Attackers of Jewish Summer Colony Fined 118 Zlotys; Six Face Trial

Official Communique Announces Punishment of National Democratic Students for Attack

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

CRACOW, July 22—Official announcement is made here today that anti-Semitic National Democratic students who attacked a Jewish student summer colony in Poronin, near Zakopane last week, were fined 118 zlotys each while six were arrested and held for trial.

As soon as the occurrence of the attack became known, the District Governor ordered the Police Commandant of Poronin to conduct an energetic investigation, says the official communique.

The fines and the arrests followed this investigation. The fines were imposed for damages.

The attackers besieged the colonies, entered the buildings, opened pistol fire and demolished furniture and lamps.

Sixth Jewish Candidate Elected to Parliament In Roumanian Elections

Likelihood Other Jews May Yet Win Seats; Re-election of Chief Rabbi Niemirower to Senate Assured

BUCHAREST, July 22—A sixth Jew has been elected to the Roumanian Parliament and is a National Zaranist candidate, it was learned today.

The new Jewish deputy is Aureliu Weiss, president of the B'nai Brith in Bucharest.

Several other Jews may yet find they have been elected to parliament by various parties, it was indicated today.

The elections to the Senate will insure the re-election of Chief Rabbi Niemirower as representative of the Jewish faith in addition to Max Aushnit, who is the unopposed candidate of the government party.

The Jewish Senator, Dinnerman, at the last moment, announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

Persian Jewish Community Denies Persecutions Necessitate Migration

Inform Alliance Israelite Universelle Jews Enjoy Freedom and Justice in Persia

PARIS, July 22—A protest against the alleged persecutions of the Jews in Persia was received here today by the Alliance Israelite Universelle from the Jewish Community of Persia.

The protest points out that "Persian Jews enjoy, under His Imperial Majesty, all benefits for granting freedom and justice to the Jewish population. There is no danger to Jewish life and property."

The protest denies that there is any need for Jewish migration from Persia.

Dr. Herman Badt Dismissed As Ministerial Director

BERLIN, July 22—Dr. Herman Badt, Jewish Ministerial Director of the Prussian government and Prussian representative in the Federal Council, was among the scores of Socialist officials who were dismissed from their posts yesterday by order of Chancellor Franz von Papen, Reich's Commissioner in Prussia.

Dr. Badt, despite his dismissal, continues as counsel for the dismissed Prussian cabinet in its petition to the Leipzig Supreme Court.

Postpone Discussion On Student Law

VIENNA, July 22—Discussion on the student law which would establish the Germanic character of student unions in Vienna universities and grant special rights to Aryan students was indefinitely postponed today by the Education Committee of Parliament.

The action was taken when the Social Democrats threatened obstruction tactics.

A number of other law projects which the government is desirous of having passed were also postponed.

Five Arabs Killed, Thirty Wounded in Affray

JERUSALEM, July 22—Five Arabs were killed and thirty wounded in an affray which occurred in the village of Koba near Jerusalem today.

Jewish Watchman and Son In Kukustaban Area Are Attacked by Bedouins

Son Receives Serious Injuries; Is in Critical Condition; Land Dispute Current for Months in This District

JERUSALEM, July 22—A Jewish watchman, Alexander Zeid, and his son, in the village of Sheik Abrek, in the vicinity of Kukustaban, were attacked by Bedouins early this morning. Zeid's son received serious injuries and is in a critical condition.

Several Bedouins were arrested. The scene of the attack is in a territory which has been the subject of much dispute between Jewish settlers and Arabs in recent months.

The Jewish settlers claim the right to plough the land which has been challenged on several occasions by the Arabs who attacked the Jews. In March a number of Arabs and Jews were arrested following a dispute over the right to plough the land which culminated with an attack by the Arabs.

The libel suit entered by the wife of Dr. Weiss against a taxi driver, Johannes Roack, ended yesterday.

Roack was accused of aiding the Nazis in spreading the rumor of the alleged immoral relations of Mrs. Weiss.

Roack pleaded guilty. Dr. Weiss asked the court to pardon Roack.

The Lewin-Epsteins were on the way to Palestine to make their home there when Mr. Lewin-Epstein's death occurred.

Mrs. Hershman is the wife of Dr. A. M. Hershman, rabbi for the last 25 years of Congregation Shaarey Zedek of this city.

Plan B'nai Brith Lodges In French Colonies

CINCINNATI, July 22—Twenty Jews of Mulhouse, Upper Rhine, have petitioned B'nai Brith for a charter to found a Lodge, it was revealed here. It will be B'nai Brith's second group in France. The Paris Lodge is only a few months old.

Mount Zion Hospital To Increase Facilities

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22—Because of the heavily increasing appeal for medical care due to the present economic situation, Mount Zion Hospital, an agency of the Federation of Jewish Charities, has begun the erection of a large new wing to house its out-patient department.

The wing, to be built at a cost of many thousands, will house the various free clinics which are conducted as a part of the Mount Zion service.

Last year a total of 55,000 visits were made to the out-patient department and authorities say that present demands indicate a far heavier total this year.

Five-Cent Kosher Kitchen Opened for Detroit Jewish Poor

Will Serve Meals Daily to 300 People
for Four Hours; Mayor Lauds
Enterprise

DETROIT, July 22—In the presence of Mayor Frank Murphy and a host of sympathizers, a five-cent kosher kitchen was opened here at the Beth Tephila Emanuel Synagogue. Meals will be served to adults for five cents, and to children for two cents.

Sponsors of the project stated that they have secured enough supplies to run the kitchen for a month, serving meals every day to 300 people between the hours of 12 noon and 4 p. m.

Max L. Black, attorney, president of the group sponsoring the project, presided at the opening ceremonies. Mayor Murphy, who partook of the first meal, stated in a brief address:

"This is a splendid example of Jewish social consciousness. Organized charities cannot cope with the situation and it is up to small neighborhood groups to care for the needy.

Rabbi Joseph Eisenman was another speaker.

Hindenburg Felicitates Max Liebermann

BERLIN, July 22—Max Liebermann, distinguished German Jewish artist received felicitations yesterday from President Paul von Hindenburg on the occasion of his eighty-fifth birthday.

Mr. Lieberman was named honorary president of the Prussian Academy of Art. Two months ago he resigned the presidency of the academy, which he had held for sixteen years, under somewhat mysterious circumstances. It was pointed out at the time that Mr. Liebermann had been named president of the Academy for life.

Lipsky Sails to Attend Actions Committee Sessions

Late Professor Simonsen, Leading
Jewish Personality in Denmark;
Resigned Chief Rabbinate

COPENHAGEN—The death of Professor David Jacob Simonsen, last former chief rabbi of Denmark, last month, removes from Denmark Jewish life one of its most interesting and versatile personalities.

Professor Simonsen was born in Copenhagen on March 17th, 1853. His father, Jacob Simonsen, was a big Danish banker. After graduating at Copenhagen University, he studied at the Rabbinical Seminary in Breslau under Frankel and Graetz, and when he completed his studies there in 1879, he returned to Copenhagen, and became assistant to Chief Rabbi Wolff, being the first Danish-born Rabbi of the Copenhagen Congregation.

When Chief Rabbi Wolff died in 1891, Rabbi Simonsen was unanimously chosen to succeed him as Chief Rabbi of Denmark.

He was Chief Rabbi for 11 years, resigning his office in 1902, in order to devote himself exclusively to scientific work. King Christian IX conferred upon him the honorary title of Professor on the occasion of his resignation.

Although no longer the official head of the Community, Professor Simonsen continued, however, to be the spiritual head of Danish Jewry, right up to the time of his death. When the pogroms swept Russia in 1905, and large numbers of Russian Jews passed through Denmark on their way to America, several thousand of them remaining behind in Denmark and settling there, he threw himself wholeheartedly into the relief work on their behalf.

It was due to Professor Simonsen and Moses Melchior, who was then President of the Copenhagen Jewish Community, that King Frederick VIII, of Denmark, who was an uncle of Czar Nicholas II, intervened in 1907 with the Czar on behalf of the Jews of Russia, as a result of which the pogroms which were then threatened were averted.

When Copenhagen, as the capital of a neutral country, became during the war a centre of Jewish relief work, Professor Simonsen stood at the head of this work, and when the Jewish Relief Conference was formed he was its first President.

He was also a member of the Executive Board of the Alliance Israelite Universelle.

Professor Simonsen was one of the early members of the Chovevei Zion movement, and when the Zionist Organization transferred its central office during the war from Berlin to Copenhagen under Leo Motzkin, in conjunc-

Founder of Clinic Issues Sworn Statement Charging Racial Prejudice Caused Closing

Places Responsibility on Bishop Manning; Quotes Latter as Saying He
Wants No Jews in His Church

A statement sworn to before a notary public, charging that racial prejudice is responsible for the closing of the Body and Soul Clinic in the Church of St. Mark's in the Bowerie was made public on Friday by Dr. Edward S. Cowles, founder of the clinic, its director and financial supporter.

Dr. Cowles charges Bishop William T. Manning is behind the eviction of the clinic on the ground that the majority of the patients treated are Jews inasmuch as the Jews comprise the largest part of the population in the vicinity of the church, according to a report in the "Herald-Tribune" of July 22.

Dr. Cowles quotes Bishop Manning as stating five years ago: "I do not want Jews in my church," while urging that courtesy be shown to Samuel Untermyer, who "is rich and powerful and a terrible fighter."

Mr. Cowles refers to an incident in connection with a meeting which took place on November 2nd, 1927 in the (Continued on Page 4)

Eighteen Jewish Artisans Receive Ministry Awards

WARSAW, July 22—Eighteen Jewish artisans are among the seventy recipients of gold medals awarded today by the Ministry of Trade and Industry to artisans who have successfully engaged in their vocations for more than twenty-five years.

The awards were made at a festive ceremony in which the Minister of Commerce participated. The latter highly lauded the achievements of Jewish artisans who, he said, have contributed greatly to the revival of Polish economic life.

\$16,000 Bequeathed To Jewish Charities

The sum of \$16,000 was bequeathed to five charitable organizations by the late Herman Hollander.

The organizations benefiting are the Home for the Daughters and Sons of Israel, \$5000; the Israel Orphan Asylum, \$4000; Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society, and the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, \$3000 each; Beth Abraham Home for Incurables, \$1000.

Dr. Morris Braude Named Professor in Psychiatry

Two Chicago Congregations Induct Rabbis

CHICAGO, July 22—Spiritual leaders of two Chicago congregations were formally inducted into office. Dr. Abraham Lobel, formerly of London, assumed the pulpit of Congregation B'nai David Haddon, and Rabbi Israel H. Weisfeld assumed the leadership of Agudath Achshin North Shore Congregation. Leading rabbis of Chicago participated in the installation services.

Dr. Lobel, who was born in Jerusalem, was educated in England, graduating from St. George College. He received his ordination in Palestine and America and has occupied pulpits in St. Louis and Dayton, O. He is an executive board member of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America and a member of the Assembly of Orthodox Rabbis.

Cantor Aaron Kritiz will be formally installed by the Agudath Achshin North Shore Congregation on September 11.

Rev. Zaludkowski to Succeed Roitman in New York

DETROIT, July 22—Rev. Elijah Zaludkowski, for the past five and a half years cantor of Congregation Shaarey Zedek, of which Dr. A. M. Hershman is rabbi, announced his resignation and his plans to leave for New York to succeed Cantor David Roitman at the Shaarey Zedek on 93rd Street and Broadway in New York.

During his stay in Detroit, Rev. Zaludkowski completed a number of compositions and was director of the Halevy-Hazomir Singing Society. Prior to coming to Detroit he held positions as cantor in Warsaw, Vilna, Rostov-on-Don and Liverpool. In Rostov he was for four years professor of music at the Russian Royal Conservatory.

Mr. Untermeyer had just concluded his address and Dr. Cowles was about to introduce Mr. Berkowitz when Mr. Edelblute rushed to him and stated: "I am sorry, but Bishop Manning has just ordered that Harry Berkowitz cannot speak in this church because he is a Jew," Dr. Cowles's statement asserts.

"I said: That is absurd. Mr. Samuel Untermeyer has just spoken and he is a Jew," Mr. Edelblute said: "I told the Bishop that Mr. Untermeyer was speaking and the Bishop replied: 'Never mind about Mr. Untermeyer, he is rich and powerful and a terrible fighter; show him every courtesy,' said Mr. Edelblute. But the Rev. Mr. Edelblute said (quoting Bishop Manning) 'I do not want Jews in my church,' the statement declares.

"The next morning I received word from the Rev. Edelblute that there would be no clinic work in his church," Dr. Cowles asserts.

tion with whom he founded the Jewish World Relief Conference, he placed himself at its service. It was the Copenhagen Bureau which restored communication between the Jewish war victims in Eastern Europe and Palestine and their relatives in England, America and Canada. It also collected funds, and most of this money was sent by the Copenhagen Bureau to Palestine in gold, and this, owing to the low value of Palestine currency, was the one thing that saved the Palestine settlement from a catastrophe. He also actively assisted the work of the Keren Hayesod.

In April, 1928, when Professor Simonsen attained his 75th birthday, the Danish B'nai Brith Lodge arranged a banquet in Copenhagen in his honor, at which Chief Rabbi Dr. Friediger and the leaders of Scandinavian Jewry paid tribute to him, declaring that the Scandinavian Jews were proud to have in their midst a man who was one of the outstanding personalities in Jewish life.

Professor Simonsen wrote many theological, historical and bibliographical treatises, and was a prolific contributor to Danish and foreign Jewish periodicals. Among his works is a study of the sculptures and inscriptions from Palmyra in the Jacobson collection in Copenhagen. Since 1917 he was joint-editor of the "Danish Journal of Jewish History and Literature."

To Settle in Palestine on Income Bearing Groves

Through the hearty cooperation of Palestine orange experts and the opportunity offered by the release of groves in Petach-Tikvah and Ness-Zionah, planted by Baron Edmond de Rothschild Agency, the PICA, the Palestine Settlers Service, have embraced the opportunity of organizing a group settlement of twenty American families in Palestine.

In making this announcement, Jacob de Haas states: "The stream of would-be American Palestine settlers has swollen considerably in the last few months. The deterrent to immediate settlement for many has been that while they keenly desire to possess orange groves, they cannot afford to settle now and wait for the trees to grow up and yield fruit. We have tried to solve that problem for twenty families, through the energetic effort of the 'Hanotiah' which is on the spot.

"Six groves in Petach-Tikvah and Ness-Zionah covered by mature trees which have been yielding excellent crops of oranges and some grape-fruit, have been secured and if negotiations with individual settlers are completed early in September, the property will be parcellated and the new owners come into a satisfactory income this fall."

Roumanian B'nai Brith Declines Conference Invitation

BUCHAREST, July 22—The Roumanian B'nai Brith organization has resolved not to send delegates to the Jewish conference in Geneva on August 14th, it was learned today.
