MacDonald, Answering Smuts, Denies British Palestine Plan a Retreat from Balfour Pledge

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Capetown, Oct. 27.—Claiming that the new British policy on Palestine is not a retreat from the Balfour Declaration, Premier MacDonald, in a cable replying to General Jan Christian Smuts' cabled expression of perturbation over the British White Paper, told the general that when he had read the full texts of the Simpson report and the government's statement he would admit "in light of the facts recently brought to our notice that the statement of policy cannot be fairly described as a retreat from the Balfour Declaration."

The full text of Premier MacDonald's reply follows:

"The Balfour Declaration explicitly provided that nothing should be done to prejudice the civil and religious rights of the existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine. Since the acceptance of the Palestine Mandate the trend of events, particularly in some methods adopted in the establishment of the Jewish National Home, has tended to endanger the position of the non-Jewish communities to a degree which, in light of the Simpson report, has given us great concern and has convinced us of the necessity for special measures to ensure that the double obligation of the Mandate be fulfilled."

"The government has affirmed the view endorsed by the Mandates Com-

Says British Statement a Move to Alienate Jews from Arabs

Cairo, Oct. 27.—The British government's pro-Arab statement of policy is merely a political move designed to create permanent animosity between the Jews and Arabs in Palestine in order that Great Britain may keep Palestine forever," the important organ of the Egyptian Wafd (Nationalists), Missr, today declares. "The British government is not interested in establishing peace in Palestine as constant quarrels are always for her benefit, as any student of British colonial policy will testify," the paper says.

British Board of Jewish Deputies Says Gov't Palestine Plan Contrary to Mandate

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 27.—"It looks very strongly as if the government is trying to upset the Mandate and the Balfour Declaration by roundabout methods," Lord Rothschild, to whom the Balfour Declaration was addressed, said at today's meeting of the Board of Deputies of British Jews of which he is vice-president.

The Board adopted a unanimous resolution recording its profound conviction that the policy outlined in the government's White Paper on Pal-

French Cabinet to Act on British Palestine Statement

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Oct. 27.—The French cabinet is expected to take an attitude toward the White Paper issued by the British Labor Government, it was learned today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here.

The question of the British White Paper limiting the rights of the Jews in Palestine will be taken up by the French cabinet tomorrow. Aristide Briand, Minister of Foreign Affairs, will submit a report to the Cabinet on the Palestine question in connection with the new British policy.

A statement with regard to the negative attitude taken by the British Government regarding the Jewish interests in Palestine will be issued here Wednesday by Baron Edmund Rothschild, who was the first to encourage Jewish colonization in Palestine.

Thousands of Declassed Jews to Join Soviet Industries

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Oct. 27.—A new law which will enable thousands of declassified Jews to join Soviet industries as laborers was issued today by the Soviet Government.

The law says that because of the scarcity of laborers, the government employment bureaus should in the coming season register for work not only members of trade unions as hitherto but also the wives and children of laborers who are not members of trade unions, including all those who never worked before.

The law issued makes it clear that the government employment bureau should make no exceptions and register for work any member of artisans' families as well as day laborers and poor citizens in general. Thus the new decree opens prospects for thousands of Jewish artisans and declassified people who will now be able to be employed in Soviet industries where they were never admitted before.

Settling of U. S. Middle Class Jews in Palestine Urged by Speakers at Mizrahi Convention

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Baltimore, Oct. 27.—Suggestion that 500,000 signatures be gathered to support the resolution calling upon the government of the United States to force Britain to respect the Palestine Mandate was made by Rabbi Saul Silber in his address before the first business session of the Mizrahi (Orthodox Zionist organization) Convention this morning.

Industrialization of Palestine by middle class immigrants from the United States is of paramount importance, Rabbi Silber said, because the Palestine government needs the taxes collected from industries. Even today, he continued, there are 10,000 more Jews engaged in industry in Palestine than there are working in agriculture.

That those American middle-class

Brandeis Refuses Comment on Report He Was Asked to Head World Zionist Organization

Washington, Oct. 27.—Justice Brandeis declined to comment on the report that he has been asked to become president of the World Zionist Organization, that report stating that in sources close to Brandeis it was learned that he would not consider taking over the presidency of the Zionist Organization at this time.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns in reliable quarters that aside from any questions of presidency, Justice Brandeis is following the current Zionist developments very closely, especially those dealing with action the United States may be called upon to take regarding the British-Zionist situation. It was also declared that there is no doubt of his readiness, if advisable, to extend such aid as is within his power.

Ozet Activities in Bira Bidjan Criticized at Conference

Moscow, Oct. 27.—Only 2,500 people settled in Bira Bidjan for the last three years, since this district in the far East became open for Jewish immigrants.

The activities of the Ozet, the organization which conducts the Jewish migration to Bira Bidjan, were therefore, severely criticized today at a conference which took place in the newly proclaimed Bira Bidjan region.

The conference adopted a resolution that the work of migration to Bira Bidjan should be taken away from the Ozet management and transferred to one central state institution.

Zionism Will Outlive Betrayal.— Message to Hadassah Convention from Dr. Weizmann; 200 Attend

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 27—"Zionism will outlive England's betrayal," was the message sent by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, world-Zionist leader, to the annual convention of Hadassah, the woman's Zionist organization, which met here today. Two hundred delegates representing 44 states dedicated themselves once more to their work of re-building Palestine. "During our history, we Jews have received harder blows than these, but in the end we always came out the victors. In spite of our enemies, Zionism will survive," said Dr. Weizmann.

The leader's sentiments were re-echoed by all the Hadassah speakers. "May I say for the weak sisters that no haven is too far for a pilgrim who has been on his way for two thousand years!" was the woman's pledge as voiced by Mrs. Edward Jacobs.

Mrs. Robert Szold, national president of Hadassah, opened the convention at 2 p. m. with a report of the year's activities. Messages were read from Col. Kisch, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, and Felix M. Warburg, Zionist and Jewish Agency leaders.

At the evening session Mrs. Irma Lindheim presided. Mrs. Jacobs said, "The Jews were in Palestine before the Mandate, and have never left. Egypt could not crush them. No other power will."

Miss Henrietta Szold, woman Zionist leader just returned from Palestine, appeared at the sessions, though very ill due to her shock at hearing the news of the new British Palestine policy while on shipboard.

In a vigorous speech Miss Szold denounced Great Britain, "I have no Mandate from Palestine, I am not an official ambassador, but I bring you a message from the land I love. Hadassah is loved and valued in Palestine. This latest attempt to murder the Jewish soul will not succeed as far as did the murdering of Jewish bodies last year," said Miss Szold. "We did not expect that Great Britain, the lover of justice, could so far forget herself. I would love to take you all to Palestine, so that you could see, as I have seen, what is being done."

Miss Szold criticized the Atlantic Monthly for a recent article on Palestine written "with absolute prejudice and no word of truth."

Rabbi Leibert Named Chaplain of Hollywood Legion Post

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 27—Rabbi Julius Leibert, of Temple Emanu-El, was elected chaplain of Hollywood Post No. 43, American Legion, considered the largest and strongest American Legion Post. Rabbi Leibert is the only Rabbi eligible for the chaplaincy on the Coast, having served in the American Army during the war. He is a member of the Officers' Reserve. He succeeds Father Michael Connelly at the post.

250 Prominent N. Y. Jews Create Zionist Emergency Fund To Make Jewish Palestine Cause Known To World; Protest Telegrams on British Plan Flood Zionist Organization

Additional contributions were being received today to the Zionist Emergency Fund created at a meeting of 250 prominent New York Jews at the Astor Hotel on Saturday night. The Fund "has no relation to the Allied Jewish Campaign or to the Jewish Agency Fund for Palestine," said Mr. Robert Szold, chairman of the Zionist Administration, who presided at the meeting. "It is to be used to make known the Jewish cause to the world."

Rabbi Stephen Wise, who sent a message to the meeting from his sickbed, said, "We need funds to acquaint the public with the true facts in Palestine, and to counteract the untruths which have emerged from the British Colonial Office. We must arouse public opinion to a realization of the breach of international law which has been committed by the British Government through treating the Balfour Declaration as a 'scrap of paper'."

Congressman Emanuel Celler declared that twenty New York congressmen would support him in a resolution put forward in the House of Representatives asking the United States to protest Great Britain's nullification of the Balfour Declaration.

Congressman William I. Sirovich read parts of the agreement signed at the American-British Palestine Mandate convention of 1924 in which it is specified that no modification in the mandate may be made "unless assented to by the United States." It is charged that the new Palestine declaration violated this treaty.

Announcement was made that plans are almost complete for the huge Madison Square Garden demonstration on Nov. 2, the thirtieth anniversary of the Balfour Declaration. Telegrams continue to come in to Zionist headquarters from all over the United States, indicating that the protest meetings on that date will be even more numerous than had been expected.

The board of directors of the Baltimore Zionist district has issued a call for such a meeting. Aaron Riche, chairman of the Zionist District of Los Angeles, reports plans in full swing for a Nov. 2 protest.

Cleveland Jewry could not wait for the anniversary and are holding what is expected to be the largest mass meeting in Cleveland Jewish history on Thursday at the Public Auditorium. Thirty leading Jewish organizations are aiding the Zionist District organization to arrange the meeting. Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver will speak.

Numberless statements of protest and indignation, from the most prominent Jews and non-Jews all over the world, continued to fly over the wires.

Emanuel Neumann, chairman of the committee on Public Information of the Zionist Organization of America, called "hypocritical" the cablegram of Premier MacDonald to General Jan Smuts, defender of Zionism, who is now in Africa.

"It is astonishing to observe how political expediency can corrupt a man's integrity," said Mr. Neumann of Ramsay MacDonald. "In his cable attempting to reply to General Smuts, who has charged the British government with repudiation of the Balfour declaration, Premier MacDonald uses phrases and expresses views which are wholly at variance with opinions he held before he became an office-holder."

Mr. Neumann quoted an article written by Ramsay MacDonald in 1922, after a trip through Palestine, in which MacDonald said, "It is perfectly evident that the present Arab population will never make good the defects of the country. There is room and to spare in the neglected lands of Palestine for as many Jews as are likely to go there."

Lipsky Addresses Zionists

Louis Lipsky, former president of the Zionist Organization of America, addressed a meeting of the representatives of the New York Zionist region at the Hotel Pennsylvania on Sunday. "It was never expected that a Mandate issued by the League of Nations should be made a plaything of the imperial interests of the Mandatory Government," he said. The meeting was also addressed by Congressman William I. S. Sirovich, by Morris Rothenberg, Zionist member of the Jewish Agency, by Jacob Fishman, managing editor of the Jewish Morning Journal, and by Maurice Samuel, author. At the meeting, \$10,000 was raised for the Zionist Emergency Fund.

Asher Pierce, president of the "Gan Chaim" Corporation of Palestine, wired from Montreal his protest against the Simpson report, saying that "Ninety per cent of the Jewish capital invested in Palestine goes into Arab hands. Stoppage of Jewish immigration will close all hope of future prosperity in Palestine."

Judge Isadore Bookstein of Albany issued a statement calling upon "all right-minded American citizens to express their indignation and the government at Washington itself to forthwith lodge a strong protest with the British government against this new proposed policy of stunting and crippling all future Jewish efforts for the establishment of a national home for the Jewish people in Palestine."

The New England section of the Jewish Socialist Verband, in convention in Springfield, Mass., adopted a resolution saying, "We appeal to our comrades of the English labor party to induce the Labor government to change its attitude."

Meanwhile President Hoover was urged to send a special commission to Palestine to ascertain for the American people the true facts about the situation there. The plea was made by Louis Yale Borkum, editor of the Detroit Jewish Guide and the Pittsburgh Jewish Leader in a telegram to the president.

Weizmann Denies He Will Try for Parliament Seat to Oppose British Plan on Commons Floor

London, Oct. 27.—A denial of rumors in Jewish quarters in London that he would become a candidate for parliament from Whitechapel, the Jewish district, in order to oppose the British government's new Palestine policy from the floor of the House of Commons was made today by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by Dr. Chaim Weizmann. Dr. Weizmann last week resigned the presidency of the Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency as a protest against the new policy.

The parliamentary vacancy in Whitechapel exists as a result of the death of Harry Gosling, former Labor minister for transport. The rumors that Dr. Weizmann would seek to succeed Gosling created a sensation in the East End of London. Whether or not Dr. Weizmann is a candidate efforts are already under way to unite the Jewish voters against the government in that strong Jewish constituency. The Jewish Chronicle has appealed to the Jews not to associate themselves with the government.

The situation has become particularly important in view of the government's decision to submit as its candidate from the Whitechapel district, Frederick Heyward Cripps, the recently appointed solicitor-general who was named without being a member of parliament. Cripps is a son of the Labor minister, Lord Parmoor. At the last election in this district Gosling polled nearly 14,000 votes against 4,500 for the Liberal candidate and 3,500 for the Conservative candidate.

Vaad Leumi Urges World Zionist Congress Early in Winter

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 27.—A resolution that the coming Zionist Congress should be held early in the winter was adopted today at a meeting of the Vaad Leumi, the Jewish National Council of Palestine.

The Labor members at the Council suggested that the Congress should be convened after Passover. However, the majority members voted for the resolution that the Congress should take place during the early winter months.

In view of the situation which has been created by the new policy of the British Government, M. M. Ussishkin, who was supposed to sail for the United States in the interest of the Jewish National Fund, has received a cable today from the American Zionists urging him to accelerate his visit to the United States.

The Vaad Leumi has proclaimed this week as a "Jewish National Fund Week". A special drive will be conducted throughout the world this week for the Jewish National Fund. In its proclamation the Vaad Leumi urges that each Jew should double his contribution toward the Keren Kayemeth, the fund to buy land for Jews in Palestine.

Jewish Council Asks Plumer for Aid in Gaining Right to Continue Palestine Work

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 27.—Lord Plumer, former High Commissioner of Palestine, was appealed to today in a cable from the Jewish National Council for his help in "the vindication of our rights to continue the historic mission to rebuild our country undisturbed by the government's abuse of a solemn pledge of the great English people." The Council recalled Lord Plumer's just and fair administration of the country.

The Council also sent a reassuring cable to Baron Edmond de Rothschild in Paris who has poured \$60,000,000 into Palestine through the Palestine Jewish Colonization Association. Baron Rothschild was assured that the Jewish community "will honorably remain at its post loyally defending the reconstruction efforts. Your limitless love, devotion and great wisdom fortify us in these trying hours."

Col. Frederick Kisch, chairman of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, cabled the convention of the Hadassah, American Women's Zionist Organization, that the convention "meeting in an anxious hour must lead the disciplined and devoted ranks of the organized women Zionists to fresh sacrifices and intensified efforts for the advancement of the Palestine upbuilding which will outlive any government attempting to oppose our work and destroy our hope."

Extraordinary Session of Mandates Body to Deal with British Plan Possible

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Oct. 27.—A second extraordinary session of the Mandates Commission within a year to deal with the problem of Palestine in view of the situation that has arisen from the British government's new statement of policy is seen as a distinct possibility in view of the fact that the agenda, as made public today, of the forthcoming session of the Mandates Commission opening November 4 contains no reference to Palestine.

There is a possibility that some member of the Mandates Commission may raise the question of Britain's new Palestine policy at the next session of the Commission since the Passfield White Paper is considered here to be contradictory to the promises made to the League of Nations by Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, and also to the conclusions of the Mandates Commission itself at its extraordinary session on Palestine last June.

The secretariat of the League of Nations believes, however, that since Mr. Henderson promised to bring up the question of Palestine at the January session of the Council of the League, the Commission will await the decision of the Council which will perhaps find it necessary to call another extraordinary

Agency Considering Parley of Jewish Economic and Financial Institutions, Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Oct. 27.—A conference of representatives of all Jewish economic and financial institutions in Palestine to take measures to avert a financial panic in the Jewish community as a result of the reaction to the new British policy is being seriously considered by the Executive of the Jewish Agency, it was learned today.

Meanwhile a heartening effect has been created by messages to the Executive from Felix M. Warburg, former chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency, and Lord Melchett, former chairman of the council of the Jewish Agency, both of whom resigned as a protest against the government's White Paper.

Mr. Warburg cabled, "We are continuing our work bravely." Lord Melchett has given his Palestine office the reassuring message that he "does not see any reason for the entire situation to influence our rebuilding work. I request you to continue the entire plantation program. I hope shortly to extend my Palestine work."

Meanwhile public interest in the situation remains tense. Thousands of extra copies of all the Hebrew papers containing the full texts of the government's statement and the Simpson report were sold today. They arrived from London by airmail Friday and were published in the Official Gazette. They were quickly made available in Hebrew and Arabic.

The B'rith Shalom, the society actively propagating a rapprochement with the Arabs, at a specially convened meeting to discuss the new British policy, failed to come to any decision. The General Federation of Jewish Labor today telegraphed all the Pro-Palestine workers' leagues in Europe and America to collect signatures for a huge protest petition against the Labor government of Great Britain.

Meanwhile it is unofficially estimated that the changed British policy will hit the government's revenue resulting in a deficit estimated at more than \$2,500,000 for the current year.

High Commissioner Chancellor is reported to have submitted to London the Zionist Executive's labor immigration schedule. The Left Poale Zion today decided to boycott the legislative council.

Reports that the attorney-general's office is now drafting two laws to give effect to the White Paper's recommendations on immigration and land transfer are also current.

Catholic Editor, Foe of Anti-Semitism, Dies in Berlin

Berlin, Oct. 25.—Johannes Stanjek, a well-known Catholic theologian and editor, who for many years conducted a journal that was an uncompromising foe of anti-Semitism, died here today at the age of 67. Father Stanjek was the first to reveal that the so-called Protocols of the Elders of Zion were rank forgeries.

**All Palestine Jewish Groups
Condemn British White Paper
Which Agudath Terms "Insult"**

Jerusalem, Oct. 27—The White Paper
of the British government, the full text
of which reached Palestine yesterday
was condemned today by every Jewish
political group here beginning from the
ultra-orthodox up to the left labor or-
ganizations."In a message which Rabbi Kook, the
chief rabbi of Palestine issued, he says,
"We are all stricken by the treachery of
England, nevertheless, we need not be
panicky. It is not a Gentile nation which
aims us to settle against our Holy Land. It
is the hand of the God of Israel that
grants us such aid. The world of God
is certainly everlasting."In a declaration which the orthodox
organization, Agudath Israel issued to-
day, the statement of the English
government is termed as "an insult to
Jewry."A strongly worded declaration was
issued today also by the Labor Confer-
ence held here in connection with the
White Paper. The declaration attacks
severely the White Paper saying that
the main purpose of this paper is to
hand over the rule of Palestine into the
hands of a number of Colonial officials
and a handful of effendis."The White Paper by its hypocrisy
libels the Labor movement throughout
the world," the declaration says. The
British Labor Party is called upon in
this declaration to "erase the spot with
which the present Labor Government in
England libelled the party."The Zionist Revisionists in their
declaration which was issued today
urged the immediate resignation of the
Zionist Executive and the appointment
of a provisional executive until the com-

Press; "Clumsiness" of Colonial Office Blamed; Mail Says
Plan Approved by "Wise Jews"; Dutch Press Scores It**

London, Oct. 27—A large section of
the European press continued today to
declare against Great Britain's new
Palestinian policy, though the London
Daily Mail editorially asserted that Lord
Passfield's pronouncement had been
favorably received and approved by the
"wise Jews" all over the world."There is danger that we shall be
accused of aiming to establish not a
Jewish Home but an Arab Paradise,"
said the Manchester Guardian in a lead-
ing editorial today, "if the scheme for
thorough land development for the ben-
efit of the Arabs is not linked with the
automatic release of land to Jewish
settlers. If the development scheme is
coupled with the progressive freeing of
land to the Jews, there is no reason why
the government statement should not be-
come the foundation of a sound Palestin-
ian policy.""The government's blaming the Jews
for not having used their money to
finance Arab unemployment is asking too
much of the Jews," said the Manches-
ter Guardian. The Jews' investing their
money in Palestine at all was an altruis-
tic action, and to invest it for the ben-
efit of the Arabs would have been heroic
virtue. We have no right to demand it."**Praises Jewish Farmer**The Guardian also praises the Jewish
farmer. "The Jewish farmer is prosper-
ous because he brings ability, enthusiasm,
and capital to his undertaking, while
Arab conditions remain what they were
in Turkish days. To allow further
Jewish settlement would safeguard Arab
interests and comply with the stipula-
tions of the Mandate. Unfortunately
the government statement indicates that
the government will follow the course
of shutting the Jews out rather than im-
proving conditions by encouraging
Jewish immigration.""Great uneasiness is displayed by the
leaders of the liberal and conservative
parties. The anxiety displayed by Gen.
Smuts must have weakened the govern-
ment confidence in the wisdom of a
policy whose announcement aroused
widespread indignation among the Jews,
and was signalled by the resignation of
Lord Melchett, Chaim Weizmann, and
the American Jewish leader Felix M.
Warburg, and by rowdy demonstrations
in Poland which supplies forty per-
cent of the Jewish settlers to Palestine.""Palestine needs a five year plan, and
Lord Passfield, who was a great social-
ist as Sidney Webb, ought to delight in
drawing up the articles of such a plan,"
concludes the Guardian.The Daily Mail however, says, "The
Passfield declaration has been so favor-
ably received all over the world that
we hope the government will stand
firmly by it. Stanley Baldwin, support-
ing the Balfour Declaration, is entirely
at variance with the present British pub-
lic opinion," declares the Mail.
"Some of the ablest and wisest Jews in
England regarded the creation of a
Jewish national home for their co-re-ligionists as a mischievous project. Even
the New York Times, which is owned
by Adolph Ochs, a Jew, only last week

Declaration and the Zionist scheme."The entire Holland press condemned
the Passfield statement terming it a "re-
vocation of the Balfour Declaration." Het
Vaderland, a liberal organ on the
Hague, said editorially, "The promises
that England gave to the Jews in order
to secure their support when she needed
it have been broken now." The Rotter-
damsch Nieuwsblad, a Protestant organ,
declared, "England has broken her obli-
gation not only to the Jews but to the
world." The Telegraaf of Amsterdam
states, "There will be grave conse-
quences for England from her abandon-
ment of the Balfour Declaration."

London, Oct. 27—A demand for the

mission and the Council of the League of Nations that the obligations of the Mandate regarding the two sections of the population are of equal weight. You will also recall that the Mandates Commission expressed the view that had the Mandatory Power concerned itself more closely with the social and economic adaptation of the Arab population to the new conditions due to Jewish immigration it would have served the interests of both sections of the population.

Policy Conforms with Suggestion

"Our present policy, in conformity with that suggestion, envisages a scheme of more methodical agricultural development which, as shown in the Simpson report, is the only method whereby additional Jewish agricultural settlement will be possible consistently with the conditions of Article 6 of the Mandate enjoining against not prejudicing the rights and position of other sections of the population.

"The government has made it clear in its statement of policy that the measures of development envisaged benefits which Jews and Arabs can both share. Neither as regards land policy nor immigration does the government aim at crystallizing the National Home at its present stage of development. The statement of policy contains no stoppage or even suspension of colonization on a large amount of land as yet undeveloped and already in Jewish ownership.

Non-Rural Immigration

"As regards non-rural immigration it has been the consistent policy of succeeding governments that Jewish immigration do not exceed the economic capacity of the country to absorb new entrants. The new statement reaffirms this principle in language recognizing that, owing to various causes, it has been imperfectly applied in the past. The government recognized that the policy it outlined was bound to be a disappointment to the hopes of the more zealous elements of both communities but it is confident that on a fuller appreciation of the facts and consideration of the policy based upon them an increasing body of unbiased opinion will be convinced that the main lines of the policy are not only in accordance with our Mandatory obligations but will be designed in the best interests of the two sections of the Palestine population whose welfare is a matter of sincere concern to the government."

Thanking Premier MacDonald for his full and prompt reply, General Smuts cabled the Premier that he hopes "it will remove some of the misconceptions. I especially welcome your assurance that the recent statements do not definitely crystallize the government's policy on the Jewish National Home, as my impression remains that both as regards land purchase and immigration the statement does not correspond to the active obligation for the national home as undertaken in the Balfour Declaration."

Dedication of New Y.M.H.A. Held; Roosevelt Sends Message; Lehman, Strock, Warburg Speak

Dedication of the New York Young Men's Hebrew Association, the largest building of its kind in the world, erected at a cost of \$2,500,000, at Lexington Avenue and 92nd Street and which was the gift of the late Jacob H. Schiff, took place Sunday afternoon.

The ceremonies, which were held in the Theresa Kaufmann auditorium, which is one of the main features of the new building, donated to the association by Henry Kaufmann, Pittsburgh philanthropist, were featured by a message from Governor Franklin Roosevelt. The speakers at Sunday's ceremonies were Hon. Joseph Proskauer, president of the association, to whom the keys of the edifice were presented by Sydney O. Crystal, chairman of the building committee; Felix M. Warburg and Justice Irving Lehman, and Sol M. Strock, former presidents of the association; Simon Gottschall, first vice-president, Dudley M. Sicher and George Bronz, one of the junior members of the association. Dr. Samuel Schulman, of Temple Emanu-El delivered the opening prayer, and the closing prayer was by Rabbi Jacob Kohn, of Temple Anshei Chesed, both of whom are officers of the association.

Roosevelt Sends Message

Governor Roosevelt, who had expected to attend the exercises, sent a message expressing the conviction that the common sense of modern youth will vindicate the judgment and wisdom of their elders in erecting buildings for their intellectual, moral, social and physical betterment.

In formally accepting the key of the new building President Proskauer paid tribute to the consistent generosity to the Y.M. H.A. during its whole career of the Jacob H. Schiff family, and expressed the association's gratitude to them as well as to Henry Kaufmann and Mrs. Bittenweiser, who presented Laemlin Bittenweiser Hall, the smaller auditorium of the new building, in memory of her husband, at a cost of \$50,000. He also read a message from Mrs. Jacob H. Schiff in which she said:

"I wish the association success in the very good work being done for the uplift of the Jewish young men of this city under the roof of your splendid new building."

Proskauer Dedication

Describing the moral and spiritual aspiration of the Jews, to which he said, they had remained true during many centuries and in face of countless obstacles, President Proskauer dedicated the building to the furtherance of these ideals. He acknowledged the obligations of the association to the Jewish Welfare Board and especially to its president, Justice Irving Lehman, and its executive director, Harry L. Gluckman, and on behalf of the association, thanked the Jewish community of New York for making the present building possible.

Mr. Warburg said, during the course

time is contrary to the spirit of the Mandate and the public pledges made by successive British governments. The Board's resolution welcomes the pronouncements of leading statesmen from the Conservative Party as well as from Lloyd George and General Smuts to the same effect.

The Palestine committee of the Board was instructed to submit to a special meeting of the Board to be convened shortly criticism of the Simpson report and the White Paper. The committee is also empowered meanwhile to take any necessary action.

Col. Robert Waley Cohen told the Board that the White Paper on Palestine was the greatest folly of any British government since Great Britain lost the American colonies.

D'Avigdor Goldsmid, president of the Board, declared that "as British citizens we cannot countenance or support any anti-British agitation. We must remember that we have the closest relations with the British government on many other matters affecting the welfare of the Anglo-Jewish community and we must not forget our other responsibilities when dealing with the present difficult problem."

Nevertheless the Board's chief executive pointed out that the Board could associate itself with the "leaders of the great British political parties, Stanley Baldwin, Lloyd George and also the great imperialist, General Smuts. I am anxious to make the government realize that we consider the White Paper policy a breach of the pledges of successive governments including its own."

Jewish Theological Seminary Dedicates Dormitory

Dedication of the Louis S. Brush Memorial Dormitory, one of the three new buildings which will house the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, took place Sunday in a large tent erected in the seminary's quadrangle. Dr. Cyrus Adler, who presided, paid tribute to the memory of Mr. Brush.

Speaking on the work of the seminary, Dr. Adler said:

"We count the usefulness and success of all of our institutions by their effectiveness in the maintenance of Jewish tradition and the increase and the dissemination of Jewish knowledge. More and more it should be borne upon the Jewish people that it is through the Torah that they have been maintained in life."

Others who spoke were Dr. Israel H. Levinthal and Elkan N. Adler. Dr. Adler conferred honorary degrees on Elkan Adler, traveler and writer; Dr. George Foote Moore of Harvard and Morris Levine of the seminary staff; and on Rabbis Max Drob, Abraham Hershtman, and Max D. Klein of Philadelphia, all of whom are graduates of the seminary.

3 Jews Arrested in Tel Aviv Protest at British Policy

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Oct. 27.—Three Jews were arrested and one accidentally hurt following a protest demonstration against the new British policy. The demonstration followed a mass meeting of Zionist Revisionists attended by 6,000 people.

The procession gathered around a young man carrying a Zionist flag. The arrival of the police led to a clash in which officer Schiff was thrown from his horse. A call was then sent for British constables who dispersed the demonstrators and the constables returned to Jaffa.

The demonstrators repeatedly shouted, "Down with Passfield," "Long live the Balfour Declaration, the Mandates Commission and free immigration."

Col. Frederick Kisch, chairman of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, is leaving tomorrow for London to attend the meeting of the Zionist political commission. Dr. Maurice Hexter, also a member of the Executive, will leave on Monday. The Jewish National Council at its meeting today will urge its president, Pinchas Rutenberg, to accept an invitation to the political commission's session.

J. Marcus, Member of Pa. State Legislature, Dead at 47

Pittsburgh, Oct. 27.—Joseph Marcus, member of the Pennsylvania State Legislature, died early Saturday morning at the West Pennsylvania Hospital following an operation, at the age of 47.

Mr. Marcus, who was a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh Law School was a member of the Allegheny County Bar Association and a former sheriff's solicitor. He was a member of the legislature's ways and means committee and chairman of the state elections committee. He was also an active member of the Washington Street Synagogue and of many fraternal societies.

Postpone Trial of Those Accused in Borscha Fire

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Oct. 27.—The trial of several scores of people arrested in connection with the fire of anti-Semitic origin in the town of Borscha last July was postponed again for a fortnight.

In view of the anti-Semitic feeling of the local population in Satmare, where the trial is scheduled to take place, a new strong request is now going on to obtain the removal of the court to some other city. It is therefore possible that the request will be granted, and the trial will take place in the city of Zalau, where there is a small Jewish population.

Among those awaiting trial there are seventeen Jews who are still imprisoned pending the trial, which has already been postponed for the second time.

Haffkine, Noted Bacteriologist, Discoverer of Virus for Cholera, Dies in Lausanne at Age of 70

Lausanne, Switzerland, Oct. 27.—Dr. Waldemar Mordecai Wolff Haffkine, noted bacteriologist, whom Lord Lister termed a savior of mankind because of his researches into the causes of cholera, died here suddenly at the age of 70.

Dr. Haffkine, who was born in Odessa, Russia, in 1860, was graduated from the University of Odessa in 1884. Following his graduation he worked in the zoological museum of the university. His researches in the next five years resulted in several papers, published in French and Russian scientific journals, on the infusoria and lower algae.

In 1888 Dr. Haffkine was appointed assistant professor of physiology under Prof. Schiff at the University of Geneva. After 18 months he went to Paris to work under Pasteur. Here he studied typhoid and cholera and discovered the principle and method of inoculation with attenuated virus against cholera. In 1893 Dr. Haffkine went to India to conduct investigations for the Indian government. His operations extended over the whole of Bengal, into the Punjab, the north-west provinces and Assam. In 1896 he was deputed by the Indian government to inquire into the bacteriology of the plague. The Haffkine method of inoculation has been generally adopted throughout India and the government plague research laboratory founded by him issues many thousands of doses to various tropical countries.

Dr. Haffkine's contributions to biological research included pamphlets and official reports on heredity and monocellular organisms, infectious diseases in connection with infusoria and the results of his study of Asiatic cholera and its etiology.

Mayer Named to Head New Orleans Z. O.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 27.—Erhard Mayer has been elected chairman of the administrative board of the Zionist Organization of this city. He succeeds Dr. David Fichman, executive director of the local Young Men's Hebrew Association.

An administrative committee will henceforth govern the affairs of the New Orleans Zionists, it was decided. The committee chairman will act in the capacity of president and will be assisted by two other members to be named later.

Philip Brenner was chosen vice-president, Moses E. Brenner, secretary, and Herman Bratman, treasurer, at the annual meeting which witnessed the induction of officers for the ensuing year.

A movement to collect all allied groups in New Orleans for a general cultural effort was discussed by the Zionists. This will consist of monthly programs along Jewish lines, designed mainly to interest members of the faith in the culture of their forefathers.

Campaign Against Proposed Influx of Jews Into Mexico

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Mexico City, Mexico, Oct. 27.—A campaign against an influx of Jewish immigrants from Poland is being carried forward here. The recent announcement that Jewish immigration to Palestine is closed has set anti-Jewish factions here in virtual terror of a "Jewish invasion" of Mexico. "El Universal Grafico," a widely read local afternoon newspaper, says in a prominently displayed article:

"An almost fantastic number of Jewish immigrants, indeed, a veritable avalanche of them, is disposed to come to our country during the next few months, and it seems probable that before another half year has passed there will be no fewer than 40,000 people of this race in Mexico. For several weeks, these people have been preparing for their journey to the 'Promised Land,' which in this case, is our country, and is open to what may be termed armies of conquerors.

"According to trustworthy information that has been obtained by this publication, the first contingents of Jewish emigrants will leave Polish ports for Mexico during November. These contingents will be made up of a great number of men, women and children, all of the Jewish race. Other groups, each composed of thousands of persons, will leave the Port of Danzig for Mexico, during the next three or four months. Therefore, within six months there will be an enormous number of Jewish people from Poland in our land.

"We do not desire to venture pessimistic predictions, but in view of the economic crisis and the paucity of work in the country, the outlook is not bright for these immigrants who seek to find their fortune in this country. Indeed, it may be concluded that, in view of the prevailing depressed economic conditions here, these people may find circumstances here even worse than in the countries they abandoned, the lands where their ancestors have lived for centuries. It is most lamentable to draw attention to these facts, but it appears that this copious immigration will probably be a charge upon this country, and even aggravate conditions in Mexico that are now not of the best.

"This matter is one of great social importance, and because of that, this periodical desires to draw attention to this matter to those who have an aptitude for finding a remedy for a future situation which may become deplorable."

Organize to Combat Communistic Influence on Jewish Immigrant

An organization to combat the communistic and other subversive influences among the immigrant classes, and to assist the Jewish immigrant in obtaining his citizenship, as well as to inspire him to loyalty and patriotism towards the United States was formed today by the Jewish Immigrant Workers. It is planned to maintain a department devoted to the education of non-English speaking immigrants in the English language, and in American laws and customs.

tions are weaker than the government. Lloyd George dares not risk an election and will make strenuous efforts to keep MacDonald in power to prevent the return of Baldwin."

Melchett Criticism Considered Unfair

The Observer's diplomatic correspondent says that the criticism of the British government by Lord Melchett when he resigned as chairman of the council of the Jewish Agency is considered unfair by the government because "the government's competence is strictly limited to the terms of the Mandate and the only fair criticism lies within the discrepancy of the Mandate and its fulfillment."

The criticism of Stanley Baldwin and Lloyd George are answered by an appeal to documentary evidence, the Observer's correspondent says, adding that any competent person can see that their criticism is unjustified because the "three relevant documents, Lord Balfour's letter to Lord Rothschild, Winston Churchill's White Paper and the present White Paper are all public property, each revealing the same cardinal principle. While promising Zionism a home in Palestine, each insists on respecting the rights of the Arabs."

The Observer's New York correspondent points out in connection with the appeal of American Jews to secretary of state Stimson because the British policy violates the British-American convention of 1924 that "this is incorrect since the official contention is that the treaty merely provides for an impartial administration in Palestine without religious or racial prejudice and protection of the holy sites." The correspondent adds that the excitability of the Jewish leaders may render complete American inaction difficult.

Passfield Tactless

An editorial in the Observer signed by James Garvin says that Lord Passfield has aroused throughout world Jewry "a blazing controversy because excellent intentions were expressed without tact. In Palestine we must keep the balance but the new White Paper reads like a case for equal justice to the Arabs and an ultimatum to the Jews."

"If the government rejected Dr. Weizmann's round table suggestion it was an execrable blunder. The Palestine Mandate is our most thankless task. Whatever we do we will be doubly unthanked. We make enemies at every step among both Jews and Arabs. The Jews must realize what is the utmost we can do for Zionism. We sympathize with Zionism but unchangeable facts exist in Palestine."

"Jewish domination in Palestine is impossible. The Moslems in Palestine have the whole of Islam behind them. The Zionists must realize that the Mandatory Power must not be harassed at every moment and abused at every turn for difficulties we have not created and cannot change, and must remember that

England has less anti-Semitism than any country in the world. We always consider the Jews a part of ourselves. Force cannot settle the Palestine question. Zionism can be a magnificent spiritual force in Palestine but the Jews must think of humanity more than of themselves. The life of the humblest Arab must be considered. If this is not understood Zionism will perish in bloodshed and disaster. No power on earth will be able to save it if it does not appreciate Britain's goodwill now."

Colonial Office's "Clumsiness"

The Sunday Times editorial blames the present situation on the "clumsiness of the Colonial Office" and on "Lord Passfield's lack of political psychology." "It will be a tragedy," the Sunday Times says, "if the expiring and discredited government leaves us a legacy of a Jewry no longer grateful and allied but sullen and resentful."

of his address:

"I sat here today with a great deal of emotion. When Mr. Schiff planned the building which stood on this corner, the building was at that time adequate more than adequate because the organization was small; its ambitions beautiful, its appetite frugal. Since then the Heinshimer memorial was added in memory of the man who gave his fortune to develop the community spirit in striving to combine all philanthropic institutions into one. That building has now outlived its usefulness because it received very considerable utilization by the young men."

"Today we are very proud to be in this new building which has every ideal and comfort that the young men desire at this time. I sincerely hope and trust that it will receive the proper use and benefits for which it has been erected by those who have put their hearts and souls in this edifice for the benefit of our young men."

Justice Irving Lehman said in his address:

Opportunity to Enlarge Work

"I am very proud to be able, as president of the national organization, to express to you our gratification. This is a wonderful opportunity to spread its work amongst a larger group. From the smaller organization founded more than fifty-five years ago, came the inspiration which has led every community of this country to found similar organizations. And now that this organization has obtained the opportunity to carry on its work adequately, and with proper means, will come the inspiration throughout the country to furnish local organizations everywhere with similar opportunities."

Settling of U. S. Middle Class Jews in Palestine Urged by Speakers at Mizrahi Convention

Jews who recently lost money can save Palestine and themselves by settling in Palestine and investing money there was also suggested by Rabbi Meier Berlin, speaking at the mass meeting at the Southern Hotel, Sunday night. The meeting opened the convention of the Mizrahi (Orthodox Zionist Organization) which 300 delegates are attending.

More than 1,000 Baltimore Jews were present at the Mizrahi opening session. The British policy in Palestine was denounced in a resolution adopted unanimously by the session. The resolution was introduced by Attorney Samuel Goldstein of New York City.

The organization of American Jewish middle classes to partake in the industrialization of Palestine was suggested by Gedaliah Bublik, president of the Mizrahi Organization of America. He explained that neither the Simpson report nor the British statement of policy prohibit the immigration of the well-to-do.

A world congress of rabbis for the purpose of arousing middle-class orthodox sentiment for Palestine was suggested by Rabbi Wolf Gold. Such a congress, he said, could lay plans for the organization of a wide-spread industry for the manufacture of sacred synagogue articles in Palestine which would be sold to Jews outside of Palestine and would involve an expenditure of millions of dollars.

American Middle-Class Needed

American middle-class immigration and investment as well as general increased activity for Palestine is needed at this critical moment, all the speakers who addressed the opening session stated. They deprecated protest against and despair over the present situation.

Rabbi Berlin, responding to the report of Sir John Hope Simpson and the statement of proposed policy by Britain, revealed that the leaders of the Jewish Agency had proposed to Sir John that land be bought in Transjordan on which to settle Arabs dispossessed by Jewish purchase of land in Palestine. This proposal was turned down by Sir John, Rabbi Berlin stated.

Cables from Dr. Chaim Weizmann, resigned president of the World Zionist Organization and of the Jewish Agency, and from leaders of the German Mizrahi urging strengthened efforts for Palestine were read at the meeting, following which the resolution denouncing the British government's proposed policy was passed.

A great increase in membership in the Zionist Organization was urged by Jacob de Haas who said that the British government, knowing the numerical weakness of the Zionists, acted accordingly.

The opening of the convention was welcomed by former Mayor Jackson of Baltimore representing Governor Ritchie. Joseph Allen, chairman of the Baltimore arrangements committee for the convention was chairman of the session.

session of the Mandates Commission. In the event that the Palestine problem is not dealt with at the January session and an extraordinary session is not convened the Mandates Commission would be unable to tackle it until its session next June.

Meanwhile League circles are rather puzzled over the British government's Palestine policy which has been a complete surprise to Geneva which is of the opinion that it contravenes the Mandate. William Martin, editor of the Journal de Geneva, today wrote that anyone who supposes that Dr. Chaim Weizmann's resignation is an event which does not imply any consequences will soon be proven wrong.

M. Martin draws attention to the fact that while Dr. Weizmann was the champion of cooperation with the British government, he always met with the opposition of the Zionist Revisionists whose attitude will now make itself felt. Asking "what has happened to British empiricism," M. Martin points out that everything went well in Palestine while Lord Plumer was High Commissioner because he "as an old general knew what he wanted."

M. Martin severely criticizes the Passfield White Paper as a statement which is "a complete negation of the Balfour Declaration as one can hardly suppose that all that Declaration meant was that the Jews would be treated in Palestine merely as they are treated in other countries."

Students Met with Anti-Jewish Bias, Says C. C. N. Y. Paper

Forty per cent of the students of City College in their search for employment encountered anti-Jewish discrimination, mostly among the big corporations of New York City. This is the statement made in the City College Evening Session weekly paper, The Reporter, by Nelson Jarschauer, in answer to the statement Dr. Frederick B. Robinson, president of City College, made recently in an interview with the New York Telegram, in New York, in which he stated that there is no discrimination against the Jew.

During an unemployment poll which the paper undertook recently, the question was asked, "In your search for a position have you found racial or religious discrimination to be a serious obstacle?" was answered in the affirmative by the forty per cent of those replied.

"Basing our statements on these letters and upon other irrefragable testimony," says Mr. Jarschauer, "we assert that the Standard Oil Company for one, makes no secret of its antipathy for men of Hebrew origin. The Edison Company, for another, has turned down many electrical geniuses because of their religious beliefs. The New York Telephone Company disguises its bigotry with percentage policy which deceives no one. It is their opinion that such a quota of Jewish employment takes them out of the bigot class."

South African Jews Protest

Johannesburg, So. Africa, Oct. 27.—Over 2,500 Jews of Johannesburg gathered last night at the Orpheum theatre to express their indignation with regard to the new policy of the English government toward the Jewish interests in Palestine.

The anti-British meeting in the Orpheum Theatre took place under the chairmanship of M. Raphael, the president of the Board of Jewish Deputies of South Africa. In a resolution which the meeting adopted it was emphasized that the new attitude of the British Government will not discourage the Jewish people to continue its work in order to realize the Zionist's ideal in Palestine.

Jerusalem, Oct. 27.—Special performances will be given tonight in the Palestine theatres and motion picture houses to increase the Jewish National Fund in connection with the "Jewish National Fund Week" which was proclaimed today.

A number of leading personalities hastened to send in to the headquarters of the Jewish National Fund double, treble and even ten-fold donations. The entire Jewish population of a Palestine considers the Jewish National Fund Week as a reply to the limitations made for Jewish land settling in Palestine by the new British White Paper.

Worcester Makes Plans for Jewish Education Expansion

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Worcester, Oct. 27.—The first step in the establishment of a central bureau of Jewish education for this city was taken yesterday when it was announced that a branch of the local Ivriah school had been opened on the west side of the city.

Population shift in the last five years has split the Jewry here into two distinct sections. The organization of the bureau marks the first real effort to realign opposite sides of the community in a Jewish project.

The opening of the school brings to fruition an idea broached last winter by Rabbi Levi A. Olan of Temple Emanuel. Directors of the Ivriah school worked on the plan with him during the summer.

That the new school will prove an invaluable aid in reviving interest in Hebrew education in Worcester was expressed by community leaders. The need for a centralized system of Jewish education has been apparent here for some time, and officials hope to extend the scope of their work.
