Center Party Refuses Jews On Lists; Regrets Ever Sanctioning Jewish Candidate

"Angriff" Warns Day of Reckoning Is
Coming; Central Union Accused
of Instigating Nazi Murders

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, July 26—The Center Party has not only refused to have Jewish candidates on its lists for Parliament, but has officially notified Jewish leaders it regrets that it previously had on its lists the Volkspartei leader, Georg Kareski, former head of the Berlin Jewish Community, as the presence of the Jewish candidate definitely harmed the Party.

BERLIN, July 26—The Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith issued a proclamation today declaring that the terror, the libels against the Jews and the threats have in the past few weeks reached impossible dimensions.

In Breslau the rumor has been spread that the Jews hide arms in synagogues. In Sensburg, the Jews are compelled by the Nazis to keep their shops closed.

The Central Union is accused by the Nazi press as being the center for issuing secret orders for the murders of Nazis.

The proclamation is signed by Dr. Julius Brodnitz, president of the Central Union and Dr. Ludwig Hollaender, director.

Moslem University Committee Announces Three Faculties

JERUSALEM, July 26—The Moslem University Committee, in line with the decision adopted at the Mufti's Moslem Conference late last year, today announced its intention of establishing three faculties at the outset.

The schools to be established are theological, technical and medical. The Theological school is planned to accommodate 600 students, the medical school 300 and the technical school 200.

Raises Peddler License Fee From \$6 to \$129; 500 Jewish Peddlers Affected

Sixty Percent Will Be Left Without
Means of Livelihood; Total Posses-
sions of Richest Not Above \$15

HAVANA, July 26—The municipality of Havana yesterday adopted a measure increasing the price of peddlers licenses from \$6 to \$129 per person.

The measure severely affects 500 Jewish peddlers, none of whom are in a position to pay the license fee.

As a result, they will be compelled to seek new means of livelihood after August 1st, when the licenses must be renewed. Sixty per cent of the families of Jewish peddlers will remain without means of earning a living.

The turnover and the possessions of the richest Jewish peddler is not more than \$15.

An urgent appeal has been addressed to Jewish public opinion in the United States to intervene in the matter.

Deputy Speaker in Parliament Upholds Accusations of Goglu Organization Against Jews

Supports Ritual Murder Charges of
Anti-Semitic Publications

MONTREAL, July 26—The Deputy speaker of the Canadian Parliament, Armon Laverne, sprang a sensational surprise today, by upholding the anti-Jewish allegations of the anti-Semitic French-Canadian Goglu Organization. Mr. Laverne even approved of their accusation that Jews commit ritual murders, according to a report in the "Canadian Jewish Eagle."

"This approval of the Goglu methods against Jews, is voiced, according to the "Eagle," in an article which the Deputy speaker of the Cana-

Order Investigation of Head of Government Grain Trust When Food Refused Jewish Settlers

New Anti-Holiday Campaign Launched
by Jewish Communists; Publish Special
Edition for Combatting Purposes

MOSCOW, July 26—A strict investigation of the administrator of the government grain trust, Ch. Garon, who allegedly has refused employment to Jewish newcomers in Stalindorf, has been ordered by the State's Attorney in Bira Bidjan.

It has already been established by a special committee appointed by the Communist Party investigating the reasons for food shortage that mismanagement is responsible for this situation. On the other hand, it was learned, that the Land Commissariat has ordered the liquidation of all stations in the Chabarovsk region which were established to grant food and shelter to Jewish immigrants enroute to Bira Bidjan.

The building of the agricultural institute at Chabarovsk was also discontinued. This, according to a wire received by the "Emess," endangers Jewish agricultural plans.

Rashkes has telegraphed that immigrants arriving from Germany and the Argentine for settlement in Bira Bidjan, will be housed in camps until the fall when houses will be found for them. He states that better treatment must be accorded foreign settlers inasmuch as the newly arrived groups are complaining.

Denver Consumptive Relief Receipts Show Drop

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

DENVER, July 26—The 28th annual meeting of the Jewish Consumptives Relief Society heard a report from its treasurer showing a diminution of receipts from contributors as a result of the economic depression. The trustees have instituted economies so as to keep the credit of the institution unimpaired and on a level with the budget. At the same time, there is to be no deviation from the previous standard of the maintenance of the patients, as regards food, shelter and medical attention.

Bronze plaques were placed in the Medical Building, commemorating the services of the late Dr. Adolph Zederbaum, Dr. O. M. Shere and Dr. A. S. Taussig, who served successively as chairmen of the Medical Advisory Board. At a meeting of the Board of Trustees, the present officers of the Society were re-elected for another year.

Two San Francisco Jews Honored by Relief Posts

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26—Two leading members of the Jewish community have been honored with appointment to places at the head of the two principal relief movements in the city and state.

Judge M. C. Sloss has been named by Mayor Rossi as chairman of a citizens' committee to campaign for a \$6,500,000 unemployment relief bond issue. This will be voted on at the August 30 primaries.

Milton Esberg has been appointed chairman of a committee representing all social and relief agencies in California to cooperate with the state agricultural director in getting surplus food products to the needy of California instead of letting these products rot in orchards and farms.

Funeral Services Held for Henry G. Foreman, Prominent Jewish Leader of Chicago

Was Noted for Civic Reforms; Known
as "Father of Small
Parks"

CHICAGO, July 26—Funeral services were held today for Henry G. Foreman, Jewish communal and civic leader who died yesterday at the age of 75 from a complication of ailments.

Mr. Foreman, who was a native of Chicago, was the son of Gerhard Foreman, pioneer Jewish banker here. He entered his father's banking business but withdrew to enter the real estate field.

He was one of the organizers of the Chicago Real Estate Board and the Chicago Stock Exchange. For a period he served as president of the Board from 1903 to 1913. He also served as president of the Cook County Board.

He was the initiator of many civic reforms. He built the first fire proof hospital for contagious diseases; the first hospital for children and fourteen other buildings. He inaugurated the cottage plan for tuberculosis patients of the insane asylum.

He was known as the Father of Small Parks, because he originated a system of small parks, playgrounds, field houses, gymnasiums, bath houses, libraries, etc. as well as fourteen new large parks during his term of office as president of the South Park Commissioners.

Mr. Foreman was a member of Sinai congregation.

His widow, three sisters, Mrs. Matilda Rosenberg; Mrs. Lydia Steele, Mrs. Birdie Schwab, and a brother, Oscar G. Foreman, survive.

Funeral Services for Max Thomashefsky

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon for Max Thomashefsky, member of a prominent Jewish theatrical family and himself active as a Jewish theatre producer for more than three decades.

Mr. Thomashefsky succumbed to an illness of three months at the Israel Zion Hospital at the age of 60.

Born in Kiev, on March 21, 1872, Mr. Thomashefsky came to this country at the age of five. He abandoned dentistry study for the theatre and launched upon his theatrical career in Philadelphia where for many years his activities in the Yiddish theatre were centered.

Mr. Thomashefsky is a brother of Boris Thomashefsky, former star of the Yiddish theatre in this country and uncle of Muni Weisenfreund, who has scored a success in the American theatre and in motion pictures under the name of Paul Muni.

He served as manager for Jack Dempsey, Vivienne Segal, Belle Baker,

Informing Roumanian Government Deeds Not Promises Asked by Jewry

"Forward" Editorial Declares Roumanian Government Promises Have
Too Often Proved Without Basis

The "Jewish Daily Forward" in an editorial warns the Roumanian government that its statement to the American Jewish Congress, expressing a desire to give the Jews equal rights and opportunities will not be accepted on its face value.

The editorial states that Jewry is too familiar with promises by Roumanian authorities which have a way of vanishing without fulfillment, to accept the pledges of the new government.

What the Jews ask are not promises but actual deeds, the paper says.

The editorial declares as follows:

"Roumania has on many occasions given enthusiastic promises to treat the Jews as full and equal citizens and every time has failed to keep this promise. We are well aware that the attitude of the Peasant Party, which has just returned to power, is much better than that of previous authorities. We have no cause to suspect Dr. Maniu and other leaders of the Peasant Party of anti-Semitism. Yet the fact remains that during Maniu's regime as Prime Minister the Jews were not treated as full and equal citizens. Maniu's government as well failed to employ the necessary energy to suppress the anti-Semitic hooligan attacks upon the Jews.

"Dr. Vaida Voevod, as Minister of Interior in the Maniu cabinet was openly accused of anti-Semitism.

"The Jews throughout the world greeted the coming of the new regime in Roumania with joy.

"The 'Jewish Politics' of the Maniu government was, however, a great disappointment to Roumanian Jews. From the new government, the Jews anticipate not new promises, but actual deeds. If the government desires to win the confidence of the Jews, it must cease to treat them as citizens of the second class and afford them the rights of all other citizens in the land," the editorial concludes.

Chief Rabbi of Copenhagen Dies Here at Age of Sixty-two

Funeral services were held yesterday at the Riverside Memorial Chapel for Rabbi Mychael Winkler, Chief Rabbi of Copenhagen, who died here while on a visit for the purpose of raising funds for the education of Jewish orphans in Denmark and Palestine.

Rabbi Winkler died of heart disease, following an attack a fortnight ago. He succumbed in his sixty-second year at the Beth Israel Hospital.

For seventeen years he was the Chief orthodox Rabbi in Copenhagen. A widow and two children in Copenhagen survive.

Opportunities Offered by Federation for Manufacturers And Horticulturists

Survey for American Palestine Economic Committee Shows Fields of Opportunity

While almost every other country in the world is unable to market satisfactorily its industrial and agricultural products, Palestinian producers continue to dispose of their goods and the country continues to offer opportunities for manufacturers and horticulturists according to reports just received from Palestine by the American Economic Committee for Palestine. In addition, the reports point out that while other governments, because of world-wide economic conditions, are experiencing difficulty with financing their operations, the Government of Palestine, which had a deficit of £40,971 in 1930, showed a surplus of £61,383 on January 1, 1932.

I. Rokach, managing director of the "Pardess" Company and president of the newly established Jaffa Citrus Fruit Exchange, reports that more than 3,500,000 cases of oranges and grapefruit were exported from Palestine during 1931-32 and predicts that by 1937 the orange crop alone will be at least twice as large as it is at present. According to Mr. Rokach, 17,500 additional dunams of land will be placed under orange cultivation during the current year. An experiment in the export of eggs has already been made with highly satisfactory results and this experiment may lead to the development of an important branch of agriculture.

The building material and furniture-manufacturing industries are making good progress, according to the reports and the increased activity in planting is supplying work to dozens of factories and workshops. In a recent statement, Heschel Farbstein, of Poland, member of the Executive of the World Zionist Organization and of the Jewish Agency, declared that there are good op-

Member of Palestine Delegation to Ottawa Conference Discusses Situation

LONDON.—A picture of conditions in Palestine and means of improving the situation in the orange grove industry was offered by I. Rokach, head of the Pardess company and head of the Jaffa Citrus Fruit Exchange, who is a member of the Palestine delegation of the Ottawa conference, prior to his departure for Ottawa.

Speaking at a meeting of the Economic Board for Palestine, Mr. Rokach said it had been hoped that Palestine would benefit by Imperial Preference, which despite constant efforts of the Economic Board and other, it had not been found possible to grant.

Even without Imperial Preference, however, Mr. Rokach declared, Palestine would do its best to compete with other producers, by lowering the cost of production, by better transportation — helped now by the magnificent new harbor at Haifa — by advertising in the old and new markets, by better grading and packing in modern packing houses, and by a Citrus Exchange formed among all orange co-operatives to govern shipments and sales in the best interests of the trade as a whole.

There are now about 150,000 dunams, 40,000 acres, of orange groves in Palestine, of which at least one-half are Jewish, Mr. Rokach said. Owing to the work involved on laying out the new groves and the seasonal work on the old, there is at present practically no unemployment in Palestine — a state of affairs which prevails in very few parts of the world today. Palestine now exports 3½ million boxes a year, which means employment for at least six months in the year for 10,000 people, who in the main manage to live for the whole year on what they earn during this time, and this number will increase with the constantly increasing crops.

Besides this direct labor, the industry supplies indirect sources of livelihood through railway and shipping traffic, roadmaking, construction of packing-houses, etc., etc.

The demand for the Jaffa orange has hitherto exceeded the supply. Mr. Rokach stated, and the profits on the industry have been very large. It must not be thought, however, that this happy state of affairs has resulted in the industry neglecting to make the progress which is necessary to its future prosperity. Improved methods of packing and grading are constantly being introduced, and there is an immense and hitherto almost untried field in advertisement. The by-products of the orange are fruit-juices, orange squash, pectin, essences for perfumery, etc., and this branch of

Bishop Manning Labels Race Prejudice Charges as Slanderous and Wholly Untrue

Makes Statement to J.T.A. Refuting Charges Against Him by Ousted Clinic Director

SOUTHWEST HARBOR, Me., July 26—Bishop William T. Manning, in a statement made to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency yesterday branded as wholly untrue the allegations made in a sworn statement by Dr. Edward S. Cowles, director of the ousted Body and Soul Clinic of St. Marks on the Bouwerie, that he was behind the closing of the clinic which was due to racial prejudice against the Jews.

From his summer home here, Bishop Manning repudiated the allegations of Dr. Cowles who quoted Bishop Manning as having said: "I do not want Jews in my church", but excluded from his ban such wealthy Jews as Samuel Untermyer.

Dr. Cowles charged that the clinic had been forced to close because the majority of the patients treated are Jews since the vicinity of the church is largely inhabited by Jews.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency addressed an inquiry to Bishop Manning and received the following statement in reply:

"Your letters received. The statements attributed to me in the Herald Tribune articles to which you refer are malicious, slanderous and totally untrue.

"My feeling towards the people of your race is well known and I am proud to count many of them among my best friends. I shall be glad for you to publish this statement."

A spokesman for Bishop Manning referred to the service held for the suffering Jews of Europe in 1926 at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine. He recalled that the late Louis Marshall was the leading speaker at this service.

The statement of Bishop Manning was issued simultaneously with the release from the office of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine of a letter from Bishop Manning to Dr. William Nor-

dian Parliament published in the chief organ of the Goglu Organization, "Le Miroir." Mr. Laverne takes issue with Judge Dejean, who in the proceedings against the Goglu publications condemned their anti-Jewish agitation.

Although he begins his article with the assurance that he is not and never was an anti-Semite, the Deputy speaker rebukes Judge Dejean for not believing that Jews use Christian blood for ritual purposes. Mr. Laverne states that a Pope has confirmed that the Jews use Christian blood, by the fact that he has conferred sainthood on one of the martyrs of a ritual murder. Mr. Laverne takes sides with the Goglu and affirms they are providing a "defense fight against the Jews" and that the Jews in Canada have not equal rights with the Christians, since Christendom is part of the Canadian constitution.

The same issue of "Le Miroir" devotes space to an article against the Montreal Jewish Alderman Bernard Schwartz, making the accusation that Mr. Schwartz threatened to kill the editor of "Le Miroir" and to use his blood for ritual purposes on the Jewish Easter holidays.

portunities open for the manufacture of various types of metal goods such as locks, latches, pipes, plumbing fixtures, electrical equipment, etc. "During 1931 over £85,000 worth of pipes for irrigation and sewerage purposes alone were imported." Mr. Farbstien pointed out, "and these might well have been manufactured in Palestine."

There has recently been a large increase in the flow of new capital into Palestine, according to a statement made by Siegfried Hoofien, president of the Manufacturers Association and manager of the Anglo-Palestine Bank. Most of this new capital has been invested in houses, land, orange groves, mortgages, and several branches of industry. Only two bankrupts were reported during the first three months of 1932, one an Arab and one a Jew, and the number of unemployed in the country is comparatively small.

the industry is still in its infancy and can be enormously developed.

He was glad of this opportunity, Mr. Rokach said, of speaking to the members of the Economic Board, which has done so much for Palestine, and he reminded them that the pioneer of the citrus industry in Palestine was Sir Moses Montefiore, who started an orange grove in what is now Tel-Aviv.

The main reason for the present and undoubted future prosperity of the industry, Mr. Rokach claimed, is the unsurpassable quality of the Jaffa orange, which is universally acknowledged to be superior to all others. Climatic conditions in Palestine are ideal for its cultivation; frost, which is practically unknown in Palestine, has affected the crops of her greatest competitor, Spain, every year for the past few years, although Spain has great advantages of distance, with consequent cheaper delivery.

England, he went on, is the largest consumer of Jaffa oranges, and it will be seen, he said, how our markets can be developed, when it is realized that only six years ago Germany did not import any Jaffa oranges, and last year, in spite of crises and import restrictions, she imported 650,000 boxes at high prices. The London market can also be greatly developed; up to last year more oranges were bought in Hull and Manchester than in London, but the London demand is increasing year by year.

man Guthrie, rector of St. Mark's church, approving the action of the vestry in ousting the cleric.

The communication, as reported in the "New York Times," is in reply to an inquiry made of him by Dr. Guthrie, wherein the latter asks the Bishop's preference and states that his view might influence the vestry to reconsider its action.

Bishop Manning in reply said: "This action has been taken by the corporation of St. Mark's parish on its own initiative and responsibility. I declined to take any part in it but I fully approve the action for reasons well known to you and many of the medical profession. Some of the statements quoted in the newspapers are wholly untrue as you of course know."

Rev. Guthrie in his letter to the Bishop stated: "I sided with my vestry minority (for the clinic) but to avoid civil war in the corporation by an appeal from the majority of this vestry I agreed. I refuse, however, to be their servant, and will not be instrumental in ousting the clinic by police power."

Dr. Cowles, however, denied that the reasons for the ouster of the clinic were medical. Dr. Cowles will take the matter of the clinic's ouster to court.
