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2 German Republican Groups Launch Anti-Hitler Drive

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 16.—Two national German groups pledging to uphold the Republic today opened a vigorous campaign against Adolph Hitler and his brown-shirted Fascists in view of the growing danger of Hitlerite supremacy. Jewish leaders expressed great satisfaction with this news. The two organizations that have opened war on the Nazis with methods similar to those used by the Nazis are the youth organization of the Republican Reichsbanner and the Deutschland-Bund.

In every town and village in Germany the youth groups of the Reichsbanner are distributing pamphlets and posters aimed at counteracting the Hitlerite propaganda. Speakers are being sent to every Nazi meeting with a demand for freedom of speech and if this request is not granted these meetings will be broken up. The Reichsbanner groups are also planning street meetings throughout the country.

The Deutschland-Bund, including in its membership many prominent people, is planning a monster mass meeting in the Sport Palace at which former National Socialist leaders will reveal the propaganda methods of the Hitlerites.

Jaffa Orange Merchants Seek Cut in Egypt's Fruit Tariff

Jaffa, Dec. 16.—The orange merchants of Jaffa today voted to ask the Palestine government to make representations to the Egyptian government to reduce its tariff on Palestine oranges. Should the Egyptian government fail to modify its duties the Jaffa merchants are prepared to demand an increased tariff on Egyptian products coming into Palestine.

Egypt sells millions of dollars of goods to Palestine annually while Palestine products sold in Palestine are small compared with Egyptian sales in Palestine. The Egyptian tariff on Palestinian fruits is believed to be in retaliation against a recent Palestine import duty on vegetables and other produce from Egypt.

Meanwhile the Palestine government is negotiating with Turkey regarding its dumping of many products on the Palestine market while Turkey imports but little from Palestine.

Nazis Open Theatre to Play Anti-Semitic Pieces

Berlin, Dec. 16.—A theatre producing nothing but anti-Semitic plays has been opened here by the National Socialists. The first opus being offered at this theatre is a piece called Poison Gas 506, depicting the Polish Jew as a war intriguer.

Criticizes Failure of Soviet Government to Consider Jewish Question in Its Full Aspects

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Dec. 16.—Charging that in the 13 years of the Soviet Union's existence the government has never considered the Jewish question in its full aspects, Dr. Abraham Bragin, one of the founders of the Russian Jewish colonization movement and a leader in the Ozet, today criticized the Central Executive Committee and the Communist Party itself for its failure to place the complicated but urgent Jewish problem on the agenda of any of its congresses.

Making himself the spokesmen for the non-Communist Jews of Russia, Dr. Bragin told the All-Union conference of the Ozet, the society for settling Jews on the land, that the government had never officially discussed the matter of Jewish self-determination in Jewish territory. He said that when the Jewish Communist leaders speak of an autonomous Jewish region they are apologetic while such a region is an absolute necessity which must be openly demanded.

While the government had planned the creation of such a region in Bira Bidjan, Far Eastern Republic, Dr. Bragin insisted that it must be in Crimea. Crimea, he declared, not only had enough land for more than 200,000 Jews but also had great industrial potentialities for tens of thousands of Jews. The Kertch district of Crimea alone will produce more metal in the next seven years than Belgium and France together, he added.

Addressing the Jewish Communist leaders, he recalled that two years ago they spoke of settling a million Jews in Bira Bidjan but now, he charged, they have reduced that number to 50,000 in three years. "I wonder whether you will ever settle even 50,000 there," he remarked. "Personally I don't believe it," he said.

A. Merezhin, leader of the Comzet, the government department for settling the Jews on the land, who followed Dr. Bragin, devoted a good part of his three-hour address to a discussion of

Christian, Mistaken for Jew, Attacked by Students

Bucharest, Dec. 16.—Mistaking a Christian electrician for a Jew, a gang of anti-Semitic students attacked him and inflicted serious injuries in Bucharest last night. The attack was interrupted by the police who arrested three of the students for resisting a officer of the law. They were immediately brought to court where the judge released two of them and held the third on a charge of resisting an officer.

Haffkine Left 1,500,000 Swiss Francs for Yeshivas

Lausanne, Switzerland, Dec. 16.—Rabbinical seminaries in various parts of Europe are the sole beneficiaries of the estate of 1,500,000 Swiss francs of Dr. Waldemar Mordecai Wolff Haffkine, noted bacteriologist and discoverer of the virus of cholera, who died October 27 at the age of 70, it was announced here today. The Relief Association of German Jews is left in complete charge of distributing the estate to the seminaries.

Dr. Morris Wishnitzer, general secretary of the Relief Association of German Jews, left here today after settling the details of the estate. A special committee named by the Association to deal with Dr. Haffkine's fortune will invest the principal which will yield an annual income of \$20,000. All rabbinical seminaries in Europe are to be investigated by this committee to determine which of them shall receive grants from the estate.

The sole condition for the seminaries to receive funds from Dr. Haffkine's fortune is that they add to their curriculum the teaching of trades. In the province of Transylvania, Roumania, a number of seminaries have already introduced such courses and others are expected to follow.

Dr. Haffkine, whom Lord Lister termed a savior of mankind, was born in Odessa. At the age of 23 he was studying under Louis Pasteur. In 1893 he went to India to conduct investigations for the Indian government.

Vaad Leumi, Agency Deplore Ness Ziona Labor Disorders

Jerusalem, Dec. 16.—Disorder on the part of unemployed Jewish workers at Ness Ziona was deplored in a joint statement issued today by the executives of the Vaad Leumi and the Jewish Agency. The statement declares that a repetition of the disorders must not be permitted under any circumstances and appeals to the public, and especially to organized labor, to oppose such acts.

Meanwhile a statement of the Ness Ziona workers points out that the cost of the British police now quartered at the expense of the Ness Ziona colonists is equivalent to wages for a dozen days work. The workers' statement says that repressive measures cannot silence "starving labor and the acute question demands immediate solution."

The colonists and organized labor have been at odds for several weeks now, labor demanding the employment of more Jews in the orange groves and the planters insisting on a reduction in the daily wage scale.

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New Type of Yevsectzia Being Established in White Russia

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Dec. 16.—A new kind of Yevsectzia, or Jewish section of the Communist Party, is to be established in White Russia, according to an order issued today by the praesidium of the White Russian central executive committee. The order calls for the organization of national minority committees at the local Soviets of Minsk, Vitebsk, Homel and forty other townships.

Each committee is to consist of seven members with a paid secretary. The chairman of the committee must be identical with the president of the local Soviet. The committee's functions will be to enlighten the local Soviets on cultural and economic needs of the national minorities thus controlling the existence of the national minorities.

While the Jews of White Russia are being told that this is an important step to aid them they nevertheless fear that it means the return of the Yevsectzia. This fear is based on the fact that these national minority committees are not to be created in Ukraina and Central Russia where the Jewish Communists do not play so important a role and are thus unable to influence their respective central executive committees to return them to power.

The original Yevsectzia was liquidated last February by the central committee of the Communist Party and Communist work among the Jews was turned over to special instructors named by the central committee. The abolition of the Yevsectzia was hailed as a great step in relieving the Jewish economic situation in the Soviet Union. The Yevsectzia was regarded by the official Soviet leaders as the special representative of the Jewish masses and it was largely responsible for the persecution of the Jewish religion, the Hebrew language and Zionist activities.

700 Attend First Joint Boston Chanukah Festival

Boston, Dec. 16.—Seven hundred men and women, representative members of the various brotherhoods of the city, listened to Rabbi Louis I. Newman, of Temple Rodeph Shalom of New York City, talk on the Maccabean and Puritan traditions in American life, to Roger W. Straus, of New York City, national president of the Temple Brotherhoods, talk on the philosophy of the brotherhood movement, and to Rabbi Samuel M. Cohen of New York, executive director of the United Synagogue of America, speak on the "Source of Jewish Strength," at the Chanukah celebration held Sunday evening at Temple Ohabei Shalom, Brookline.

This was the first time in the history of Boston Jewry that orthodox, conservative, and reform groups banded together to celebrate the Chanukah holiday jointly.

Rabbi Newman declared that the Maccabean and the Puritan traditions of discipline and orderliness are imperatively needed in this confused, turbulent generation—the Maccabees with their unflinching self-determination; the Puritans with their courage and self-restraint: the former standing for religious freedom and religious unity; the latter, for the right to worship God as they saw fit.

Hadassah Launches Drive for Palestine School Luncheons

The Hadassah Campaign for the Palestine School Luncheons Fund, through which school children in Palestine are supplied with daily hot meals, is now under way. The campaign began on December 15th, the Feast of Light. During this week an appeal will be made to the children in the religious and Sunday schools. Rabbis and teachers are cooperating by telling their pupils of the work of the Fund.

A national campaign is being conducted by Mrs. Alexander Lamport, of New York, chairman of the Palestine School Luncheons Committee of Hadassah. In announcing that the budget for this year is \$25,000, an increase of \$7,000 over that of last year, Mrs. Lamport declared that the wide-spread and increasing interest in the work of the committee gives promise of large returns in this year's campaign.

The fifth annual convention of the Metropolitan League of Jewish Community Centers, elected the following officers: president, Hon. M. Vernon Y.M.H.A.; Isaac Siegel, Institutional Synagogue; treasurer, Hugo H. Piesen, Brooklyn Y.M.H.A.; secretary, Milton Weill, 92nd Street Y.M.H.A.

Drs. Kahn and Rosen Sail to Resume J.D.C. Work Abroad

Dr. Bernhard Kahn, director of the Joint Distribution Committee's work in Europe, and Dr. Joseph Rosen, director in charge of the Committee's work in Russia, sailed on the Europa on Monday night, after a brief visit here. During their stay they discussed with leading American philanthropists the possibilities for carrying on the work of the Joint Distribution Committee despite the world financial crisis.

Dr. Kahn on leaving said, "I count my visit here successful in that I see we are keeping up the interest in Europe and its problems even through these hard times." In referring to the meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee at the home of James N. Rosenberg on Sunday, Dr. Kahn said, "the meeting made it clear to American Jewry that not only their financial but their moral help will be needed for a very long time. It is the moral help upon which we must draw. The Jewries of East European countries understand that in this crisis American Jews will not be able to give as they did during the past 15 years. Nevertheless we are sure that all construction work will be continued."

Asked whether he had means for carrying on this work, Dr. Kahn said, "we have not means enough to carry on this work, but we hope local Jewry will make an effort to see the work through until American Jewry can help again. If they are assured America has not deserted them, they will have courage to go through this crisis."

Dr. Rosen, while refusing to make a general statement, said that the work of the Committee would continue in Russia.

The program for industrializing the Jews of Russia by teaching them trades and equipping them with machines is being carried forward under Dr. Rosen's suggestion by the Joint Distribution Committee in order to make it possible for the Jews to avail themselves of the opportunity offered by the government.

This program will occupy a good deal of Dr. Rosen's attention on his return to Russia.

Justice Lehman Re-elected President of Temple Emanu-El

At the annual meeting of Congregation Emanu-El on Monday night, Justice Irving Lehman of the State Court of Appeals was re-elected president, and Sydney H. Herman and William I. Spiegelberg, the two vice-presidents, were also re-elected. The following six trustees, each for a three-year term, were elected: M. Herman, Justice Lehman, Edward Schafer, Lionel F. Straus, Gerald F. Warburg and Arthur Zinn.

In his annual report Justice Lehman declared that the congregation can find ground for satisfaction in much of its work during the past year, but that this "must not blind us to the fact that our opportunity requires of us even more than we have achieved." The value of the community house activities of Congregation Emanu-El was emphasized in Justice Lehman's report.

Jewish and Opposition Lists Barred in Budapest Election

Budapest, Dec. 16.—The Jewish ticket in the Budapest municipal election was disqualified today together with a number of other election tickets opposed to the present anti-Semitic controlled city administration. The election commission, which ruled the opposition tickets off the ballot, did so on technical grounds in order to ensure the election of an anti-Semitic municipality.

The opposition groups thus disqualified have filed suit in the courts. Meanwhile, however, they have joined with the Social Democrats and are urging their supporters to vote for the Social Democrats. Unless the courts grant the disqualified tickets an injunction the election of an anti-Semitic municipality seems assured in Sunday's voting.

Ullman and Cahan Named to New Haven Commissions

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 16.—Two of the leading members of the Jewish community have been appointed to important municipal commissions by Mayor Thomas A. Tully. Joseph H. Ullman, brother of the late Col. Isaac M. Ullman and Major Louis M. Ullman, has been appointed to the board of fire commissioners, succeeding president John T. Sloan; and Alexander Cahan has been named to the board of education.

Mr. Ullman is one of the leaders in the Republican party of this city, and is a member of the Republican Executive Committee for this district. Mr. Cahan is a graduate of Yale, and as a civil engineer is known to be an expert in his field, and is now doing specialized work for Yale University.

Dr. Boris Kwartin, Brooklyn Pathologist, Killed in Explosion

Funeral services for the late Dr. Boris Kwartin, son of Cantor Savel Kwartin, who died on Monday as a result of an explosion in the laboratory of the Beth Moses Hospital in Brooklyn, where he was pathologist and research physician, were held yesterday from his home in Brooklyn. Besides his father, Dr. Kwartin is survived by three sisters and two brothers.

Though only 31 years old, Dr. Kwartin had already made a reputation for himself in the medical world. At the time of the explosion which resulted in his death he was engaged in an experiment. He was the author of several volumes dealing with problems of lecithin bodies and immunity.

Dr. Kwartin was born in Russia and came to this country ten years ago. In 1924 he graduated from the Long Island Medical College, and for the next three years he served as director of pathology at the Post-Graduate Hospital in Manhattan. For the next two years he did research work in Vienna, and last year returned here to assume the directorate of pathological research at the Beth Moses Hospital.

Lipsky Attacks Revisionists and Brith Shalom; Appeals for Support of Weizmann

Cleveland, Dec. 16.—Terming the Zionist Revisionists "demagogues," Louis Lipsky, former president of the Zionist Organization of America and now honorary vice-president, launched an attack on both the Revisionists and the Brith Shalom Society of Palestine at a banquet given in his honor here last night by the Cleveland Zionist district.

Rabbi Harry Davidowitz of the Jewish Center, who was toastmaster, installed the newly-elected officers of the district headed by George J. Klein as president.

Cautioning against the Revisionists who by their attack on the British government "believe they can achieve the Zionist ideals," Mr. Lipsky said these ideals can be achieved only by "the sound and liberal policy of Dr. Weizmann which has brought tens of thousands of Jews to Palestine and built up Palestine of today which showed its capacity for defending itself against any attack."

Mr. Lipsky also criticized the Brith Shalom and appealed for the election of delegates to the forthcoming 17th World Zionist Congress that would represent Dr. Weizmann's policies.

Jewish Boy Named Rhodes Scholar from Massachusetts

Boston, Dec. 16.—Morris F. Shaffer of Boston, a student in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is one of the few Jewish boys named a Rhodes Scholar for 1930. Thirty-three students from various sections of the country were selected for this high scholastic honor. Shaffer is the only student from Massachusetts selected this year.

Shaffer has been an outstanding student and had won several honors. He was the youngest freshman in his class. He was active in the Menorah Society and had worked in the Boston Public Library to support himself through college.

the weak and strong points of the Comzet's activities and to condemnation of those who demanded the liquidation of the foreign Jewish relief organizations operating in Russia.

He said little about Bira Bidjan but stated that the work of the foreign Jewish relief organizations were very helpful. Merezkin urged that until the completion of the Five-Year Plan the number of Jewish industrial workers should be double that of the Jewish artisans and that during the same period the entire amount of land set aside for Jewish settlements in Crimea should be settled.

White Paper, Basis of Arab-Jewish Peace, Ribani Says

Montreal, Dec. 16.—The basis of peace between Jews and Arabs in Palestine lies in the White Paper of the British government, said Ameen Ribani, Arab intellectual and American spokesman for the Palestine Arabs, addressing a local gathering. Complimenting the Zionist aid in promoting the industrial and hygienic progress of Palestine, Ribani warned that there would be trouble if the British acted unwisely.

From the Arab point of view an amicable settlement will be reached when Jewish immigration is stopped and when both peoples cooperate in the formation of a joint assembly to govern the land, he declared. "Whatever happens, the Arabs do not forego the Pan-Arab dream of a country which has been theirs for the last 1,300 years," the Arab spokesman stated.

Two Regional Conferences of Committee of 1,000 Jan. 25

In pursuance of its general program of organization activities under which regional conferences for the strengthening of Conservative Judaism in America are to take place in different parts of the country, the Committee of One Thousand of the United Synagogue of America is arranging for two such conferences which will be held Sunday, January 25. One of them will be representative of Maryland, the District of Columbia and Virginia and will hold its sessions in Baltimore. The other will represent congregations, brotherhoods and sisterhoods in Long Island and will hold its sessions at the Jamaica Jewish Center in Jamaica.

The Committee of One Thousand is headed by A. B. Cohen of Scranton and Philadelphia. Its aim is to stimulate a nation-wide movement for the strengthening of synagogues and Jewish religious schools, particularly in the small communities. One of the principal aims of the regional conferences is to bring together representatives of larger and smaller communities with a view to working out practical methods of cooperation between the two.

National, Municipal Officials Join in Sholom Asch Jubilee

Warsaw, Dec. 16.—National, municipal and Jewish officials headed a large gathering in the Yiddish Theatre here yesterday that celebrated the jubilee of Sholom Asch, famous novelist and dramatist. The praesidium of the cabinet council, the president of the Warsaw municipality and representatives of the various ministries were present.

Asch's mother received a great ovation when she greeted the assemblage on behalf of her distinguished son. Representatives of the Polish, Yiddish and Hebrew authors and journalists societies as well as delegates from various Yiddish and Zionist educational institutions were present.

Theatrical Managers Make New Proposals to Yiddish Unions

Yiddish theatrical managers who closed their houses a week ago, claiming that their expenses were too great and demanding that their employees accept a 25 per cent reduction of salaries before they reopen the theatres, again conferred on Monday with the representatives of the unions. At this conference the managers stated that they will not insist on a flat 25 per cent reduction in the wages of all the Yiddish theatrical employees.

Instead of the wage reduction which the unions had proposed at a former conference, the managers on Monday proposed still further reductions. The managers insisted that the salaries of Yiddish actors who earn up to \$90 per week be reduced 15 instead of 10 per cent, as the actors' representatives had proposed; that the salaries of actors who earn from \$90 to \$145 a week be reduced to 20 instead of 15 per cent; and that the salaries of all the actors who earn more than \$145 a week be reduced 25 instead of 20 per cent.

Dressers, doormen and ushers who earn between \$30 and \$40 a week have consented at a previous conference to a 15 per cent reduction of their salaries.

On Monday, however, the managers insisted that this reduction be 20 per cent. Members of the chorus union have been willing to accept a 10 per cent reduction in their wages but the managers insisted that their reduction be 15 per cent.

In case the unions refuse to accept the conditions, the Yiddish theatrical managers propose that the matter be referred to arbitration. The unions have rejected the new demands of the managers, declaring that they have conceded as much as possible and that they cannot consent to any further reductions. The unions will, however, meet again during the week to consider the proposition of arbitration.

Prussian Diet Scene of Anti-Semitic Attack

Berlin, Dec. 16.—The Prussian Diet this afternoon was the scene of vigorous anti-Semitic attacks by National Socialist deputies in connection with a motion to censure the Socialist premier, Otto Braun, and the minister of the interior, Dr. Carl Severing, for permitting the showing of the now prohibited American picture, *All Quiet on the Western Front*.

The Hitlerite deputy, M. Schwech, abused Carl Laemmle, the American producer of the picture, as "a Hungarian Jew who utilized German heroism for Jewish-American business," alleging that the dialogue of the film contains a passage describing death for the Fatherland as "filthy." The left wing deputies, on the other hand, maintained that Laemmle was a non-Jewish German-American.

The debate culminated with a statement by the Jewish deputy, M. Kuttner, who charged that Paul Goebbels, leader in the agitation against the film, had remained at home while his Jewish

To Elect Zionist Congress Delegates January 24th

The elections for American delegates to the seventeenth World Zionist Congress will take place on Sunday, January 24th, according to an announcement made by the Central Election Board, which represents all factions of the Zionist movement in this country. Polling places will be established in practically every Jewish community in the United States, and every Jew and Jewess, over the age of eighteen, who has paid the shekel fee of fifty cents will be entitled to vote for delegates.

The forthcoming Congress, which will take place in Carlsbad, Czechoslovakia, beginning February 24th, is regarded as the most important in the history of the Zionist movement, so that all Zionist groups are concentrating their efforts on disposing of as many shekels as possible, in order to insure a large and representative American delegation at Carlsbad.

The rules for the elections provide that any one who presents a shekel receipt at the polls on January 24th will be entitled to vote, but that cards of membership in any organization are not valid substitutes. Any shekel-payer over the age of twenty-four is eligible for candidacy as a delegate, and may become one upon the submission of a petition signed by one hundred other shekel-payers. All candidacies must be submitted to the Central Election Board, 111 Fifth Avenue, not later than noon of January 12, 1931.

Jewish Arbitration Court Changes Name with Charter

The Jewish Conciliation Court of America, formerly known as the Jewish Court of Arbitration, which has been in existence for eleven years, received its certificate of incorporation last week from Supreme Court Justice Wasservogel. Many Jewish individual and communal matters have been handled and settled by this court without resort to the regular courts. The officers of the Jewish Conciliation Court of America are: Dr. Israel Goldstein, president; Mrs. Rebekah Kohut, Justice Jacob Panken and the Rev. Dr. Moses Hyamson, vice-presidents; Mrs. Mary Blum, treasurer; Louis Richman, executive secretary; and Bernard S. Deutsch, chairman of the board of directors.

Warner Brothers to Complete Furnishing Memorial Hospital

Los Angeles, Dec. 16.—Complete furnishings and equipment for the Sam and Milton Warner Memorial building at Los Angeles Sanatorium will be provided through the latest gift of the Warner family, which has contributed generously to the improvement of this national institution in recent years. A fluoroscope, x-ray apparatus, cardiograph, full equipment for physiotherapy, complete furnishings for the medical offices and clinics and all other necessary equipment and apparatus are included in this gift, which will involve an expenditure of over \$16,000. The building itself, completed several months ago at a cost of \$50,000, will house the administration offices, research and clinical laboratories, clinics, x-ray rooms, operating rooms, pharmacy and physiotherapy rooms.

Three years ago the Warner Brothers turned over the use of their theatre in Hollywood, and the services of their entire organization in putting over a gigantic benefit which netted \$24,000 for the sanatorium. Shortly thereafter they gave a complete, double-act, motion picture projection apparatus to the sanatorium, following up this gift with Vitaphone and Movie-tone equipment.

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
