Police to Station Plain Clothes Men at Synagogues in Germany During the High Holydays

Protection Measures Discussed at Meeting with Representatives of Central Union and Kehiloth

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—Negotiations were inaugurated today with the police department by the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith and the Federation of Jewish Communities to protect the synagogues throughout Germany during the High Holydays.

Last year, for the first time in the history of Berlin, worshippers were attacked on the Jewish New Year as they were leaving synagogue services.

The police department suggested that policemen in civilian attire be stationed at the synagogues in order not to attract attention. This method would be similar to that employed for the protection of diplomatic buildings.

This proposal was accepted by the Jewish representatives. The details alone now remain to be settled.

Ask Socialists Not to Send Jewish Speakers to Campaign in Provinces

Social Democrats Assert That It is Tactical Measure Best Designed to Combat Nazis

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Sept. 16.—Socialist headquarters in Vienna have been requested by their branches in the provinces not to send Jewish speakers to their communities in connection with the forthcoming election campaign, it was learned here yesterday.

Jews who are converts to Christianity and those who are non believers are likewise on the banned list, it is learned.

The Nazi press states that trade union leaders have joined in this demand and have also asked that the number of Jewish candidates for Parliamentary posts be reduced.

The Social Democratic press does not deny the substance of these allegations. Social Democratic circles moreover explain that the tendency to exclude Jewish speakers is not based on anti-Semitism but is a tactical method to be used in fighting the Nazis who have

Taschereau Voices Indictment of Anti-Semitic Campaign; Says Time for Legislative Action Now

Hope Revived Bercovitch Bill to Curb Anti-Semitic Publications Will Receive Favorable Action

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

QUEBEC, Sept. 16.—Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec yesterday added his condemnation of the anti-Semitic campaign being conducted by the Goglu publications to that of Premier Beinnett and Justice Desaulniers.

Asked to comment on the scathing denunciation of the anti-Jewish campaign of the Goglu publications by Justice Desaulniers who regretted that the law did not permit him to grant an injunction restraining these papers, Premier Taschereau declared: "As far as the judgment is concerned, I have no hesitation in stating that it is a complete indictment of the campaign waged by anti-Semitic papers against the Jews."

"The judgment is a severe and timely indictment. The Jews are here to stay and I personally condemn the campaign being directed against them by the papers in question."

Expressing regret that Justice Desaulniers came to the conclusion that the law did not permit him to issue the injunction, Premier Taschereau stated that it is his view that the time has come for legislative action which will place papers under the supervision of the courts.

The statement of Premier Taschereau revives the hope that the bill introduced by Deputy Peter Bercovitch for the curbing of anti-Semitic publications, which was defeated at the last session of the Legislature, will be favorably received when it is reintroduced.

Weizmann in Madrid; Received By Minister of Education

MADRID, Sept. 16.—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former head of the World Zionist organization arrived in Madrid yesterday.

Dr. Weizmann was received by the Spanish Minister of Education, Fernando de los Rios, with whom he discussed Palestine questions at length.

The Minister of Education is known to be sympathetic toward the Jews.

400 Jewish Families in Polish Town Left Destitute When Fire Razes Property

Police Investigating Cause of Fire; 75% of Jewish Population Without Shelter

WARSAW, Sept. 16.—More than four hundred Jewish families are destitute today as a result of a fire in Kolno, near Lomzha.

Seventy-five percent of the Jewish population is left without shelter and is in a state of starvation as a result of the fire.

The authorities are investigating the fire which started in a barn and was spread to neighboring houses by a strong wind.

The narrow streets and the general congestion made the task of extinction most difficult even though several fire brigades aided by two detachments of the military were summoned.

Anticipate Favorable Consideration for Demand for Change in Nationality Law

Petition Submitted to Parliament; Jewish Staatenlose Would Benefit If Demands Granted

BUCHAREST, Sept. 16.—Immediate and far-reaching changes in the nationality law, which would favorably affect the status of thousands of Jewish "Staatenlose" in Bessarabia were demanded in a petition submitted yesterday to the vice president of Parliament by Deputy Michael Landau.

The petition carries the signatures of fifty members of Parliament. It is understood that it will receive favorable consideration.

Jewish Colonial Trust Shows Profit of £5,758

Reports on Activities at Poale Zion-Zeire Zion Convention

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

BALTIMORE, Sept. 16—Problems now affecting world Jewry were outlined at the Poale Zion-Zeire Zion convention here yesterday by Meyer I. Brown, of New York, national president.

Covering the party's activities, the report submitted by Mr. Brown was the feature of the three sessions — morning, afternoon and evening — held at the Lord Baltimore Hotel.

Mr. Brown touched on various aspects, citing, among other things, the anti-Semitic situation in Poland, the Hitler movement in Germany and the economic crisis affecting American Jews.

Need for seeking an outlet for the restlessness of Jewish youth also was mentioned. Activities of the youth movement were discussed.

Addition of eleven new branches of the organization since last year was reported by the speaker. There now are 61 branches in 45 cities and 21 States in this country and four Canadian provinces, he stated.

Mr. Brown pointed out activities in the formation of Jewish public schools.

There is an optimistic trend in activities of the party, he declared. Reference was made to the formation of a non-Jewish Palestine labor committee from among labor and progressive circles, and the speaker outlined relations with the Socialist party in America.

Mr. Brown also dealt with the present condition of the Jewish Agency, in preparation for the coming Zionist Congress in Europe next summer.

Organization of the Hechalutz movement was discussed by the secretary, who asserted that ninety American families of the organization now are colonizing in Palestine.

A number of committees were appointed at a session presided over by

Hundreds of Jewish Immigrant Families Will Shortly Be Reunited, Dickstein Says

States Reunion Will Follow Investigation;
To Seek Revision of
Public Health Service

Hundreds of families in Europe seeking immigration visas to the United States, the largest proportion of them Jewish, will shortly be reunited as a result of an investigation into the work of the consulate and medical officers conducted by him, Congressman Samuel Dickstein, chairman of the Immigration Committee of the House of Representatives declared yesterday in a statement issued to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Congressman Dickstein who has just returned from Europe where he investigated immigration conditions, stated that he will introduce legislation at the next session of the House of Representatives which will provide proper control for the Public Health Service to prevent it from acting arbitrarily.

Congressman Dickstein stated that the mental tests given by the public health service to prospective immigrants have in the past made it very difficult for an alien to pass them with the result that visas have been refused.

"Particularly in the case of mental tests for aliens, the examinations given are unusually severe and I dare say that a good many of our 'best citizens' would be unable to pass the strict tests," Congressman Dickstein said. These tests, he asserted, require a thorough revision.

The American consulate was exonerated from responsibility by the Congressman who lauded in particular the work of Consul General Huddle stationed in Warsaw. On the whole, he stated, the manner and method pursued by United States Consuls in various lands is satisfactory.

Congressman Dickstein stated that there seems to be no adequate organization in Europe to advise prospective Jewish immigrants as to possibilities in the United States.

"Conditions of the Jews in East Europe are frightful" and for this reason many Jews are seeking to migrate to this country, he said.

Discussing the situation of the Jews in Poland, Congressman Dickstein said: "One of the difficulties with which the Jews in Poland have to contend is the exorbitant taxation imposed by the government on occupations primarily Jewish. I had occasion, however, to speak to some of the most influential leaders of the Polish government and was assured that at the proper time the government will seek to alleviate cases of extreme hardship whenever possible."

Dr. David Wolin, head of the pediatrics staff of the Highland Hospital of Rochester, N. Y., has sailed for Europe for an extended trip during which he will make a study of child health and feeding clinics in England, Scotland, Germany and France.

Complains Yiddish Press Has Joined in Conspiracy of Silence to Defeat Anti-Religious Campaign

"Emess" Says Only Two Provincial
Sheets Have Followed Its Lead; Asks
Communists to Invoke Aid of Press

MOSCOW, Sept. 16—The Yiddish press has united "in a conspiracy of silence" to defeat the anti-religious campaign in connection with the Jewish high Holidays, the "Emess" complains.

Neither the "Shtern," Yiddish Communist daily of Charkov, nor the "Ociatrab" of Minsk, have mentioned the anti-religious campaign which it launched, asserts the "Emess."

Only two insignificant provincial sheets have followed its lead, the "Emess" says.

The "Emess" thereupon calls upon local Communist Unions to make representations to the Communist organs to combat religious observances.

The paper cites the growth of religious tendencies among the workers and even in the collectives. The Jews of Zaporozhie near Dnieprostroy, it asserts, invited a cantor from Moscow to come to the colony to conduct holiday services and are paying him two thousand roubles.

Henry Morgenthau is a vice-chairman of the Committee, while its members include Bernard M. Baruch, Laurence A. Steinhardt, Jessie I. Straus, Herbert Bayard Swope, Sidney Weinberg and Walter Weinstein, all of New York.

The Jewish Theological Seminary of America announces that two of its graduates, Rabbi Philip A. Langh and Rabbi Ben Zion Bokser, have accepted calls to congregations on the Pacific Coast. Rabbi Langh has been called to the newly organized conservative congregation in Seattle, Washington, and Rabbi Bokser to Vancouver, B. C. Rabbi Langh previously served Congregation Anshe Emet of Chicago, and Congregation Beth El of Chelsea, Mass.; Rabbi Bokser was formerly Rabbi of Congregation Kehilath Israel of the Bronx.

Ask Government to Bar Jews From Trading in Agricultural Products

**Government Press Joins Campaign
Against Middlemen, Because
of High Prices**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, Sept. 16—The government press yesterday joined the campaign against the middlemen in Poland in view of the appreciable difference between wholesale and retail prices of products.

While the government press makes no specific allusion to the Jews as middlemen, the anti-Semitic National Democratic organ, "Gazeta Warszawska" asserts that 90% of the middlemen are Jews who are not engaged in productive work.

The paper concedes that most of these Jews are also severely affected by the crisis, but draws the conclusion that a hungry herd is far more dangerous than a satisfied one.

It concludes with a demand that the Jews be prohibited from trading in agricultural produce.

**Tercentenary of the Birth of Baruch
Spinoza Marked by International
Philosophic Congress**

THE HAGUE.—The tercentenary of the birth in Amsterdam of the great Jewish philosopher, Baruch Spinoza, which occurs on November 24th, was marked here by the International Philosophic Congress.

The Congress, which was held under the auspices of the Societas Spinozana, was attended by representatives of the Queen, the Dutch Government and many distinguished scholars from practically every country in the world.

It was a remarkable coincidence that the meeting was held in the same hall, the so-called Rol-Hall, where in former days the verdict of the Court of Holland was pronounced, forbidding the publication of the famous "Tractatus Theologico-Politicus" of Spinoza.

A large painted portrait of Spinoza was put up beside the pulpit. Great interest was evoked by the presence of Sir Frederick Pollock, of London, representing the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, who, 55 years ago, attended the Spinoza Commemoration meeting held two hundred years after the great philosopher's death. Professor Oko of Cincinnati, member of the Board of the Spinoza Society, and Professor Erdman of Columbia University, New York, were also present, while Dr. J. Shatzky represented the Spinoza Institute of America.

The opening address was delivered by Professor Dr. Leo Polak, the well known Dutch philosopher, of the University of Groningen, and Chairman of the Dutch branch of the Spinoza Society and of the International Memorial Committee.

Professor Polak expressed his thanks for the great international interest shown by the large number of brilliant scholars present.

It must have been great for Spinoza, Professor Polak said, to live in his days, but it is greater to live three centuries later, when so many sciences have made progress to an extent never dreamed of before, enabled to advance in the light of complete spiritual freedom. Mankind owes this to master minds, and martyrs, of whom Spinoza was one of the very greatest, who have delivered the truth from compulsion and humanity from inquisition.

The speaker reminded his audience of the condemnation of Spinoza's work in the very hall in which they were now met. What a contrast, Professor Polak exclaimed, the Maledictus of former days and the Benedictus of our time — a dead dog and a living lion!

When the Rt. Hon. Sir Frederick Pollock appeared on the platform, bringing the greetings of the Vice-Chancellor

Official Communiqué Denies Nazi Allegation Jewish Banker Consulted on Economic Program

**See Nazi Attempt to Place Responsibility for Differences with
Government on Jews**

BERLIN, Sept. 16—The German government today issued a communiqué officially denying that Chancellor Franz von Papen had consulted Jacob Goldschmidt, prominent German Jewish banker, on the government's economic recovery program.

The government communiqué was issued in reply to a charge made last night by Paul Joseph Goebbels, head of the Nazi party in Berlin, at a Nazi mass meeting in the Sportpalast that Jacob Goldschmidt had been consulted by the Chancellor immediately after Hitler's interview with President Paul von Hindenburg where the former was refused the Chancellorship.

In an effort to arouse the workers against the Jews, Goebbels further asserted that Chancellor von Papen also

36 Peasants Arrested For Attacking Jews

WARSAW, Sept. 16—Thirty-six peasants of the village of Ostrowiec were arrested yesterday by the police on charges of having attacked a number of Jews last Friday and having poured petrol over 15 carts of fruit the Jews were transporting to Otowitz.

The Jews were severely beaten up by their attackers. The arrested peasants have been taken to Warsaw.

A search of the village by the police discovered propaganda material calling upon the peasants not to bring their products to the town markets.

For this reason it is believed that the attack may not have been inspired by anti-Semitic motives.

Revisionists Precipitate Fight at Zionist Meeting

VIENNA, Sept. 16—A Zionist meeting here last night addressed by Dr. Isaac Gruenbaum, Polish Zionist leader, aroused such strong resentment on the part of Revisionists present that police intervention was required several times in order to subdue the turmoil which ensued.

Dr. Gruenbaum attacked the Revisionists whereupon the Revisionists present sought to break up the meeting and a fight followed.

Uri Zvi Greenberg, Hebrew poet and Revisionist leader of Palestine, who was present was also mishandled when he rushed to the platform and demanded the right to reply to Dr. Gruenbaum.

Rabbi Alexander Burnstein of Harrisburg, Pa., has accepted the call to lead the Beth-El congregation of Long Beach during the coming year.

In Jewish circles, the allegation of Goebbels is seen as additional proof that the Nazis are attempting to give a Jewish coloring to the differences between themselves and Chancellor von Papen and to couple with their attacks upon the government incitement against the Jews.

Seek Injunction to Bar Jews from Government Posts

BERLIN, Sept. 16—An injunction to prevent the Commissioner for Prussia from employing Jews in government posts, was sought from the Prussian Diet today by the Nazi Deputy Freisler.

Deputy Freisler asserted that in the absence of an elected government in Prussia, the Commissioner is not authorized to carry out political acts. The Nazi deputy therefore urged the Diet to recognize that the employment of Jews is a political act and to prohibit the Commissioner from engaging Jews.

The matter developed in connection with the intention of the government to name a Jew, Rosenblum, as president of the Provincial court of Guben.

Freisler asserted that the population of Guben are insulted by the naming of a Jew.

1,500 Expected at Hadassah Convention Today

What American women Zionists have done toward the development of Palestine as a Jewish homeland and what plans to make for future work will be discussed at the Eighteenth Annual Convention of Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, which opens today at the Commodore Hotel and continues until Tuesday.

More than 1,500 delegates representing the 251 Hadassah chapters in all parts of the country are expected to attend.

Among the speakers at the convention will be Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, head of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism; Dr. Louis I. Newman, Rabbi of Temple Rodeph Shalom; Professor C. E. A. Winslow, of the Yale University Medical School; Dr. Haim Yassky, Director of the Hadassah Medical Organization in Palestine; Morris Rothenberg, President of the Zionist Organization of America; Israel B. Brodie, Chairman of the Economic Committee of the Zionist Organization, and Judge Julian W. Mack.

Jewish Population in Morocco Estimated at 150,000

PARIS, Sept. 16—The number of Jews in French Morocco up to the end of May, 1931, in accordance with figures published in the "Official Gazette," was 107,613. This includes, however, only the native-born Jews, not foreign citizens or European Jews, whose number is estimated to be between 5,000 and 6,000. In addition, the international zone in Tangier and Spanish Morocco, which are not included in these figures, have also a Jewish population of nearly 20,000.

The total number of Jews in Morocco is therefore estimated to be actually about 150,000. The most important Jewish centers in Morocco are Casablanca, with a Jewish population of 19,960, Fes with 11,307, Meknes with 7,745, Mogador with 5,648, and Rabat with 4,218. During the last years considerable progress has been made in Jewish education in Morocco, chiefly through the efforts of the Alliance Israélite Universelle, which provides schools in Casablanca alone for about 3,500 Jewish children.

Frank L. Weil New Head Of 92nd Street "Y"

The resignation of Supreme Court Justice Bernard L. Shientag as president of the Ninety-second Street Young Men's Hebrew Association, and the election of Frank L. Weil, as his successor, is announced by the Board of Directors of the Y.M.H.A. following a special meeting.

Mr. Weil has been connected for a number of years with the Y.M.H.A., which is one of the ninety-one institutions affiliated with the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, and at the time of his election to the presidency, was chairman of the Cultural Activities Committee of the Board. He has been a member of this board since 1926, and from 1929 to 1930 was chairman of the Equipment Committee for the construction of the new \$2,500,000 building, which was dedicated in October 1930. He was also chairman of the Membership Committee from 1926 until the beginning of this year, and is at present chairman of the Scout Committee.

Saul Drucker, Prominent Jewish Social Worker, Dead

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 16—Saul Drucker, nationally known Jewish social worker and superintendent of the Jewish Home for Babies and Children, died yesterday at the Passavant Hospital.

Drucker, who was fifty years old, swallowed poison in the dental office of the institution after his resignation had been demanded by Mrs. Barnett Davis, president of the home and the board of directors.

Mrs. Davis received a mysterious threat over the telephone which the police are now investigating. Mrs. Davis, it is alleged, had some difficulty with Mr. Drucker and demanded his resignation. The reasons have not been divulged.

A rabbi explained that the difficulty arose when the directors allegedly learned that Mr. Drucker owed several boys of the Home sums of money which he had borrowed from them.

Mr. Drucker came to his present post six months ago from Boston. He was recognized as an authority on social problems and in 1922 received a medal for his book, "The Education of Children."
