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Seven Nazis Get Prison Sentences for Anti-Jewish Attacks in Sensburg

**Nazis Seek to Invoke Law Courts to
Annul Citizenship of Jews;
Spread Poison Powder**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 1—Seven Nazis received prison sentences ranging between three months and one year today being found guilty of participation in the attack upon the Jews of Sensburg.

The verdict was handed down by the summary court dealing with terrorists in Lyck, East Prussia.

The sentenced Nazis are Max Matz, Carl Pasucha, Gollub Hoffman, Laudien Koszinowski, Kirm Pasucha, Flinzack Zimmermann and Erich Heinrich.

The court held that the attacks upon the Jews in Sensburg were the signal for other anti-Jewish excesses in other sections in East Prussia, despite the fact that the anti-Jewish allegations of Prince August Wilhelm, son of the former Kaiser, and others are baseless.

BERLIN, Sept. 1—Poisonous powder was spread today on the stairs in the home of a Jewish cattle dealer in Bad Homburg by Nazis.

A servant girl sweeping the stairs collapsed and was removed to a hospital.

This is the second case of powder poison reported in recent weeks. Similar poison powder was found outside of a synagogue. A rainfall, however, had rendered it harmless.

Minister of Justice Promises Prolongation of Period for Citizenship Applications

**Jewish Deputy Follows Up Representa-
tions to Premier by Introducing
Interpellation in Parliament**

BUCHAREST, Sept. 1—Yesterday's conference between Jewish Deputies and Premier Alexander Vaida Voevod was followed up in Parliament today by Deputy Meyer Ebner, who submitted an interpellation to the Minister of Justice with regard to citizenship rights.

Deputy Ebner pointed out that more than 30,000 applications for citizenship have been filed with the Ministry of Justice, which, however, has not even attempted to take action.

He demanded the prolongation of the period permitted for the applications for citizenship and the acceleration of action on applications already submitted.

The Minister of Justice, replying, announced that he is introducing a bill in the present session of Parliament prolonging the period for citizenship applications until September 1, 1933. According to the present status, the period for applications for citizenship concluded in 1928.

The Justice Minister stated that the government is pledged to rush the bill through and sufficient support from the government party is assured for its adoption.

Iron Guardists Attack Jews in Galatz; Injuries on Both Sides

BUCHAREST, Sept. 1—The Jews of Galatz were attacked today by members of the anti-Semitic Iron Guard protesting against the production by a Jewish theatre company of a play called "All Quiet on the Marasesti Front."

Several Jews and members of the Iron Guard were injured in the fray. When police arrived on the scene, the Iron Guardists seized the police revolvers and fired into the air. Several arrests were made.

The Iron Guardists charged the Jews with profaning Rumanian heroism in the play. Marasesti is the famous Rumanian battlefield.

Vladimir Jabotinsky's Return To Zionist Organization Not Excluded; Scores Militarism

**Revisionist Leader Asks Adherence to
Calais Agreement; Sessions
Approaching Close**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Sept. 1—Vladimir Jabotinsky, head of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists, replying yesterday to the detractors of his policy, made it known that he is opposed to militarism.

"I am an opponent of egoistic, offensive nationalism or militarism," he declared. "I always say: 'God make no world catastrophe. Better delay our salvation.' At the same time, Jabotinsky pointed out that a Jewish legion is inseparable from the Revisionist movement and preparations must be made in time for the eventuality of a world complication.

The Revisionist leader in his address made known that he would oppose any departure from the Calais agreement, but did not exclude the possibility of his return to membership in the Zionist organization.

"I tore up my Congress card, but not Herzl's shekel," Jabotinsky declared. "Perhaps I shall again buy the shekel when the Revisionist shekel payers succeed in washing off the stains of the last Congress."

Jabotinsky described Revisionism as being devoted to the realization of a Jewish state which will retain all the shadings of the Jewish people, excluding none. But all must subject themselves to the sole discipline of the Revisionist Union.

The present conference, he asserted, must decide to carry through independent work in all fields. There can be no contradiction of the Calais synthesis.

He enumerated the practical resistance possible in Palestine and London.

GLENS FALLS, N. Y., Sept. 1.—What Jewish Centers can do for unemployment in dealing with policies of membership fees, scholarship, securing jobs and the like is one of the topics slated for discussion at the 17th annual convention of the New York State Federation of Y.M.H.A.'s, Y.W.H.A.'s and kindred organizations which opens here Saturday night and continues until Monday, September 3 to 5.

The convention will open with an informal reception Saturday night for the delegates from 14 cities, outside of the metropolitan district of the state.

Those who will take part in the symposiums on various questions include: Supreme Court Justice Samuel J. Harris of Buffalo; Mrs. Irving Hamburger, Albany; George Bacharach, Gloversville; George M. Hyman, Syracuse; Assemblyman Haskell H. Marks, Rochester.

Assemblyman Marks, who is ending his tenth term as President of the State Federation, will lead a discussion on "Lay Leadership" Monday in which the presidents of the various organizations affiliated with the Federation and members of the Executive Council will take part. The annual message of the president will be delivered at Sunday afternoon session.

A meeting of the Executive Council and the professional body of executive directors will open the convention proper Sunday morning. Following greetings from Mayor Earl Stickney of Glens Falls and other civic leaders, reports will be submitted by the treasurer, Leon Brounstein of Syracuse, and the heads of departments of the State Federation.

Jewish Bank President Severs Connections to Take Up Residence in Palestine

Joseph J. Bach, president of the National Safety Bank and Trust Company for two years and identified with banking circles for a quarter of a century has resigned his office and is severing his connections in this country preparatory to taking up permanent residence in Palestine.

In a statement made yesterday to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Mr. Bach stated that he is planning to go to Palestine in November and will take his entire family with him.

Although not a Zionist and never identified with the Zionist movement, Mr. Bach explained his reasons for going to Palestine on the ground that he is a Jew and that Palestine is the only place in the world he could choose to spend the rest of his life. He is fifty-eight years old.

He sees in Palestine, moreover, business opportunities which far exceed those in this country, and the possibility that he will enter business in Palestine is not precluded, he said.

In the past seven years he has visited Palestine four times and each time has been profoundly impressed with the marked improvement and progressive development visible. In 1929 he planned to settle in Palestine but was deterred by the Arab outbreak against the Jews.

Mr. Bach organized the Public National Bank in 1907 and served as its managing vice president until 1930. He has been identified with hospital work in this city.

He was born in Germany and came to this country at the age of seven.

Funeral Services for Halpern, Noted Jewish Poet

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at Forward Hall for M. L. Halpern, noted Jewish poet, who died suddenly from a heart attack at the age of 46.

Interment took place at the cemetery of the Jewish National Workers Alliance. The services were arranged by the J. L. Peretz Writers Club.

Eulogies were delivered by H. Rogoff, S. Nigier, A. L. Glantz, J. Glatstein, R. Eisland, H. Lieberman, M. Boraischa.

Mr. Halpern was one of the most prominent modern Jewish poets and had a large following. He came to this country in 1908.

Jewess Youngest Girl to Get Cologne Degree

Ruth Gruber, a twenty-year-old Jewish girl of Brooklyn, is the youngest girl to be awarded a doctorate at the University of Cologne.

Miss Gruber received a degree of Ph.D. from the University of Cologne, winning it in one year. She was sent to the Cologne institution as an exchange student. She returned to this country on the "St. Louis."

Delegates from U. S., Canada Create Foundation for Jewish Colony in Palestine (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

DETROIT, Sept. 1.—The foundation of an American-Jewish colony in Palestine was laid at Unser Camp of the Jewish National Workers Alliance at Chelsea, Mich., at the two-day conference of Hairuth Beth.

Delegates, all of them enrolled as members of the group and as future colonists in this Palestinian settlement, were present from 10 cities in the United States and Canada: Minneapolis, Detroit, Chicago, Cleveland, St. Louis, Kansas City, New York City, Weirton, W. Va., Welland, Ont., and Toronto, Ont.

These delegates represented the 65 members of Hairuth Beth, membership in which has been closed. It was estimated by Zvi Yehuda of Nahalal, Palestine, who presided at the conference and who was its guiding spirit, that when the colony is finally completed and is settled by 85 families, each investing a minimum of \$4,000, there will be a total investment in the project of \$350,000. Mr. Yehuda pointed out that for the first time a colony was established after less than seven months' effort, work already having been begun, a well dug and cultivation started, the initial sum already remitted for the work being \$24,000.

The delegates decided to call annual meetings of members in order to create a closer relationship between the future neighbors of Hairuth Beth, which is located at Hasharon, in Wadi Hawaruth, on Jewish National Fund land purchased with contributions received from Canada.

Among the principles decided upon was one calling for self-help, establishing the rule that colonists must reside in the settlement, the work to be conducted for the mutual benefit of the settlers. Another decision ruled against private initiative, everything to be conducted on a co-operative basis, including the water installation.

The foundation was laid by the delegates for a mutual loan and savings society, each being required to have a

Report Pan-Arab Conference In Baghdad in the Fall

A Baghdad despatch to the New York Times states that a Pan-Arab conference is to be held in Baghdad in the fall, according to the Nationalist press.

The conference, according to the despatch, will be under the supreme presidency of King Feisal as "the true representative of all Arab peoples." Yassin Pasha is reported as the chairman of the conference, while delegates are expected from Iraq, Syria, Palestine, Egypt, Transjordan and Hedjaz.

The conference will discuss the present Arab situation with particular reference to the "projected union of Iraq and Syria."

Judge's Decision in Injunction Against Goglu Publications Postponed for Week

Police Surveillance Ordered to Apprehend Those Responsible for Anti-Semitic Stickers

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—The decision in the petition asking for an interlocutory injunction restraining the Goglu publications from attacks upon the Jews, due to be handed down today by Justice Desaulniers, will not be handed down until next week, it was announced yesterday.

On July 15, Judge Desaulniers heard the petition of E. Abugnov, a Jewish merchant of Lachine, asking for the injunction against Joseph Menard, owner of three anti-Semitic Goglu publications.

The petition was drawn up following a series of virulent attacks upon the Jews.

At the first hearing the Judge characterized the attacks as anti-Christian, anti-social and anti-national.

Special instructions were issued yesterday by Fernand Dufresne, police director, for surveillance to be kept on young sympathizers of the Goglus, who have been posting anti-Semitic stickers on windows of Jewish places of business and homes.

The Police Director ordered arrests to be made if such offenders proved intractable.

Zionist Youth League to be Formed in Baltimore

BALTIMORE, Sept. 1.—A Zionist Youth League will be formed in Baltimore and plans for its organization are now being formulated by a central committee elected following a conference in which 140 participated.

Twelve chapters in various sections of Baltimore are to comprise the League. Louis Schwartzman was named Executive Director and Abraham Leschack, head of the Educational Department.

The League is to be known as the Herzlian Zionist Youth League of Baltimore.

Relatives United Through Aid of Hias Service

More than 2,000 appeals to locate missing relatives came to the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, during the first six months of the current year, the New York office reports. The appeals came from Poland, Roumania, Lithuania, Latvia, France, Germany, Argentine and Brazil, where Hias maintains offices, and from other countries where Hias has correspondents.

In most cases, Hias reports, its efforts to trace lost relatives and friends were successful.

Madame Michaelis, Noted Danish Authoress, Lauds Jews; Says Anti-Semitism Unknown in Denmark

PARIS—Madame Karin Michaelis, famous Danish authoress, writing in the "Neue Pariser Zeitung," severely condemns anti-Semitism and states that it is a phenomenon not known in Denmark.

The Jews, she said, are fully appreciated in Denmark and recognition is accorded their contributions to world progress.

Madame Michaelis is well known for her liberalism and her sympathetic attitude toward the Jews, which has found expression on numerous occasions.

"I must declare with pride that we in Denmark are free from that bacillus which is known as anti-Semitism," she writes. "No one among us asks whether a particular person happens to be a Jew. In our country it is impossible for such things ever to happen as occur day after day in Austria, students attacking their Jewish colleagues with sticks and rubber cudgels, and driving them out of the university."

"At home in my country we know nothing of the inhuman horrors of Roumania, or of the Ukraine, and no one could possibly imagine a pogrom in our country. We have never known such things, and we do not want to know them ever. We drive the thought from us, as if these were things that happen on a different planet, with which we can never come in contact."

"If we in Denmark have progressed as much as we have," she went on, "it is because we have known how to appreciate the qualities of the Jews whom we have taken into our midst. Mixed marriages are frequent with us, and have helped us to advance. The Jews have given us their industriousness, vitality, and endurance, and what they have given has not been without influence upon us. I know many Jews who live according to the Sermon on the Mount much more than we Christians do, and what does it matter if they still wait for the Messiah, instead of accepting Christ?"

Denmark has a great deal for which to be thankful to the Jews who have helped it to progress, Madame Karin Michaelis, who is one of the Literature Nobel Prize Winners, wrote recently in the "Berliner Tageblatt." Denmark, she said there, has much for which to thank the undeniable qualities of the Jews of Denmark, who have given the Danish people the benefit of their industry, vitality and endurance.

Madame Karin Michaelis has repeatedly given expression to her high regard for the Jews. In 1927, in Vienna, she told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative there that Europe without the Jews would be like a lump of

More Than 3,000 Americans Resident in Palestine

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1—According to an announcement issued by the State Department, 3,313 American citizens reside in Palestine. These figures were announced upon completion of a survey based on reports from Consuls abroad, of American citizens residing in various foreign countries. The figures quoted for Palestine represent a high ratio of the total population of the country, and indicate the large number of American Jews who have settled in Palestine, as relatively few non-Jewish Americans reside there. This figure does not include many additional Jews coming from America who either never adopted American citizenship or lost it through expatriation on account of prolonged absence from the United States, or adoption of Palestinian citizenship.

Syracuse University to Have Course on Democracy and Bible

SYRACUSE, Sept. 1—The Syracuse University has announced that it will introduce this coming fall for the graduate students, a new course in the field of religious education. The subject will be known as the "Bible, Religion and Democracy," and will be under the supervision of Prof. Ismar J. Professor Peritz, in outlining the course, says that American democracy found its originating source in religion, with the Bible playing a great part.

share of \$60, payable \$1 monthly for a period of five years, the money to be deposited in Bank Hapoalim in Palestine. The Vaad, or board, of Hairuth Beth is also to be the Vaad of the loan society. Loans are to be made only to complete the cultivation of groves and are to be made for a maximum of three years at 6 per cent interest.

The conference thanked the Jewish National Fund for providing the land for the colony, the Histadruth and Yakhin for their co-operation.

This new Yishub is located on a piece of land extending to the Mediterranean. It is stated to be on first class ground and the groves are protected by a hill from the winds coming from the sea.

A. M. Koller, who with Zwi Yehuda is a leader of the Yakhin, was another guest at the conference.

Mr. Yehuda was enthusiastic over the result of the convention, and he lauded the conscientious, intelligent and determined efforts of the delegates. He also praised Unser Camp for its hospitality. Mr. Yehuda explained that of the 20 dunams allotted each settler, 10 dunams are to be set aside for the planting of oranges and the other 10 dunams to be used for mixed vegetable growing and for dairy farming.

dough without any yeast. All the great men of Europe, she said, gained in strength by what the Jews had created. Many of them had Jewish blood in their veins. That was why she did not like the idea of the Jews leaving Europe, even to go to Palestine. At the same time, she felt that Zionism meant the regeneration of an important part of the human family, and the next Jewish generation in Palestine, grown up on the soil, would show all the racial advantages of the Jews without any of their faults.

In 1925 she published an article in which she said that Jewish family life is happier than that of non-Jews, that the Jews are distinguished for their charitable disposition, and that domestic servants in Jewish homes are treated more humanely and democratically than in non-Jewish homes.

with the sympathizers of the Histadruth and the friends of the Gewerkschaften campaign who are anxious that in addition to the campaign for funds there be established a permanent organization of "Friends and Workers for Working Palestine." The Histadruth Delegation will consider the carrying out of this project one of its major undertakings while in this country, he said.

Discussing the situation in Palestine, Mr. Mereminski stated that time has come for a strong battle for a new migration movement into Palestine. Politically speaking, it has been long since there was such a ripe opportunity for the immigration of thousands of workers and a large group of middle class immigrants. The size and character of the immigration movement in the first half of the year strengthens this impression.

For the purposes of attracting both workers and private capital to Palestine, national capital is essential, Mr. Mereminski said, emphasizing that the possibilities for the fruitful investment of private capital are great.

The economic situation in Palestine is good, well stabilized and evincing progress, he said. The absorptive capacity of the country, notwithstanding the views of the Shaw, French and others of their kind, is increasing with the development of the Jewish Yishub and its technique, according to the Histadruth leader.

The newly discovered water sources have opened up such vast possibilities for colonization that they exceed the visions of the greatest optimists. All that is lacking are Jews for whom the last generation of Chaltzim have paved the way, Mr. Mereminski concluded.

Hadassah Convention in New York Next Month

For the first time in its history, Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, will hold its convention in New York City. The convention will open on September 18 at the Hotel Commodore and continue until the 20th. More than 300 delegates from all over the country are expected, representing 251 chapters and a total membership of approximately 30,000.

This convention will be the first to have present at its sessions the director of the medical work in Palestine maintained by the American Organization. Dr. Haim Yassky has been in the United States for six months, during which time he has studied a number of health institutions in various cities, among which are New York, Boston, Baltimore, Syracuse and others. At the convention, Dr. Yassky will give a detailed account of the progress of the work in Palestine.
