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Hitler Denies Responsibility for Berlin Anti-Semitic Outbreaks as Jews Organize for Self-Defense, Withdraw Deposits from German Banks and Begin Exodus to Holland and Switzerland

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Oct. 15.—While Adolf Hitler, in an interview with the Berlin correspondent of the London Times, denies that his party was responsible for Monday's anti-Semitic street riots which were timed to coincide with the opening of the Reichstag, an emergency court called into session to consider the case of the arrested rioters sentenced two to six months each in prison, twelve to from three weeks to three months and released the others.

Hitler, leader of the National Socialists, declared himself ready to make a thorough investigation and promised to expel immediately any member of the party whose complicity in the anti-Jewish outbreak was proven. "The National Socialist movement does not need to employ such methods," Hitler said. "It is a strictly disciplined movement and every member knew that such excesses were against its interest and orders."

"The movement discountenanced violent anti-Semitism," Hitler declared, adding that he would have nothing to do with pogroms and that that was always his attitude. The doctrine of the National Socialists, he said was "Germany for Germans" and their attitude toward the Jews was governed by the attitude of the Jews toward this doctrine. They had nothing against Jews but if Jews "associated themselves with Bolshevism, as many unfortunately did, they must be regarded as enemies," Herr Hitler concluded.

Guardian Blames Hitler

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 15.—While Adolf Hitler, National Socialist leader, is seeking to shift the blame for Monday's anti-Jewish disturbances, the Manchester Guardian today openly charges that

the responsibility for the riots rests not with those who were arrested but with the leaders of the National Socialists, namely Herr Hitler, M. Goebbels, Fascist chieftain in Berlin, and M. Rosenberg, editor of the Fascist organ, the Voelkischer Beobachter. "The action of the youth who were arrested was the direct outcome of the anti-Semitic agitation going on from day to day in the National Socialist movement, and the anti-Semitic character of the disorders is beyond any doubt," the Guardian says.

"National Socialist headquarters has issued a confused and self-contradictory bulletin," the Guardian writes, "which is characteristic of the National Socialist leaders who are whitewashing themselves of responsibility while their youthful followers are on the way to prison."

The Manchester Guardian completely discredits the suggestion thrown out

Says Britain Plans Palestine Assembly with 24 Deputies

Jerusalem, Oct. 15.—The legislative assembly for Palestine which the British government will propose in its statement of policy expected at the end of the month will provide for an assembly of 24 nominated members, the Arab papers here report. Of this number 16 will be Moslems, four Jews and four Christians.

The paper also reports that the government is planning a new census in 1932 after which an election will be held, every community receiving a proportionate number of deputies. Reports from Haifa indicate that the Christians are opposed to the above mentioned scheme because they fear they will be outnumbered.

Hitler Blames Lieutenant for Anti-Semitic Riots

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Oct. 15.—Joseph Goebbels, Berlin spellbinder for the National Socialists was sharply criticized today by the party chieftain, Adolf Hitler who held Goebbels responsible for Monday's anti-Semitic riots. Hitler criticized his lieutenant during a session of the National Socialist members of the Reichstag.

Herr Goebbels defended himself by replying that true National Socialists do not agree with Hitler's reserved tactics of party management. Hitler finally made a plea for party obedience and ordered the Fascist storm squads to avoid all excesses.

Silver Jubilee of International Agriculture Institute, Founded by American Jew, Marked

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Rome, Oct. 15.—Twenty-five years ago David Lubin obtained the support of King Victor Emanuel for the establishment of the International Institute of Agriculture for which Lubin had spent almost a lifetime. Yesterday the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Institute was celebrated by delegates from 70 countries. King Victor Emanuel was there but David Lubin was present in spirit only. He died in 1919.

Lubin, a Polish-born Jew who made a fortune in business in California, conceived the idea of the Institute which as established through the aid of the King of Italy. Yesterday tribute was paid to the foresight and genius of Lubin by the King, Premier Mussolini and the representatives of the leading nations of the world except the United States which is not a member of the Institute and was not officially represented.

Premier Mussolini devoted a good part of his address to praise of the late Mr. Lubin. Other speakers joined in the tribute to the genius of Lubin whose ideals of economic justice are the foundation of the Institute.

Washington, Oct. 15.—Unsatisfactory relations between the United States and the Institute of Agriculture in Rome made impossible the official representation of this country at the twenty-fifth anniversary celebration of the Institute which was founded by an American Jew, David Lubin. The United States, a former member of the Institute, resigned from the Institute because it was dissatisfied with the method of administration which it is alleged has been based on political and diplomatic rather than scientific considerations, according to sources well informed as to the attitude of the department of agriculture.

Deny Government Plans to Dissolve Warsaw Kehillah

Warsaw, Oct. 15.—The Polish minister of cults today denied a sensational report in the Juedische Tageblatt, the organ of the Agudath Israel, that the Polish government intends to dissolve the council and executive of the Warsaw Jewish community and replace them by a government superintendent who would manage the community's affairs.

Following the publication of the sensational report the Jewish Telegraphic Agency inquired as to its veracity from Herschel Farbstein, president of the community and a member of parliament. Deputy Farbstein then interviewed the minister of cults who assured him that the report was absolutely unfounded.

Bund May Quit Traditional Opposition to Labor Zionism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Oct. 15.—As the result of the conclusion of an election bloc between the Right Poale Zion, the Socialist-Zionist Labor party, and the Jewish Socialist party (Bund) the latter may abandon its historic opposition to labor Zionism. The election agreement signed today between these two Jewish groups resulted from the Bund's reply to a point blank question from the right Poale Zionists whether the Bund was fighting Palestine labor on principle. The Bund categorically repudiated this declaring it was a malicious calumny and added that they were supporting the workers of the whole world including those of Palestine.

Rejection of Anti-Semitism as Election Slogan Leads to Break Between Heimwehr and Hitler

Vienna, Oct. 15.—The rejection of anti-Semitism as an election slogan by the Heimwehr has led to a complete break in the negotiations between Prince Starhemberg, Heimwehr leader, and his German counterpart, Adolf Hitler, chieftain of the National Socialists. The pourparlers between the German and Austrian Fascist leaders looking toward mutual cooperation have been abandoned because of the influence of the Christian Socialists. Hitler's proposed visit to Austria has also been given up.

The Heimwehr, under the influence of the Christian Socialists, turned down the Aryan race principle as election propaganda since the Christian Socialists insist that racial anti-Semitism is contradictory to Christianity. This is in direct line with the recent action taken by the Archbishop of Mainz who prohibited all Catholics in his diocese from joining the Hitlerites because the program of the latter was incompatible with the teachings of Catholicism.

While the Heimwehr's rejection of anti-Semitism as a campaign issue is gratifying to the Jews they are faced with the unique situation of not finding any Jewish candidates on any of the bourgeois tickets for parliament. The Schober center bloc has declined to invite any of the Democratic elements to participate in the new party because the Democrats are considered "too Jewish." The Social Democrats are rumored to be replacing a number of Jewish members of parliament elected as Socialists by Christians. The Jews are said to be retiring because of old age.

Schober himself is reported to be greatly disappointed that his own bloc has been turned into an anti-Semitic affair. The leaders of the only independent Jewish ticket headed by Dr. Robert Stricker and supported by the Radical Zionists are of the opinion that the anti-Semitism of the Schober bloc improves the chances of the Jewish ticket which had previously been considered hopeless.

Warn Minister on Sale of Anti-Semitic Paper in Bucharest

Bucharest, Oct. 15.—John Mihalache, new minister of the interior, was warned today by the local press to take measures to reestablish order in connection with the slackness of the police in arresting vendors of anti-Semitic publications which have been offered for sale on the principal streets of Bucharest in the last few days.

A minor scandal has been brewing because of police inactivity in halting the sale of these inciting publications. Pedestrians who have declined to purchase them have been insulted. The vendors of the anti-Semitic sheets, emboldened by the failure of the police to put a stop to the practice, ventured into the Calea Victoires. Some of the vendors have been arrested but were immediately released.

Anti-Semites Blame Jews for Rumanian Economic Crisis

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Oct. 15.—Anti-Semitic propaganda is again becoming widespread in Bessarabia. A group of anti-Semitic students has arrived in Hotin from Czernowitz to distribute leaflets containing articles that blame the Jews for the economic difficulties of the peasants.

The students, who are followers of Professor Alexander Cuza, are promising the peasants that "a prominent professor" will save the country by confiscating the property of the Jews and distributing it among the peasants.

Polish Court Annuls Death Sentences Passed on 3 Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, Oct. 15.—The court of assizes today annulled the death sentences passed last June on three Jews charged with Communist activities. The case was carried to the court of appeals in Warsaw which threw out the decision of the Lemberg court and ordered the latter to give the three Jews a new trial.

As a result of the new trial the Jews were again found guilty but the death sentence was quashed and replaced by milder punishment for two of the accused, while the third, Naphtali Proper, was let off with a warning. The other two, Samuel Jugend, 22, a minor government official, was sentenced to a year in prison, and Israel Hirsch, 23, was sentenced to 18 months in prison.

\$55,000 to Philanthropies in Frederick Mandel's Will

Chicago, Oct. 15.—Mrs. Blanche Mandel, widow of the late Frederick Mandel, chairman of the board of Mandel Bros.' department store, and their two sons, Frederick L., Jr., and Leon, are the principal beneficiaries of his estate, according to the terms of his will which was admitted to probate here. Mr. Mandel died in Paris on Sept. 20. Bequests for three charities are included in the will. Further contributions are entrusted to the discretion of his widow. "I know my beloved wife with suitable discretion will make suitable contributions to charity," the will reads.

The Jewish Charities of Chicago is left \$25,000. The United Charities of Chicago gets \$10,000, the Catholic Charities of this city, \$10,000 and the Mercy Hospital, \$10,000.

National Farm School Buys Property as Krauskopf Memorial

Doylestown, Pa., Oct. 15.—The alumni of the National Farm School here have purchased the Homer farm near the school as gift to the school in memory of the late Rabbi Joseph Krauskopf, founder of the school. This announcement was made early this week by Herbert D. Allman, president of the School, in his address at the thirty-third annual meeting. The farm has been named the Isaac Stern Farm as a tribute to the president of the national alumni.

Einstein Outlines Measures to Achieve Rapprochement Between Jews and Arabs

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 15.—An outline of measures that would help to create a rapprochement between Jews and Arabs in Palestine is given by Dr. Albert Einstein in an interview published in the Juedische Stimme, local Zionist organ. Dr. Einstein also approves in principle of the activities of the Brith Shalom Society, a Palestinian group actively propagating peace between Arabs and Jews.

Dr. Einstein points out that "it is impossible for two peoples to live in the same country without regular collaboration in the economic and political spheres. A particularly difficult problem is to establish contact with the Arabs, gain their confidence and have them understand that it is not intended to affect their economic well-being. Through patient political work the attempt must be made to break the influence of unconcilable elements and professional politicians. It must be remembered that England can only help us when we facilitate her task by ourselves establishing relations with the Arabs," Dr. Einstein declared.

He recommended that particular attention be paid to a study of the Arabic language "because otherwise it is impossible to establish effective contact." He also believes it necessary to establish relations between the moderates of "both camps who are not connected with politics as a profession in order to consider sore points and matters of mutual interests. Politics from motives of prestige must be avoided."

Pointing out that the Jewish people or "rather Jewry forms in the first place a cultural commonwealth" and that the assistance of valuable elements "can only

Two thousand women Zionists of this city will gather at the Commodore Hotel, November 5, to pay tribute to the memory of the late Mrs. Nathan Straus, who was honorary vice-president of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, for many years.

Dr. David de Sola Pool, rabbi of the Spanish-Portuguese Synagogue, will make an address on Mrs. Straus.

The meeting, which will be held under the auspices of the New York chapter of Hadassah, will be in the form of a tea to open the chapter's activities. Miss Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah and former member of the Palestine Zionist Executive, is on her way to this country and will be a guest at the chapter's gathering. Other guests of honor will be Sir Harry Glaser, Armstrong, British Consul-General in New York; Lady Armstrong, Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, Mrs. Rebekah Kohut, Rabbi Louis I. Newman and Mrs. Newman, and the past presidents of the chapter, including Mrs. Miriam Zunszer, Mrs. Israel Goldstein, Mrs. Samuel C. Lampert, Mrs. Harold Spielberg, Mrs. Emil Weinheim and Mrs. J. Caesar Guggenheimer.

\$50,000 Pledged for Current HIAS Deficit

Following a six-hour conference Sunday at the Hias Building, the Hias Council of Organizations pledged itself to raise \$50,000 during the next six months to be devoted toward the current deficit of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

The consensus of opinion expressed by many of the delegates, who collectively represented 327 lodges, societies, Workmen's Circle branches, synagogues, etc., was to the effect that the Hias now finds itself in an extremely precarious state financially and hence steps must be taken to insure its continuance as a necessary adjunct of Jewish communal life.

By a resolution adopted, it was left to the executive committee of the Council to devise the manner and methods in which the money is to be raised. A direct tax on members of the affiliated organizations, as well as general solicitation, were discussed at the conference, which, incidentally, marked the opening of the new year's activities for the Council.

But whatever the means of achieving the sum voted, the delegates themselves will lead the activity, for at Sunday's meeting they immediately voted themselves into a committee of the whole to plan the effort. The executive committee also will assign quotas to communities other than in New York, notably New Jersey, which was well represented at the conference.

The conference was addressed by B. Charney Vladeck, business manager of the "Forward"; Abraham Herman, president of the Hias and John L. Bernstein, former president and now chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee.

An election of officers for the Council, also was held in connection with the conference. Saul Poliakov, of the Cloakmakers' Union, was unanimously re-elected president for the next year. Similar honor was accorded M. D. Perelman, of Workmen's Circle Branch No. 315, who was chosen vice-president and Louis J. Holzman, of Lipner Young Men's Association, secretary. An executive committee of thirty-five also was chosen, and included among its members are Rabbi Pfeffer, of Manhattan; and Rabbi Leo Essex, of Brooklyn.

In connection with the elections, an important step taken was the ratification of a plan for an "interlocking directorate" to exist between the Council and the Hias itself. The Council designated five delegates as members of the Hias' board of directors, and the Hias will reciprocate. This step is intended to promote complete unity and accord between both groups.

King Boris Decorates Two Bulgarian Jewish Leaders

Sofia, Oct. 15—King Boris has conferred high honors upon Luka Moskowitsch, president of the Ashkenazic Jewish community of Sofia, and upon Joseph Haimoff, prominent tobacco merchant.

British Statement on Palestine Policy Due in Two Weeks Will Suggest Legislative Assembly

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 15—A statement defining the future policy of the British government as regards Palestine is now in preparation and will be issued in a fortnight, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned today from reliable sources.

Outlining the principles which the British administration will have to follow in Palestine, the statement of the British government will also recommend the establishment of a legislative assembly there. Such an assembly was suggested as early as 1922 but failed to materialize because of the opposition of the Arabs. Now, however, there is reason to believe that the Arab leaders will be amenable to the suggestion.

The statement will also contain a definition in clear and positive terms of the meaning which the British government attaches to the passages in the Mandate for the safe-guarding of the rights of the non-Jewish community in Palestine and will lay down for the guidance of the Palestine government directions more explicit than any that have yet been given as to the conduct of the policy on such vital issues as land and immigration.

The expected statement will define the British policy in general terms while the details will be worked out later together with the measures for giving effect to this policy.

Negotiations are now pending with regard to the release of the immigration certificates which were suspended last May by the Colonial Office. The time limit of the suspended certificates expired September 30, but they have not yet been released notwithstanding the fact that the accredited representative of the British government at Geneva officially stated before the Mandates Commission that this suspension was merely temporary.

Relief Map of Palestine Is Feature of Field Memorial

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Oct. 15—A historical garden in connection with the Eugene Field Memorial at the Church of the Holy Comforter in Kenilworth, Ill., a suburb of Chicago, will have as its central feature a relief map of Palestine.

The map, said to be the second of its kind in the United States, is laid out on the ground on a concrete base and constructed of plant rock. It embraces the territory from thirty miles below the Dead Sea northward to Mount Hermon. It shows in detail the whole Jordan valley, the Dead Sea, the mountains of the territory, and, when completed will indicate the location of the cities of Biblical interest, including Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Nazareth, Bethany, etc. Stones brought back recently from points of interest in Palestine by Dr. Herbert L. Willet, pastor of the Kenilworth Union Church, will be incorporated in the garden, indicating the various locations. Running water will indicate the location of principal rivers and lakes of the region.

Fosdick Defends Inclusion of Einstein on Church Facade

Preaching before a congregation of more than 4,000 people last Sunday, at the new Riverside Church, the Rev. Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, pastor of the church, defended the presence of the statue of Einstein among those of saints and philosophers on the facade of the new church. Some criticism had been made recently against the church for placing a statue of Einstein, who considers himself a pantheist and a disciple of Spinoza and who is therefore not considered a religionist in the church sense of the term.

"I am glad that Einstein is over the church's portal because I hope that minds like his, facing the same great questions about God that he faces, will come through the portal and sit in these pews and profit by our ministry," said Dr. Fosdick in his sermon. "They are a notable company today, these choice men and women are puzzled about God. What should be our attitude toward them? Some of our great scientists belong in this group. They are dedicated spirits. They give themselves without rest to the search for truths that will help human need."

Jacob Schiff Memorial Library Will Be Dedicated Sunday

The dedication of the Jacob H. Schiff Memorial Library and the Israel Unterberg Memorial Building of the Jewish Theological Seminary, will take place Sunday, October 19, at 3 p. m. The Louis S. Brush Memorial Dormitory will be dedicated on the following Sunday, October 26. All during next week several dedicatory celebrations will be held on the Seminary quadrangle.

Mortimer L. Schiff will hand the keys of the building to Sol. M. Stroock, chairman of the Seminary executive committee. Among those who will deliver addresses will be Prof. Alexander Marx, Prof. William Walker Rockwell and Dr. A. S. Rosenbach, president of the Jewish Historical Society, whose collection of books of Jewish historical interest will be housed in the new library.

M. H. Goldenberg Will Leave \$22,500 to Jewish Charities

Baltimore, Oct. 15—Providing bequests and creating trusts totaling more than \$450,000 for the benefit of friends, relatives and employees, the will of Morten H. Goldenberg was filed for probate in the Orphan's Court here. An estimate of the value of the estate involved was not given.

Owner of a department store in Washington, D. C., Mr. Goldenberg, who made his home here, died from apoplexy last week at the Laurel race track.

The will provided two \$10,000 bequests. One will go to the Associated Jewish Charities of Baltimore and the other to the Community Chest of Washington. A bequest of \$2,500 also will go to the Rosa H. Goldenberg Shoe Fund of the Associated Jewish Charities of Baltimore.

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Morgenstern's Address Shows Reform Judaism and Zionism Changing, Dr. Freehof Finds

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 15—"Dr. Morgenstern's address clears the air. Being stated with the authority of an honored position, it gives weight to what many others have thought and said. It is an evidence that Reform is changing and Zionism is changing. Both are diminishing in dogmatism and growing in tolerance and the ability to co-operate. The extremists will continue to squabble. The rest of us will work together."

This is the observation of Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, rabbi of Temple Anshe Maariv of Chicago and contributing editor of The American Israelite, in an editorial in that publication's issue of October 16th, based on the address "Is Reform Judaism a Failure?" delivered Saturday, October 4th, by Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president of Hebrew Union College, at that institution's opening exercises.

"The unchanging anti-Zionists will hold up their hands in horror at his statement that he does not oppose an eventual Jewish state if that expresses the actual will of Palestine's entire population," says Dr. Freehof. "Anti-Zionists needn't be horrified at this 'heresy,' for it will be quite some time before 'Palestine's entire population' (including the Arab Notables) will express their desire for a Jewish state. The doctrinaire Zionists will scoff at his denials that the whole world (except Palestine) is a barren exile for the Jews. They may continue to scoff, but Jews everywhere will continue to build schools and synagogues and permanent social institutions all over the world."

Blumenthal Heads New York Federation Drive for \$2,221,000

George Blumenthal, patron of arts and philanthropies in France and America and president of Mount Sinai Hospital, has accepted the chairmanship of the \$2,221,000 campaign which the Jews of New York will launch at a dinner at the Hotel Commodore next Sunday night, October 19, in behalf of the ninety-one affiliated agencies of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

Announcement of Mr. Blumenthal's selection as head of the fund-raising effort of the local Jewish community chest was made by Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Federation board, who explained that the sum sought was needed to complete the budget of \$5,499,000 voted to the constituent agencies at the beginning of 1930 for the current year.

As president of Mount Sinai Hospital, one of the largest hospitals in the country, Mr. Blumenthal will have at his command the services of the presidents of the ninety other agencies of the Federation, in addition to the 2,400 workers from trades and professions constituting the Business Men's Council, headed by Samuel Leidesdorf, chairman, and Ira M. Younker, associate chairman.

Charges of Anti-Semitism at Rutgers University Stir Demand for Investigation

Newark, N. J., Oct. 15—Charges that a "numerus clausus" exists against Jews seeking admission to Rutgers University has stirred local Jewish spiritual leaders and fraternal representatives to ask for an investigation.

The following statement denying that discrimination exists against Jewish students has been issued by Dean Fraser Metzger of Rutgers.

"All applicants for admission must meet certain requirements. This questionnaire is the same for all. This is an undenominational institution, and it is a general proposition here, applying equally to all, that no one racial or religious group is permitted to dominate. We have about 1,400 students, and of this number between 200 and 250 can be considered in the Jewish group from a racial standpoint."

The Jewish Daily Bulletin last Sunday published a story from its Perth Amboy correspondent containing an interview with Julius Kass, lawyer of that city and an alumnus of Rutgers, who charged openly that the University was accepting students on a basis other than scholarship and that "a great many Jewish students who were recommended by the principals of the high schools from which they graduated were refused admittance while their non-Jewish classmates, with lesser qualifications matriculated at the University." More specifically Mr. Kass charged that only 33 Jewish students were admitted this year out of a Freshman class numbering about 330.

Blumenschein, Maurice Sterne, Abraham Walkowitz, and Charles Rosen.

Bernard Karfol was one of five members of the American Committee of Selection which chose 48 paintings by United States artists for display in the show.

For the second successive year a cash award of \$2,000 to the artist whose painting is considered the best one available for purchase will be offered by Albert C. Lehman, Jewish industrial leader, art patron, and philanthropist of Pittsburgh. In addition, the Lehman Prize and Purchase Fund provides a guarantee for the purchase of the painting selected for the cash prize at its list price up to \$10,000.

Unpublished Arab Memo Shows No Change Towards Zionism

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Oct. 15—A hitherto unpublished and unnoticed memorandum which the pro-Arab Syrio-Palestine Committee in Geneva submitted to the Assembly of the League of Nations on September 24 has just come to light here. It is doubly interesting because neither the Assembly nor the latter's sixth or political commission made any mention of the memorandum and because its contents indicate that the Arabs have not departed from the line of complete resistance.

Zionism, according to this memorandum, contradicts article 22 of the Palestine Mandate by striving to establish a Jewish state and to suppress the existing Arab population. "Great Britain promised the Jews a country which did not belong to her in order to obtain the support of Jewish finance—and to open a route to India," the memorandum claims.

The memorandum asks, "What interest has the League of Nations in supporting such an injustice? The Jewish National Home is being established under the protection of British bayonets. We demand the adjustment of an injustice which the Mandates Commission has unfortunately endorsed."

Hitler Denies Responsibility for Berlin Anti-Semitic Outbreaks as Jews Organize for Self-Defense, Withdraw Deposits from German Banks and Begin Exodus to Holland and Switzerland

by the National Socialists that the excesses were due to Communist provocateurs. The Guardian also deplores the fact that the Lokalanzeiger and other Nationalist papers reported the attacks in a way to create the impression that the disturbances were arranged by Communists. "The Nationalists joined with the National Socialists in encouraging and condoning the ugliest thing in contemporary German life, namely, anti-Semitism," the Guardian concludes.

Jews Withdraw Funds (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Oct. 15—Heavy withdrawals from a number of German banks by Jewish depositors and the organization of emergency self-defense corps under the leadership of the Union of Jewish War Veterans are the first direct results of Monday's anti-Semitic riots during which the attacks on the leading Jewish-owned shops, cafes and even banks by gangs of National Socialist rowdies startled Berlin out of its post-election placidity.

In addition to removing their funds from German banks and transferring them to banks in Holland and Switzerland, a great number of Jews are crowding the trains leaving for Switzerland, Holland and other neighboring countries. An unusually large Jewish migration is predicted here this week until conditions return to normal. Reports reaching Berlin from the provinces, especially from Bavaria, the Hitlerites' stronghold, state that there is not a city in which the Jewish population does not fear anti-Semitic outbreaks. Many Jews, therefore, are abandoning their residences and moving abroad temporarily.

Jewish War Veterans on Guard

Although the local authorities have the situation well in hand the Union of Jewish War Veterans is taking no chances and has organized a self-defense corps. Small groups of the Jewish war veterans are patrolling the Jewish quarter prepared for any emergency. Armed and in small groups in order not to attract attention the Jewish soldiers are ready to repulse any new attacks. The officials of the Union of Jewish War Veterans have informed the authorities that several thousand Jewish soldiers will volunteer for emergency duty should rioting recur.

While the rioting has been suppressed the danger has not yet entirely passed because the street attacks on the Jews do not emanate spontaneously from street rowdies but are the result of well-planned and carefully organized measures by the Hitler high command. In view of this the measures for self-defense by the Jews were thought necessary. Attempts to renew the anti-Jewish disturbances were quickly frustrated by the police yesterday.

Endeavoring to quiet Jewish fears, Karl Zoergoebbel, chief of police, is-

sued a statement emphasizing that no more anti-Semitic riots need be feared. "I have taken all necessary steps to prevent the Hitlerites from again attacking Jewish-owned establishments," Herr Zoergoebbel explained. "The Hitlerites utilized the fact that 4,000 police were occupied in keeping order around the Reichstag district to attack Jewish places of business elsewhere," he said. "Nevertheless the police succeeded in halting the National Socialists and preventing more serious damage," the chief of police declared.

108 Persons Arrested

Of the 108 persons who were arrested for participating in Monday's riots 76 were released but charges will be preferred against them later. The others will be tried at a special session of court. Among the Hitlerites arrested were a large number of young girls. They came to the scene of the riots armed with bricks and stones wrapped in paper and disguised to look like lunch packages. During the clash between the police and the rioters three persons were seriously injured.

As an outgrowth of the arrests a sensational charge of perjury was brought against a member of the Brunswick cabinet, M. Franzen, a National Socialist, by the police. Herr Franzen sought to obtain the release of Guth, a Hitlerite caught as one of the rioters, on the plea that Guth was a member of parliament and hence immune from arrest. The police, however, quickly established that Herr Franzen's explanation was untrue, Franzen later admitting that he had lied to the police.

The reports appearing in the American press on the riots are characterized in the German evening press as exaggerated. The German papers claim that the onslaughts on the Jews are of no political significance. Every paper is full of articles on the riots, mostly condemnatory. The Right wing organs are seeking to minimize the effect of the disturbances by reporting that those who took part in the riots were not Hitlerites. Police officials, however, have stated that all of those arrested were members of Hitler's party.

Police Say Riots Well Planned

Police officials are also certain that the riots were well-planned in advance to coincide with the opening of the newly-elected Reichstag. According to police information the Hitlerites beat no one nor did they do any looting during the riots.

Berlin financial circles are very pleased that the American press considers the occurrences as merely acts of hooliganism and continues to lend Germany its confidence which is seen by the fact that the position of the Stock Exchange here is firm.

When the rioters had been dispersed most of Berlin, but chiefly Leipziger Strasse, looked like a deserted battlefield. Glass from broken windows and

goods that had been thrown out of the stores littered the streets where the attack of the Hitlerites had been most furious. While policemen in motor cars and on horseback were guarding the area that on Monday was the scene of rioting, employees of the stores that were attacked began cleaning up the debris. Many of the stores are already open for business and the neighborhood is rapidly returning to normalcy.

Millions of Marks Damage Done

The damage done by the anti-Semitic rioters is estimated at millions of marks. Among the stores that were the special prey of the rowdies were those of Wertheim, the silk establishment of Gords & Adams, and the shops of Gruenfeld, Goldschmidt and Lachman as well as the Teitz department store. The Deutsche Nationale Bank also suffered damage.

The cafes owned by Jews were a particular object of the Hitlerites' fury. The famous Drobkin cafe was completely wrecked. The popular cafe on the corner of Tiergarten and Stressemann Strasse, a mecca for American tourists, was the scene of great damage. When the riot began the cafe was crowded with visitors, chiefly foreigners. The anti-Semites entered shouting "Down with the Jews" and the pillaging began. Furniture was smashed and the guest driven into inner rooms. The doors were then locked and the guests were virtual prisoners for several hours. In the meantime the hooligans amused themselves by smashing every dish and piece of glassware in the cafe.

Young People's League to Discuss Youth Groups' Function

A symposium on the function of organizations of Jewish young men and women will be one of the leading features of the seventh annual convention of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America to be held at Temple Anshe Chesed, Manhattan, during the Thanksgiving week-end.

The program committee, of which Samuel Rabin is chairman, has invited Rabbi William S. Malev of Jamaica, Rabbi Benjamin Plotkin of Jersey City and Rabbi E. Chas. Sydney of Freeport to introduce the discussion. The opening address of the convention will be delivered by Rabbi Israel Goldstein of Temple B'nai Jeshurun, Manhattan, who was the first president of the Young People's League.

Virginia Frank Heads Jewish Social Service Bureau of Chicago

Chicago, Oct. 15—Miss Virginia Frank, for six years assistant superintendent of the Jewish Social Service of the Jewish Charities of Chicago, has been named superintendent to succeed Harry Lurie. Mr. Lurie in turn succeeds Mr. Goldsmith, the new general director of the Jewish Charities here, in New York. Miss Frank has been connected with the Jewish Social Service Bureau for 15 years. She received all of her schooling in Chicago and started her career as a visitor in the office she now heads.

Weakening of Political Anti-Semitism in Hungary Seen in Defeat of Anti-Semite

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Oct. 15.—The Jews of Hungary are interpreting the results of a special parliamentary election in the Pach district today as evidence that political anti-Semitism is waning in Hungary. In this district, always represented by an anti-Semite, M. Ziskray, a racial purist, declined to run and the Christian Socialist nominee was defeated by his opponent, Tibor Farkas.

The victory of Farkas, which was not a fluke, the victor having received much more than a majority, is viewed as a good omen by Hungarian Jewish leaders. They see in the defeat of the Christian Socialist candidate the growth of the opposition movement and are also hopeful that it means a diminution of economic anti-Semitism in the next parliament.

Official Indian Quarters Expect Samuel to Be Next Viceroy

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 15.—Official quarters in India are expecting the announcement of the new Viceroy designate some time early in November and the selection of Sir Herbert Samuel, former High Commissioner of Palestine, is now considered most likely, the correspondent of the Morning Post in Simla reports. This is the latest of a series of rumors that Sir Herbert would succeed Lord Irwin as Viceroy of India.

Practically every British correspondent in India has at some time or other in the last three months cabled his paper confirmation of the unofficial reports that Sir Herbert would be the next Viceroy. The reports first became current in July when it was learned that Premier MacDonald had sounded out Sir Herbert regarding his acceptance of the post. The Daily Herald, organ of the Labor Party, also announced that Samuel was being seriously considered. Many years ago Sir Herbert was aide-de-camp to the Viceroy.

Hamlin and Locker Will Address Chalutzos Convention

Detroit, Oct. 15.—More than 100 delegates, representing 50 chapters of the Jewish Women's Pioneer Organization for Palestine (Chalutzos) are expected at the opening session of the organization's third biennial convention to be held tomorrow night at Littman's Yiddish Theatre.

Isaac Hamlin, national secretary of the Gewerkschaften Campaign, and Berl Locker, international secretary of the Poale Zion, will address the opening session and will report on the decisions of the Berlin sessions of the Palestine workers' conference.

Messrs. Hamlin and Locker will also be the principal speakers at the banquet to be held at Hotel Statler on Saturday evening. Sessions of the convention on Friday, Saturday and Sunday will also be held at the Statler.

Sees Hitlerite Excesses Having Sequel in Vienna

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 15.—The Hitlerite anti-Semitic riots in Berlin are likely to have a sequel in Vienna, Die Stunde, a local illustrated non-political paper, says. Die Stunde reports that Hitlerites are daily arriving in Vienna with instructions to train the Austrian National Socialists on the same lines as the Hitlerite storm squads are trained.

According to Die Stunde, Hitler has promised funds and detachments of his storm troops to assist the Austrian National Socialists during their preparations for the elections on November 9.

Need to Stimulate Student Interest in Judaism Stressed at Hartford Conference

Hartford, Oct. 15.—The importance of providing Jewish programs and Jewish associations for the seven hundred or more Jewish students attending the colleges and universities in the state of Connecticut was emphasized at the first regional conference held last Sunday under the auspices of the National Committee of One Thousand, United Synagogue of America. More than 100 delegates, representing virtually every Jewish community in the state, attended the conference and wholeheartedly endorsed the efforts now being made by this National Committee to stimulate interest in traditional Judaism throughout the country and particularly to make provision for the needs of the Jewish student youth in the cultural institutions throughout the land.

The conference was opened by Rabbi Morris Silverman of Hartford, president of the Connecticut state branch of the United Synagogue. A. B. Cohen, national chairman of the Committee of One Thousand, State Senator Herman P. Koppelman, national secretary; Mrs. David Friedlander, national director; and Rabbi Jesse Schwartz of New Britain, chairman of the Connecticut state branch of the United Synagogue, were among the speakers. The conference elected the following state officers: chairman, Hon. David L. Nair; secretary, David A. Lippman; treasurer, Abner Schwartz. Another state conference will take place on Oct. 26th at Congregation Emanu-El in Hartford.

Jewish Education Board Opens Jewish High School in Chicago

Chicago, Oct. 15.—For the first time in the history of Chicago the Board of Jewish Education will open a modern Jewish High School to give classes in Hebrew, Jewish history, literature and modern Jewish life. The course will be a three year one and will lead into the College of Jewish Studies. Classes will be held at the Jewish People's Institute and at the College of Jewish Studies in the Loop district.

Charges of Anti-Semitism at Rutgers University Stir Demand for Investigation

between Mr. Kass and Dean Metzger and Registrar Martin, the latter two are alleged to have said: "Rutgers got away from the old Dutch denominationalism years ago, and we do not wish it to become predominantly Jewish now. If 40 or 50 per cent of the Jews that apply were admitted, Rutgers would soon become like C.C.N.Y." The present ratio of Jews in Rutgers is about 15 per cent. That is a sufficiently high proportion, especially in view of the fact that the Jews comprise but 10 per cent of the population of the State."

During the conference Mr. Kass asked the University officials to assume a case in which a Jewish student in the upper quarter of his class in preparatory school and a non-Jewish student who was in the lower three-quarters of his class, both applied for admission at a time when the so-called "Jewish quota" had been filled. "Which student would be admitted?" Mr. Kass asked. Dean Metzger's surprising answer was, "The non-Jewish student."

Scores Metzger's Statement

The statement of Dean Metzger denying discrimination was roundly scored by Rabbi Julius Silberfeld of Temple B'nai Abraham and Rabbi Harry S. Jacobs of Young Israel Synagogue, this city. Rabbi Silberfeld said:

"It is bad enough that in our day and generation an institution of learning, which I understand is at least partly subsidized by the state from taxes collected from all the people, should exclude anybody on account of race or creed. But what aggravates the situation is the hypocritical attitude of the authorities of Rutgers. To cloak such discrimination with the mantle of undenominationalism, as Dean Metzger attempts to do, is certainly deserving of the severest censure."

"Suppose the largest number of best qualified students were Catholic. Should some of them be excluded on no other grounds than that their particular religious group would predominate? The same applies to Jews or any other race or creed. Such an attitude is to be condemned in any university, and is certainly unworthy of a university which calls itself American."

Urges Investigation

"Judging from incomplete reports of the alleged discrimination, I think a very thorough investigation of the matter should be undertaken at once, for if the charges are true, it is absolutely outrageous," said Rabbi Jacobs. "It is inexcusable even in a privately endowed institution of learning to discriminate on racial grounds in admission of students, but it is absolutely unpardonable in a state endowed institution such as Rutgers."

The New Jersey branches of the Independent Order Brith Shalom, Order Sons of Zion and B'nai Brith are planning to investigate the charges of discrimination at Rutgers. On Sunday Mr. Kass will meet with New Jersey B'nai Brith leaders at Elizabeth to discuss the matter.

Report That Jewish School Bill Will Be Repealed Persists Despite Denials

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal, Oct. 15.—Although Premier L. A. Taschereau has categorically denied that the Jewish school bill would be repealed, the rumor still persists that such action is contemplated after the Jewish school commission reaches an understanding with the Protestant School Board.

The well-informed Montreal Gazette corroborates the recent report in the French newspaper La Presse that the repeal of the Jewish school bill was imminent, adding that the draft of a new ordinance is already prepared. The Gazette claims that the return to the status quo in the Jewish school question makes the previous legislation unnecessary.

The anti-Semitic papers are already rejoicing and boasting that the Liberal provincial government was compelled to bow before the will and agitation of the opponents of the Jewish school bill. In the minds of local Jewish leaders arises the question whether the anti-Semites have any cause for their jubilation or whether it is premature.

Last week Mayor Houde of Montreal publicly announced that he was in favor of a repeal of the Jewish school bill, desiring instead that the Jewish school question be turned over to the Council of Public Instruction, which consists mainly of clergymen and from which Jews are excluded. It is also known that the Jewish school commission is about ready to announce the results of its protracted negotiations with the Protestant School Board.

The demand for the repeal of the Jewish school bill has become a weapon in the political campaign of the provincial opposition, led by Mayor Houde, against the present Liberal regime in the province of Quebec. From a speech which Mr. Houde delivered at a political rally in Louisville, Que., it became quite clear that the Jewish population in the province cannot hope to enjoy separate school rights if the Conservatives ever assume the reins of government.

American Jewish Committee's Annual Meeting November 9

The annual meeting of the American Jewish Committee on November 9 will take up the question of adopting measures to alleviate the economic and political conditions under which the Jews of Southeastern and Central Europe are now living. This announcement followed the presentation of a report to the executive committee of the American Jewish Committee by Morris D. Waldman, secretary of the Committee, who recently returned from an extended trip to Europe.

The executive committee also announced that Fred M. Butzel of Detroit, Henry Itelson of New York, James Davis of Chicago and Louis H. Kirstein of Boston had accepted election as members of the executive committee.

Jewish Farmers of America Federate in National Body

The first convention since the World War of the National Conference of Jewish Farmers, held at the Educational Alliance under the auspices of the Jewish Agricultural Society, closed Monday after a two-day session, during which many problems of Jewish farmers were discussed and resolutions adopted.

In the resolutions it is pointed out that the condition of Jewish farming has changed considerably since organized efforts to help the Jewish farmers began 30 years ago; that the Jewish farm movement has grown so widely and rapidly that there are now throughout the country a large number of successful Jewish farm communities and individual farmers; that the tendency under present economic conditions is such that the number of Jews who are settling on land is greatly increasing; and that on account of the changing conditions the present state of financial resources to promote Jewish farming is not adequate to meet the new situation.

Consider Financial Problems

Taking into consideration these various problems, the Conference elected a committee of nine to consider ways and means by which financial resources can be increased to meet these problems. The resolution further stated that "we Jewish practical farmers see the necessity of being organized in a federated body whereby to lead and exchange educational ideas as well as information for the benefit of Jewish organizations and groups," and decided that the conventions be held annually from now on without interruption.

The projected organization is tentatively known as the "Federation of Jewish Farmers of the United States." It is to "co-ordinate the various Jewish cooperatives and other farm associations and develop a larger and more satisfying rural life, to get the organizations to work together to improve the material, social and economic conditions of the Jewish farmers in this country."

The committee consists of the following members who will work in conjunction with the Jewish Agricultural Society: Joseph H. Cohen, West Hempstead, L. I.; Benj. Davis, Taunton, Mass.; Mrs. Rachel Katz, Hightstown, N. J.; David Cohen, Guilford, Conn.; Max Axelrod, Westfield, Mass.; Nathan Tenney, Parkville, N. J.; Sol Bruck, Monsey, N. J.; Meyer Allman, Hatfield, Pa.; and M. Shapiro, Farmingdale, N. J.

The newly formed Jewish cooperative known as the Nearby Farmers' Association which was incorporated on October 4, to sell farm products under a copyrighted label and name, was endorsed by the conference. "Ba-Best" is the label used by these farmers, who can deliver products to the markets in less than a day.

Agricultural Exposition

There were about 200 farmers from eastern sections of the United States at the Convention. An important feature of the convention was an agricultural exposition showing the high qualities of products of Jewish farmers in the

Jacob Fishman Finds Jews Everywhere Disappointed in British Labor Government

Jews everywhere are disappointed in the Labor government of Great Britain which is "striving to trim the Balfour Declaration so that nothing should remain of it," declared Jacob Fishman, managing editor of the New York Jewish Morning Journal, in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency upon his return this week from Europe where he spent two months. Mr. Fishman participated in the Berlin sessions of the Zionist Actions Committee and the Jewish Agency.

"The bitter truth is that the British Labor government, because of political opportunism has placed Jewish interests on one scale and the imperial interests of England on the other. It weighed the fate of the Jewish Homeland with the measure of India and other British colonies," said Mr. Fishman. "The Jews are also disappointed in the fact that the leaders of the Labor government are not sincere when they wish to make us believe that their concessions to the Arab side are not in contradiction to the Balfour Declaration."

With regard to the internal situation in the Zionist movement, Mr. Fishman said:

"The Zionist Congress which will take place in January will have to react to the new situation. It is important that we do away with the impression that when the Zionist leadership is changed the situation in Zionism will also change. Today it is no more a question of individuals. I believe that the coming Congress should create an 'emergency cabinet,' which during these difficult times should work in such unison as to arouse the whole world."

Questioned about the situation of the Jews in Europe, Mr. Fishman said:

"Recent political happenings in Europe have clearly shown how defenseless the Jew is. This has been especially shown in Germany, where the Jewish situation has become particularly serious as a result of the victory of the Hitlerites in the Reichstag elections. German Jews are not telling the world about their heavy suffering. They are too proud to do it. But they are fighting anti-Semitism with cultural weapons. The spirit of German Jewry has undergone a revolution and one notes there a tendency toward united Jewish action."

Jewish Labor Delegation Finds Palestine Workers Most Hopeful

"In spite of the terrible experience of a year ago when an incited mob of Arabs swooped down upon them in slaughter, arson and pillage; in spite of the recent action of the Colonial Office of the British Government in closing the doors of Palestine to the thousands of Halutzim all over Europe waiting to be admitted; in spite of the many other problems with which they are confronted, the organized workers of Palestine are most hopeful and most thoroughly convinced of the successful achievement of their task, the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine on a basis of social justice."

This was the statement issued this week by the delegation of the American Jewish Labor Committee on its return to this country from Palestine. The statement further declares:

"They are creating on all fronts. They are sowing the fields, planting orchards and building homes. They are applying the most up-to-date methods in agriculture and irrigation on a soil that has been completely neglected and left barren for many centuries. They are exploiting all the natural resources that have been lying dormant through the ages. They have harnessed the Jordan to give them light and power; they have found life-giving elements in the Dead Sea where hundreds of workers are now employed. They have drained the swamps and have cut their way into the chalk cliffs and stone quarries of the land, and at the same time they have been building spiritually as well as materially."

"They are erecting school houses for the young and spiritual centers for the grown-ups. From among the manual workers there is developing a group of teachers and poets and artists of the drama that can hold their own among those that have had better opportunities. The song of work and the joyful tune of creation is heard everywhere. It is almost impossible to see them without admiring them and without getting the contagion of faith in the final results of their efforts."

West's First Progressive Hebrew Kindergarten Opens in Seattle

Seattle, Oct. 15.—The first progressive Hebrew kindergarten in the West has just been organized here in connection with the opening of the new building of the Seattle Talmud Torah. The kindergarten will be in charge of A. L. Greenfield, Hebrew pedagogue who came here a few years ago from China, where he was the founder and principal of Jewish elementary day schools and kindergartens in Harbin and Tien-Tsin.

Shiels Says Britain Fully Accepts Mandate, Will Carry Out Obligations and Pledges

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Haifa, Oct. 15.—The British government has made clear on numerous occasions that it accepts without equivocation the full Palestine Mandate with all its implications and that it believes, though knowing the difficulties involved, that it is possible to carry it out with fairness and justice to all interests concerned. Dr. Drummond Shiels, British under-secretary for the Colonies, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The British government intends to carry out all its pledges and obligations, Dr. Shiels said.

Palestine has been the cause of special anxiety to the British government in the last fifteen months. Dr. Shiels pointed out, and the government "has devoted considerable time and attention to its problem. Apart from constitutional questions the main difficulties have arisen in connection with immigration and land settlement. Therefore Sir John Simpson, an acknowledged authority, was sent to make a careful study of the whole problem."

"The publication of his report is anticipated with interest and hopefulness. The general lines of the government's policy will also be published. Then we will be able to go forward with a minimum of political discussions and greater concentration on economic and social welfare," Dr. Shiels emphasized.

Referring to his visits to various towns and villages he said he had been "impressed with the patient industry of the fellah as well as with the improved agricultural methods in the old and new Jewish colonies." He was also impressed by the "idealism and remarkable achievements" of the Jewish colonists and the progressiveness of Tel Aviv "where industries new to Palestine have been vigorously developed."

He said he had found a number of hopeful people on all sides and he believed that "important and capable forces in Palestine were working for peace. I hope that they will be given a chance."

be secured if the Arab question is solved in the sense of an honest understanding between nations," Professor Einstein said, "In the near future it is important chiefly to establish close relations between the working masses and the line of action taken by the General Federation of Jewish Labor in this direction is suitable."

Dr. Einstein also considers the plan of Dr. Arthur Ruppin, Jewish colonization expert in Palestine, for close and intensive colonization as suitable for the establishment of better economic as well as political relations. "Through constant fights in Palestine the better elements of the Jews have been driven from the movement and it is in the interests of the upbuilding of Palestine as an idealistic movement of enormous importance to secure a peaceful understanding on political problems," he concluded.

Jews, Gentiles Admit Economic Bias Against Jews Exists Here

Anti-Semitic discrimination in New York City is admitted in numerous letters to the New York Telegram, written by both Jews and Gentiles, as a result of a series of six interviews with prominent New Yorkers on the subject of anti-Jewish discrimination which appeared last week in the Telegram. Some of the letters which have come in response to these interviews are given in part in Tuesday's Telegram.

"The average Jew, by his ability, has attained a position where his manners, when he acts natural are an offense to his Gentile companions," writes Harold Rowntree of the National Pneumatic Co. "The average Gentile cares nothing about the Jewish faith, one way or the other, but he does care about, and resents some of the Jewish traits. Do not misunderstand me. I am not accusing Jews of being coarse. Coarseness is all a matter of degree. Each walk in life has its own scale of deportment, but the average Jew has risen into a walk of life in which he is not at home and he suffers accordingly."

"Afrat wandering around the city for the past two months looking for work," writes Philip D. Kovitz, "I finally got hold of a job that lasted more than a day, but when I took off the day of Yom Kippur I was politely told—the following Sunday, when my week was up—that my services were not needed any more. The place I refer to is only a lunch wagon in Jamaica, where I worked as counterman."

Though, himself a Jew, Jacob Morton Lubar writes that he would rather work for a Gentile than for a Jew. "There is prejudice among Jews as well," he writes. "One cannot see the other grow faster than himself; there is selfishness and jealousy."

"Not only do the employment agencies refuse to obtain positions for Jews," writes Cheldon R. Lautenberg, attorney, "but the large corporations absolutely deny them positions. Among my friends are those who have denied their religion for bread, but when the imposition was discovered they were fired 'for cause.' No discrimination? If the matter was not so pathetic it would be laughable."

Ask Jewish Women to Raise \$825,000 for Palestine Fund

A proposal made by the Jewish National Fund that the Jewish women of America raise \$825,000 for the purchase of 8,250 acres of land in the vicinity of Haifa Bay, Palestine, will be recommended to the sixteenth annual convention of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, to be held at the Hotel Statler, Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 26, 27 and 28.

Toward this sum will be applied \$111,300, which the 50,000 members of senior and junior Hadassah raised during the past two years, it was announced by Miss Edith Elkind, national chairman of the Jewish National Fund Council of Hadassah. The amount still to be raised is \$713,700. The plan calls for the raising of this sum over a period of ten years, the increases in the annual quota to be graduated.

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
