New Zionist Executive Without Revisionists Elected at Closing Session of 17th Zionist Congress

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BASLE, July 15—After more than two weeks of wrangling, the steering committee of the Zionist Congress this afternoon submitted a slate which the plenary session of the Congress approved by a vote of 103 to 42 at the closing session of the 17th Zionist Congress. The Revisionists, who were excluded from the new Executive, voted against the slate while the Radicals the only other party not represented on the Executive abstained from voting at all. All other parties voted.

The new resident Executive, which will guide the Zionist Organization for the next two years, consists of two Laborites, two General Zionists and one representative of the Mizrahi. The members of the Executive are Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, Palestine Laborite, Prof. Selig Brodetsky, British Zionist, Heschel Farbstein, Polish Mizrahist, Emanuel Neumann, American General Zionist and Berl Locker, American Laborite.

Professor Brodetsky is the only member of the old Executive to be given a place on the new one. He had been closely associated with Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the retiring president of the Zionist Organization.

BASLE, July 15—At five o'clock this afternoon the Zionist Congress will reconvene and if by that time the steering committee has not yet broken the deadlock over the election of a new Zionist Executive the Congress itself will then use its sovereignty and will elect an Executive from the floor of the Congress so that the impasse in the committee may be overcome.

With practically its entire program completed the adjournment of the Congress is being held up by the inability of the steering committee to agree on the personnel of the new Executive. Scheduled to convene again at 5 A. M. this morning, the worn delegates waited up impatiently all night

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Rabbi Meyer Berlin Again Heads Mizrahi Organization

BASLE, July 15—Rabbi Meyer Berlin of New York was reelected president of the World Mizrahi at the close of the Mizrahi annual conference here yesterday. Rabbi J. L. Fishman of Brooklyn was named chairman of the world executive. Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum, also of New York, was chosen chairman of the Mizrahi Palestine Fund and Daniel Sirkis was elected treasurer. Moses Shapiro was named secretary of the world executive.

Wise Opens Conference for World Jewish Congress

BASLE, July 15—A conference preliminary to the world Jewish congress being organized by the American Jewish Congress opened here yesterday afternoon with Dr. Stephen S. Wise, honorary president of the Congress, addressing 100 delegates from Europe, the United States, Africa and Palestine on the world situation of the Jews.

The conference, which will continue tomorrow, is being attended by Chaim Nachman Bialik, famous Hebrew poet; Isaac Gruenbaum, leader of Polish Jewry, and Ab Goldberg and Z. Tygel, Americans.

Bulgarian Jewish Leader Denies Greek Anti-Semites' Charges Against Salonican Maccabees

SOFIA, Bulgaria, July 15 — The charges by Greek nationalists that a member of the Salonican Maccabee Club had manifested disloyalty to Greece when he visited the Bulgarian Maccabees last summer, allegations which led to a violent outburst of anti-Semitism in Saloniki a fortnight ago, were today branded "mean slanders" by Col. A. D. Tagger, chairman of the Bulgarian Jewish Consistory.

In reply to numerous inquiries in connection with the attacks on the Jews of Saloniki, Colonel Tagger today issued the following statement:

"The chairman of the Jewish Central Consistory wishes to state that the representative of the Salonican Maccabee organization who was in Sofia at the time of the Maccabee sport celebration in the summer of 1930, came here, as did representatives of Maccabee organizations in other countries, to greet the Bulgarian Maccabee Federation on the occasion of its thirtieth anniversary.

"The behavior of the Salonican delegate, Mr. Cohen, during his entire stay in Sofia, was wholly proper and did not give the least occasion for doubting his loyalty. Anything else that has been said in his name or in the name of the Maccabee organization of Saloniki, is nothing more than mean slanders."

Greek anti-Semites had spread a report that when Mr. Cohen was in Bulgaria last year he had listened unprotestingly to addresses by Bulgarian Maccabees in which they advocated Macedonian independence. By his silence, the anti-Semites charged, he was a tacit party to the agitation.

Although this charge was repeatedly denied by the Maccabee organization in Saloniki and after it had been disproved by an investigation sponsored by the governor of the city, Greek nationalists attacked and burned the Jewish quarter of Saloniki.

U.S. Agency Members Would Welcome Round Table Parley Between Jews, Arabs, Britain

BASLE, July 15—Any steps taken by the British government to bring about a round-table conference of Arabs and Jews and representatives of the Mandatory government in order to consider the question of Palestine development and administration in a spirit of mutual understanding and co-operation, in the interest of all the inhabitants of Palestine should be welcomed by the Jewish Agency for Palestine in the opinion of the American members of the Agency.

This was the attitude expressed in a report read today to the meeting of the Council of the Jewish Agency by Joseph C. Hyman, secretary of the provisional committee of the American members of the Agency's Administrative Committee. The provisional committee firmly approves the formulation of a program that shall extend and intensify the work of understanding with the Arabs, Mr. Hyman declared.

The provisional committee, created when Felix M. Warburg resigned as chairman of the Administrative Committee in October, 1930, as a protest against the White Paper, is comprised of Dr. Cyrus Adler, acting chairman of the Agency's Council and president of the American Jewish Committee; Bernard Flexner, former president of the Palestine Economic Corporation; Morris Rothenberg, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign; Robert Szold, chairman of Administration of the Zionist Organization of America, and Julius Simon, president of the Palestine Economic Corporation, member ex-officio and treasurer.

Mr. Hyman's report reviewed the events and activities marking the status of the Jewish Agency since the last meeting of its Administrative Committee, September, 1930. In his review Mr. Hyman stressed the difficulty in creating an American section of the Jewish Agency and pointed out that the provisional committee hopes shortly to make a serious effort to lay the foundation for an organized Agency

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Aged Blind Jew Bequeathes \$375,000 for Jewish Home

LONDON, July 15—Maurice Lyon, an 86-year old Jewish silversmith of High Holborn, who died recently, bequeathed \$375,000 for the establishment of a Jewish convalescent home, it was learned today when the contents of his will became public. In the last six years of his life Mr. Lyons lived in seclusion over his shuttered shop in Holborn. With his brother and five sisters he had conducted his business in Holborn for over 60 years.

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Schwartz and Thomashefsky to Play on English Stage in Fall

Boris Thomashefsky, noted Yiddish actor, will appear on the English-speaking stage on Broadway during the coming season. Mr. Thomashefsky will make his debut on Sept. 7 at the Selwyn Theatre in "The Singing Rabbi", a musical comedy which he himself has written. His son, Harry Thomashefsky, will manage the production. Regina Zuckerberg, who has been playing Yiddish stellar roles with Mr. Thomashefsky for many years, will be featured in this production. The supporting company, however, will consist entirely of Broadway players.

Mr. Thomashefsky declares that he is leaving the Yiddish stage because it "has found itself without a sufficient audience to support its drama".

Another noted Yiddish actor who will appear on Broadway during the coming season is Maurice Schwartz, former director of the Yiddish Art Theatre, who will open a season in English at the Ambassador Theatre on Sept. 21. The first play in which Mr. Schwartz will appear on Broadway will be "If I Were You," a translation of Sholem Aleichem's comedy, "Shver tsu Zain A Yid". In a statement which he has issued Mr. Schwartz declares that lack of a fund which would assure a permanent existence to the Yiddish Art Theatre compels him to abandon the Yiddish stage temporarily.

New Shelter Home Is Dedicated in St. Louis

It is an affiliated constituent agency of the Jewish Federation.

Junior B'nai Brith Moves

To Strengthen Religious Spirit of Jewish Youth

MILWAUKEE, July 15—Acting upon the recommendations of one thousand rabbis and Jewish lay leaders, Aleph Zadik Aleph, Junior B'nai Brith, closed its eighth international convention here last night by instituting a movement to strengthen the religious spirit of American Jewish youth. The program includes propaganda for Hebrew literature and culture departments in colleges and universities, the creation of girls' auxiliaries to the Order, libraries of Jewish literature, the extension of camps for scouts' religious leaders, contact with Jewish leaders, expansion of forums and study groups, and the encouragement of synagogue attendance and membership.

The Order went on record as approving the observance of Jewish dietary laws at all district and international Aleph Zadik Aleph conventions. Approval was reached after a heated debate over the expense of dietary observance as against the spiritual obligations involved.

A religious good will meeting for Protestant, Catholic and Jewish youth was recommended for better interracial understanding. It was also decided to establish chapters in England, Czechoslovakia and Bulgaria. The establishment of an Aleph Zadik Aleph alumni endowment fund was also approved.

Adriel Fried of San Francisco was elected president by the 400 delegates attending the convention. Milton Blumenfeld of Braddock, Pennsylvania, was chosen vice-president; Lloyd Isaacs of Des Moines, Iowa, secretary; William Fineman, Minneapolis, treasurer, and Arthur Rothman, St. Louis, sergeant-at-arms.

Philip Seman, executive director of the Jewish People's Institute, Chicago, in addressing the convention, declared that the program of the Jewish center movement should be to develop "a Jewry which is not going to cringe and be ashamed of its Jewishness." A discussion ensued as to whether Judaism should be a culture without regard to creed, or a religion sustained by the synagogue.

The delegates were welcomed to the city by Ernest Bruncken, secretary of the harbor commission, on behalf of Mayor Daniel W. Hoan.

Brooklyn Bar Backs 2 Jews

Two Jews are among the 20 Brooklynites who received the largest number of votes among members of the Brooklyn Bar Association for nomination to the Supreme Court this fall. The Association named ten Republicans and ten Democrats and the two Jews are Meier Steinbrink, Republican and Herman S. Bachrach, Democrat. Mr. Steinbrink is considered sure of receiving one of the two nominations allotted to the Republicans for the 12 new places on the Supreme Court in the second district.

Considerable surprise has been expressed that Joseph J. Baker, president of the Jewish Hospital, who is thought to be in line for one of the Democratic nominations, did not appear on the Bar Association's list.

Story of Nes Ziona Told in German Book of Hebrew Library

JERUSALEM, July 15—There has just appeared the first booklet of the German edition of the Hebrew Palestine Library "Lanoar." This is "Nes Ziona" by S. Ben-Zion, the well-known Hebrew writer. The translation is by Dr. Max Mayer. Like other booklets in the series, "Nes Ziona" gives a vivid and intimate picture of the foundation, early growth and development of this flourishing Judean settlement. The Palestine library, which in the original Hebrew now includes 30 volumes, is published in conjunction with the Jewish National Fund by Omannuth, Tel Aviv. The volumes are illustrated, and each carries a map of the respective settlement region.

The first booklet in the French edition is "Mikveh Israel" by S. Hillels, translated by J. J. Cohen. Mikveh Israel owes its foundation to the Alliance Israelite Universelle.

There will shortly be published the first volume of the English edition of this library, "Dagania" by Joseph Baratz, translated by Miss Lotta Levensohn.

Oldest Coast Jewish Charity Body Occupies Its New Home

He also emphasized that despite many economies in the Agency, a diminution in its income and of the Keren Hayesod, the Agency's chief financial instrument, has created a situation resulting in liabilities and obligations approximately \$1,000,000 in excess of the debts of the Agency and of the Keren Hayesod when the Council was constituted two years ago.

In the light of this serious situation, Mr. Hyman said that the provisional committee believes that the budget for the coming year should be drawn most carefully and with a full realization "of the trouble and depressed state in which the world now finds itself. Only by the most careful planning and the most rigorous husbanding of our resources in this coming year will it be possible to avoid a collapse which might mean the loss of generations of work in the upbuilding of Palestine. A drastically reduced budget must naturally depend in large measure upon a transference of more responsibility for financial contribution on the part of local bodies and groups in Palestine, and on the other hand, on a sharply reduced Administrative apparatus."

Mr. Hyman directed special attention to the Allied Jewish Campaign of 1930 and to the fact that it laid the foundation "for a definite growth of harmonious understanding between various groups in the United States which heretofore had emphasized their willingness to lend their major support either to the Joint Distribution Committee or to the cause of Palestine. Although in some of the larger communities there was a marked reluctance at the beginning on the part of one group or of the other to engage in a joint fund-raising effort, by the autumn of 1930 a considerable number of the communities had organized themselves on a joint basis."

He considered it significant that "four national chairmen discovered that as a result of the Allied Jewish Campaign there was developing in many of the communities of the United States a definite tendency for the unification of all campaigns for extra local purposes through a central apparatus for fund-raising."

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Shawkat Ali to Speed Moslem University for Jerusalem

JERUSALEM, July 15—Shawkat Ali, Indian Moslem leader who is now on his way to London to attend the Indian round table conference, will return to Palestine to spend some time after the conference in order to organize the work of the projected Moslem university in Jerusalem. The proposed Moslem University is part of the Pan-Islamic movement.

It was given renewed life with the burial in Jerusalem of Mohammed Ali, brother of Shawkat Ali. After his brother's death, Shawkat Ali spent some time here with the Grand Mufti in outlining plans for the university which is on the agenda of the World Islamic Congress. The university would welcome Christian students from the Eastern countries.

May Dissolve Warsaw Kehillah And Turn Its Affairs Over To Government Commissioner

WARSAW, July 15—The newly-elected board of the Warsaw Jewish community may be dissolved and a government commissioner appointed to conduct the affairs of the community, the Jewish press here suggests today. The first two meetings of the board, it is pointed out, have shown that it is impossible for either of the two opposing sides, the Agudists or the Zionists, to obtain a stable majority to enable it to form an administration to carry on the affairs of the community.

The two meetings of the board held since the elections have both been of a stormy character. At the second meeting, held on June 29, when the new executive was elected, Agudists and Zionists several times came to blows, and some of the incidents, it was said, may be followed by legal action. The new executive consists of eight Agudists, four Zionists, two Mizrachists and one non-partisan.

The Warsaw Jewish community, the largest in Europe, has had a chequered existence since its board has been a democratically elected body. The two opposing sections, the Zionists and the Agudists, have always been more or less equal in numbers, and deadlocks have consequently been frequent. The suggestion that the community should be dissolved and a government commissioner appointed to conduct affairs has been made on previous occasions.

The very first meeting of the kehillah after the elections in 1924 broke up in disorder as a protest against the insistence of the government that the proceedings should be conducted in Polish. No meeting was held for 19 months until February, 1926, when permission was given for the proceedings to be conducted in Polish, Yiddish or Hebrew. Deadlocks occurred constantly and on one occasion the budget could not be passed for months, so that the executive finally resigned until the deadlock was broken as the result of a compromise between the Zionists and

New Palestine Law Gives High Commissioner Sole Discretion Over Eviction of Land Tenants

JERUSALEM—The first fruits of the land policy initiated by the Shaw Commission Report, and endorsed by the Passfield White Paper, are visible in the new "Protection of Cultivators (Amendment) Ordinance of 1931" which has received immediate promulgation in a special number of the Official Gazette of May 29.

The principal effect of this Ordinance is to transfer to the High Commissioner himself at his absolute discretion the decision as to whether tenants may be evicted, excepting in those cases where the tenant has failed to pay his rent or failed to cultivate the land properly. His action in such cases is to be adjudicated by a board of representatives of landlord and tenant under the chairmanship of a district officer. In other cases the High Commissioner has to be satisfied that equivalent provision has been secured towards the livelihood of the tenant before such tenant may be evicted by the landowner.

The second new feature of the Ordinance is that which lays down that provision must be made for the livelihood even of persons who may have grazed or watered their animals for five years or even cut wood or reeds or engaged in "other beneficial occupation" on the land, whether they have done so by right, custom, usage or even sufferance.

The transfer of discretion to the High Commissioner rather than to the courts, which would be guided by law on the subject, prevents any appeal and permits the administrative officers of the Government to decide as they please, whether or not they are satisfied that the tenant or woodcutter has been adequately compensated. This opens the door to political pressure and even to blackmail on the part of genuine and false trespassers. The widening of the category of persons able to claim compensation to include those who have used the land "on sufferance," that is, without the knowledge or authority of the owner, is a particularly significant innovation.

There can be little doubt that the effect of the new law, particularly in the hands of an unfriendly administration such as the present, will be to render more difficult the already burdensome procedure involved in land purchase on the part of Jews. No

At the same time the steering committee was holding another stormy session at which no definite decision was reached. On the one hand the Laborites are demanding that several resolutions already adopted concerning internal Palestine affairs should be modified. After weary hours of waiting, the exhausted delegates at last heard the official announcement of Dr. Leo Motzkin, chairman of the presidium, that the Congress will resume its session at 5 P. M. The possibility is not excluded that the Congress may adjourn without electing a new Executive, in which case the Executive will be chosen by the new Zionist Actions Committee elected yesterday.

Before yesterday's session adjourned 52 members to the Council of the Jewish Agency were elected. These, together with the 58 members of the Actions Committee, will constitute the Zionist half of the Council's membership. The Revisionists refused to utilize the ten mandates assigned to them on the Council and the Congress completed the Zionist representation by electing ten others.

Levy Returning As Assistant Director of Straus Center

Dr. Abraham J. Levy will sail for Palestine, July 23, on the S. S. Sinaia, to assume his duties as assistant director of the Nathan and Lina Straus Health Center of Hadassah in Jerusalem. Dr. Levy, who is a Palestinian and a graduate physician, was enabled to pursue his studies in public health at Yale University by virtue of a scholarship granted to him by Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America.

Dr. Levy distinguished himself while at Yale, by completing the two year course in public health in a period of one year, during which time he not only wrote several valuable articles which have appeared in leading publications in this country, but also wrote a monograph on the "Songs of Moses," which has just been published by the Oriental Review Series. His article on the "Effects of Quinine on the Tubercle Bacillus" appeared in the June issue of the American Review of Tuberculosis, and his thesis on "The Health Center as a Community Service Unit" will be published by Yale University. In recognition of the high quality of his work at the University, he was elected to the Delta Omega, the Public Health Honor Society.

Plan New Jewish Charities Scheme in London With Fund Of \$1,000,000 Left in 1913

LONDON, July 15—A charitable scheme "to sustain poor Jews who in consequence of religious persecution or other misfortune shall take refuge in England" is now being prepared here with a fund of \$1,000,000 left in 1913 by the late Adolph Haendler, a French Jew. Owing to the intervention of the war the scheme was never organized but it has now been revived. Twenty Jewish charitable institutions in London would benefit from Haendler's bequest.

The subject arose when the attorney general asked the chancery court here that the charity created by the bequest "to the Israelite community of London bearing the names of Nathan and Adolph Haendler," be administered under the order of the court. A plan for the use of the money drawn up by the attorney-general's office was approved by the court.

The trustees of the bequest are Chief Rabbi Joseph Hertz, Lionel Nathan de Rothschild and Robert Revel.

Organ of Grand Mufti Charges Chancellor's Resignation Is Due to Zionist "Intrigue"

JERUSALEM, July 15—The resignation of Sir John Chancellor, High Commissioner of Palestine, is due to a Zionist intrigue, declares Al-Jamea al Arabia, semi-official organ of the Grand Mufti, today. The paper claims that High Commissioner Chancellor realized that the Palestine post was difficult for an administrator wishing to do justice.

Chancellor, the Arab paper adds, showed an inclination for justice and "therefore the Jews organized an intrigue against him."
