Four Jews Arrested in Anti-Shiels Demonstration in Tel Aviv; Sees Histadruth Leaders

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Oct. 10.—Four Jews were arrested yesterday during an attempted demonstration against Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary for the Colonies, who is here for a ten-day visit. The demonstration took place in front of the Palatin Hotel. A great crowd surrounded the building shouting "shame" and hissing and booing as the Shiels party emerged from the hotel. Shouts of "down with a parliament which does injustice to the Jews" were also heard. These latter cries were the result of reports from London that Dr. Shiels had promised the Arab Executive a parliament for Palestine.

Dr. Shiels had been conferring with the leaders of the General Federation of Jewish Labor at the hotel after a tea party which was arranged there. The police claim that the four arrested persons are Zionist Revisionists. Among those arrested is Akhi Mayer, a former member of the staff of the Doar Hayom.

Urge Harbor for Jaffa

A harbor for Jaffa and the transfer of the railway junction at Ludd to Tel Aviv were among the measures urged upon Dr. Shiels in the course of his visit to the Tel Aviv municipality. Crowds lined the streets through which the Shiels party passed. Dr. Shiels enthused over the development and

Minorities Candidates' Inclusion in Election List of Liberals Irks Turkish Government Party

Istanbul, Oct. 10.—The inclusion of candidates representing the minorities on the Liberal opposition lists for the forthcoming municipal elections has aroused the vigorous protest of the government party which is desirous of keeping the monopoly of power and privilege exclusively for Turks. The government press points out that while civic rights are not denied to non-Turkish minorities their past "cannot be forgotten because they have not changed their mentality and cannot be entrusted with power."

The Liberal opposition, replying to the government party's attacks, says it is time to utilize the cooperation of the non-Turks since a purely Turkish administration has failed in its task. Because of the determination of Fethi Bey, leader of the Liberal party, to officially put into effect the existing but never properly executed equality of minorities, Jews will be candidates for election in the Turkish municipalities for the first time.

Benes Promises Solution of Staatenlose and Refugee Problem in Czecho-Slovakia

Prague, Oct. 10.—Dr. Eduard Benes, foreign minister of Czecho-Slovakia, today assured the naturalization commission of the senate that the government would solve the problem of the naturalization of the staatenlose, or people without citizenship, because of post-war map changes, in a sympathetic manner. The minister of the interior has already settled 20,000 cases, Dr. Benes said.

The Jewish deputies present at the commission's sessions expressed the hope that by next year Dr. Benes could promise a definite solution of the problem of the Jewish staatenlose, particularly in Slovakia and Carpatho-Russia as well as naturalization of the Polish and Russian war refugees.

Last May the minister of the interior, Jan Cerny, announced that a bill had been drafted which provided that anyone who has lived within the present boundaries of Czecho-Slovakia since 1910 is eligible to citizenship. An amendment to this bill offered by Jewish members of parliament would make all residents of Czecho-Slovakia since 1915 qualified for citizenship, thus enabling Jewish war refugees to become citizens.

At the same time the government organ in Carpatho-Russia, the Podkarpatske Hlasy, violently attacks the Jewish nationalists for their insistence on the Jews registering themselves as of the Jewish nationality in the forthcoming census. The paper says that Zionism has not brought any good to the Jewish people but "has only led the Jews to join the minorities, who are never loyal to the state majority, and to the promotion of the language battle which never existed before."

This attack is believed intended to frighten the Jews into declaring themselves as Czechs when the census is taken. In July the government issued a decree permitting the Jews to declare themselves as of the Jewish nationality.

Einstein to Be Honored by Swiss Institute of Technology

Berlin, Oct. 10.—Dr. Albert Einstein has accepted an invitation to attend the celebration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Swiss Institute of Technology on November 5, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns. On that occasion Dr. Einstein will be given an honorary degree by the Institute. Some of Dr. Einstein's early pre-War lectures were delivered at the Swiss Institute of Technology.

At the end of this month he will be the guest of honor at a dinner of the Ort and the Oze in London.

Failure of Zionists to Agree on Political Program Leaves Austrian Jewry Undecided

Vienna, Oct. 10.—The failure of the various Austrian Zionist groups to agree on a common program for the forthcoming elections leaves the attitude of Austrian Jewry towards the several political parties exactly where it was before the Zionist conference of yesterday was held. The General Zionists decided not to name their own candidate nor to join an all-Jewish bloc because the chances of success were nil.

The Revisionists, however, voted to support a Zionist candidate. The Radicals abstained from voting and declared they did not recognize the conference's decision on internal politics so long as the General Zionists participate in the non-Jewish parties such as the Social Democrats or the Heimwehrists. The Radicals proposed a parliamentary list with their leader, Dr. Robert Stricker, as the candidate, and are negotiating with the Revisionists and other Jewish groups for support in order to prove both at home and abroad that the Jews do not identify themselves with the Social Democrats or the Heimwehrists.

Cross-Fire Subject of Comment

This cross-fire between which the Jews are caught with anti-Semitism at either side is commented on in the current issues of the two Zionist papers, the Stimme and the Neue Welt. The Zionist organs say that the Heimwehrists identify the Jews with the revolutionary Socialists while the Social Democrats charge that the Jewish capitalists are supporting the Heimwehr.

In the meantime the Jews of Vienna are deeply disquieted at the permission

Doctored Letter of King Carol Used for Anti-Semitic Agitation

Bucharest, Oct. 10.—New anti-Semitic agitation in the Balfi provinces is now assuming alarming proportions. The Cuzists have utilized a cabled communication from King Carol to make him out a sympathizer with the anti-Jewish movement. Having received an acknowledgement from the King to greetings they sent him, the Cuzists added the Swastika sign to the signature of the King's secretary. Photostatic copies of this doctored letter were distributed among the gullible peasants in an effort to convince them that the King is supporting the Cuzists.

The trial of the anti-Semitic leader, Grabcius, was also utilized for an anti-Semitic demonstration in front of the court house. The police quickly dispersed the demonstrators.

Leah Davis, Founder of Gold Star Mothers' Association, Dead

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—Mrs. Leah H. Davis, organizer and national president of the Gold Star Mothers of America, is dead here at the age of 50 as the result of a heart attack. She was the mother of one of the Jewish heroes of the World War, the late Victor H. Davis, a private in the 363rd infantry. Mrs. Davis devoted much of her time to aiding in the passage of legislation which made possible the recent pilgrimage to France of Gold Star mothers. She herself was unable to go because of illness.

Long active in uniting the various chapters of Gold Star mothers, she was named president of the national organization in 1929. She was also interested in legislation in Congress providing more assistance for dependent war mothers.

Rabbi Grafman Installed at Tremont Temple

Rabbi L. Elliot Grafman was officially installed as the rabbi of Tremont Temple, New York City, on Friday evening, October 10. Rabbis Nathan Krass of Temple Emanu-El, and Jonah B. Wise of the Central Synagogue, New York City, participated in the installation exercises. Brief addresses were also made by Adolph Steiner, president, and Seymour Mork, chairman of the Board of Trustees, of Tremont Temple.

Rabbi Grafman is a graduate of the Hebrew Union College and of the University of Cincinnati. He has been prominently identified with religious and social welfare work, and at one time edited the Southern Advocate, an English-Jewish publication. Rabbi Grafman came to Tremont Temple after six years of ministry to the Reform Temple in Tampa, Florida. Tremont Temple is the only Reform Temple in the Bronx section of New York City.

Agreement Between Protestants and Jews on Montreal Jewish School Question Expected

Montreal, Oct. 10.—Negotiations are proceeding between the members of the Jewish school commission and the Protestant school board for a settlement of the Jewish school question. Although no details of the negotiations have been made public it is understood that both parties are prepared to come to an understanding by means of which the Jewish children will receive their education in the Protestant schools and the Jewish school commission will enjoy certain privileges.

Premier Taschereau today denied a sensational story in the French newspaper La Presse that the Provincial government was ready to repeal the Jewish school bill since the Jews and Protestants had already reached an agreement and hence such legislation was unnecessary. The statement was pure imagination and the program of the Provincial opposition headed by Mayor Houde of Montreal, the Premier told Peter Berkovitch, Jewish member of the Provincial parliament.

Earlier in the week Mayor Houde had publicly declared for the repeal of the Jewish school bill. This bill passed by the Provincial legislature provides for the appointment of a Jewish school commission of seven. This commission is to negotiate with the Protestant school board regarding the Jewish school question. Failing to reach a satisfactory agreement the Jewish school commission is empowered to proceed with the organization of an independent Jewish school system in Montreal.

A.F. of L. and American Legion Urge New Immigration Bans

Boston, Oct. 10.—Further restrictions on immigration were advocated at the conventions of the American Federation of Labor and of the American Legion. James J. Davis, secretary of labor, addressing the convention of the American Federation of Labor, discussed the effect of immigration upon unemployment. He asserted that it had long been his opinion to adopt the selective system under which no unattached immigrant would be admitted to the United States except to meet the country's actual need.

Mr. Davis declared that the American wage-earner was fully entitled to the protection such a system would afford.

The American Legion went on record as urging Congress to support such legislation as would make certain the effective enforcement of the immigration restriction act. The national legislative committee of the Legion was instructed to prepare a bill for adequate legislation for the apprehension, punishment and deportation of violators of the immigration laws.

The Legion also approved a resolution suggesting that the naturalization courts throughout the country be so organized and the naturalization proceedings be so carried out that greater dignity shall surround the process of naturalization.

Jewish Women Active in Exhibit of Women's Industries and Arts

The ninth annual Exposition of Women's Arts and Industries has opened at the Astor Hotel where for one week the achievements of women employed in gainful occupations will be displayed for the benefit and enlightenment of the metropolitan public.

The National Council of Jewish Women had a small booth wherein, though they could hardly be expected to cover every branch of their numerous undertakings, they had a fine display showing the scope of their educational work amongst the foreign born in practically every city in the United States. Visitors to the Exposition showed an active interest in the work of the Council.

The Jewish Big Sisters, working for the welfare of unfortunate girls and problem cases; also had a booth in conjunction with the Catholic and Protestant Big Sisters.

Nor was social service the only branch in which Jewish women participated. There was Doris Meltzer of the International Book and Art Shop displaying the drawings and etchings she brought from Paris; there was Fannie Moses with hand-made jewelry she carved and hammered; there were the Madison Players, a group of amateur actors competing in the Amateur Theatrical Tournament; and thus from booth to booth we found them, talking politics, cosmetics, candy-making and real estate.

Dr. Cyrus Adler Urges Jews to Support HIAS in Emergency

Philadelphia, Oct. 10.—Whole-hearted endorsement of the work being done by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society and the call to the Jews of America to contribute to the emergency fund now being raised in this country are contained in a statement issued here by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of Dropsie College and president of the American Jewish Committee. Touching upon the character of the work being done by HIAS and the urgency of the need existing overseas Dr. Adler declares: "I gladly support the appeal of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society. The depressed economic condition in Eastern Europe makes it difficult for many Jews to earn their livelihood in the countries in which they reside. To enable them to emigrate to a country in which they could eventually earn a living without fear of oppression is a praiseworthy charity and deserves the support of every public spirited Jew.

"In conjunction with the Societies in Germany and France, the HIAS of the United States has been working for the past two years and has just entered into an arrangement for joint work for the next three years. From the experiences since 1927 it is established that the Jews of Eastern Europe will find an opportunity, granted a little help, to establish themselves on a self-supporting basis in certain South American countries. Support of the campaign of the HIAS to this end will be a means of helping these brethren of ours to help themselves."

Alumnus Charges Rutgers University Has "Numerus Clausus" for Jewish Students

Perth Amboy, N. J., Oct. 10.—Rumors that have been current and suspicions that have existed for the past few months to the effect that a "numerous clausus" affecting Jewish students had been established at Rutgers University, located in New Brunswick, N. J., were brought prominently to the fore today. Julius Kass, a Perth Amboy attorney and an alumnus of Rutgers, charged openly that the University was accepting students on a basis other than scholarship and that a great many Jewish students who were recommended by the principals of the high schools from which they graduated, were refused admittance, while their non-Jewish classmates with lesser qualifications matriculated at the University.

Mr. Kass stated that he makes the charges reluctantly and after due reflection, but since the State of New Jersey appropriated almost a million dollars of the taxpayers' money last year for the support of the University and since, whenever it had suited its purpose, Rutgers has designated itself as the "University of the State of New Jersey," he feels that the public should be apprized of the system used in selecting the future "men of Rutgers." He further stated that he is prepared to substantiate every charge made by him.

Only 33 Jewish Students Admitted

According to Mr. Kass only 33 Jewish students were admitted this year out of a Freshman class numbering about 330. Of these 33 students, 9 are from New Brunswick and of these 9, Mr. Kass states, 8 were originally rejected and were admitted only after their former principal, Robert C. Carlson, had protested against their exclusion from the University and influential Rutgers alumni and politicians had taken up the cudgel in their behalf.

Most of the letters of rejection which were written by the University to the student applicants simply stated: "Your application for admittance to Rutgers University has been denied," no reason being assigned. Although many of the Jewish students throughout the State had applied for admission to the University prior to their graduation from High School last year, the Committee on Admissions did not pass upon their applications until the early part of August and many students who were certain that their scholastic standing would enable them to matriculate at Rutgers, and thus had not made application to other universities, discovered that it was too late to apply to other schools offering the type of courses that they desired to study.

Mr. Kass made public the results of a conference that he had on October 3 with Luther H. Martin, Registrar, and Fraser Metzger, Dean of Men of the University, who, together with Philip Brett, a New York attorney, comprise the Committee on Admissions.

Specifically, Mr. Kass appeared on behalf of Myron Sewitch, a Perth

Jewish War Veterans Honored at American Legion Convention

Boston, Oct. 10.—An interesting fact was brought to light when Governor Frank G. Allen yesterday received Thomas Medbar of Sugar City, Idaho, a World War veteran who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor and who is attending the American Legion convention here. Although he himself is of the Mormon faith, Mr. Medbar might be listed as a person of Jewish extraction, since he admits that his grandfather was a rabbi.

The Governor of Massachusetts also received yesterday Captain Sidney Gumpertz of New York City and Sergeant Benjamin Kauffman of Trenton, N. J., the only two Jewish World War veterans living at present who were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the records listing only three Jews of the 78 who were so honored; two living and one dead. After receiving them, the Governor presented Gumpertz and Kauffman with State medals and souvenir histories of the State, published in connection with the Tercentenary. At special summons from the Mayor, they left the State House and were received by Mayor Curley, who presented each one with medals and the famous Washington Elm tree canes.

Thousands of spectators during the Legion parade held here during the week of the American Legion convention watched a uniformed, medal-bedecked World War veteran acknowledge for the Boston City Council the salute of the marching Legionnaires. Herman L. Bush, City Councillor, who saw considerable action with the machine gun battalion of the 26th Division and was severely wounded several times, was delegated by the President of the Council to take the salute.

Bush is the only Jew in Boston to wear the distinguished service medal. It is the first time in the history of the City Council that a Jewish soldier was so honored. In his Legion uniform, upon which were pinned the distinguished service cross, the French croix de guerre, the insignia of service at the Mexican border and the service ribbon with its bars indicating the World War engagements in which he participated, Bush attracted considerable attention from the visiting Legionnaires.

World Ort Raised \$759,658 During Last Year, Report Shows

During the year 1929 the World Ort has collected the sum of \$759,658, according to the financial report which the central office of the "Ort" in Berlin has just issued. Besides this sum the Ort sent to Russia during the same year machines worth \$387,814 at the expense of foreign relatives of Russian Jews. Machines and raw materials worth \$465,718 have been sent out to the credit of the cooperatives. More than 150 Jewish agricultural colonies in Russia, Bessarabia and Poland were served by the Ort during 1929. A total of 97 Jewish institutions in various East European countries were supported by the Ort during the same year.

First Gathering of Jewish Farm Leaders of U. S. Opens Tonight; Exposition Planned

The first gathering of Jewish farm leaders of the United States will meet tonight at the Educational Alliance when Jewish farm delegates from all parts of the country open the two-day session of the National Conference of Jewish Farmers under the auspices of the Jewish Agricultural Society. Simultaneously with the convention an agricultural exposition demonstrating the activities of the Jewish farmers and their home life will be opened.

The principal subject to be taken up at the conference will be the problem of developing farm leadership in the Jewish farming settlements so that the social, religious and economic life of these communities may be fully developed. The various groups to be represented at the conference will pool their intellectual resources in an endeavor to perfect a form of rural organization that will utilize to the fullest extent the latent forces in the community.

Among the group conferences scheduled are those of the graduates of agricultural schools, students of college short courses, farm pioneers, graduates of veterinary colleges and farmers' associations. Each of these groups will hold brief independent sessions to review their special problems.

The speakers at the conference will be Dean A. R. Mann of the College of Agriculture and Domestic Science at Cornell University; Dr. Jacob Goodale Lipman, dean of the New Jersey State Agricultural College and head of the Agricultural Experiment Station, Gabriel Davidson, general manager of the Jewish Agricultural Society, and Mrs. A. H. Aarons of the National Council of Jewish Women.

The exposition will show products raised by Jewish farmers in the various parts of the country and a great variety of educational exhibits that will depict the utilization of the very latest methods and devices in scientific agriculture. Prizes totalling \$500 will be distributed at the exposition by Percy S. Straus.

Thuringia Bans Talkie Dealing With Two Jewish Themes

Berlin, Oct. 10.—Because it deals with a pogrom on the Jews and the love affair between an Austrian army officer and a Jewess, the talking film, "Two Worlds," has been prohibited in the moving picture houses of Thuringia by the minister of the interior, Dr. William Frick. "To characterize the Jews as better people than Austrian officers is an insult which we could not inflict upon our Austrian brethren," Dr. Frick declared, in explaining the ban.

Dr. Frick, a member of the National Socialist party, is a noted anti-Semite, having been responsible for the introduction of the notorious "hate prayers" in the schools of Thuringia.

beauty of Tel Aviv. He lunched with the Jaffa municipal officials.

For more than an hour Dr. Shiels was closeted with six members of the executive of the General Federation of Jewish Labor. Chaim Arlosoroff stressed the fact that the Jewish people could only be summoned to sacrifice for Palestine if the structure was not subject to the approval of the majority. Ben Zwi deplored the lack of labor legislation. Dr. Shiels replied that the Labor government in the future would not lean to either side, and he emphasized that constant opposition to the government was not wise. A number of the Jewish labor leaders will accompany Dr. Shiels on a tour of the labor settlements in the Emek.

The version of the anti-Shiels demonstration as published in the Doar Hayom varies slightly from other accounts. The Doar Hayom does not mention Revisionists and alleges police brutality in dispersing the crowd, a part of which sang Hatikvah. A juvenile organization, styling itself National Youth, yesterday distributed handbills urging a boycott of Dr. Shiels. The four persons arrested for participation in the demonstration are still not named.

C.C.N.Y. Head Finds Extent of Discrimination Exaggerated

"More than any place in the world, New York takes a man on his own merits, regardless of his racial or religious affiliations. New York is particularly free of prejudices."

This is the opinion of Dr. Frederick B. Robinson, president of the College of the City of New York, expressed in an interview with Evelyn Seeley and published in Thursday's New York Telegram. Miss Seeley has been interviewing several prominent New Yorkers on the subject of discrimination against Jews in New York with regard to employment and other matters.

"I think the extent of discrimination is exaggerated," Dr. Robinson stated in the interview. "Certain individual Jews, unsuccessful, blame their failure on their race. They say, 'I didn't get the job because I am a Jew,' when often there were many other reasons. But the ablest, finest Jews never hide behind their race."

Paying tribute to the Jewish student's seriousness, Dr. Robinson said. "He has a traditional reverence for learning that most Gentiles lack. He is sensitive to the sacrifice his parents have made in many cases to give the younger generation maximum opportunity. Realizing more clearly the value of knowledge in his future life he sluffs off earlier the desire to play. There is an early maturity among Jews in sensing values, intellectual and spiritual and material. The young Jew is fortunate indeed in his glorious background of culture, learning and morality, in his heritage of the traditions of the prophets. I would not say however that he is brighter than other boys; I would only say that he makes more of his opportunities."

granted by Prince Starhemberg, Heimwehr leader and minister of the interior, to Major Waldemar Pabst, former Heimwehr leader who was exiled by ex-Chancellor Schoeber, to return to Austria. The dictatorial activities of Prince Starhemberg are also causing anxiety in Jewish circles. His confiscation of non-Socialist and conservative newspapers for revealing the political intrigues of Major Pabst is looked upon with concern.

Increasing Disunion of Heimwehrist

Moderate opinion, however, is finding satisfaction in the increasing disunion among the Heimwehrist themselves, and the growing feeling among the Christian Socialists that they made a mistake in including the Heimwehr in the new government. The nationalist pro-Hitler section of the lower Austrian Heimwehr has seceded from the main organization while the Vienna clerical-monarchist wing has quarreled with Starhemberg.

Starhemberg's position in the cabinet is also being constantly weakened because although he himself belongs to the nationalist wing he is at the same time in alliance with the clerical party contrary to Hitler's orders. The Heimwehrist have definitely decided not to enter into any binding engagements with any party, thus affecting adversely the interests of the Christian Socialists who had hoped that the Heimwehrist would not name candidates in districts where the clericals stand for election.

Jewish Actors' Union Bans

Maurice Schwartz in N. Y.

Maurice Schwartz, noted Yiddish actor and theatrical manager, will be compelled to play during this season in Philadelphia, instead of New York, according to a decision of the Jewish Actors' Union at its meeting on Thursday. By a vote of 36 to 24, the Union denied Mr. Schwartz the privilege of playing in New York.

When Mr. Schwartz was recently in Argentina he had negotiated by cable to play in the Gibson Theatre, Philadelphia, during the coming season. On his arrival in this country however he found that the theatre in Philadelphia was unsuited for his purposes, and decided to appear again in New York, leasing the Second Avenue Theatre for this purpose.

In a statement which he gave to the press after the meeting of the Actor's Union, Mr. Schwartz declared that he would play in New York despite the decision of the Union. He stated that enemies are endeavoring to drive him out of New York, where, he said, he put in twelve years of hard work in developing the Yiddish Art Theatre.

The facts in the Sewitch case were called to Mr. Kass's attention and, having been previously apprized of other cases where Jewish students had fared similarly, he arranged for a conference with Dean Metzger and Mr. Martin.

Admit Numerus Clausus

They admitted, frankly, that very few Jewish students had been admitted this year. This was done, they said, in order to "equalize the proportion." They said that the Committee on Admissions had been instructed by the Trustees that Rutgers was not to be made "denominational." "Rutgers got away from the old Dutch denominationalism years ago," they said, "and we do not wish it to become predominantly Jewish now. If 40 or 50 per cent of the Jews that apply were admitted, Rutgers would soon become like C.C.N.Y. The present ratio of Jews in Rutgers is about 15 per cent. That is a sufficiently high proportion, especially in view of the fact that the Jews comprise but 10 per cent of the population of the State."

The Perth Amboy attorney asked the University officials to assume a case in which a Jewish student in the upper quarter of his class in preparatory school and a non-Jewish student who was in the lower three-quarters of his class, both applied for admission at a time when the so-called "Jewish quota" had been filled. "Which student would be admitted?" Mr. Kass asked. The surprising answer of Dean Metzger was, "The non-Jewish student."

Sees Palestine Making Steady Progress in Industry, Agriculture

Palestine Jewry is steadily progressing in the development of its agricultural and industrial life, declared A. Hamlin, American Poale-Zion leader and secretary of the Gevevkschaften Campaign, on his arrival this week in New York from an extended visit to Palestine as a member of the American Jewish Labor delegation and as a delegate to the first World Congress for Palestine Workers, held recently in Berlin.

"While in Palestine we found going on in full swing the work at the Rutenberg electric power station, the Dead Sea excavations, the building of the Haifa harbor, the work in the orange plantations at which 8,000 Jewish workers are employed, the building of new Jewish quarters in Jerusalem and Haifa and other smaller and larger undertakings. The Palestinian Jew is not losing his courage and confidence in the future."
