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## Drafting Ordinance for Giving Effect to Arab-Jewish Wailing Wall Agreement When Reached

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 30—The office of the attorney-general is completing the draft of an ordinance begun by Attorney-General Bentwich which is designed to give effect to the Jewish-Moslem agreement on the Wailing Wall question when and if reached, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns. Even if the Moslems do not go beyond recognizing the Jewish right of access to the Wall without stipulating the present Jewish position, the ordinance now being drafted will recognize the right of the Jews to worship at the Wall.

It is felt here, however, that if the Moslems do not yield the Jews the right to hold public prayer at the Wall there is no purpose to further negotiations, especially since both the rabbinate and the Agudath Israel, Orthodox organization, are being subjected to pressure by Jewries outside of Palestine against an agreement, Jewish circles outside of Palestine preferring to trust the Wailing Wall Commissioners to reach a just decision.

## Rutenberg Abandons Plan to Quit Vaad Leumi Chairmanship

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 30—Pinchas Rutenberg, president of the Jewish National Council, has dropped his intention of resigning and so informed the last meeting of the Council's executive which was largely attended. Among those present was Col. Frederick Kisch on behalf of the Jewish Agency. Rutenberg returned from the Berlin meetings deeply disappointed with what he alleged to be the failure of the Jewish Agency leaders, including Dr. Chaim Weizmann, to appreciate the gravity of the Jewish situation in Palestine, particularly in view of Sir John Simpson's expected recommendations, especially the restriction of land sales.

During the first meeting of the Council after his return from abroad Rutenberg was inclined to adopt a policy tending to alienate the Jewish community here from the Jewish Agency. At the last meeting of the Council, however, he greatly moderated his stand. On his recommendation the Jewish National Council decided to initiate agreements between employers and employes for compulsory arbitration to avoid strikes and lockouts.

Last July Rutenberg, who is head of the Rutenberg Power Company, resigned from the triumvirate charged with the administration of the Palestine Emergency Fund.

## Report 2 Jews Killed, Many Injured in Rosh Hashanah Riot in Russian City

Warsaw, Sept. 30—Two Jews were killed, four seriously injured and many others slightly hurt as a result of a bloody fight between members of the Young Communist League and Jewish worshippers in Berditchev on the second day of Rosh Hashanah, the *Illustrowany Kurjer Codzienny* of Cracow reports. The paper says that at least a hundred persons were also arrested following the clash.

According to the Cracow paper, members of the Young Communist League, under the leadership of one Somolow, alias Sommerfeld, began to disperse the holiday worshippers while the services were on. When the leader of the congregation, Rabbi Rappaport, drew the attention of the Young Communists to the fact that the Ogpu, the Soviet secret police, had given permission for the holiday prayers, Somolow spat in the venerable rabbi's face.

Aroused to indignation by this deliberate affront, the Jews sought to expel the Communists from the synagogue. This led to the fight in which a cavalry troop was impressed into service, the Cracow paper reports. The cavalrymen are said to have beaten the Jews mercilessly, Rabbi Rappaport being among those injured. After the attack had ended scores of Jewish homes were searched and a hundred or more Jews arrested.

## German Mizrahi Threatens Split in Ranks of World Mizrachi

Berlin, Sept. 30—A split in the ranks of the Mizrahi, Orthodox Zionist Party, is threatened as a result of a resolution adopted here today at the conference of the German Mizrahi organization. The resolution declares for an open fight against the World Mizrahi and demands a complete change in the political, financial and organizational orientation.

Should the forthcoming World Mizrahi conference decline to accede to these demands the German Mizrahi is prepared to organize a world union of its own in which the Swiss Mizrahi, it is believed, would join. Rabbi Meier Berlin of Jerusalem is head of the World Mizrahi.

## Chief Rabbi of Czernowitz Decorated by King Carol

Bucharest, Sept. 30—The high Order of the Roumanian Star was today bestowed upon Rabbi Jacob Mark, chief rabbi of Czernowitz, by King Carol.

## No Compensation to be Paid Prague Riots Sufferers; Order and Peace are Now Restored

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Sept. 30—With order in Prague and the provinces completely restored, the anti-Semitic agitation in the press that resulted from last week's anti-German demonstrations has been discontinued and a repetition of the troubles is believed unlikely. The damages caused by the riots are estimated at 500,000 Kronen, half of which was suffered by Jews. Both the federal and municipal governments have refused to compensate the property-owners, advising them to collect damages from the 91 persons arrested in connection with the disturbances.

The authorities are now investigating the responsibility of a number of police officers who are accused of sympathizing with the nationalists and anti-Semites who instigated the riots. These officers are alleged to have disregarded orders to take more energetic measures to preserve order. This insubordination was said to have been apparent on the first day of the troubles, and consequently there is a possibility that the ministry of the interior will take disciplinary measures against the accused officers.

## Death of Birkenhead Loss to Zionism and Anglo-Jewry

London, Sept. 30—Zionism and Anglo-Jewry have lost a great friend and a staunch supporter in the death of Frederick Edwin Smith, the first Earl of Birkenhead, who died here today after an extended illness, at the age of 58. Lord Birkenhead, one of the leading Conservative statesmen of England, repeatedly manifested his pro-Jewish sentiments while he was a member of Conservative governments. As Solicitor-General from 1915 to 1919, Attorney-General from 1919 to 1922 and Secretary of State for India from 1922 to 1928, he always showed sympathy for the Zionist cause.

He was an outstanding defender of Great Britain's retaining the Palestine Mandate. During the campaign to get England to clear out of Palestine, he staunchly opposed such action. Lord Birkenhead was a frequent speaker at various Zionist functions. In July 1928 at a dinner in London to raise funds for the Balfour Forest in Palestine, Lord Birkenhead was one of the principal speakers and contributed to the \$75,000 that was raised.

Lord Melchett, president of the English Zionist Federation and Jewish Agency leader, who himself has not recovered from his illness, issued a statement to the press deploring the death of Lord Birkenhead as a friend and close collaborator.

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## Zionist Election Bloc Turns Down Union with Agudah; to Contest Elections Alone

Warsaw, Sept. 30.—After two days of negotiations, the recently organized united Zionist election bloc has decided not to join with the Agudath Israel, Orthodox non-Zionist organization. Following the insistence of Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, president of the Polish Zionist Organization, and the Hitachduth, non-Socialist Zionist Labor Party, which is strictly against an election union with the Agudath Israel, the Mizrachi, Orthodox Zionist Party, also agreed to establish only a Zionist bloc.

As a result of this, a heated election campaign among the Jews is predicted with the Zionists and a number of Jewish economic groups on one side and the Agudah and other Jewish organizations on the other. The Agudah, some weeks ago, issued a public statement urging the establishment of a united Jewish front for the forthcoming elections.

## Executive Committee of Z.O.A. Outlines Economic Program for Palestine; Plans to Raise \$100,000 for Expanding Work in U. S.

Plans for an extensive program of economic undertakings in Palestine to be sponsored by a series of separate corporations, were announced by Israel B. Brodie, chairman of the Economic Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, at the first meeting of the Executive Committee of the Z.O.A. at the Hotel Pennsylvania on Sunday, September 28th, it is revealed in a transcript of the minutes of the executive session which have just been made public.

Meeting for the first time since its election at the Cleveland Zionist convention, the Executive Committee heard a series of reports covering the activities of the Organization. The meeting was opened by Robert Szold, chairman of the Administration, who then turned the chair over to Israel Brodie after he had been unanimously elected chairman of the Executive Committee. Nelson Ruttenberg, of New York, was named as secretary.

In his report as chairman of the Administration, Mr. Szold expressed the feeling that as a result of the action of the Mandates Commission and the Council of the League of Nations that a spirit of closer cooperation between the Jewish people and the Mandatory Power may be expected, and spoke of the need for enlarged constructive activities. Referring to the Jewish Agency, Mr. Szold said:

### Z.O.A. to Cooperate with Agency

"The Jewish Agency is manfully setting about its task. Organized under circumstances of unusual difficulty, it is beginning its work of development of the Jewish National Home under the Mandate. The proportions allotted in the Agency budget to constructive practical colonization and economic work, as compared to that of other activities may be too low in the opinion of many of us, and in the instrumentalities of its organization both here and in Palestine, may no doubt be improved. The enlarged Jewish Agency exists; we shall loyally and faithfully carry out our compact; we propose to cooperate, as Zionists, with and support the Jewish Agency in carrying out its purpose. In thus cooperating a virile Z.O.A. is necessary and we shall maintain an occasion may require, the principles which animate our movement for the Jewish National Home."

Mr. Szold set the tone for the meeting when he declared that the Administration "proposes to emphasize the economic methods for the upbuilding of Palestine. This is not because any of us does not have the high spiritual and cultural ideals as the goal; for we realize the sound economic base is not the ultimate end in itself. But at the present moment we feel the need of accelerating the pace of immigration; and we feel called upon to dedicate ourselves to that immediate objective. We stress the economic foundation for the immediately enlarged Jewish population."

What was regarded as the most important occurrence at the meeting was

the reading of the report of the Economic Committee by Israel B. Brodie which foreshadowed a program of economic expansion in Palestine hitherto never attempted by any agency in the United States. It was emphasized by Mr. Brodie that the plans for commercial and industrial undertakings are to be furthered in cooperation with the Jewish Agency, the Palestine Economic Corporation and any other bodies or individuals who may desire to lend assistance.

Pointing out that it is the Zionist aim, in the words of Justice Brandeis, "to populate Palestine within a comparatively short time with a preponderating body of manly, self-supporting Jews, who will develop there into a homogeneous people; will apply the Jewish spiritual and intellectual ideals; and will ultimately become a self-governing commonwealth," Mr. Brodie said that the most important task facing Zionists is the acceleration and enlargement of the absorptive capacity of Palestine.

Saying that agricultural colonization "is, of course, of supreme importance, and it must continue without interruption," he declared, however, that "the time has come to shift our emphasis, at least for the time being, to the stimulation and rapid development of industry and commerce in Palestine and in this view we must make current with the Jews of the country."

After reviewing the commercial possibilities of the country, Mr. Brodie stated that it is the purpose of his committee to select certain "key" enterprises which are likely to exercise "the widest influence upon the whole economy of the country and which will vitally enlarge the capacity of Palestine to absorb the largest number of immigrants in the shortest possible time."

### Corporation for Each Phase

The Economic Committee proposed that each particular phase of the expansion work be undertaken by a separate corporation. The functions of the Committee in relations to the corporation would be (a) to study all relevant facts for each undertaking before submitting plans for the formation of a company to undertake the financing of the enterprise; (b) to secure for each undertaking the leadership of those men whose business experience in the particular enterprises them to deal with the particular enterprise; (c) to use the facilities of the Zionist Organization in securing participation in these enterprises by members of the Zionist Organization and those who are not members thereof; (d) to serve the several groups in an advisory capacity from time to time through those members of this committee particularly qualified for the task.

Mr. Brodie then enumerated what he considered the "key" industries in which investigations are being conducted, where the enterprises are not already established. These are:

(1) Palestine Potash, Ltd. It was pointed out that the capital of this com-

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## Palestine Labor Congress Hears Palestine Can Hold 7,000,000

Berlin, Sept. 30—Palestine has an absorptive capacity of 7,000,000 people, S. Kaplansky, Poale Zion leader, told the World Congress for Palestine Workers now in session here. Joseph Sprinzak, Palestine labor leader, declared that the participation of Jewish labor in the Zionist Organization does not mean a coalition with the bourgeoisie but with the Jewish people. Speaking on the Jewish worker and the Zionist movement Sprinzak declared he made the above remark in reply to the charge from the Left Poale Zionists that such cooperation was "treason."

Colonel Malone, member of the British parliament, told the Congress that British labor was interested in Palestine not because of the Suez Canal but because of Socialism in Palestine. The workers of all lands hope that the Jewish workers will build a labor state there, he declared. "I accept Harry Snell's and the Mandates Commission's criticism of the Mandatory Power," Colonel Malone declared, adding that English social laws must be introduced into Palestine.

## Sees Palestine Shaken to Its Foundations If Simpson Report Not Accepted by Jews and Arabs

London, Sept. 30—Palestine will be shaken to its very foundation if the forthcoming report of Sir John Simpson fails to win acceptance by conciliation and mutual agreement of both Jews and Moslems, a special correspondent of the London Times, writing from Jerusalem concludes. This correspondent's long article published under the subhead of "Waiting for the Land Report Prepared by Simpson Which Will Be Published Shortly," describes in a favorable light Zionist achievements and stresses the jealousy, envy and suspicion of the Moslems towards the Jewish success.

The correspondent says that "while waiting for the publication of the report, which will serve as the basis of land tenure and land distribution, peace is not likely to be disturbed, but should the decision of the Mandatory Power fail to win acceptance by conciliation and mutual agreement of both Jews and Moslems, Palestine will be shaken to its very foundations."

## 70 Arabs, 4 Jews Employed on Haifa Railways Shops Job

Haifa, Sept. 30—Seventy Arabs and only four Jews are employed on the excavating work for the railway shops at Haifa. This number of Arabs does not include the 50 road workers whom the railway company employs. The contractors for the construction of the railway shops are Guth & Gurewith, a Jewish firm of Jerusalem. When they were awarded the contract the Arab press charged that favoritism was involved. The General Federation of Jewish Labor has repeatedly protested against the labor numerus clausus.

## Arab Executive Split as Leaders Prepare for Parley on Council With High Commissioner

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 30—Despite strenuous efforts to heal the ever-widening breach between the Grand Mufti's party and the adherents of Mouzza Kazim Pasha within the Arab Executive, a divided Executive will meet with High Commissioner Chanceller and Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary for the Colonies, within the next few days. The High Commissioner is returning to Palestine with proposals for parliamentary changes and the Arab leaders will confer with him on these changes.

The disagreement between the Arab factions centers around the proposed institutions, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns on excellent Arab authority. If the Grand Mufti decides to accept the British offer of a legislative council, Mouzza Kazim Pasha, president of the Arab Executive, will outwardly oppose it but actually is prepared to cooperate. On the other hand, if the government deals with Mouzza Kazim Pasha, the Grand Mufti does not intend to bridle his intransigence.

It is understood that the government would perhaps prefer to deal with the more moderate Mouzza Kazim Pasha, having been given sufficient evidence of the Mufti's lost hold on the people. Such action on the part of the government would probably also break the Mufti's hold on the Moslem Supreme Council whose annual income of \$400,000 gives him the mastership.

Jealous of the Mufti's power, and probably also fearful of the results of his unbridled recalcitrance the more thinking Arabs consider it more important to unseat the Mufti than to quarrel with the British authorities or even with the Zionists. The leadership of the Arab Executive is consequently divided

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## Last Rites for Guggenheim Held at Temple Emanu-El

Last rites for Daniel Guggenheim, who died at the age of seventy-four, were held at Temple Emanu-El yesterday afternoon, with Rabbi Nathan Krass officiating. Though tributes to the memory of Mr. Guggenheim were received from all parts of the world, no eulogy was actually read, and the funeral services were conducted with simplicity and dignity.

Among the honorary pallbearers were figures prominent in every walk of life, both Jews and non-Jews and included such personages as Irving Lehman, Dwight W. Morrow, Charles A. Lindbergh, Adolph S. Ochs, Cyrus Adler, Samuel Untermyer, Chancellor Elmer Ellsworth Brown and Ben Altheimer.

The Board of Trustees of Congregation Emanu-El adopted a resolution which reads in part as follows: "Realizing the valuable, devoted and conscientious service which he rendered to the congregation for many years in the firm conviction that Judaism had a great function to perform in the world, the Board of Trustees hereby express their deep sense of loss at his passing."

## Lt.-Gov. Lehman Renominated for Post by Democrats

Syracuse, Sept. 30—Lieutenant-Governor Herbert H. Lehman was renominated today for Lieutenant-Governor of New York by the Democratic State Convention meeting here today. Lieutenant-Governor Lehman is completing his first term, having been elected in 1928. For the last two years Lieutenant-Governor Lehman has served as Acting-Governor on a number of occasions. Lieutenant-Governor Lehman, formerly a prominent banker, is actively connected with many of the most prominent Jewish organizations in the country. He is vice-chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, vice-president of the Palestine Economic Corporation and active in the work of the Jewish Agency. He was one of the principal speakers at the meeting in Washington, last March, which led to the launching of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

He is also a director of the Hebrew Sheltering and Guardian Society and of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research.

## Jewish Lawyer Named Public Defender in Chicago Courts

Chicago, Sept. 30—Benjamin C. Bachrach, well known Jewish attorney, today was appointed public defender, to represent indigent defendants in criminal cases in Cook county. 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pany is \$1,250,000 of which \$500,000 was subscribed by persons affiliated with the Zionist Organization and the Palestine Economic Corporation. Mr. Brodie reported that the work at the Dead Sea is proceeding most rapidly and satisfactorily. He indicated that the undertaking will lay the foundations of a heavy chemical industry in Palestine.

(2) Citrus industry. The report points out that the value of the Jewish holdings in the Palestine citrus industry is about \$20,000,000 and yet "no real steps have been taken to create the fundamental instrumentalities which are essential to the stabilization and growth of this industry. What the corporation in this field would do would be to promote the establishment of a central agency to control the practices of grading and packing, to set up marketing agencies, to organize a central Citrus Growers' Exchange, etc. Mr. Brodie announced that an expert is now engaged on investigating the entire subject and that a report for the action of the Committee may be expected.

(3) Mortgage bank. A mortgage bank for urban loans to serve manufacturers and business men who have large portions of their capital frozen in business and residential properties.

(4) Engineering and contracting corporation. Possessing the most modern equipment and under the guidance of competent engineers, such a corporation would open up the field for the employment of Jewish labor in government and municipal works of all kinds, from which Jewish labor is now practically excluded.

(5) Factoring corporation. Such an organization would furnish credit to manufacturers for reasonable periods, on proper security, to enable them to purchase raw materials; furnish credit to manufacturers to extend their relatively long term credit demands; furnish capital for the enlargement of operations by various industries.

(6) Home industries. Promotion of home work which can provide employment for persons whose employment is seasonal, men, women and girls who work in the agricultural colonies, etc.

(7) Fisheries. An organization to develop the sardine packing industry.

### Other Committee Heads Report

During the day reports were also made by the Committee on Organization of which Jacob de Haas is chairman, Committee on Public Information, Emanuel Neumann, chairman; Committee on Finance, Samuel J. Rosensohn, chairman; Committee on Jewish Na-

tional Fund, Abraham Goldberg and Committee on Publications, Abraham Tulin.

During the discussion the various speakers declared the need of continuing the normal activities of the Organization as well as expanding some phases of its work. In line with these suggestions a resolution was adopted authorizing the Administrative Committee to proceed with the preparation of a budget which would maintain its full strength. The Executive Committee "pledges itself and through itself the Zionists of America, to supply a fund of \$100,000 to supplement the income from membership."

The session concluded with addresses by Abraham Goldberg and Louis Lipsky on the meetings of the Actions Committee and the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency at Berlin. Mr. Goldberg said that the memorandum which had been presented to the British Government was an indication of the close harmony that existed between Zionists and non-Zionists on fundamental policy in Palestine. Mr. Lipsky expressed the belief that in the best interests of accelerated work in Palestine it was desirable to enlarge the scope of the non-Zionist side of the Jewish Agency so that it might embrace a larger section of American Jewry.
