Zionist Congress to Be Held February 24 as Scheduled (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 23-After long and careful consideration of all the facts in the matter the Zionist Executive announced tonight that the 17th World Zionist Congress would be held as scheduled on

The forthcoming Congress is expected to be the most significant and important since the War because it will have to take a stand on the Zionist attitude toward the British government and elect a new president in view of Dr. Chaim Weizmann's resignation. Zionists throughout the world are already making plans for the Congress and arranging for the election of delegates. The parties within the Zionist Organization have already organized an extensive campaign to elect their delegates.

Duca Succeeds Bratianu as Head of Roumanian Liberals

Bucharest, Dec. 23-I. G. Duca, who at various times was minister of agriculture, education and foreign affairs in Liberal cabinets, was today named head of the Liberal party to succeed Vintila Bratianu, the former chieftain of the party who died vesterday. At a special session of Parliament

today to pay tribute to the deceased former premier, the Jewish deputies and senators associated themselves with the tribute. In the chamber of deputies Joseph Fischer spoke for the Jewish population and Senator Meyer Ebner did the same in the senate.

Only 18 Percent of Prussian Jews Foreigners, Figures Show

Berlin, Dec. 13-Out of a total of 403,969 Jews who were living in Prussia in 1925, only 76,387, or 18.99, were foreigners, according to statistics just published in the "Zeitschrift fur Demographie und Statistik der Juden"

Of this total of foreign Jews in Prussia, 35,385 came from Poland, 9498 from Austria, 6986 from Russia, 3574 from Czecho-Slovakia, 2480 from Hungary, 2156 from Roumania, 1791 from Holland, 1350 from Lithuania and 1037 from Latvia. Thus East-Europ-ean Jews constituted the vast majority of the foreign Jewish population of

Jews, or 57,4% of the total throughout Prussia. Out of a total Jewish population of 172,672 in Berlin, more than one-quarter were foreigners in 1925.

Former Wealthy Berlin Jewish Merchants and Bank Officials Now Seek Employment Aid

Berlin, Dec. 23-Indications that poverty among the Jews of Berlin is rapidly reaching catastrophic propor-

tions is seen from the fact that former well-to-do Jewish residents of Berlin's West Side, the residential area of the prosperous business men, are now compelled to seek financial assistance from the Berlin Jewish community. This condition was discussed today at a press conference of the community. It was revealed at the conference

that many former wealthy bank officials and merchants who were once generous donors to philanthropy are now so impoverished that they are impelled to seek employment. Many one time well-to-do Jewish professional men are in the same condition. To help these people out the Jewish community has established a special employment bureau for them in the Kurfuerstendam district of the city.

Chancellor to Get Protests on Athlit Sunday Work Stoppage (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Haifa, Dec. 23-M. Thompson, resident engineer in charge of the work at the Athlit quarries on the Haifa Bay construction project, today told a delegation of Jews headed by Rabbi Markus that he would submit the Jewish protests against the suspension of Sunday work at the quarries to the High Commissioner who ordered Sunday work discontinued. Manifesting sympathy with the Jewish protests, Mr. Thompson said he deplored the alienation of Jewish friendship as a result of the suspension

The High Commissioner's ruling a fortnight ago aroused widespread indignation not only in Jewish quarters but among the Moslems too. By discontinuing Sunday work, Jewish and Moslem laborers are compelled to work on their respective Sabbaths or else lose a day's pay. The matter was raised last week in the House of Commons where it was revealed that the British government knew nothing about it. The Colonial

Emek Colonists to Get \$15,000 for Relief from Plague

Haifa, Dec. 23-The Palestine government today set aside \$15,000 to aid the Jewish colonists in the Emek who recently suffered severe losses from a crops. An appropriation of \$175,000 has been made by the government to assist all settlers who suffered from the

Czernowitz Jewish Community Honored Murdered David Falik (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Cezernowitz, Roumania, Dec. 23-The Czernowitz Jewish Community has this week erected a memorial to the Jewish student David Falik, who was shot dead in November, 1926 by the anti-Semitic student leader Nicholas Totu while Falik and several other Jewish students of the Czernowitz Secondary School were being tried for having organized a demonstration against their professors as a protest against the latter's having disqualified 80 per cent of the Jewish students in the examinations.

Totu, who was associated with Danila, Codreanu and other anti-Semitic agitators in the incitement which recently led to the Borsha, Suceava, Szhiget and other anti-Jewish outbreaks, was put on trial for murder. had spoken for the defence, describing him as "our dear child" Totu and de-claring that "Totu deserves not to be condemned, but to be canonized for all

"The student Totu who has killed the boy Falik," wrote the "Glasul Bucovinei" after the crime, "has been fed on Cuzist teachings of the kind which are spread also by Zelea Codreanu, to the effect that the Jews must be got out of Roumania and must be killed, that the Jew is not a human being, and so on. Such teachings quickly enter the mind of excited youths, and a madman is found who gets hold of a weapon and fires."

5th Anniversary Convention of Avukah Opens Today in Boston (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Boston, Dec. 23 - Menachem Ussishkin, president of the Jewish National Fund, Professor Horace M. Kallen, James Waterman Wise, honorary secretary of Avukah, Dr. E. H. Feil-chenfeld of the Harvard Law School and Joseph Baratz of the General Fedebe among the speakers at the fifth anniversary convention of Avukah, Ameri-can Student Zionist Federation which opens in Boston tomorrow and will last until December 28th.

Rabbi Samuel M. Blumenfield, national president of Avukah, will give a report of the activities of the organization which has chapters throughout the United States and Canada, and George M. Hyman, executive secretary will outline proposals for future undertakings. Professor Nathan Isaacs of Harvard will preside at a symposium on "Pales-tine and the American Jewish Youth," and Judge Jacob J. Kaplan of Boston will act as chairman at the reception to the Honorary Convention Committee. The headquarters of the fifth anni-

versary Avukah convention will be the Hotel Statler, Boston, and Dr. Mitchell Salem Fisher, Chairman of the Administrative committee and Rebahiah Lewin-Epstein, treasurer will report at the business sessions where the Avukah Summer School Camp and the Chizik Memorial Palestine Project will be included in the agenda.

Portland Citizen for 1930 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Portland, Ore., Dec. 23-Aaron Frank, general manager of the Meier-Frank department store, the largest establishment of its kind west of the Mississippi, and a partner of Governor-elect Julius Meier, was today declared the first citizen of Portland for the year 1930. This selection is made annually by the Portland Realty Board.

Mr. Frank, who is a son of the late Sigmund Frank, one of the founders of the store, was selected as the outstand-6 ing citizen of his native city for his significant gifts as an organizer and executive and for his services to municipal welfare. Mr. Frank is 40 years old, a member of Temple Beth Israel and a brother-in-law of Rabbi Jonah Wise of the Central Synagogue in New York.

This makes the second selection of a Iew as the outstanding citizen of Portland in the past three years. Ben Sell-ing was chosen as the outstanding citizen two years ago.

Stanley Rypins to Head English Department at C.C.N.Y. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

San Francisco, Dec. 23-Dr. Stanley Rypins, author, sociologist and English scholar of this city, has been appointed head of the English department of the College of the City of New York and will leave next month to take his new ration of Jewish Labor in Palestine will post. He is now director of academic studies at the San Francisco State Teachers College.

> Dr. Rypins has to his credit distinguished work at Oxford and Harvard and is known for his research work in sociology. He recently returned from a study tour of Soviet Russia.

Charles Rayevsky, One-Time Editor of Forward, Dead

Dr. Charles Rayevsky, well-known American-Iewish Socialist who was at one time an editor of the Jewish Daily Forward, died on Monday from cancer at the age of 64. He leaves a widow and a daughter. During the past twentyfour years, he and his family had lived in Liberty, N. Y., in the Catskill Mts., where Dr. Rayevsky was a practicing physician, specializing in lung diseases and being for a time head of the Arbeiter Ring Tubercular Sanatorium near Dr. Rayevsky, who was born in

Krementschug, Russia, came to Ameri-ca at the age of 17. He had been a member of the Russian-Jewish revolu-tionary group, "Am Olam," which decided to emigrate to this country. In America Dr. Rayevsky at first worked in factories and helped organize the Jewish labor movement.

Dr. Rayevsky was a member of the morrow and Thursday, Dec. 24 and 25.

Charles Harris, Composer of "After the Ball." Dead at 65

Charles K. Harris, noted American-Jewish music publisher and composer whose song, "After the Ball," sold in three million copies, died Monday at his home at the age of 65. He is survived by his widow, two daughters, a brother

Mr. Harris, who was born in Poughkeepsie, N. Y., spent most of his early years in the Middle West. During his childhood his father kept a tailor shop in Saginaw, Michigan. When the family moved to Milwaukee Mr. Harris,

though still a boy, had become so proficent as a banjo player that he began to earn money as a teacher of the instrument, in spite of the fact that he could not read music. His first songs Mr. Harris wrote for

a Milwaukee amateur show, and al-though he did not receive any pay for them, they gave him a local reputation. Eventually he got an order from the Chicago Opera House to write three songs for "Sinbad the Sailor." For this

he was paid \$150. "After the Ball," his first and greatest success, was written in 1893 and became famous almost overnight. After trying unsuccessfully to sell the song to actors, he persuaded James Aldrich Libby to sing it at the Bijou Theatre in Chicago, and it made a hit at once.

As a result, Mr. Harris was able to set up a thriving song-publishing business, first in Chicago and then in New York, where it is now located. Besides "After the Ball," Mr. Harris wrote such hits as "Break the News to Mother," hits as "Break the News to Mother,"
"Hello, Central, Hello," "Kiss and Let's
Make Up" and "Only a Tangle of Golden Curls." He also wrote a photoplay
based on "After the Ball," and also scenarios based on other songs.

Paterson Jews Settle Long-Standing Kashruth Dispute (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Paterson, N. Robinson Will Remembers 18 Jewish Philanthropies (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Detroit, Dec. 23-The will of David Robinson, treasurer of the United Hebrew Schools of Detroit and president of the Robinson Furniture Co., who died December 7th, names many Jewish educational and charitable institutions, local as well as national. The will was filed for probate Thursday before Judge Erwin R. Palmer. His son, Louis Robinson, was appointed special admin-

The United Hebrew Schools get the largest bequest, in the sum of \$5,000 The Jewish Old Folks Home of Detroit is to receive \$2,000 and \$1,000 each is to go to the Jewish National Fund, Jewish Orphans Home, Hebrew Free Loan Association, Zionist Organization of America and the Isaac Elchanan Yeshivah of New York. Eleven other institutions will receive \$500 each.

By the terms of Mr. Robinson's will, certain amounts are to be paid to each of his children on condition that they marry within the Jewish faith by the time they become 35 years old.

American Jews Help European Kin to Settle in Palestine

A large number of American Jews have recently provided for the settlement of their European relatives in Palestine, through the aid of the Palestine Department of the American Jewish deputies. It is also an especial Zionist Organization. Availing themselves of the opportunity which has recently been afforded by the Palestine government to apply for permission for persons of a certain age to settle in Palestine as permanent residents, if they can show that they have an assured income of five dollars a week American relatives have obligated themselves through a bond guarantee to support the settler until he will be able to receive employment. As soon as the bond is given, the Palestine Department here gets into touch with the authorities in Jerusalem and sees to it that the British consuls in East-European countries should receive instructions to issue visas to these immigrants.

American Jews themselves, older people as well as women and children, can make applications for these settlers visas if they put up a bond which guarantees an income of five dollars a week for each person, according to Dr. S. Bernstein, director of the Palestine Department of the American Zionist Organization. Polish Jewry Hopeful Pilsudski Government Will Bring Security and Prosperity Out of Chaos

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Warsaw, Dec. 14 (By Mail)-The re-

cent parliament election campaign in Poland found Polish Jewry divided into two camps, two middle class parties fighting among themselves. On the one hand were the Zionists, with all their factions, General Zionists, Mizrachi, Histachduth, etc., and on the other hand were the Agudath Israel and the Merchants', Craftsmen's and Volkists parties. The fight was a bitter one, and the result of this bitter contest is: In Warsaw, the largest Jewish community of Europe, 2 Jewish dep-uties; in all of Old Poland, 3 Jewish deputies, 2 Zionists and one Agudist; in all Poland, including Galicia, 7 deputies elected, 6 Zionists and one Agudist. Polish Jewry in proportion to its population is entitled to at least 25 deputies and 6 senators. Now there are only 7 Jewish deputies and not one Jewish senator representing Jewish parties.

This is both a defeat and a victory. It is a victory when one takes into consideration how much the Jewish vote was split, since the Socialist Bund too received in Warsaw alone 13,000 votes, while thousands of Jews voted for the Communists and thousands of others voted directly for Marshal Pilsudski Nevertheless Warsaw alone elected two victory for Zionism, forty thousand votes were polled in Warsaw for a Zionist ticket. The Agudath too can point to victory; at former elections it polled in Warsaw twenty-odd thousand votes, whereas this time it polled thirtyodd thousand votes.

Loss for Zionists

This election may also be interpreted as a defeat for the Zionists, since in the former Sejm they had 14 Jewish deputies and senators, while now they have only six deputies. The Agudath too may be said to have been defeated in a certain sense, for in spite of the great moral and material support which it received from the government, it did not elect in all Poland more than one deputy, while the Zionists, in spite of the lack of funds and the persecution under which they had to labor, did manage to elect six deputies.

The influence the Jewish delegation in parliament will have will probably be nil, since the overwhelming majority of the Sejm is controlled by Marshal Pilsudski. Out of a total of 444 deputies, Pilsudski's group has 249, which means that he always has a majority and is not dependent on the votes of the other groups. In the Senate the situation is even worse. Out of a total of 111 senators, 74 are Pilsudski's adherents. The only thing the other parties in the Seim will be able to do will be to criticize, if they will be able to do that, since long debates will probably not be allowed Man in Street Hopeful

Educational Alliance Marks 10th Year of Its Reopening

As part of the celebration marking the tenth anniversary of the reopening of its building, the Jewish Educational Alliance has just issued an anniversary Year Book, an eighty-page printed and illustrated booklet telling the history of the organization, describing its activities and detailing the life of a busy and well organized Jewish community. Alabaman Founds Schools That Will Ban Aliens, Non-Britons

Welcome of Havana Jews (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Havana, Cuba, Dec. 21 (By Mail)-Several thousand Havana Jews greeted Center on Friday, which Dr. Einstein visited while the "Belgenland," on which he is traveling to California, was docked in Havana harbor. On the following day, a few hours be-fore the "Belgenland" left Havana, Prof. Einstein received a delegation of the Cuban Jewish National Fund Committee, which consisted of Dr. Einstein and Messrs. Kurland, Kamioner and Valbe.

Says Einstein Belongs First to Jews, Then to World

The General Committee in charge of the conference includes prominent Jewish, Protestant and Catholic leaders. Prominent among the representatives of the Social Justice Committee of the Central Conference of American Rabbis are Professor Jacob H.Hollander, Rabbi Julian Feibelman, Maurice Bisgyer, Ed-mund I.
