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500,000 Jews Helped by New Soviet Legislation Giving Artisans Rights

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Nov. 22—A law granting much-desired privileges and rights to 100,000 Jewish artisans was promulgated here today. This piece of legislation will improve the economic and social status of nearly half a million Jews in Russia because the privileges extended to the heads of families are also applicable to the entire family.

This latest of a series of ordinances aimed at improving the lot of former declassed Jews who are now being industrialized applies only to those artisans who are organized in artels, or artisans cooperatives. The chief aim of the law is to place these Jewish artisans in many ways on a plane of equality, or at least near equality with factory workers.

The law provides that the Jewish artisans are to receive foodstuffs under the same conditions as factory workers provided they work in artels employing not less than 30 persons, permits them to pay rent at the same rate as workers, entitles them to obtain sick benefits on a par with workers, grants them government pensions similar to those given factory employees, allows them to become members of any government cooperative, and permits their children to enter government schools with the same privileges accorded workers' children.

This sweeping law is being hailed in Jewish circles here as a rare piece of good fortune for the Jewish artisans who constitute a large section of the Jewish population.

American Owner of Doar Hayom Asks U. S. Aid in Suspension

Washington, Nov. 22—Secretary of State Stimson today received a letter from Jonah J. Goldstein, New York attorney, protesting, on behalf of Solomon White of Long Island City, against the action of the Palestine government in suspending Mr. White's newspaper, the Doar Hayom, which is published in Jerusalem.

Pointing out that the American government is a party to the agreement giving Britain the Mandate over Palestine, Mr. Goldstein, in his letter asks the intervention of the American government to the end that the ban should be lifted.

The Doar Hayom, Mr. Goldstein writes, was suspended because it took exception to the much-criticized Passfield White Paper. Mr. White, the publisher of the Doar Hayom, who is now in this country, is expected to come to Washington shortly to take up the matter of his paper's suspension with the State Department.

War Minister Retracts Slur on Jews of Hungary

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Nov. 22—A virtual retraction by Julius Goemboes, Hungarian minister of war, of his statement that Jews could not be admitted to the Hungarian Order of Heroes, today concluded the debate on this question in parliament where it had given rise to heated denunciations by the Jewish deputies and by the non-Jewish deputies of the Left and Middle parties.

Goemboes admitted that a cabinet officer is not entitled to conduct anti-Jewish agitation. Speaking in parliament, the war minister said he retreated from his previous attitude and declared that his speech at Keckskemet was his opinion as a private citizen but that he recognized that as a minister he must support the policy of equality for all religions which Chancellor Bethlen maintains.

The minister of war admitted that it was impossible to put into practice racial anti-Semitism because two members of the Bethlen cabinet are not 100 percent Hungarians, since one has a Jewish mother and the other has a Jewish wife. In retribution, M. Goemboes pointed out that the country's system of national defense, which he now heads, was created by Baron Fejervary, a descendant of Jews.

Borscha Jury Hears Danila Admit Voevod Supported Him

Bucharest, Nov. 22—A frank admission that the minister of education in the former Maniu cabinet, Dr. Alexander Vayda Voevod "warmly" supported him in his campaign of propaganda, or as he called it, education, among the Christian population of Borscha, Marmarech and Szighet was made today by Constantin Danila, anti-Semitic leader, and one of the 83 defendants being tried for participation in the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Borscha last July.

The fifth day of the trial at Satu-Mare was featured by the testimony of two aged Jews who told of being thrown out of their homes and then dumped into the river by Danila and another defendant, Timis. The two Jews, Jehu-

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Hitlerite Students Score in Munich University Elections

Berlin, Nov. 22—Hitlerite students scored a great victory today in the student elections at the University of Munich, one of the oldest universities in the country. The number of votes received by the Hitlerites doubled in comparison with last year's vote, the Hitlerites receiving 3,800 votes and becoming the strongest group in the university.

Crucial Point in Negotiations Between British Government and Jewish Agency Due Today

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 22—The crucial point in the negotiations between the British government and the Jewish Agency is expected to be reached Monday when the conference between representatives of both sides is due to resume its adjourned sessions. Meanwhile there still exists a wide diversion of views between the government and the Jewish Agency.

The Jewish spokesmen hold that the entirety of the problem should be reviewed without basing the negotiations on the recently issued White Paper which the Jewish leaders consider an unacceptable basis for discussion. While it does not seem likely that the government will rescind the White Paper or even introduce substantial changes a new interpretation of that document is assumed to be probable.

The most important aspects of the situation are the problems of land purchase, immigration and the antagonistic attitude of British officialdom in Palestine. Particular attention is devoted to the projected fund of \$12,500,000 to be chiefly spent on the settlement of Arabs. It is pointed out in Jewish circles that the Jews should secure fifty percent in the development scheme which provides for settling 10,000 families on the land, as being more in accord with the stipulations of the Palestine Mandate which impose upon the

Hitlerite Organ Demands Reich Act Against Jews Who Seek to Destroy Germany, Austria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Nov. 22—"If the present German government does not want to fight Jewish attempts to destroy Germany and Austria nothing remains but for all race conscious Germans to unite under the leadership of Hitler to combat these Jews who are a weltpest," the Voelkische Beobachter, organ of Adolf Hitler, writes in its current issue.

Reproducing in full the article written for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by Winston Churchill on the White Paper, the Voelkische Beobachter emphasizes Churchill's argument that the White Paper is an ungrateful act against the Zionists who supported the Allies during the World War. The Hitlerite mouthpiece interprets this argument as proof that organized Jewry is constantly conducting "well-planned activities to destroy the German-speaking countries."

The Beobachter demands that the German government "take strenuous measures against this organized crime," adding that if the government won't do it, Hitler's party will.

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Six National Jewish Groups to Confer in N. Y. on Bias Against Jews in Employment

Cincinnati, Nov. 22—Upon the invitation of the B'nai Brith, representatives of six national Jewish organizations will confer in New York, November 30 to consider the entire question of employment discrimination against Jews. The organizations which have accepted the invitation are the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the Jewish Welfare Board, the National Council of Jewish Women and the United Hebrew Trades.

All of these organizations have already discussed the employment problem as it affects Jews and have evidenced interest and concern in finding a possible solution. It is agreed by each of them that before any effective action can be planned the facts in the case must be accurately ascertained. It is hoped that out of the forthcoming conference will come a united effort for a survey of the entire field of employment in relation to opportunities for Jewish workers.

The B'nai Brith will be represented at the conference by its international president, Alfred M. Cohen, its executive director, Dr. I. M. Rubinow, Sigmund Livingstone, chairman of its anti-defamation league and Judge A. K. Cohen of Boston. The American Jewish Committee will be represented by its secretary, Morris D. Waldman and by Dr. Lee K. Frankel, David A. Brown, Dr. Harry S. Linfield, and Dr. Jacob Billikopf. The American Jewish Congress will have as its delegates its president, Bernard Deutsch, its secretary, Bernard G. Richards, and George Z. Medalie, Nathan D. Perlman and Israel Thurman. The Jewish Welfare Board will be represented by Benjamin Buttenweiser, Joseph Rosenzweig, Henry J. Bernstein and Harry L. Gluckman.

The delegates of the National Council of Jewish Women will be: Mrs. Abraham H. Arons, Mrs. Maurice L. Golman, Mrs. Francis D. Pollak and Mrs. Estelle D. Sternberger.

Over \$1,000,000 Spent by J. D. C. During Last Year on Reconstruction in Eastern Europe, Dr. Kahn Reports

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Over one million dollars has been spent by the American Joint Distribution Committee during the last year for reconstruction work among the Jews of Eastern Europe, declared Dr. Bernard Kahn, European director of the committee, in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on his arrival in this country Friday. This sum, Dr. Kahn pointed out, has enabled the realization of only half of the work planned by the Committee in the last year.

Dr. Kahn is here to report to the Executive Committee of the Joint Distribution Committee, which since the World War has spent more than \$100,000,000 on reconstruction activities among East European Jewries. His chief aim is "to enlist the aid of American Jewry for the continuance of assistance in the reconstruction work in Europe which of late has diminished. European Jewish leaders are well aware of the present economic crisis in America," Dr. Kahn said, "but they are ready to carry on with their reconstruction work despite the great reduction in funds from America and despite the fact that European countries too are suffering from an economic depression in which the Jews suffer most."

Leaders Have Courage

"Leaders of Jewry in Europe have the moral courage to go on with their work because they are convinced that the present slack in financial assistance from American Jewry is only temporary, and they feel sure that the American Jews will again generously assist their brethren in Europe as soon as economic conditions in the United States improve. Without this conviction the reconstruction work among the Jews of Europe would have broken down," Dr. Kahn declared.

Referring to the work of the Jewish Cooperative Societies of Eastern Europe, Dr. Kahn pointed out that over 700 of these had been established and subsidized by the Foundation and the

Ica in 13 countries and districts of Eastern Europe. In Poland alone there are 520. Over 600 free loan societies were founded in Poland and subsidized by the Joint Distribution Committee. Dr. Kahn also pointed to the Joint Distribution Committee's work in subsidizing the medical societies, which do notable medical work among the Eastern Jews and to its financial assistance to Jewish Child Care Societies, schools, orphanages, camps and hospitals in Eastern Europe.

Hopeful on Palestine Policy

Touching on the statement of Premier MacDonald during the parliamentary debate on Palestine, Dr. Kahn, who is a member of the Executive of the Jewish Agency, says that shortly before the debate opened he had a long conversation with Dr. Weizmann and Dr. Hexter in Paris on the eve of his sailing. He learned of the parliamentary debate when he landed in New York and therefore would make no comment on it but he hoped that negotiations between the Agency and the British government would finally bring about satisfactory results.

Sundheim to Head Philadelphia \$1,500,000 Jewish Drive

Philadelphia, Nov. 22—Harry G. Sundheim, a director of the Federation of Jewish Charities, and a leader in cultural and philanthropic endeavor, will head the forthcoming annual maintenance campaign of the Federation of Jewish Charities, according to an announcement made by Lessing J. Rosenwald, president of the Federation.

Organized originally in 1901 and then reorganized and enlarged in 1918 the Federation of Jewish Charities is the parent body of all local Jewish philanthropy provided for every need and emergency. To carry out its program the Federation spends approximately \$1,500,000 annually on the maintenance of its various institutions. Though it is a Jewish philanthropic agency a considerable portion of its activity, especially in its medical institutions and at its health centers, is carried on without regard to race, creed, or color. Louis Wolf, Judge Horace Stern and Justin P. Allman are the honorary presidents of the Federation with Mr. Rosenwald, president. Dr. Jacob Billikopf is executive director of the Federation.

The campaign this year will be launched officially with a community dinner on Sunday evening, January 4th.

Libby Jacobson Heads New England Junior Hadassah

Boston, Nov. 22—Libby Jacobson of this city was elected regional president of the New England Junior Hadassah at the regional conference held in Hartford over the past week-end. The region comprises Junior Hadassah units from Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Ochs Named Chairman of Jewish Education Association Dinner

Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the New York Times and national leader in civic and Jewish communal affairs, has accepted the honorary chairmanship of the Jewish Education Association dinner which will take place December 14th at the Commodore Hotel. The announcement of Mr. Ochs' acceptance was made by Mark Eisner, chairman of the Arrangements Committee of the function.

The invitation to Mr. Ochs was presented by Israel Unterberg, president of the Jewish Education Association, and Dr. David de Sola Pool, secretary of the executive committee. Mr. Ochs has for a number of years been interested in the work of the association. He has also taken a leading part in the activities of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations and the Hebrew Union College.

Warn Hitlerites Against Anti-Semitism on International Road

Berlin, Nov. 22—The Democratic press today warns the Hitlerites against introducing anti-Semitism into the international communications system of Germany as such a policy would not only work to keep Jews and foreigners from using German transportation lines but would impel them to avoid passing through Germany.

The Hitlerites have begun a campaign to rid the Mitropa line, an international road passing through Holland, Italy and other countries, of Jews and foreigners. As the first step in this drive they are seeking to replace the Jewish and foreign employees on the dining and sleeping cars of the Mitropa with Hitlerites.

Cincinnati Jew to Seek Ban on Passion Play

Cincinnati, Nov. 22—The Freiberg Passion Play scheduled to be staged at the Music Hall the week beginning Dec. 14 may not be produced here if negotiations being carried on by the anti-defamation commission of the B'nai Brith succeed.

The matter was called to the attention of the B'nai Brith by Henry Segal, editor of the American Israelite. As a result a meeting was held with George Leavitt, representing the Cincinnati Federation of Men's Bible Classes and Dr. I. M. Rubinow, international secretary of the B'nai Brith; Leonard H. Freiberg, president of District No. 2 and member of the commission; Rabbi Victor E. Reichert president of the Cincinnati Jewish Ministers' Association and Segal in attendance.

Later, Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Constitutional Grand Lodge, B'nai Brith; Rubinow, Dr. David Philipson of Rockdale Avenue Temple and Freiberg sent a letter to the Music Hall Association protesting against a semi-public institution being used for performance of a Passion Play that would foment religious prejudices.

Leo J. Brumleve, secretary of the Music Hall Association, has promised to call it to the attention of the trustees. Meanwhile Dr. Philipson, Rabbi James G. Heller of Plum Street Temple; Dr. Frank Nelson, rector of Christ Church and Rev. H. P. Atkins, secretary of the Cincinnati Federation of Churches had a conference this week and expect to obtain indefinite postponement of the showing here.

Hebrew High School Opened in Newark Under Y. Auspices

Newark, Nov. 22—The first Hebrew high school has been established here under the Y. M.-Y. W. H. A. auspices. With an enrollment of 21 pupils to start, classes are held twice a week and the subjects consist of Advanced Hebrew, History and the Bible. Three scholarships have already been established; one in memory of the late Louis B. Lesser, and two others by Aaron Levinstone and B. Z. Ginsburg in memory of the late Etta G. Levinstone.

Existence of J.D.C. Influences European Powers' Attitude Toward Jews, Waldman Says

That there is such an organization as the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, which, as the representative of the Jews in this country, is vitally concerned with the situation of the Jews of Eastern Europe has a decided influence on the attitude of governments toward them, is pointed out by Morris D. Waldman, secretary of the American Jewish Committee in a report to the Allied Jewish Campaign, made public yesterday at its national offices, 415 Lexington Avenue.

The Joint Distribution Committee, Mr. Waldman says in his report, creates confidence in the minds of the struggling European Jewry masses that their determination to win out will be backed up by the Jews of America.

"The Joint Distribution Committee has taught the Jews of Eastern Europe the value of organized effort on their own part for the solution of their economic problems," Mr. Waldman says in his report. "The development of co-operatives, in spite of many disheartening experiences, into national systems covering a number of East European countries, has raised the Jewish morale in those lands, and at the same time has added to their ability to resist the complete demoralization that otherwise would, in all likelihood, have resulted from their dreadful poverty. This is all the more noteworthy when it is taken into account that before the war there were comparatively few Jewish credit co-operatives anywhere in Europe, and that when the first broached, large numbers of Jews in Europe resisted the project, including many who are now beneficiaries of the system.

Aleph Zadik Aleph to Extend Jewish Scouting Work

The plan of the Aleph Zadik Aleph, junior division of the B'nai Brith, to extend scouting to many Jewish communal institutions throughout the United States was endorsed at the last meeting of the executive board of the Jewish Committee on Scouting of the Boy Scouts of America.

A resolution was passed at the annual convention of the Aleph Zadik Aleph held recently, adopting Boy Scout work as a feature of the program of the junior order. This would mean that 125 local A. Z. A. chapters throughout the United States would actively sponsor the organization and maintenance of Boy Scout troops in many Jewish communal institutions within their reach. Many of the leaders of this Junior Fraternal Order are college students or the younger progressive professional and business men of the community, to whom Scouting makes a strong appeal.

Twelve of the largest national Jewish bodies comprise the constituent organizations of the Jewish Committee on Scouting, of which Dr. Cyrus Adler of Philadelphia is chairman.

Hebrew U. Invited by Harvard to Excavate in Palestine

London, Nov. 22—The Hebrew University of Jerusalem was invited by Harvard University to participate in a project for excavating on the site of Samaria, Palestine, it was disclosed today after the annual meeting of the British School of Archaeology. The Hebrew University will be represented by a member of its staff, Dr. E. L. Sukenik, who has already done considerable exploring in Palestine.

Others invited by Harvard are the Palestine Exploration Fund, the British Academy and the British School of Archaeology. Although actual work will not begin until March the necessary workshops are now being built and the labor needed for the expedition is being organized.

Isaac Cohen, Pioneer California Jew, Dead at 82

Los Angeles, Nov. 22—Isaac Cohen, one of the pioneer Jews of Southern California, is dead here at the age of 82. Coming to California from Germany in 1868 he settled in Anaheim of which town he was later mayor. Later he was mayor of Redondo Beach. For 40 years he was a member of the state central Democratic committee. He was a charter member of the Los Angeles Turnverein, having been president and secretary. In 1918 he retired from business. He is survived by a widow, a daughter, two sons and a brother.

Survey Proposes Jewish Federation for Worcester

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Worcester, Mass., Nov. 22—The immediate formation of a Jewish Welfare Federation in Worcester to make possible a coordinated and aggressive program for local Jewry is urged in the survey of the Worcester Jewish community which was issued late today. A budget of \$80,000 annually was named as a sum sufficient to care for local charitable and social work as well as to handle national and international Jewish activities.

The survey just completed by investigators from the Jewish School of Social Research, New York, also urges further concentration and widening the scope of the work now being done by the United Jewish Charities.

The proposed federation would include the Charities, the Jewish Home for Aged and Orphans, the Y.M.H.A. and the Worcester Hebrew Free Loan Society, the report declares. Such a plan will draw together the various Jewish groups into an effective working unit.

That the Jews of Worcester form a great proportion of those included in non-Jewish organizations is revealed by the survey. Jews form 40% of the total of all members using the gymnasium facilities of the Y.M.C.A. while out of a total membership of 2,214 in the same organization more than 10% are professedly Jewish.

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Eastern and Central Europe which is of the utmost importance," Mr. Waldman said. Orthodox Congregations Union Have New Plan of Activity

A new plan of activity for the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations for the coming year was presented at a recent meeting of the Union by Isaac Rosengarten, the newly elected executive director of the Union. The plan calls for the appointment by each congregation of five committees, one each for Sabbath, Kashruth, Jewish Education, Family Purity and Palestine. It is planned to have the Union act as a unifying force in bringing together all those working for each of these phases of Orthodox Judaism.

A resolution denouncing the British White Paper on Palestine was adopted by the meeting, after an address by the Rev. Dr. H. Pereira Mendes, one of the founders of the Union, who recently returned from a visit to Palestine. Jews have every reason to be proud of what they have accomplished in Palestine, said Dr. Mendes, but England seems to have gone back on her word.

Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, president of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, was chairman at the meeting. The headquarters of the Union have recently been moved to the Yeshivah College Building.

Yiddish Books at Hebrew University Increased to 7,500

The collection of Yiddish books at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem has increased to more than 7,500 as a result of a gift of \$5,000 from David Shapiro, publisher of the New York Yiddish Day, according to a report received by the American Advisory Committee of the Hebrew University, of which Felix M. Warburg is chairman. Important Yiddish collections from the late Dr. Chaim Spivak's library in Denver and the library of the late Dr. Joseph Hazonovich of Warsaw have also been received by the library of the Hebrew University.

One Arab student, the report states, has registered this year at the Jerusalem University. The student group this year includes one student from Canada and a large group from Poland. During the past semester, sixty students registered in the course in Hebrew literature conducted by Prof. Joseph Klausner, this being the largest registration for any course.

Dr. Hugo Bergmann, librarian of the Hebrew University, also reports that among the most valuable contributions received by the library recently are the gifts of Emanuel Hertz of New York City. Books written in various languages used by Jews are being collected by the university library.

Jewish Council Women Aid Government's Employment Drive

The National Council of Jewish Women is assisting President Hoover's Emergency Committee for Employment, in the effort to meet the present employment problem throughout the United States, and is extending its co-operation to prevent human suffering and to alleviate the present situation. A survey of the Newark and Bayonne, N. J., communities has been completed by the department of vocational guidance and employment of the National Council of Jewish Women, according to Mrs. Francis D. Pollak, national chairman of the department.

It is hoped that the establishment of Junior Camps will give the older members of the Order an opportunity to bring up their children in a Zionist spirit.

The Ohabei Zion Camp, No. 2 is the first to establish a Junior Camp.

Baltimore Educator Named to Jerusalem School Post

Baltimore, Nov. 22—Dr. Moses Seidel who for the last eight years has been supervisor of the Board of Jewish Education in Baltimore, will leave here Sunday for Palestine, where he will become principal of the Teachers' Training School for Girls at Jerusalem.

A graduate of the University of Berne, Switzerland, Dr. Seidel came to America in 1912 and for several years was connected with the Rabbinical Seminary of New York as instructor of the Bible and Hebrew. Numbering 1,200 pupils, six schools have been under his supervision here.

The school of which he will become principal in Jerusalem has more than 200 pupils and is under supervision of the Mizrahi.

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
