Minister Annuls Police Order Calling on Inn Keepers to State Nationality Outside Their Doors

Order Would Have Affected Jews,
Who Own Ninety Percent of
Inns and Restaurants

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

CZERNOWITZ, Oct. 25—The police department today ordered all owners of inns and restaurants to display outside their establishments licenses bearing the names of proprietors and their nationalities.

The measure is seen as an attempt to introduce anti-Semitic discrimination inasmuch as ninety percent of the inns and restaurants are owned by Jews.

The Jewish innkeepers made representations to the Minister of Interior who had the police order annulled.

Highest Court Confirms Verdict Against 7 Nazis

LEIPZIG, Oct. 25—The Leipzig court, the highest judicial authority in Germany yesterday upheld the verdict of the Kassel court sentence of seven Nazi students to four months imprisonment each for attacking the summer camp of the Brith Haolim in August of 1931.

A number of young Jewish scouts were injured by the Nazis before the elder scouts came to their rescue.

Fourteen Latvian Jews Desert Bira Bidjan

MOSCOW, Oct. 25—Fourteen of 29 Latvian Jews who emigrated from Latvia for settlement in Bira Bidjan, left Bira Bidjan and will return to their native lands.

A number who are experiencing difficulties with the Bidjan authorities, regarding the return of their Latvian passports, have appealed to the Latvian consul in Moscow for assistance.

Authorities Close Vilna's Only Yiddish Theatre

VILNA, Oct. 25—The municipal authorities yesterday ordered the closing of Vilna's only Yiddish theatre.

The reason given for the act is that the theatre requires renovation.

Separate Immigration Certificates May Be Issued to Agudath Israel

Jewish Agency Decides Allocation of
Certificates; 500 Only for Middle
Class Possessing £150

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, Oct. 25—The possibility that the Agudath Israel may receive separate immigration certificates to be allotted to members of its organization abroad was seen in the communication which the organization received today from the government.

The government has requested the Agudath Israel, extreme orthodox group, to furnish a list of young orthodox Jews abroad who wish to settle in Palestine and who in the opinion of the Agudath Israel are suitable.

The Agudath Israel delegation was received last month by the High Commissioner to whom it presented its demands for a separate immigration list.

Simultaneously the final allocation of the 4500 immigration certificates it has received was made known by the Jewish Agency Executive.

Of the total 2,400 certificates are to be assigned to chalutzim; 1,200 to re-

New Excesses at Vienna University Despite Nazi Guarantees of Peace

Jewish Physician Seriously Injured;
Jewish Student Delegation Com-
plains to Authorities

VIENNA, Oct. 25—Despite Nazi guarantees that peace and order would be maintained, new excesses against Jewish students took place at Vienna University this afternoon.

A Jewish physician, Dr. Moses Shendl, was seriously injured and had to be taken to a hospital after the police administered first aid.

Several Nazis were arrested. A Jewish student delegation, including Doctors Kormehl and Alexander Teich were received by the University authorities this afternoon to whom they submitted their complaints against the terrorization which has been going on at the University in the last fortnight.

Campaign to Boycott Non- Christian Stores in Athens Launched; Jews Protest

Communal Council Calls Special Meet-
ing to Take Up Matter; Jews
Small Minority in Athens

ATHENS, Oct. 25—A campaign for boycotting non-Christian stores has been launched by an anti-Semitic group which attempts to disguise its true purpose by adopting the name of "Anti-Communist League."

Appeals have been issued by this League urging Athenians to purchase from Christian shops only.

A special meeting was summoned last night by the Jewish Communal Council to deal with this matter. Protests were uttered against the attempt to introduce anti-Semitism in the Grecian capital where the Jews constitute such a small minority.

The Jewish population in Athens numbers only 4,000 of a total populace of 800,000.

Reichsgericht Upholds Ouster Of Prussian Government

BERLIN, Oct. 25—The Reichsgericht at Leipzig, Germany's highest court, today upheld the constitutionality of President Paul von Hindenburg's decree ousting the Prussian government on July 20th and naming Chancellor von Papen Federal Commissioner for Prussia.

The Federal government was upheld at every point by the court which refused to consider sections of the complaint which counsel for the government did not even attempt seriously to refute.

Ask Confiscation of Property Of Austrian Rothschilds

VIENNA, Oct. 25—A motion was introduced by the Socialists in Parliament today calling for the confiscation of the property of the Rothschild family in Austria and the arrest of Baron Louis Rothschild.

The motion is intended, it is believed, to impress the anti-Semitic government parties that the Socialist party is not serving "the Jewish capitalists" and also to impress the government with the need for taking action against the transactions of the House of Rothschild.

The Rothschild house has long been the target of anti-Semitic attack.

Oscar Wasserman Greet "Jewish Current Events"

The combination of the international, national and religious spirit of the Jew will cause Jewry to accomplish its mission in the world. This is the viewpoint of Oscar Wasserman of Germany, director of the Deutsche Bank. The distinguished Jewish leader, who is chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, states this belief in a message to the first issue of "Jewish Current Events," published by the Jewish Daily Bulletin, which will appear on Oct. 28.

Herr Wassermann is one of a group of distinguished Jewish personalities who greet the publication under its new aegis.

"It is a pleasure to be able to say a word for the first number," Herr Wassermann writes. "Your remark that the three tendencies, that of the international Jew, that of the national Jew and that of the religious Jew are decisive in Jewish life gives me my cue. If each of these three tendencies goes its own way, there are bound to be division and weakness, which severely sap the strength of Jewry against the outside enemies that we have always had and whose number are today on the increase. But Jewry will remain unconquerable and accomplish its mission in the world, if the three tendencies manifest mutual understanding and strive to reach the great goals pointed out to them in the first three parts of the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Shmonahesrah. These first three parts say that the three tendencies have equal rights, but likewise have the duty of acting in concert."

"Even though the fundamental ideas and the aims remain unchanged, the terms internationalism, nationalism and religion vary with the times, and every generation must place its own interpretation upon them. That is the task

Mosley Says Fascists Will Oppose Jews Who Aid Communists, Are Anti-British

Fight Precipitated at Rally When Mosley Refers to Communist Revolution Leaders as Coming from Jerusalem

LONDON, Oct. 25—Sir Oswald Mosley, founder of Britain's new Fascist party, precipitated a fight at a mass meeting which he addressed last night when in referring to the Russian revolution, he spoke of its "three warriors of class war all from Jerusalem."

When a member of the audience protested against this anti-Semitic remark, Mosley ordered him thrown out of the auditorium. This was the signal for disturbances in which Communist sympathizers took part.

Later when Mosley was questioned with regard to the hostility of the Fascists toward the Jews, he replied that the Fascist hostility is directed only against those who finance the Communists or pursue an anti-British policy.

The reply is accepted as an indication that Mosley is inclining more and more to an undisguised identification with anti-Semitism.

Detroit to Name Street in Honor of Spinoza

DETROIT, Oct. 25—The Common Council of the City of Detroit has taken cognizance of the three hundredth anniversary of the birth of Baruch Spinoza, the famous Dutch-Jewish philosopher, which occurs this year, by naming a street in River Rouge Park in his honor.

This was done at the request of the Spinoza Tri-centennial Committee of which Dr. N. E. Aronstam is chairman. This Committee is arranging a public celebration on November 27, at which Will Durant, the author of "The Story of Philosophy" will speak on "Spinoza and Our Contemporary World."

Police Guarded Stage, Theatre To Prevent Demonstration At Schildkraut Performance

Says Theatrical Managers Now Ask Not for Record, But for Passports

BOSTON, Oct. 25—An eye-witness description of anti-Semitism in Austria was given by Joseph Schildkraut, the actor, member of the famous Schildkraut theatrical family, and himself a native of Vienna, in an address delivered here at a luncheon meeting in connection with the current campaign of the Associated Jewish Philanthropies.

"America is a paradise for the Jews and no mistake about it," Mr. Schildkraut said. "After what happened to me in 'cultured' Vienna, this country is the haven of the world as far as I am concerned. Returning to Vienna after an absence of ten years to appear in a German version of the 'American Tragedy,' I arrived in time for the unveiling of a statue in memory of my father.

"On the evening of my fourth performance, my manager telephoned me not to appear on the stage as there was likely to be an anti-Semitic demonstration because it was election day. I refused to do so and said I was going on regardless of the consequences. I called the Commissioner of Police, a friend of mine, and had to play with policemen stationed backstage, guarding my dressing room, and mounted police at the back door.

"Another day I was in the office of a theatrical manager who was interviewing and engaging talent for the coming season. With my own ears I heard this man, known for his artistic achievement, ask not 'what is your record?', not 'what were your engagements?', but 'show me your passport; if you are a Jew I cannot engage you.'

"One evening after my performance I went to a cafe with some friends. There we met the eminent Prof. Mauritz Oppenheim, the leading dermatologist. A few days before it had been announced that Prof. Oppenheim would be honored with the chair of dermatology in the University of Vienna. While we were seated there, a group of young Hitlerites, boys from 16 to 18, in their brown uniforms, rushed in. Recognizing the professor, they grabbed him by the coat and shouted: 'if you accept the chair at the university, you will be killed the next day.' He did not accept.

"I also witnessed a demonstration in which Hitlerites in full uniform invaded the thickly populated Jewish section. They broke open the doors; pulled the beards of men; beat up women and children and flung them into the street. The newspapers made no mention of this atrocity and the government just laughed it off. That is Vienna today."

Yiddish Press Opens Campaign To Eradicate Illiteracy Among Russian Jews

Seventy Percent of Russian Population Are Still Illiterate, Statistics Reveal

MOSCOW, Oct. 25—The considerable extent to which illiteracy still prevails in Soviet Russia was revealed here today.

Statistics published today disclose that 70 percent of the Russian population are analphabetic. While the figures do not show the number of Jewish illiterates, it is believed that their number is considerably smaller.

Nevertheless, it is revealed that illiteracy still prevails to an appreciable extent among Jews in factories and colonies. Hundreds of illiterates are to be found in the factories in Odessa, Minsk, Homel and Witebsk.

The Yiddish press launched a campaign today for the liquidation of illiteracy among the Jews.

Ill Health Causes Resignation of Bach

"Germany Awake! Perish Judaea!" Hitlerites shouted during the concert. Later, as Tauber was walking through a park, a throng of Hitlerites stopped him and demanded proof that he is not a Jew.

"Leave me in peace. I am not a Jew. I am an artist with no political affiliations. I am an honorary chamberlain to the Pope. How can I be a Jew?" Tauber asserted.

Letter to the Editor

To the Editor of the Jewish Daily Bulletin:

I desire to withdraw a passage printed on pages 388 and 389 of my book "The Spirit of World Politics," as based on insufficient evidence, and as disputed by strong counter evidence now brought to my attention. This passage referred to Professor Albert Einstein's address in New York on March 4, 1931, from which I quoted, on the strength of my memory, two sentences as follows:

"To bring about a understanding between Jews and Arabs is not the responsibility of Great Britain; it is the responsibility of the Jews. And to reach such an understanding is not important than the building of new institutions in Palestine."

I then remarked that "In the English translation as read to the audience, the second of these two statements was omitted."

Dr. A. H. Fromenson, who was the executive secretary of the American Palestine Campaign under whose auspices Professor Einstein made the address, points out that Professor Einstein's written address from which the translation was made, does not contain the second sentence; and that neither does that sentence appear in the translation of the stenographic notes made from Einstein's spoken words. This evidence shakes my "memory" of my memory of the event, and in the absence of conclusive support, I shall withdraw from my text all reference to that second sentence.

With it will go the remark regarding the omission of that sentence from the translation. I desire especially to apologize to Mr. Fromenson and to those in charge of the meeting for the suggestion of the word "omission," there may have been an error in translating, or an elision of Einstein's word or some other failure in the effort to give a precise rendering of his statement. I am satisfied that there was no such defect or failure, and that every precaution was taken to secure a complete and exact record of his words.
