Parley Between Jewish Agency and Government Adjourned Till Monday to Give Time to Consider Jewish Demands, Contentions of Britain; Demand Passfield's Elimination from Negotiations

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 19.—The conference between the British government and representatives of the Jewish Agency on the government's Palestine policy adjourned today until Monday. The adjournment is not to be interpreted as a breakdown in the negotiations but is merely to give the negotiators time to consider the demands made by the Jewish Agency and the contentions of the government's spokesmen.

In well-informed Jewish circles here no one believes that the White Paper will be completely withdrawn as a result of the conference but the Zionist tactics now are to lead the government, by means of the conference, to make the greatest possible concessions. The official stenographic report of the conversations that have been going on since Monday will not be available until next Monday.

The American non-Zionists are represented at the conference by Dr. Maurice Hexter, American member of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency, who is an unofficial observer. Another quasi-official observer is Prof. Harold Laski of the London School of Economics, a confidant of the British cabinet. Professor Laski, who has never taken any interest in Zionism is playing an important role in the government's consultation.

Warburg Kept Informed

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the chief spokesman of the Jews at the conference, is consulting James de Rothschild, Sir Herbert Samuel and Lord Reading on every move he makes. Meanwhile the Executive of the Jewish Agency and the Zionist Executive are holding private meetings in preparation for the resumption of negotiations on Monday. The wires are being kept hot between

London and New York, Dr. Weizmann and Dr. Hexter keeping Felix M. Warburg in constant touch with developments.

Meanwhile a new situation has arisen with a demand from many moderate British Zionists that the negotiations be broken off so long as Lord Passfield is one of those representing the British government at the conference. This demand came out into the open today in the form of a warning published in the Zeit, London's leading Yiddish paper, declaring frankly that Lord Passfield cannot conduct the negotiations because the Jewish people have no faith in him and can have no faith in any negotiations in which he plays a part.

Trial of Borscha Anti-Semites in Second Day

Bucharest, Nov. 19.—The second day of the trial of 80 anti-Semitic peasants accused of having set fire to Borscha last July when many Jewish homes were destroyed was limited to a further examination of the defendants. Petre Timis denied all the charges against himself and Constantin Danila. Mihail Grigore admitted some of the charges concerning the disturbances in Marmarosch. Ion Petcu also confessed to having been the guide of the anti-Semitic leaders and the intermediary in their correspondence.

A number of the lawyers for the defense insisted upon calling as a witness M. Juga, the police prefect of the Marmarosch district.

Ussishkin, J. N. F. Head, Leaves for United States

Jerusalem, Nov. 19.—Mendel Menachem Ussishkin, head of the Jewish National Fund, left for the United States today. At yesterday's meeting of the Jewish National Council he was instructed to represent the Palestine Jewish community while he was in America.

National Assembly Elections to Be Held December 15

Jerusalem, Nov. 19.—The elections to the Asefat Hanivcharim, the national assembly of Palestine Jews, will be held December 15, according to a report of the election committee to the Jewish National Council today. The assembly elects the Council.

Mexico Denies Reports of Impending Immigration of 40,000 Jews from Europe

Mexico City, Nov. 19.—The report in a number of leading Mexican papers that 40,000 Jews were about to arrive here from Poland and other countries of Eastern Europe was characterized as entirely unfounded in an official statement issued today by the Mexican state department. The state department declares that it has received no solicitation to permit 40,000 Jews to enter Mexico.

The statement adds that even if such an application were made it would probably be rejected in view of the fact that the recently enacted immigration laws establish barriers for all those unprepared to gain a foothold in the republic, and the Jews supposed to be on their way to Mexico are unfamiliar with agriculture and would have to seek a livelihood in commercial activities.

State department officials point out that the government's attitude is not to be interpreted as unfriendliness to Jewish immigrants because the department would take similar action against any group of immigrants unable to comply with the requirements of the new immigration laws which provide that all newcomers must be able to establish themselves economically and otherwise.

The government's denial is prominently featured in all Mexico City dailies and El Universal Grafico, which was the first to publish the reports of the impending mass immigration of Jews, blandly reprints the statement without comment. On the basis of these unfounded reports various chambers of commerce throughout the country have initiated a campaign to prevent the arrival of the Jewish immigrants.

League Unlikely to Act on White Paper Until Next Year

Geneva, Nov. 19.—Keen disappointment prevails here in various circles interested in the Palestine question over the probability that the League of Nations will not be able to take any action on the British White Paper much before a year from now in view of the fact that the present session of the Mandates Commission will end tomorrow without the Palestine problem's having been discussed.

The possibility still exists, however, that the Council of the League of Nations meeting in January will ask the Mandates Commission to hold a special session to consider the White Paper. But if the matter is postponed until the next ordinary session of the Mandates Commission in June 1931, the Council will not be in a position to consider that document until its meeting in September 1931.

Zionists Barred from General Amnesty in Crimean Republic

Moscow, Nov. 19.—Zionists are excluded from the general amnesty in Crimea which was issued today on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of the Crimean Soviet Republic.

Zionists are termed "anti-Soviet politicians" and are grouped with those sentenced for bribery and banditism, who are also excluded from the amnesty. Other prisoners, including criminals who were sentenced for not more than two years imprisonment or hard labor, will be released. All other political prisoners, arrested for "crimes" similar to those of the Zionists, will not be amnestied.

Weizmann and Warburg Should Resume Posts as Britain Has Reaffirmed Pledge, Times Says

Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Warburg should withdraw their resignations and resume their work on behalf of the Jewish Homeland in Palestine since the British government last Monday in Parliament reaffirmed its pledge to abide by the Mandate, declares an editorial in Wednesday's New York Times. Expressing the belief that Monday's debate clarified the Palestine issue, the editorial says:

"Fears concerning Great Britain's 'violation' of the pledges of the Balfour Declaration and of her obligations under the Palestinian Mandate must be dismissed after Mr. MacDonald's emphatic and specific restatement of them. He could not concede that the White Paper ever intended anything more than a 'pull-up' in the speed of Jewish work in Palestine as necessitated by conditions presumably temporary.

"With the promises of the Balfour Declaration solemnly reaffirmed and with official acknowledgement that Jewish development in Palestine must be thought of as grounded in permanent rights and not in the temporary exigencies of British colonial policy, the critics of the White Paper have won all they can seemingly ask for. It should be easily possible for Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Warburg to withdraw their resignations and resume their useful work for the Jewish people in Palestine — and also for their Arab neighbors."

Declaring that the main trouble in the present Palestine situation lies in the ambiguous working of the Palestine Mandate and the Churchill White Paper of 1922, an editorial in Wednesday's New York Times says:

"Confusion of purpose and a dual responsibility ambiguously defined have been present since the start. They still remain untouched by Mr. Mac-

Debate Gives Hope for Understanding, Adler Says; Lipsky Sees Negotiations Made Difficult; Wise, Straus Laud Lloyd George

"That the government is now willing to have a conference with representatives of the Jewish Agency gives ground for the hope that a proper understanding will be reached, although it is a great pity that such a conference was not held before the issuance of the White Paper."

This was the statement made yesterday by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee and now virtual head of the Jewish Agency, to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency in answer to a request for his opinion on the latest developments in the Palestine situation. With regard to Monday's debate in Parliament, Dr. Adler said that comment on Prime Minister MacDonald's statement now would be premature. "The debate as reported in the press is very interesting and it is gratifying to find that the subject of Palestine will not be made a question of British party politics," declared Dr. Adler.

By defending the White Paper, the British government makes it very difficult for the leaders of the Jewish Agency to enter into the proposed conference, since the government representatives already have their minds made up, according to the opinion expressed yesterday by Louis Lipsky, former president of the Zionist Organization of America and a member of the World Zionist Executive. "Only by removing the White Paper of Lord Passfield from present consideration can there be any practical value in the round table discussion proposed by Mr. MacDonald," said Lipsky.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Nathan Straus sent a cablegram on Tuesday to David Lloyd George, former Prime Minister of Great Britain and present head of the Liberal Party, in which they praised him for his attack on the White Paper in Parliament on Monday. "We are heartened by your reaffirmation of Britain's covenant with Israel and of every obligation it entails," they declared.

"The result of the Palestine debate in the House of Commons Monday evening must be regarded by Jews throughout the world as very unsatisfactory," declared Emanuel Neumann, chairman of the Committee on Public Information of the Zionist Organization of America and president of the Jewish National Fund. "Instead of clarifying the issue, the MacDonald government attempts to

Donald's assurance to the House of Commons that this government intends to keep faith with the Mandate."

Lloyd George was right in declaring on Monday that the White Paper must have been written by anti-Semitic officials, declares an editorial in Tuesday's Montreal Gazette, which declares that "it was just such a paper as a government would issue which intended ultimately to repudiate its pledges." Jewish work in Palestine receives high praise in the Gazette editorial.

"Certain it is that an effort must be made by the Agency to come to terms with the British government, if these terms do not involve the sacrifice of the principle of a Jewish National Homeland," Isidore D. Morrison, American Zionist leader, said, while Rabbi Israel Goldstein, president of Young Judea, declared that "Mr. MacDonald's remarks in the debate, while conciliatory in tone, are indefinite and non-committal in content, especially as taken together with the remarks by Mr. Drummond Shields, Under-Secretary for the Colonies, literally justifying the White Paper. There must be an end to equivocation."

Einstein Turns Down All Invitations on U. S. Visit

Berlin, Nov. 19.—Albert Einstein today asked the Jewish Telegraphic Agency to express thanks on his behalf for all the friendly invitation that have come to him from friends in the United States in connection with his impending visit there and to communicate his regrets at the impossibility of accepting any of them. Dr. Einstein has received numerous offers of hospitality from all parts of the United States as well as more than a score of invitations to address banquets, receptions and other public affairs.

Dr. Einstein expects to arrive in New York on the S. S. Belgenland, December 9th. He will remain in his cabin for three days or else stay incognito at some quiet hotel because he requires complete rest and peace not only for reasons of health but because of his work. Afterwards he will continue his trip to California by steamer.

Pasadena Jewry Planning Welcome to Dr. Einstein

Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 19.—Pasadena's Jewish community today began laying plans to welcome Dr. Albert Einstein, the great scientist who is coming here early in January for a series of lectures at the Pasadena Technical High School. Rabbi Henry L. Radlin, spiritual leader of Temple Israel, today cabled the following welcome to Professor Einstein: "Pasadena Jewish community greatly honored by your coming and is anxious to help make your visit to Southern California pleasant. We are proud to welcome you. Our facilities are at your disposal."

Pending a reply from Dr. Einstein, the officers and members of the board of directors of Temple Israel as well as the officers of all other Jewish organizations in Pasadena will meet shortly to arrange a formal welcome and reception to the great scientist.

Arabs Rejoice, Jews Sad at Results of Parliamentary Debate

Jerusalem, Nov. 19.—Arab and Jewish leaders here are divided in their attitude toward the results of yesterday's debate on Palestine in the British Parliament.

The Arab Executive, now in session, is considering a motion to cable a message of thanks to the British government for not retreating from the White Paper on Palestine, which was the subject of Monday's Parliamentary debate. A statement by the Arab Executive, signed by its leaders, Mussa Kazim Pasha, Faraj, Auni Bey and Moghanem, is expected to be issued on Wednesday for submission to the Palestine government. The statement will formally reiterate the Arab demands for a constitution, but will accept the policy of the White Paper.

A contrary attitude is assumed by the Jewish National Council of Palestine. At a special meeting tonight the Council debated a resolution for publication on Wednesday, denouncing the report of Sir John Simpson, upon which the White Paper policy was based, as "dishonest" and "resulting, like the report of the Shaw Inquiry Commission, from a conspiracy against the Jewish people. The government's endorsement of these treacherous documents is a violation of the solemn obligations made to the Jews," the resolution states. The Council also adopted a resolution demanding that no negotiations be undertaken with the government "on the basis of the White Paper."

A leading Arab who desires anonymity declared here today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the declaration made by the British government during the debate in the House of Commons "was a triumph for the middle-course of British statesmanship, which appreciates Jewish influence in the West and Arab influence in the East, as against Lord Passfield's pro-Arab group and Lloyd George's pro-Zionist group. The Arabs welcome the government's declaration, because the White Paper was not cancelled."

17 Drives Being Held for Allied Jewish Campaign

Headed by Louisville, with a quota of \$45,000, seventeen drives for the Allied Jewish Campaign are being held this week. The second largest quota on this week's list is that of Savannah, Georgia, for \$20,000. Next comes Mobile, Alabama with \$10,000; Tampa, Florida has undertaken to raise \$7,500; and Augusta, Georgia, and Pontiac, Michigan \$5,000 each. Niagara Falls, New York, has a quota of \$4,000 and Coatesville and Braddock, Pennsylvania, \$3,000 each.

The other communities holding drives this week are Willimantic, Conn.; La Crosse, Wisconsin; Muscatine, Iowa; Iowa City, Iowa; Vineland, New Jersey; Bridgeton, New Jersey; and Jamestown and Ellenville, New York.

Jewish Professor Finds New Rejuvenation Method

Riga, Nov. 19.—A new method of rejuvenation has been discovered by Prof. S. Lebedinsky of the Latvian University, it became known here today. Professor Lebedinsky's method consists of a slight operation lasting not more than a minute. It is entirely painless. Although no experiments have been made on humans, experiments on dogs have proven successful. Medical authorities who witnessed the operation on aged dogs and saw how the canines took on new energy and vigor are examining the possibilities of the rejuvenation method for humans.

British Press Varies on Palestine Parliament Debate

London, Nov. 18.—Varied opinion regarding yesterday's Parliamentary debate on Palestine is expressed today in the British press.

The Manchester Guardian finds that the government's defense during the debate was inconsistent and evasive. The Guardian believes, however, that the "government's reply meant an amendment for its sins," and welcomes the plan announced by the government during the debate for a loan of \$12,500,000 for land development in Palestine. The paper believes that the "land scheme will release land for Jews and increase the prosperity of Palestine, enabling the latter soon to relieve the British treasury."

The Evening Standard declares that the debate showed that the "Socialist government never wholly says what it means and seldom wholly means what it says. The impression is growing that the government spends afternoons explaining away what it did or did not do in the morning." Speaking of the widely criticized White Paper on Palestine, the Standard states that "if the White Paper was not intended to be a state document, it should not have been published, and if it was intended to be a state document, it should have been drafted clearly."

The Standard then speculates about the possible outcome of the Parliamentary by-election to be held on December 3 in the overwhelmingly Jewish constituency of Whitechapel, where the White Paper aroused great resentment. "If the White Paper will cause fluctuation in the Whitechapel by-election, then an era of more misunderstandings is coming," the Standard predicts.

The Daily Telegraph states that general surprise was expressed at the fact that Prime Minister MacDonald entrusted Albert Alexander, First Lord of the Admiralty, with making the final reply of the government during yesterday's Parliamentary debate, instead of giving that job to Arthur Henderson, Foreign Secretary, who is an abler man. Some people believe that Mr. Henderson declined the job, because he is dissatisfied with the work of Lord Passfield, Secretary for the Colonies, the Telegraph declares.

Urges Imperial Board Rule on Palestine Commitments

London, Nov. 19.—The authority to be created by the Imperial Conference for giving binding decisions on disputes between the British dominions might be a competent body to rule on the question of British commitments regarding Palestine, Lord Lloyd, former British High Commissioner in Egypt, suggests in a letter to the London Times in which he comments on the recent letter to the same paper by Sir John Simon and Viscount Hailsham.

Lord Lloyd, who was dismissed some months ago by the Labor government because of differences of opinion between himself and the cabinet regarding the British policy in Egypt, points out that Palestine's significance in the imperial scheme lies not only in its position on the Mediterranean alongside the Suez Canal and in the air route to India but also in the fact that it is becoming a "base for Soviet machinations against the Empire, being the springboard of Bolshevism in the East."

The immigration of Jews into Palestine from all parts of the world had the inevitable result, Lord Lloyd says of "affording the Soviets an opportunity to establish revolutionary agencies whose purpose is to foment dissatisfaction not only in Palestine but also in Egypt, Arabia and in the whole East. The fact that the White Paper caused world Jewry to denounce it as a piece of treachery of England only supports the contention that the whole question of promises and commitments be examined by an unquestionable authority."

U. S. Socialist Leaders Plan Memorial to Berger

A memorial will be built to the late Victor L. Berger of Wisconsin, one of the founders of the American Socialist Party and the founder and editor of the Milwaukee Daily Leader, as a result of a luncheon held this week at which a committee was chosen for this purpose. The committee will consist of Morris Hillquit, national chairman of the Socialist Party; Norman Thomas; B. Charney Vladek, manager of the Jewish Daily Forward; E. J. Costello, editor of the Milwaukee Leader, and Howard Y. Williams, executive secretary of the League for Independent Political Action.

Charities Get \$43,500 from Will of Mrs. Summerfield

Various charities will receive \$43,500 from the will of Mrs. Selina E. Summerfield, widow of Elias Summerfield, who left an estate appraised at \$1,769,941. The Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies will receive \$10,000, the Henry Street Settlement will get \$15,000, \$7,500 goes to Mount Sinai Hospital, \$5,000 to the Crippled Children's East Side Free School and \$1,000 each to six other charities.

the conference, every endeavor for an understanding will be useless as the "best intentions will fail so long as Lord Passfield will have to put them into effect." The paper goes further and reminds Dr. Weizmann that if he continues the negotiations with Lord Passfield he will have to answer for his action at the Zionist Congress because he is "violating the instructions of the political commission of the Jewish Agency that there can be no negotiations on the basis of the White Paper."

If Lord Passfield does not participate then it means that the Jewish Agency submits an outline of its demands which may or may not be touched upon in the White Paper but ignores the White Paper as such. The British government will do a greater service to itself and to its Palestine policy if it removes all Palestine questions from Lord Passfield's activities," the Zeit concludes.

The more extreme Zionists are of the opinion that under no circumstances should the Jewish Agency have started negotiations so long as the White Paper is not withdrawn.

London, Nov. 19.—The conference between the British government and the Jewish Agency leaders got down to business by starting with practical negotiations on the Jewish demands regarding the present British policy in Palestine. Lord Passfield, Colonial Secretary, Arthur Henderson, Foreign Secretary and Albert Alexander, First Lord of Admiralty, representing the government, listened to a long address by Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

Behind closed doors, Dr. Weizmann outlined the present Jewish viewpoint and what the Jews think they are entitled to get today from Great Britain. The government members, particularly Henderson, were especially attentive to Dr. Weizmann's presentation, and they expressed readiness for immediate point by point negotiations. Today's session lasted almost all day and will be continued tomorrow. Meanwhile Dr. Weizmann, Harry Sacher and Prof. Selig Brodetsky will report tonight at a closed meeting of the Zionist Executive on the results of today's negotia-

tions and also on the government's proposal.

Optimistic Feeling Prevails

While the details of Dr. Weizmann's representations to the government will not be made public until a full agreement has been reached, nevertheless an optimistic feeling prevails that a large part of his demands will be considered more favorable now after last night's historic and impressive pro-Jewish demonstration in the House of Commons.

The opening meeting of the conference held yesterday before the debate in Parliament was entirely devoted to matters of procedure since the Jewish Agency was not desirous of beginning the actual negotiations until the government had tested Parliament out on the Palestine question and until Premier MacDonald had declared from the floor of the House of Commons how the British government intended to modify the White Paper.

On the other hand the government representatives were interested in hearing yesterday from the Jewish Agency concrete proposals, thus making it possible to report during the debate that negotiations with the Jews were already under way.

Parliamentary By-Election in Whitechapel Set for Dec. 3

London, Nov. 19.—The Parliamentary by-election in Whitechapel, where the Liberal candidate is a Zionist leader, will be held December 3, it was announced today. The Labor party is seriously worried over the possible outcome of the election to fill the seat left vacant by the death of Harry Gosling, because the constituency is overwhelmingly Jewish and there is great resentment there against the government because of its Palestine policy.

The plan of the government to nominate Sir Stafford Cripps, Solicitor-General, for the vacant seat, has been given up, and James Hall has received the designation. T. L. B. Guinness, who unsuccessfully contested the same constituency at the last general election, is the Conservative nominee.

At the last election the Labor candidate polled 13,701 votes, receiving a majority of 9,180 votes. There is much speculation now whether the Laborites have a chance in Whitechapel in view of Jewish resentment against the White Paper and because of the Liberals' move in nominating Barnett Janner, a Zionist for the place.

Day and Morning Journal Disappointed at Debate; Forward Voices Satisfaction

The debate on Palestine in the British House of Commons on Monday does not leave the Jews in a better position than the one in which they were before the debate and it remains for the conference between the British government and the Jewish Agency to re-establish the good will between England and the Jews which the White Paper has destroyed, declares an editorial in the New York Day of Wednesday.

"The only one who really encouraged us during the entire debate was Lloyd George," says the editorial. "He spoke openly and emphatically when he said that only anti-Semites could have written the White Paper. He was right. Jews throughout the world felt that way immediately after the publication of the White Paper, and one needed the courage of a Lloyd George to hurl it openly into the face of England."

Jacob Fishman, in an editorial in Tuesday's issue of the New York Jewish Morning Journal declares that the first impression of the statements of Prime Minister MacDonald and Under-Secretary for the Colonies Shiels in Parliament on Monday is one of disappointment. Dr. Shiels' speech particularly, says Fishman, was a reflection of "his master's voice," the voice of Passfield. The government declarations in Parliament show that the Jewish fight must be continued, he says.

"The statement of Dr. Shiels that the government is planning to spend twelve and a half million dollars to colonize ten thousand families in Palestine has for us under the circumstances no significance. Dr. Shiels did not give any details about the colonization plan, but from the tone and contents of his speech one can surmise that this will be accomplished on the basis of Sir John Simpson's report, which means that those who will be colonized will be mostly, or entirely, Arabs."

The Jewish Daily Forward (Socialist) is satisfied with the outcome of Monday's debate. It says:

"Our comrades, who are now the representatives of the British government, in issuing the White Paper, simply made a mistake, a false and unjustified step. At the present moment this thought is even easier for us to express, for as it seems the false step was made by one of our comrades who is now at the helm of the British State, by Comrade Sidney Webb (Lord Passfield)."

"Now, after the debate, there has been created a basis for a mutual understanding in the Palestine situation. We hope that with the aid of cautious Jewish leaders and of more conscientious and honest Arab leaders a way out will in time be found."
