Reform Jews Win in Berlin Kehillah Elections

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 1—The Reform Jews of Berlin emerged completely victorious in the elections for the local Jewish Kehillah which took place yesterday. The Reform Jews received an absolute majority over all parties, defeating the Zionists who had wrested control of the Berlin Kehillah from them four years ago. Up to 1926 the Reform Jews had been in continuous control of the Berlin Kehillah for over a century.

They polled 41,000 votes yesterday and elected 24 representatives on the Kehillah Council. The Zionist "Volks-partei" polled 26,000 votes and elected 15 representatives. The Poale-Zion, the Middle Party and the other parties elected one representative each. The Orthodox party, which was once a power in the Kehillah, was completely routed, not being able to elect its one candidate, the famous Dr. Nathan Birnbaum. Other factions which were defeated were the "German" party, which is hostile to East-European Jews, and two lists of East-European Jews.

Roumanian Anti-Semitic Student Congress Gets Official Welcome

Bucharest, Dec. 1—An official reception was accorded to the Congress of Christian Students which met today in Braila. In spite of numerous Jewish protests against official association with this anti-Semitic organization, the police prefect of Braila officially greeted the Congress, saying that the citizens of the town were honored by the decision to hold the Congress there.

A letter was also read from Zelea Codreanu, anti-Semitic leader, who promised to attend tomorrow's session. Greetings were also extended to the Congress by representatives of Polish, Czech and French students and by M. Musichescu, an architect, representing the League of Christian National Defense. He declared that all foreigners and undesirables "are only Jews," making it clear to the representatives of the foreign students that the Congress aims only at fighting the Jews.

Denmark Bans Lecture By Hitlerite Leader

Copenhagen, Dec. 1—To avoid any incident which might lead to a conflict between Germany and Denmark, the Danish government today prohibited a lecture scheduled here by Joseph Goebbels, Berlin leader of the National Socialist party. Goebbels had been invited by a Danish Fascist student organization. In banning the lecture the government followed the opinion of the local press which feared that the lecture might lead to a clash.

Jews in Danger if Anti- Soviet Plot Succeeded, Unnamed Professor Says

Moscow, Dec. 1—The lot of the Russian Jews would have been disastrous as a result of a wave of pogroms, had the plans of the anti-Soviet plotters now on trial been carried out, according to a statement made today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency by a professor of the Moscow University who does not wish to give his name.

The professor said that Professor L. K. Ramzin, confessed leader of the anti-Soviet conspiracy, was a pronounced anti-Semite, who often clearly revealed his Jew-hatred, and that his plans included anti-Jewish pogroms.

The names of the old Menshevik leader, R. Abramovitch who is now in Berlin, and Dr. Paul Miliukov, leader of the old Constitutional Democrats, who is now in Paris, were mentioned at today's hearing during the evidence given by Professor Fedoroff, one of the anti-Soviet plotters now on trial. Professor Fedoroff said that Abramovitch and Miliukov had been in contact with the Ramzin group, promising their assistance in case of a coup d'etat in Russia.

Nazis Spokesman Admits Party Seeks to Force New Elections

Berlin, Dec. 1—That the National Socialists are planning to force new elections to the Reichstag and the Prussian diet was revealed today by Gregor Strasser, parliamentary Fascist leader, at a meeting in Munich. The reason for compelling new elections, he said, is the refusal of Chancellor Bruening to appoint Fascists as ministers of defence and the interior.

In view of this refusal the Fascists will seek a new election, he stated, in the hope that the results will give them control and thus enable them to name an entire Fascist cabinet.

Poland to Name Under- Secretary for Minorities

Warsaw, Dec. 1—A special under-secretary for minorities will be appointed by Premier Walery Slawek as soon as he completes his new cabinet. Leading candidates for the post are Prof. Simon Askenazy and the Jewish deputy, Henry Rosmarin. It is likely, however, that a Jew will not be appointed, the government preferring to name a Ukrainian deputy of the pro-government bloc in view of the difficulties with the Ukrainian minority in Galicia.

Wailing Wall Commission Concludes Deliberations

Geneva, Dec. 1—The international Wailing Wall Commission today concluded its deliberations after meeting in Paris for three days. Judge Charles Barde, one of the commissioners, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today. The last meeting was held Saturday and the report was unanimously adopted. It is to be forwarded to the British government within the next ten days. M. Barde said that the Commission itself would not publish the report but it is possible that the British government may do so.

The Commission of three has spent several weeks in Palestine investigating the claims of Moslems and Jews to the Wailing Wall.

Jewish Agency-Government Parley Will Reconvene

London, Dec. 1—The conference between the British government and the Jewish Agency to clear up doubts regarding the compatibility between passages in the White Paper and certain articles in the Palestine Mandate will be resumed today after more than a week's adjournment, the Daily Herald, government organ reports.

Baron Groedel, Wealthy Hungarian Jew, Dead

Budapest, Dec. 1—Baron Hermann Groedel, a member of one of the most prominent Jewish families in Hungary, died here today at the age of 75. Known as one of the wealthiest members of the pre-war Jewish aristocracy in the late Austro-Hungarian Empire, the Baron was famous for his liberal philanthropies to various Jewish causes. The large timber enterprises which he operated employed many thousands of people.

Recall Role of Jews in 1830 Polish Insurrection

Warsaw, Dec. 1—A memorial stone in honor of the Polish patriots who fell in the insurrection of 1830, in defending the arsenal, which is now a prison, was unveiled today in the centre of the Warsaw Jewish quarter on Nalewki Square.

Thousands of Jews participated and special memorial services were held in the synagogues. During the 1830 insurrection not only the Jews of Congress Poland but also of Vohlynia and White Russia helped the insurrectionists against the Czarist armies. The Jewish press publishes today hitherto unknown archives containing material regarding the Jewish participation in the Polish insurrection.

Plan Study of Phases of Employment as They Affect Jews of United States

Plans for an intensive study of the various phases of the employment problem as they affect Jews were made at a conference of representatives of six national Jewish organizations held Sunday at the Hotel Astor at the call of the B'nai B'rith, according to a statement issued today to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The conference resulted in the formation of a national conference on Jewish employment with representatives from each of the groups that responded to the call of the first conference.

The study will be made by a general committee which will submit its findings to another conference to be held in New York on January 4. The conference elected the following officers: Alfred M. Cohen, of Cincinnati, president of the B'nai B'rith, chairman; Dr. I. M. Rubinow, executive secretary of the B'nai B'rith, secretary; and Estelle M. Sternberger, executive secretary of the National Council of Jewish Women, associate secretary.

The following representatives of the six organizations attended the conference: American Jewish Committee; Morris D. Waldman, Harry Schneiderman, Dr. Lee K. Frankel, Jacob Biliakopf, Dr. Harry S. Russian Jew Flees Across Dniester Into Rumania

Kishenev, Dec. 1.—The Rumanian border police today arrested in Kriulian, on the River Dniester, a Jew who swam over the river from the Russian side. The arrested Jew explained to the police that he was delegated by 140 Jews who are now gathered at the Soviet-Rumanian border waiting for the Dniester to freeze in order to pass into Roumania over the frozen river.

"These Jews delegated me to ask the Rumanian authorities to permit them to remain in Roumania until they would be able to proceed to their relatives in the United States and South America. They are willing to be kept in concentration camps until the possibility for proceeding further arrives," the arrested Jew explained.

The Jewish community of Kishenev is therefore now urged to take up the question of how legally to assist those Soviet Jews who risk their lives and cross the Dniester into Roumania. The Bessarabian Jewish and Russian newspapers predict that when the Dniester becomes frozen, Jews from Soviet Russia will flood the border cities as they did in the 1920-1923 period, when Soviet Russia suffered from a famine.

Einstein Leaves Berlin for Second Visit to America

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Accompanied by his wife and Dr. Walter Mayer, his research assistant, Prof. Albert Einstein, left here last night for Antwerp on the first leg of his second trip to the United States. Because the hour of his departure was kept secret, Dr. Einstein was seen off only by his two daughters, his son-in-law and M. Planck, Nobel prize winner in physics in 1918.

Dr. Einstein was very cheerful and told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that his sole destination was Pasadena where he expected to begin research work immediately upon his arrival. He took particularly warm leave of his stepdaughter, Margot, who was married yesterday to Dr. Dmitri Marianoff, noted Russian scientist and writer.

Jewish Fraternities to Raise \$50,000 for J. N. F.

Four hundred delegates attending a meeting of New York Jewish fraternities at the Hotel Pennsylvania on Sunday pledged themselves to raise \$50,000 during the coming year for the Jewish National Fund, for the purchase and reclamation of land in Palestine. Dr. Samuel Margoshes, editor of the Jewish Day, presided at the meeting.

Nathan D. Perlman, Grand Master of the Independent Order of B'rith Abraham, was one of the speakers, emphasizing the need for immediate action toward securing Jewish land in Palestine.

Weizmann Says His Dual Resignations Will Stand

London, Dec. 1.—"We do not accept and will not accept the White Paper, and so far as it depends on us, future Palestine laws must not be based on the spirit or letter of the White Paper," Dr. Chaim Weizmann declared at a meeting in Finsbury Park yesterday in reference to the Jewish Agency's negotiations with the British government.

The speculations regarding the postponement of these negotiations, Dr. Weizmann discredited and hinted that they were spread by people with sinister motives. He explained that while there has been a short delay it was inevitable in view of the nature of the negotiations. Referring to attacks on him in the London press in connection with his resignation, Dr. Weizmann said that his resignation stands and added that the time has come for other people to try their hand at leadership.

At the same time he expressed the hope that those who succeed him will be spared the disappointments which have been his lot. Touching on the by-election in Whitechapel he stated that the Zionist movement is far-flung "and it is incumbent on us to observe strict neutrality so far as political issues in each country are concerned. The Zionist movement has friends and enemies in each party."

Abandon Plan for Arab- Jewish Publishers Parley

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—Issa Elissa, editor of the Christian Arab newspaper Falastin, withdrew his proposal for an Arab-Jewish press conference to protest against press censorship owing to the practically unanimous opposition of all Arab newspapers which favor a separate Arab meeting instead. It is understood that all the Arab newspapers are supporting the contention of the organ of the Jerusalem Grand Mufti, Aljamea El-Arabia, that "Jews would exploit the proposed joint-meeting for proclaiming the possibility of Arab-Jewish cooperation everywhere."

The Iraq parliament, after considering the appeal of the chairman of the Palestine Arab Executive, Mussa Kazim Pasha, to assist the Palestine Arabs and help them extricate themselves from their desperate situation, telegraphed today to the London League against modification of the British White Paper on Palestine, according to reports from Bagdad.

Samolovitch Planning Trip to North Pole Next Year

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Commander Rudolph Samolovitch of the Soviet ice-breaker Krassin, that rescued the members of the tragic Noble expedition, is now visiting Berlin. Commander Samolovitch announced today that he is making preparations to reach the North Pole next year and that he will take along three aeroplanes with the Krassin expedition.

Landmannschaften to Unite to Assist Relatives in Europe Through Ort

Over two million dollars every year is sent in petty contributions by small Landmann organizations to their needy relatives and friends in the "home town" in Russia, according to a statement made by L. B. Bousin, chairman of the Landmannschaft Department of the American Ort, at an Ort meeting in the Hotel Pennsylvania on Sunday. The meeting was attended by about 150 officials of such Landmann organizations, who resolved for the first time to band together and, through the Ort, combine their efforts to make their relief work more effectual.

The new plan for thus extending the activities of the Ort, which had hitherto confined itself largely to raising its funds through big unit contributions from wealthy philanthropists, was set forward by Murray Levine, president of the American Ort.

Dr. B. Dubovsky acting chairman of the American Ort, then reported on the agreement made between representatives of the Ort in Moscow with the Russian government. The Narcomsoez, which is the Central Welfare Committee of the Soviet authorities in Ukraina, agrees that the government shall furnish declassified Jews with raw material, space for factories, and credits, provided that the Jews find a way of securing part of the money necessary for the equipment of their factories.

Extends Landsmannschaften

"There is no reason why we should not extend the Landsmannschaft organization throughout America," said Mr. Levine. "Dozens of such small relief societies exist in every city. Acting together, they could accomplish remarkable work."

The representatives of the "home-town" organizations present at the meeting agreed to cooperate with the Ort, adopting a series of resolutions to that effect. Formation of a permanent body to be called the "Landsmannschaften Council" was recommended, as well as formations of ladies auxiliaries and a national advisory council.

One of the resolutions adopted by the Conference called upon "each and every Landsmannschaft to join in the work of the Landsmannschaft department of the Ort, and in the reorganization of that department on a broader basis, in order to work out a comprehensive plan for the assistance by the Landsmannschaften of this country of their native cities and towns in the old world, and to transform the stream of charity now going from this country to the old world into a channel of constructive relief."

Jewish Architect Wins Prominent Swiss Prize

Zurich, Dec. 1.—Louis Parness, a 25-year old Jewish architect, was announced as the winner today of the first prize in the architectural contest for the plans for the new surgical clinic of the University of Zurich.

German Jews Give Synagogue to Catholics in Bavaria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 1.—The Jewish community of Pfalz in Bavaria today donated the synagogue in the town of Wattenheim, which is under its jurisdiction, to the Catholics of that town. The synagogue has not been used for a number of years. This action of the Pfalz Jewish community is due to the dissolution of the Jewish community of Wattenheim as a result of the removal of the Wattenheim Jews to the larger cities.

Hitlerites Make More Gains in Municipal Elections

Berlin, Dec. 1.—The constant growth of the National Socialist movement was again demonstrated yesterday when the Nazis made impressive gains in the municipal elections in Bremen, Luebeck and Bielefeld. Doubling their best previous vote in Bremen, the Nazis now have 32 of the 89 members of the municipal council as compared with only two before.

In Luebeck they won 7 seats of a total of 17 while in Bielefeld they polled 22,000 as compared with 16,000 in the last general elections.

Egyptian Jewish Communities Deny Support for Waft

Cairo, Dec. 1.—Egyptian Jewry as a body is not identified with any political party but stands for the King and the Egyptian nation states a letter published today under the joint signatures of the president of the Cairo and Alexandria Jewish communities. The letter was provoked by the announcement of M. Fargeon, a Jewish attorney, who, claiming to speak for a Union of Liberal Jews, declared the Union was ready to join the Waft and fight for a constitution.

The announcement had caused considerable annoyance to Jewish leaders and created surprise in government circles.

Favors Ban on All Aliens Unsuited to U. S. Needs

Washington, Dec. 1.—A recommendation that all immigration to the United States be limited to aliens who are qualified for special work that is needed in this country is contained in the annual report of James J. Davis, retiring Secretary of Labor, for the fiscal year which ended June 30th. Mr. Davis would, however, exempt from this rule immigrants who are near relatives of those who reside in the U. S. A.

The Secretary of Labor urges a law providing for the deportation of alien radicals and habitual lawbreakers. Mr. Davis also recommends the enactment of a law providing for the revocation of citizenship of persons who commit felonies or acts of gross immorality within five years subsequent to their acquisition of citizenship.

Jewish Labor Here to Raise \$500,000 for Workers in Palestine

Jewish labor in the United States, organized to help Jewish labor in Palestine, answered the British White Paper by quadrupling its Palestine quota in a \$500,000 campaign that was launched at the annual convention of the organization, which closed Sunday evening.

Over 800 delegates attended the convention at the Irving Plaza hall on Friday and Sunday, while more than 2,000 sympathizers were present at the Saturday evening meeting at Carnegie Hall.

Speakers Rouse Enthusiasm

David Ben-Gurion, general secretary of the Histadruth, the Jewish labor organization of Palestine, was the principal speaker at several of the convention sessions. Hannah Chizik, one of the leading women workers of Palestine, several times roused the enthusiasm of the delegates, who came from all parts of the United States and Canada to attend the meetings. Joseph Baratz, one of the founders of Digania colony, gave the workers a straight, factual picture of what was going on in the fields in Palestine, told them what help was needed.

Last year the National Labor Committee for the Jewish Workers of Palestine raised \$174,845. It was the most they had ever raised.

This year, as speaker after speaker emphasized the necessity of carrying on Jewish labor in spite of all difficulties imposed by Great Britain's political attitude, the workers became convinced of the necessity of making a tremendous effort. At the Saturday evening mass meeting, a campaign for half a million dollars was launched.

Abraham Cahan, editor of the Jewish Daily Forward, was one of the speakers at the meeting. He told enthusiastically of his contact with the pioneer workers, the Chaltzim, on his visit to Palestine. Abraham Shipiloff presided at the meeting.

Pledge Aid to Palestine

While the workmen pledged themselves to carry on their efforts for Palestine, they were not hesitant in denouncing the action of the British Labor government in issuing the White Paper. A resolution was passed reserving the rights of the Jewish people to establish a homeland in Palestine, and calling upon Great Britain to remove the obstruction to the "establishment of harmonious relations between the Jews and the Arabs" set up by the White Paper.

Mr. Ben-Gurion asserted that Sir John Simpson, who made the Palestine investigation and report on which the White Paper is based, had been very earnest in his enquiry, but that the data furnished to Sir John Simpson by immigration and land officials in Palestine was not always full or correct. He criticized such methods as an "airplane survey" which the investigation used to determine the amount of cultivable land available in the hill country.

Polish Zionists Name Body to Deal with Election Results

Warsaw, Dec. 1.—A committee of five, two Zionists, two Mizrahists and one representative of the Central Committee, was appointed today by the Polish Zionist Council to deal with the situation created as a result of the recent Sejm elections. Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, leader of the Polish Zionists, who outlined the situation, pointed out that the Jewish Parliamentary Club will not be represented in the various Sejm committees owing to its small number of deputies.

While some members of the Council suggested that the Agudist deputy be included in the Club, Deputy Gruenbaum opposed this, suggesting instead an understanding with the German deputies to make possible the election of Jewish deputies to Sejm committees. Deputy Gruenbaum said that the elections proved the need for continuing practical politics and hence the leadership must pass to the Galician Zionists.

The Council also discussed the question of Heschel Farbshtein's demand that Dr. Rosenblatt resign his Sejm seat in Farbshtein's favor in accordance with the pre-election agreement. Dr. Rosenblatt is unwilling to resign while Deputy Gruenbaum has declared in writing his willingness to resign in Farbshtein's favor on three conditions.

They are that Farbshtein continue Gruenbaum's policies in the Sejm; that if the Jewish Parliamentary Club includes the Agudist deputy, Farbshtein should resign; and that the Mizrahi, of which Farbshtein is a leader, should pay part of the election costs. Farbshtein rejected these conditions. The Council decided that Gruenbaum should not resign because he represents the Jewish national policy, and that Rosenblatt should also not resign because he was elected from Lodz and because of his personal services and ability.

The Council also adopted a resolution voting against taking part in the negotiations of the Jewish Agency's political commission with the British government regarding the White Paper.

J.N.F. Preparing Detailed

Reply to White Paper

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—A detailed reply to the passages in the White Paper and the Simpson report dealing with land has been drawn up by the head office of the Jewish National Fund. The reply has been prepared by M. Granovsky, Jewish National Fund official, author of a number of works on land, taxation and settlement problems in Palestine. The reply is now being printed and will be made public shortly.

Eisenstein, Former Member

of Sejm, Dead at 56

Warsaw, Dec. 1.—Karl Eisenstein, a member of the second Polish Sejm, died here today. He was 56 years old. Active in the Zionist movement, he was president of the Jewish Merchants' Union.

Histadruth Members Irked at Leaders' Support of Whitechapel Labor Candidate

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—Reports that Palestinian Jewish labor leaders now in London have made statements on behalf of the Labor candidate in the Whitechapel by-election have created great excitement in Jewish labor circles here, the Doar Hayom reports, adding that many members of the Federation of Jewish Labor are prepared to leave the Federation because of the action of their leaders.

The Haaretz says it has received many open letters from members of the Federation protesting against their leaders' action in connection with the Whitechapel election. The letters have not been published, the Haaretz explains, out of respect for the Federation.

The Federation's view on the matter is prominently displayed in the Davar. The Federation's statement points out that Federation delegates in London as well as the Poale Zion decided to strengthen the pro-Zionist group in the British Labor Party because hostility by the Labor M. P.s would be of no profit to Zionism. The decision to assist the Labor candidate in Whitechapel was taken after he had agreed to oppose the White Paper and after Bevin, leader of the Transport Workers Union, had given a similar promise on behalf of 26 Labor members of Parliament.

Synagogues Organize for Service in Unemployment Crisis

The New York Board of Jewish Ministers, which includes over one hundred rabbis serving congregations in greater New York and which represents the orthodox, conservative and liberal sections of the Jewish community, has appointed a special committee on unemployment to organize the synagogues of the city for service in the aid of unemployment. The Chairman of this Committee on Unemployment is Rabbi Sidney E. Goldstein, Associate Rabbi of the Free Synagogue and Professor of Social Service of the Jewish Institute of Religion, and the other members are Rabbi Max Drob, Rabbi Joshua Goldberg, Rabbi Leo Jung, Rabbi Samuel Levinson, Rabbi Al Landesman, Rabbi Clifton H. Levy, Rabbi D. de Sola Pool and Rabbi William F. Rosenbloom. This committee has prepared a program of work which has been approved by the New York Board of Jewish Ministers and which is designed to enlist every synagogue in the city in immediate and active service.

A committee on unemployment is being formed in each synagogue and will undertake to organize the congregation. The program of the rabbis include measures for immediate relief, methods of providing temporary employment and finally a long range plan that aims to prevent a recurrence of the catastrophe of unemployment. The synagogues are urged to create an unemployment fund and each member, clergy and laity alike, is called upon to contribute one day's salary a month. This fund will be expended in forms of service indicated by the Coordination Committee of the Community Program.

Czech Deputy Demands Numerus Clausus for "Certain Race"

Prague, Dec. 1.—A demand for the establishment of a numerus clausus in the Czechoslovakian universities was voiced today by Dr. Ant Hajn, National Democrat, during the parliamentary debate on the budget. This measure would not affect the Russian immigrants and foreigners of Slavic origin but would apply to those "of a certain race" who sympathize with the Communists, Deputy Hajn said.

Jewish Federation \$1,000,000 Behind in Last Month

Marking the opening of the final month of the Jewish charity Federation's campaign, Dudley D. Sicher, president, appealed yesterday to the Jewish community of New York to come to the support of the effort now in progress to raise \$2,221,000. This sum is required before January 1st to pay off the bank indebtedness incurred by the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies in providing funds for the ninety-one charitable institutions which it represents.

With communities all over the country responding more generously than ever before to community chest appeals, it is inconceivable that New York will lag behind, Mr. Sicher said. This year when the need is greater than ever before, he pointed out, community chest campaigns for funds have been uniformly successful in many cities of the country. Most people have realized that hospitals, child welfare institutions, homes for the aged and relief agencies generally would have to provide for many more than in normal times and have given generously, in some cases substantially increasing the totals over previous years. Federation's campaign, with but four weeks remaining, is still short more than \$1,000,000 of the sum required.

Former King Hussein to Live in Transjordan

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—The former King Hussein of the Hedjaz will spend the rest of his days in Amman, the capital of Transjordan, of which one of his sons, Emir Abdullah, is now the ruler, it was learned here today. Hussein left Cyprus where he had been exiled, on Friday for Amman. He is accompanied by Abdullah who went to Cyprus following recent reports that Hussein was seriously ill.

It is recalled that when Hussein was exiled he was not permitted in any part of Arabia.
