Simpson Report and British Statement on Palestine Policy Due at End of This Month

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—The report of Sir John Simpson on problems of land settlement, immigration and development will be made public at the end of this month as will the long-awaited statement of the British government's future policy in Palestine, Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary of state for the Colonies, told an Arab deputation, says a communique issued by the Arab Executive today.

The communique adds that the deputation discussed the questions raised in the conversations of the Arab delegation in London in addition to the problem of the Wadi Hawareth lands, education and the budget which Dr. Shiels said was receiving the attention of the government. The Arab deputation composed of Mouzza Kazim Pasha, president of the Arab Executive, the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, Ragheb Bey Nashashibi, mayor of Jerusalem, Yacoub Faraj, vice-mayor of Jerusalem, Aunib Abdul Hadi and Jamal Hussein, secretaries of the Arab Executive, Alfred Roch, Christian Arab and Moghannem.

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Zionists Unlikely to Join Austrian Center Bloc Unless Pan-Germans Stop Anti-Semitism

Vienna, August 9.—The election victory of the Hitlerites in Germany is in no way connected with the domestic politics of Austria, Chancellor Vaugoin assured the press today. The Austrian parliamentary election campaign is aimed directly at checking the growth of Socialism and only for this reason is the Heimwehr included in the new government, he said.

In the meantime former Chancellor Schober is conferring with the Zionists in connection with the establishment of a center party bloc. It is doubtful, however, whether the Zionists or any other Jewish groups will join the center bloc unless the Pan-German party, a party to the bloc, promises to refrain from anti-Semitic propaganda during the election campaign.

Schober has in the meantime renewed negotiations with the Pan-German leaders in an effort to persuade them that the center bloc is only a temporary election expedient and not a permanent political body. He is trying to point out to them that after the elections it will not be necessary for them to remain with the Democrats and the Economic party.

Lord Reading, Former Indian Viceroy, Reaches 70 Today

London, Oct. 9.—Lord Reading, the only Englishman who was ever Lord Chief Justice of England, Viceroy of India and ambassador to the United States, will celebrate his seventieth birthday tomorrow. Born Daniel Rufus Isaacs, the son of a wealthy London Jewish merchant, Lord Reading's phenomenally successful career has as much drama in it as any Arabian Nights tale.

As a lad he ran away from home and ended up in India as a cabin boy. His parents brought him back and had him educated at the University College School in London and then in Brussels and Hanover. Upon completion of his duties he took a fling at the Stock Exchange and failed. Burdened with debts at the age of 27 he turned to law. Eleven years later he had paid his obligations in full and had become a Queen's Counsel.

His success as an advocate was astonishing and immediate. When Asquith became Prime Minister, Isaacs was named Solicitor-General and later Attorney-General. About the time he was knighted in 1911 he began developing with Lloyd George the program of social Liberalism. He had a brief and uneventful parliamentary career which he abandoned to become Lord Chief Justice, the first Jew given such a post in England.

As Lord Chief Justice he was able and dignified but he laid aside the ermine when the War broke out in order to aid Britain solve the commercial and financial problems that arose. This led to his heading the Anglo-French Loan Mission to the United States in 1915. Two years later he was named High Commissioner and special ambassador to the United States and in 1918 was appointed ambassador.

The end of the War found India seething with unrest. At the height of

Ten Moslem Arabs Still Under Arrest on Charge of Murder

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—Ten of the seventeen Moslem Arabs originally charged with premeditated murder in the first degree as a result of the death of Jamal Bakhrri, Christian-Arab editor, who died of wounds inflicted in a Moslem-Christian street affray in Haifa over the ownership of an old cemetery, are still under arrest charged with murder without premeditation. The other seven were released yesterday by Examining Magistrate Shams for lack of evidence.

Among the seven freed were Ramsi Omar, secretary of the Young Men's Moslem Association, and Rashid Ibrahim, director of the Haifa Wakf.

Czech Authorities Confiscate Paper Inciting Populace to Oust Jews and Germans

Prague, Oct. 9.—The authorities today confiscated the nationalist newspaper, Straz Rise, for publishing inciting articles against the German and Jewish elements of the population. Before the police intervened, however, a great many copies of the paper had already been circulated. The paper urged that before October 28, the national holiday marking the anniversary of the establishment of the Czecho-Slovak Republic, Prague should be "purified of all German and Jewish Schweinerei."

"We Czechs have been silent for twelve years," the Straz Rise writes. "Our patience is at an end. It is time to defile the swelled heads of the Jews and Germans. Down with a German-Czech government. Prague must set an example to the other cities and when Prague has been purified the other towns should follow the example."

This inciting propaganda is viewed with a certain anxiety in Jewish circles here although there is no doubt of the government's announced determination to maintain order on the anniversary of the Republic's establishment. Nevertheless the holiday is awaited with some anxiety.

U.S. Immigration Ban Costs Polish Jews Their Positions

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—Large numbers of Jewish employes of steamship companies whose vessels usually transport large groups of immigrants have lost their positions as a result of a drastic reduction in the staffs of the companies. The reduction is directly traceable to the further restrictions on immigration to America which went into force October 1. Seventy-five per cent of the Jewish employes have been dismissed, including a number who have held their positions for eight or nine years.

Yiddish Pen Club Protests Attack on Yiddish Talkies

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—The Warsaw branch of the International Yiddish Pen Club today wired a protest to the Hebrew Pen Club in Tel Aviv against the participation of the latter in the incipient riot during the showing of a Yiddish talking film. The Yiddish Pen Club demands that the Hebrew Pen Club take some action against those who insulted the Yiddish language. Both clubs are members of the International Pen Clubs.

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Buttenweiser Hall, Auditorium of Y.M.H.A., to Open Today

Buttenweiser Hall, one of the auditoriums of the New York Y. M. H. A. at 92nd Street and Lexington Avenue will be formally opened today with religious services celebrating Succoth, the Jewish Feast of Tabernacles. This auditorium, which is located in the second floor of the new eleven story building of the New York Y. M. H. A. was presented to that organization by Mrs. Leah H. Buttenweiser, at a cost of \$50,000, in memory of her husband, Laemmli Buttenweiser, who died in this city in 1901.

The original intention of Mrs. Buttenweiser was to cooperate with the officers of the Y. M. H. A. in the establishment of a branch of that organization on the West Side of the city, but when it was decided that all of its activities should be concentrated in one large building, she consented to the inclusion of an auditorium in the new edifice at 92nd Street and Lexington Avenue, bearing her late husband's name.

Jewish Pioneer Women's Group to Meet in Detroit, October 16

Detroit, Oct. 9.—The third annual convention of the Jewish Pioneer Women's Organization of the United States and Canada will open here next Thursday, Oct. 16. A large number of delegates from various parts of the country are expected. A feature of the convention will be a report of the American Jewish labor delegation which recently visited Palestine and which participated in the sessions of the World Congress for working Palestine, held in Berlin recently.

The Jewish Pioneer Women's Organization was founded for the especial purpose of aiding the Chalutzoth, the women pioneers, of Palestine. The convention will hold its sessions in the Statler Hotel.

Labor Party Resolution Calls on Great Britain to Promote Policy of Palestine Mandate

Llandudno, Wales, Oct. 9.—The Labor Party conference today adopted a resolution by an overwhelming majority declaring that the conference is of the opinion that the time has arrived for the British government to apply all the resources at its command in order to promote the policy of the Palestine Mandate by the development of the economic possibilities of the whole mandated territory, thus encouraging Jewish immigration and the close settlement of the land to the utmost capacity.

The resolution reaffirms the policy of the Labor Party concerning the establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine. The resolution was proposed by Maurice Rosetti, a Jewish delegate, and seconded by by Councillor Frankel. Dr. Hugh Dalton, under-secretary of state in the foreign office, accepted the resolution on behalf of the Labor Party's executive after expressing a plea for co-operation between Jewish and Arab workers in Palestine.

A second part of the resolution placed the conference on record as noting with satisfaction the conclusions of Sir Harry Snell, the Labor member of the Shaw Commission, that the achievements of the Jews in Palestine in the last decade are as significant as anything that has happened in our time. The conference also reiterated its conviction that no divergence of interests exists between the Jewish and Arab working populations and, therefore, the conference noted with approval the statement of the British government before the League of Nations that the Jewish National Home can be established without detriment to non-Jewish interests by conferring benefit upon the whole country.

A second resolution, which it was at first intended to submit to the conference protesting against the suspension of immigration, was withdrawn by the common consent of the Party and the proposer.

Jewish Festival Trip

Planned in Honor of Succoth

A "Jewish Festival Trip" to various synagogues and other Jewish institutions of New York in honor of the Festival of Succoth is being arranged for today and tomorrow by the "Reconciliation Trips," of which Clarence V. Howell, Ida Oatley Howell and F. Tredwell Smith are the directors. This organization arranges trips to various racial groups in New York for the purpose of studying their lives and to foster friendship between these various groups. The Succoth trip is especially planned for the High School Department of Riverside Church in cooperation with Mrs. Ivar Helstrom.

The group will visit Temple Emanuel, the Spanish-Portuguese Synagogue and Temple Ansche Chesed. Dr. Harold Korn of the Jewish Historical Society will lecture to the group on "Outstanding Jews in New York's History."

Sketch of Marshall Features American Jewish Year Book

A biographical sketch of the late Louis Marshall, written by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee, the Jewish Theological Seminary and Dropsie College, who was Mr. Marshall's intimate co-worker for many years in Jewish affairs, is the feature of the American Jewish Year Book for 5691 which has just been issued by the Jewish Publication Society of America.

The Year Book also contains a review of Jewish happenings during the past year, 5690, written by Harry Schneiderman, who has edited the Year Book for the American Jewish Committee. This review deals at length with the Palestine disorders of a year ago and with the political developments in Zionism which followed. Jewish life in many other countries during the past year is recorded fully in Mr. Schneiderman's review.

New statistics of Jewish population in the United States and in other countries appear in the latest issue of the American Jewish Year Book. Among American cities for which new figures of Jewish population are given are: Atlanta, 12,000; Birmingham, 4,500; Dallas, 8,000; Des Moines, 4,500; Duluth, 4,000; Elizabeth, N. J., 7,500; Houston, 12,000; Miami, 2,400; Mount Vernon, N. Y., 10,000; Nashville, 2,800; New Brunswick, N. J., 6,500; New Rochelle, 5,500; Norfolk, 6,500; Oakland, Cal., 5,000; Omaha, 10,000; Portland, Ore., 11,000; Richmond, 6,500; Rochester, 33,000; San Antonio, 6,000; Scranton, Pennsylvania, 8,000; Seattle, 12,000; Toledo, 12,000; Trenton, 10,000. Woodbine, N. J., which has a general population of 2,164 and a Jewish population of 1,100, shows the largest percentage of Jews of any American town enumerated. Chelsea, Mass., has 20,000 Jews out of a general population of 44,827. Fallsburg town, N. Y., located in the midst of the Jewish farming section of the Catskill Mountains, has 1,060 Jews out of a general population of 3,825.

A list of important centers of Jewish population in Europe, Palestine and other parts of the world is also given in the latest issue of the American Jewish Year Book. The Jewish population of various Palestinian cities in 1928 is given as follows: Jerusalem, 53,500; Tel Aviv, 38,500; Haifa, 17,500; Jaffa, 7,000. In all of these cities except Jaffa the Jews constitute a majority of the population.

Of Jewish immigration into Palestine, the Year Book says:

"From the date of the British occupation of Palestine, December 9, 1917, to the end of 1929, a total of 104,000 entered the country; and the yearly number varied between 33,801 in 1925 and 21,718 in 1928. But during the period of 1922 to 1929, a total of 25,500 Jews emigrated, or 29.96% of the total number of Jews admitted."

One-Third of Polish Jewry Deprived of Every Means of Existence, French Paper Reports

One million Polish Jews, or one-third of the total Jewish population there, is at this moment deprived of every means of existence, while another million is approaching the abyss, says a recent article in the *Paix et Droit* (Peace and Justice), a journal issued in Paris, a copy of which has just been received at national headquarters of the Allied Jewish Campaign.

The present crisis in Poland is one of the most acute with which the country has been afflicted during the course of the last few years, says the article. Certain industries are completely paralyzed, particularly the metallurgical and textile industries; the number of bankruptcies and judicial liquidations is constantly increasing; the army of unemployed reaches a record—more than 300,000 unemployed, one-third of the number of workers engaged in the industry of the nation. And it is even not yet certain that the crisis has reached its peak.

Jewish Situation

It would be a mistake however, continues the article, to say that there is an exact correspondence between this crisis and the tragic condition of the Jews, and to draw the conclusion that an improvement in the general economic situation would have a favorable effect upon the Jews for any length of time. A merciless struggle is being carried on by the government against the Jewish merchant class, which constitutes almost one-half of the Jewish population of Poland. Although Jews only constitute 11 per cent of the population, they pay 40 per cent of the total taxation, one of which, particularly heavy and unjust, is the tax upon business turnover. On the other hand, an economic evolution is working itself out by the development of consumers' cooperative societies which

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Jew, Catholic, Protestant and Agnostic Define Their Faiths at Four-Ply Pittsburgh Forum

Pittsburgh, Oct. 9.—"Judaism is a way of life disciplined by moral law and transfused by a consciousness of God. Judaism is law plus faith. It is expressed in law when law is required. At another time it is expressed in faith when the situation calls for faith, and at still other times it is expressed in knowledge, wisdom and research."

These were among the remarks of Rabbi Samuel H. Goldenson, spiritual leader of Temple Rodef Shalom here, who upheld the Jewish viewpoint in a four-cornered discussion last night before approximately 2,500 persons who packed Carnegie Music Hall to hear a Catholic, Jew, Protestant and Agnostic defend their beliefs. In addition to Rabbi Goldenson, other speakers were Clarence Darrow, noted criminal lawyer of Chicago, who is an avowed agnostic; Dr. Albert E. Day, pastor of the Christ Methodist Episcopal Church, Pittsburgh, who told "Why I am a Protestant"; and Quin O'Brien, nationally noted Catholic lawyer, attorney and Knights of Columbus leader. James Rae, president of the Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce, presided.

Darrow, the last speaker, attacked the faith of those who preceded him, singled out the belief in the virgin birth of Christ as a particular target, declared the fear of God was not the end of wisdom and emphasized that he believed in neither God nor soul, at the same time calling on those who had certain religious beliefs to come out with actual reasons and proof for them.

Dr. Day sketched his viewpoint of a responsive, personal universe, stating that this universe was his God, but that God transcended his universe. He liked Protestantism, he said, for its democracy, for its acceptance of realities, and for its approach to his own personal problems.

Attorney O'Brien, who was the first speaker on the program, enumerated what the world owes to the Catholic Church—Sunday, Christmas, Easter, the elevation of workers from serfdom to freedom, loyalty to Divinity at all times. "Where agnosticism strikes, chaos follows," he said.

Rabbi Benjamin Werne Heads Yonkers Temple Emanuel

Yonkers, N. Y., Oct. 9.—Rabbi Benjamin Werne, who conducted services at Temple Emanu-El here during the high holy days, has just been elected to serve as rabbi for the ensuing year at a quarterly meeting of the congregation. He receives the post formerly held by Rabbi Emanuel J. Jack, now retired from the rabbinate. Rabbi Werne formerly served in temples at Jamaica, L. I., and Columbus, Ohio, and before ordainment was principal of Hebrew schools in Los Angeles, Calif., and Dallas, Texas. At Columbus, he lectured on Jewish history at Ohio University.

Montreal Mayor Would Repeal Bill Giving Jews Right to Have Own School System

Montreal, Oct. 9.—Camilien Houde, mayor of Montreal and leader of the Provincial opposition, has come out with a demand for the repeal of the Jewish school bill which gives the local Jews the right to create a separate Jewish school system if no understanding can be reached during the year with the Protestant School Board. A Jewish school commission of seven, appointed in accordance with the bill, is now negotiating with the Protestant School Board.

Addressing a local gathering, Mayor Houde said, "A new school problem has arisen in this Province. Certain people think that the Provincial government exceeded its powers when it granted school privileges to a minority group. As a matter of fact it has gone beyond its powers. Premier Taschereau has refused his confidence to the Council on Public Instruction, claiming he can do better than our educators."

The Mayor pointed out that when the Jewish school bill came up in the Provincial parliament the opposition presented an amendment suggesting that the matter be referred back to the Council on Public Instruction but it was defeated. In the name of the party of which he is the leader, Mayor Houde said he asked for the "repeal of that legislation" and he will also ask that it be referred back to the Council on Public Instruction with the understanding that the parliament act in accordance with the recommendations of that body in the matter.

The Mayor emphasized that he did not intend to undertake an anti-Semitic campaign but on the contrary condemned the campaign being waged by the anti-Semitic papers as being likely to cause animosity between the races. Nevertheless his demand for the repeal of the Jewish school bill is considered a capitulation to the demands of the anti-Semitic press.

The Council on Public Instruction to whom Mayor Houde would turn over the Jewish school bill consists mainly of clergymen and Jews are excluded. If the demand of the opposition as voiced by Mayor Houde is acceded to the Jews would have no voice in matters pertaining to the education of their children.

Louis M. Cole Leaves \$4,000 to Charities

Los Angeles, Oct. 9.—Louis M. Cole, prominent financier and civic leader of Los Angeles, who died last Sunday left the bulk of his estate to his widow, Mrs. Frieda Hellman Cole, and divided \$4,000 among various charities as follows: \$1,000 to the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital (Jewish); \$1,000 to the Shrine Fund for Crippled Children; \$500 to the Jewish Orphans Home; \$500 to the Jewish Consumptive Relief Association; \$500 to the Barlow Sanatorium, and \$500 to the Los Angeles Tuberculosis Association.

Sold to Address Allied Jewish Campaign Conference

This is the first gathering for the Allied Jewish Campaign called in this section of the State, and it is the purpose of the Conference to organize these communities so that they may plan their individual Allied Campaign drives.

The distinguished guests at the afternoon session and at the banquet which will conclude the Conference will be Frank G. Allen, Governor of the State; Rabbi Harry Levi, noted spiritual leader of Temple Israel; Robert Szold, president of the American Zionist Administration, who comes from New York, and the Hon. Elihu D. Stone, president of the New England Zionist Region, who has just returned from Europe, where he attended the Actions Committee sessions in Berlin.

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the trouble Premier Lloyd George selected Lord Reading as Viceroy of India, which next to the Crown, is the highest post an Englishman can hold. Thus Lord Reading, who had first seen India nearly fifty years before as a cabin boy, returned in regal splendor in 1921. For five years he faced Indian hostility and then retired. When he returned to England he was made a Marquis.

Lord Reading has been tremendously interested in Palestine. He is an officer of the Rutenberg Company. In the course of the lengthy diplomatic negotiations between the various Jewish leaders and the British government concerning Palestine Lord Reading was frequently consulted by the Jewish leaders and was tremendously helpful in the protracted pourparlers.

Governor Allen Receives Jewish Heroes of World War

Boston, Oct. 9.—Governor Frank Allen officially received this morning the two Jewish World War veterans who hold the Congressional Medal of Honor, Captain Sydney Gumpertz of New York and Sergeant Benjamin Kauffman of Trenton, N. J., both of whom are attending the American Legion convention, as specially invited guests.

Alexander Brin, chairman of the Jewish Tercentenary Committee, presented the distinguished heroes to the Governor and pointed out that the acts of valor of these Jewish heroes had attracted international attention. The Congressional Record records 1,100 citations for valor to Jews of which number 723 were conferred by the American command. Of the 78 Congressional Medals of Honor awarded three went to Jews.

Frank Urges Support of Allied Jewish Campaign Just Because Palestine Is Included

Cincinnati, Oct. 9.—Speaking as an avowed Non-Zionist, Dr. Lee K. Frankel, noted health and social welfare leader, urged the Jews of Cincinnati to give generously to the Allied Jewish Campaign not in spite of but because of the inclusion of Palestine in the campaign, in an address opening Cincinnati's \$190,000 joint Jewish Welfare Fund drive.

The significant feature of the League of Nations Mandate in Palestine is that for the first time in 2,000 years the nations of the world are trying to do justice to the Jews," Dr. Frankel said. "If Palestine means anything it may mean the opportunity to repeat there what was in Jewry's past. Perhaps in the land again there will arise another Isaiah, another Amos, another Hosea, perhaps another Moses. If that should come to pass it will have been worth whatever it cost," Dr. Frankel declared.

"The League of Nations promised no Jewish statehood in Palestine; it promised only a place to live. There in Palestine we see the Jew once more the civilizer as he has been through the centuries. Not we but our posterity will see the fruits of this work. It is not relief work but a great adventure, an attempt to develop Jewish idealism. Jews throughout the world, in America, in Roumania and in Poland suffer disabilities. For all of us Palestine means much, a common experiment. When the Palestinian experiment comes to fruition benighted lands will have to change their attitude toward the Jew," Dr. Frankel concluded.

William J. Schroder, executive vice-chairman of the drive, congratulated the five hundred persons present on their humanity in giving this service and courage in laboring during the present economic situation. The records of 100 years disclose no Jew who died because he gave too much despite the remarkable generosity of Cincinnati Jewry, Mr. Schroder said.

Yiddish Talkie Shown in Jerusalem Without Objections

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—The Yiddish talking picture, "The Jewish Mother," was presented at a local theatre without any of the unpleasant disturbances that marred the showing of the Yiddish talkie in Tel Aviv last week. The fact that no objections were raised to the Yiddish talkie in Jerusalem may be due to the fact that the film was really a talkie in name only as all of the dialogue and singing parts were eliminated.

Jewish Farmers to Confer

A two-day conference of Jewish farmers from various parts of the country will begin on Sunday in the Educational Alliance Building. The conference will be held under the auspices of the Jewish Agricultural Society.

Various problems connected with Jewish farm life in the United States will be taken up by the conference.

By standardization and by the establishment of cartels of producers for internal and external commerce, the march of these events brings about the destruction and the ruin of large and middle-sized Jewish business establishments.

Government Against Jews

Since the reestablishment of the Polish state, the various governments which have succeeded one another have had one common item on the programs of each of them; that is, to cast the Jews out, says Paix de Droit. The economic doctrine of the actual ministries is without doubt framed in such a way as not to be expressly anti-Jewish; nevertheless, since it is by no means sympathetic to private initiative or to freedom of commerce the consequence is that it works out against the interest of Jews. Moreover, nothing whatever is done to make possible for those who are discharged from their positions their rehabilitation in some other form of activity.

"It is necessary to elaborate a vast economic plan, for the realization of which the help of overseas Jewry, and particularly American Jewry, is indispensable," declares the paper. "It will be necessary also to create favorable political conditions, to get in touch with the government authorities and with the more important municipalities of which many, Warsaw in particular, carry on an anti-Jewish policy. This then should be the object of the Jewish policy at the present time. It is a vast enterprise and requires tremendous efforts, but in view of the mass misery which confronts them, it is the only course. It must be put into operation immediately; otherwise it may be too late."

Louis Bush, Jewish Bus Magnate and Civic Worker, Dies at 60

Washington, Oct. 9.—The local Jewish community is greatly shocked at the death of Louis Bush, president of the Grey Lines Motor Tours and prominent in local Jewish affairs, who died yesterday from wounds inflicted when a robber shot him three times. Mr. Bush, who was 60, came to Washington 36 years ago. He was the founder of the first Grey Line in 1912. He was also a director of the Jewish Community Center and of the Jewish Foster Home.

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
