Pro-Arab Campaign Starts in London on Eve of Debate on Palestine in Parliament

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 14—On the eve of the opening of the parliamentary debate on Palestine, a pro-Arab campaign was launched here with a reception attended by Lord Islington, Mohammed Ali, a member of the Indian Round Table Conference; Jamal Hussein, London representative of the Arab Executive; a number of society women, numerous members of the House of Lords and a squad of black-shirted Fascisti.

Lord Islington proposed a resolution that Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations be applied to Palestine. He voiced regret that the Arabs had been "driven off the land," adding that he does not oppose a moderate number of Jews in the country, similar to the pre-War situation, but he does oppose a large immigration with the Jewish Agency exercising more influence over the Palestine administration "than the League of Nations, the Mandates Commission, the British government and the Palestine government put together."

Mohammed Ali supported Lord Islington and revealed the interesting fact that for four years he had lived in the home of the late Sir Hermann Gollancz, son-in-law of the late Chief Rabbi Adler. Ali said that his wife does not eat any but kosher meat. Emphasizing the fact that the Moslems constitute a quarter of humanity, he asked whether Great Britain preferred a quarrel with them. Finally he reported that he had talked with Lord Passfield yesterday and the latter had admitted to him that he would stick to the White Paper but that an explanation

British Cabinet Names Body to Negotiate With Zionists

London, Nov. 14—At the suggestion of Premier MacDonald, the cabinet has appointed a small committee of cabinet officers to deal with the Palestine situation with a view to the reopening of friendly discussions with the Zionist Executive on conditions which will give satisfaction to the Jewish people, the parliamentary correspondent of the London Jewish Chronicle learns today.

Though Lord Passfield is a member of the committee the matter has been taken out of his hands and transferred to the committee as a whole. The cabinet has already rejected a proposed explanatory statement of the White Paper which Lord Passfield prepared as being inadequate and most unlikely to remove the painful impression of the White Paper that prevails in Jewish circles.

Arab Executive's Delay in Taking Stand on White Paper Arouses Anxious Speculation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Nov. 14—A good deal of curiosity and anxious speculation is being manifested in all quarters here now because of the unprecedented delay, or as some say, failure of the Arab Executive to make any public statement regarding its position on the Passfield White Paper. Evidently awaiting the day to day developments the Arab Executive has never manifested such hesitation in making its stand known.

One meeting after another of the Executive has been postponed. The official statement promised a few days after the full text of the White Paper became available has been withheld. Questioned by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency as to the reason for the unusual procrastination, the secretaries said that a full meeting of the Executive to act on the matter would be called but the meeting has not yet been held.

The Arab press is impatiently demanding action but the Executive explained to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the reaction of the Arab papers is no criterion of the present situation, each paper having its own views and motives. Even the question of acceptance or rejection of the proposed legislative council remains undecided, the Executive relying on Jamal Hussein, now in London, to do his utmost in connection with the parliament.

Jewish Students Decline to Return to Classes Until Protection Is Guaranteed

Vienna, Nov. 14—Austrian Jewish students attending the World Commerce College here today refused to return to their classes because the college authorities have declined to guarantee their protection against a recurrence of the anti-Semitic attacks of Monday. Foreign Jewish students at the College today appealed to their respective diplomatic representatives for protection.

The Jewish students declined to return to their classes because the school authorities were not willing to agree to call in the police in the event of further trouble. The Jewish students said they could not remain in their classes so long as they were likely to be beaten daily by an overwhelming majority.

Meanwhile the nationalist students who were responsible for the anti-Semitic attacks have yielded to the appeals of officials of the ministry of education and the college authorities and agreed to maintain order in order not to damage Austria's reputation abroad. The disorders began when the nationalist students ousted their Jewish classmates and injured a number of them in the clash that followed. The nationalists had demanded the right to be the sole official representatives of all students, thus barring the Jewish students. When this demand was rejected the attacks began.

Hexter Urges Economic Board to Utilize Resources of All Economic Institutions in Palestine on Political Commission of Jewish Agency; International Provisional Body Proposed

London, Nov. 14—The consideration of a plan proposing the creation of an economic board for working out a scheme for the utilization of the resources of all existing Jewish operative economic institutions in Palestine was urged upon the emergency meeting of the Jewish Agency's Political Commission by Dr. Maurice Hexter, American member of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, according to a report of the Committee's deliberations made public here today.

In addition to the members of the Political Commission members of the Jewish Agency Executive, of the Zionist Actions Committee, James De Rothschild and Major Nathan participated in the deliberations. Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who resigned as President of the Jewish Agency and the World Zionist Organization in protest against the White Paper, declared that the grant of 1,500 certificates for Jewish immigrants under the Labor schedule meant nothing so long as the White Paper policy stood

and that it was necessary to make it clear to the British government that the Jewish Agency regarded them as merely a sop. Dr. Weizmann informed the Political Commission that in his private capacity he had interviewed Premier MacDonald and made it clear that the Jewish Agency would enter into negotiations on the basis of the White Paper. He also said that the Agency's reply to the White Paper and the Simpson Report would soon be ready for submission to the Mandates Commission through the British government.

Dr. Bernard Kahn, explaining the attitude of American members of the Agency, opined that there was danger in hasty negotiations which should therefore be delayed with a view to discussing very carefully the whole question of the Mandate and the Palestine policy. Pointing out that proper cooperation with the non-Zionists should be secured, Dr. Kahn said the American leaders did not believe that the full effect of Dr.

Sees Liberals Less Divided Over Question of Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 14—The Liberals are seen as less divided over the Palestine question than the Laborites and the Conservatives because of the outspoken attitude of Sir Herbert Samuel, a leader of the party and former High Commissioner of Palestine, according to the Morning Post.

Speculating on the outcome of Monday's parliamentary debate, the Post sees little difference of opinion among the opposition that the White Paper departs from the spirit and letter of the Mandate. The Laborites, the Post says, are more concerned, however, for the moment, with the effect that the new Palestine policy will have on the Whitechapel by-election where the Jewish vote is very strong. To this the paper attributes the allocation of so early a day for the debate despite the congested calendar of the House of Commons.

Anti-Semites Battle Police in Hungary's Second City

Budapest, Nov. 14—Breaking windows in Jewish-owned shops and battling reinforced police patrols, students of the Franz Joseph Royal Hungarian University of Science in Szeged, Hungary's second largest city, today renewed their anti-Semitic demonstrations which started earlier in the week when Count Kuno Klebelsberg, minister of education, visited the University.

Ignoring the warning of the dean that the rioters would be severely punished, the students formed a street demonstration in the center of the city and fought police armed with swords and bayonets. A special bicycle police battalion was called out to prevent the students from invading the Jewish quarter.

Several students and a number of policemen were injured by flying missiles but the rioters were finally routed and order restored.

Roumanian Jewish Merchant Boycotts British-Made Goods

Czernowitz, Nov. 14—Salesmen handling British-made goods might as well omit from their itineraries the store of Heinrich Zekler, a Jewish merchant of Czernowitz, as he announced today a complete boycott of all English goods until such time as the British White Paper on Palestine is withdrawn. He has sent out a notice to all firms carrying English goods that they need not send salesmen to him since he will not handle such goods until the White Paper is cast into the limbo of historical curiosities.

Warburg Sees Hope for N. Y. Community Chest

Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the board of trustees of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, speaking before a luncheon of the business men's council of the Jewish federation at which Catholics and Protestants participated, Thursday, urged the cooperation of all faiths in the fight against unemployment "without reference to color, race or creed."

In introducing the various non-Jewish speakers, Mr. Warburg said, "The presence of these gentlemen here gives us hope that some day we may see a real community chest in New York, in which all denominations will join in raising all funds needed for New York City's philanthropies. It is my hope that out of such meetings as this a real community chest will grow."

Lowenstein Heads Executive of Jobless Coordinating Board

Six Jews active in the fields of social service and philanthropy have been included on the executive committee of the Welfare Council Coordinating Committee appointed by former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York to abate unemployment. Solomon Lowenstein, executive director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies was appointed chairman, and other Jewish members are:

Fritz Kaufmann, director of State Employment Service; Dr. Samuel C. Kohn, executive director Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities; Mrs. Mary K. Elmer Brown Reelected to Jersey Legislature

Newark Jews Make Large Gifts to Community Chest

Newark, Nov. 14—More than fifty per cent of the annual Community Chest campaign, this year for a quota of \$1,344,492, now in progress here, has already been achieved. The local Conference of Jewish Charities is one of the important constituents of the Chest. Louis Bamberger has again achieved the distinction of being the largest individual donor to the campaign, having pledged \$30,000. The department store of L. Bamberger & Co. pledged the sum of \$25,000.

Form Jewish Welfare Group on Long Island

An organization whose purpose will be to look after the social welfare needs of Jews in Nassau and Suffolk Counties, Long Island, is now being formed by Rabbi A. Joseph Lasker of Temple Emanu-El, Lynbrook, L. I. Sick and needy Jews, as well as those having difficulties with the law, will be aided by this organization, in which there will be representatives of all the Jewish communities in the two counties.

On the committee which is cooperating with Rabbi Lasker in this work are Gertrude Wertheimer, president of the Sisterhood of Temple Emanu-El, and Samuel Weisman, president of the Men's Club of Temple Beth David. Others who have expressed their willingness to cooperate are Assemblyman Wallace, Judge Smith, District Attorney Edwards and Chief Probation Officer Hammill.

The tenth anniversary of the founding of Temple Emanu-El is being celebrated this week-end. Among the speakers at the three-day celebration, which began Friday night with services in the Temple and which included a banquet last night, were Judge Benjamin Marvin, president of the Jamaica Jewish Center; Mayor Wilson; Assemblyman Wallace; Rabbi Alexander Lyons of Brooklyn; Rev. George W. Roesch of St. James M. E. Church, Lynbrook, and others. A series of Zionist meetings is being arranged for this winter by the Temple.

Mexican Chambers of Commerce in Drive Against Alleged Mass Jewish Immigration (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mexico City, Nov. 14.—The National Chamber of Commerce in the Laguna district, state of Coahuila, today began an intensive campaign for the support of all chambers of commerce in Mexico in its move to protest to President Rubio against the admittance of 40,000 Jewish immigrants, allegedly supposed to start arriving here early in December from Poland and other East-European countries.

Scores of chambers of commerce throughout the country are already backing the proposal which will be submitted to the Confederation of Chambers of the United Mexican State for presentation to the highest authorities of the republic. The Laguna chamber of commerce, which is largely composed of planters and other agriculturists, represents Mexico's leading cotton producing center.

Arrival Must Be Prevented

In its appeal to other chambers it warns that the arrival of the Jewish immigrants must be prevented and that the immigration officials must be ordered not to allow them to land. The appeal is based on the contention that, as practically none of the expected newcomers are agriculturists, they will make graver the prevailing commercial depression as they will probably enter commerce in competition with Mexicans.

The appeal points out that if the Jewish immigrants were agriculturists they would be received cordially. This appeal follows up an extensive campaign along similar lines being waged in the provincial press in the form of conspicuously published news stories concerning the impending arrival of a large contingent of Jewish immigrants from Eastern Europe.

Inquiries made at the offices of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society here indicate that nothing is known in Jewish circles about a reported migration of 40,000 Jews from Eastern Europe to Mexico. It was pointed out that no funds are available for such a mass movement even if Mexico could absorb such a number of immigrants at one time and if Mexico's immigration laws were to permit so many Jews to enter at one time.

Gerson Named Vice-President of Nebraska Social Worker (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Omaha, Nov. 14.—Samuel Gerson, executive director of the Jewish Welfare Federation and the Jewish Community Center, was elected first vice-president of the Nebraska Conference of Social Work at the closing session of the conference in Hastings, Neb. Mr. Gerson's paper on "The Future of the State Conference" outlined a long-time program of development for the conference. Henry Monsky, president of the Omaha Community Chest and a prominent worker in national and international Jewish affairs, delivered the closing address of the conference.

Oldest Jewess in Poland Dead at Age of 119 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lodz, Nov. 14.—Sheindel Hirsch-korn, said to be the oldest Jewess in Poland, is dead here at the age of 119. She was a well-known character in the city, having been a peddler for two generations. Despite her great age she never wore spectacles.

She will be buried tonight with five generations of ancestors participating in the services. Aware of the end she prepared her own shroud.

Detroit Jewish Bakeries Closed as Consumers Strike for Price Reduction (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Detroit, Nov. 14.—Detroit Jewish bakeries have been forced to close as a result of a bread strike initiated by consumers in demands for reductions in prices.

Action was taken at a conference of 28 of the largest Jewish organizations and landsmanschaften, and of the workers organizations in the city, including the Arbeiter Ring branches. Jericho Temple was packed to the doors with an audience determined that their demands be honored by the Jewish bakers.

The demands of the striking consumers are for a reduction in price of bread of three cents on the pound, with a proportionate cut on "chals" and cakes.

Boston Jewry to Mark 275th Year of First Jewish Colony (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Boston, Nov. 14.—Boston Jewry will officially celebrate the 275th anniversary of the founding of the first Jewish colony in the United States on Wednesday evening, December 17, at Faneuil Hall, the cradle of American liberty.

Distinguished Jews and non-Jews will participate in the elaborate program being planned by Alexander Brin, publisher of the Jewish Advocate, who is chairman of the committee. Among the notable array of speakers will be the Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman of New York, former president and chairman of the Good Will Committee of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, and Professor Albert Bushnell Hart of Harvard University, the eminent historian.

Kahn Appointed to City Court by Gov. Roosevelt

Louis L. Kahn has been appointed by Governor Roosevelt as a judge of the City Court of New York City to fill the place left vacant by the elevation of Bernard L. Shientag to the Supreme Court. Mr. Kahn was elected two weeks ago to complete the five years remaining of Justice Shientag's term and this appointment by the Governor is only for the balance of this year.

Meetings in New Orleans, Yonkers, New Kensington and Shreveport Attack White Paper (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

New Orleans, La., Nov. 14.—Characterizing the recent action by the British government in issuing the White Paper on Palestine as a betrayal of trust, the representatives of New Orleans Jewry, Orthodox, Conservative and Reform, and Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley addressed a protest meeting which was attended by more than 600 persons here, last night. Rabbi Mendel Silber referred to the White Paper as a "Black Paper, demonstrative of hypocrisy and politics which is being played at our expense." Resolutions denouncing the British policy were unanimously adopted by the meeting.

Yonkers, N. Y., Nov. 14.—A vote of thanks should be given to Lord Passfield for the British White Paper restricting Jewish immigration to Palestine, Jacob de Haas said in an address in the Jewish Community Center here, "because it called out all the strength, all the courage and all the backing of the Jews."

Originally intended merely as one of a lecture series, the session became a protest meeting, at which formal resolutions were adopted objecting to the Passfield statement. More than 300 persons attended.

New Kensington, Pa., Nov. 14.—Four hundred people attended a protest meeting against British policy in Palestine, held last night at the New Kensington Jewish Club. Among the speakers were Congressman Adam Wyant, Isaac Carmel of Cleveland, Rabbi Henry Goldberger of Beth Jacob Congregation and Mayor Burns. A resolution protesting against the White Paper was unanimously passed at the meeting, over which Dr. A. Levendoff, president of the Zionist District, presided.

In issuing the White Paper on Palestine Britain has yielded to criminality and murder, declared Morris Rothenberg, American Zionist leader, in an address before the Menorah Society of New York University yesterday. The British government would not have dreamt of issuing the present restrictions except for the Arab atrocities last August, said Mr. Rothenberg.

Wise and Szold Appeal for Zionist Emergency Fund

The Jewish people must unite in a vigorous effort to resist the enactment of the policies outlined in the latest British White Paper on Palestine, or else "the status of Jews in countries governed by international law will be adversely affected," according to a statement issued yesterday by Dr. Stephen S. Wise and Robert Szold, in an appeal for contributions to the Zionist Emergency Fund, of which Dr. Wise is chairman. Mr. Szold is chairman of the Administration of the Zionist Organization of America, which launched the Fund to promote activities "for the protection of Jewish rights under the Palestine Mandate."

Declaring that "public opinion must be informed of the truth regarding Jewish aspirations and achievements in Palestine," the statement by the Zionist leaders asserts that "never in modern times have the Jewish people been confronted with so grave and decisive a situation as presses upon them today." Dr. Wise and Mr. Szold also say that the foundations of the Jewish National Home "stand threatened. Impelled by political expediency, members of the present British Government are attempting to destroy the Balfour Declaration and to set back Jewish history for several centuries. A weighty responsibility rests upon all Jews to resist this attempt."

The statement was sent to the chairmen of all Zionist districts throughout the United States and to leading Jews everywhere.

tion would be issued. To this Mohammed Ali said he replied, "Don't explain the whole thing away."

Although it is well known that most of the speakers are not friendly to the Jews they all endeavored to emphasize that they were well-disposed towards them but merely opposed Zionism. The reception was conspicuous by the absence of many members of Parliament, including Lords, who had previously definitely associated themselves with an anti-Zionist policy. Lately, however, they have been silent, probably in view of the Conservatives' desire to gain the "Jewish vote" on the Palestine question for the next elections.

Weizmann's resignation had been achieved, which did not mean however a lack of confidence in Dr. Weizmann. The Americans, he said, felt that Dr. Weizmann's resignation should stand and that an international provisional committee should direct affairs until the council of the Jewish Agency met for the election of a new Executive.

Economic Board

In addition to suggesting an economic board, Dr. Hexter urged cooperation with the government as the only policy for the Executive because he said it must not lose the support of liberal opinion upon which in the final analysis the Jewish rights in Palestine depended. He therefore proposed that the Political Commission adopt a resolution declaring that it was prepared to discuss the creation of legislative apparatus provided the government would make it unmistakably clear that it would carry out a constructive program.

Chaim Arlosoroff of Palestine pointed out that the government's proposed development policy might be nothing but camouflage but that practical matters existed which must be discussed with the government such as the Jewish share in the development policy, whether Transjordan would be included in its scope, the machinery for development, and the relation of Arab unemployment to Jewish immigration. While Sir John Simpson proposed a development board, the government merely wanted a development department which is a fundamental deviation, Arlosoroff said.

Britain Prepared to Reconsider Plan

James DeRothschild voiced the opinion that the British government was prepared to reconsider the White Paper, and if negotiations continue they should be outside the framework of the White Paper as all parties now favor Zionism and the Zionists must not lose sympathy. In view of the tone of the White Paper the Jewish Agency should support the Jewish community in Palestine and hold aloof until the government was prepared to set up a legislative council with which the Agency could agree and in which Jews could participate, Rothschild stated.

Col. Frederick Kisch, chairman of the Palestine Zionist Executive, stated that it had been his experience that the great majority of British officials in Palestine were opposed to the Jews although not all of them could be described as anti-Semites. The White Paper, Col. Kisch declared, prejudices the prospect of arriving at better relations with the Arabs. The situation has been improving in recent months

but greater care is needed now to prevent new violence, he said.

Mr. d'Avigdor Goldsmid pointed out that it was necessary to make it clear to the British government that Palestine should have its own civil service and not utilize officials drawn from other eastern countries. He urged the united front between Zionists and non-Zionists with united support for Dr. Weizmann.

Palestine Christian Minority Worried at Plan of Legislative Council, Catholic Paper Says

Berlin, Nov. 14.—The Christian minority in Palestine is filled with anxiety over the intention of the British government to establish a legislative council in that country, writes Germania, the organ of the German Catholics. Protestants and Catholics alike fear that the Moslem majority will use the council as a new method of domination which they will try to justify in the name of democracy and majority rule, Germania says.

The position of the Christians of Palestine, Germania points out, "has changed very much since the disruption of the Turkish Empire. They are no longer under the protection of the European powers which then wielded great influence in the Orient. Their attempt to join the Arab national movement has miscarried. The policy pursued by the Grand Mufti aims at a division between the Arab Moslems and the Arab Christians.

"The days have gone," the Catholic organ concludes, "when Gladstone could arouse all England by his protest against the Armenian atrocities. England is no longer ready to battle for the Christian cause. Its interests in the East, above all in India, are dictated now by its relations to the Moslems."

Germania also reports that there is a movement afoot in Palestine under the leadership of an adventurer from Nablus, named Zueytan, to organize an Arab legion and storm troops on the lines of the Hitlerites in Germany. Their slogan is the battle cry of the Prophet in the militant days of Islam—"Din Mohamed Bissey!"—"The religion of Mohamed is by the sword."
