To Form Brigades to Check Up on Absentees During Holydays; Jewish Colonists to Be Compelled to Work

MOSCOW, Sept. 5—An anti-religious holyday campaign is being organized in Soviet Russia today, three weeks before the Jewish High Holydays begin. The "Emess" has issued a proclama-

The "Emess" has issued a proclamation urging Jewish workers, whether they be artisans, colonists, employed in the factories or elsewhere, not to interrupt their labors on the Jewish New Year or on the Day of Atonement.

The paper calls upon the labor unions and the Association of the Godless to regulate the campaign to keep Jewish workers at their jobs during the holyday season.

A special consultation bureau will be opened at the offices of the "Emess" in connection with the anti-holyday campaign and also for the purpose of receiving complaints against organizations which refuse to take part in such a campaign.

According to the proclamation, Jewish zolonists will be compelled to join a special anti-religious march in which will participate all members of Jewish collectives, who will proceed to the city to sell their products in the collective markets, during the holyday season.

Russia Places Restrictions On Food Package Contents

According to advices received by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society from Riga, the Soviet government has issued an order to the effect that food packages which are sent to relatives or friends from abroad may not contain more than three kilo sugar, two kilo coffee, cocoa or soap. A kilo is approximately two and a quarter pounds. The regulations further provide that no one person may receive the above-mentioned quantities more than once a month.

In connection with this order the officials of Hias state that only one of the sixty-four standard food packages which may be sent through Hias to rela- bers who comprise the Philadelphia tives and friends in Soviet Russia are affected. This is package No. 215, which contains eight pounds of sugar. All other packages are available.

Food packages may only be transmitted to Soviet Russia by those agencies which have received permission from the Russian government. Hias food packages are sent from Riga, the nearest port to Russia, under the personal supervision of Aaron Benjamin, vicepresident of Hias and the Society's European Commissioner.

(c) The obligation is not in any case to apply to facilities accorded by Iraq to adjacent countries to facilitate fromtier traffic, or to those resulting from a customs union concluded by Iran nor to any special advantages in customs matters which Iraq may grant to goods produced or manufactured in Turkey or professionally, of this nation, which up in any country whose territory was wholly included in the Ottoman Empire in Asia in 1914.

The declaration confirms the abolition of the system of capitulations that was inaugurated during the mandatory period, and maintains, for a period of ten years from the date of Irag's admission to the League, the system by which the Iraq Government appoints a certain number of foreign jurists to hold posts in its judiciary. It is provided that these foreign jurists should be nine, and nationality.
