GENEVA CONFERENCE APPROVES CALL FOR WORLD JEWISH CONGRESS IN SUMMER OF 1934

Approval of Congress Idea Comes After Three Days of Deliberations; Executive Committee of 20 Named to Organize Congress; Central Bureau to Be Situated in New York; General Elections to Be Held for Deputies to Congress; League of Nations Acting Secretary Receives Praesidium; Expresses Good Wishes for Success of Effort

GENEVA, Aug. 17.—The world Jewish conference, attended by 130 delegates from 20 lands, which opened its three days sessions here last Sunday amid the opposition of influential groups in the United States, Great Britain and Germany, concluded its deliberations this evening with approval of a resolution submitted by a special committee calling for the establishment of a world Jewish congress in the summer of 1934.

The central bureau of the Congress is to be situated in New York City, while a branch of the organization will be established in Berlin.

An executive committee of 20 was named by the conference to carry out plans for the establishment of the world Jewish congress.

For the first time in the history of Jewry, general elections will be held wherever Jews reside for the naming of Jewish deputies to the world congress.

The members of the Executive committee include Dr. Stephen S. Wise, honorary president of the American Jewish Congress, initiator of the conference; Judge Julian W. Mack, Zionist leader and honorary president of the American Jewish Congress; Baruch Zuckerman, vice president of the American Jewish Congress; Dr. Joseph Tenenbaum, chairman of the Executive Committee of the American Jewish Congress; Abraham Goldberg, vice president of the American Jewish Congress and Meyer Dizengoff, Mayor of Tel

Refer Differences to Vaad Leumi for Settlement

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17.—The differences between the Poel Mizrahi and the Histadruth on who is entitled to work in the Hadar colony, will be submitted to the Palestine Jewish National Council for decision, it was announced today.

Fiftieth Anniversary of Founding of Rishon Le Zion Celebrated With Festivities

Next to Petach Tikvah Is Oldest Jewish Colony in Palestine; Center of Wine Industry

JERUSALEM, Aug. 17.—The fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Jewish Colony of Rishon le Zion was celebrated yesterday afternoon with the participation of thousands of guests from all parts of the country.

Work in the colony suspended in honor of the occasion while children of the Judean colonies formed a festive procession. Founders of the colony and Bilu members delivered addresses.

An exhibition showing the progress of Rishon le Zion is being held.

Rishon le Zion was founded in 1882 by 17 Jewish families, all members of the Chovevei Zion and next to Petach Tikvah is the oldest Jewish colony in Palestine.

The colonists had a hard struggle owing to their inexperience, the scarcity of water and the raids of marauders. In 1898, Baron Edmond de Rothschild came to the assistance of the

New Bombings in Germany; Nazi Deputy Arrested for Kiel Synagogue Bombing

Immunity Does Not Apply Since Reichstag Not Yet Convened; Nazi Party Threatens Reprisals

BERLIN, Aug. 17.—New bombings of Jewish property are reported today throughout Germany.

A bomb by an unknown assailant was thrown into the first Jewish colony established by the Jewish Farming Society, in Gross Gaglow. The bomb fell into an unoccupied house. Little damage was wrought.

In Landsberg, the home of a Jewish merchant, Mannheim, where a Jewish Judge Salinger is resident, was bombed. The house was partially demolished.

An award for the apprehension of the guilty has been offered.

BERLIN, Aug. 17.—A Nazi, Moder, elected to the new Reichstag which has not yet been convened, was arrested today and held by the police as one of the bombers of the synagogue in Kiel.

The arrest is legal since the immunity privilege of Reichstag members does not apply before the first session of the Parliament is held.

The Nazi party has lodged a protest, notwithstanding and threatens serious consequences if their comrade is held.

Three other arrests in connection with the bombing of the synagogue in Kiel were also made today.

Fear New Order Will Affect Jewish Exporters Seriously

WARSAW, Aug. 17.—Jewish clothing exporters in Poland are perturbed by a new decree issued by the Ministry of Trade, which they fear will greatly curtail their means of livelihood.

The new order restricts the export trade to such firms as are listed in the trade registers and which hold certificates of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Jews are fearful lest the Chambers of Commerce utilize anti-Semitic pretexts to prevent them from trading,

colony from which date begins the period of their thriving.

The colony which in 1882 owned 3,000 dunams of land and was settled by about 100 inhabitants now owns 17,000 dunams of land, exclusive of sand dunes westward to the sea and has a population of 2,300.

The holdings of the colony are valued at £645,000 while the liabilities do not exceed £75,000.

Rishon le Zion is the metropolis of the Palestine wine industry. Ten thousand dunams of land are covered with vineyards and 1,500 dunams with orange groves. The colony is the seat of the famous Baron Edmond de Rothschild wine cellars which in richness and equipment rank among the leading wine cellars of the world. Built by Baron de Rothschild, they are leased to the Jewish Wine Growers of Palestine at a nominal rental. The products of the vineyards are dispensed by the Carmel Wine Company.

Although Rishon le Zion has the legal status of a village, it conducts a municipal government of its own.

Funeral services were held here for Mrs. Emily Friend, member of a distinguished Jewish family of Alsace Lorraine and this country.

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise officiated. She was 84 years old, and a daughter of Simon Levy, who served in the Civil War as a Colonel with the Union forces.

Herbert A. Canter, who served his clerkship in the law office of Associated Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo, succumbed in the Israel Zion Hospital at the age of 39 after an illness of two weeks.

Arab Crowd Attacks Jews In New Outburst in Tunisian Town; No Casualties

Arab Crowd of 500 in Attack; Military
and Civil Authorities Prompt
in Suppression

PARIS, Aug. 17—The disturbed situation in Tunisia, where on July 25th, the Jewish community of Sfax was attacked by Arabs, brought another anti-Jewish outburst, this time in Soukharas, according to information which reached Paris yesterday.

An Arab crowd, estimated at 500, stormed a Jewish printing plant. When repulsed by the police, they started sacking Jewish stores. Military forces were called out and succeeded in dispersing the throng.

There were no casualties and little damage was caused.

The civil and military authorities, consisting of both Frenchmen and natives, are lauded by the Jews for their prompt action.

PARIS, Aug. 17—Police Commissioner Schwartz of Sfax, a non-Jew, was awarded the high Tunisian order of Ishtar Niftikar, it was learned here yesterday.

The award is in recognition of Commissioner Schwartz's activity in suppressing the riots in Sfax on July 25th.

Agreement Reached Between Yiddish Theatres and Actors

An amicable settlement of differences between the Hebrew Actors Union and the theatrical managers representing the Yiddish theatres in this city was arrived at as the result of a conference held on Tuesday.

In accordance with the agreement reached, all moneys from benefit performances in Yiddish theatres are to be deposited in a joint bank account. Appeals for funds during intermission of performances are to be abolished as well as the free list. Hawking of candy and soft drinks are likewise to be barred.

The wage scale of Yiddish actors will be revised downward, those receiving more than \$65 per week to receive cuts ranging from 25 to 30 percent, while those receiving less than \$65 are to receive a \$10 pay cut.

A further meeting to discuss unemployment in the theatrical field will be held next week.

A plan to place a fixed tax on theatre seats to raise an unemployment fund was discussed and was referred to a committee for further consideration.

Announcement has been made of the organization in Chicago of the Association of Jewish Blind. Its aim is the social, intellectual and vocational advancement of the sightless. Jacob Richter is president of the organization. Other officers are Abraham Lewitz, vice-president; Jeannette Kuttner, secretary; Max Kuperman, treasurer, and M. Bolotin, chairman of activities.

Appeal Against Wulfin Verdict, Scheduled for Aug. 26th, Postponed

Believe Hearing Against Two Year
Sentence Against Jewish Student
Will Be Held in September

VILNA, Aug. 17—The appeal against the verdict of the Vilna court which sentenced Shmuel Wulfin, Jewish student, to two years imprisonment on charges of having participated in the events which led to the death of the Christian student, Stanislaw Waclawski, who was killed during the anti-Semitic riots in Vilna last November, was postponed.

The appeal against the verdict was scheduled to be heard on August 26th. It is believed that the hearing will probably be held on September 1st.

Sentence was imposed on Wulfin on April 19th. The verdict aroused widespread indignation among the Jews.

Mid-West Zionist Regional Conference Held

SOUTH HAVEN, Mich., Aug. 17—Delegates from Michigan, Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin met here in conference to perfect plans for the organization of the Midwest Zionist Region, formed at a convention in Chicago last February. The accredited delegates were members of the executive committee chosen at the February meeting.

An important decision of this conference was to invite the states of Minnesota, South Dakota and North Dakota to join the Region. It was decided also that all Zionist work in the states included in the region should be centered in the regional office in Chicago. The national Zionist office is to be asked to turn over to the region \$3 of every \$6 membership of which the region is to retain \$1, and \$1 of each \$3 membership of which 50 cents is to go to the region for expenses.

The region undertakes not only to conduct membership drives but to stimulate cultural activities and to increase efforts for the American Palestine Campaign.

Reports submitted to the conference indicated that a Michigan State Zionist Conference is to be held on October 30th, a Wisconsin State Conference in September and a conference of Zionists in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, on Labor Day.

Meyer W. Weisgal, director of Zionist activities in Chicago and of the American Palestine Appeal in Illinois was elected executive director of the region.

Max Shulman of Chicago, president of the Midwest Zionist Region, presided at the conference here. Professor Klausner of St. Louis was a guest.

The region's executive committee is to convene in Detroit on October 29th, on the eve of the Michigan State Conference.

Assembly of Hebrew Orthodox Rabbis Votes Tax of One Cent On Kosher Meat in New York

Money to Be Used for Support of Religious Institutions and Aged Rabbis; Endorse Candidacy of Col. Lehman

The fifteenth annual convention of the Assembly of Hebrew Orthodox Rabbis of America and Canada closed its two day convention last night at the Hotel Pennsylvania with the adoption of a number of resolutions.

One of its most important decisions was its resolve to impose a one cent tax on each pound of kosher meat slaughtered in Greater New York, the income of which is to aid the Orthodox Jewish religious schools, the Yeshivas, the Talmud Torahs and aged Rabbis.

The resolution was adopted after the proposal was offered by Rabbi Bernard Birstein of Temple Ezrath Israel, who estimated that the sum of \$1,200,00 could be obtained annually in this fashion in Greater New York.

Departing from precedent and emphasizing that it does not favor the participation of rabbis in politics, the convention nevertheless went on record as favoring the candidacy of Lieutenant-Governor Herbert H. Lehman, prominent Jewish leader, for the post of governor of the State of New York.

Another resolution adopted calls upon temples and synagogues where marriages are performed to ask for an agreement that the couples will seek a rabbinical divorce in addition to the civic divorce, should the marriages break up.

A resolution calling for the repeal of the 18th amendment was also adopted.

Among the speakers at the sessions were Rabbi Jacob Mandelson of Newark, N. J.; Rabbi B. S. Pronin of Plainfield, N. J.; Rabbi I. Sodden, Brooklyn; Rabbi E. Singer, Newark; Rabbi Alexander Levin, Brooklyn; Dr. Moses Romm, representing the rabbinates of Palestine.

One hundred delegates attended the sessions.

Most Deplorable Part of Sfax Anti-Jewish Attack Was Undecided Attitude of Authorities, Says Local Organ

LONDON.—Further details of the attack upon the Jewish quarter of Sfax, Tunis on July 25th are revealed by the "Reveil Juif", a Jewish paper appearing in Tunisia which has reached London.

"It appeared to start with nothing at all," writes the paper.

It began with a petty quarrel with the brothers Didi, Jewish merchants of Souk, well-to-do men, known and respected by the whole population, who have been established for years in the Arab village. One of their former workmen — it was not, as was at first wrongly reported, a customer or someone wanting to borrow money — came to claim his wages. There was an altercation, and then shouting. The Arab had knocked himself against a glass door, and had cut himself; some say intentionally, others say it was an accident. Whether the one or the other, blood flowed, and he went off shouting that the Didis had tried to cut his throat. Instantly, as if they had been waiting for the signal — the authorities, it seems, are quite definite about that point — thousands of dockers, Bedouins, and phosphate workers, rushed up to the Didis shop and wanted to lynch the brothers. The shop was barricaded and the police were telephoned for. The crowd grew denser. At last the police arrived, and the only way in which they could save the people inside was to handcuff them as prisoners, and lead them out of the Arab village amid hostile cries and a shower of rotten fruit.

It seemed to be over, says the paper. But soon, incited by their leaders, of whom the principals are known and many of whom, unfortunately, are well-known Moslems, no longer young people either, the mob rushed to the quarter where the jewellers live, overpowering them, small dealers and workmen, and laid about them savagely, beating, robbing and burning. But for the intervention of a member of the City Corporation, a Moslem, it is impossible to say what might have happened. Many Jews were wounded. Those whose names are known are Deid Azria, Houtaou Berdakh, Joseph Sebagh, Binhas Ankra, Jacob Ankra, Makhlof Cohen, Issac Cohen.

The Arab Governor then arrived with his Sphais from Oudjak. He deserves our thanks. He tried to calm the excited crowd, dwelling on the good relations which had existed between Arabs and Jews. But he was not listened to. He finally had to send the jewellers to his own house, escorted for their protection of his Sphais, thus leaving the rioters free to continue pillaging.

The mob then descended upon the European town, attacking all Jews

Gogiu Paper Calls on Anti-Semites to Unite, Use Stamps With Anti-Jewish Slogans

Repeats Blood Ritual Libel; Offers Series of Slogans for Use Throughout World Where Anti-Semites Live

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—The anti-Semitic Gogiu publication, "Le Miroir," devotes its current issue once again to attacks upon the Jews, reiterating its blood ritual murder libel against the Jews, and calls upon anti-Semites throughout the world to use stamps with slogans as the symbol of their union against the "Jewish pest."

The paper devotes the larger part of a page to a display of slogans for the anti-Semitic stamps, which call for a boycott against the Jews and accuse the Jews of Communism, and responsibility for the depression.

Typical examples of the slogans are: "Jews are Responsible for the Misfortune of Russia, Spain and Mexico. Drive them from Quebec!"

"To Abolish War, eradicate the Jews! War enriches only the Jews!"

"The Jews are an Asiatic race, a combination of the yellow and black races. The white race must keep them at a distance!"

"Is it the Jew who is to be made prosperous or the Canadian in this country? Buy only from Canadians!"

"Do not permit our political parties to be controlled by the Jews!"

"The single enemy of the race, the country, our traditions and Christian civilization is the Jew!"

"Jesus Christ stated concerning the Jews: They are the children of liars. Satan is their father!"

"Never ask tolerance for Jews, but never for Christians. An example is Russia!"

they met on the way, wounding Rene Abbou, Moise Bohnik, Khamous Cohen, Meyer Cohen, Isaac Nam, Moche Djerbi, Boughris, and many others, whose names are not known. We are told that even a Jewish doctor who attended the Didis' workman, whose injury in falling against the glass door, started all the trouble, was hit.

The Jewish quarter was in a panic. The mob tried to break into the Great Synagogue, but it was barricaded, and all the children attending the adjacent Hebrew school ran for their lives. The mob smashed everything in sight. The old Rabbi was attacked and seriously wounded.

The Jewish self-defence then came into action, a handful of men, trying to beat back the infuriated mob. The self-defence was outnumbered. At this moment — it was 4 o'clock in the afternoon and the rioting had gone on since morning — the civil authorities decided to call out the troops. French Sphais and Senegalese charged the mob. The rioters were driven back and the sol-

offer to the Polish non-Zionists subsequently.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, chief protagonist of the world Jewish congress idea, closed the sessions this evening with a fervent plea for unity among all groups of Jewry.

He called upon leaders of Jewry to set aside petty party quarrels in the service of a great cause.

He lauded the high level maintained throughout the debates, which he said, have shown that Jews are capable of having their own Parliament no less than other nations of the world.

His last words dealt with the situation of the Jews in Germany and he concluded his peroration dramatically: "Our only reply to 'Perish Judaea' is 'The Jews are an eternal people and will survive their torturers.'"

Before the close of the conference, members of the praesidium were received by the Acting Secretary of the League of Nations, Edmond Avenol.

M. Avenol informed the delegation that the League of Nations is greatly interested in the formation of an organization for international co-operation. He conveyed the best wishes of the League for the success of the effort.

M. Avenol made inquiries of Dr. Leo Motzkin concerning the status of the Jewish minorities in various countries and of Mayor Dizengoff regarding the situation in Palestine.

Rabbi Wise was the guest of honor at a luncheon today at the International Club where he delivered an impressive address regarding anti-Semitism in various countries of the world.

The last work of the conference was to issue two manifestos one addressed to the civilized world and a second to the Jewish world specifically.

The manifesto addressed to the world at large referred to the post-war changes when the Jews were recognized among others as a nation with equality and citizenship rights. These rights have frequently turned illusory the manifesto says, owing to administrative practices in various countries, where the Jewish youth is systematically barred from approaching institutions of learning; where the natural human right to work is denied to Jews, where Jewish artisans and Jewish merchants are placed in positions of disadvantage by unfair competition sponsored by the authorities; where Jews fail even to receive equal protection of their lives and property.

"In addition to these practices, efforts are made to legally withdraw equality rights from the Jews and to confiscate their belongings," the manifesto points out.

"The representatives of the Jewish world assembled in Geneva protest against the return of brutal domination, against indulgence shown to open or

concealed demands against the Jews," the manifesto states.

The second manifesto calls upon the Jewish people to unite as the only effective means of averting danger. The Jews, it says, must rely on their own power with the assistance of such enlightened sections of the world which have not yet been saturated with poisonous anti-Semitism.

"The World Jewish Congress," it maintains, "does not aim at weakening any existing organizations, but rather to support and stimulate them."

"The Jewish conference appeals at this historic hour to the Jewish masses not to lose hope but to stand together to save the Jewish people," the manifesto concludes.

GENEVA, Aug. 17—At two o'clock this morning after sessions lasting throughout the day and evening, the Commissions appointed by the world Jewish conference to deal with vital problems on the agenda had not yet concluded its work.

Several questions of a political and technical nature remained to be decided upon. No decision had yet been reached as to the headquarters of the forthcoming world Jewish congress. Berlin and Paris are favored for the congress centre.

A sub-committee is also preparing two manifestos, not yet completed, one to be addressed to the civilized world at large, and the other a specific appeal to world Jewry.

The manifesto to the world at large is to seek the aid of the latter in the protection of Jewish rights.

The suggestion that the appeal to the Jews to organize themselves everywhere as national minorities is meeting with considerable opposition in committee.

The plan of Professor Guido Tedeschi of Rome, for the creation of an international body to combat anti-Semitism under the League of Nations has been discussed and further deliberation on the plan was decided upon.

GENEVA, Aug. 17—The convening of a world Jewish congress in the summer of 1934 was unanimously approved last night by a sub-committee appointed to deal with this question.

No sessions of the plenum were held yesterday. The day was spent by the Commissioners in camera in an effort to co-ordinate a variety of views and demands prevalent among the delegates to the conference.

The question of including Palestine as one of the problems within the scope of the projected congress continued to form one of the principal topics of discussion.

Deliberations were concentrated on an effort to find a suitable form to include Palestine in the agenda of the congress which would be satisfactory to the non-Zionists who fear that

diers were left in possession of the field.

All night long the town was in a state of siege—police patrols, Sengalese troops, Spahis. The Jews were barricaded in their houses. If panic is calm, that night was calm.

Starts Again in the Morning

Sfax looked like a city of the dead on Tuesday morning. All shops shut. Jewish families living in the Arab village leave their homes, seeking refuge in the houses of relatives or friends in the European town. Troops in the streets. Sengalese guarding the abandoned shops.

About 8 o'clock in the morning the news arrives that the dockers are going out on strike. A mob invades the European markets, hitting women and children, Jews and non-Jews. The Sengalese troops, commanded by Captain Mermet, who showed a great deal of firmness, immediately come to the rescue and put a stop to the outbreak.

Many arrests were made. About a hundred rioters filled the Caidat Gaol and the Commissariat, among them young intellectuals and also Jews. Jews who had hit back when their wives were insulted, their goods stolen, and they themselves beaten. People arrested for defending themselves.

Soon everything was quiet. But not for long. Afraid of moving about in crowds that the troops could charge, the rioters went about singly, and snatching a chance when there was no policeman or soldier near broke into a Jewish house, or attacked a Jew. Thus more Jews were added to the casualty list.

On Wednesday fresh trouble. A group of young Jews escorting a companion working outside the town was set upon. The members fought bravely, but were borne down by superior numbers. Elie Scetbon had his teeth knocked out, Elie Azria has concussion, and Simon Anki is black and blue with the blows he received all over his body.

The most deplorable part of the whole business was the undecided attitude of the authorities, the paper says. The military authorities said the civil authorities were responsible, and the police argued that the matter was one for the higher authorities. And meanwhile the Jews were being attacked and wounded.

Palestine problems will dominate the Congress.

On the other hand the Zionists are anxious to prevent any misunderstanding which may lead to the mistaken belief that the Congress is seeking to replace established Zionist institutions.
