would develop on a peaceful basis.

The Congress, which opened Saturday night, is being attended by 200 delegates from all parts of the world and by more than 1,000 visitors, including Jewish labor leaders from all countries and other labor and Socialist personages from Europe. Ben Gurion's address outlined the aims of the Congress and reported on the program of Palestine labor.

Karl Marx's Grandson Speaks

Jean Longuet, French Socialist leader and grandson of Karl Marx, told the Congress that "all champions of the progress of the Jews as well as other Christians sympathize with the work of Palestine labor because it is a Socialist experiment." He welcomed the American delegation as the "bearers of Socialism in the country of Rockefeller and Ford."

S. Kaplansky, a member of the Zionist Executive and leader of the Poale Zion, welcomed Professor Albert Einstein, Dr. Eduard Bernstein and other world-famous personages who were given a rising ovation by the Congress. Dr. Bernstein said that "seventy years ago I entered the Socialist party. Today I hope the work of Palestine labor will show Socialism new roads." Johan Sassenbach, general secretary of the

Trade Union International, praised the trade union efforts of the General Federation of Jewish Labor and called it a pioneer in the enlightenment of the Arab workers. The International fully supports the work of Palestine Labor, he declared.

Nahum Sokolow quoted a letter of the late Theodor Herzl in which the latter said that the Zionist Executive was sacrificing most for labor colonization. On behalf of 5,000,000 German trade unionists, their general secretary, M. Knoll, said, "We understand the martyr-like fight of the Jewish workers in Palestine because we too have our Arabs, viz., the Hitlerites who threaten that heads will roll in the sand. But Socialism will win in Palestine as it will in Germany."

Snell Hopeful of Simpson Report

Messages were received by the Congress from Harry Snell, on behalf of the British Labor Party, from J. S. Middleton, acting-secretary of the British Labor Party, from Chaim Nachman Bialik, noted Hebrew poet, Prof. Simeon Dubnow, famous Jewish historian, Leon Blum, French Socialist leader and hundreds of others. Mr. Snell's message concluded with the hope that the "recommendations of Sir John Simpson will inaugurate an epoch of prosperity in Palestine." The Haifa Arab Labor Club cabled its thanks to the General Federation of Jewish Labor for unifying all Palestine workers. Abraham Shiplacoff, veteran American Socialist leader and a member of the American delegation, rendered an enthusiastic report of his recent visit to Palestine.

Professor Einstein, in his address welcoming the delegates at the opening session Saturday night, said:

"It is true that I am an old school-master, but today I can teach you nothing. On the contrary, I want to learn from you. The Palestine question is close to my heart. As a people we Jews would have perished long ago had we not been at the same time a cultural community. I believe Palestine can be to us what it should be, an expression of a high cultural community. It does not matter how many Jews are in Palestine, but it does matter what they produce there. That should be something that the Jews of the whole world can point to as ideal creative work and with which they can identify themselves."

Large Part of Kiss Estate for Jewish Charities

A large part of the estate, as yet unappraised, of the late Emil Kiss, Jewish banker who died August 1, is to go to Jewish charities here and in Hungary. After the estate has been appraised half of the proceeds from the sale of Mr. Kiss' art collection is to go to Mt. Sinai Hospital and the other half to the Spital der Israelitischen Koltus Gemeinde in Budapest.

U. S. Jews Must Take Leading Role in Meeting Problems of World Jewry, Warburg Says

"American Jewry must assume a leading position and responsibility in the problems of world Jewry," declared Felix M. Warburg, Chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, in addressing the students of the Training School for Jewish Social Work yesterday afternoon on the opening day of school at the School auditorium. Mr. Warburg, who is Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, which dispensed more than \$70,000,000 since the beginning of the World War on behalf of American Jewry, is also Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Training School for Jewish Social Work.

Speaking before a large assembly of the faculty, alumni, incoming students, and communal leaders, Mr. Warburg outlined the position of the Jews in the principal countries of the world, and stated that no group in world Jewry is as fortunately situated as American Jewry.

"The Jews in Russia," said Mr. Warburg, "are in no position to help others. They need help themselves and the American Jews are doing a great deal to help them through the Joint Distribution Committee and other agencies. German Jewry is just now concerned

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Riegelman Named to Prosecute Election Frauds in N. Y. C.

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Harold Riegelman, New York City lawyer and a leader in Jewish college fraternity work in this country, has been appointed by Attorney General Ward to take charge of the prosecution of election frauds in New York City. Samuel A. Berger and Marshall Snyder will be among those who will assist Mr. Riegelman in this work.

Mr. Riegelman is a leader of the Zeta Beta Tau fraternity, of the inter-collegiate Menorah Association and president of the Council on American Jewish Student Affairs. He has been Special Assistant Attorney General in charge of Constitutional cases in the Federal and State courts, was counsel to the state commission on revision of the tenement house law and has been a State Veterans' Relief Commissioner since 1922.

Says PICA Option on 4,000 Dunams of Land Has Lapsed

Jerusalem, Sept. 29.—The option of the Palestine Jewish Colonization Association (PICA) on 4,000 dunams of land near Beisan has evidently lapsed, the Arab paper *Palastin* says, reporting that the widow of the Arab landlord owning the land intends to sue M. Nachmani, the PICA's representative in Tiberias for breaking the contract. According to the *Palastin*, she will then offer the lands to Arabs or Egyptians at a cheaper price than stipulated in the option.

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with its own problems due to the recent success of the Hitlerites. Although they look upon this as only a passing phase, they are nevertheless deeply concerned and must use some of their strength and resources to combat this vicious attack on the Jews of Germany. German Jewry is, however, standing by nobly and is doing everything in its power to help world Jewry. The Jews in Poland are in no condition to help, since they are in desperate economic straits and need all the help we can give them. The same is true of the Jews in Roumania and in most of the other countries of Europe. The Jews of France and England are mere handfuls compared with American Jewry, but they are doing their share."

American Jewry, according to Mr. Warburg, is the best situated Jewish group in the world from the standpoint of their numbers and their economic and political position, despite the present depression. "It is natural, therefore," he said, "that they should be expected to assume their position of leadership and responsibility." He declared that students beginning their studies in Jewish social service could not do better than to begin to think at once in terms of the wider aspects of Jewish philanthropy.

Louis E. Kirstein of Boston, vice-president of Filene's and president of the School, stressed the increasingly important position which Jewish social workers are coming to occupy throughout the United States and called attention to the fact that some social workers have been called to positions of national and international importance and prominence.

Maurice J. Karp, director of the School, outlined the progress which the School has made since its organization in 1925 and spoke of the important position which the School has come to occupy in Jewish life in America and the contribution which it is making to Jewish communal work by making available the trained personnel to carry on the many activities on which American Jews spend in the neighborhood of \$40,000,000 annually. Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York City, welcomed the students for the Board of Professional Advisors of the School of which he is Chairman.

National Socialists Oust Jewish Committee Members

Berlin, September 29—All of the Jewish members of the Koburg city council's welfare committee have been expelled by the majority members of the council who are National Socialists (Fascists). Following a protest of the Koburg Jewish community to the Bavarian government the latter annulled the action of the National Socialist members as illegal.

Arabs Split Over Dismissal and Slight Punishment of Saleh, Arab Executive Secretary

Jerusalem, Sept. 29—Indignation at the action of the Arab Executive in merely censuring and dismissing Omar Saleh, one of the Executive's three secretaries who was accused of divulging information to the police, is voiced by the Aljamea Al Arabia, organ of the Grand Mufti. The paper hints that much graver punishment was contemplated but was withheld for various reasons. The Saleh affair has left the Arab Executive exposed to attacks from both the Mufti's party and the Palestinian which is friendly to Saleh. The failure of the Executive to punish the latter is characterized as a desertion of God and country by Aljamea Al Arabia.

After censuring him for revealing secret documents to the police, the Arab Executive asked for and received the resignation of Saleh. The latter pleaded that he had acted in good faith in showing to the British police the text of the Executive's resolutions and proclamations calling for a general strike on August 23, the first anniversary of last year's riots.

Auni Abdul Hadi and Jamal Hussein, a nephew of the Grand Mufti, who conducted the inquiry, acquitted Saleh of treachery, recommending only a reprimand for negligence. Abdul Hadi was then elected secretary of the Executive to replace the dismissed Saleh while Jamal Hussein was named manager of the Executive's office to succeed Subhi El Khadra, who has been exiled to a year's enforced residence in Safed for having been the author of the proclamation, the text of which Saleh was accused of having given to the authorities.

Abdul Hadi, one of the Arab counsel before the Shaw Commission, was recently dismissed as counsel to the Moslem Supreme Council.

Christian Arabs Decline Peace Overtures of Moslem Leaders

Haifa, Sept. 29—The efforts of the Arab Executive to settle the dispute between the Moslem and Christian Arabs which grew out of a street row over possession of a cemetery, a row in which a Christian-Arab was killed, have broken down. The Christian-Arab Bishop Hajj today coldly received a peace deputation of the Executive consisting of Ragheb Bey Nashashibi, mayor of Jerusalem; M. Moghanam, secretary of the Executive, and Issa Elissa.

Bishop Hajj accepted the Arab Executive's expressions of regret over the killing of Jamal Bakhrri the Christian-Arab editor, but declined all peace overtures. While the Moslem delegation was conferring with Bishop Hajj a crowd of Christian Arabs outside shouted, "We do not want peace." Acknowledging the failure of its mission the delegation returned to Jerusalem.

Funeral Services Today for Daniel Guggenheim, Capitalist, Philanthropist, Mining Magnate

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Guggenheim was also known as an advocate of workers' welfare. In the course of a government probe of the labor situation he declared that if the Guggenheim interests ever failed to put into effect a remedial measure for improving the condition of its workers he would quit. He was a wholehearted approver of trade unionism. There could never be "too much legislation along humanitarian lines," he said.

Numerous Philanthropies

His numerous philanthropies, many of which were anonymous, were principally directed towards the support of popular appreciation of classical music and the development of aviation. In 1924 he established the Daniel and Florence Guggenheim Foundation to promote "through charitable and benevolent activities the welfare of mankind." He endowed this Foundation with many millions of dollars. Together with his brother Murray, he financed the Goldman Band Concerts in Central Park.

Five years ago he gave New York University \$500,000 for the establishment of the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aviation. This Foundation has had an important part in the development of aviation in this country, having financed Lindbergh's tour of the country, cooperated with the government, and aided in the organization of air mail routes. The foundation has also spent almost \$1,000,000 on aviation educational centers in various colleges and universities.

His achievements in industries, philanthropy and aviation are being widely praised by men in all walks of life. Mr. Guggenheim was a member of Temple Emanu-El. For a number of years he was a trustee of the congregation.

Urge Czechoslovakia to Protect Jews

Prague, Sept. 29—Ludwig Singer, Jewish member of the Czechoslovak parliament, today lodged a second protest with the minister of the interior against last week's anti-Semitic disturbances. He demanded provisions to safeguard the life and property of Jewish citizens. Dr. Singer pointed out the great anxiety of the Jewish population over the extensive anti-Semitic agitation being carried on in certain sections of the press and urged the government to give assurances that it would preserve order under all circumstances in the event of further disturbances.

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
