Palestine Chief Secretary Warns Mufti's Organ Against Publishing Inciting Articles (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, July 17-Sir Mark Aitchinson Young, chief secretary of Palestine, today sent a warning to Al-jamea al Arabia, the semi-official organ of the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, against its publication of inciting articles in connection with the Arab campaign against sealed armories in the Jewish colonies. In his warning Sir Mark stressed the fact that similar articles were responsible for the 1929

Notwithstanding his warning the campaign itself continues unchecked and in full swing. The chief of the Arab scouts, speaking at a meeting convened to protest against the armories, rejected mere protests as useless and called for action. "Your land, your lives and your property are endangered and if we do not awaken we will be killed by Jewish fire kept in the colonies," he declared.

On the other hand the Jewish press today points out that in the last week alone 26 Arabs have been arrested for carrying arms. The papers cite this to prove to what extent measures for the safety of the Jewish colonies re-main most essential. (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BASLE, July 17-The newly-elected Zionist Actions Committee, the governing Zionist body in the interim between Congresses, held its first meeting today and decided to hold a session of its presidium every three months in order to control the activities of the Zionist Executive. Dr. Leo Motzkin, chairman of the old Actions Committee, was reelected chairman.

The Committee, consisting of 52 members and six so-called co-opted members, is divided by parties as fol-lows: General Zionists, 18; Laborites, 15; Revisionists, 10; Mizrachi 7 and Radicals, 2. The six-co-opted mem-bers are Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the retiring president of the Zionist Orretiring president of the Lionist Or-ganization; Menachem Mendel Us-sishkin, president of the Jewish Na-tional Fund; Dr. Leo Motzkin, Isaac the voting right.

The Committee includes six Americans, all from New York. They are Louis Lipsky, former president of the Zionist Organization of America; Jacob de Haas, chairman of the or-Jacob de Haas, chairman of the or-ganization committee of the Zionist Organization of America; Mrs. Edward Jacobs, president of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America; Berl Locker, general secretary of the Zionist Socialist Party of America: Rabbi Wolf Gold, and Abraham Goldberg.

Pearl Franklin of Chicago, Elihu Stone of Boston, Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence and Abraham Tulin of New York are the American alternates on the Committee.

Greek Diplomat in Warsaw Blames Communists for Saloniki Anti-Jewish Riots (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, July 17-Blaming Communists for the recent anti-Tewish outbreaks in Saloniki, the Greek consul in Warsaw stated today during a visit to the office of the Warsaw Jewish community that the Greek people were never inclined toward anti-Semitism and that Premier Venizelos of Greece is a friend of the Jewish people.

The Consul was greeted by the Kehillah leaders, Prof. Abraham Schorr and M. Feldstein. In greeting the Consul, Prof. Schorr pointed out that the Greek government is under obliga-tion to fight anti-Semitism in Greece and to compensate the Jewish victims of the recent Saloniki pogrom.

The visit of the Consul to the Warsaw Kehillah office was in connection with the proposal of the local rabbi-nate to declare a "cherem," or religious boycott, against esrogim (a kind of citrus fruit used in the Succoth religious services) that are imported here every year from Greece, in retaliation for the recent pegrom in Saloniki

WARSAW, July 17-Pinchas Osher Litwak, the 17-year old Jewish student who was injured during the anti-Semitic disturbances in Radom on June 13 and 14, died here today of his injuries. The government authorities at Radom have refused to permit Litwak's body to be brought to Radom for burial, giving as the reason for the refusal the fear of new disturbances during the funeral.

As a result of the action of the Radom officials, Litwak will be buried in Warsaw. He died in a Warsaw hos-pital to which he was removed after the outbreak.

88-Year Old Minneapolis Jew Leaves for Palestine Alone (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

ST. PAUL, July 17-An aged St. Paul Jew who has wandered over three nations and who now is 88 years old has left here alone for Palestine, that he may realize a lifelong desire to "die in the Holy Land."

From the time when he was a small boy in Poland and his grandfather told him stirring tales of the ancient Hebrews under David and Solomon, Louis Michnisky has been intensely anxious to visit the homeland of his ancestors.

When he grew to manhood, moved to Germany, and, 50 years ago, came to St. Paul, he still harbored that desire. A visit to Palestine to trod the paths of his fathers was his greatest dream. To live the last years of his life there and die "in the Holy Land," would be the consummation of all his wishes.

The responsibilities of caring for a family kept Mr. Michnisky from realizing his dream. He established a clothing store in St. Paul. It prospered. His children grew up, moved away and prospered in turn. Four years ago, with his wife, he moved to the Jewish Home for the Aged here.

There his interest in religion and his piety earned him a reputation. Though he had no training he often was placed in charge of services at the home. And to the old people living there he was known simply as "Rabbi" Michnisky. Two years ago Mrs. Michnisky died. Mr. Michnisky once more was alone. Reminiscing during the long nights and days over the ambitions and desires of his boyhood, his old desire to

visit Palestine again possessed him.

Before closing a scheme for a mil-lion members of the Jewish Agency paying five dollars annually was ac-cepted today by the Council. The plan was fathered by Joseph Sprinzak, Pal-estine Labor leader. The Council appointed a special committee to investigate during the year the workability of the plan and means for its realiza-

The scheme was discussed in the report rendered to the Council by its acting-chairman, Dr. Cyrus Adler. He said that while he was not sure that the idea was feasible he thought it correct and urged its favorable consideration so that there might be a reasonable certainty with regard to budget and income.

At the same time a special effort to raise \$1,000,000 in order to meet the extraordinary financial position in which the Executive of the Iewish Agency finds itself was decided upon. The decision was made after the Council had heard a detailed report from Dr. Bernard Kahn on behalf of the budget committee.

Of the \$1,000,000 to be raised, \$500,-000 is needed within the next few months in order to make possible the continuation of the Jewish work in Palestine. The second \$500,000 is required as a reserve for a stabilization fund to be set aside after the requirements of the regular budget have been

satisfied.

In his report Dr. Kahn pointed out the need of raising \$500,000 within the next few months in order to meet the obligations of the Jewish Agency. He cited figures to show that until September \$780,000 is necessary.

The Council also resolved to appoint a joint committee from its Executive and the Jewish National Council of Palestine which is to consider proposals for the transference of the Palestine health work to the National Council and to the Hadassah. In other resolutions the Council urged economy and the merging of the various offices of the Keren Hayesod, the Agency's chief financial instrument, in order to consolidate the administration of these

offices. The Council took note of the negotiations with the National Council concerning the transfer to the Palestine Iewish community of all financial responsibility for health and educational institutions and for individual teachers. The Agency Executive was empowered to bring these negotiations to a close and to take all necessary steps so that the transfer may be effected not later

adopted resolution the Council of the Iewish Agency for Palestine this morning went on record again with a "sincere desire for the creation of a durable understanding between Jews and Arabs in Palestine on the basis of mutual confidence and respect" and declared that it is the Council's conviction that "Jews and Arabs have a common interest in the peaceful development of Palestine."

In the same resolution the Council instructed its Executive to continue its work "for the establishment under the Mandate of harmonious relations between Jews and Arabs based on the acceptance of both parties of the prin-ciple that neither is to dominate or

to be dominated."

At the same time the Council unanimously approved a resolution pro-testing against the difficulties attaching to Jewish land purchases in Palestine, Jewish immigration to Palestine and the employment of Jewish labor on public works despite the assurances contained in Premier MacDonald's

This resolution declared that "the Council draws attention to the continuous difficulties attached to the purchase of land by Jews, to Jewish im-migration and to the employment of Jewish labor on public works despite the Premier's letter. Moreover, the Tenants' Protection Ordinance has been amended in a manner which very seriously impedes the acquisition of land by Jews. The Council accordingly urges the Mandatory Power to take immediate steps with a view to satisfying on the basis of the Mandate the iustified claim of the Jewish Agency in respect to the aforementioned matter."

Basis for Future Discussion

In another resolution, also unanimously approved, the Council approved of the action of its representatives in the negotiations which led to the Mac-Donald letter and characterized this document "as a basis for further dis-cussions of the Jewish Agency with the Mandatory Power to the effect of implementing the assurances to the Jewish people contained in the letter and the creation of such conditions as will ensure the uninterrupted develop-ment of the Jewish National Home."

The text of this resolution reads as follows: "The Council of the Jewish Agency approves of the action of its representatives in the conduct of the negotiations which led to the issuance of the Premier's letter, and takes note of the Premier's statement as to the authoritative character of this docu-The Council expresses appreciament tion of those assurances and definitions in the letter which show a desire for calling a world Jewish congress in the summer of 1932. Rabbi Silver Finds Zionist Congress Acquitted Itself Well (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

CHOCORUA, N. H., July 17-In spite of besetting difficulties the just concluded World Zionist Congress acquitted itself remarkably well and has again manifested the practical idealism and good sense which are traditional in this parliament of world Jewry, Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, acting chairman of administration of the Zionist Organization of America, declared today in a statement issued at his summer home.

Characterizing the Congress as "the most weighty and difficult one since the famous Uganda Congress in 1903," Rabbi Silver, who is spiritual leader of the Cleveland Temple, said that while the Congress was a stormy and im-petuous one "it left Zionist ranks unbroken, cleared the air, and opened the way for a full program of constructive

Zionist effort in the future."

The retirement of Dr. Chaim Weizmann from the presidency of the World Zionist Organization and of the Jewish Agency "is no reflection on him nor on his great and unforgettable service to the cause of Israel's national liberation," Rabbi Silver declared. "He has written his name large on the pages of Jewish history for all times. The White Paper of the British gov-ernment, issued last October, was re-sponsible for Dr. Weizmann's original resignation, and the government's continued attitude of non-cooperation made his return to the leadership of the movement, at least for the time being, practically impossible. A new leadership was required, and a new leadership has been chosen.

"The movement fortunately will not be without Dr. Weizmann's counsel, for he has accepted membership on the actions Committee. The separation of the program for private economic de-velopment from political activities and the setting up of an independent agency for the stimulation of economic undertakings in Palestine are steps dicthe budget which was adopted is undoubtedly a limited one, but it is compatible with the present resources of the movement and with world-wide economic conditions."

Rabbi Silver also lauded the Congress for restating the Zionist position, and for its refusal "to sacrifice the best historic purposes of the Jewish people for temporary expediency" as well as for its rejection of "every attempt to minimize the fundamental aim of Zionism.

After a lively debate it was decided by a vote of 28 to 17, with many members not voting, that the resolution should not be put to a vote. The resolution was then removed from the agenda.

D'Avigdor Goldsmid of England, on behalf of the political commission which discussed the resolution throughout the night, submitted it to the Council with Dr. Cyrus Adler's suggestion that it should not be read but considered as confidential and only the gist of it read to the Council which should vote on it on the basis of the gist of it.

The gist of the resolution declares that the Council of the Jewish Agency's participation in the development scheme to the decision of its Executive. This suggestion created considerable excitement among the Zionist mem-bers, Menachem Mendel Ussishkin. president of the Jewish National Fund, asking Mr. Goldsmid whether the resolution had been unanimously adoptby the political commission.

When Mr. Goldsmid replied in the affirmative, Oscar Gruenbaum, Austrian Zionist, protested, declaring that it had been adopted against the opposition of the Zionist members of the commission. Mr. Goldsmid then declared that his reply had been based on a misunderstanding and that actually no unanimity existed in the political com-mission. Louis Lipsky, on behalf of the Agency's Zionist members, then declared that it was impossible to vote for a resolution the contents of which remain confidential

Following this declaration a vote was taken and by 28 to 17 it was de-

scapegoat but in reality he emerged bigger than before. The vote of the majority of the American delegation was solemnly dictated by a policy of revenge against Weizmann. Mrs. Archibald Silverman, an alter-nate member of the Actions Committee,

said "a change of leadership was absolutely necessary at this particular juncture in Zionist affairs. I was not against Dr. Weizmann, but I voted against him as a protest against the British government."

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
