Death Sentences of 5 Nazis Commuted to Life Terms By German Government

Commutation of Death Sentence Which
Precipitated Anti-Jewish Attacks
Seen as Concession to Hitler

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 2.—The German Government today commuted to life imprisonment the death sentences imposed upon five Nazis on August 27 by the summary court at Beuthen for the murder of a Communist workman.

The verdict of death brought about anti-Semitic attacks by the Nazis and elicited threats by Adolf Hitler as well as a direct demand to Chancellor von Papen that the sentences be commuted.

There is no appeal from the verdict of the special courts named to deal with terrorists under an official emergency decree signed by President Paul von Hindenburg, and the government alone is able to act.

The commutation of the death sentences to life imprisonment is interpreted here as an indication that the von Papen government is making concessions to Adolf Hitler, fearing serious consequences should the death sentence be executed.

Vaida Voevod Assures League To Combat Anti-Semitism Jews To Be Treated "With Solicitude"

Jewish Population to Be Treated in
Accordance with Premier's Program
to Maintain Peace and Order

PARIS—Assurances that the Jewish population in Roumania will be treated with all solicitude are offered by Premier Alexander Vaida Voevod in a letter received by Bernard Lecache, president of the League to Combat Anti-Semitism.

"I want to assure you that the Jewish minority in Roumania will be treated by me with all solicitude in accordance with my program which is to preserve peace and order among the various social and ethical sections of my country," the Roumanian Premier declared.

"You may be assured," he said, "that I shall act in the same way as when I was Minister of Interior. I shall endeavor to pacify the extremist movements and check the anti-Semitic incidents."

Wulfin Two-Year Sentence Rescinded; Gets Instead Two Months Imprisonment

Appeal Against This Verdict Expected;
Judge Says Neither Anti-Jewish
Nor Anti-Polish Riots Took Place

VILNA, Sept. 2.—The Court of Appeal yesterday rescinded the two-year sentence imposed on April 19 on Shmuel Wulfin, Jewish student found guilty of participating in the events leading to the death of a Christian student, Stanislas Wacławski, during the anti-Semitic riots in Vilna last November.

Instead the court imposed a sentence of two months imprisonment on Wulfin. The remission of the two-year sentence, and the new verdict, was accompanied by a curious statement by the presiding judge, who found that no anti-Polish and no anti-Jewish disorders took place in Vilna last November, but that Wacławski's death followed some quarrels between chauvinistic elements.

Wulfin is not satisfied with this verdict and a new appeal will be entered, it is expected.

The prosecutor demanded eighteen months imprisonment for Wulfin. He charged that the Jewish press inflated a small affair involving individuals and not the Jewish people as a whole.

It is true, the prosecutor stated, that "we have anti-Semitic National Democrats, but the Jews are not all saints."

Counsel for Wulfin, Smiarkowski, asserted that the anti-Semitic National Democrats attacked the Jews. While the Jews probably defended themselves in some places, it cannot be said that they were animated by race hatred.

Another member of Wulfin's counsel, Czernichow, repudiated the charge that

Hugenberg to Dismiss All Jews Employed on Papers

BERLIN, Sept. 2.—Siegfried Breslawer, editor-in-chief of the "Lokal Anzeiger," one of the chain of newspapers owned by Dr. Alfred Hugenberg, leader of the German National Party, has been dismissed from his post, it was learned here yesterday.

Dr. Hugenberg, whose party has frequently allied itself with the National Socialists, in their anti-Semitic outbursts, will dismiss all Jewish journalists employed on his numerous papers, it is stated.

Revisionist Commissions Fail to Come to Agreement After All-Night Session

Congress Expected to Close Tonight;
Jabotinsky and Grossman May
Settle in Geneva

VIENNA, Sept. 2.—After an all-night session, the Commissions appointed to deal with important resolutions to be presented to the plenum of the congress of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists, were unable to come to an agreement. As a result, the congress will not close before Sunday at the earliest, it is understood.

There were no sessions today, in order to permit the Commissions to finish their work.

It is learned that an agreement has been reached on the important matter of the budget.

It is reported here that Vladimir Jabotinsky and Meier Grossman, president and vice-president of the Revisionist Union, may settle in Geneva, Switzerland.

Official Says No Ground for Apprehension for Jews Living In French Mandated Territory

Official of Foreign Ministry States In-
vestigation Discloses No Disquiet-
ing Events Current in Syria

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS—An investigation into the anti-Semitic boycott propaganda conducted in Damascus has failed to reveal anything of a disquieting nature.

This statement is made by M. Alexandre Leger, Director of the Political and Commercial Department of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs here, in response to an inquiry from the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

There is no ground for any apprehension concerning the safety of the Jewish population residing in the French mandated territory of Syria, M. Leger declared.

He stated further that the French High Commissioner in Beirut has no knowledge of any anti-Semitic incidents.

The League for Combatting Anti-Semitism, which conducted a separate inquiry into the report that anti-Semitic boycott propaganda was being conducted, has also informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the incidents were of a very slight and insignificant character.

Cleveland Jewry to Honor Memory of Rebecca Gratz By Dedication This Month

**Bas Relief to Be Erected at Entrance
to Gardens in Memory of Jewish
Philanthropist; Was Scott Heroine**

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

CLEVELAND, Sept. 2.—The memory of Rebecca Gratz, educator and philanthropist of the early 19th century, will be honored here on September 25 by the dedication of a bronze bas relief tablet bearing her likeness at the entrance of a new section of the Hebrew Cultural Gardens.

Dedication ceremonies of the new unit, to be known as the Rock Garden, are being arranged by the Gan Ivri League in celebration of the fifth anniversary of the founding of the Hebrew Gardens. The occasion will also mark the centenary of the death of Sir Walter Scott, to whom Rebecca Gratz served as the inspiration for the character "Rebecca" in "Ivanhoe."

The Gan Ivri League was organized in 1927 for the development of the Hebrew Garden. Mrs. Jennie K. Zwick, chairman, announces that the Federation of Women's Clubs, the Parent Teachers Association and other women's organizations will be represented on the dedication program.

The character and service of Rebecca Gratz was described by Washington Irving in 1817 as devoted to philanthropy, to the cause of Jewish education and to literary achievements. Her friendship with Irving sprang from their joint devotion to Matilda Hoffman, fiancée of Irving, who passed away at eighteen in New York after a lingering illness. Miss Gratz had been a friend

BOSTON, Sept. 2.—Robert Szold, vice-president of the Zionist Organization of America, was the principal speaker at a meeting arranged as a memorial to Theodor Herzl under the auspices of the Brookline Zionist Organization.

Speakers at the meeting included Esther M. Andrews, of the Governor's Council, who conveyed the greetings of Governor Joseph B. Ely; Myer J. Sawyer, Coleman Silbert, I. J. Lowe, Augustus Holzman, president of the Zionist organization of Brookline; Alexander Brin. Joseph S. Shubow presided.

Enroute to Boston, Mr. Szold stopped in Chatham, where he spent several hours with Justice Louis D. Brandeis. Mr. Szold said he found Justice Brandeis in excellent health and maintaining a keen interest in the upbuilding of the Jewish national homeland.

Lehman Donates Land To Aid Unemployed

HARRISON, Sept. 2.—An acre of land from his estate at Purchase has been given to the township of Harrison by Lieutenant Governor Herbert H. Lehman, for the purpose of aiding the unemployed.

The land will be used for the widening and improving of Barns Lane and will thus offer employment to a number.

Lieutenant Governor Lehman, prominent Jewish philanthropist, is a candidate for governor of New York State and will be the first Jew to hold this post if elected.

Flatbush Parochial School Re-opens for Fall Term

The Yeshiva of Flatbush, a Hebrew parochial school, located on Coney Island Avenue and Avenue I, will re-open on September 12 for the fall term, with a registration of over 200 children.

The school is chartered and supervised by the State Board of Education and is extended all the rights and privileges of a public school. In addition to the secular education, the students receive a complete Hebrew training in a truly Jewish atmosphere.

Jewish Painter Named to Swedish Royal Academy

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 2.—The Jewish painter, Isaac Gruenewald, has been appointed professor at the Royal Academy of Art in this city.

Professor Gruenewald, who is 42 years of age, is regarded in Sweden as the most significant representative of the younger generation of painters in the country.

He studied for many years in Paris, where he was a pupil of the great French painter Henri Matisse. He held his first one-man exhibition in Stockholm in 1909. He has produced a large number of works, portraits, landscapes, water colors and drawings. He is primarily a colorist and his decorative sense has led him to the theatre, where he has made scenery for "Samson and Delilah," "Midsummer Night's Dream," "Oberon," and other productions.

Gruenewald is well represented in the Stockholm National Museum, and the Goetheborger Art Museum.

His latest exhibition in Stockholm was a record with an attendance of over 30,000 visitors.

Dr. Ariel Ben Zion Elected To Spanish Academy

PARIS, Sept. 2.—Dr. Ariel Ben Zion, Zionist worker and literature, has been elected correspondent member of the "Real Academia de la Historia" of Madrid in recognition of his literary work and more particularly because of his recent book "The Zohar in Moslem and Christian Spain," it was learned here today.

The volume, which carries a preface by Sir Denison Ross, principal of the School of Oriental Studies of the University of London, is a study of the Zohar from the historical point of view and is at the same time a philosophic and poetic contribution to Jewish literature.

A Spanish edition of the volume is scheduled to appear shortly and will have an introduction by the Spanish philosopher, Miguel Unamuno.

Pennsylvania "Y" Federation Convention Opens Today

ALLENTOWN, Sept. 2.—The Pennsylvania State Federation of Y. M. H. A.'s, Y. W. H. A.'s and Jewish Community Centers, affiliated with the National Jewish Welfare Board, will open its 23rd annual convention here today and will continue tomorrow.

The program includes conferences on Unemployment, Lay Leadership, Dramatics and Group Activities. A feature of the convention is a banquet on Sunday evening, which will be addressed by Dr. Mordecai Soltes. Israel Krohn, of Easton, is president of the State Federation, and Dr. Philip R. Goldstein, Campaign Director of the Welfare Board, is the field secretary.

Synagogue Treasures Believed Confiscated Listed For Sale in Soviet Catalogue

Rabbi Hildesheimer Calls for Excommunication of Jews Who Make Purchases from This Catalogue

BERLIN, Sept. 2.—Numerous German rabbis and bibliophiles have received from Moscow an official Soviet catalogue of valuable Jewish manuscripts that are offered for sale, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned yesterday.

Rabbi Meier Hildesheimer, leading rabbi of Germany, and others are of the opinion that the offerings are part of synagogue treasures confiscated during the seizure of the synagogues throughout Russia.

Rabbi Hildesheimer has issued an appeal to the world not to buy the treasures listed. He also calls upon the Rabbinate of Poland and Lithuania to excommunicate any member of the Jewish faith who makes purchases from this Soviet catalogue.

Jewish Girl Wins \$500 Prize Over 903 Contestants

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 2.—A seventeen-year-old Jewish girl of this city, Grace Smelo, won a \$500 prize offered by Antioch College for the best essay on "What College Is For."

Miss Smelo, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William M. Smelo, took first place over 903 contestants.

Miss Smelo was graduated from the Cheltenham High School last spring. She was a member of the debating team of her school and editor of "The Cheltonian," student publication.

Judge Lester W. Roth Re-elected in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 2.—Lester W. Roth, appointed to the Superior Court of Los Angeles by Governor Rolph, was re-elected to the post by a clear majority at the primary elections here.

Judge Roth is prominently identified with Jewish communal activities in this city. He is the president of the Jewish Consumptive Relief Society and the Ex-Patients Society.

Judge Isaac Pacht, who was also appointed by Governor Rolph, will have to contend for office in the regular election, although he received more votes than any of the other candidates.

Isadore Urfner, Commander of Lake Placid Post, No. 325, of the American Legion, has been awarded the Essex County Commander Membership Trophy for obtaining the greatest increase in post membership in the country during the fiscal year just closed.

Commander Urfner won the prize by increasing the membership of his organization 50 per cent during the past year.

New Book Presents Comprehensive Study of Transjordanian Question

PARIS—One of the principal subjects of discussion at the recently concluded sessions in London of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization was that of Transjordan as a possibility for future Jewish colonization.

Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff pointed out with justice that Transjordan has now become quite modern, while George Halpern stated that "Transjordan" has now become "koshered."

There was a time, however, as M. Grossman declared, when the question of Transjordan was a forbidden topic of discussion in Zionist ranks. Only in recent months has it become clear in the leadership of the Zionist movement that Transjordan is bound up with the whole future of the delicate question of land for colonization.

In Jewish circles and even in Zionist circles the history of Transjordan's separation from Palestine is not very well known, its juridical aspects, and the political combinations which resulted in Emir Abdullah's operetta government.

For years it was impossible to find in any language a single work devoted to this question.

It was only in 1929, just prior to the sixteenth Zionist Congress, that a brochure appeared, in German, entitled "The Jewish Irriditanda." This brochure contained in brief and concise form important material relating to these questions. Recently a young Jewish jurist, S. Fishelov, submitted to the University of Toulouse a thesis for his doctorate degree entitled "The International Statute of Eastern Palestine (Transjordan)."

The book represents an important and useful source and is an earnest exposition of the whole complex problem with the exception only of its economic aspects. The writer has utilized all official English documents, protocols of the English Parliament and the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, the English and French press and legal sources. He has written a book which will be used as a source by those who have a living interest in an understanding of the Transjordanian problem.

Dr. Fishelov points to the interesting fact that Transjordan was included in the British mandate for Palestine thanks largely to the fact that England desired "a good eastern frontier for the Jewish government in Palestine." Following the temporary alliance of Great Britain and France during the World War, the territory now known as Transjordan became part of the so-called Occupied Enemy Territory Administration, under the rule of King Feisal, who then occupied the throne of Syria.

A complicated situation developed,

Honored with Cross of Order of Polonia Restituta; Pittsburgh Polish Consul Presents Award

The Consul of Poland at Pittsburgh, Jan Lech Byzswski, on August 16 decorated Nathaniel Spear, Jr., of Pittsburgh and New York, vice-president of Spear & Company, with the Chevalier's Cross of the Order of Polonia Restituta, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed yesterday.

In conferring this high honor, bestowed upon Mr. Spear by the President of the Republic of Poland, Consul Byzswski said:

"It is indeed a great honor and my personal pleasure to inform you, that the President of the Republic of Poland, through the Chancellor of the Supreme Chapter of the Order of Polonia Restituta, has seen fit to recognize your untiring efforts to bring about rapprochement and closer cooperation between nations."

Rabbi Raffalowitch Formally Confirmed As Grand Rabbi

RIO DE JANEIRO.—The Grand Rabbi of Brazil, Dr. Isaiah Raffalowitch, formerly Minister in Liverpool, who is the official representative of the Jewish Colonization Association (Ica) in Brazil, has now been officially proclaimed as Chief Rabbi.

Although Dr. Raffalowitch has been in Brazil for a number of years, and has been generally recognized as the head of the Jewish Community, he had not received any actual documentary recognition on the part of the various independent communities in the different States. It had been taken for granted.

Recently, however, a local Jewish paper questioned the position, and in consequence, a small committee, half Ashkenazi and half Sephardi, was formed, which invited all Jewish centers in Brazil to demonstrate their solidarity behind the Chief Rabbi.

A big meeting was held, representing every Community in the Republic, at which declarations were signed by the representatives of the Communities, and in some cases by every member of the Community, confirming Dr. Raffalowitch in his office as Grand Rabbi. The declarations and signatures have been bound in albums and presented to Dr. Raffalowitch, and speeches were delivered, expressing to him the wholehearted support of Brazilian Jewry.

Congregation Shaarey Zedek, of Detroit, of which Dr. Abraham M. Hersman is rabbi, announced the election of Jacob H. Sosenklar of Chicago as cantor, beginning with the High Holy Day services. Cantor Sosenklar succeeds Rev. Elijah Zaiselkowsky, who resigned his Detroit post to become cantor of Congregation Shaarey Zedek of New York. To come to Detroit, Cantor Sosenklar leaves his post with Congregation Anshe Eines of Chicago, of which Rabbi Solomon Goldman is spiritual leader.

tions of the world, by bestowing upon you the Chevalier's Cross of that Order.

"Congratulating you most heartily upon this high distinction, which my country has conferred upon you, I now take pleasure in decorating you, on behalf of the Ambassador of Poland at Washington, with the Chevalier's Cross of the Order of Polonia Restituta.

"I am very grateful for the opportunity of bestowing this high distinction upon you in the presence of the members of your family, and your good friends and associates, who have honored us with their presence.

"Happy indeed am I, that my country, always mindful of the work of the individual towards the furtherance of World Peace and International Cooperation, has singled you out for reward for your truly constructive work.

"I regard today's event, which has brought to this Consulate such a distinguished representation of Pittsburgh's citizens, as another strong link in the chain of traditional friendship which binds the United States with Poland.

"Accept, Mr. Spear, my sincere felicitations and wishes of all success."

In his reply to Consul Byszewski, Mr. Spear said:

"Through you, as the representative in Pittsburgh of the Republic of Poland, I want to convey to your Government my deep appreciation of the high honor which has been conferred upon me. It is my earnest wish that the bonds of good feeling between the Republic of Poland and the Republic of the United States of America be further strengthened—that Poles and Americans may become more cognizant of the unlimited possibilities for friendship between their respective countries and that these nations may progress toward their fullest development in uninterrupted Universal Peace."

Mr. Spear, who recently moved to New York City, is chairman of the Pennsylvania Department Foreign Relations Committee of the American Legion, and an officer of the General Staff, Military Order of the World War. He was graduated from Yale in 1919.

however, when the French drove King Feisal from Damascus and the question of which country Transjordan was to belong to was abated. It is interesting to recall how the English press insisted upon the inclusion of Transjordan in the British and not in the French Mandate. The London Times wrote on September 19, 1920, Transjordan is the natural frontier of Palestine. The Manchester Guardian of February 24, 1920 declared that from a historical and economic standpoint, Transjordan is an organic part of Palestine.

In March of 1921, the influential French journal "The French-Asian," wrote that the English are endeavoring to revise the frontier question in order "to guarantee complete success for something which is not English in the ordinary sense of the term, but truly international, viz. the forthcoming Zionist government."

The English demanded Transjordan in the name of Jewish government to be established, but the very first step England took was contrary to the independence of Palestine. In 1920, the first High Commissioner for Palestine, Sir Herbert Samuel, established in Transjordan local autonomous councils. When it was discovered that this form was unfortunate and that anarchy reigned Emir Abdullah was approached in March of 1921. The latter took over Amman, whence he sought to march on Syria to recover that country from the French. The English asked Emir Abdullah to take over the administration of the country and restore order for a period of six months. However, Abdullah's tenure of office continued for a longer period and England began to think of a basis for further separating Transjordan from Palestine.

The first draft of the mandate for Palestine contained 27 paragraphs, none of which mentioned Transjordan. The final text of the Mandate consisted of 28 paragraphs, paragraph 25 of which empowered the mandatory government, with the consent of the Council of the League of Nations "to withhold or set aside, in the territories between the Jordan river and the eastern boundary of Palestine, the employment of such mandate agreements which are found to be inapplicable because of local conditions."

On the basis of this paragraph, Great Britain, in a memorandum sent to the League of Nations on September 16, 1923, declared that it would not employ in Transjordan all the stipulations of the mandate relating to the duty assumed of helping to establish a Jewish national homeland in Palestine.

On April 26, 1923, Sir Herbert Samuel, in the name of the British government, declared: that Great Britain is willing to recognize the independence of Transjordan under Emir Abdullah.

On February 20, 1928, a pact was concluded between Great Britain and Emir Abdullah which completed the separation of Transjordan from Palestine,

of Miss Hoffman's mother and had known Matilda from childhood.

Irving remained unmarried and the tragedy of his betrothed's death affected his whole life. While visiting Scott, Irving described Miss Gratz's service as a leader in charitable institutions and her devotion to her faith. After the appearance of "Ivanhoe" in 1819, Scott wrote to Irving: "How do you like your Rebecca? Does the Rebecca I have pictured compare well with the pattern given?"

William Thackeray regarded Miss Gratz as the "sweetest character in the whole range of fiction."

The sculptor of the bas relief likeness of Miss Gratz is Miriam E. Cramer. The most famous early American artists painted the likeness of Miss Gratz, including Gilbert Stuart, Sully and Malbourn. A large boulder near the entrance of the newly developed rock garden section of the Hebrew Garden has been selected for the tablet now being designed by Mrs. Cramer.

Vladimir Jabotinsky has been persistently refused a visa to settle in Palestine by the British Government since the Arab riots of 1929.

although the British mandate over the new government remains in full force.

Dr. Fischelev marshals a brilliant array of facts to prove that England openly violated Article 25 of the mandate in its memorandum of September 22, 1923. Article 25, he holds, refers only to a temporary situation in its provision for unapplication of certain articles of the mandate and does not refer to the establishment of an independent government. In taking this action, Britain is contravening the text and the spirit of the mandate, he asserts.

It is also contrary to Article 5 of the Mandate, which makes the mandatory government responsible for the unity of Palestine territory, declares Dr. Fischelev.
