

## 13 Jewish Students Sustain Injuries Following Anti-Semitic Attack in Poland

Anti-Semitic National Democratic Students, Objecting to Display of Polish Flag, Open Fire on Summer Colony

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, July 18.—Thirteen Jewish students were injured, three of them seriously, when anti-Semitic National Democratic students attacked a Jewish students summer camp at Poronin, near Zakopane, today.

The most seriously injured students are a physician named Lifschitz, an engineer, Rothstein, and an undergraduate, Bacher.

The anti-Semitic students, hailing from Posen, began their attack when Jewish students declined to remove the Polish flag which they had displayed together with the Zionist flag, upon the expiration of a twenty-four hour ultimatum period set by the National Democrats.

The anti-Semites from Posen, their number augmented by inhabitants from the district, besieged the colony, aiming missiles at the buildings and opening pistol fire.

All the windows, the lamps and the furniture were broken up.

The police arrived within fifteen minutes after the start of the attack and dispersed the mob. The Jewish injured were taken to a Jewish hospital. One of the attackers also sustained injuries.

A semi-official communiqué denies that the National Democrats opened pistol fire and asserts that only toy revolvers were used.

## Jewish Boy Scouts Attacked by Nazis

BERLIN, July 18.—A group of Jewish boy scouts enroute to Bavaria were attacked upon their arrival in Wurzburg, the "Vossische Zeitung" reported yesterday.

The authorities have warned the Jewish Boy Scout Executive not to maintain a central Jewish scout camp this year as such a camp will be unsafe.

The Jewish Scout Association has summoned a conference to be held on July 23rd for the purpose of taking up this and other Jewish questions in Germany.

## Charges Police Murdered Jewish Youth on Alleged Ground He Was Communist

"Unser Zeit" Demands General Inquiry; Reveals Death of Apprentice; Believe Government to Open Inquiry

BUCHAREST, July 18.—Charges that for the second time within less than three months attempts were made by the Bessarabian police to kill innocent Jewish victims on the alleged assumption they were spreading communist propaganda, is made by "Unser Zeit," in connection with the death of a Jewish tailor's apprentice, Chaim Lewit.

Lewit was among 18 Jews arrested by the police last Sunday, on the ground that they were among the Communist group organizing a demonstration in Kishineff in connection with the elections.

The police at first charged that Lewit was a Communist. Subsequently, the police department asserted that

## Jewish Party Elects Four Deputies to New Roumanian Parliament

Union of Roumanian Jews Fails to Win Single Mandate as Bloc Did Not Get Minimum Vote

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BUCHAREST, July 18.—The Jewish Party of Roumania secured the minimum of 2% of the votes cast in yesterday's Parliamentary elections and thus is entitled to representation in Parliament, partial returns show.

The procuring of this 2% assures the election of Dr. Meyer Ebner, Josef Fischer, Michael Landau and Samuel Singer.

The Union of Roumanian Jews, which entered a coalition with the Economic bloc and put forth Dr. William Filderman as their leading candidate, secured not a single seat, since the Economic Bloc failed to secure the minimum vote necessary.

The peasant party, it is believed, gained a majority, while the Cuzists are expected to be the fifth strongest party in Parliament. The fate of the anti-Semitic Iron Guard party is not yet known. The Party of former Premier Jorga failed to secure a single mandate.

## Board of Deputies Declines Participation by Vote of 36 To 32 After Heated Debate

Opposition Gains Majority After Public Session Adjourns and Discussions Continued in Camera

LONDON, July 18.—Following a debate lasting three hours, the Board of Deputies by a vote of 36 to 32 yesterday rejected a motion to participate in the world Jewish conference scheduled for August 14th in Geneva.

Leading in opposition to participation in the world Jewish conference were the members of the Joint Foreign Committee.

When the Board expressed a wish to be acquainted with the undisclosed reasons which have prompted the Joint Foreign Committee to oppose the conference, press and audience alike were requested to leave and the session was continued in camera. It was during the closed session that the opposition obtained a majority.

The principal point of disagreement, it is learned was on the question of whether or not the conference could aid German Jewry.

Leonard G. Montefiore, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, which like the Board of Deputies is affiliated with the Joint Foreign Committee, maintained that intervention on the part of Jewish leaders from abroad is contrary to the interests of German Jewry.

Rabbi Samuel Daiches lead the opposition.

## Three Jewish Children Drowned After Cloudburst

## Lead Services of Robert Szold as Head of Zionist Administration

Praise for the modesty and sacrifice  
of Robert Szold who retired as head of  
the Zionist National Administration, is  
contained in an editorial in "Opinion".

The editorial says:  
"Character does count — though not  
always at national conventions. One  
felt that anew in the closing hour of  
the recent Zionist Convention. Two  
years earlier, as a result of the peace  
pact which has been more honored in  
the breach than in the observance,  
Robert Szold, one of the most capable  
of the Brandeis adjutants, was by the  
processes of accommodation and ad-  
justment finally chosen as Chairman of  
the Administrative Committee of the  
Zionist Organization of America. Though  
his record of Zionist service, including  
residence for a time in Palestine as  
an official of the World Zionist  
Organization, was unexceptionable,  
he was received with a minimum of  
graciousness and has, throughout his  
two years of service, faced a maximum  
of thinly disguised hostility.

For two years he has more than any  
other in the Zionist Administration  
borne its heavy burdens. Always looked  
upon as an outsider by those to whom  
the game is more momentous than the  
goal, Mr. Szold did the day-by-day work  
of administration with diligence and dig-  
nity, with capacity and integrity, quali-  
ties less winsome and less showy than  
*bonhomie*. Respect has always been his  
but he could not quite win the allegiance  
of those who bring to large affairs  
what might be called the "baseball  
mind."

"For some time Mr. Szold has clearly  
stated that he could not continue to  
bear the responsibilities of his office.  
The Convention days marked his re-  
tirement in favor of the newly-elected  
president of the Z.O.A. but happily for  
it the Philadelphia Convention was not  
permitted to adjourn without rising to

## Mizrachi Youth to Organize Three Colonies in Palestine On Three Thousand Dunams

Land Made Available by Jewish Na-  
tional Fund; 160 Jewish Families  
to Be Settled

The Board of Directors of the Jew-  
ish National Fund in Palestine has as-  
signed 3,000 dunams of land for col-  
onization purposes to the Mizrachi Youth  
in Palestine, Hapoel Hamizrachi, it  
was announced by Mizrachi Youth  
headquarters here.

On this area, the Hapoel Hamizrachi,  
with the aid of the Mizrachi Youth of  
America, will build three new colonies.  
A large part of this territory is suit-  
able for orange plantations.

The Hapoel Hamizrachi will colonize  
1,260 dunams of land in Wadi Hawa-  
rath. On this land the organization  
will settle 70 families who have been  
resident in Palestine for six to ten  
years and have plantation experience.

Another colony is to be built on 1,000  
dunams located between the colonies  
of Petach Tikveh and B'nai Brak. This  
area was purchased by means of a loan  
secured from the Jewish National  
Fund. Six families will be colonized  
there with the aid of the Brandeis  
Bank.

A third colony was established on  
800 dunams and is connected with the  
colony of Givat Chaim. One hundred  
and sixty families in all will be settled  
in these three colonies. The coloniza-  
tion plans are being carried out with  
the aid of the Mizrachi Youth of  
America.

## Minnie Untermyer Theatre To Be Completed in Fall

The Minnie Untermyer Memorial  
Theatre at the Hebrew University, gift  
of Samuel Untermyer of New York,  
will be completed in time for the open-  
ing of the academic session in October,  
according to an announcement by Dr.  
A. S. W. Rosenbach, President of the  
American Friends of the Hebrew Uni-  
versity. Plans provide for a seating  
capacity for 2,200 in the amphitheatre  
which overlooks a panorama of the  
Dead Sea and the mountains of Trans-  
jordan.

"Mr. Untermyer has provided funds,"  
said Dr. Rosenbach, "for a stage with  
adjoining rooms, which will replace the  
former wooden platform from which  
the late Lord Balfour dedicated the  
Hebrew University in April, 1925.  
Formal dedicatory exercises of the new  
stage will take place in connection with  
the inauguration of the forthcoming  
scholastic year at the Hebrew Uni-  
versity."

An expedition under the joint aus-  
pices of the University of California  
and the Hebrew University, to be un-  
dertaken in Turkey is also announced  
by Dr. Rosenbach. Dr. A. Eig, custo-  
dian of the Herbarium of the Hebrew  
University, will be in charge of the ex-

## Interior of Rosenwald Science And Industry Museum To Be Completed for Exposition

Rosenwald Family Furnishes Funds to  
Avoid Sacrificing Securities of  
Museum at This Time

CHICAGO, July 18—William Rufus  
Abbott, president of the Museum of  
Science and Industry, founded by Julius  
Rosenwald, announced that work on  
the central portion of the interior would  
go forward at once and would be com-  
pleted and equipped with exhibits for  
opening simultaneously with the Cen-  
tury of Progress Exposition.

The exhibits are to include a true  
coal mine of actual size.

The decision was reached after con-  
ferences between the museum trustees  
and the South Park commissioners.  
After completion of the external re-  
construction of the old Fine Arts Build-  
ing in Jackson Park, interior work has  
been discontinued temporarily. Market  
conditions are said to have delayed the  
sale of park bonds as well as making  
inadvisable immediate sale of stock  
certificates held by the museum, though  
both parties gave assurance that the  
entire museum would be completed in  
the course of time without serious dif-  
ficulty.

"Funds for this purpose," Mr. Abbott  
said, "have been furnished by the Ros-  
enwald estate under arrangements  
which will avoid the necessity of sacri-  
fice by the museum of any of its se-  
curities under the present abnormal  
conditions of the market."

## Herzl Memorial Meetings In Chicago and Baltimore

## Not a Single Jew on Reichstag Lists of Any Party With Exception of Left

Point Out That No Party Wishes to Risk Accusation That It is Pro-Jewish

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, July 18—With the Reichstag elections only two weeks off, it is apparent today that not a single Jewish candidate is listed by any of the parties with the exception of that of the extreme Left.

In the Reichstag elections of 1930, all the parties not anti-Semitic in their program, had Jewish candidates on their lists.

The "Israelitisches Familienblatt," commenting on this fact, explains that the lack of Jewish candidates is due to the strength of the anti-Semitic issue and no party is willing to risk being accused by the Nazis of being pro-Jewish.

The Nazis have spread throughout the city thousands of reprints of their bill and the measure as passed by the Prussian Diet regarding the confiscation of the property of East European Jews.

The reprints are part of the election propaganda of the Nazis.

The Nazi press carries daily attacks upon the Jews which are reiterated in special pamphlets.

## Max Lieberman to Mark Eighty-fifth Birthday

BERLIN, July 18—Max Lieberman, internationally famed Jewish artist and former president of the Prussian Academy of Art will mark his eighty-fifth birthday on July 20th.

Commenting on the occasion, the C-V. Zeitung, organ of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, says that July 20th will be a day of honor for international art.

Mr. Lieberman resigned from the presidency of the Prussian Academy of Art on May 31st, after holding the office for sixteen years. Advanced age was the official reason given for the resignation. Scepticism was expressed however, and the resignation was regarded as mysterious inasmuch as Mr. Lieberman had been elected president of the Academy for life.

## Max Balaban, Motion Picture Head, Dies

CHICAGO, July 18—Max Balaban, thirty-nine years old, one of the founders of the Balaban and Katz motion picture organization died here today at the Michael Reese Hospital following an operation on Saturday.

He is survived by his mother, his wife and two children, as well as six brothers, most of whom are officials of the Paramount and Publix organizations.

## Lewin-Epstein, Zionist Pioneer, Dies in Germany Preparatory To Settlement in Palestine

Was One of Founders of Colony of Rehoboth; Prominent in Zionist Movement in U. S.

BERLIN, July 18—Elihu Lewin-Epstein, Zionist pioneer and one of the founders of the Palestine colony of Rehoboth, died this morning at Baden Nauheim following a heart attack.

Mr. Lewin-Epstein, who was sixty-nine years old and a native of Poland, had lived in the United States for almost three decades. He was planning to take up permanent settlement in Palestine when he was stricken.

The deceased was the founder of the Carmel Wine Association, which undertook to distribute the wine of the Judean colonies in Palestine. He was also a director of the Hias. Recently he published a book of memoirs written in Hebrew.

Mr. Lewin-Epstein served as treasurer of the Federation of American Zionists and of the Provisional Zionist Committee formed during the war under the leadership of Justice Louis D. Brandeis.

In 1918 he went to Palestine with the medical unit organized by Hadasah.

A son, Rechaviah Lewin-Epstein, is in Palestine as the manager of the Palestine branch of the American Economic Committee for Palestine. Another son, Dr. Samuel Lewin-Epstein, also lives in Palestine. A third son and a daughter, Mrs. H. M. Hershman, residing in the United States, survive.

## Attempt to Bomb Jewish Maternity Hospital

TANGIERS, July 18—An attempt was made to wreck the Jewish Maternity Hospital here with a bomb.

The outrage is laid at the door of the Communists by the local Spanish press, but it is believed that the actual plotters are Spanish and Portuguese strikers.

Similar terrorization tactics were employed against a non-Jewish businessman, a Frenchman, Rousseau, whose garage was bombed.

## Order Western Star Decides to Suspend

CHICAGO, July 18—The Order of the Western Star, which has been functioning since 1894, at its last convention here determined to conclude its existence and instructed its officers to arrange for the formalities in this connection.

The order was moved to take this step because of the drastic fall in membership and because of the large deficit it was carrying.

## Rabbis of All Lands, Regardless of Age, to Be Admitted to Palestine

Stipulation Made That Chief Rabbinate Must First Guarantee They Will Not Become Public Charges

JERUSALEM, July 18—Rabbis of all lands, regardless of their age, will be admitted to Palestine if the Chief Rabbinate guarantees they will not become public burdens, it was announced here yesterday.

The new policy was announced by the High Commissioner, in accordance with a pledge given the Chief Rabbinate. Under this new ruling, 37 rabbis, who were previously refused admission, will now secure visas.

The High Commissioner, after consulting the religious communities, is planning to legislate against marriages of minors below the age of sixteen.

## General Zionists Ask Rejection of French Report

JERUSALEM, July 18—A conference of General Zionists of Palestine held here yesterday decided to urge the Actions Committee to reject the proposals made by Lewis French, Palestine Land Commissioner, in his report, notwithstanding possible amendments.

The Actions Committee is scheduled to meet in London on July 28th.

## Jewish Minister to Siam Returns for Visit

TOWANDA, Pa., July 18—Dr. David E. Kauffman, United States Minister to Siam arrived here for a two months visit.

The Jewish Minister expressed the belief that Siam will be the first country in the Orient to make an economic recovery.

## Bezalel School of Arts And Crafts Reopens

JERUSALEM, July 18—The Bezalel school of arts and crafts founded by the late Professor Boris Schatz was reopened today after a lapse of several years during which its activity was discontinued owing to lack of funds.

The re-opening of the school was announced by the Society of Friends of the Bezalel school.

pedition. Members of the Department of Botany of the Hebrew University will explore parts of the taurus and the anti-taurus mountains, gathering botanical material in those regions.

A number of applicants for entrance to the Division of Biological Studies which was opened at the Hebrew University last fall, had to be refused admission owing to lack of space and equipment, according to Dr. Rosenbach. Only twenty-two students could be admitted for work in biology this year, with one hundred forty-eight enrolling in the Faculty of Humanities and eleven in the Einstein Institute of Mathematics, according to the report just issued by the Registrar of the University.

"Practically one-half the one hundred eighty-one students now enrolled at the Hebrew University," said Dr. Rosenbach, "received their education in Palestine, while the remaining half represent over sixteen different countries including students from the United States and Canada."

the youth must have been killed by one of the demonstrators. A post-mortem examination revealed, however, that Lewit was shot in the back with a revolver of the type used by police sergeants.

"Unser Zeit" demands the government instruct the Bessarabian authorities to investigate the situation in Bessarabia and it is understood that such an inquiry will be conducted.

The paper points out that "our previous complaints never reached former high government authorities but now we persist in demanding the government pay attention to the widespread indignation and organize an immediate inquiry."

"Unser Zeit," the paper which published the first reports of the torture of Samson Bronstein, Zionist leader of Yedinez, Bessarabia, asserts that "last Sunday's events destroyed our faith and hope in the new government before we were able to relax from the limitless terror by the former government and while hundreds of innocent victims still linger in the prisons from the time of the Jorga regime."

The paper denies the allegation that Lewit was a Communist and terms the police charges a tissue of lies.

It points out that Lewit's parents are poor, observant Jews and that the son always accompanied his father to the synagogue. It is unthinkable that he was a Communist, "Unser Zeit" asserts.

a sense of Szold's service to the cause, service which rests upon the solid basis of character. This quiet, thoughtful man, whose lack of bumptiousness was imagined by the unthinking to be the equivalent of ineffectiveness, impressed himself upon the convention as did no other man. His Annual Report, which was his farewell, was such a stirring call to arms as conventions do not often hear."

"The Jewish Press" of Omaha, Nebr., also publishes an editorial of comment on the Zionist convention, in the course of which it says:

"The thirty-fifth annual convention of the Zionist Organization of America, held last week in Philadelphia, was marked by another change in leadership. The conclave, dominated by Lipsky's followers and their pro-Weizmann policy, virtually repudiated the Brandeis-Mack forces which assumed the reigns two years ago. No bitter controversies, however, marred the serenity of the convention, because the so-called Brandeis-Mack group put forth no opposition.

"But we fear that in the Zionist Organization of America altogether too much stress has been laid upon 'leadership.' What good is the most sagacious general if he has no army to lead? The true strength of the Zionist movement lies in the masses. They must form the foundation upon which we must build upward.

"The Zionist Organization lives for the upbuilding of Palestine. But the Jewish pioneers, in the Holy Land, facing unsurmountable difficulties and enduring unbelievable hardships, have not succumbed to the spirit of defeatism which is ours in the Diaspora. Theirs is the example we must follow — revitalization and recreation, not a deadening, unenergizing program of defeatism, Morris Rothenberg as president of the Zionist Organization of America does not have to contend with enemies within the ranks. He is an able leader with admirable qualities and splendid potentialities. Under him the Zionist Organization in this country must throw off its lethargy—must assume power and initiative in tremendously increasing the membership of the Zionists, in introducing Hebrew cultural activities, and in strengthening Palestinian achievements."

## Canadian Revisionists Hold First Convention

MONTREAL, July 18—After a night and a day session the first convention of the Canadian Zionist Revisionists, held here adopted a number of resolutions protesting against Dr. Magnes for punishing a certain number of revisionist students; protesting against the National Fund for leasing certain lands to the Arabs; protesting against the Palestine Office in Poland for so-called unfair distribution of certificates and protesting against the Zionist Executive for not reorganizing the Palestine offices in accordance with resolutions of the last congress.

Other resolutions call upon Jewry to join the ranks of the Revisionists into whose hands the destiny of Zionism has been entrusted and state that the only way to bolster the Zionist movement in America is to bring to this continent a Revisionist delegation headed by Vladimir Jabotinsky.

Executive members of the National Council of the American Revisionists, brought greetings from that body and spoke about the necessity to remove the present Zionist leaders by all possible means.

Officers elected for the coming year were M. Barsal, president; H. Abella, vice-president and I. Bratt, general secretary.

Addresses on "The Tel-Hai Fund," "Is a Jewish State in Palestine Possible Under the Present System" and the "Zionist Outlook," were delivered by I. Baratz, A. Zabeloff, and I. Ha-Carmeli of New York.
