Anti-Semitism Appears Likely to Play Leading Role in Forthcoming Austrian Election

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 5.—No matter what the party alignments will be in the forthcoming parliamentary elections anti-Semitism appears likely to play a leading role. This is indicated from the aggressive anti-Jewish tactics of Prince Ernest von Starhemberg, leader of the Heimwehr, Austria's unofficial nationalist army, and minister of the interior in the new Vaugoin cabinet. Starhemberg's anti-Semitism is causing anxiety among Jewish leaders here who fear that the coming campaign will be similar to the fierce campaigns of 1895 and 1896 when the notorious anti-Semite, Dr. Carl Leuger, was elected mayor of Vienna.

Incites Crowd

Addressing a Heimwehr meeting at the Wienerheldenplatz, Prince Starhemberg incited the huge crowd against "hooknosed press scribblers who are misleading the Austrian national soul." He also announced that he would "tread under foot the Asiatic head" of Breitenner, financial commissioner of Vienna. Starhemberg attacked Breitenner not as a Socialist but as a Jew, although he left Judaism decades ago. Although Chancellor Vaugoin and former Chancellor Ignaz Seipel are understood to disagree with Starhemberg's methods the Christian Socialist Party is likely to return to the old Leuger policies because of the position it has been maneuvered into by its alliance with the Heimwehr.

Signs of the way the wind is blowing are seen in the abandonment of the Heimwehr front by the Wiener Journal edited by J. Lippowitz, a converted Jew. Hitherto inclined to back the Heimwehr-government coalition if it was assured that the anti-Socialist Jews would be treated as equal citizens, the Wiener Journal has now deserted the Heimwehr. The paper points out that it is impossible for a minister to use the government's authority properly when he engages in vilifying and threatening the Jews "who helped to create in a large

Period of Grace for Wailing Wall Agreement Ends Tuesday

Jerusalem, Oct. 6.—The period of grace that the Wailing Wall Commission allowed for a voluntary agreement between Moslems and Jews over the Wailing Wall is said to expire tomorrow night and no mutually satisfactory understanding is yet in sight. The attorney-general's office has been busy completing the draft of an ordinance begun by Attorney-General Bentwich which is designed to give effect to the Moslem-Jewish agreement when and if reached.

Carol Warns Bukowina Peasants Against Anti-Semitic Troubles

Bucharest, Oct. 6.—Occurrences such as the anti-Jewish disturbances in Balaceana and Suceava should never be repeated, King Carol told a deputation of peasants from Bukowina who waited upon him at Sinaia to complain of the difficult times and their great hardships. The delegation was comprised of five peasants from Suceava who sought the King's aid in reducing the interest that moneylenders charge, in the enforcement of the law against usurers, the reduction of taxes and the distribution among the peasants of forest lands now held by religious funds.

While the King promised to use his influence to ease the position of the peasants he not only appealed to them to increase their output and reduce their expenditures but told them that they were a disgrace to the district and reproached them for having created trouble for the country.

1,800,000 Lei Assigned for Borscha Reconstruction; Only 2 Percent of Damages Suffered

Bucharest, Oct. 6.—A grant of 1,800,000 lei will be given by the Roumanian government for the victims of the anti-Semitic fire in Borscha and 90,000 lei for the Jewish sufferers from the anti-Semitic disturbances in Balaceana and Suceava. This was the statement made today by Dr. Constantin Angelescu, assistant minister of the interior, to Deputy Michael Landau who interviewed Dr. Angelescu regarding the difficult situation of the Jews of Borscha, Suceava and Balaceana since the anti-Semitic troubles. The grants have been approved by Premier Maniu.

Deputy Landau protested verbally and the general council of Roumanian Jews will submit a written protest against the sums granted, which are less than two per cent of the total damages suffered by the Jews.

Prior to the announcement of how much the government would allocate for the relief of the above-mentioned towns the general council of Roumanian Jews announced that the reconstruction of Borscha had been greatly handicapped because Borscha's share of the 12,000,000 lei allocated by the government for all of the towns that suffered from the anti-Semitic incidents was not yet known.

The reconstruction measures are being carried out by a special cooperative organized by Deputy Fisher. Thus far the cooperative has received 262 hectares of timber lands from the government's preserves from which it hopes to realize 3,500,000 lei. The cooperative also has 2,000,000 lei from the relief

Simpson's Report Praises Jewish Palestine Achievements and Stresses Arab Viewpoint

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 6.—While giving expression to his admiration for the Jewish achievements in Palestine and lauding the constructive work done in the country through Jewish enterprise and initiative, the report of Sir John Simpson also stresses the Arab point of view, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns. Sir John, whose report is to be made public shortly, describes the Arabs' conception of the "growing danger of Jewish predominance."

Noting that while the Palestine government has done little to bring the Jews and Arabs together and to make them understand one another, Sir John's report points out that the installation of the Jews in Palestine is being watched with jealousy and suspicion by the Arabs who see in it a menace to their land possessions, their existence and even to their religious freedom, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency understands.

Report Guarded

Although Sir John's report is being closely guarded to prevent any leaks it is learned that his findings show that the march of Jewish progress in Palestine is considered by the Arabs as the advance of an enemy and a daily growing danger, realizing that lands purchased by the Jewish National Fund can never be restored. In his report Sir John will probably try to hold the balance between Jews and Arabs, it is believed. He will, no doubt, endeavor to find the middle of the road between

Halsmann May Seek Retrial in Latvian Court at Riga

Vienna, Oct. 6.—Philip Halsmann, young Latvian Jew who was recently pardoned by the Austrian government after being under a four-year prison sentence for patricide, is considering the possibility of seeking a retrial in the Latvian courts to clear his name. Arriving in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, after he had rejected the belated offer of the Austrian police to permit him a three-day stay in Austria, Halsmann, realizing that by his virtual expulsion from Austria it will be almost impossible to obtain a retrial there, may shift the case to Latvia.

He plans to declare himself accused of the murder of his father, institute trial in the Latvian courts and obtain all the documents from the Austrian courts on which the verdict finding him guilty was based. Although he is now resting in Bratislava he is not certain whether he will remain because he is making plans to rehabilitate himself and wipe the stain from his name.

Shiels to Talk Constitutional Questions with Arab Leaders; Col. Kisch Visitor at Bedside

Jerusalem, Oct. 6.—Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary for the colonies who is here for a ten day visit, will receive the Arab Executive and the members of the Arab delegation that went to London last March on Wednesday when it is expected constitutional questions will be discussed. In this connection Aljamea Al Arabia, the organ of the Grand Mufti, discordantly hints that no committee or delegation is authorized to accept a constitutional settlement but the people themselves. According to the Mufti's organ this means the Mufti and his clan.

Colonel Frederick Kisch of the Jewish Agency spent an hour with Dr. Shiels at the latter's bedside and after the discussion expressed himself as satisfied with the course of the conversation. Although Dr. Shiels' program has been affected by his sudden illness the Hebrew paper, Davar, points out that his itinerary does not include the Hebrew University or the Hadassah Hospital but it does provide for visits to many government and missionary institutions.

In an article designed to catch Dr. Shiels' eye, Aljamea Al Arabia says that Great Britain will soon realize that Palestine can only be an Arab fatherland with "Jews and other aliens adapting themselves to an Arab atmosphere the same as they have adapted themselves to an English atmosphere in England, a German atmosphere in Germany and other atmospheres in other countries."

The Mufti's organ makes the above statement after pointing out that Great Britain has given up the attempt to make Palestine Jewish and is now "trying to make it bi-national." The Christian-Arab paper, Falastin, addressing Dr. Shiels, voices the hope that he will recognize that Palestine is sacred to the Moslems and to the Christians, the Jews merely enjoying "wailing rights at the Wailing Wall before the Mandate was promulgated."

The Hebrew paper, Ha'Aretz, in an editorial directed to Dr. Shiels' attention, hopes that after Dr. Shiels' visit the British government will issue a statement on its Palestine policy that will contain something more than negative definitions and non-positive declarations not translatable into immediate action.

Dr. Shiels, who is here for a ten day visit during which time he hopes to gain a first hand knowledge of local conditions and to meet informally with the country's leading official and non-official personalities, collapsed just before he was scheduled to visit the Wailing Wall on Saturday. He is now confined to bed with an intestinal disorder and high fever.

Failure to Collect Crops Causes Crisis in Jewish Districts

Moscow, Oct. 6.—Failure to collect the crops from the Jewish fields after the harvest is responsible for the difficult situation in the Jewish agricultural districts, particularly in the Kalinindorf region, the Emes, organ of the Moscow Jewish Communists, complains. The failure to collect the crops is due to a lack of organization and discipline as well as to disinterest and criminal negligence, the Emes charges.

While only a few days remains for the Winter seeding the Summer harvest is still on the fields unthreshed and rotting, much to the dissatisfaction of the Ukrainian district land commissariat who has drawn the attention of the Kalinindorf Jewish authorities to the state of affairs. The Emes also complains that there are an insufficient number of workers on the land.

Council of League Urges Melchior Not to Resign

Geneva, Oct. 6.—The Council of the League of Nations today considered the resignation submitted by the well-known Jewish banker and internationally known economist, Dr. Carl Melchior, a partner of Max Warburg, Hamburg banker and brother of Felix M. Warburg, who is Germany's representative on the financial committee of the League of Nations. He is also chairman of the committee.

The Norwegian representative on the committee, E. A. Colban, who is also the Council's rapporteur on finances, endeavored, on behalf of the members of the financial committee, to induce Dr. Melchior to change his decision to resign. The British, French, Italian and Polish representatives also sought to persuade Dr. Melchior to withdraw his resignation before the next session of the Council.

Finally after Count von Bernstorff declared that he was sure that the German government would do its best to persuade Dr. Melchior to retain his position, the Council decided to postpone its decision. In an official communique issued by the information section of the League of Nations, Dr. Melchior is described as one of the most competent members of the financial committee. It is learned that Dr. Melchior's resignation is due to his heavy duties as one of the two German representatives on the directorate of the Bank for International Settlements. He is also vice-president of the Bank.

Dr. Melchior, who last April declined to head the Reichsbank when Dr. Hjalmar Schacht resigned, has represented Germany at every post-War international conference.

Society for Protection of Jewish Women Planned

Warsaw, Oct. 6.—A decision to create an organization for the protection of Jewish women was adopted today by the Jewish delegates to the International Congress for the Protection of Women which meets here from October 7 to 10.

Selective Immigration Banning Quotas to Become Important Issue in Next Congress

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Boston, Oct. 6.—Selective immigration, which would abolish the present quotas and allow only a selected number of immigrants to enter the United States, will become an important issue at the next session of Congress. This has become clear from the annual report of the Executive Council of the American Federation of Labor which will be presented at the fiftieth annual convention of the Federation which opens today in Boston.

The report which was made public here today comes out in favor of the bill which was presented during the last session of Congress which provides that no immigrant should be given a visa unless he can prove to the American consular that his entry into the United States would not be detrimental to employment conditions in this country. This clause however is not applicable in the case of immigrants who have a right to enter outside the quota.

The report of the A. F. of L. Executive Council states that during the next session of Congress a bill will be introduced providing for selective immigration and that the bill will contain a clause empowering the President to control the number of immigrants that are to be admitted annually.

The present contract labor law, which provides that alien skilled labor be admitted if labor of a like kind can not be found in this country, is criticized in the Executive Council's report for its too broad interpretation. The Executive Council is also in favor of including professional musicians and artists under the terms of the alien contract labor law.

Model Jewish Community Planned on Staten Island

A model Jewish community of 160 families which will have its own school, where both secular and Hebrew subjects will be taught, and which will establish a health centre for Jewish children, will be founded shortly at Silver Lake Gardens, Staten Island. The community is being founded by the "Judea Macabee Association," an organization interested in the development and growth of Jewish community life, in fostering the teachings of Judaism and the Jewish communal spirit and in establishing a health centre for the younger generation.

Silver Lake Gardens, Staten Island, has been selected for the establishment of this model community because it is 380 feet above sea level. Its air is remarkably pure and it is only 25 minutes by ferry from Manhattan. A hospital and sanatorium are among the things planned for the model community.

The officers of the "Judea Macabee Association" are: Hyman L. Landy, president; Cantor Shein, vice-president; Charles Rosett, Treasurer and Business Manager; Sigmund Sussman, Harry Resnick and Bekie Lvovskys, Trustees; Rev. Isaac Rottblitt, Chaplain; and S. Rosen, Recording Secretary.

Smolar, J.T.A. Writer, Says Plight of Polish Jews Worst, Russian Situation Improved

"In no country of Eastern Europe is the situation of the Jews today a favorable one. But worst of all is the situation in Poland, which contains the largest Jewish community in Europe."

This is the opinion of B. Smolar, who has acted during the past year and a half as special correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in Soviet Russia and in other East-European countries. Mr. Smolar, who arrived here last week, besides his stay in Soviet Russia, visited Poland, Roumania, Czechoslovakia, Austria and Germany, to which countries he was sent as special correspondent to report for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on the condition of the Jews in those countries.

"There is almost no country in Eastern Europe where Jews do not suffer economically and politically, but what I saw in Poland was much worse than I expected to find," said Mr. Smolar. "It is true that one hasn't heard recently about anti-Jewish excesses in Poland. But on the other hand it is also true that anti-Semitism there is systematic and deeply imbedded among all classes of the population."

"While Roumania has only a small group of anti-Semites, members of the so-called intelligentsia who take advantage of the dire economic situation of the peasants to incite the latter to make pogroms upon Jews, the Polish government is conducting a systematic campaign of economic extermination of the Jews eliminating them from industry and commerce. Jews cannot obtain government posts and Jewish merchants are taxed exorbitantly. But the worst thing about it is that the situation of the Jews in Poland seems to be hopeless."

Asked about the present situation of the Jews in Soviet Russia, Mr. Smolar, who spent more than a year there said:

"Briefly one can say that the economic situation of the Jews there is improving. The fact that many Jewish young men from the small towns have lately been taken into the industrial establishments lends hope that the economic condition of the declassed Jews of the small towns will eventually improve. While part of these declassed Jews who have up to now been deprived of all citizenship rights have now been granted the right to settle on the land as farmers, another part is being supported by their children who obtain work in the industrial establishments. In general one can say that the economic situation of the impoverished and declassed Jews is continually improving."

The Hague Hears Vatican Raps National Socialists

The Hague, Oct. 6.—Catholic circles in Holland have received a report that the Vatican has instructed the Catholic clergy of Germany to point out to German Catholics the impossibility of reconciling the activities of organizations persecuting other religions with Catholicism. It is generally believed that this refers to the National Socialists and their anti-Semitic slogans.

Premier Pays Tribute to Jews of Jugo-Slavia

Belgrade, Oct. 6.—A warm tribute to the loyalty and patriotism of the Jews of Jugo-Slavia was paid by Premier Pera Zhivkovich today in replying to greetings from a delegation of Jews who called on him to express the gratitude of Jugo-Slavian Jewry for the recently promulgated Jewish religious communities law. This law provides many facilities for the Jewish population of the country and places Judaism on a par with other religions.

The Jews always enjoyed complete equality in Serbia, the Premier said, the government never having made any distinction between people on religious grounds. The Premier told the delegation that the Jews of Jugo-Slavia, especially those of Belgrade, were, during the War and afterwards in the constructive period of peace, always in the van of those who fought for the South Slavic ideal.

Holland Names Non-Zionist Member on Jewish Agency

Amsterdam, Oct. 6.—Sh. Vandenberg, a member of the Upper House of the Dutch parliament, has been appointed as the Non-Zionist representative on the Jewish Agency from Holland. The appointment was made by the Permanent Commission of the Holland Jewish community together with the council of the Portuguese Jewish Community. Dr. de Benedictis, a judge of the Amsterdam district court, was selected as Senator Vandenberg's alternate.

Guggenheim Will Add \$1,975,000 to Philanthropy

The will of Daniel Guggenheim, famous copper magnate and philanthropist who died last week, sets aside \$1,500,000 for the Daniel and Florence Guggenheim Foundation, which was incorporated in 1924 for the purpose of promoting "through charitable and benevolent activities the well-being of mankind throughout the world." The will also directs that \$475,000 be added to the \$2,025,000 already given to the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics.

Galician Zionists in Election Bloc with Agudath Israel

Warsaw, Oct. 6.—Disregarding the decision of the Central Zionist Council in Warsaw, the Zionist Council of East Galicia has decided to unite with the Agudath Israel, Orthodox organization, for the forthcoming parliamentary elections. By a vote of 37 to 14 the Galician Zionists approved an election union with the Agudath, thus creating a united Jewish front in East Galicia.

In Poland proper the General Zionists, the Zionist non-Socialist labor party (Hitachduth) and the Mizrahi, Orthodox Zionist party, formed a united Zionist election bloc but rejected an election union with the Agudath. The united Zionist bloc's negotiations with the government party have reached a stalemate.

Morgenstern Approves Jewish State in Palestine in Future If Jewish Population Will It

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Oct. 6.—Admitting that Reform Judaism "has by no means completely solved the problem of Judaism" and conceding that Zionism, like Reform Judaism, is indispensable to Judaism, Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president of the Hebrew Union College, stated that world Jewry must desert the paths of unreasoning partisanship for those of true vision, in an address here yesterday. The occasion of the address, the subject of which was, "Is Reform Judaism a Failure?", was the opening exercises of the Hebrew Union College.

The conflict within Jewish ranks is between Universalism or Reform Judaism on the one hand and Particularism, Nationalism or Zionism on the other, Dr. Morgenstern said. This struggle is but one example of the other universality-nationalistic struggles such as have had nationalistic expression in the creation of petty states such as Poland, Lithuania and Latvia, he pointed out.

Non-Zionist, Not Anti-Zionist

Emphasizing the fact that he is a non-Zionist and not an anti-Zionist, Dr. Morgenstern declared that he does not oppose, for the Jews in Palestine, a strong colonization movement, a strong cultural movement and even eventually a Jewish state if the latter expresses the actual will of Palestine's entire population. Formal Celebration of Dubnow's Birthday Held

Berlin, Oct. 6.—The formal celebration of the 70th birthday of Professor Simeon Dubnow, world-famous Jewish historian, was held here with hundreds of prominent political and scientific personages present. George Kareski, president of the Berlin Jewish community, Leo Wolff, chairman of the Union of Prussian Jewish Communities, Dr. Albert Klee, Zionist leader and M. Joachimson, representing the Relief Association of German Jews, all expressed their joy and appreciation at the honor that the scientists were paying to Professor Dubnow.

Ismar Elbogen and Gotthold Weil praised Professor Dubnow's personality and lauded him as the inspiration for a new Jewish-mindedness.

Jewish Agency to Submit New Immigration Quota

Jerusalem, Oct. 6.—The Jewish Agency's Executive is now discussing the Jewish immigration quota for the next six months which it will submit to the Palestine government. The estimate of the General Federation of Jewish Labor proposes 2,800 while the Jewish Agency's estimate will probably be 2,000. The new half year schedule if approved means that the certificates suspended last May will not be received despite an earlier proposal to press for the release of the cancelled certificates before submitting the new quota.

New Yiddish Theatrical Season Going Full Blast; Adlers Close

The New York Yiddish theatre season started somewhat inauspiciously with the closing of the Adler vehicle, "Millions," a play by Carl Roessler based on the house of Rothschild, three days after it opened at the New Yorker Theatre. The play had received fine notices in both the English and the Yiddish press, and though George Jessel, its producer did not expect it to be a financial success, its closing is somewhat premature. No plans have been forthcoming to date as to the future plans of the Adler clan.

On the other hand, Ludwig Satz opened at the Public Theatre with the "Bridegroom from Berditchev," a light musical comedy, with lots of girls, dancing and singing and a bit of tragedy. A commendable feature of the play is the music by the young composer, Abraham Elstein, whose melodies are reminiscent of classic "lidlach" and American jazz, which strikes a new note in Yiddish music.

The opening play of Mark Schweid at the Bronx Art Theatre, the former home of the late Rudolf Schildkraut, is a very serious presentation from the pen of the perennially popular Sholom Asch, entitled "Electric Chair." The play is well presented by an extremely large cast, each doing his part to add to the company's ambition to produce plays in a modern, tasteful and intelligent manner.

Molly Picon opened in a new play called "The Girl of Yesterday," written for her by Rumshinsky and Kalisch.

Fascists Attack Jews in Cologne Cabaret

London, Oct. 6.—The Sunday Express reports that the first blood shed as a result of the victory of the German National Socialists (Fascists) was Jewish blood. The paper says that a gang of Hitlerites raided a cabaret in Cologne yesterday and created a panic by firing revolvers, cutting telephone wires, thus preventing the summoning of the police, and then beating Edler and Urbach, two Jews, into unconsciousness.

Holmes Sees Inferiority of Jews as Miserable Superstition

"The inferiority of the Jew is a miserable superstition, a damnable lie. There are objectionable Jews and objectionable Gentiles; you cannot condemn a race. I often think, when I run up against this anti-Semitic attitude, that it is the Gentiles who are inferior."

"On the part of the Gentile you have bitterness and hatred and a despicable lack of intelligence. On the part of the Jew you have often a cringing inferiority, which is pitiable and to be deplored; but in the Jew you haven't the psychological attitude of bitterness and hate, resulting from discrimination, that you might reasonably expect. I think the New York Jew, on the whole, bears the burden of discrimination admirably."

These were some of the statements made by the Rev. John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Community Church and noted liberal preacher, in an interview with Evelyn Seeley of the New York Telegram with regard to the discrimination which prevails against Jews in New York City. The interview appeared in Monday's "Telegram."

"A good part of anti-Semitism is the prejudice of defeat," said Dr. Holmes. "The Jew has gained leadership in ownership of real estate, ownership of newspapers, theatre management and in many trades. Very well, let him own our homes, our theatres, our newspapers. He has won his success fairly, the world being what it is."

"The Jew is condemned as an overdeveloped materialist. 'What else could he be, out of his Ghetto experience, his struggle against cold and hunger and cruelty? What else are we Americans all, but one hundred and twenty million materialists?'"

Anti-Jewish discrimination in New York, which is worse than in other places because there are more Jews here, should be denounced at every opportunity and an educational campaign, which would teach Gentiles to understand the Jew's background and experience, should be conducted to offset prejudice, believes Dr. Holmes.

Cincinnati's Jewish Welfare Fund Drive Starts Wednesday

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Oct. 6.—Dr. Lee K. Frankel, noted health and social welfare leader, will deliver the keynote address Wednesday night in the Hotel Sinton at a public dinner opening Cincinnati's \$190,000 first joint Jewish Welfare Fund drive. Former mayor Murray Seasongood is chairman of the drive committee.

J. N. F.'s Wadi Hawareth Lands Again Subject of Litigation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 6.—The district court at Tulkarem decided today that the eviction of the Arab tenants from 3,600 of the 45,000 dunams of land at Wadi Hawareth claimed by the Jewish National Fund was illegal and the tenants are entitled to resettlement. The claim was made on behalf of eight Arab squatters against the legality of the sale by the execution office.

This is the first adverse decision the Jews have sustained in the long drawn out litigation over the Wadi Hawareth lands. The Jewish authorities, nevertheless, are not perturbed since the sale of the lands to the Jewish National Fund was conditioned on proof that this area did not belong to the tenants and if this proof was not forthcoming the Fund was to be reimbursed. A more grievous case, however, is pending in which many of the former tenants on the Wadi Hawareth lands are claiming pre-emption rights and many invoke these rights to repurchase the lands which the Fund has acquired.

When the purchase of the land was made with a \$1,000,000 fund subscribed by Canadian Zionists most of the Arab tenants had already evacuated, having been compensated by the Jewish National Fund. A few squatters refused to move despite compensations and court decisions. In September the land court at Tulkarem had ruled that the government was entitled to sell the Wadi Hawareth lands to the Fund.

Brooklyn Square Named for Late Marcus Loew

In the same vicinity in which the late Marcus Loew, founder of the Loew Theatres Circuit and pioneer in the motion picture exhibition business, began his successful career as a showman, a gathering of state and city officials as well as notables in the entertainment field gathered last Sunday for the dedication of Loew Square in the Pitkin Avenue district of Brooklyn. The naming of the intersection of Pitkin Avenue and Barrett Street for the late Mr. Loew was characterized by the Board of Aldermen as "in memory of a man who did much for his native city."

The naming of this square after Marcus Loew adds another to the list of streets in New York City named for Jews. Among these are Schiff Parkway, Herzl Street and Straus Square.

Selling, Detroit Charity Worker and Realtor, Dead

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Detroit, Oct. 6.—Joseph L. Selling, long prominent in Jewish charity and welfare activities and a former president of the United Jewish Charities, is dead here at the age of 62. He was a former president of the Phoenix Club, a director of Temple Beth El and a member of the Detroit Real Estate Board of Commerce and the B'nai Brith. Born in Hartford, Connecticut, he was brought to Detroit as a boy. He was educated in the Detroit schools and has lived here all his life.

Jewish War Hero Guest of American Legion Convention

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Oct. 6.—Among the thirty Medal of Honor men who will be the special guests of the American Legion's annual convention opening today in Boston is Captain Sydney G. Gumpertz of New York, one of the Jewish heroes of the World War. He enlisted in the 132nd Infantry 33rd Division from Illinois in 1917. In 1919 he was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

His notable achievement "of desperate and extreme courage above and beyond the call of duty" was performed in the Bois de Forges, September 26, 1918. To permit the advance of a platoon of which he was in charge he found it necessary to silence machine gun fire. Single-handed he killed two gunners with pistol fire and captured the remaining 14 members of the machine gun crew. Later in the same day he advanced alone on a machine gun nest, threw in hand grenades, killing several members of the crew and capturing 16 in addition to two heavy machine guns.

Bronx House to Give Courses in Yiddish

Courses in conversational Hebrew, Jewish history, the Yiddish language, Jewish literature and Jewish social service are to be given at the Bronx House Institute of Jewish Culture during the new term which commences on Monday, October 20th. Miss Mary Caplan is headworker of Bronx House; Samuel Griff is assistant headworker, and Jacob Ben Lightman is director of the Institute.

In announcing the course in conversational and written Yiddish, the Institute of Jewish Culture states: "This course, because Yiddish was the language of the Galuth, is being taught from a purely cultural point of view. It is allied with no movement for or against the perpetuation of Yiddish."

World Jewish Population Put at 15,050,000; U.S.'s at 4,228,000

The total Jewish population of the world, estimated on the basis of data gathered up to 1927, is placed at 15,050,000, while the United States, according to the same estimates, contains 4,228,000 Jews. These figures appear in the new volume of the American Jewish Year Book, which has just been issued.

The number of Jews in New York City is put at 1,765,000. Jews make up 16.67 percent of the total population in New York State, where the percentage of Jews is the largest in the country, while in Idaho, where the percentage of Jews is the smallest, they make up only 0.21 of the total population.

The new volume of the American Jewish Year Book discusses events affecting Jews in foreign countries during the past year, particularly the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Roumania, Germany, Vienna, Hungary and Czechoslovakia.

"Free Pulpit and Free Pew" Basis of Los Angeles Synagogue

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—A community synagogue on the principle of a "free pulpit and free pew" has been organized here by Rabbi Meyer Winkler, who recently resigned as spiritual leader of the Sinai congregation. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services by the new community synagogue were held in the Wilshire Ebell auditorium.

"By the term free pulpit," Rabbi Winkler explained, "I mean that the rabbi or minister should be absolutely free in his utterances by virtue of his ordination. I shall not be a hired man. My ministry assumes a voluntary character—the sermon must be the product of an unshackled mind from its inception to its crystallization. By the free pew, I mean that the people who belong to my church will be free from obligatory taxation—all money contributed will be by free offering. My church will be literally a 'good will' synagogue. I will preach fellowship between Jew and Jew, and between Jew and Gentile."

Speaking of his fundamental religious views, Rabbi Winkler said:

"I did not change my religious views. I am an exponent of traditional Judaism. The rites and traditions and symbols cannot be discarded. Rather they should be presented to the modern mind in an intelligent and understandable way—if necessary those fundamental values of Judaism can stand a reinterpretation and reevaluation. The God of yesterday must be interpreted to the man of today in terms of today."

Funeral Services for Walter Arnheim to be Held Wednesday

Funeral services for Walter Arnheim, president of the Marks Arnheim, Inc. clothing firm who died suddenly in his country home in Elberon, N. J. on Sunday, will be held on Wednesday at his late New York residence. The services will be conducted by Rabbi Elias of Temple Emanu-El and burial will be in the Rodeph Sholom Cemetery in Brooklyn.

Mr. Arnheim, who was forty-nine, was born in Cincinnati. He was greatly interested in the traffic problems of New York City, having served on the Mayor's Committee of Plan and Survey and as chairman of the traffic committee of the Broadway Association. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Minnie Arnheim, and by his sister, Mrs. Blanche A. Hahn.

Astoria Jews Subscribe to \$10,000 Fund in Appreciation of Rabbi's Services

Forty Jewish families of Astoria, Long Island, who are members of the Astoria Center of Israel have subscribed to a fund of \$10,000 in addition to the regular budget of the Center. This was done in appreciation of the completion of Rabbi Joshua L. Goldberg's fifth year of service at the Astoria Center of Israel and will enable the Rabbi to carry out his plan of activities presented by him to the Board of Trustees for 1930-31.

305 American Jews Settled in Palestine in 1929

A total of 305 Jews left the United States to settle in Palestine during the year 1929, according to a report issued by Robert Szold, chairman of the Zionist Organization of America, who made public the figures that have just been compiled by the Palestine government. These immigrants brought into Palestine a sum of capital exceeding \$3,000,000, according to the report, which is being invested in orange plantations, building construction and mortgages.

Of the 305 Jews who left to assist the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home, 202 were in the category of what the Palestine government calls "capitalists." The average capital of these men and women was \$12,000.

The report shows that during 1929 approximately 7,000 Jews entered Palestine. Poland was first with 1,971; Yemen, Arabia, second with 593. Russia provided 368 immigrants, Roumania 355, and the United States was fifth. Germany sent 283 Jews to Palestine during the year.

Wallstein Named to Probe Rockaway Condemnation Awards

Leonard M. Wallstein, counsel for the Citizens' Union and former Commissioner of Accounts of New York City, has been appointed a Special Corporation Counsel to help in the fight which is being conducted by the municipal government of New York City for a reduction of the \$12,500,000 condemnation awards which have been temporarily granted by Supreme Court Justice Dunne in the Rockaway Beach improvement. Mr. Wallstein's appointment was approved by Mayor Walker and Corporation Counsel Hilly upon the recommendation of Max Tachna, attorney for a group of Rockaway civic organizations, who declared that Mr. Wallstein had been chosen because of his reputation as a diligent investigator and because of the services he had previously rendered to New York City.

Mr. Wallstein was born in New York City and is 46 years old. He is a director of the New York Guild for Jewish Blind. In 1925 he was a member of the Commission on the Reorganization of the New York State Government. He is also counsel for the Citizens' Union.

Polish Government Buys Tobacco Crop of Upper Galilee

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 6.—The Polish government, just as last year, has purchased the entire tobacco crop of Upper Galilee on the basis of an agreement between the Polish tobacco monopoly and M. Barsilai, chairman of the Hebrew tobacco growers' syndicate of Rosh Pinah. The 40 pence per pound paid for this year's crop betters last year's price but even with this increase the price is still below that paid for tobacco of equal grade elsewhere, M. Barsilai said. After certain formal difficulties are removed he hopes for better prices.

Regional Conference of United Synagogue's Committee of 1,000 in Philadelphia This Sunday

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Oct. 6.—The first regional conference to be called under the auspices of the United Synagogue of America, "Committee of One Thousand" to stimulate religious activity, will take place in this city all day Sunday, October 19th, according to an announcement made by A. B. Cohen, national chairman. Similar conferences are planned by Mr. Cohen to take place in various sections of the country in the course of the next few months.

The purpose of this conference will be to effect an amalgamation of the Philadelphia branch of the United Synagogue of America with the regional branch, so that more intensive religious work might be done throughout the region. Geographically the new organization will include all of Eastern Pennsylvania, comprising upwards of twenty-five communities with a Jewish population of 300,000.

At this Conference, special consideration will be given to the religious needs of the Jewish students attending the universities and the colleges in this part of the country. The work being done at the Jewish Students House on the campus of the University of Pennsylvania will be discussed and recommendations made for a similar house to be established on the campus of Temple University in Philadelphia, as well as provision for the religious needs of the Jewish students at the Colleges located in Eastern Pennsylvania.

Recluse Leaves \$75,000 to Various Jewish Philanthropies

Four Jewish charitable institutions will benefit to the extent of \$75,000 from the will of Mrs. Johanna Traub of Queens, who died on Sept. 18th. The institutions are the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, New York Guild for the Jewish Blind, Jewish Home for the Aged and Infirm and the Home of the Daughters of Jacob.

Mrs. Traub, who was born in Hungary, left \$100,000 in cash and securities. During the past 12 years, since her husband died, she had been living in seclusion, leaving her home only to go shopping. Neighbors regarded her as a poor woman compelled to live in a very frugal manner.

Ninth Academic Year of Jewish Institute Begins

Students of the Jewish Institute of Religion will convene on the evening of October 8th to attend the opening exercises of the ninth academic year of the Institute. Classes begin regular work the following day. The address, "The Drawing of the Waters" will be delivered by Dr. Gerson B. Levi, Rabbi of Temple Isaiah-Israel of Chicago and editor of the Reform Advocate.

Sixty-six students have registered for the courses of study which lead to the degrees of Doctor of Hebrew Literature, Master of Hebrew Literature, and Rabbi.

Objects to California Rabbis' Anti-Intermarriage Resolution

Jewish Daily Bulletin, Editor:

In your issue of Thursday, September 18th there appeared an article entitled, "California Rabbis Opposed to Intermarriage Unless Non-Jewish Party Accepts Judaism."

I am a member of The Board of Rabbis of Northern California, the organization which passed this resolution of "unequivocal opposition to mixed marriages between Jew and Gentile where there is no declaration of willingness on the part of the non-Jew to embrace the Jewish faith." A copy of the resolution was sent to me and I was invited to comment on it. I did so. I stated that the resolution did not meet with my approval and I urged the secretary of the Board not to publish it. I insisted, moreover, if the resolution were published, that my dissenting vote be recorded. That my request was ignored is apparent from the published statements and comments on the resolution which have appeared in a number of Jewish periodicals.

If you will grant me the courtesy of a few lines in your valuable little publication I shall try to make my position clear; My objections to the resolution are as follows: First. It seems to me to be narrow and intolerant. In this day and age when harmony and goodwill between all religious denominations are desired above all else, a resolution of this kind strikes a discordant note. Inferentially it raises the question of the superiority of one religion over others, which is to be deplored.

Dogmatic Resolution

Second. A dogmatic resolution of this kind may often have the opposite effect of that which its framers hoped for. They maintain that the solemnization of mixed marriages tends "to sanction the disintegration of the Jewish people, to threaten the integrity of the Jewish home." This is not necessarily true. There have been instances where the non-Jewish member of a mixed marriage was not converted to Judaism. Nevertheless the children of this union of Jew and non-Jew have been raised as Jews and Jewesses. The loyalty of the Jewish party of the mixed marriage has never been questioned. In such cases, and they are not rare, "the disintegration of the Jewish home and the integrity of the Jewish homes," have not been threatened, whereas the refusal of a Rabbi to solemnize such a union, when assurance was given that the children would be brought up as Jews, would certainly have had the opposite effect. The contracting parties would have been driven to a civil magistrate, and, in all likelihood, lost to Judaism forever. The writer is acquainted with people who have been driven out of the synagogue and the circle of Jewish life by the misguided and misdirected zeal of conscientious Rabbis.

Does Not Secularize Rabbinate

Third. It is not "secularizing the rabbinical calling" nor is it "converting it into a civil magistracy" to officiate at

Board of Jewish Ministers, Northern California, Aims to Strengthen Jewish Religious and Historical Education

(By Our San Francisco Correspondent)

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—If the Board of Jewish Ministers of Northern California has its way, young Israel in the West will grow up better versed in Jewish religious and historical learning than any preceding generation.

And this essential step toward the strengthening of the Jewish cause will be brought about by providing better trained teachers of Jewish studies—and more of them. For the rabbis recognize that Jewish education, like the broader fields of academic studies, has been reduced to an exact science and, to be successful, requires careful and thorough training of those selected to disseminate learning.

The vehicle through which this is to be brought about is the School for Jewish Studies, fostered by the Board of Ministers, and now destined to undergo a great broadening in its scope of activity and usefulness. It is to be linked in a measure with University of California academic work so that Jewish young men and women, inspired by the enthusiasm of education, can be trained on the campus to become teachers of Jewish subjects.

To understand the importance of the latest step taken by the rabbis requires a brief review of what they have done to date. Some six years ago the Board of Jewish Ministers, under the presidency of the late Rabbi Jacob Nieto, founded the School for Jewish Studies. The purpose of the school was to train young men and women to become teachers of Jewish subjects, theological and historical, in religious schools and like institutions.

Rabbis Comprised Faculty

The rabbis made up the faculty of the school with the addition of visiting educational leaders from afar who from time to time augmented the ranks of the teaching ministers.

Numbers of trained graduates were turned out and placed in the religious schools of the various congregations in Northern California and in the several Talmud Torahs.

That, in itself, was a big forward step. It meant a more exact, more thorough teaching in the religious schools of reform and conservative congregations for up to this time academically trained Jewish teachers were serving largely the orthodox group through the Talmud Torah maintained by the Jewish Educational Society of San Francisco.

In the past several years the school for teachers has grown, embracing each year a larger number of students who enjoyed at each semester a wider and more extensive source of study.

So valuable was this work found to be that the Board of Ministers, at its recent meeting, decided to take more definite steps to broaden its field of usefulness.

According to Rabbi Elliot M. Bur-

tion. He declared, however, that he does oppose three things in Zionist theory and program, which are as follows:

First, Zionism's "gratuitous assumption that without a distinctive Jewish life and Jewish cultural center in Palestine Judaism the world over is doomed to spiritual destruction, if not to eventual complete disappearance." Judaism has already existed for nearly twenty centuries without such a center in Palestine, Dr. Morgenstern said.

Second, Zionism's dogma that Jews not in Palestine are in exile. "I loathe the very word 'galuth' and the word 'diaspora' is repugnant to my innermost being," Dr. Morgenstern said. "I see no signs of a return to Palestine of the Jewish exiles in America."

Third, Zionism's "tendency to set the people of Israel in the place of God in Jewish thought and aspiration."

Zionism's claims are being modified, he said, "as witness recent declarations of Dr. Judah Leon Magnes, chancellor of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, and of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, as well as the formation of the B'rith Shalom party."

With regard to Conservative Judaism Dr. Morgenstern stated that it is "itself really Reform at about the stage where we stood ourselves a generation or more ago and it is evolving more rapidly than did our Reform Judaism, partly because of our very example and influence."

In answer to the charge that Reform Judaism advocates assimilation, Dr. Morgenstern said:

"Granted that the early Reformers of the nineteenth century overemphasized Universalism, in an age freed from trammels of political oppressions and fired by the principles of liberty, equality and fraternity, still it cannot be said in fairness that a single responsible leader of Reform Judaism ever advocated assimilation."

Post Graduate Courses at H. U. Teachers' College Announced

The program of post-graduate courses which will be offered at the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers during this semester was announced this week by Abraham N. Franzblau, principal of the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers. The courses will be given on Wednesday nights, beginning October 22nd, at the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers. They are open to all graduates of the school, and by special permission, to the general public.

The program includes a course entitled "Character Education," given by Dr. Julius B. Maller, two language courses in Hebrew, one elementary and one advanced given by Abraham S. Halkin and Dr. Samuel Nirenstein, and a course entitled "A Survey of Modern Hebrew Literature," to be given in English by Simon L. Halkin.

the Jewish National Home and the second part of the Mandate referring to the non-prejudicing of the rights of the existing non-Jewish population.

Pending the publication of the Simpson report, the return of Dr. Chaim Weizmann to London is expected to lead to an intensification of the negotiations between the Jewish Agency and the Colonial Office. While the Imperial Conference is in session, however, these negotiations are likely to lag somewhat as the various members of the government with whom the Jewish Agency leaders are dealing are preoccupied with the Conference.

Swift developments may, however, be expected after the government's statement on its future policy in Palestine is issued. The statement is expected to be published even before parliamentary reconvenes. It is a matter of only a few weeks before the issuance of the long-awaited statement, which will probably be based largely on the findings of Sir John Simpson.

In the meantime the Colonial Office has not yet released the suspended labor schedule immigration certificates. The economic situation in Palestine, which is more and more being affected by the general world depression, might have increased the Colonial Office's reluctance to reopen immigration, particularly in view of the fact that the number of unemployed in Palestine is rising somewhat.

stein, the progressive leader of Temple Beth Israel and the new president of the Board of Ministers, the next School for Studies, opening in November, will take on a wider scope of work than ever before and a record breaking attendance is expected.

The effect of this move is expected to be far reaching and is regarded now as only a beginning of a new day in Jewish education.

Jews Watch Liberal Bloc

The Jews themselves are watching with the greatest interest the newly formed liberal bloc headed by former Chancellor Schober. This interest is heightened by the fact that Schober is not only the chief pillar of such an avowedly anti-Semitic party as the Pan-German section of the National Socialists, but is also the leading figure of the non-political economic groups and therefore also of a large section of the non-national Jewish bourgeoisie.

Pending the completion of the liberal bloc the Zionists and the other Jewish parties are negotiating for an independent ticket or seeking means of joining in the Schober bloc.

In the meantime it is learned that Chancellor Vaugin has endeavored to influence Prince Starhemberg not to use anti-Semitic expressions as a cabinet minister. Dr. Ignaz Seipel is also supporting the Chancellor in this and it is believed that the Heimwehr leader has partly agreed. Meanwhile, in consequence of the impression created at home and abroad by Starhemberg's Wienerheldenplatz speech, Chancellor Vaugin has authorized the newspapermen to declare that Starhemberg had assured him that the speech contained no anti-Semitic threats. Starhemberg himself, however, has not denied the published text of his address.

campaign conducted in Klausenberg and in other cities. This amount, however, is insufficient even for the rebuilding of the destroyed houses, necessitating a continuation of the campaign for relief funds.

The general council also decided to lodge a protest against the statistical commission in connection with the forthcoming census because of the rules which require that all census questionnaires be printed in the language of all minorities except the Jewish. At the same time the general council plans to urge the Jewish population to describe themselves as of the Jewish nationality and to give Hebrew as their mother tongue in reply to the census questions.

It was announced today that the trial of the anti-Semitic agitators of Borscha which had been set for tomorrow had been postponed owing to the district attorney's request for a change of venue.

a mixed marriage. Rabbis who perform mixed marriages will resent the implications of this statement. As a matter of fact it is for this very reason: that they do not want to deny the contracting parties the benefit of a religious ceremony, that they perform the marriage despite the fact that the non-Jewish party has not been converted to Judaism. They prefer to do this rather than to send them to a justice of the peace, whose marriage ceremony is altogether secular in character and inadequate for religious-minded people.

Fourth, I question the wisdom of insisting that the non-Jewish party of a mixed marriage be converted to Judaism. It is not likely that the non-Jew with a good religious background will care to desert the religion of his fathers any more than the devoted Jew will care to give up his Judaism.

If there is a willingness on the part of the non-Jew to take upon himself the yoke of the Torah—well and good. Where such willingness is lacking it is useless to force the issue. In that case all that that Rabbi can demand is a promise that the children of a mixed marriage will be brought up as Jews. Such a promise is readily obtained when a Jew and a non-Jew appear before the Rabbi. Their desire to be married by a Rabbi is proof that the Jewish member of the union is to guide the religious destinies of the household.

Fifth (and last) In the great majority of cases the Jew and the non-Jew will be married whether the Rabbi performs the ceremony or not. Why antagonize them? What is to be gained by arousing in them feelings of hostility toward Judaism? Why deny them the comfort of a religious ceremony? Is such conduct in accord with the highest precepts of Jewish teachings? I do not think so.

1,107 Converted Jews Returned to Fold in Hungary in Past Decade

Budapest, Oct. 6.—During the past ten years 1,107 Hungarian Jews who had been converted to Christianity reentered the Jewish fold. They were persuaded to reenter Judaism mainly through the efforts of Rabbi Dr. Sigmond Grossmann of the Budapest Jewish community.

During the years following the war many Jews, under the stress of a bitter anti-Semitism which was then raging in Hungary, embraced Christianity. As soon as anti-Semitic propaganda began to abate, however, many of them began to regret their step and decided to return to Judaism.

Hoover to Receive American Jewish Congress Delegates

Washington, Oct. 6.—The delegates to the annual session of the American Jewish Congress, which will take place in Washington, October 19, will be received by President Hoover at the White House on October 20, it was made known today by the President's office. Five hundred delegates, representing Jewish national organizations and communities throughout the country are expected to attend the session.

The session, which will discuss various problems affecting the position of the Jews in the countries of Eastern Europe and the situation in Palestine, will have as its guest of honor and chief speakers, Sir Harry Smith, Labor member of the British parliament, who will present to the American public the views of liberal public opinion in England on the subject of the reconstruction of the Jewish National Home under the terms of the British Mandate.
