Strassburg Kehillah Denies It Refused to Permit Burial Of Polish-Jewish Student

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, July 24—The Strassburg Jewish community today denied reports published abroad that it had refused to permit the burial of a Polish-Jewish student, who had died in Strassburg, in the cemetery belonging to the community. The report also stated that in view of the refusal of the community to permit the student's burial, he had to be interred in a plot forty miles away from Strassburg.

In making its denial the Strassburg Jewish community gave the actual facts in the case. It appears that some time ago it became apparent that within a generation the cemetery of the Strassburg community would be completely filled if, as in the past, Jews were interred there without any restrictions. The community therefore decided to safeguard the rights of its members and to reserve the Strassburg cemetery for the local Jews exclusively.

This decision was reached about two years ago. However, in order to insure every co-religionist of a Jewish burial, the community purchased a plot of ground adjoining the cemetery of Gerstheim where all those who were not official members of the community would be buried without regard to their origin.

This was the case with the deceased Polish student, except that in his case the community went one step further and provided the expense of burial. The chief rabbi of Strassburg officiated at the funeral services and prayers were recited just as in the case of every burial in Strassburg itself.

Transjordania Not Included In New Palestine Land Survey

LONDON, July 24—Transjordania will not be affected by the new Palestine land inquiry in connection with the Palestine development scheme, Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary of state for the Colonies, informed the House of Commons today in response to an inquiry from Commander Kenworthy, Labor member.

Commander Kenworthy had asked whether the new inquiry into the possibilities of land settlement and cultivation in Palestine would extend to unoccupied or uncultivated lands beyond the Jordan River. Dr. Shiels answered this question with an emphatic no, explaining that Transjordania is under a different administrative system.

Yesterday the Manchester Guardian criticized the Palestine development scheme and urged the British government to solve the Palestine land problem by including Transjordania within the boundaries of Palestine land settlement.

Berlin U. Rector Who Expelled Jew Replaced

BERLIN, July 24—Prof. Gustav Adolf Deissmann, rector of the University of Berlin, whose resignation had been demanded last week by Karl Zweig because the latter's stepson, Leo Dobriner, had been expelled from the University on unfounded charges of having participated in the recent anti-Semitic student riots, was replaced today by Heinrich Lueders, professor of Indo-Aryan philology at the University of Berlin.

In an open letter to Professor Deissmann, Herr Zweig had accused him of ruining a stepson's life by ousting him from the university. Jewish students were of the opinion that Dr. Deissmann's action in expelling Dobriner was due to his endeavor to maintain a fifty-fifty balance between the Nazis and Jews in expelling students, although the Jews were blameless. Dobriner sought to commit suicide two weeks ago when Dr. Deissmann expelled him.

The new rector is well known in his field. He is the author of numerous works on classical and Hindu literature and on Sanskrit.

Keith-Roach Will Leave Palestine Entirely or Be Transferred from Jerusalem

LONDON, July 24—Edward Keith-Roach, governor of the Jerusalem district will either leave Palestine entirely or be transferred to the governorship of northern Palestine, it became known in London. J. E. F. Campbell, governor of the Jaffa district, is expected to succeed Keith-Roach as governor of Jerusalem as well as of all southern Palestine.

If Keith-Roach is displaced it will be a further step in the reorganization of the Palestine administration. Last year Harry Charles Luke, chief secretary of Palestine and acting High Commissioner during the riots of 1929 was replaced by Mark Aitchinson Young, Luke becoming chief secretary of Malta. High Commissioner Chancellors resignation becomes effective November 1 and General Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, commander of northern Ireland, has been named High Commissioner.

In the event that Keith-Roach is transferred to a post in some other part of the British Empire, Palestine Jewry will shed no tears of regret. It was on his orders that the British police forcibly removed the screen separating men and women worshippers at the Wailing Wall during the Yom Kippur services in 1928. The incident aroused worldwide Jewish protest.

Ask Britain to Demand Iraq Protect Jews, Other Minorities Before Admission to League

LONDON, July 24—Members of the House of Commons today called upon the British government to see to it that before Iraq is admitted to the League of Nations as an independent state it should give guarantees of fair play and protection for its national minorities. The question of Iraqi minorities created a long and heated discussion during the debate on the Middle East vote.

Replying to the apprehensions voiced by G. L. M. Mandar, Liberal, Sir Samuel Hoare, Conservative and other members, Dr. Drummond Shiels, under-secretary of state for the Colonies, said that the position of the Jewish minority in Iraq is the best example of Iraq's fair treatment to its minorities because none of the 88,000 Jews in Iraq are complaining of discrimination against them.

He also pointed out that the House knew that in countries where Jews are badly treated there was a great desire to go to Palestine, but no such desire was evinced by the Jews of Iraq who are spread all over the country and appear to be happy and contented.

Mandar declared that he hoped before Iraq was admitted to the League of Nations it would lay down guarantees of fair play for its national minorities and that these guarantees would be carried out in the daily lives of those minorities residing in Iraq.

Not to Discriminate

Sir Samuel Hoare demanded that Dr. Shiels should state whether the British government had made it clear to Iraq that no discrimination against national

Parliament to Debate Palestine Development Scheme Shortly

LONDON, July 24—Parliament will shortly be given an opportunity to discuss openly the Palestine development scheme, details of which were made public this week, J. H. Thomas, secretary for the dominions, declared today in the House of Commons. Mr. Thomas' statement came in reply to a query from Commander Kenworthy.

Addressing himself to Premier MacDonald, Commander Kenworthy asked whether the House of Commons would be granted a chance to discuss the proposed \$12,500,000 loan which is to finance the development scheme. Replying to this question, Mr. Thomas said that it is proposed to bring before Parliament a bill which asks that body to authorize the British government to guarantee the development loan. When the bill is brought in an opportunity for discussion will be given, he declared.

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150 Jewish Settlers, Tourists From America Reach Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, July 24—One hundred and fifty men, women and children, constituting the largest Jewish group that has come from the United States to Palestine at any one time for several years past, arrived today at Jaffa on the S.S. Providence. They left New York early this month.

Of the total number about thirty heads of families came here as permanent settlers. This group includes 80 people. The remainder are tourists or returning residents. The entire group brought more than \$1,500,000 to invest in various Palestine enterprises. Most of these new arrivals are so-called middle class settlers.

Fifteen American Jews left for Palestine on S.S. Sinaia which sailed on Thursday. Six of these are going to settle in Palestine permanently. One of the passengers, M. Weinberg, is going to study in the Mikei Israel Agricultural School in Jaffa. Twenty-five persons have applied for permits to settle in Palestine under the so-called capitalist category during the first three weeks of July, Dr. S. Bernstein, director of the Palestine bureau of the Zionist Organization of America, said yesterday.

Wills \$50,000 to Translate Jewish Publication Society's Text of Bible Into Chinese

SHANGHAI, China, July 24—The sum of \$50,000 is bequeathed by Silas Aaron Hardoon, the late Shanghai Jewish millionaire, for the translation into Chinese of the English text of the Hebrew Bible as published by the Jewish Publication Society of Philadelphia. This curious bequest became known to-day when Hardoon's will was made public here.

Hardoon, who died here on June 19 at the age of 84, was generally believed to be the wealthiest foreigner in Shanghai. A native of Bagdad, he came to Shanghai fifty years ago when the city was a mere village. He was married to a Chinese woman and although he had no children of his own he had adopted ten boys and girls of various nationalities.

At the time of his death his fortune was popularly estimated at \$25,000,000 in gold, most of it amassed in real estate transactions. Out of courtesy to his wife, who is a Buddhist, he made provision that his funeral rites should be conducted according to the Buddhist and Jewish religions.

Although he was one of the wealthiest men of the Orient he was practically unknown to the Jewish world until he died. Like most wealthy foreigners in China he feared being kidnaped and held for ransom by bandits who had often threatened him. To prevent these threats from being carried out he maintained an Irish bodyguard.

Labor Leaders Pay Last Tribute to Morris Sigman

The funeral of Morris Sigman, former president of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union, was held Thursday from the building of the Jewish Daily Forward on the East Side, where the late Jewish labor leader was eulogized. About 4,500 people came to the Forward building, while other thousands gathered along the route of the cortege. Burial was in Mount Carmel Cemetery, Glendale, Queens.

Among those who eulogized the activities of Mr. Sigman were Benjamin Schlesinger, president of the union, who presided; Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor; Edward F. McGrady, representing William Green, president of the A. F. of L.; Max Zaritsky, president of the Cap and Millinery International; Maurice Feinstein, secretary of the United Hebrew Trades; A. I. Shiplacoff, chairman of National Labor Committee for Palestine Workers; Joseph Kann, editor of the Freie Arbeiter Stimme; Nathan Chanan, secretary of the Jewish Socialist Verband, and B. C. Vladeck, manager of the Forward.

Supreme Court Justice Bernard L. Shientag, who was appointed with Mr. Sigman as a member of the commission named several years ago by Governor Alfred E. Smith to reorganize the garment industry, in an address at the cemetery, paid a warm tribute to Mr. Sigman.

Judge Lehman Gives \$2,000 to N. Y. J.D.C. Campaign

The receipt of a donation of \$2,000 from Judge and Mrs. Irving Lehman to the \$1,000,000 New York quota of the national \$2,500,000 campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee was announced yesterday by Albert Ottinger, chairman of the New York campaign. Mr. Ottinger also made public a gift of \$100 from Bishop William T. Manning, which was brought to headquarters by Assemblyman Saul S. Streit, chairman of the West Side Committee. Mr. Ottinger reported new donations totalling \$14,000.

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, chairman of the national campaign, yesterday stated that a large number of Jewish communities are planning intensive drives for the campaign beginning early in the fall. In response to an appeal by him for immediate cash to be dispatched abroad, many committees are now remitting checks and others are staging campaigns during the summer months, he said.

Henry Edward Wise, World War Hero, Dies in France

Henry Edward Wise, former stock broker and shirt manufacturer of New York who had been living in Paris, France, since 1920, is dead at the age of 50 in Vichy, France, according to word received here yesterday. The funeral was held in Paris.

Mr. Wise was decorated for bravery as a Red Cross official during the World War, when he became a lieutenant in the American Red Cross and was eventually promoted to a captaincy. Mr. Wise was wounded and gassed and received the Croix de Guerre from the French government as well as the Czecho-Slovakian War Cross.

Mr. Wise was born in Baltimore. He was graduated from the Pennsylvania Military College and later attended Columbia University. After engaging for a number of years in the shirt manufacturing business which his father had founded, he entered the Stock Exchange firm of Newburger, Henderson & Loeb, becoming manager of the firm's office at Twenty-third Street and Fifth Avenue.

Kaufmann Sees Hoover on Appointment to Denmark

WASHINGTON, July 24—David E. Kaufmann, of Philadelphia, American minister to Siam, discussed with President Hoover at the White House yesterday his proposed transfer as minister to Denmark, to succeed to the post made vacant by the recent death of Ralph H. Booth of Michigan.

After his call on the President, Mr. Kaufmann said that both senators from Pennsylvania, David Reed and James Davis, had recommended the transfer. No decision was reached. Mr. Kaufmann declared. In his two years in the diplomatic service, Mr. Kaufmann has served as minister to Bolivia and to Siam.

Plan United House to House Canvass for Palestine Funds

For the first time since 1921, when the gathering of funds for Palestine reconstruction was put on a systematic basis, all Zionist groups throughout the country will unite for a door to door canvass in order to secure the large sums necessary for the maintenance of Jewish reconstruction activities, according to a statement issued at the headquarters of the American Palestine Campaign.

A manifesto to young Jews, urging them to enroll as volunteers for the two days of the canvass, Sunday, October 11th and Sunday, October 18th, has been issued together with a statement of the Jewish position in Palestine. This document, the first of its kind, is signed by the leaders of all groups in the United States devoted to the raising of funds for Palestine. They are Morris Rothenberg, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, for whose \$2,500,000 drive the house to house canvass has been arranged; Robert Szold, chairman of administration of the Zionist Organization; Berl Locker, secretary of the Poale Zion, and Dr. David Rabelsky, chairman of the executive committee of the Zeire Zion.

The unusual measure of a door to door canvass is said to be dictated by the pressing need for funds for the upkeep of Jewish institutions in Palestine.

The manifesto reads, in part, as follows:

"The movement for the upbuilding of Palestine is a genuinely democratic movement. Born in the longing of the Jewish people to return to their ancient home, a longing that has found eloquent expression in their prayers and their literature, the democratic principle of this great Jewish ideal has always been in the foreground.

"It is the basis of the organization of the Zionist movement, in which every section and every shading of Jewish opinion—religious, social and economic—finds free play for the achievement of its particular viewpoint.

"It is on this democratic basis that our pioneers and all Jews of Palestine have consecrated themselves. They realize that their work is not for themselves alone, but that each of them, by the very hardships he is enduring, by the sacrifices he is making, is expressing the national consciousness of the Jewish people, is acting as an advance pioneer for a greater mass-action still to come.

"This democratic principle is emphasized in the fund-raising efforts for the basic Zionist institutions, which have always looked to and received their chief support from the masses. Without that support, regardless of how vast the sums might be that would be given by a few chosen individuals, the rebuilding of Palestine would not be an act of the Jewish people, demonstrating its national consciousness.

"The American Palestine Campaign of the Jewish Agency is based on the same democratic ideal that permeates every phase of the effort to rebuild Palestine. Its appeal is not to individual Jews; its appeal is to Jewry; and

Cecil Sees Establishment Of Jewish National Home As Duty of Civilization

PRAGUE, July 24—The establishment of the Jewish National Home in Palestine is a sacred duty of civilization in reparation of the many injustices to which the Jewish people have been subjected, Lord Robert Cecil, former member of the British cabinet and patron of the Anglo-Palestine Club, declared in an interview here with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Lord Cecil, who was in Prague to attend a meeting of the Inter-Parliamentary Union, said, "I am convinced that after this National Home is established, the Jewish people will once again contribute to the world's civilization. I feel certain that the English government, as far as immigration is concerned, will be guided only by economic considerations and will allow the Jewish immigration into the country to be as extensive as the economic condition of the country will permit."

Tuttle Defends Bible Study In Connection With Schools

Bible study in connection with the New York school system was upheld by Charles H. Tuttle, president of the Greater New York Interfaith Committee, in an address this week at a Rotary Club luncheon at the Hotel Commodore, which was attended by more than 300 people. Mr. Tuttle declared that the increase of lawlessness and juvenile delinquency in this country is "a symptom of widespread paganism" and expressed the opinion that only a well-planned program of moral and religious training can check this tendency.

Those who criticize the Bible study project because they fear a union between Church and State are "fanatical secularists," according to Mr. Tuttle.

He said, "It does not mean the invasion of our school system or of school buildings or of the school staff for religious instruction. The program thus suggested for consideration is outside of both school buildings, school personnel and school time. Emphatically, this does not mean the union of Church and State."

The plan to offer New York City high school students Bible study after school hours for scholastic credit will be carried out this Fall. Religious education centers will be established in Brooklyn and the Bronx and the instruction will be given under the direction of the committee, made up of Catholic, Jewish and Protestant clergymen and laymen.

Progressive Order of West Opens 27th Convention Today

ST. LOUIS, July 24—Morris Rothenberg, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, has been invited to deliver the principal address at the 27th convention of the Grand Lodge of the Progressive Order of the West, that will be officially opened on Sunday, July 26, at the Jefferson Hotel, and will conclude on Tuesday, July 28.

Preliminary conferences of the leaders of the Order begin today. The largest delegations are expected from Chicago and Philadelphia. Rabbi Ch. F. Epstein, Dr. Alex S. Wolf, Max Shulman of Chicago and other prominent Jewish leaders will extend greetings at the opening session. Mr. Rothenberg, New York lawyer and one of the leaders of the Jewish Agency, will deliver the principal address at the convention on Sunday afternoon. I. D. Goldberg, chairman of the convention committee and 1st vice-grand master, will introduce the grand master, Joseph Schiller of Chicago.

The principal business of the Sunday afternoon session will be the reading of the Grand Master's message and a complete survey of the activities of the order, that will be presented by Morris Shapiro, the national Grand Secretary. The reports of committee, will also occupy the business of the afternoon session. In accordance with the regulations of the Order, grand master Joseph Schiller of Chicago will retire from active leadership. Petitions for the nomination of officers will be received at the second session.

The original purpose of the P. O. W. that was founded in 1896, was to fraternally unite the Jewish people of St. Louis in a beneficiary society, to promote friendship and good fellowship, to establish a Jewish hospital for the sick and needy and create other charitable institutions in the community as well as to give all possible moral and material aid to its members and those dependent upon them. For several years the existence of the Order was of a local character but it spread rapidly in many of the larger cities in the west, south, north and east, until the P. O. W. became one of the large Jewish fraternal organizations operating in more than 18 states of the Union, with 82 subordinate lodges. 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Mayer Heads Federal Farm Board's Wool Cooperative

DENVER, Colo., July 24—Word was received here today that Sol Mayer of San Angelo, Texas, and a summer resident of Denver, was elected president of the National Wool Marketing Corporation, the wool and mohair cooperative of the Federal Farm Board, when the directors and stockholders representing the 40,000 members of the corporation met in Chicago.

Sol Mayer and his brother, Abe, are the only two Jews in the ranching business in Texas. By his election to the presidency of the National Wool Marketing Corporation, Sol Mayer, one of the most popular citizens of Texas, becomes responsible for the sale and marketing of 125,000,000 to 200,000,000 pounds of wool a year.

Starting from modest circumstances and rising to a position of influence, Mr. Mayer now owns the "T" Half Circle ranch in Sutton and Schleicher counties, Texas. Some years ago he found a large lake of water in western Texas near which he established an irrigation colony and to furnish the necessary transportation built his own railroad thirty miles long.

Although he lives in San Angelo, Mayer is seldom home, travelling 50,000 miles a year to keep in touch with his many interests. He spends his summers in Denver.

Seek to Protect Purchaser Of Kosher Meat in Boston

BOSTON, July 24—Steps are being taken here by the United Kosher Butchers, of which Hyman Shulman is executive director, to protect the purchasers of meat represented as kosher. This action is being taken in accordance with many complaints made to the organization that certain butchers in Greater Boston and vicinity are selling ordinary meat announced as kosher meat at the kosher meat prices. The United Kosher Butchers of Massachusetts and the Associated Orthodox Rabbis of New England are acting as a unit in an attempt to terminate unfair business practices and misrepresentation, and to assure the purchaser that the meat bought is kosher, as advertised.

Mr. Shulman has for four years organized and headed the work of the United Kosher Butchers and the Associated Orthodox Rabbis in their attempts to aid the sale of strictly kosher meats. He has been authorized by these associations to publish a list of certified kosher butchers, who actually hold the certificate of the Orthodox Rabbis and meet all their stringent requirements for cleanliness and purity.

minorities should be practiced in the future when Iraq is admitted to the League of Nations. Reviewing minority questions in the East recalled the anti-Jewish outbreaks in Palestine two years ago, Sir Samuel insisted that Iraq should make a categorical declaration before the Assembly of the League of Nations guaranteeing fair treatment for its minorities. He pointed out that the Kurds, Assyrians, Yezids and other national minorities were not well treated, and that such a declaration on the part of the Iraqi government would make it easier for Iraq to be admitted to the League of Nations.

Iraq, like Palestine, was freed from the Turks by the World War and was recognized as an independent state by the Allies, to be placed, however, under a mandate which was subsequently awarded to Great Britain. By the terms of the Anglo-Iraq treaty, ratified last November, England grants Iraq her independence, relinquishes its mandate and agrees to withdraw British troops after five years. The treaty becomes operative when Iraq enters the League of Nations.

Kurds Dissatisfied

When the Anglo-Iraq treaty was ratified Iraqi minorities such as the Kurds and Assyrians manifested antagonism to it, fearing that the pact would give the Arabs unlimited powers. The Kurds have carried their protest to the League of Nations and at the same time guerrilla bands of Kurdish chieftain have organized against the Iraqi government.

The Jews of Iraq are of two kinds, the native Iraqi and the Persian-Kurd stock. The Kurdish Jews are very Orthodox and almost all of them can speak Hebrew. They are mostly farmers and handicraftsmen and live in the Kurdish villages. They have a great attachment for Palestine and many of them, as a matter of fact, emigrated to the Holy Land.

The Jews of Bagdad, the Iraqi capital, have a kehillah, to which everybody, Orthodox as well as free-thinker, belongs. Out of a tax on kosher meat this Kehillah supports Jewish schools, which are attended by 7,200 pupils, dressmaking schools, which have more than 1,000 girl pupils, two hospitals, a clinic and several other institutions.

Almost 90 percent of the Jews of Bagdad are in business. Though industrially they play an important role in the country, Iraqi Jews have a smaller influence in politics than the Christians of the country who are less numerous than the Jews. The Jews have 5 members in Parliament, 2 from Bagdad and 1 each from Bethra, Mosul and Karkak and one senator.

The Jews of Iraq claim that their ancestors came here from Persia hundreds of years ago, some even claiming that they have been living there from the time of Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, who destroyed the first Temple.

U. S. Mizrachi Women Send \$5,000 for Palestine School

The American Women's Mizrachi Organization this week transmitted \$5,000 to Palestine as a contribution toward the erection of a Technical School for Jewish Girls there. The school will offer courses in domestic science, commercial subjects, hygiene and Hebrew. Graduates of the school will be prepared to assume positions as social workers, supervisors of workers' kitchens, hospitals and sanatoria, and teachers of trades. An employment bureau and a social center will also be established in connection with the school, which will be part of the Mizrachi educational system in Palestine.
