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Jewish Group Attached to Centre Party to Function in Connection With New Elections

**Group to Be Headed by Georg Kareski;
Central Union Organ Says Centre
One of Parties Jews May Vote For**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 23 — The Jewish group, attached to the Centre Party which was organized in connection with the last Reichstag elections, will continue to function relative to the new elections scheduled for November, it was learned here today.

The Jewish group will be headed by Georg Kareski, former head of the Berlin Jewish Community and other Jewish leaders.

It is estimated that the Jewish group was responsible for securing at least 30,000 Jewish votes in Berlin for the Centre Party in the last elections and a total of 501,000 throughout the country.

The negotiations between the Centre Party and the Nazis for a possible coalition, which caused disappointment in Jewish circles, were discussed today by Jewish and Centre leaders with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency representative.

The Centre spokesman stated that the negotiations were purely of a tactical nature and that they had not been expected to achieve practical results. He reiterated that the Centre Party made it clear to the Nazis that they would not tolerate any question regarding the withdrawal of the rights of the Jews.

The "C.-V. Zeitung," organ of the Central Union of the German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, advises the Jewish

Says Jew Designed New Hitler Uniform

BUDAPEST, Sept. 23 — A Hungarian Jew, Thiamer Varadi, is the designer of the new Hitler uniform worn by the Nazi storm troops, the "Pester Lloyd" asserts today.

Varadi was named to design the uniform at Hitler's personal request, though the latter was aware that Varadi is a Jew, the paper states.

So satisfactorily did the National Socialist chieftain find Varadi's designs that he paid the latter double the amount agreed upon, "Pester Lloyd" reports.

Insufficient Accommodation In Soviet Russia for High Holyday Worshippers

**Cemeteries Converted to Synagogue
Use as No Vacancies Available
for Rentals**

MOSCOW, Sept. 23 — So large attendance at High Holyday services is expected in Soviet Russia that there will not be sufficient facilities to accommodate the worshippers, it is feared.

While in previous years, it was possible to rent premises for temporary synagogues, such premises are not available this year.

In Moscow where there are four synagogues, only 3,000 worshippers can be accommodated.

Old and new Jewish cemeteries are being converted into synagogues, as are a number of private homes. Even these measures are not regarded as sufficient to meet the need.

Tale of Fabulous Fortune Left to Beadle Stirs Lodz

WARSAW, Sept. 23 — Lodz is agog today with the tale of a fabulous fortune allegedly bequeathed to the beadle of a small synagogue, in Lodz, Shlome Davidovitch, by a deceased nephew in Los Angeles.

According to the tale Davidovitch has received a letter from the American consulate informing him that the son of his brother who went to Los Angeles 18 years ago, died, leaving him a fortune of no less than seventy-five million dollars.

Bars Inciting Paris Paper in Morocco

PARIS, Sept. 23 — The Military Commandant of French Morocco has prohibited the admission to Morocco of the Moslem paper, "Moghreb," published here, it is learned here today.

The order of prohibition was issued because of the calumnious campaign against the Jews conducted by the paper which incites the Arab population to attacks upon the Jews.

Elaborate Precautions for Holiday Services Completed With Police Department

**Dr. Weiss, Wife and Mother, Threatened
by Nazi Throng as They Leave
Court Where Libel Suit Being Heard**

BERLIN, Sept. 23 — Plain clothes police will stand on guard at the synagogues during the High Holydays and uniformed police will be stationed in the vicinity of the temples in the event emergencies arise, according to arrangements completed today between the Jewish Community and the Police Department.

As another safety measure, the Jewish Community will appoint Commissioners to be stationed within the synagogues and temples and who will maintain contact with the police should the necessity for their intervention arise.

The elaborate precautions being arranged are undertaken to prevent any possible disturbances in view of the general incitement against the Jews and the recollection of last year's excesses during the Jewish New Year.

BERLIN, Sept. 23 — Dr. Bernhard Weiss, former vice-president of the Berlin police department, who was removed from office by Chancellor Franz von Papen together with other Prussian officials, his wife and mother were threatened today by a Nazi mob when they left the court-room where his libel suit against "Der Angriff" is being heard.

The attempted attack on the Weiss family was a continuation of court-room abuses by the Nazis throughout

Resignation of Samuel Viewed as Certainty

LONDON, Sept. 23 — The resignation of Sir Herbert Samuel from his post of Home Secretary in the national cabinet, is now believed to be a virtual certainty.

Lord Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, will resign his portfolio at the cabinet meeting next Wednesday in protest against the Ottawa trade agreements, and Lord Snowden's resignation portends the failure to reach any agreement at the cabinet meeting.

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Nazis Attempt to Break Up Gumbel Meeting

National Socialists attempted to break up a meeting held at the German Labor Temple on Thursday night during an address delivered by the prominent German Jewish professor, Dr. Emil Gumbel, who last month was ousted from the faculty of the University of Heidelberg, owing to Nazi pressure.

A small group of Nazis attended the lecture and made several attempts to shout down Professor Gumbel.

Professor Gumbel, who came to this country in connection with the Eugenics congress, is spending a short time here.

In the course of his address, he stated that the position of the Jews and the labor classes will not be enviable should the Nazis succeed in attaining power.

He accused the government of Chancellor Franz von Papen of tolerating every act of the Nazis and stated his belief that a working agreement between the Nazis and the junker government is not excluded, particularly in the light of recent developments.

Detroit House of Shelter Faces Disintegration

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 23.—The Detroit House of Shelter, a home for the wayfarer and transient, now faces its 35th birthday with the suspicion that its future in this city will probably be less glorious than its past.

The House of Shelter, the oldest Jewish philanthropic organization extant in Detroit today, is being disrupted by the recognition that it is now merely a matter of years before the society must relinquish its prestige of former years.

Chief among the factors of disintegration is the lack of community interest. Board members are in complete charge of the Home, and it is becoming increasingly difficult to recruit new board members.

Smyrna Jewish Community On Verge of Collapse

ISTAMBUL.—The Jewish Community in Smyrna is on the verge of collapse owing to the stringencies imposed by the Turkish government, the Turkish Jewish press indicate.

The papers point out that in the last seven years, Jewish institutions and Jewish life have been steadily retreating in Smyrna. The Jewish population of Smyrna shows a decrease of 25,000 during this period while eight large schools, seven Jewish newspapers and three Talmud Torahs have been closed.

Jewish Leaders on Relief Committee for Unemployed

NEWARK, Sept. 23.—Seven well known Jewish citizens are included among the forty-eight members appointed by Mayor Congleton yesterday to serve on the executive committee of a citizens' relief organization to coordinate unemployment relief through this community during the winter.

The Jewish members are Rabbi Solomon Foster, of Temple B'nai Jeshurun; Rabbi Julius Silberfeld, of Temple B'nai Abraham; Louis V. Aronson, Dr. M. C. Ellenstein, Mrs. J. F. Meyer, former head of the Newark Section, Council of Jewish Women; Mrs. Nathan Kussy, a voluntary referee in the Essex County Juvenile Court; and Dr. A. G. Robison, executive director of the Newark Y.M.-Y.W.H.A.

Anti-Semitic Editor Gets Prison and Fine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW.—A sentence of two weeks' imprisonment and a fine of 250 zlotys was imposed by the district court on the editor of the anti-Semitic daily, "Gazeta Warszawska," who was sued by the former Minister and present member of the Government Club, Boguslaw Miedzinski.

The trial arose in connection with the anti-Semitic excesses which were organized last November in the Universities of Warsaw and elsewhere by the anti-Semitic youth of the National Democratic Party.

The anti-Semitic activities of the students were condemned at the time in the Sejm by the Minister of the Interior, M. Pierozki, and also by Deputy Miedzinski. The "Gazeta Warszawska" thereupon attacked the Deputy, using insulting expressions against him. The Counsel for the editor of the "Gazeta Warszawska" tried to influence the court by the argument that anti-Semitic excesses occur not only in Polish Universities, but also in Universities abroad, and that the Government condemned the excesses merely because it needs the support of the Jewish members of the Sejm. The court, however, found the editor guilty and passed the sentence.

Zuckerman Honored at Dinner by Poale Zion

Baruch Zuckerman, Poale Zion leader, was honored on Saturday night with a dinner on the occasion of his sailing for Palestine to take up his duties with the Palestine Foundation Fund whose headquarters are in Jerusalem.

The dinner, held at Beethoven Hall, was arranged by the Poale Zion organization.

Mr. Zuckerman will sail for Palestine on September 30th with his family.

Speakers at the dinner included H. Ehrenreich, who was toastmaster; Dr. Yehuda Kauffman of Palestine, Haim Greenberg, I. Mereminski and Golda Myerson of the Palestine Labor Federation; Meyer Brown, General Secretary of the Poale Zion Organization; I. Hamlin, secretary of the Gewerkschaften campaign; L. Segal, general secretary of the Jewish National Workers Alliance; Louis Lipsky, Chairman of the American Palestine campaign and Bernard Deutsch, President of the American Jewish Congress.

Jewish Centers to Observe Spinoza Anniversary

The 300th anniversary of the birth of Baruch Spinoza, occurring on Thursday, November 24th, will be observed by Jewish Centers, Y.M.H.A.'s, and Y.W.H.A.'s in the United States and Canada. They will conduct exercises in commemoration of the event during November.

The Jewish Welfare Board, the national organization with which the Jewish Centers are affiliated, will issue program material, and striking quotations from his writings.

Refute Dr. Badt Flights At Government Expense

BERLIN.—An allegation that Dr. Hermann Badt, the Jewish representative in the Prussian Diet, who has been given leave of absence for an indefinite period when the von Papen Government was formed, was attacked in the Prussian Diet by the National Socialists, who alleged that Dr. Badt's recent airship flights to America, Egypt and Palestine were made at the expense of the Government, although the actual nature of these flights were not connected with any official duties but were undertaken for purely private reasons.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns in this connection that this accusation against Dr. Hermann Badt is entirely without foundation. Dr. Badt, who has rendered great services for the promotion of German aviation, participated in the flights of the "Graf Zeppelin" at the personal invitation of Dr. Eckener.

Funeral services were held in Elizabeth, N. J. for Herman Kaufman. He was affiliated with Temple B'nai Israel. After the World War, he purchased several hundred thousand dollars worth of waste metal from the government.

Montreal Mayor Adds Condemnation to Indictment Of Goglu Publications

Says Premier Taschereau's Indictment
Is Possibly Forerunner to
Legal Action

MONTREAL, Sept. 23.—Mayor Fernand Rinfret of Montreal, former Minister of State in the Liberal government, last night added his voice to the condemnation of the anti-Semitic campaign of the Goglu publications uttered by political leaders.

Addressing a meeting of the local B'nai Brith, Mayor Rinfret expressed satisfaction that the anti-Semitic agitation had been exposed and indicted by Justice Desaulniers. He stated his regret moreover that no judicial action against these papers is possible.

Mayor Rinfret indicated that Premier Taschereau's recent condemnation of the Goglu publications is possibly the forerunner to legislative action to create the necessary legal machinery to halt such agitation.

He feels it necessary, he said, to ask the forgiveness of the Jewish community for the small French Canadian minority who may be influenced by the Goglu publications.

Double Funeral Services For Samuel Kahan and Mother

Double funeral services were conducted on Friday for Samuel Kahan, prominent in Brooklyn Jewish charitable and communal circles, and his mother Mrs. Feiga Stuchinsky who died within twenty minutes of each other.

Mr. Kahan who was fifty-seven years old, died of a cerebral hemorrhage. His mother, grief stricken, passed away twenty minutes later. She was eighty-seven years old. Both were buried in New Mount Carmel Cemetery.

Mr. Kahan was chairman of the board of trustees of Temple Ahavath Shalom. He made generous gifts to the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities. A widow and five children survive.

May Name Street in Detroit After Spinoza

DETROIT, Sept. 23.—The Spinoza Tricentennial Committee, of which Dr. Noah E. Aronstam is chairman, is sponsoring a movement to name a street in Detroit after Baruch Spinoza, the famous philosopher, the three hundredth anniversary of whose birth occurs this year.

A public hearing will be held before the Detroit Common Council in the near future to decide on the street to be named. This is in line with the world-wide celebration which is taking place this year in the leading cities of Europe and America.

Exhibition of Jewish Arts and Crafts
Opened in Berlin; Seek to Counteract
Boycott Propaganda

BERLIN—Under the slogan—"For the creation of work and against boycott," an exhibition of the work of Jewish artisans was opened here under the patronage of the Jewish community of Berlin.

Particularly impressive at the exhibition are the Jewish achievements in decoration work, the furnishing trade, and wrought iron work. Considerable attention has been attracted by the work in gold and silver executed by a Jewish woman artisan.

The exhibition occupies 35 rooms and numbers 120 stalls.

At a press reception, the President of the Union of Jewish Artisans, Herr Louis Wolff, referred to the history of Jewish artisanship in Germany, and pointed out that before the Jewish emancipation in Germany the Jews were forbidden to engage in any craft. The first Jewish Artisans' Guild was established in 1813, and the present Artisans' Union looks back on a history of 35 years.

The aim of this Union was to abolish the prejudice which existed among the Jews against artisanship and to convince the outside world that Jews are willing to engage in manual labor. The aim of the present exhibition is to help the Jewish artisan to overcome the boycott agitation conducted against him in Germany.

In various parts of Berlin and also in the provinces leaflets are being distributed with the slogan—"No orders for Jewish artisans." Even the Artisan Guilds fight against the Jewish artisans.

In the invitation issued by the Artisans' Union it is stressed that no claim is put forward to counteract the anti-Semitic slogan "Don't buy from Jews" with such slogans as "buy from Jews only." We do, however, ask our coreligionists to consider favorably the work of the Jewish artisans in their hour of need, the invitation urges.

The "C. V. Zeitung," the organ of the Central Union of German Citizens of Jewish Faith, in a special issue devoted to the exhibition welcomes the enterprising spirit of the Jewish artisan and points out the part played by him in the life of the Jewish Communities in Germany. It calls upon the Jewish population to extend its support to hard-hit Jewish trade.

Rabbi Leo Shubow has been named Rabbi of Temple Israel, Amsterdam, N. Y. Rabbi Shubow received his degrees of Master of Hebrew Literature and Rabbi at the Jewish Institute of Religion last June. He is a graduate of the Boston Latin school and studied at Harvard College, Columbia University and New York University.

Newark Theatre Owner Refuses to Book Passion Play in His Houses

Play Now in Philadelphia Where Jewish
Protests Failed to Halt
the Production

NEWARK, Sept. 23.—Newark Jewry has been spared possible inflation of anti-Semitic feeling that follows in the wake of the production of the drama, the Freiberg Passion Play, it became known yesterday, because M. S. Schlesinger, who controls the Broad and Shubert Theatres in this city, refused to book this play.

Mr. Schlesinger was repeatedly called upon by the producers of the Passion Play to book this drama. Mr. Schlesinger has flatly refused to consider the presentation of the play.

"I know that the Passion Play foments anti-Semitic hatred," he declared, "and I simply would not be a party to such insidious propaganda against our Jewish people. The Jews have suffered more than their share, and such dramas as the Freiberg Passion Play will never bring about an abatement of the anti-Semitic evil."

The Passion Play is now being run in Philadelphia, where it has been showing for several weeks. A storm of Jewish protest in Philadelphia has failed to bring about the abandonment of the play, which is being shown at the Academy of Music there.

Jewish Congress Meeting Today at Astor Hotel

A joint meeting of the Administrative and Executive Committees of the American Jewish Congress will be held this afternoon at the Hotel Astor.

The meeting has been called in order to hear the reports of a number of delegates to the Geneva conference, and the speakers will include Dr. Stephen S. Wise; Bernard S. Deutsch, A. H. Cohen, Rabbi Joshua Goldberg; Rabbi B. Leon Hurwitz; Sidney Matz; Manuel S. Sachs; Solomon Schelsky; Dr. Joseph Tenenbaum; Z. Tygel; Morris Weinberg, Mrs. Stephen S. Wise and Baruch Zuckerman; Nathan D. Perlman, chairman of the Administrative Committee, will preside.

Scout Foundation Bought With Schiff Gift

A \$250,000 gift to the Boy Scouts of America by Mrs. Jacob Schiff in memory of her late son, Mortimer Schiff, president of the organization, has enabled the Scout body to acquire 480 acres of land near Morristown, N. J. to be developed as a permanent reservation for the 2,000,000 Scouts throughout the world.

Of the \$250,000, only \$150,000 will be spent for the purchase of the land and buildings and the remainder for the maintenance of the site, Mrs. Schiff stipulated in her gift.

LETTER TO EDITOR

Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin,

Dear Sir:

May I be permitted to call the attention of your readers to a very serious situation which has arisen in connection with the relief work for the Jewish unemployed and homeless carried on by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society (HIAS).

During the past eight months, that is from January 1st to August 31st of this year, the Society provided 312,276 meals and 29,612 nights' lodging to the Jewish unemployed and homeless. The extent of this relief and what it has meant to the Jewish sufferers from the depression may best be understood when I state that in these eight months Hias has provided 10,785 more meals than during the entire preceding three years of 1929, 1930 and 1931, the figures for which respectively were 65,508, 79,582 and 156,301 or a grand total of 302,191 meals. As to the nights' shelter provided the total for these three years was 44,291 so that in the period from January 1st to August 31st of this year, the 29,612 nights' shelter furnished are more than half of the total for 1929, 1930 and 1931.

With the Jewish Holy Days approaching this relief work will undoubtedly have to be extended. Hias has undertaken this work realizing that the hungry and the homeless have to be taken care of. However, there is every danger of this activity coming to an end unless adequate financial support is forthcoming. The Society has no endowment fund and is entirely dependent upon voluntary contributions.

May I, through you, appeal to your readers to make possible for Hias to go on with its relief work among the hungry and the homeless who look to it for food and shelter in these critical times.

10,000 Trees to Be Planted In Palestine as Memorial To Sir John Monash

Australian Jewry Planning Memorial;
Minister of Defense and Governor of
New South Wales Support Project

MELBOURNE—A public meeting was held in Sydney for the purpose of inaugurating the campaign on behalf of the Monash Memorial Forest which the Jews of Australia propose planting in Palestine, in conjunction with the Jewish National Fund, in memory of Sir John Monash, commander of the Australian forces during the world war.

The Governor of New South Wales has given his patronage to the appeal, and the Minister of Defense, Sir George Pearce, sent a message in which he paid splendid tribute to the late Sir John Monash and heartily commended the idea of perpetuating his name in Palestine.

Rabbi Israel Brodie of Melbourne, President of the Australian Zionist Federation, delivered the principal address. The state government was represented by the Deputy Premier, Colonel Bruzner, who had been an officer in the British Occupation troops in Palestine, and who expressed his high appreciation of the work accomplished by the Jews in that country.

It is intended that the Monash Forest should comprise 10,000 trees of which the Jews of New South Wales have undertaken to contribute 3,000. In order that the memorial may have a specifically Australian character, it is to consist of Australian gum trees.

Mizrachi Youth to Honor Rabbi Isaiah Shapiro

A reception will be tendered on Monday evening to Rabbi Isaiah Shapiro, founder of the Hapoel Hamizrachi organization of Palestine here on a two months visit, by the Mizrahi Youth of America.

Rabbi Shapiro is the editor of the "Hahed," a literary monthly; a member of the Palestine Jewish National Council and chairman of the Board of Directors of the Co-operative bank, "Zerubabel."

Kansas City to Launch Palestine Campaign

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 23—The Jewish community of Kansas City will launch a drive for the American Palestine Campaign beginning Rosh Hashanah and continuing until after Yom Kippur, it was decided at a meeting of the Executive Committee.

Roumanian Noble Scores Anti-Semitism in Book

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, Sept. 23—Pleased surprise has been occasioned here by a vigorous protest against anti-Semitism uttered by Georg Greciano, a descendant of Roumanian royalty and a son of a former Roumanian Minister to The Hague and Soviet Russia.

Greciano voices his protest against anti-Jewish hatred and his defense of the Jews in a book, written in Roumanian, which has just appeared here in a French translation.

The book is entitled "Judea." Mr. Greciano gives his impressions of Jewish life under the Czar and condemns the tolerance shown by Russian authorities toward pogroms. He deplores that in higher society anti-Semitism is part of the confession of faith of every "well-bred" person.

In a series of chapters he vividly describes the anti-Jewish excesses which he himself witnessed in Poland, Roumania and Galicia. He concludes his book with emphasis on "the danger of tolerating certain kinds of perfidious and criminal propaganda."

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
