MacDonald Personally Handling British Palestine Policy (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 7-The initiative in dealing with the government's Palestine policy has been wrested from Lord Passfield, Colonial Secretary, and Premier MacDonald is now dealing with the matter personally, the parliamentary correspondent of the Jewish Chronicle says. Ministerial circles are reported to be admittedly worried over the denusciation of the White Paper on strictly legal grounds by so eminent a legal authority as Sir John Simon. A number of cabinet members who find no comfort in Lord Passfield's attempts to "interpret" away the passages in the White Paper that have offended the Jews are really alarmed. It is felt that unless the terms of the White Paper are substantially changed the government's position will be badly shaken as a result of the forthcoming bye-election its Whitechapel, a Jewish constituency, in which the government's Palestine policy will be the chief issue.

Drive Soon to Further Work of Land-Buying in Palestine

The Jewish National Fund will shortly undertake a great money-raising cam-paign for the purpose of furthering its work and buying more land in Palestine, it was announced today. The campaign will reach its peak coincident with the coming of Mendel Menachim Ussishkin, head of the Jewish National Fund, and known as the "grand old man of Zionism," to America.

The convening of a national conference on the Palestine land problem, to be held under the auspices of the Iewish National Fund of America, was

Plans for the campaign, which is to be by far the greatest ever undertaken for the Fund, were discussed Thursday evening at a meeting in the Pennsylvania Hotel. Emanuel Neumann. American president of the Jewish National Fund, was chairman. The executive committee of the organization. augmented by representatives from all tine participated.

The meeting was addressed by Rabbi Nachman H. Ebin of the Mizrachi, who declared that the coming of Ussishkin to America should be celebrated by the purchase of large sections of Palestine land. Rabbi Maliansky compared the present situation to that in the time of Jeremiah. When Nebuchadnezzar stormed at the walls of Jerusalem, and prisoned in a well of slime, Jeremiah's cousin came to him to sell him a parcel of land. "And Jeremiah bought land," said Rabbi Masliansky, "and he bought that land on that day as a protest against Lord Passfield. That was the beginning

Elias Epstein, general secretary of the Jewish National Fund in Jerusalem, who has just arrived in New York, refuted point by point many of the arguments presented in the Simpson report. He emphasized the possibility of developing seven million dunams of land now waste in the south of Palestine. And he said "The Jews altogether own only 5.6% of Palestine. The Jewish Na-tional Fund owns only 1.25% of Palestine. Does that sound like we are driving out the Arab? The Simpson report regards our work in Palestine only as a colonization movement. Yet when Sir John Hope Simpson was in Jerusalem he visited our office and spoke then as though he understood our ideal. He said, 'I understand now that the Jewish Rev. Jewish Tribune Council Attacks State Aid to Lake Placid Club Because of Anti-Semitism

Protesting to Governor Roosevelt that state funds are being used to improve the property of a private club which discriminates against Jews, the National Council of the Jewish Tribune on Thursday attacked the plan to hold the 1932 Olympic games at Lake Placid. In a statement which accompanies the letter to the governor, the Council declared that \$60,000 was being spent by the state to build a bobsled run for the games on property of the Lake Placid Club, which, according to the Council, has always barred Jews from membership and is a "notorious anti-Semitic vacation resort."

In the letter, Governor Roosevelt is asked to prevent the state "from debasing itself in promoting racial antagonisms." In answer to this, representatives of both the state and the Olympic games organization said that the Council was "very much mistaken" in its attitude, declaring that "not one penny" was being spent to improve club property. Wallace Pierce, attorney for the state commission, explained that a perpetual easement had been given to the state by the club on the property where the bobsled run was being built and that after the games both will go to the State

Dr. Godfrey Dewey, chairman of the Winter Games Committee and executive vice-president of the Lake Placid Club, also denied the charges. The Council of the Jewish Tribune in its statement objected to his connection with the games, declaring that his father, Dr. Melville Dewey, founder of the Lake Placid Club, had resigned after charges

of anti-Semitism had been made against

him by prominent Jews.

In an article which the Jewish Tribune publishes in its current issue it is charged that items for improvements on the property of the Lake Placid Club were contemplated in the state budget for the promotion of the games. David N. Mosessohn, chairman of the Jewish Tribune council, who signed the letter to Governor Roosevelt, insisted yesterday that his charges were correct, declaring that any improvement to the Lake Placid region would benefit the Lake Placid Club.

Boston Jewish Charities Raise \$536,950; 1,500 New Subscribers (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Nov. 7-Contributions totalling \$536,950 have been turned in to the Associated Jewish Philanthropies in the first two weeks of its \$750,000 campaign, Louis E. Kirstein, president, announced today. This represents a record amount raised in this community in such a short period.

The total raised to date is within \$50,000 of the amount raised during the entire preceding year and includes 6,251 subscribers, more than 1,500 in excess of the complete list of sub-scribers for 1929-30. Another indication of the remarkable response of the community is the receipt of more than \$75,000 in cash which is to be used for

The campaign will be continued until the \$750,000 goal is reached thus assuring the \$65,000 anonymous contribution contingent on the campaign quota be-

ing reached.

Henry Penn, campaign chairman, pointed out that the non-Jewish support given the drive this year was also unprecedented. Several thousand dollars have been received from sources which were unsolicited, the donors writing that they were anxious to add their contribution in tribute to their fellow citizens of the Jewish faith.

Schwartz's New Opus Small Scale Jewish "Passion Play"

A Jewish "Passion Play" on a small scale describes fairly accurately "The tre opened this season in New York. The play, written by Sholom Asch, seeks to portray Jewish life during the Inquisition period of the Roman-Catholic Church under Pope Paul IV in the 16th Century. It undertakes to describe the horrors which the Jewish Ghetto lived through during this era.

The production is very elaborate as far as scenic effects are concerned The types, however, are very much misrepresented, especially the Pope who plays the leading role. Joseph Buloff, who plays the role of the Pope, exaggerates too much by presenting Paul IV as a half-mad, weak and

sadistic character.

Both Mr. Schwartz and Mr. Buloff keep the audience on edge. Miss Stella Adler is drawing attention in the leading feminine role. The play has provoked great interest in the Jewish theatrical world and is one of the outstanding productions of the current Jewish theatrical season.

Mattuck Breaks Anglo-Jewry's United Front on White Paper

London, Nov. 7-The united front which British Jewry created in opposition to the Passfield White Paper on Palestine has been broken by the Rev. Dr. Israel Mattuck, leader of Liberal Judaism in England, who has just published an article in the Daily Mail in which he expresses approval of the Rabbi Mattuck argues in the article

that America and Germany, which contain the largest Jewish communities and the most important sections of world Jewry, are not in sympathy with Zionism, but rather dislike it, since

Mattuck concludes that the White Paper has now removed the uncertainty which has been hanging for a long time over Palestine and has freed the country from "petty nationalist politics." He believes that peace and security will now reign in Palestine, which will achieve national prosperity in which both Jews and Arabs will share.

Palestine Jewish Labor Chiefs Coming Here to Aid Drive

David Ben-Gurion and Joseph Baraz, leaders of the Palestine Iewish workers federation, the Histadruth Ha'Ovdim, are coming to the United States to aid this year's Geverkshaften campaign on behalf of the Jewish workers in Palestine. A cablegram to this effect was received yesterday by the National Labor Committee for the Organized Jewish Workers in Palestine

Ben-Gurion is one of the most important political leaders in the Palestine labor movement. Joseph Baraz is the founder of the colony Dagania and one of the first leaders of the Jewish agricultural workers in Palestine.

Ben-Gurion and Baraz are expected here by the end of the month. They will make their first public appearance here at the Jewish workers' convention which will take place November 28th to 30th in Irving Plaza Hall. On Saturday evening, November 29th, a reception now being made to hold will be held for them in Carnegie Hall.

Freiheit Calls on Jews to Desert Zionism. Back Soviets

Calling upon the Jewish workers to desert the Zionist cause and to fight for Soviet Russia and Communism, an editorial in Friday's Freiheit, New York Yiddish Communist organ, enumerates what it alleges to be Jewish failures in Palestine with regard to land settlement, and contrasts this with what it regards as the great success of Iewish land settlement in Russia within recent years.

"During the past five years the Soviet Union has settled three hundred thousand Jews on the land," says the editorial. "During the coming five years it will build a large new settle-ment in Bira-Bidjan. Wherever Jews live in compact masses the whole governmental apparatus is conducted in Yiddish. If great Jewish masses will come to Bira-Bidjan a Soviet Republic will be organized there.

"All this is being done by the Soviet Republic without noise, without trum-

peting; it is part of the general work of building up the country. The Jews in the Soviet Union have equal rights together with all citizens. Jewish books and periodicals are being issued at the expense of the government. Anti-Semitism is being uprooted with an

iron hand. "In Palestine it is just the opposite There during the past fifty years hundreds of millions of dollars have poured in, nevertheless only about twenty thousand Jews are settled upon the land. There everything is kept up by philanthropy, and there is no room for a large lewish population. There the ruler is the British imperialistic power which now declares openly that it will give the Jews no governmental power There Jews are being settled upon alien soil from which the peasants are being driven off by force, although they have been living there scores and hundreds of years. There a poisonous hatred on the part of the local population towards the aliens who come with the bayonet and the dollar exists, and the masses have already revolted against the alien op-

"Down with Zionism! Long live the

Professor Fraenckel, head of the University's department of mathematics, referred to the tragic times through which the country is passing and deprecated student participation in political affairs He pointed out in connection with the present political situation that Jewry's connection ante-dated the Balfour Decclaration and optimistically quoted the legend of God telling Moses, when the Jews stood terror-stricken on the banks of the Red Sea on their way out of Egypt, to order the children of Israel to go forward.

At the end of the academic year which was inaugurated today students will be graduated for the first time and degrees will be granted in the faculty of humanities which was organized in 1929. According to the University's year book, released simultaneously with the opening of the new semester, the chief work accomplished during the past year was the establishment of a University Press Association.

Plans for the University Press Association in the coming year include the publication of "The Third Wall," by Dr. E. L. Sukenik and Dr. L. H. Mayer, embodying the results of excavations carried out by the University and the Jewish Palestine Exploration Society, in Hebrew and in an English translation. Other works to be published include "Toseth-Concordant" by Rabbi J. H. Kassovsky and the "Ancient Synagogue of Beth-Alpha" by Dr. E. L. Sukenik. The publication of these works is rendered possible by funds from the Drop-sie College in Philadelphia, Congrega-tion Emanu-El in New York, the Jewish Academy of New York and a grant from the Hebrew University budget. Expedition at Samaria

Archaeological works planned by the University in the coming, year, according to the year book, will be an expedition in cooperation with Harvard University at Samaria. The report of the University's work for the year indicates that the Malaria Research Station at Rosh Pinah continued its work almost uninterruptedly during the entire period of the disturbances. "This fact testified to the confidence of the native population in the station, and particularly to the personnel in charge," Dr. Magnes pointed out.

There was only a brief session today. the final plenary session being postponed until tomorrow night to give the various committees an opportunity to conclude their discussion and frame their resolutions. The committees are meeting difficulties on the question of the formation of a provisional committee to run the Zionist Organization instead of the present Executive until the Congress is convened.

Other snags holding up the reports of the committees are the differences of opinion as to the time and place of the next Congress and the text and form of the various resolutions and their coordination. Most speakers favor a congress not later than the end of January and the Zionist Executive is not opposed to a congress in February. Carlsbad, a favorite place for Zionist congress, has been mentioned as the scene of the 17th congress.

At last night's session middle class colonization of Palestine was the principal subject of discussion. The suggestions included the speedy settlement of Jews with small means on land owned by the Jewish National Fund. This, it was pointed out, would achieve the double purpose of a larger immigration of the middle classes and the development of all the land now in Jewish possession as well as bringing more money into the country. Col. Frederick Kisch, chairman of the

Palestine Zionist Executive, pointed out that in addition to the above plans there is also the hope of a certain num-ber of labor immigration certificates being granted by the Colonial Office. which, while not numerically large or in accord with the Zionists' demand, would still be considerable. He also outlined the immediate finan-

cial requirements of the Zionist Executive and the Keren Havesod, the chief financial instrument of the Jewish Agency. Complaining of the small budget that the Jewish Agency allotted for Palestine development, Colonel Kisch voiced the hope that the Keren Hayesod campaign would begin in the United States early next year in order to utilize the willingness and determination of American Jewry to increase their contributions for Palestine work

Other speakers recommended that further coordination be made between the Jewish National Fund and Keren Hayesod campaigns in the United
