The bomb, which exploded at three A. M., also caused damage to the adiacent water works and broke the windows of many houses.

many parts of Germany, Last night a hand grenade was thrown into the house of a Jewish merchant, Lehmann, in Konstadt, Upper Silesia. No one was injured, but considerable property damage was wrought. Similarly, bombs were thrown into Jewish stores in Ortelsburg, East Prussia, damaging the stores of Jews named Molutzki, Behr and Mendell, All the windows in these shops were shattered.

In Neidenburg a lewish merchant was attacked and sustained such severe injuries he had to be taken to a hospital. None of those responsible for the outrages have been apprehended.

Esthonia Education Ministry Approves Jewish Chair At Dorpat University

Dorpat University First in Europe to Teach Yiddish and Hebrew Literature for Doctorate Degree

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) REVAL, Aug. 3-The Ministry of Education of Esthonia today approved the establishment of a Jewish Chair planned by Dorpat University as part of its tercentenary celebration.

The chair is to be part of the Philosophic Faculty of the University which is a state institution. Dorpat University thus becomes the first University in Europe where Yiddish and Hebrew Literature will be taught as part of the course for the doctorate de-

The chair is to be maintained by Friends of Dorpat University for the Promotion of Jewish Science.

Dorpat University has been noted for its liberal traditions for a long period and during the Czarist regime supplied a refuge to Russian Jews unable to secure an education in Russian Universities.

The Kehillah agreed to conduct a drive against the "mushroom" synagogues which have been springing up in increasing number in Chicago before the High Holidays. The Kehillah will conduct, it announced, a dignified publicity campaign against this evil.

An investigation in the situation at the Jewish Shelter Home also was ordered. Conflicting reports about the conduct of the home and conditions there have been issued as a result of what is reported to be internal strife by those who are conducting this or-

The executive committee of the Kehillah endorsed the enterprise of the Vaad Ha-Chinuch and the United Auxiliaries of Orthodox Jewish Women concerning Education Day and pledged the participation of every synagogue and auxiliary in this event. Reorganization of the Vaad Ha-

Schitah was completed when President A. Goldblatt was authorized to appoint eleven laymen to this important committee.

Head of Belgrade Sephardic Community Dies (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BELGRADE, Aug. 3-Shemaya Demayo, president of the Sephardic Jewish Community of Belgrade, died today at the age of fifty-five.

Mr. Demayo was a member of Parliament and was regarded as the most popular representative of the Jewish Community. His services were recognized by the King and he received the King's Decorations of the White Eagle and the Jugo-Slavian Crown, as well as a number of Hero's orders

Mexican Jewish Chamber **Approves Conference**

The Camara Israelita de Industria Y Comercio de Mexico has expressed its approval of the convening of the world Jewish conference in Geneva on August 14th, according to information mad public by the American Jewish Congress.

The organization states the Jewish Chamber of Commerce expressed its approval following a meeting of Jewish organizations. It will not send a delegate to the Conference, because it is unable to defray the expenses. The headquarters of the conference

Detroit Artist Gets French Legion of Honor (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

DETROIT, Aug. 3-Word was re-ceived here that Myron Barlow, well known Detroit artist who for many years has lived at Etaples, France, has been honored with the Legion of Honor

Award by the French Government. Mr. Barlow studied in France under Gerome and other masters at the Beaux

Arts. In 1907 he was elected a member of the Societe Nationale des Beaux Arts. His pictures won gold medals at the World's Fair in St. Louis in 1904 and at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco. The Detroit Institute of Arts owns several of his pictures, and he is also represented in the Pennsylvania Academy and other art galleries both in America and France. Four of Mr. Barlow's murals adorn the tower of Temple Beth El here.

Accustomed to make almost annual visits to Detroit, Mr. Barlow was compelled by the World War to make a stay of more than four years here, for Etaples became an armed camp. On several occasions his studio, a mile out of town, narrowly missed destruction by German bombs.

The body will be brought back to the United States aboard the "Bremen" when it arrives on its return trip, August 11, and funeral services will be held several days later.

Demands Abolition of Missions for Conversion Of Jews in Germany

Nazi Clergy Union Makes This De- Lithuanian Jewish Communities Unable mand on Ground Conversion of Jews Would Taint Purity of Nation (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Aug. 3-The abolition of missions for the conversion of the Jews, on the ground that they will taint the purity of the Germans, is demanded today by the Union of Nazi clergymen in connection with the forthcoming Church elections.

The leader of the Nazi union, Rev. Hossenfelder, sharply attacks the missions for Jewish conversions and de-clares: "We see in the Jewish missions grave danger to our nation in that they open the gate for the infusion of foreign blood in our national body.

"We disapprove of Tewish missions in Germany so long as Jews possess citizenship rights because we are thus exposed to the danger of racial bastardization and racial impurification."

Even the Holy Scriptures have something to say about holy wrath and have prohibited love and marriages between Jews and Germans. This in particular must be forbidden, Rev. Hossenfelder asserts.

Says Student Law Will Be Taken Up After Recess

It was impossible a year ago to forsee that the Lithuanian Jewry would be so greatly affected. Lithuania, a small peasant country with a popula-tion of over 2 million, with the Tews constituting only seven per cent of the entire population, has always presented favorable economic conditions for the ter of the students law which has been Jews. There was never a question of starvation in Lithuania, simply because it is a country of farmers. A country which is plentiful. A country which exports bread, butter, eggs, poultry and livestock to other countries.

> Being well provided, and having quite a sufficient income from his exported goods, the Lithuanian peasant was always a frequent visitor to the cities. He was often seen in Kovno spending his money freely in Jewish stores, dealing with Jewish artisans,

> ordering from Jewish peddlers. The Iew in Lithuania, for the most part a city dweller and a trader, there-

> fore made a living, more or less, as long as the farmer could sell his products for foreign consumption.

The world crisis, however, passing by Lithuania for a while, has finally found this country too. The exports from Lithuania now show a large drop. The farmer is affected. Naturally, the Jew is likewise hard hit.

Kovno, a year ago a lively city, with a large number of Jewish institutions, with a throbbing, many-sided, normal Jewish life, is now becoming more and more impoverished. The number of needy Jews here mounts daily. The

In an effort to relieve the situation, Lithuanian Tewry is trying to help itself by organizing everywhere local re-lief committees. These committees are Iewish victims of the economic crisis. The income of these relief committees is, however, sufficient to help only ten percent of those applying for help.
