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Many Jews May Refrain From Voting in Reichstag Elections, Because No Choice of Parties

**Central Union Says No Vote Means
Vote for Hitler; But Does Not Indi-
cate Parties for Whom Jews Can Vote**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Oct. 24—The belief that many Jews will refrain from voting in the forthcoming elections to the Reichstag, because they do not know for which party to vote, is expressed here.

The Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith has issued a slogan: "Any one who does not vote, votes for Hitler." But this has only served to complicate the situation inasmuch as the organization does not advise the Jews for which parties to vote, indicating only which parties are anti-Semitic.

The Jewish voter who does not adhere to Socialist views and does not wish to vote for the Social-Democrats, faces a dilemma.

The State Party, in addition to the fact that it no longer carries any weight, has now excluded Jewish candidates from its election list.

Grave doubts exist with regard to the attitude of the Centre Party toward the Jews in view of recent occurrences. Little is now heard of Georg Kareski, and his Jewish group which attached themselves to the Centre Party.

The Nationalist Party, moreover, has definite anti-Jewish clauses in its constitution and of course offers little attraction for the Jewish voter.

Under the circumstances the Jewish voter may abstain from voting altogether.

4 Jews Hurt in Train Wreck; Suspect Plot

JERUSALEM, Oct. 24—Four Jews were slightly injured yesterday in a wreck of a train proceeding from Beisan to Haifa.

Heavy damages were caused and rail communication was discontinued until the road had been cleared.

It is believed that the derailment was the result of a plot against Rutenberg's workers, the train being known as a Rutenberg special, because most of the passengers are usually workers employed by the Rutenberg electrification works.

Nazis Pledge Peace at Vienna University; Foreign Students Leave Owing to Excesses

**Promise Also Not to Attempt to Bar
the Enrollment of Jewish
Students**

VIENNA, Oct. 24—All colleges at the University of Vienna resumed classes today.

The Nazi students have given their pledge to the rector to maintain peace and order. They have also promised not to cause any financial loss to the University by seeking to prevent the enrollment of Jewish students.

The University is beginning to experience financial reverses as a result of the riots inasmuch as a number of foreign students have left Vienna.

Youngest Volunteer Of War of 1870 Dies

PARIS, Oct. 24—Colonel Henry Ren, youngest volunteer in the war of 1870, died here today at the age of seventy-seven.

Colonel Ren was one of the first to arrive at the headquarters of Garibaldi for enlistment, giving his age as eighteen, when actually he was only fifteen.

Ren was a captain in the army during the stormy Dreyfus period and experienced a most anxious time.

2,000 in Torchlight Procession After Olympiad

TEL AVIV, Oct. 24—Two thousand Jewish youths participated in a torch light procession last night through the central streets of the city in celebration of the closing of the three day Palestine Labor Olympiad.

The police, who feared that clashes with Arabs might result, refused to permit the procession to start from the Hapoel Sport field, which is near Jaffa, but interposed no objections to having it start from the Tel Aviv gate.

As special precaution, however, police reserves came by truck from Tel Aviv. Everything passed peaceably.

The evening previous Tel Aviv witnessed the largest meeting in its history of its kind, when 12,000 persons assembled at a mass meeting to celebrate the Olympiad. Addresses were delivered by Ben Gurion, Berl Locker, Josef Sprinzak, Baruch Zuckerman and other labor leaders.

Confirm Czech Envoy Advised Certain Washington Authorities Unfriendly to N. Y. Attorneys

**Advises Czechoslovakian Bodies There-
fore to Employ Washington
Attorneys**

PRAGUE, Oct. 24—Central government authorities confirmed to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today that the Czechoslovakian Ambassador in Washington, Dr. F. Veverka, in a memorandum submitted to the Czechoslovakian Chamber of Commerce and other organizations, had pointed out that in matters of tariffs and patents, lawyers from Washington, not New York, should be employed, inasmuch as New York lawyers are Jews for the most part, toward whom certain American authorities are unfriendly.

The Ambassador further points out that it is best to approach Washington lawyers because the departments of tariffs and patents are located in Washington.

This memorandum, which was sent confidentially, was circulated by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs to the interested parties and leaked out through the press.

The authorities confirmed to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency the authenticity of the report, regretting, however, that its publication should have been brought about through an indiscretion.

The statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency pointed out that the Washington Legation intended only to bring to the notice of interested firms the true situation, and that anti-Jewish motives cannot be attributed to the Legation.

Zik Appeals for Immediate Aid for Bira Bidjan

MINSK, Oct. 24—An urgent appeal for assistance to be rendered to settlers in Bira Bidjan, was issued yesterday by the White Russian Zik.

The Zik asks that physicians, medicine and winter clothes be dispatched to Bira Bidjan at once. It also asks that fifty builders be sent at once to build shelters for those who are now without a roof over their heads.

Not forgetting the cultural aspects, the Zik also requests that teachers and films be sent to help uplift the settlers.

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Cardozo Law Library**To St. John's College**

Justice Benjamin N. Cardozo of the United States Supreme Court has given his personal library, consisting of almost 1,000 volumes to the law library of St. John's College.

The gift was made through a former private secretary to Justice Cardozo, who is now an associate professor in the law school, Joseph M. Paley.

A special alcove in the college library, to be named the Cordozo Alcove will house the books, it was announced by Dean George W. Matheson, which will be available for reference and research.

Justice Cardozo received the first Doctor of Laws degree given by St. John's in 1928, at the first commencement exercises of the institution which he addressed.

The St. John's library is also to have the robe which Justice Cardozo used when presiding as Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals of New York State. The robe was given to the Cardozo Law Society of the college which in turn presented it to the library.

Many of the volumes were in the library of his father, the late Justice Albert Cardozo of the Court of Common Pleas. The date of publication of some of the volumes goes back to as far as 1730.

Dr. Calisch at Washington**Bi-Centennial Services**

FREDERICKSBURG, Oct. 24.—Dr. Edward N. Calisch of Richmond, Va., was selected, as the Jewish representative, to conduct a service and to deliver an address in a national celebration, by the Washington Bi-centennial Committee, of the establishment of religious liberty and freedom of church and state yesterday.

Dr. Calisch used the service leaflets furnished by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations in connection with the services he conducted.

**Campaign May Cause
Delay in Publication of
Polish Trading Modifications**

**Anti-Semitic National Democrats Or-
ganize Strong Campaign Against
Proposed Modification**

WARSAW, Oct. 24.—The anti-Semitic National Democratic party has organized a strong campaign of opposition to the government with regard to its intention of making slight modifications in the Sunday compulsory closing law.

The Party has organized mass meetings and its press organs against the proposed modification. As a result it is now rumored that the planned publication of the decree will be postponed by the government.

The campaign has been organized despite the fact, as the Jewish press points out, that ninety percent of Jewish trading will be unimproved by the concessions proposed.

The new decree, it is stated, would permit trading for several hours on Sunday morning by food stores, florists, tobacconists and traders in perishable products.

Protest Anti-Semitic**Attack on Papers**

BERLIN, Oct. 24.—High indignation has been aroused by the anti-Semitic attack against the "Berliner Tageblatt" and the "Welt Buehne" broadcast from the Berlin radio station on Saturday night.

Thousands telephoned protests to the director of the station, Duske. Duske stated that he had not seen the manuscript used and that the assistant director Mariaux is responsible.

It is expected that Mariaux will be dismissed because of this occurrence.

The anti-Semitic address was delivered by Karl Martin Koehn, editor-in-chief of a humorous Nazi paper, Brennessel. The Nazi had been engaged to substitute for the dismissed Jewish announcer, Alfred Kerrs.

Services Held For**Dr. Abraham P. Zemansky**

Funeral services were held yesterday at the Free Synagogue for Dr. Abraham P. Zemansky, prominent Jewish physician of this city.

Dr. Zemansky succumbed at the age of eighty-one to pneumonia after having suffered fractured ribs and concussion of the brain after being struck by a falling business sign near his home.

In 1894, he was named the first attending physician of the Lebanon Hospital in the Bronx, holding that post until 1911 when he became consulting physician. For many years he was president and later secretary of the hospital's medical board. For eleven years he served as instructor of physical diagnosis at the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

A number of leading educators and representatives of central Jewish organizations, who constitute the Advisory Board, are expected to attend.

The publication of "Jewish Current Events" by the Jewish Daily Bulletin continues to elicit widespread commendation.

Judge Horace Stern of Philadelphia, communal leader and chairman of the Executive Committee of the American Jewish Committee, declared:

"I think it extremely important that students in the religious schools should be properly informed of what is going on in the world and that their interest in the history, ideals and aspirations of the Jewish people will be stimulated and enhanced if they are kept aware of current problems and are thus made to realize the continuity of Jewish history and Jewish life."

Rabbi Morris Newfield, of Birmingham, Alabama, president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, stated:

"The magazine, thus far, has had, as I understand it, but a limited circulation. I believe that the change of auspices will make it a weekly paper to be used throughout the Jewish Religious Schools of America. Under the new direction, our young people will be furnished all news of genuine interest concerning Jewish people in every part of the world. Doubtless the educational value of this paper should be increased tremendously."

A square deal for the Jews and generally broad hearted views and deeds for the foreign born in the event of his election as Mayor were promised by Surrogate John P. O'Brien, Democratic candidate for mayor at a dinner held on Sunday evening, marking the 70th anniversary of the founding of the Brotherhood of Israel, Inc.

"I was born," Surrogate O'Brien said, "in a State where religious intolerance prevailed and where the young Jew and Irish boy didn't have an equal chance. By reason of my birth, by my collegiate training and by my work in helping to enact the tenement house law nine years ago I have come to understand and sympathize with the foreign-born."

Impressive Services Held For Professor Schatz in Tel Aviv and Jerusalem

Interment on Mount of Olives; Hundreds Attend Services; Eulogized by Leaders and Press

JERUSALEM, Oct. 24—Impressive funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at the Bezalel Building for Professor Boris Schatz, whose remains arrived from the United States, where he died last March, aboard the Excalibur.

The Bezalel building, home of the Bezalel School of Arts and Crafts, which the late Professor Schatz founded and to which he devoted his life, was draped in black.

Hundreds attended the services and heard the eulogies delivered by Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff in behalf of the Zionist Executive; M. M. Ussishkin, president of the Jewish National Fund, and Ben Zvi, representing the Palestine Jewish National Council.

After the services, the funeral cortege proceeded to the Mount of Olives where the remains were buried.

The services in Jerusalem were the second to be held that day. The body arrived yesterday morning in Jaffa whence it was taken to Tel Aviv. There a service was held in the Great Synagogue. Eulogies were delivered by Mayor Dizengoff and Dr. Klausner. The municipality of Tel Aviv had previously issued a call for a last tribute to be paid to Professor Schatz.

The body was escorted to Jerusalem, under special guard. The press devoted considerable space yesterday to a review of Professor Schatz's life and work.

Chief Rabbi Felicitates Gomboes on Jewish Stand

BUDAPEST, Oct. 24—Chief Rabbi Hevesty has wired Premier Julius Gomboes thanking him for his recent declaration in Parliament regarding his attitude toward the Jews.

On October 11, Premier Gomboes, formerly leader of an anti-Semitic party, disavowed anti-Semitism, declaring that he considers as a Hungarian brother every Jew who shares in the common fate of Hungary.

To Bring to Trial Author Of Boxheim Document

BERLIN, Oct. 24—The government has decided to bring to trial, Best, author of the notorious Boxheim document.

The action of the authorities was a surprise even to Jewish circles.

The document involved suggested state control of food provisions and the exclusion of Jews from the distribution of food supplies.

Lemberg Chassid on Tenth Day of Fast as Ultimatum To God to Send Messiah

Efforts to Dissuade Him Fail; Physicians Say He Will Succumb

LEMBERG, Oct. 24—Pinchas Bloch, a pious chassid of Lemberg, has entered upon the tenth day of his fast as an ultimatum to God to send a Messiah, else the Jewish people will vanish from the face of the earth.

Bloch is convinced that the day of redemption is approaching and is joyfully continuing his fast.

His act has attracted wide attention from the Jewish press and public alike and already a legend has arisen regarding his holiness and mysterious powers.

Relatives and rabbis of the chassid, who is fifty-four years old, have sought in vain to prevail upon him to give up his fast. Bloch insists, however, that even his death is a worthy sacrifice if it will aid in the solution of the Jewish question.

Physicians and psychiatrists who have been called in have likewise been unable to dissuade Bloch. The latter declare that while Bloch is normal, he is suffering from a mania. They express the belief that he will succumb to the effects of his fast.

Salonica to Name Street After First Jewish Editor

SALONICA, Oct. 24—A street in Salonica is to be named Saadi Halevi Street in memory of the first editor of a Jewish-Spanish publication in Greece, it was announced yesterday by Mayor Vancavas of Salonica.

Simultaneously, the Mayor, who had visited many Jewish synagogues and other institutions during the holiday season, promised to increase municipal subsidies for Jewish undertakings.

Form League for Labor Palestine Here

Over seven hundred men and women, sympathizers of the Palestine Jewish labor movement attended a meeting on Sunday evening at the Hotel Pennsylvania which launched the founding of the League for Labor Palestine.

Twenty-nine persons were elected as members of an Executive Committee. The organization established in New York is to be the first of similar branches projected throughout the country.

The League is to be affiliated with the World League for Labor Palestine and is to work for the Federation of Palestine Labor and its institutions.

Addresses were delivered by Abraham Shiplocoff, Dr. Jehuda Kaufman, David Pinski, Mrs. Irma Lindheim, Goldie Meyerson and Isaac Hamlin.

Hoover Commits Self to Continuation of Present Restriction of Immigration

Would Have Limited Immigration Even After the Depression Is Ended

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

COLUMBUS, Oct. 24—Continuation of the present policy of immigration restriction until the end of the depression and a policy of wise and selective immigration of a limited order thereafter was advocated by President Hoover in an address delivered here Saturday enroute to Detroit.

The present immigration policy "has been to protect the American workman in his standard of living and in the increasing comfort of his home," the President declared.

"If we are to maintain within our borders our own industries, if we are to maintain our standard of living higher than the rest of the world, the handmaiden to that policy must be that there should not be a flow of immigration, fleeing from the lower standards of living abroad, flooding our country and offering to work for less wages than the American workman, at the gate of every factory in the United States. It is just as important to protect the American workman from the movement of the people into the United States to take over his job as to protect him from a flow of goods from abroad which would take away his job."

"The United States has received invaluable contributions in its building, in the growth of its culture from the migration of various races of Europe. It has held its doors open to those who have fled from persecution, both religious and political. With the growth of democracy in foreign countries, po-

litical persecution has largely ceased. There is no longer a necessity for the United States to provide an asylum for those persecuted because of conscience.

"It is important that we should restrict immigration in order that those who are already resident in our country may not be driven into unemployment. We should be wise and humane in our restrictions. It must not spare families. It must not prevent the coming into our country of the relatives of residents already here. It must in ordinary times allow a flow of selective streams of peoples to refresh our population with the ideas and contributions of foreign countries to our civilization.

"It must recruit from them our share of their advancing skill and their advancing knowledge. It should be based upon our determination of who shall come. But in times of great crisis like the present, where we have millions of unemployed, it is an injustice and inhumanity to our own residents that we should allow the entry of people fleeing from starvation abroad. The obligation remains upon those countries to take care of their own people.

"Therefore, by executive order two years ago I stopped the entry of all immigrants to the United States except the relatives of residents who are still here and a few other minor exceptions. Two years have now passed since that order was issued. If we had had the same immigration during these last two years that we had in the two years previous we should have nearly a half million more unemployed in our country than we have today. This would have added 500,000 new immigrants to be cared for by our public bodies and by our charitable associations. Or, alternatively, it would have taken 500,000 jobs from our residents and thrust them upon public charity.

"I propose to continue this policy until the end of this depression, and after the end of the depression, we propose to continue the policy of wise and selective immigration of a limited order," President Hoover concluded.
