## Jewish Circles Believe Renewed Nazi Terrorization Will Be Prevented by Present Regime

**Police Establish Nazis Responsible for  
Dynamiting of Jewish Colony  
of Gross Glasgaw**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 14—The police department yesterday established beyond a measure of doubt that those responsible for the dynamiting of the Jewish agricultural colony of Gross Glasgaw on August 17th are members of the Nazi party.

On August 30th, in the course of an interpellation on the bombing in the Jewish colonies, in the Prussian Diet, the Nazi deputies abused the State Attorney for conducting an investigation into the activities of Nazis arrested in connection with the dynamiting.

The Nazi deputies then repudiated responsibility for the outrage and suggested that dismissed workmen were in all probability the perpetrators. The Nazis arrested included the leader of the Storm Troops, Reinhard, four members of the Storm Troops and a husband and wife named Steiner. All deny the crime. The Social Democratic paper, "Abend," commenting on this disclosure discusses the lack of conscience of the Nazis and emphasizes the importance of taking measures.

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## Police Disperse Demonstrators Protesting Victory of Hakoah Team in Riga

**Several Hundred Anti-Semites in Demonstration When University Team Loses**

RIGA, Sept. 14—The Jewish people were abused and Jewish pedestrians attacked here today by anti-Semitic students numbering several hundreds, demonstrating in protest against a victory gained by the Hakoah football team over a non-Jewish University team.

The demonstrators assumed a particularly threatening attitude when they reached the district where the Jewish newspapers are located.

Police reserves were summoned who dispersed the anti-Semites. They re-assembled, however, and continued to provoke fights with Jews. "Beat the Jews and throw them into the river!" they cried.

## Dismisses Injunction Against Anti-Semitic Papers; Regrets Compelled to Do So Under Law

**Montreal Justice Issues Slashing Indictment of Anti-Jewish Agitation**

MONTREAL, Sept. 14—Justice Desaulniers yesterday dismissed the application for an injunction to restrain the owners and editors of the Goglu publications from continuing their campaigns against the Jews, expressing at the same time regret that the law left him no alternative but to do so.

Justice Desaulniers in dismissing the application of E. Abagov, a Jewish merchant of Lachine, handed down a slashing indictment of anti-Semitic campaigns in general and those of the Goglu publications in particular. The anti-Semitic incitement was termed by the Justice as "anti-Christian, audacious and tending to stir up rioting and misdeemeanor."

He castigated the publishers of anti-Semitic papers for failing to heed the warning not to continue their incitement. All citizens, he said, are interested in good social order and expressed regret that the publishers are persisting in their action.

Justice Desaulniers cited from the historical records concerning the persecution of the Jews, particularly in Russia, declaring that the raising of a ritual murder allegation against the Jews might be sufficient to let loose events which have the most terrible consequences.

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## Jewish Woman Seriously Injured in Tunisia Attack

TUNIS, Sept. 14—A Jewish woman was seriously wounded by a bullet today during a violent anti-Jewish outbreak at Bab Cartagane today.

The police succeeded in checking the Arab attackers and in restoring order.

Tunisia has been in a disturbed state for some time and Arab outbreaks against the Jews have been current for some months. Last week, attacks in various sections of the country took place.

## 2,500 Dwellings Needed at Once For Settlers Already in Bidjan Says Government Commission

**Warns Success of Jewish Settlement Plan Depends on Adequate Housing Facilities**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW, Sept. 14—The mass desertion of Jewish settlers in Bira Bidjan may show a further sharp increase this winter unless dwellings for newcomers are provided at once, declares a report submitted yesterday by the Commission despatched to Bira Bidjan for investigation purposes by the Zik of White Russia, the local Soviet authority.

The entire plan calling for the settlement of 14,000 Jews in the Far Eastern region this year now depends on the ability to make adequate accommodations available for the immigrants, according to the Commission. Thus far, however, the Commission comments, adequate quarters have not even been found for the workers who are conducting the building activity. As a result, of 600 builders, only 300 now remain.

The report further discloses the curious fact that a timber shortage is being experienced in Bira Bidjan, also.

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## Deputy Landau Asks More Humane Treatment for Jews On Part of Revenue Collectors

**Jewish Deputy Asks Authorities to Investigate Case of Jew Allegedly Attacked by Revenue Official**

BUCHAREST, Sept. 14—The question of the maltreatment of Jews by revenue officials, particularly in Besarabia, was raised in the Romanian Parliament today by Deputy Michael Landau.

The Jewish deputy referred at length to the case of a small Jewish trader, Motti Pekl of Kishinev, who was attacked by revenue officials when he insisted that he had already paid his taxes, as reported by "Unser Zeit."

Deputy Landau asked the authorities to conduct an investigation into this case. He also called for more humane treatment in general in connection with tax collections, in view of the hardship suffered by the Jewish population and their impoverishment.

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## Revisionist Headquarters to Be Moved to Geneva to Bring Palestine to Fore Internationally

**Hope to Open Up Avenue for Political  
Work Other Than With Britain; Says  
Discipline Question Theoretical Only**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Sept. 14—In a press communication issued yesterday by Meir Grossman, vice-president of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists, the resolutions adopted at the recently concluded Revisionist congress in Vienna are explained.

Discussing the reasons for the contemplated transfer of Revisionist headquarters from London to Geneva, the communication says the purpose is two fold. The transfer will permit at least three members of the Revisionist Executive to reside permanently in Geneva. In this manner avenues will be opened up for political work apart from that with Great Britain. The international obligations to the restoration of the Jewish National Homeland in Palestine will be brought to the fore, in this fashion, it is hoped.

Although it is to be hoped that a possibility for co-operation, friendship and mutual trust with Great Britain exists, nevertheless every avenue for the defense of the rights of the Jews in Palestine must be utilized, says the communication.

Referring to the Revisionist decision to form a non-partisan trade union in Palestine, it is explained that conflict with the Histadruth, existent Palestine Labor Federation, is not intended. The purpose of the Revisionist union will be to fight monopoly, and to prevent unnecessary strikes and labor dictatorship in the interests of thousands of non-partisan workers.

The question of discipline for members of the Revisionist Union is purely theoretical and has no material value, according to the communication.

## Union Campaign for Judaism in 1,000 Towns

CINCINNATI, Sept. 14—With the coming of the fall season, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations takes up afresh the movement for the Advancement of Judaism in the small unorganized communities, in a campaign in which 1,000 of these towns are to be visited.

The 1,000 towns selected for the Campaign contain from 20,000 to 40,000 Jews. Of these 5,000 are children. During the Campaign, attempts will be made to organize a Congregation, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, or Religious School for these Jews who were formerly isolated from any Jewish contact, or who, if they desired such contact, were forced to travel miles to find it.

## Prepare Jewish Kindergarten Curriculum for Children of 4

DETROIT, Sept. 14—A kindergarten curriculum to be used for children as young as four, in the teaching of the Hebrew language and Jewish customs has been prepared for the United Hebrew Schools of Detroit by Bernard Isaacs, superintendent of the local schools and by Miss Leah Pike, head of the kindergarten department of the schools, who received her training in Palestine.

The curriculum is attracting wide attention and requests for copies have been received from many cities in this country as well as from South Africa.

## Protests Discrimination In Tobacco Concessions

The Federation of Polish Jews of America has addressed to the Polish Ambassador in the United States a protest against alleged discrimination in the matter of tobacco concessions which has reduced the number of Jewish tobacco concessionaires from 800 to 33.

The Polish Federation asks that an investigation be conducted into the reports of discrimination and, if true, that the Polish Ambassador use his good offices toward "an immediate cessation of these municipal discriminations, so that the rights of these Polish citizens be restored."

The Polish Embassy, replying to this communication, has asked for clippings of dispatches containing these allegations.

## Executive and Administrative Committees of Congress to Meet

A joint meeting of the national executive and administrative committees of the American Jewish Congress will be held on September 25th at the Hotel Astor.

The meeting is being convened in order to present an opportunity for leaders in the American Jewish Congress to hear complete reports on the accomplishments of the Geneva conference last month.

## 1,100 Dunams Planted of Land for 1,000 Families

JERUSALEM, Sept. 14—Eleven hundred dunams of land of the 18,850 dunams assigned by the Jewish National Fund in Wadi Hawareth for the settlement of 1,000 Jewish families, have been planted, it was disclosed today.

The Jewish National Fund made the land assignment on June 14th.

A total of 286 houses are also in the course of construction, it was revealed.

## Rabbi Fink Vice-President Of Social Work Conference

## 96% Underissue of Visas To 21 Lands in Month of July State Department Reveals

Only 633 Visas Issued of 14,838 Available; Economic Conditions in U.S. and Public Charge Clause Responsible

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14—Only 633 visas were issued to aliens in July of the quota of 14,838 available for twenty-one countries, it was disclosed yesterday by the Department of State.

This figure represents an underissue of 14,205 or 96 percent.

The decline is attributed in part to economic conditions in the United States and in part to the enforcement of the "likely to become a public charge" provision of the Immigration Act of 1917.

"Reports from American consular officers assigned to 21 countries whose annual quotas represent 148,383 of the total quota of 153,831, indicate that of the possible maximum issue based upon the monthly 10 per cent of the total quotas, which maximum issue equals 14,838, only 388 immigration visas were issued during July, 1932, to aliens entitled to preference under the immigration laws, and 245 to aliens not entitled to preference, making a total of 633 for the month," say the Department of State. "This means that of the possible maximum of 14,838 quota numbers available during July for issuance to aliens born in the countries mentioned, there was an underissue of 14,205 or 96 per cent.

### Other Countries

"Incomplete returns received to date from the remaining countries, whose annual quotas amount to 5,448, are not restricted to a 10 per cent monthly issue, indicate that only 76 visas were issued during July.

"The above results have been accomplished by consuls of the United States in the enforcement of existing provisions of law in the light of present economic conditions.

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## Says Considering Extending Preference to Palestine

JERUSALEM, Sept. 14—A delegation representing Jewish colonists met with the Palestine High Commissioner yesterday with reference to the draft of the new municipal ordinance regarding tree uprooting and the British duty on orange imports.

The colonists urged that the duty on oranges be imposed only for the period of May 15th to October 30th.

A delegation representing Arab orange growers, who were also received by Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchoppe, were informed that the Colonial Office is now considering the possibility of extending Imperial Preference tariffs to Palestine.

### Mosaics of Ancient Synagogue in Esdrachon Excavated; Book on Results

JERUSALEM—About three years ago a number of Jewish workmen digging an irrigation canal at Beth-Alpha, the large communal settlement at the foot of Mount Gilboa, in the Valley of Esdrachon, came across a narrow strip of multi-colored mosaic pavement showing Zodiacal signs and Hebrew inscriptions. The Hebrew University Press is publishing this Rosh Hashanah the results of the subsequent excavations conducted by Dr. E. L. Sukenik, archaeologist to the University. The volume is written by Dr. Sukenik, and is named "The Ancient Synagogue at Beth Alpha."

The synagogue dates back to the sixth century C.E. and is the first to be found with such perfect mosaic pavements. They had been excellently preserved under the debris of fourteen hundred years. Fragments of colored mosaic pavements had previously been found in other places in Palestine. Near Jericho, for example, one such floor was found, but it was not intact and the designs were mutilated. The Esdrachon colonies, however, were the first to be unearthed in a whole condition, unspoiled by the ravages of Nature or the conflicts of man, especially those that occurred in that stormy period marking the end of the Byzantine period and the inception of the Arab conquest of Palestine.

The principal designs are in the central hall of the synagogue. This area is divided into three sections, which show in brilliant and beautiful hues a group of synagogue utensils, the Zodiacal signs, and the sacrifice of Isaac. A series of reproductions of human beings, animals, trees, flowers, and carpets are contained in the framework around these sections and other parts of the pavement.

The great importance of the finds is enhanced by two inscriptions, one in Greek and the other in Aramaic, telling of the skilled craftsmen who laid the mosaics and the period in which they were made. The discovery of this first dated synagogue sheds light not only upon the existence of Beth-Alpha, but also upon other epochal events upon which opinion of historians had not been unanimous.

The rich and diverse material revealed in the course of the studies has enabled Dr. Sukenik, Hebrew University archaeologist and a leading authority on old Jewish synagogues of Palestine, to determine a second period in the development of ancient houses of worship in the country, and also to clear up a number of problems con-

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## Says No Cause for Hysteria on Part of German Jewry; Sceptical Hitler Will Ever Come to Power

Lawrence A. Steinhart Back from  
Trip Abroad Says Economic Distress  
Responsible for 'Anti-Semitism'

Economic conditions in Europe are responsible for anti-Semitism in Germany, and England. Nevertheless the hysteria which has existed among part of German Jewry was not and is not justified.

This statement was made to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency yesterday by Lawrence A. Steinhart, prominent Jewish attorney and communal worker who has returned from an extended stay abroad.

In contradistinction to Germany and England anti-Semitism has failed to achieve a foothold in France and Italy because economic conditions have not provided the necessary hothouse within which that culture thrives and because the Latin temperament is not inclined in that direction, Mr. Steinhart stated.

Discussing the situation in Germany, Mr. Steinhart expressed doubt that the Nazis would ever come into power.

"In Germany," he said, "anti-Semitism has been primarily a political expedient of the Nazis. The closer they come to a real accession to power the less palatable anti-Semitism will be to them. As long as the Hitlerites remain a powerful opposition to the constituted government, they will agitate for anti-Semitism. Should they take over the government — which is most unlikely — they will then find themselves in the position of having to suppress anti-Semitism as much as possible."

He predicted that "as economic conditions in Germany improve — and great improvement is confidently anticipated in the Spring — anti-Semitism will subside.

"I have never felt," he declared, "and still do not feel today that the hysteria which has existed among part of German Jewry was or is justified. There have, of course, been minor disorders caused by individuals, and they are liable to continue, but I do not anticipate or fear, for a moment, any calamitous outbreak. The German people as a whole are a highly civilized, educated people who dislike disorder, who have a marked respect for discipline, and particularly for the rights of other individuals. They will not tolerate any anti-Semitic outbreak on a large scale, nor would any responsible German government, Hitlerite or otherwise, sanction outbreaks which might easily get out of control," Mr. Steinhart stated.

German Jewry, he said, should not forget that there is a fundamental difference between the Russian masses and the German masses, a difference of tradition, culture and education which is

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empires which enslaved them. He deplored the fact that the law has not placed in the hands of the magistrate the necessary implements to keep anti-Semitic campaigns within decent limits. Had the bill introduced in the Legislature by the Jewish Deputy Peter Bercovitch been adopted, he would have had the power to grant the injunction.

The decision, although expected, has nevertheless caused disappointment in Jewish circles.

A suit to collect damages may be entered against the publications. The bill of Deputy Bercovitch may also be introduced again in the provincial legislature.

## 96% Underissue of Visas To 21 Lands in Month of July State Department Reveals

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in the United States particular care should be taken before issuing immigration visas to determine whether the applicants may become public charges. If any alien, upon whom the burden of establishing admissibility is placed by section 23 of the Immigration Act of 1924, should be unable to establish that he is not likely to become a public charge, the consular officer to whom he may have applied for a visa would have no other choice under section 2 (f) of the Immigration Act of 1924 than to refuse a visa. Section 2 (f) of the act cited provides in part that:

"No immigration visa shall be issued to an immigrant if it appears to the consular officer . . . that the immigrant is inadmissible into the United States under the immigration laws . . . nor shall such immigration visa be issued if the consular officer knows or has reason to believe that the immigrant is inadmissible into the United States under the immigration laws."

A total of 2,500 dwellings are required to accommodate settlers already in Bira Bidjan. Unless this problem is solved without delay further desertions must be awaited, the report emphasizes.

### Yiddish School System in Bidjan Endangered

MOSCOW, Sept. 14—The Yiddish school system in Bira Bidjan is on the verge of collapse owing to the inadequacy of accommodations, lack of text books and a dearth of teachers, the "Emess" asserts today.

The report in the "Emess" which comes from its correspondent in Bira Bidjan, points out that the erection of a school building which was decided upon last year has not even been started.

Many school buildings have been taken over for government offices and the few available are in a dilapidated condition while the local councils refuse to repair them.

There are not sufficient teachers and those available are for the most part unqualified. Text books moreover are completely absent.

The liquidation of the schools is imminent owing to these conditions, the report warns.

Last night the windows of a grocery store of a Jew, Aron, in Frobenstrasse, were broken. Nazis, according to the Communist press, are responsible, although the perpetrators have thus far not been apprehended.

In Jewish circles there is a belief that renewed terrorization is not likely to be tolerated by the present regime. This particularly in view of the fact that Minister of Interior Wilhelm von Gayl yesterday let it be known that new elections will be held within the sixty day period set by the constitution if order is maintained. He warned the Nazis, however, that if disturbances are renewed, the elections will be postponed.

Anti-Semitism, he declared, is on the wane in England, although it will be many years before the status of the Jews in England reaches the pinnacle achieved before the outbreak of the world war.
